Gone Down!

Wreck of a Steamer on the Coast of Newfoundland.

The Mondego Sunk in St. Mary's Bay.

Her Cargo of 554 Cattle and 82,534 Bushels of Grain Lost.

Montreal, Sept. 19.—The steamship Mondego, from Montreal for Dundee, is a cotal wreck on the coast of Newfoundland. The first intimation of the disaster comes from a cattle foreman on board the steamer Joseph Hyland. He telegraphed from St. Marys, Newfoundland, as follows:

"Mondego a total wreck. Lost all cattle. Myself and men safe. Leave for St. Johns tonight. How are we to get home?"

This message was received by Mr. John Crowe, who had the most of the cattle on the Mondego. The steamship Mondego, Capt. J. Rowell, left here on July 10. Her cargo was as follows: 50,400 bushels rye for Norris & Carruthers, 24,034 bushels rye for Norris & Carruthers, 24,034 bushels rye for Crane & Baird, 8,150 bushels rye for Crane & Baird, 8,150 bushels rye for Cattle for C. Coughlin. The cattle were for Dundee and the grain was for Hamburg. How the steamship was wrecked is not definitely known, but the probabilities are that she has got on the rocks in St. Mary's Bay. St. Mary's Bay is one of the most dangerous spots on the coast of Newfoundiand.

and. The Mondego had a crew of 30 men, and had on board also ten cattiemen from Montreal. The cattle foreman, Joseph Hyland, is from Toronto. In answer to an inquiry, the agents stated that their only information was a short dispatch from the captain stating that the vessel was a total loss, but that all on board were saved. The insurance on cattle and cargo exceeds \$120,000, and was taken in English companies.

"HASTENING REVENGE."

Caustic Comments by the Paris Press on Emperor William's Erfurt

Speech. PARIS, Sept. 18 .- The whole press of Paris condemn Emperor William's recent speech at Erfurt, in which it was reported that he alluded to Napoleon as "the Corican parvenue." Le Paris says: "This violent attack on a man of genius and greatness like Napoleon will have no diplomatic

ness like Napoleon will have no diplomatic results. It simply reveals the character of a monarch who seizes every opportunity to revile France and hasten revenge."

Le Jour says the speech proves that recent events have rudely dispelled the Emperor's dreams. He wanted Europe to be blindly submissive to Prussian dictation and finds himself conferented by national be blindly submissive to Prussian dictation and finds himself confronted by nations which have recovered and developed themselves and which now laugh at his threats. Le France says this time it is not we who can be accused of talking of revenge—it is the German Emperor, who reminds us that armies are things of a day. His remarks are an impudent outrage on the patriotism of a great people.

Moderate papers like the Temps Liberte and Journal des Debats regret the tone of Emperor William's speech at Erfurt, but make allowance for the excitement of the occasion, adding that the bark is perhaps worse than the bite.

Meeting of Mr. Mercier's Supporters.

Review of the French Army. Paris, Sept. 17.—At Vitry-le-Francois President Carnot and his Cabinet reviewed the French army, consisting of 110,000 men, which has been taking part in extensive maneuvers since Sept 13. There was an immense crowd present, and the

was an immense crowd present, and the most fervent enthusiasm was manifested.

The review concluded with a grand charge up to the grand stand occupied by the President of the entire massed force of cavalry, 16,000 men, who thundered along in grand style, and then reigned in sharply and presented swords, amid a roar of enthusiastic approval from crowds who witnessed the maneuvers.



The London Times Denounces American Claims as Arbitrary and High-Handed.

and High-Handed.

London, Sept. 18.—Commenting upon two articles on the Bering Sea question published in its columns, the Times calls the American claims preposterous. It says: Their action is arbitrary and high-handed. Their arguments, as far as they can be put in intelligible shape, are worthy of the most rigid school of British game preservers. 

This time the Waltham and Elgin companies have pooled their issues and by one blow seek to wipe out of existence their foe, John C. Dueber, who has been fighting the trust for several years. Some months ago Dueber put a watch movement on the market at \$9 50 which had formally been sold at \$15. Now a circular has been placed in the hands of every jobber in the world who handles the Elgin and Waltham movements. It carried with it a notice that hereafter all movements of this class would be soid at a reduction of 20 per cent. In rebates on goods already in jobbers' hands and on goods in stock this reduction is said to amount to \$400,000 for the Elgin company and \$1,000,000 for the Waltham.

Celebrated English Divine Visits London.

Rev. Dr. Watts Tells of the Improve ments Since Then-Disappointed in Some Respects—He Favors Free Trade but Not Annexation -- The Corruption

Rev. Dr. Watts, of London, Eng., editor of the Methodist Magazine, after an absence of 30 years, is visiting in this city, the guest of Rev. Geo. Brown, 562 Dufferin avenue. His numerous friends think that he has not grown much older during that time, and he is still the same hearty, genial Englishman as of yere.

time, and he is still the same hearty, genial Englishman as of yore.

Dr. Watts was in the city for the first time in the year 1850. In conversation with an Adventuser representative last evening, he stated that at that time London was a small place and was not known as the Forest City. Bridges over the Thames were then few and far between in London. The City Hall was a frame structure and there was no cathedral. In the surrounding country the dwelling houses were nearly all built of logs and forest covered the land.

all built of logs and forest covered the land.

Since then, however, the reverend gentleman noticed, brick and stone structures have taken the place of frame ones. The city has been extended to a great degree, especially towards the north, east and west. Imposing public buildings have been erected. Telegraph and telephone service has been introduced, as has also the use of street cars. The growth of beautiful shade trees has caused the formation of fine avenues. The class of houses and the style of buildings in general show a laudable amount of taste and an eye to comfort. The Court House has been enlarged. Handsome stores and other places of business of a very creditable nature have been erected throughout the city. Charitable institutions of various kinds have been provided. A marked improvement has taken place in the old military grounds, where now beautiful Victoria Park is situated. Hellmuth Ladies' College and the bishop's palace, two remarkably fine buildings, have sprung into existence. The architecture of the houses and villa residences is worthy of special notice. London's population has increased from 11,500 to about 35,000. The site of the exhibition grounds has been changed from Richmond street to Dundas street east. Asphalt, stone and good plank sidewalk have displaced old broken wooden walks. Miles of block pavement have been laid. The G. T. R., the C. P. R. and the M. C. R. have taken the place of the old G. W. R.

Dr. Watts was disappointed as regards the condition of the city streets in general. The

br. Watts was disappointed as general. The immense improvement which he had expected had not been brought about. The adition of the surrounding country was tup to the expected mark. There were il fields covered with stumps which were that condition 30 years ago. He was satisfied that free trade with the

United States would be decidedly bene-icial to Canada and would hasten her prosperity, but annexation would not be for the benefit of America or for the world in general. The United States would then become unwieldy. Canada should retain her resent relations with the mother country The custom houses should be abolished.

He further stated that Great Britain
was shocked by the recent revelations of



A True Story of the Sea

of the brig, they waited an opportunity, as she rose and fell, to drop him into the arms of two men whe stood in the boat to catch him. And so they received this living skeleton and brought him aboard the steamer.

He was put to bed and nourished with brandy and water. His legs were numb; he had lost the sense of taste and smell; his sense of sight was feeble; he weighed not more than 100 pounds.

Two days later he showed signs of recovery. He could speak. The next day he began to tell the story of the wreck, the substance of which I embody in this narrative. He was Captain Hopken, master of the brig, which sailed from San Francisco for Callao, having a company of ten hands and two young men as passengers. Two weeks after leaving port the brig encountered a hurricane and beard water logged. Then she drifted for 110 days at the mercy of the winds, and no help reached her in all that time! During the hurricane all the provisions were flooded; the sea got into the fresh-water casks, and, with the exception of a box of starch, some salted tongues and salmon washed up from below, the men on the wreck had nothing to eat, nor had they anything to drink. Four of themdied from exposure. The eight who remained retreated to the foretop, around which they arranged the canvas shelter. The foretop was a semi-circular platform at the head of the foremast, about 25 feet from the deck, and about the size of half the circular top of a small table. They went down daily to patch fish for sustenance; their hooks were nade of wire taken from the edge of a tim an; their lines were strands of rigging; their bait was rags. With these equipments hey caught skipjacks and albacores and enough of them to lay away, some to be lried. They chewed the raw fish, for they had no fire to cook them. By and by their throats became so parched and sore that they cloud not swallow what they chewed. In the morning each man sucked dry his piece of the foretop to absorb dews that fall in the night. Then, having gone down from the foretop to seep. thirst, and so they existed for 65 days. Then, having gone down from the foretop as usual to fish on the 66th day, they could themselves to be too weak to climb the rigging any more. That night they spread a sail on the forecastle and lay down under it in the wet, hoping for the day to come speedily when they should be rescued.

Now hunger, thirst and weakness increased every day. Still the captain encouraged his miserable fellows with the tope of a rescue. He said he had dreamed about it. This hope was so much in his day-thoughts that he often fancied he heard the welcome cry, "Brig ahoy!" and, hearing it, as he supposed, he got up and peered out of the sail that covered them. But he never saw anything save the expanse of secan and the expanse of sky. His comrades also scanned the horizon daily in search of a ship coming to their rescue. At different times they thought they saw three ships sailing on courses far away from them.

They had existed in the condition about \$95 days, when, one morning, a bark under full sail came near the wreck and was hove to abreast of it. There she was, in plain sight and motionless; her topsails were a-back, her forestaysails a-weather, her helm a-lee. The poor men got up eagerly and waved what they had that would attract attention. The Italians waded through the water on deck, got upon the stump of the mainmast, and waved their hats. All hands tried to shout together; their voices were feeble and husky; they could not make much of an outcry.

The stranger bark was so near that the men could have thrown a stone aboard of her had they had their usual strength. They saw that her hull was painted black, with a gilt band running around it. They saw the letters of her name on her stern They had existed in the condition about



DOMINION PARLIAMENT.

OTTAWA, Sept. 18.—In the House to-day some useful amendments were made in the law governing controverted elections. The practice of filing petitions on the chance of I eling able to finish up evidence is checked by a provise that the petitioner must testify to his belief that his protest is well founded. It is provided also that the counsel fee to be taxed between party and party shall not exceed \$50 for the first day of the trial and \$40 for each succeeding day, and that the whole amount of the bill so to be taxed shall not exceed \$300. Mr. Mulock is the author of these amendments. Mr. Dalton McCartiny obtained the assent of the House to an amendment making it necessary to deposit, on making an appeal from the Election Court, \$500 instead of \$100. Mr. Laurier moved an amendment intended to prevent a curious anomaly in the election law. If the two judges of an election court decide against the petitioner he has his right to appeal the state of the state election court decide against the petitioner he has his right to appeal, but where they disagree there can be no appeal because it is said there is no judgment to appeal from, though the effect is precisely the same as a judgment to appeal from the process of the same as a judgment to the same as a judg effect is precisely the same as a judgment against him, namely, to leave the respondent in possession of the seat. Then follows this curious consequence that a petitioner is worse off when he has one judge in his favor than when both are against him. The amendment was opposed by the Minister of Justice, and defeated upon a vote of 33 to 32, Mr. McCarthy and Col. O'Brien voting with the Opposition.

OVER 3,000 LIVES LOST

By the Recent Floods in Several Spanish
Provinces—\$5,000,000 Damage.

Madrid, Sept. 18.—The number of people who perished in the floods in the Province of Toledo is now placed at 2,300, and the number of lives lost in other localities was 500. In addition many were injured. The destruction of the grape, clive and maize crops in the flooded districts is in itself a serious evil, coming as it does in addition to the bad harvest in most of the Provinces and their complete failure in a Provinces, and their complete failure in a region and portion of Catalonia where the distress in rural districts is intense. It is estimated the total loss from floods, including the destruction of crops, damage to property, the railways' loss of their effects, will amount to little short of \$5,000,000.



Will the Spot Be Wiped Out?

It looks as if the "beauty spot" at the junction of Richmond street and Park avenue will have to be erased. The idea belongs to the city engineer, who proposed to erect a fountain on a diamond-shaped grass plot, and it was considered by the Council a happy suggestion. Nearly all the work on it has been finished, and the solicitor was asked if it were legitimate to put on the finishing touches—a low boulevard fence. This is his answer: "I know of no authority which the city has to make a park in the place you speak of (intersection of Richmond street, Park and Central avenues). I fear, too, that if a park were laid out at the place in such a way as that accidents might happen to persons driving or walking, it would involve the city in expensive litigation. I would therefore advise that the street be blockpaved and that no park be laid out there and no fence erected." The Board of Works Thursday referred it to the Council. The engineer will proceed to blockpave between the street car tracks on Richmond street, the solicitor holding that the city was liable for the work. The Street Railway Company must keep it in good order. The solicitor informed the committee that Mr. Moylan, of Dundas street, had served him with a notice of action, alleging damage to his property by the raising of the street. Aldermen Connor and Shaw and the engineer will look into the matter. The 25 or so applications for the position of caretaker at Queen's Park were laid over.
