ted States commission on reciprocity, out of which nothing might come, and declaring that the tariff was both a revenue producing one, and one capable of stimulating manufactures, Sir Leonard Tilley went to show that there had been an increase both in the importation of coal in 1870-80, and in the production of Nova Scotia coal. In the manufacture of cotton there had been a large increase, and there had been an increase in the importation of the raw article. In wool production there was an increase, but the goods were selling cheaper than ever before. There was an increase in raw hides and in pig iron. There has been a falling off in the item of sugar, but this was caused by withdrawal in anticipation of duty. He claimed, however, that people paid no more for their sugar, and at no length went into the price of sugar. He referred to the manufactures at Moncton and at Halifax as giving employment to the people. There was an increase in business in the furniture factories and the locomotive factories, in agricultural implement making, in boots and shoes, in silk making, in the manufacture of printing paper, wall paper, and in pianos and organs. Better times had increased the purchasing power, that these manufactures were extending greatly. Look works, brass works, and manufacturers of shelf, hardware, formerly not made in the Dominion, had been established and enlarged. A corset factory now employed five or six hundred hands. In ready-made clothing, the Dominion had increased nine hundred. A careful estimate clearly established that increased raw material to the amount of six millions was used in a year, while the increased operations employed 14,000 operatives, giving support to 42,000. If but 7,000 occupied different houses, this was virtually creating a city of 40,000 to 50,000 people. He would appeal to the House if the most sanguine supporters of the National Policy would have expected such remarkable results. In regard to the way the tariff affected farmers, he thought the price of flour had increased on an average to consumers about ten cents per barrel. Wheat grain had increased in market value at seasons, while the price was in demand at better prices by distillers, owing to the fact that having increased the cost of corn, the duty on corn had increased its price, and also caused increased production in Ontario. Oats in the Maritime Provinces and portions of the West, had been increased three cents per bushel. He found no part of the tariff more acceptable than the duty on fruit and fruit trees. With reference to the amount of the duty on iron, he added to the cost of freight. He took issue with the Finance Minister on two assertions, viz., that the present tariff was the best tariff for increasing the exports of our products, then the claim would be well founded. PARLIAMENT. The Budget. On Friday last, the debate on the Budget was opened in the House of Commons by SIR LEONARD TILLEY. He said he could not follow the same course as he had followed on the occasion of last year's Budget. He had, therefore, had to content himself with what was in 1873, drawing the attention of the House to the fact that there was a full treasury and a prosperous condition of affairs in the country, and a good hope for the future. In 1879 matters had materially changed, and he had to point out that for three or four years preceding there had been serious deficits, the trade had been depressed and the manufactures of the country nearly crushed out. Then it was, in consequence of these things, the duty of the Government to devise means for remedying the evil, that existed. At the last session he was able to tell the House that success had attended them, that confidence had been restored, that the country was again impetus, and our manufacturing and other industries had been revived. He was now prepared to say that within two years all their expectations had been met. Last session the Government had been compelled to ask Parliament over and above the estimates for \$200,000 for the Indians in the North West and also for \$100,000 for the distressed people of Ireland, which sums were not included in the estimates. These sums asked for, and they had been compelled to add to them, were a deficiency of half a million, but this turned out not to be the case. When he submitted the tariff in 1873 he stated the estimates of its revenue producing power to be \$2,600,000 more than the previous tariff, and this was very clearly demonstrated. He pointed out that the late Finance Minister had adopted the same plan under similar circumstances. The estimated revenue for last year was \$24,607,000, and the excess over expenditure was \$1,574,000. FREDERICTON, Feb. 16.—Notice of motions were given: By Mr. Blair, for an account in detail of all moneys paid by each department of the Government for printing and advertising, names of persons to whom payment has been made, and amount paid each of the newspapers in which advertising is done, and the amount paid each and when paid, from 1st Nov. 1879 to date.

By Mr. Willis for a complete statement of the several lots of land advertised for sale in the Royal Gazette, under date Oct. 16th, 1880, to take place on the first Tuesday in November, 1881, comprising lands in the counties of Restigouche, Gloucester, Northumberland, Kent, Saint John, Kings, York and Victoria, together with the names of the applicants, the amounts to be realized from the sale of the several lots, and the names of the purchasers of the same, the names of the persons to whom transfers, if any, were made, the names of any persons acting as agents for the Government, or for any person or persons not connected with the Government, a complete statement of the commissions allowed to agents and of the quantity of lands disposed of at such sales which were held under license.

Mr. Blair resumed the debate on the Address. He criticized the policy of the Surveyor-General in forcing sales of Crown Lands out of which the regular revenue of the Province is, in part, made up, showing that if this policy were continued a great revenue source would be dried up. No such recourse should be had, unless the necessities of the Province were very urgent, which they could only be through mismanagement. There were reasons why the Government were obliged to obtain an advance of \$80,000 before the close of the last fiscal year. Yet for all this, the school teachers had to wait for months for their salaries beyond the time they were due. When the Government had to raise extra, and yet could not meet the expenditure, the finances could not be healthy.

The Attorney-General said it was not the Surveyor-General who took the initiative in connection with the Chatham Branch. In the journals of 1879 it is found on the 8th of July a search was made, and it was found the proceedings were taken. On the 15th the committee was appointed to look into the matter. Between the 8th and 15th the Surveyor-General took office and negotiations were going on with him for some weeks before he entered the Government. He knew himself, that before he entered the administration, the Surveyor-General stipulated there should be an investigation of the Chatham Branch. On the strength of this he made the statement he did, and those who carried on the negotiations must have communicated with the other members and had the action taken.

Mr. Hutchison introduced a bill entitled the Act to amend the Act to incorporate the North West Boom Company and to continue the said Act of incorporation and the amendment thereto. Mr. Blair gave notice of motion for a statement of the expenses attending the reception of and attendance of the English agricultural delegates, showing the amount paid at each locality and payment in gross, with a statement of the names of the various persons accompanying the delegates at the public expense.

Mr. Blair gave the following notice of inquiry: Whether the Government contemplate making any changes in the management of the Educational Department, or in the Regulations of the Board of Education, or introducing any measure in amendment of the law whereby the cost of the present school system may be diminished, and the same made more acceptable to the country. Mr. White gave notice of the following inquiries: Whether it is the intention of the Government to make any appointments to fill the vacancies in the Legislative Council, and if so, it is intended that the appointments shall be made before the close of the present session of the Legislature; and whether the Board of Works Department have during the past two years, invited tenders for supplying all fuel required by the departments; if not why have not tenders been invited, and what sums have been paid for fuel specifying payments for the different kinds for each of the fiscal years 1879 and 1880.

Mr. Sayre committed his bill providing for the reduction of the representation of Northumberland, Westmorland, York, Charlotte and St. John counties to three members each. He referred, at considerable length, to the various notices of population, and said the chief object of the bill was not the saving of expense, though that would amount to \$3000 or \$4000 annually, but equalling the representatives in the House of Government, and having the equalizing of the population of the counties monopolized by five counties. He hoped there would be magnanimity enough among the representatives of the counties he named, to acknowledge the justice of the principle of the Act. Carleton is not now represented fairly according to population, at the present time, one county increased more rapidly than another; no change had been made in the representation hitherto.

Mr. Butler favored the bill. Mr. Blair and Mr. H. proposed it. Mr. Davidson believed four members were better for Northumberland than three. Population is not always the correct basis of representation. The varied interests of the counties should be regarded. The interests of the counties which are agricultural, and the interests of Northumberland are very varied and extensive. Northumberland is as well entitled to four members, taking into account the importance of the county, as Kent is to two. Two or three particular counties should not be reduced without there being a general reduction all over the House.

Mr. Johnson said Northumberland had a population of 20,000 and Kent 10,000. It is never too soon to do good, and change should be made now. York deserves four, for the Parliament buildings are in York. In Malawaska we see every little bribe built from the Government road money, because it always has a member in the Government. See the power those counties with four representatives have. He hoped the House would take the matter into consideration, and give every county justice.

Mr. Elton moved the bill, and would vote for a reduction of the Executive also. He made an excellent speech on the subject and was followed by several other members when progress was reported. Mr. Blair gave the following notice of inquiry: Whether the Government have continued to pay a subsidy to the Grand Southern Railway Company since the last session of the Legislature, and notwithstanding the refusal of the Legislature to renew and continue the Act to incorporate the Grand Southern Railway Company; and if so, whether the Government have continued to pay the same, and under what authority has the Government continued to pay the same?

Mr. Hutchison presented the petition of Robert Willey praying for a subsidy for steam ferry boats to run on the Miramichi.
