**THE BABY'S CLOTHES.**  
"A baby's clothing should be drawn over its feet and not slipped over its head," said Miss Marianna Whelan, superintendent of the "Babies' Hospital," of New York City, "whose long experience in the matter makes her an authority on all subjects pertaining to the care of infants."  
"Nothing is more awkward than to stoop to dress a young baby in a sitting posture. It should lie on the nurse's lap until quite able to sit alone. If the clothes are put on as I describe there will be no fighting and crying. Instead, the child will be content of being dressed. For the first four months there should be a snug flannel band over its bowels. Later this should be replaced by a ribbed knitted band of wool, cotton, and linen, like the top of a sock. It must be drawn over the feet and should be worn during the second year.

"I am sure that nearly all intestinal troubles in young children are caused by their bowels getting cold. It is the one place which must be protected if you have any doubts as to the matter, try a few of these bands which I recommend, medium, thin and gauze.
