MEETING OF TOWN COUNCIL

Much Street Work Being Done—
Water and Sewerage
Extensions.

A meeting of the Town Council was held Monday evening at the residence of the Mayor Deputy Mayor A. C. Belle-Isle presided. There were present Coun. Wallace, Moore, Duncan, Bissett, St. Onge, Patterson and Chamberlain.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read and confirmed.

A communication from the Town Solicitor, re the account of the St. John County Hospital was read. This stated that he had gone fully into the matter and was convinced that there was no legal claim against the town in the Miss Walker case as no legal settlement could be proven. If however a former Mayor had made any recommendations the town might have a moral obligation. Referred to the Public Charities Committee.

The clerk also read a further communication from the St. John County Hospital re Miss Walker case which was also referred to the Public Charities Committee.

The deed of Lansdowne St. from Mr. R. L. Duncan was accepted and ordered to be recorded.

Wm. Morrisey wrote that as he was sixty years of age and he wished a refund of his poll tax. Referred to Assessment and Appeals Committee.

The Annual report of the Building Inspector for 1920 was read.

Coun. Duncan complained that the report was not complete. It should contain a list of buildings erected upon what streets located and a detailed account of each building.

Coun. Wallace said the office of the Building Inspector was a good deal of a farce. The work required could not be done for \$100 and could not be done by a man who knew nothing about building. He suggested that the report be referred back for more details.

The motion to receive the report and place it on file was carried.

A letter from the Town Solicitor re check issued in favor of J. & D. A. Harquail Co. in Feb. by held, was laid on the table.

The Department of Public Works Ottawa, wrote that the matter of Post Office to side-walk in front of Post Office had been referred to the Chief Architect.

Coun. Wallace moved that the Chief Architect be asked to do the work at the Post Office. He would be in Bathurst in a few days and would endeavor to see Hon. Mr. Byrne.

Coun. Patterson said that the duties were clearly laid down by the Act as stated in the Attorney General's letter. What were the Council going to do in the matter. The police were liable to a fine for not attending to their duty. He thought it was time the resolution was taken off the minutes.

Coun. Duncan asked how many constables were appointed by the Council. The Clerk—Ten or twelve.

Coun. Duncan—Then it is the duty of every one of these constables to enforce the law. They should be notified at once. They were certainly very lax in the discharge of their duties if there were so many violations of the Act here.

It was up to all constables to do their duty. He thought the Police were doing their duty faithfully.

Coun. Wallace moved that as the Deputy Mayor expected to see the Attorney General, the communication lay on the table.

Coun. Wallace wanted it clearly understood that he opposed the matter part of the resolution complained of. He held that it was conflicting.

He felt that perhaps those responsible for the motion might wish to amend it after discussing the matter with the Attorney General.

The motion was carried.

A letter from M. H. Dixon re Housing Loan was read. This explained that it might be possible for Campbellton to get a further grant if all

BIG CUT IN OUR TAX RATE

Valuation of Town Increased and
Rate Cut Down to About
1.85.

The Assessors are about through their work. The total valuation of the town is now \$5,844,825 which is considerably above previous valuations. The rate this year is expected to figure out at 1.85 per \$1000, which is a little more than half that of last year.

Applications to other towns were not taken.

Coun. Bissett asked if the town had applied for a further grant.

Clerk—No formal application had been made.

Coun. Bissett moved that the Town Clerk make formal application for \$100,000 under the Better Housing Act—Carried.

Messrs. Belyea & McNeish submitted a further report of their audit which was received and referred to the Finance Committee.

P. S. Martin wrote asking for appointment as foreman of concrete works. Referred to Public Property and Streets Committee.

Mrs. Sarah Sullivan wrote asking to be relieved of taxation as she had no source of income except rent of half of her house. Referred to Assessment and Appeals Committee.

Wm. Savdant wrote recommending the payment of Mrs. Jos. Foubert's rent account for house occupied by Mrs. Goslin. Referred to Public Charities Committee.

The Dominion Secretary of the G.W.V.A. wrote in reference to the shooting in the hospital and returned man here and asking that the account for treatment at hospital be paid. Referred to Finance Committee.

Various departmental monthly reports were submitted.

Coun. Bissett asked if it was the intention to publish reports in the local papers.

Coun. Moore moved that the reports be published in the papers—Carried.

Coun. Patterson recommended that the By-law and Legislation Committee prepare a by-law governing dance halls. Report adopted.

Coun. Wallace reported re the Nelson account. He said that the matter was entirely between Nelson and Parker. The Council's instruction were to get horses for their feed. With reference to J. & D. A. Harquail claim that they had been passed by when tenders were being called for he did not think this was so. At all events their figure was no lower than the town had paid.

Coun. Wallace said that in some quarters there was criticism of the amount being spent on the park. He was a councillor he had both loaned and borrowed of the town. Last year Messrs. J. & D. A. Harquail had borrowed cement and kept it for months.

Coun. Bissett asked if it was the intention of the Streets Department to get a cement mixer.

Coun. Wallace replied that the committee of the whole decided to experiment with hand mixing for a time. He had been endeavoring to hire a mixer. He wished to state that if he was not interfered with too much he would guarantee to lay as much concrete sidewalk in the next thirty days as had been laid in the past fifteen years.

Coun. Moore read letters in reference to the appointment of a meat and milk inspector.

The matter was left in Coun. Moore's hands for further information.

Coun. St. Onge reported that the water and sewerage extension to R. Smith's lot would cost at least \$2798.20.

Wallace suggested that a temporary supply might be given at a small cost. St. Onge did not favor this.

Coun. Duncan moved that the engineers report be placed on file—Carried.

Coun. St. Onge recommended that W. J. S. Walsh be appointed superintendent of Water and Sewerage systems for \$200.00 per month for June, July and August and \$75.00 for balance of year, he to give all his time during the three months mentioned. Recommendation was upon vote approved.

VALUABLE COWS SHOW INFECTION

Examination of W. H. Miller
Co's Cattle Show Slight
Traces of T. B.

Recently the W. H. Miller Co. requested the Dept. of Agriculture to send a veterinary here to examine their herd of thoroughbred Ayrshire cattle. Early last week Mr. J. H. Shoryo arrived and the test has been going on. Thursday of last week he detected slight signs of tuberculosis among a number of heifer and a few milk cows. Immediately all milk delivery was stopped. Further testing and examination has been going on and about twenty head of cattle are to be shipped to Montreal. The infection was so slight that no injurious results can possibly come from the use of the milk.

The milk herd is one of the most valuable in the province and the loss of which the government pays two thirds of \$250.00 on every registered animal, will be heavy.

This is the second test this herd has undergone, about six months ago they were all examined. It has been the policy of this company to have only thoroughbred stock, which have passed every test.

In the meantime milk is very scarce and many are suffering from the high price demanded by other dealers, and the inferior and limited supply.

FIRE AT SAYABEC
This morning a serious fire broke out at Sayabec and a telegram was sent here for the fire engine. This equipment was loaded but a later telegram stated the fire was under control.

Coun. Moore stated that vehicles of all kinds interfered with the fire truck when rushing to a fire, in fact some autos raced it. He moved that a warning be issued to all that they must give fire truck the right of way.—Carried.

Coun. Moore moved that the Fire Protection Committee be authorized to sell the Public Property and Streets Department here hundred feet of old hose at 50 per cent. discount.—Carried.

Coun. Wallace moved that the Deputy Mayor be requested to take up matter of taking over of T.N.R. lot with Mr. Stewart and railway authorities at once so that proposed streets could be made.—Carried.

The Council then adjourned.

MILLS NOW IN OPERATION

Long Lumber Mills Are In
Operation or Will Be
Shortly.

The long lumber mills are commencing their season's operations. The W. H. Miller Co's mill began operations last week, and the Fraser Limited, Chaleur Bay Mills, Shives Athol mill and the Richards Manufacturing Co's mills are either in operation or will be in a few days.

In all cases the men are working on a ten hour schedule.



ATTORNEY GENERAL IS ON THE JOB

Takes Hand in Matter and Orders Police Officers to Do Their Duty.

Attorney General Byrne has called the Chief of Police to account for not doing his duty in reference to the enforcement of the Prohibition Act, and the Chief of Police has reported to the Council as follows:—

Campbellton, May 16, 1921

To His Worship, The Mayor and Town Councillors of the Town of Campbellton.

Dear Sir:—

I beg to state that on the 11th day of May inst., I was called up by phone by the Honorable J. P. Byrne, Attorney General of the Province of New Brunswick and he asked me as Chief of Police here, what we were doing in regard to the enforcement of the Intoxicating Liquor Act 1916. I replied that owing to instructions from the Town Council, that we were ordered not to take any part in the enforcement of the Act, and were not doing so. He also asked me regarding the resolution passed by the Town Council, and I explained to him verbally as I understood it, and that we were acting according to instructions from your honorable body. He replied to me that under section 156 of the Intoxicating Liquor Act 1916, did I not know it was my and our duty to enforce the provisions of the said Intoxicating Liquor Act. I replied that I was following my instructions from the Town Council. The next morning I received a letter, a copy of which is herewith attached, and you will kindly notice I am ordered by him to bring your attention to section 156 of the Intoxicating Liquor Act, as conflicting with the duties laid down in Section 156 of said Act aforesaid. As ordered by him and following his instructions, I am placing this matter before you for your consideration.

To the Chief of Police, Campbellton, N. B.

Sir:—

Pursuant to our conversation over the phone, I beg to call your attention to the fact that the Town Council of the Town of Campbellton passed the following resolution at a meeting of the Council held February 29, 1921, that is to say: "Moved by Councillor Belleisle, seconded by Councillor Duncanson, that the police force be instructed to confine their activities to their civic duties and not to take any part in the enforcing of the Provincial Prohibition Act until such time as the government may sufficient remuneration for their services or refunds one-half of the fines collected to the Town." I wish to point out to you that it is provided by section 156 that Police officers, policemen and constables shall have full authority and it shall be their duty to enforce all the provisions of the said Act, and by Section 96, every person who offends against the provisions of section 156 shall be liable, on a summary conviction to a penalty of not less than twenty dollars and not more than eighty dollars for a first offence and for a second offence to a penalty of not less than five months imprisonment for not less than two months without the option of a fine.

I am in receipt of a telegram from the Rev. F. E. Boothroyd taking strong ground with reference to the resolution passed by your Town Council. It has also been represented to me that as a result of the resolution the work of enforcing the Intoxicating Liquor Act 1916 has practically ceased in Campbellton and that violations of the Act are open and flagrant and continuous and that drunkenness is prevalent. I regret to hear this very much because it seems to me that it is not a desirable condition to have existing, and I trust that, in accordance with your promise you will immediately bring to the attention of the Town Council that their resolution conflicts with the duties laid down by section 156 as to Police Officers, Policemen and Constables shall do with reference to enforcing the provisions of the Prohibition Act. I understand the Mayor of your town is away. I wrote him a few days ago with reference to this matter but have received no reply up to the present time.




The pall-bearers were Alex. Pratt, John Anderson, Clarence Harris, Arthur Firth, Nathan McDavid and John Irvine.

CHARLIE CHAPLIN GIVES MILLION FOR CHANCE TO PRODUCE "THE KID," HIS FIRST SIX REEL PICTURE

NOTED COMEDIAN PASSES UP LARGEST SALARY TO DEVOTE HIMSELF TO FILMING FEATURE LENGTH COMEDY WHICH ABOUNDS WITH PATHOS AND CREATES NEW YORK SENSATION.

The million dollar motion picture has become a reality! There have been such fabulous claims in regard to salaries paid to motion picture actors, such statements as to the amount of money certain pictures cost to produce, that the layman starts to wonder. Large salaries have been paid and are still being paid. Enormous amounts have been spent in producing pictures, but when an exact amount is mentioned, it is often exaggerated on the belief that the real amount is not staggering enough to make a real impression.

When that contract expired, Associated First National Pictures had made a contract with the comedian that was just fifty percent greater in point of compensation, than the first one he had made. This association of exhibitors stipulated to pay him \$1,000,000 for eight pictures, instead of the twelve, which had been the basis of the first \$1,000,000 contract signed by Chaplin. "A Dog's Life" and "Shoulder Arms," the first two pictures he produced under this contract gained a degree of popularity among American audiences that had never before been attained, and speculation as to what his next contract would call for became current. That his time was actually worth more than \$1,000,000 was an established fact.

The comedian is well satisfied that the time was well spent. Associated First National Pictures "think the same; and the approval which the public has given "The Kid" wherever it has been shown would seem to give a sound basis to the assumption that even pictures with such a cost may be made profitable through appreciation by theatre goers.

Occasionally, however, a contract is signed with an actor in such a public manner that there can be no doubt as to the authenticity of the published statement as to the salary he is to receive. Charlie Chaplin has the honor of being the highest paid screen actor in the world and the amount he has received is publicly known. Two years ago he signed a contract for \$1,000,000 for a single year's work. Newspapers and the public generally were present, when the contract was signed. It stipulated that he was to appear in twelve different productions in the course of the year, during which the contract was in force, and he was to receive monthly payments which would total \$1,000,000 by the end of the year. This contract was accepted as being the high-water mark of compensation for a film actor. Newspaper editors
