THE HEALTH REPORT.

Dr. Melvin, Chief Medical Officer, in his report for last year, which has been received at this office, is able to show a marked advance in the work of the Public Health Department, with proportionate good results. The death rate in the province for 1922 was 18.15 per 1,000, compared with 14.34 in 1921 and 15.60 in 1920. This shows a saving of over 880 lives in 1922 as compared with 1920. Infant mortality declined from 134.9 per 1,000 to 103.25.

school inspectors are making use of it in the rural schools. Other child-tarring institutions in St. John have immunized their populations against diphtheria. Several of the St. John physicians have immunized their children. This awakening interest in this method of immunization has been produced in part by the striking effects of this method in control of diphtheria at the Wright Street Memorial Home in St. John three years ago.

Dr. Abramson notes that there are now twenty-two depots in the province where serums may be procured by physicians, and in emergency cases this often saves lives. It is no longer necessary to wait for a supply from Montreal or elsewhere. No physician is now more than 25 miles from a supply.

St. John people will be interested in what Dr. Melvin says about the Health Centre in this city. He says: "I can personally testify that in material matter and arrangement it approaches the ideal, and I have every reason to conclude that under judicious management and control, and with the simple and straightforward principle of the prevention of avoidable mortality in the foreground, it will do much to make St. John what it should be—one of the healthiest cities on the continent."

There is so much of interest and value in the report of the Department over which Hon. Dr. Roberts presides, and which he has made so effective in the interests of public health, that it contains suggestions for many interesting articles, and Dr. Melvin's plea that more use should be made of it by the press to give the people information on a vital subject is by no means ill-founded.

Press Comment

THE CIVIL SERVICE (Winnipeg Tribune)

Omelets cannot be made without breaking eggs. The cost of civil government cannot be cut without dismissal of many civil servants. Nevertheless the condition is not the fault of the civil servants, and everything must follow should be dismissed. Dismissal of married women whose husbands are also employed, of the employees on a temporary basis, and any other possible measures to avoid hardship should first be applied. And if the government adopts a policy of bringing no new employees into the civil service the present surplus would soon be absorbed by voluntary resignations, retirements and deaths.

VALUE OF ADVERTISING. (Victoria Colonist)

Sir Charles Higham, who is one of Britain's chief authorities on the value of advertising, in a recent address on the subject, said that in his 25 years' experience he had found that the newspaper was the quickest and most economical means of reaching the greatest number of people profitably. He expressed the hope that the day would come when the advertising columns of the newspapers of the world would tell the people the advantage of loving one another. His belief was that the advertising columns of the newspapers would some day be the educator of everyone over 16 years of age.

THE VIRTUE OF PATIENCE. (Journal of Commerce)

A constituent of British character is the ability to endure unpleasant things without becoming excited and angry. The possession of this quality distinguishes us rather sharply from some of the other peoples of the world. In private life the Britisher is the most self-suffering being on the face of the earth. There is almost no limit to what he will stand if he cannot see his way clearly to change for the better. It is this capacity of holding on quietly that enables him to outlast rivals and overcome obstacles that would daunt weaker natures. It is the power in reserve which, if anything, will bring our Empire safely through the present trying period, one of the severest in our long history.

WOMEN AT COLLEGE. (Moncton Transcript)

With the large number of girls attending universities today it is hard to realize that less than fifty years ago there wasn't one woman in any Canadian university. The first Canadian woman graduate was from New Brunswick. Miss Harriet Stewart, formerly of Sackville, N. B., and now residing in Western Canada, obtained her B. A. degree at Mount Allison University in 1882. Three years later Miss Stewart received her M. A. degree from the same university. The next two women graduates were in 1884 from Victoria College, then at Coburg, Ont., now at Toronto, and from Queen's University, Kingston, Ont. The New Brunswick graduate has not only the honor of being a pioneer in Canada but is said to be the first woman in the British Empire to obtain an arts degree.

VANCOUVER HAS A RIVAL. (The Toronto Globe)

Vancouver has a rival eager to get its share of the Pacific Coast trade. The Board of Trade of Prince Rupert says that the Northern Pacific port, like Vancouver, is ice-free all the year round, is a terminal of the Transcontinental Railway, which cuts across the wheat belt, and is, therefore, as well located as Vancouver to be an outlet for Western grain. It has no elevator accommodation, and is asking for it. The Edmonton Board of Trade supports the demand. The Bulletin says that, having given assistance to Vancouver in its efforts to obtain equipment for a large grain export business, the Provincial Government and Edmonton are equally bound to help Prince Rupert.

Mr. Peck, opposition member for Albert in the Legislature, says there are no better securities in Canada than New Brunswick provincial bonds. That such is the case is a cause for gratification. But for the Valley Railway burden the province would be in a very fortunate position and each year's financial statement much more satisfactory.

Two Ontario Liberals have declared themselves against any reduction in the tariff that would affect industries in which their constituents are interested. It will be interesting to learn whether any Maritime Province Conservative will rise to champion a high tariff or object to a reduction in the present one.

The church union bill has passed the Manitoba Legislature, the committee on private bills in the Saskatchewan Legislature has made no amendments conflicting with its principles, and that of Alberta has withheld its approval from one minor clause.

The debate in the Legislature is more or less interesting, but has not nearly everything been said that is worth saying in advance of discussion of measures to be introduced? Why prolong the discussion?
