CURIOUS INCIDENT.—On Tuesday, Mrs. Etter, Fort Lawrence, observed a large goat, as she thought, in the barnyard, gambolling around with a calf. The children, in shutting the calf up, drove the goat out of the yard, when it turned out to be a caribou.

COUNTY COURT adjourned Friday, sine die. Some 12 or 15 civil causes have been tried, besides the criminal cases. Before adjournment, His Honor sentenced the criminals as follows: Rufus Parsons, 1 year in the penitentiary; Otha Jones and James McDonald, 2 months in the County Jail.

SUICIDE AT TORONTO.—Rev. John Marples committed suicide on 22nd, by swallowing ten grains of strychnine. Deceased was at one time a Presbyterian Minister. Some time ago he retired from the church, becoming a convert to Spiritualism. It is supposed he was insane when he committed the fatal act.

LOSS OF THE SCHOONER "D. M. SMITH"—The schooner "D. M. Smith," master, which left St. John, on Wednesday last, for Weymouth and St. Mary's Bay, has been wrecked. Captain Savary and his two hands James Dwyer and John Smith, and son of the owner, perished. None of the bodies have yet been found. The schooner had a full cargo.

THE SITUATION in the East is assuming a more threatening aspect. England continues her demand that all the conditions of peace be accepted by the Congress, while Russia seems to determine that the terms of peace agreed on with Turkey shall be maintained in them entirely, and defended to the last extremity.

At the same time Russia desires to conciliate Austria as much as possible, and to come to an English demand.

CHARGE OF PERJURY.—Mr. R. S. Chapman, proprietor of the Queen Hotel, Moncton, was charged on Tuesday night by Justice Wortman, for perjury. The prisoner was sued for \$25, and put on the limits by one Pope, a trader at Moncton. He applied to Mr. Knapp for his discharge on the ground of having no property, and according to Mr. Pope's information against Chapman, he swore that he had no real or personal property; that he was not able to pay Mr. Pope's debt; and that he did not say to Charles Pope or any other person that he had his property on the limits, and had money to pay his little bills around town. Mr. Pope claiming that these statements were false, laid information against Chapman on the 18th inst. Messrs. Hanington & Wells conducted the case for the Crown, and Messrs. J. H. Dickson and C. A. Steeves were for the prisoner. Mr. Chapman was released on bail, his counsel consenting to be his bail.

Vote of Want of Confidence.

Mr. Covert's Speech.

He complained that papers asked for were not promptly furnished; that in fact they were kept back until too late in the session to be used in showing the delinquencies of the Government. Two years ago the People's Bank returns showed that on the 23rd February the balance in the Bank to the credit of the Government was \$104,000. That was, no doubt, the correct balance, and every cent the Province had to its credit on that day. But a return brought in by the Provincial Secretary claimed that on the 23rd February there was \$167,000 to the credit of the Government. Both these statements could not be correct, and although when a further effort was made to investigate the matter, a cry was set up that the Opposition desired to attack the Bank, it was well known that no one really believed any person doubted the Bank's statement, but the Government desired to avoid investigation and any cry was justifiable, in their estimation, to secure that end.

Covert here quoted the law requiring the Provincial Secretary to lay the statement of the People's Bank on the table before this stage of the session, and asked why that statement was not submitted as it ought to have been. Was it because it might not agree with the financial statement to 26th February brought down by the Secretary?

Referring to the AGRICULTURAL REPORT, Covert said it was no wonder that shame fell upon the Government whenever its supporters reproached it with its conduct in ignoring manufacturing interests of their own Province, while the made use of the Agricultural Report to recommend the implements manufactured at a sister Province.
