MANSLAUGHTER

Montreal youths, whose wild ride in an automobile, alleged to have been stolen in Quebec, ended in a collision which caused the death of Albert Harvey, aged 47, near here yesterday morning, will appear before Magistrate Lalor on Friday, charged with theft. It is like-ly, according to the police, that the more serious charge of manslaughter will be made against them when the coroner's inquest has been held. It is alleged that the four youths, Thomas Cubron, 19; Laurent Desjar-dins, 18; Robert Desjardins, 19, and Armand Chartrand, stole the automo-bile in which they were riding on Tues-day. The youths, who reside with their parents in Montreal, have no criminal records so far as it is known. When the collision occurred it is al-leged that the youths' car was on the left side of the road and before the oc-cupants of the car driven by Albert Proulx, aged 39, who is in a critical condition, could jump, the light car of the joy riders crashed head on into it, throwing Proulx's car upside down and prisoning its six passengers. The four youths, who were thrown out of their car, with slight injuries, took to their heels across the fields, leaving both cars on fire. They were captured later. The occupants of Proulx's car, who were in grave dan ger of being burned alive, were rescued by residents nearby. Such a plague spot of murder, robbery, brutality and beastiality has rarely existed on the borders of civilization as the Soudan under Egyptian rule, prior to Britain taking control. British "empire-builders" who had taken over the government of Egypt to safeguard the Suez Canal, pushed their out-posts into the desert, increased nav-igation facilities on the Nile, and by a system of rams and irrigation turned an arid wilderness into a fertile coun-try.


