



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University of Trinity College.

THE UNIVERSITY OF TRINITY COLLEGE was constituted by a Royal Charter, bearing date 16th July, 1852, and empowered to confer Degrees in Divinity, Arts, Law, and Medicine.

THE CONVOCATION of the University consists of the Chancellor, the Provost and Professors of Trinity College, and all persons admitted to the Degree of Master of Arts, or to any Degree in Divinity, Law, or Medicine, in the University.

No Degree can be granted by the University, unless a Supplicat for that Degree shall have passed the Convocation, having been previously approved by the Caput.

THE CAPUT consists of the Vice-Chancellor; the Deans of the Faculties of Law and Medicine; and Two Masters of Arts, to be elected annually by Convocation at the first meeting in the Michaelmas Term,

The University confers no Degree whatever unless the Candidate has previously taken the oath of allegiance and supremacy, and subscribed the following declaration :—

"I, A. B., do willingly and heartily declare that I am truly and sincerely a member of the United Church of England and Ireland."*

* For any Degree in Divinity, subscription to the Three Articles of the XXXVIth Canon is also required.

PROCEEDINGS IN ARTS.

All Candidates for the Degree of B.A. must be matriculated Students of Trinity College, and have kept nine complete Terms. They will be required by the University to pass two Examinations—

I. THE PREVIOUS EXAMINATION, which will take place at the end of the Lent Term in the second year. The subjects of this Examination will be:

One of the Historical Books of the New Testament. Paley's Evidences of Christianity. The Church Catechism. One Greek and one Latin Author. Latin Prose Composition.

Euclid-B. I. II. III. IV. VI.

Algebra to the end of the Binomial Theorem.

Trigonometry to the end of the solution of Triangles.

The particular Latin and Greek authors will be fixed at the beginning of the Lent Term in the year preceding. The names of those who pass this Examination will be arranged in two classes, in alphabetical order—the first class consisting of those who shall pass with credit; the second of those to whom the Examiners shall only not refuse their certificate of approval. Any one who shall absent himself from the proper Examination of his year, without the written approval of the Vice-Chancellor, will not be allowed the Lent Term of that year.

Those who fail to satisfy the Examiners must present themselves at the Examination in the following year.

II. THE EXAMINATION FOR THE DEGREE OF BACHE-LOR OF ARTS, which will take place at the beginning of the tenth term from Matriculation.

The subjects for this Examination will be:

Old and New Testament History.

One of the Historical Books of the New Testament.

The Articles of the Church of England.

Two Greek and two Latin Authors.

Greek and Roman History.

Latin Prose Composition.

Euclid.

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Algebra to the end of the Binomial Theorem. Trigonometry to the end of Solution of Triangles. Mechanics.

Hydrostatics.

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The particular authors will be fixed before the end of the Easter Term of the second year.

Those who shall have been approved at this **E**xamination may present themselves for further **E**xamination for Honors in Classics or Mathematics.

The Honor Examination will take place shortly after the Examination for the ordinary degree of B.A. The result of each Honor Examination will be published in three classes, in order of merit.

N.B.—The Lectures in the Arts Course commence in the Michaelmas Term; and as the Annual Examination in the following June, and the final Examination for the Degree of B.A., embrace the subjects of the Lectures delivered in that Term, a Student entering at any other time does so under a great disadvantage.

PROCEEDINGS IN DIVINITY.

THEOLOGICAL CLASS.

THE THEOLOGICAL COURSE extends over two years. Any person is eligible for admission to it who has taken the Degree of B.A., or who, having attained the age of twenty-one, has passed one year in the Arts Course.

BACHELOR OF DIVINITY.

Candidates for this Degree must be Masters of Arts of at least seven years' standing. The requisite exercises are :---

A Latin and an English Thesis: one on some point of doctrine connected with the Thirty-Nine Articles; and the other on some Scriptural subject; to be appointed by the Examiners.

An Examination must also be passed in some Latin or Greek Treatise or Treatises chosen by the Examiners.

An English sermon must be preached before the University.

DOCTOR OF DIVINITY.

Candidates for this Degree must be Bachelors of Divinity of five years' standing. They will be required to write an English and a Latin Thesis, as in the case of B.D., and to preach an English sermon before the University.

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th th The Examiners in Divinity shall be the Professor of Divinity and two Graduates in that Faculty, to be appointed by the Council.

EXAMINATION IN MORAL SCIENCES.

AN EXAMINATION IN MORAL SCIENCES will take place at the end of the Lent Term in each year, open to Bachelors of Arts. There will be a course of lectures on the History of Philosophy, and on portions of the works of standard ancient and modern Philosophers.

The particular subjects for Examination will be fixed in the Lent Term of the preceding year.

Candidates will be arranged in order of merit.

PROCEEDINGS IN MEDICINE.

Students intending to proceed to a Degree in Medicine are required—

1. (To Matriculate.

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2. To pass their first year in College under the same regulations as Students in Arts.

N.B.—During this year they must attend, besides the Arts Lectures, one Lecture daily on Materia Medica, and one on Chemistry.

3. They will be required to pass the PREVIOUS EXAMINATION at the end of the Lent Term in their second year.

4. The three remaining years of their course will be devoted to Medical Studies exclusively; during which time they will be subjected to two Examinations—the first in the April of their third year, and the second at the end of the course. Before each of these Examinations a Fee of £3 must be paid. 5. On completing the course of four years, and passing the requisite Examinations, the Student receives from the University a License "ad practicandum in Medicina."

6. He may proceed to the Degree of M.B. after the expiration of two years from the completion of his Medical course, without further Examination.

NOTE.—The Declaration required of Candidates for any Degree in Arts will be required of Candidates either for a License or a Degree in Medicine.

Further information as to the course of study may be obtained by application to the Dean of the Faculty.

LIBRARY.

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The College Library contains about 2,900 volumes, 600 of which are a gift from the Society for the Promotion of Christian Knowledge. About the same number were sent from England by private benefactors before the College was opened. Valuable additions have been made to the Library by the Government of the State of New York, from the Smithsonian Institute, and from Columbia College. The Bishop of Toronto has also presented upwards of 300 volumes, including many valuable works in Theological, Classical, and general Literature.

All fees for Matriculation and Degrees are appropriated to the Library Fund. Members of Convocation are, under certain regulations, entitled to the use of the Library.

MUSEUM.

A part of the present building has been fitted up for the temporary reception of a Museum of Natural History, towards which many Mineralogical, Geological, and other specimens have been already contributed.

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of y, One Wellington and one Burnside or Bishop Strachan Scholarship will be awarded annually, according to the result of the June Examination, to Students in Arts of the first year, who have been matriculated in the previous Michaelmas Term, and have kept three complete Terms.

Two SCHOLARSHIPS founded by the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel, from the Jubilee Fund of the year 1851, of the annual value of £40 currency, tenable for two years. One of these Scholarships is awarded yearly to the most deserving Bachelor of the year who shall have expressed his intention of studying for Holy Orders.

Two SCHOLARSHIPS, founded by the HON. JOHN HILLYARD CAMERON, Q.C., of the annual value of £25 currency, tenable for three years; appropriated to the sons of Clergymen of the United Church of England and Ireland who shall be at the time resident and doing duty in British North America, or who, having fulfilled these conditions, shall be incapacitated by age or sickness, or removed by death. A preference will be given, *cæteris paribus*, to candidates intending to receive Holy Orders. The Examination for this Scholarship is held at the beginning of the Michaelmas Term, and the Scholar is required to graduate in Arts.

THREE SCHOLARSHIPS, founded by G. W. ALLAN, Esq., of the annual value of $\pounds 30$ currency—two for Students in Arts, and one for Students in Medicine. The Scholarships in Arts are awarded according to the result of the Annual Examination in June, and

*This Scholarship was founded by subscription in 1853, to commemorate the completion of the fiftieth year of the Bishop's ministerial life. are tenable for three years. The Medical Scholarship is tenable for four years, and is awarded to the most deserving commencing Bachelor of Arts of Trinity College who shall have kept nine terms in the College, and shall have declared his intention of studying Medicine before the end of his ninth Term.

ONE LAW SCHOLARSHIP, given by the Professors in the Faculty of Law, of the value of £30 currency per annum, tenable for three years, by a Student in Arts, either before or after the Degree of B.A.

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The following Scholarships are also open to competition at the commencement of the Michaelmas Term of each year.

FIVE DIVINITY SCHOLARSHIPS, tenable for four years—one of £30 currency per annum, two of £25 currency, and two of £20 currency. The holders of these Scholarships will be required to reside for four years, during the first two of which they must attend the lectures in the Arts course.*

AN EXHIBITION of the annual value of £30, tenable for three years, has been founded by ROBERT DENIson, Esq. The Exhibitioner is nominated by Mr. Denison: he must have entered on his seventeenth year, and is required to graduate in Arts.

Any person offering himself as a Candidate for admission is required to produce testimonials of good conduct, and to pass a Matriculation Examination in certain fixed subjects, which may be known on application to the Provost. Every Candidate for admission must have entered upon his sixteenth for a scholarship, on his seventeenth year.

The annual Expenses of a Student resident in College are $\pounds 50$ currency, exclusive of $\pounds 12$ 10s. as College Fees.

Students residing with their parents in Toronto make an annual payment of £15 10s. currency.

* An additional Scholarship of £20 currency per annum will be offered in October 1856.


