INTERESTING LETTER FROM CAMPBELLTON BOY
Tells How Louis Annett Was Wounded and Taken a Prisoner.

The following letter has been received from a Campbellton boy who was in the same unit with Louis Annett when he was wounded and captured, and throws light on how it was done.

France, Nov. 10th, 1916

Dear Father:
 Received your letter with clippings some time ago and was glad to get them.

We have moved to a new part of the line now since my last letter and it sure is a great change too; farther south. It is the quietest part we have been at yet.

Have made enquiries about Louis Annett and as near as I can find out he is a prisoner. Will give you an account as near as possible. The Battalion made an attack and took a certain trench and while they were holding it Louis was wounded just over the heart. One of the other sergeants tried to carry him out but he was too heavy and the Sgt. put him in a kind of sheltered spot alongside a Sgt.-Major who was also wounded. The Sgt. then went to get a stretcher but while he was gone back Fritz made a counter attack and retook the trench. So Louis is probably a prisoner. Fritz has been using the wounded very well down there and so he has a good chance.

This trench changed hands a good many times in a short time and he may have been taken out by our own Red Cross men and I hope so. Of course everything is so uncertain down here that it is very hard to get any information at all, but I have been enquiring as much as possible and trying to find out.

This is a very nice place, we are in now and very quiet. There is little or no artillery work but quite a lot of trench mortars. They are pretty but we are away out of their range. There are seven of us in the dugout and we have a room in front of it with a (P.T. O.) fireplace in it which we use for a kitchen and living room.

There has been no cold weather yet, but quite a lot of rain.

The Graphics come pretty regularly and I am very glad to get them.

Saw Fred Graham, young Lebeans and Merle Keith a short time ago and they were all O. K.

REV. J. E. PURDIE TO LEAVE CAMPBELLTON
Has Accepted Call to Parish in Saskatoon—Had Other Calls.

Campbellton people who have become so well acquainted with the Rector of Christ Church, Rev. J. E. Purdie will regret to learn that he is about to sever his connection with the work here and has accepted a call to Saskatoon.

Rev. Mr. Purdie came here from St. John a little over six years ago when Campbellton was a town of shacks. He and Mrs. Purdie entered heartily into the work and to-day a handsome brick church, with a church hall and a Rectory have been built.

On Sunday morning last the Rev. J. E. Purdie announced to his congregation that since coming to this Parish he had received six calls to go elsewhere. Some few months after he came here he had an offer to go to a city where there was a fine church, with a good Rectory and Parish hall with Rector's office in it and \$400.00 per year more than he was receiving here. A few months later he received another attractive offer to go to British Columbia, moving expenses paid and several hundred dollars more a year. These both were declined believing God had not made way clear for him to go. Less than two years ago he had an opportunity to go to a Parish in Ontario. This was also declined. On the 28th of September last he was unanimously elected to the Rectorship of a progressive town in the Diocese of Saskatchewan. He wired his refusal feeling that this parish did not afford opportunities for the kind of work God wanted him to do. In early October he received a communication from an Archbishop in the same Diocese saying that St. James' church, Saskatoon, was vacant and that his name was being put in the hands of the Wardens and Vestry. Before the parish meeting took place he had an offer which presented a most attractive opening for work in the city of Toronto. While this latter was under consideration a wire came from the Wardens of St. James' church, Saskatoon, saying that he was elected to the Rectorship and also another from the Bishop of Saskatchewan ratifying the appointment. After much prayer and consideration Mr. Purdie wired his decision accepting this offer. These calls came entirely unsought for and from the most unexpected quarters. Saskatoon is a progressive city of 25,000 inhabitants. There are in the city four Anglican Parishes. Within the borders of St. James' stands the University of Saskatchewan and alongside Emmanuel Anglican Theological College. The Bishop is a strong, evangelical man and very keen on evangelistic work. The College and practically the whole Diocese is Evangelical.

Campbellton friends will join with the Graphic in wishing Rev. and Mrs. Purdie every success in their new field of work.

PUBLIC PROPERTY & STREETS.
 Your committee to whom are referred all matters relating to Public Property and Streets respectfully submit that they have had under consideration the application of Mr. W. J. Comeau for rent of store on east side of building. We interviewed the ladies of the Women's Institute who are engaged in Red Cross work in this room and find a desire amongst them to hold the room for their use, as well as the Tipperary Club and LaToque Club. Under the circumstances we do not feel like depriving the ladies of the use of the room and would therefore recommend that Mr. Comeau be notified that at present we cannot rent the room.

This report was adopted.

Coun. Alexander reported from the committee to interview the McLennan Foundry & Machine Works, stating that they had met with the manager and a rate of five cents was agreed upon.

Coun. Alexander further stated that when the electric power schedule was fixed by the Council it was agreed that all accounts over \$100.00 per month should be allowed a discount of 50 per cent. In some way this latter had been omitted, and he moved as follows:

That the Electric Power rate schedule be amended by adding the following words: "accounts of \$100.00 and over per month a discount of 50 per cent. Carried."

Coun. Harquail reported that there was a serious shortage of coal for the Power house and it seemed almost impossible to get a supply. There was enough on hand to carry over into February. Many dealers had been approached but none could guarantee delivery.

The matter was left in the hands of the Electric Light committee. The Council then adjourned.

WOUNDED HEROES RETURN HOME
Corporal Clarence Duncan and Private Seely Johnson Arrive Wednesday.

Two more Campbellton boys have arrived home wounded from the front. They are Corporal Clarence Duncan and Private Seely Johnson.

Corporal Duncan enlisted with the 26th Battalion and was wounded in the left elbow, making the arm stiff. He has been discharged as unfit for further service.

Private Seely Johnson is home on leave and expects to return to duty. They returned on the Local, Wednesday, and were met by an enthusiastic crowd at the depot, who gave them three rousing cheers as they stepped off the train. As it had been announced that they would arrive on the Limited many people were disappointed in not seeing them.

Friends of both the boys are to-day warmly greeting them.

Editor of Graphic, Campbellton.

Dear Sir:—

In the "Tribune" some weeks ago and more recently in the "Graphic" it was stated that the water supply of the Town of Dalhousie had been "tested" and was above suspicion.

To allow these statements to go uncontradicted would mean concurrence in their truth. As a matter of fact, no official examination of the water of Dalhousie has been made, which is authoritative of the slightest legal value.

Our water system consists of a reservoir in the hills, three miles from town, fed by a mountain brook, and of a well in the middle of the village. This latter was bought by Mayor Montgomery, for town use, from himself, The Dalhousie Land Co. for two thousand dollars.

The difference of opinion about the quality of our water supply centres in this well. From its situation, and the character of the water we are supplied with, where its contents are pumped into the main, the majority of people here thought and think it dangerous, and the Provincial Board of Health was asked to investigate.

Dr. Mullin, Secretary of the Board, an official of the New Brunswick Government at a salary of \$50.00 a month, was sent to make a report, on which the Provincial Board of Health might act intelligently. Dr. Mullin on his arrival, examined the surroundings of this hill, and elicited the following facts.

The well is fifty-five feet deep, situated on a slight elevation and surrounded on two sides by a swamp which approaches to within seventy-five feet of it, on three sides it is surrounded with privy pits, cess pools and pig pens, the nearest being 30 feet away, there being in all from fifteen to twenty within a radius of two hundred feet of this well. The proprietor of one privy, which is situated on higher ground, and eighty feet away stated that it had not been cleaned out for thirteen years, the pit and under the floor had in all that time been filled with water, which was sucked dry when this well was pumped.

Directly on top of this well, for two years before and one year after it had been purchased and used for a public water supply, stood a henhouse with the accumulated manure from a population of five hundred hens, and all the territory around and about and immediately over these walls had been used as a hen run. This hen house was removed, the manure carted away by W. S. Montgomery a few weeks before in anticipation of Dr. Mullin's visit.

When this well is pumped, every private well, with two situated in the swamp, within a distance of two hundred feet is sucked dry.

For seventy-five years this swamp and all the territory tributary to this well has been soaked with fecal matter.

It is obvious that when one privy and all the wells within two hundred feet are sucked dry, that every privy, cess pool and other cavity-containing fluid is also exhausted and that this

ANOTHER BONAVENTURE BOY WOUNDED

Private James Allison of Escuminac Reported Wounded in Action.

Ottawa, Nov. 20th.

I regret to inform you that Private James Allison, artillery, officially reported wounded Nov. 10th. Will send further particulars when received.

so called well is only a catch basin for all the filth in the vicinity.

The above are the conditions Dr. Mullin found of which he took copious notes as each person told his or her story.

In his report, which is found in the official blue book of the Provincial Board of Health for 1915, Dr. Mullin for a reason known to himself suppresses all the above facts, but describes the surroundings of the wells as "deplorable", unsatisfactory" and "disgraceful". The doctor says further that an inspection twice a year, and cleaning their closets and swamps twice a year, will make this well safe and above suspicion as a public water supply. Does he propose to contaminate the local contributors to these necessary utilities for 363 days in the year with extract of strawberry or some such popular remedy.

The doctor also included and published in this report what purports to be an analysis of water taken from this well. To be of any value he must be prepared to swear that it did so. Doctor Mullin handed the specimen of water, which came from this well trusealed, into the hands of men who had a two thousand dollar interest in the purity of this water. They had it in their possession for at least two hours. This report is not worth the paper it is written upon as Dr. Mullin does not know and cannot swear where the water came from which he sent for analysis.

Water from this swamp was pumped into our houses by night for some weeks two years ago. During the day, reservoir water only flowed, on a certain day about noon, the Rev. Dr. Polley and Rev. A. Coleman took a specimen of the reservoir water, in the evening of the same day, from the same tap, under the same conditions when the well was being pumped, they took a specimen of the mixed water. They sterilized the bottle, took the specimen, packed and expressed them, and are in every way responsible for the accuracy of the test. The report of Dr. Cornell, Bacteriologist of the Ontario Board of Health on the two specimens, was, that the sample of reservoir water taken at noon was absolutely pure, the mixed specimen taken at night was unfit to use and that this well should be condemned.

About this time some explanation had to be offered as to why the water supplied was so disgusting. What more simple than to secure what purported to be an analysis of the reservoir water, showing to be hard. This was secured and at the time could be seen on the Town minutes, it stated in effect that the reservoir water was dangerous to use, and the analyst advised that the reservoir be treated (Continued on page four)



OUR BIG GAME

The big game hunting season closes to-day. We trust that from now on the government will appoint a sufficient number of reliable and active game wardens to see that the big game is properly protected during the winter months, and that the slaughter of game which took place last winter will be prevented this season.

We would suggest that the wardens be ordered to visit every lumber camp in the district and remove every rifle or gun they discover in them, and issue a warning that the law will be enforced to the full extent of the law.

Our big game is one of our most valuable natural resources and should be protected, to prevent its becoming extinct.

EDITOR'S MAIL BAG (Continued from page 2) Significantly twice a year with Hypocrite of soda and that he would gladly send down an engineer to give the first treatment and show how to do it. But his advice was not acted on.

For six weeks this autumn our houses have been pointed with this swamp water. Some people shut it out entirely, those near wells carried water, others boiled filtered it, a few with no other resources were compelled to use it. The pump was stopped something over a week ago, forty-eight hours after our water was as clear as crystal.

For two years after the purchase of this well the people used and enjoyed reservoir water, despite the fact that it was shown on the minutes to be dangerous, our Mayor never had the analysts advice carried out and allowed the people here to use this disgraceful water. Was not this very reprehensible?

On the other hand, we have this swamp water, which when injected into our houses, looks like a weak decoction of pea soup, smells like an attenuated typhoid stool and I am told tastes like decayed bilge water, vomited for by our Mayor and has almost the vice of the Board of Health which the people here refuse to use, surely Dalhousie possesses a contumacious wrong headed and obstinate population. Perhaps they may be pardoned if they do not consider Dr. Mullin's remedy adequate and esteem his expressed views on sanitation, as primitive crude and unappetizing.

A practical result of the use of this water has been two cases of typhoid in families which use it. This is the first time in twenty years that typhoid has originated here. I believe it due to the water. There have been many cases of severe typhoid and one woman nearly lost her life. These all occurred during the period from the last of August, when this swamp water was being pumped into the mains. There were also many cases.

es of acute temporary poisonings, the two latter conditions were certainly due to this water.

Two men here only are enthusiastic over the well, one is W. S. Montgomery, the Dalhousie Land Co., who sold the well, the other, W. S. Montgomery, the Mayor, who bought the well for the town. They have two thousand reasons for their enthusiasm and each reason represents an easy dollar.

The "Tribune" correspondent stated that the writer was "censured" in connection with this well. Dr. Mullin in this wonderful report says "If this water is bad it is due to the fact that Dr. Ferguson neglected to have these privies, cess pools and swamps cleaned twice a year".

Did the genial doctor forget that he was writing a report in which the health of a community was involved and think pervas conducting a page in a comic paper. Does he not know that the augen stables cannot be cleaned. The attempt was made long ago and failed. The writer did not believe that a doctor could be found in New Brunswick who would not condemn this well at sight as a public water supply.

Dr. Mullin is an official of the New Brunswick Government at a salary of fifty dollars a month.

I wish briefly to refer to the way in which this well became town property. A test as to quantity was made by Wm. Gallop, a director of the Dalhousie Land Co., what was stated to be an analysis of this water, was provided by Wm. Montgomery, president and A. J. LeBlanc, secretary of the same company. These data were accepted as authoritative by the Mayor and Town Council, and the well without any independent enquiry in the town interest, was purchased from these people for \$2000.00 and a bond issue of \$7500 later on issued part of which was used to pay for it. The Ratepayers presented to the Town Council meeting, a petition asking, what the law demands, that before the well was purchased or bonds issued they be granted a vote on the subject. This was contemptuously refused.

Suppose for illustration my dear sir, that Mayor Andrew styled his property the "Campbellton Grab Co." with you Town Clerk and made superintendent, secretary and director and attempted to sell the Town of Campbellton a well under similar conditions to above what do you think your Town Council and the people of Campbellton would do to them?

IMPORTANT CHANGES IN HEALTH REGULATIONS

Householders Must Report Suspected Cases of Infectious Diseases.

At a meeting of the Provincial Board of Health held in the city of St. John on Thursday the 9th day of November instant some amendments were made to the Rules and Regulations of the said board.

Rule I, Sub Section (i) as amended will read as follows:—"The local Board shall cause to be isolated and kept isolated every patient suffering or suspected to be suffering from Smallpox, Infantile Paralysis, Cerebro-Spinal Meningitis, Measles, Scarlet fever, Diphtheria, cholera or Typhus Fever, so long as the danger of contagion exists."

Rule IV, as amended will read as follows:—"Any householder in whose house there shall occur a case of Smallpox, Infantile Paralysis, Epidemic Cerebro-Spinal meningitis, Cholera, Diphtheria, Scarlet Fever, Tuberculosis, Typhus Fever, Typhoid Fever or Measles, shall immediately notify the Board of Health of that district of the same."

Rule VI, as amended will read as follows:—"Whenever a case of Scarlet Fever, Diphtheria, Typhus Fever, Infantile Paralysis, Epidemic Cerebro-Spinal Meningitis, Measles or Smallpox exists in any house or dwelling a notice or placard shall be posted on or near the door of such house stating that such disease exists therein and no person shall remove such notice or placard

without any authority of that Local Board of Health of that district. Of all the contagious diseases above mentioned, typhoid fever, tuberculosis, scarlet fever, diphtheria and measles are those most common in this district and most important for us to prevent.

As it is plainly said in the Rules and Regulations of the Provincial Board of Health every patient suffering of measles, scarlet fever, or diphtheria should be isolated and these cases should be reported to the local Board of Health as well as any case of typhoid fever or tuberculosis.

Any case of scarlet fever, diphtheria and measles shall be placarded as long as there is danger of contagion.

Your attention is called to these regulations and the public is asked to remember and put them into practice as the board intend enforcing them in future.

Remember that it is the householder and not the family doctor who shall notify the Local Board of Health, if a case of contagious disease is found and that any householder who shall violate any of the provisions of the regulations of the Provincial Board of Health shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding forty dollars. (\$40.00).

These regulations are practically the same in every country and experience proves that they should be complied with. For instance, it is a mistake to believe that every person is bound to have measles sooner or later and that it is better to let the children have it when they are young. If necessary precautions were taken measles would be checked as easy as diphtheria or a small pox, and although the disease is mild in many cases, its complications would not cause so many deaths and so many deaf-dumbness on young babies who have suppuration of the ears resulting from this contagious disease. It is also very important for this Board to know where and when a case of typhoid fever develops in town in order to find and remove cause of infection and protect other people.

The same can be said of tuberculosis whose germs should be destroyed in



We trust however that when the fiery struggle is over we shall again welcome the return of our hero, "with blushing honors thick upon him."



GATHERED IN THE DOMINION FIELDS

In the vote for prohibition in Yukon, the wets won by a majority of three.

Speaking for a delegation representing all Temperance Societies in Quebec, Judge Lafontaine deprecated the permission of using wine and beer as the beverage of the wealthy and there should be uniformity in the law.

So far as beer was concerned, evidence was unanimous in recognizing that it was a bad and insanitary beverage. The best proof of this could be found in Germany. Could a more brutal nation be found? Beer only led to the use of strong liquors.

In the name of the rural people, who constituted, he said, the best people in the Province, Judge Lafontaine besought a law of Provincial prohibition, a law of individual and public salvation.

Sir Lomer Gouin in replying to the delegates, said that in spite of the many years that he had sat in the Assembly he had rarely attended such an interesting sitting. What particularly distinguished the meeting was the unanimity of feeling which pervaded the chamber, so seldom accustomed to such harmony.

"You say," remarked Sir Lomer, "that the time has come to give prohibition, that the education of the people is complete. Other important persons believe that the time has not yet come. We must tell you that we are facing a very difficult problem, and opinions which must be weighted. You have pleaded your case. Rest assured that you have not appealed to deaf ears. We shall give to your requests all consideration which they deserve, and rest assured that we shall remain worthy of the confidence of the people of this Province."

"Good morning. I am much pleased to hear you singing hymns so early in the morning. Have you experienced religion?"

"Ligion nothin," replied the cook. "Ah always sings dat hymn when ah bolts aigs—two verses fo' soft, and three fo' hard."

Chairman Flavelle of the Ontario License Board declared to a press representative that he was greatly pleased with the success which has attended the operations of the Ontario Temperance Act during the past week.

"It has resulted in a great decrease in drunkenness throughout the Province," said he. "The enforcement of the act has been very easy, as all parties concerned have endeavored to give it a fair trial."

Prohibition has been in force in Alberta for two months now, says The Guardian, and everyone is loud in praise of the working of the new act. Everybody seems to have fallen in with the new order of things. Things are very much better since the coming of prohibition. Bank managers say there is a decided increase in deposits; one in the city of Calgary said that the increase for the city alone would be nearly \$100,000 a month. Many business men say that business is much better, and not one as realized the utter ruin of business as predicted by the "wet forces." One business, however, has suffered severely—that the pawn-broker and second-hand dealer. The police show a vast improvement everywhere. Day after day goes by and not an arrest for "drunk and disorderly", whereas before the coming of prohibition there were scores of arrests on this charge. In Calgary the police record for July, 1915, was 334 arrests; for July, 1916, 180 arrests. In July 1915 there were 77 arrests for drunkenness; in July, 1916, only 15 arrests for drunkenness, and 11 of these 15 were in the first two days of the month.

Mayor Hiram C. Gill, of Seattle, is now an out-and-out advocate for prohibition of the liquor traffic. He used to be a strong anti-prohibitionist. To
