Dublin, March 14.—Dublin streets recently re-echoed the crackle of rifles and revolvers as the result of an extraordinary incident. Pago Pago, American Samoa, Feb. 10.—(By mail.)—Merchants and trad-

10.—(By mail.)—Merchants and traders are complaining of unsatisfactory trade returns since the copra crop has fallen short of expectations.

The rhinoceros beetle is increasing in some districts, despite the efforts of the Government to exterminate it, but the decrease in the cocoanut crop cannot be attributed to the beetle. The pest is said to have come to Western Samoa from Ceylon with large importations of rubber plant.

DETROIT FREE PRESS BUILDS NEW HOME

Detroit, March 14. — (Associated Press.) — A combination newspaperoffice building, liberal in space and resplendent in architectural dignity, will be erected by the Free Press Publishing Company, which operates this city's only morning daily, The Detroit

Free Press.

The new home of the Free Press will front on Lafayette Boulevard for an entire city block, and extend back a distance of 130 feet. Present plans call for its occupancy in the fall of 1925.

A central tower 13 stories high will form the new building. One of the wings will be used exclusively for the needs and purposes of the newspaper, while the other will be leased as office space and for stores.
