A Talk to the Young Men of Fredericton.

Advice to Young Men Who Frequent Club Rooms, Etc.

In the Methodist church, on Sunday evening, Rev. Wm. Dobson preached a sermon on manhood, addressing his remarks to the young men of the city. There was a large congregation present and the address was followed with deep interest. He took his text from the first book of Kings, 2nd chapter, 3rd verse—'Show yourself a man.'

Traditions of the Early History in Fredericton.

Rev. Booth Wood, D. D., whose death occurred in Davenport, Toronto, last week, was one of the fathers of the Methodist church in New Brunswick. Born in England in 1804, he entered the service of the Wesleyan Missionary Society in 1826. He was among the early missionaries sent out to British America. He served for three years in the West Indies and was then transferred to this Province, where he was stationed in St. John in the year 1830 and in Fredericton in 1832. After laboring for thirteen years in New Brunswick, he was appointed by the British conference superintendent of missions and returned to Toronto. We clip the following from the Wesleyan:

Traditions of Dr. Wood's early ministry in Fredericton, N. B., are that his sermons, rising at times to powerful eloquence, abounded in pathos and practical application, varied by incidental allusion and extemporaneous illustration, produced a profound impression on his hearers and made the name of the preacher famous through the community. Numerous of his sermons in the pulpit, equally with his literary labors, long after his departure to another sphere of work. It was said that he never forgot a sermon in his position of nearly everything of a special character in personal, family and public affairs. Amongst those attracted to his ministry was a brilliant young barrister of that place, L. A. Wilmut. In a note to the writer (Rev. Dr. L. A. Wilmut), some years ago, Dr. Wood made special reference to his first appointment to Fredericton. Observing some marked evidence of a religious interest, the pastor invited him to the first communion. Nearly fifty years after the venerable preacher and pastor wrote with deep emotion that of his early ministry.
