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ready made to the House and thought Mr. Willis ought to wait until that gentleman was present. The information wanted was, however, furnished. He claimed that enquiry would show the Surveyor-General's management of Crown Lands to be creditable to himself and the Province. He thought the House ought not to call upon the Government to furnish papers relating to transactions between private parties.

Mr. Blair replied that what he wanted was papers relating to lands bid in by Government agents and afterwards sold to private purchasers. Mr. Willis explained that he had allowed this matter to stand over on Saturday, and there was, therefore, no need to hasten about it. He wished to secure protection for the legitimate operator against the system introduced by the Surveyor-General, by which friends of the Government received favors and those opposed to them were differently treated.

Mr. Sayre's bill for the abolition of the Legislative Council was committed, and, after some discussion, was reported on it, the first session being passed. On Tuesday Mr. Blair gave notice of motion for a return of all minutes of council and orders made since the 1st of March, 1879, relating to the appointment of a Committee of Council to further investigate the matters of the Chatham Branch Railway, and the reports, documents and papers submitted to the Executive, touching the matters in litigation in the Court of Equity between the Government and the directors and company, and certain stockholders, and touching the settlement of the said suit, and all minutes or orders in Council relating to and authorizing a settlement, and statement of the terms and conditions of settlement and all information in possession of the Government, as to the state of the road, by and to whom sold, and when and at what price, and as to the proceeding, or legal authority under which the sale took place.

A bill relating to Auctioneers, introduced by Mr. Landry, has passed the Lower House. The law provides that auctioneers shall pay their license fees between the 1st and 10th of January; the bill is to amend the law so that they shall pay immediately on taking out the license. Under the old law, if appointed after the 10th of January, the auctioneers escaped paying fees for the remainder of the year. On Tuesday afternoon, in answer to Mr. Ritchie, the Attorney-General stated that in the case of the Queen vs. Tower, which was commenced during the session of the House, when neither he nor the Solicitor-General could get away, the sum of \$600 was paid to Payley for services as a solicitor. In the case of the Queen vs. Malone, the Government paid no counsel fees, and the lawyers conducting the case acted for the Solicitor-General.

The House again went into Committee on the item law, which was supported by Lyonn, Gillespie and White, and opposed by McLean, Hamilton, Fraser, Turner, Blair and others. The arguments advanced were about the same as when the bill was first considered in session. A motion to give the Bill the one month's notice was lost and progress was reported.
