It had been proved by experiment that the vegetable cell, which he reasonably believed to be the source of the disease, can pass by the blood current of the cow from the throat or lungs to the milk, and that human beings problems and cats most certainly, can be ably, and cats most certainly, can be affected with the disease if this milk un affected with the disease it this milk un-boiled be taken by them. Diphtheria affects the throat of the cat exactly as it does our own, and it is evident, therefore, how very readily this animal may become the means of its distribution. It should be carefully noted that the disease does not originate in either animal; its true source is purescent vegetable matter in which a low fungi growth flourishes. The practical lesson is that unboiled or otherwise un-cooked milk should never be used as food.

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





The defense was an almost point blank denial of the allegations in the statement of claim, fortified by a statement that the trade mark used by the defendant was by an arrangement with the plaintiffs, who, for good consideration, had agreed not to object to the modified use of the trade mark by the defendant.

Mr. Justice Kay, without calling upon counsel for the plaintiffs to reply, said this was a case in which the defendant had evidently determined to do everything in his power to get the advantage and the trade of another man by passing off his goods among the class of people who bought this class of goods, as the goods of the plaintiffs. He had gone as nearly as he dare to an exact imitation of fthe label and get-up generally of the canisters in which the plaintiffs were accustomed to sell their goods; and he wanted to persuade the court, although his intention to commit a fraud was manifest, that the arm of the court was not long enough to reach him. True, the defendant had submitted a diamond for the oval, but he (Mr. Justice Kay) had no doubt that his device was intended to deceive and calculated to deceive; that it was, infact, a continuation of the fraud in which the defendant began. The court could not help dealing with a case of this kind with considerable disgust and indignation. He should grant the injunction asked for, and order the defendant to pay the costs of the motion.
