MR. FOSTER MAKES HIS POSITION DELEGATES TO PLAIN REGARDING NOMINATION BE SELF

So many suggestions have been current during the last few days of a government dictatorship in the selection of a candidate to represent this division, or at least to uphold the Conservative banner if a contest should arise at the polls, that the Sidney and Islands Review approached Mr. W. W. Foster a few days ago for a frank expression of the reasons which had induced him to become a nominee at the forthcoming conservative convention and other matters affecting his candidacy. In reply to questions Mr. Foster said:

"The invitation to contest the Islands electorial division, a district with such a splendid political history, and one whose future is so full of promise in every way, coupled with the fact that this invitation did not come from any one particular section of the division but was an insistant demand from every quarter, was such an unexpected compliment to me that it was impossible to refuse the offer.

"Without undue egotism in the matter, I believe that my past record in public, life has been such as to inspire the confidence of the voters of this constituency. I have been brought into the closest touch with the needs of the division during the past three years and I can say with firm conviction that, if I am honored by being elected, every section of the constituency and every elector in the community will receive just and impartial treatment and I will bring to bear on the problems that may arise, the knowledge and experience of the needs of the Islands that I have stored up during my three years of office as deputy minister of public works. I will endeavour to obtain for the Islands division the adequate recognition that its potentiality, influence and possibilities for the future, merit.

"As an ardent goods roads enthusiast I need hardly repeat that in a district where good roads are essential to the development and tuture prosperity of the district this question will be in the forefront of my programme.'
