





## THE BUILDING LAW

To the Editor:-The Telegraph this morning publisharpenters to advocate the building of wooden houses, and that it is for the public to decide whether we will build of wood, stone or brick. By the public, I believe, Mr. Hyatt means par-

of wood, stone or brick. By the public, I believe, Mr. Hyatt means particularly the working cass of this community. I would ask, Mr. Editor, in the event of these houses being built of stone or brick, under present conditions. (the cost of land and the building materials mentioned) what chance the average worker has of occupying one of these proposed two storey houses. Mr. Hyatt also suggests forcing the street railway to extend its lines into the suburbs. Would that help the situation any from the workman's viewpoint: Writers on this subject have compared Brantford, Ont., Amherst, N. S., and other cities in arguing for the enforcing of this law. I would appreciate an answer to the following question from any of these gentlemen: In any of the cities mentioned, do you have to pay from \$300 to \$500 for a piece of land in the suburbs 25 ft. x 50 ft., which means that in order to build a man must purchase two lots as anyone who wants to be reasonable knows you cannot build a dwelling house on a lot 25 ft x 50 ft. From a workingman's viewpoint, I see nothing but a further boost of rents if this byelaw passes on Tuesday.

The self-contained cottage with garden plot, front and back, is no doubt the ideal condition, but, Mr. Editor, under present conditions (the cost of land, building materials, etc., etc) it is in the witer's opinion a far-off dream.

For the life of me I cannot see where crowding about fire walls, fire escapes, etc., in connection with the present building laws.

In conclusion I would ask every voter of the working class to consider the proposition from this viewpoint: Is it going to be profitable to build for rent, at a price to suit your pocket-book, a two storey house of either wood, stone of brick on land in the city of St. John or suburbs under present conditions?

B., Aug. 25, Editor Times:— Sir:—I was very much surprised to see the letter in your issue on Saturday from James Sugrue, who claims the three storey tenement is no business of the working men whether it is built or not. If it is of such small consequence, why does Mr. Sugrue rush with his letter to press at almost the last minute and tell the electors to leave well enough alone. The housing conditions in St. John are very bad, and I am very much surprised at Mr. Sugrue, being president of the Trades and Labor Council, and who is supposed to represent the workingmen from taking one step towards better housing conditions. In this great country with all the land at our disposal, there is no need for three storey wooden buildings, but every one should be able to have a house to themselves. The Trades and Labor Council passed a resolution endorsing the action of the city council in passing the bye law. Then they should Mr. Sugrue try to call down the secretary for giving their verdict to the public. Rather high-handed action, I think. In conclusion I hope a great majority of the votes will be cast against the three-decker, as it is about the best step towards progress, we, as citizens, could take.

## IN MEXICO

Washington, Aug. 25—Besides Great Britain, France and Japan, practically all the central and South American countries are lending their suppore to the efforts of the United States to bring about a peaceful settlement of the Mexican revolution.

Unless satisfactory overtures are made by the Huerta government before Tuesday President Wilson will deliver a message to both houses of congress, outlining the suggestions of the United States for the elimination of the Huerta government and the establishing of a legally constituted administration.

That the United States is backed by a world-wide sentiment in its peace policy is conceded in diplomatic circles here. Tangible evidence of the attitude of France came yesterday in news despatches from Paris, stating it was practically certain that President Poincare and Foreign Minister Pinchon would not receive Francesco De La Barra, appointed minister to France by Provisional President Huerta, and now en route to his post.

Great Britain's statement recently that the recognition of Huerta had been provisional, pending an election, taken together with expressions from Japan and France, all of which have formally recognized Huerta, are the only public manifestations of sympathy with the policy of the United States in opposing Huerta, but in the quiet realm of diplomacy a greater pressure is being brought to bear upon the Huerta regime to yield to the American suggestions for peace.



The cost of the proposed project will exceed \$3,000,000. The dock will be 1200 feet long and 150 feet wide, with a depth of 35 feet at low tide and 45 feet at high water. The dock at the Charlestown navy yard, which will hold the largest ship in the navy, is only 730 feet long. In the past this dock has been used by various steamship companies.

The new dock will be located on the South Boston shore beyond the wharves of the Metropolitan Coal Coppany, the Sitaples Coal Company and the Boston Molasses Company. Its site will be at the end of the state land beyond these wharves, where the shore line takes at turn at the mouth of the reserved channel, and will run from the land owned by the state across the reserved channel out toward the main ship channel out toward the main ship channel out toward the main ship channel, is naturally suited for the purpose because of a large ledge of rock which will make a good foundation. 


