ELECTRIC RAILWAY TERMS IN OTHER CITIES.

Toronto made a pretty good bargain with the street railway company when, the charter having expired, a new deal was rendered necessary. Under the arrange ment the ordinary fare in that city is 5 cents, but eight tickets are sold for 25 cents, good between 5:30 and 8 a.m., and between 5 and 6:30 p.m.; school children's tickets, ten for 25 cents. Day cars run from 5:30 a.m. till midnight, at such intervals as the city engineer may order, while all-night cars (fare, 10 cents), are run subject to the same authority. The city council is in complete control. The company must construct and maintain its cars, tracks, ails and pavings subject to the city engineer's satisfaction; must locate on the part of the street he decides; cannot touch the streets without his permit; must extend its lines or lay down new ones as he directs; must not open new lines without his permission; must not extend beyond the city or purchase new lines without his permis-sion; care must be taken to avoid overcrowding; the company's books must be open at all times to civic inspection, and on Jan. 1 every year the company must furnish to the city a complete statement of the company's plant and assets. As a revenue from the railway, Toronto receives \$800 per mile for single track and \$1,600 per mile for double track and 8 per cent. on all gross receipts of the company up to \$1,000 000 (the estimated revenue to Toronto from these sources this year is \$120,000.) No employe shall be compelled to work more

than 10 hours per day, or than 60 hours per week, on more than six days a week; and no adult employe shall be paid less than 15 cents an hour. The charter is for twenty years, but the city guarantees to aid the company to get a

en vears' extension. Under the new arrangement in Montreal eight tickets are sold for 25 cents, good between 6 and 8 a.m., and 5 and 7 p.m.; chool children's tickets, ten for 25 cents. Cars run from 6 a.m. to 11:30 p.m., to run from 6 a.m. to 7 p. m. every five minutes, and thereafter every ten minutes, but the council has the power to order them oftener. The city council has fair con-trol, though nothing like so definite as in Toronto. In Montreal, the civic revenue s 4 per cent. of all gross receipts up to is 4 per cent. of all gross receipts up to \$1,000,000 (this year's civic revenue, \$25,000.) The working time is Umited to ten hours a day, and six days a week, except that if conductors and drivers be required to work seven days a week, no day must exceed eight and a half hours. employes have averaged fourteen hours a day. The charter is granted for 30 years and the company must then remove all its plant, having no claim whatsoever on the oity. In Hamilton, the new electric railway



Annual Report of the Medical Health Officer.

It Says the Forest City is Cleaner Than Ever Before

Mortality Rate Low-The Sewage System

Dr. T. V. Hutchinson, medical health officer, submitted his annual report at yes-terday afternoon's meeting of the Board of Health, the text of which is as follows: To the Chairman and Local Board of

Gentlemen,—I beg to submit my annual report upon the sanitary caudition and health of the city for the year ending Nov. 15. The Federal Government having ceased the collection of mortuary statistics the death rate for the year cannot be accurately ascertained. Nevertheless I have every reason to believe that the rate of mortality will not exceed that of last year, which was the lowest in the Dominion.

One hundred and thirty-seven cases of infectious diseases were reported by physicians, divided as follows: Measles 2, diphtheria 30, typioid fever 33, searlet fever 76. Of these 10 of diphtheria, 3 of scarlet fever, 22 of typhoid and 2 cases of measles were sent to the City Hospital. The mortelity from all was light.
One hundred and forty-one citizens' complaints were received and attended to, Gentlemen,—I beg to submit my annual

The mortality from all was light.

One hundred and forty-one citizens' complaints were received and attended to, compared with 103 last year. Twenty-five samples of well water were examined—16 of these wells were found to be contaminated, and caused to be closed, the other', 9 were good; 16 cespools and privy pits were closed, 9 persons compelled to conhect their premises with public sewers, and 4 houses were condemned, being unit for habitation.

Two hundred and fifty-eight samples of milk were examined during the year, and 61 herds and dairies visited twice, making 122 visits. In general the herds were in fair condition and clean, and some exceedingly good and well kept. The quantity of milk supplied the city by vendors was with a few exceptions good, only 4 samples falling below 3.25 of butter lat. Semi-annual reports of these inspections, together with the quality of the milk, are made to the board and published in the daily newspapers of the city for the information of the people.

Chicago, Ill., Dec. 14.—The Grand Trunk Railway proposes to inaugurate in the near future the fatest ocean steamship service in existence between Portland, Maine, and European ports. With its maritime terminus at this eastern Atlantic port and Chicago at its western terminus, with a perfect and cordial understanding with all the lines running west and northwest from Chicago, it is believed that the Grand Trunk can establish a steamship line between the United States and European points that will be of equal, if not superior equipment to that of its Canadian rival. Taking Montreal as a common point, the distance from Montreal to the State of Maine via the Canadian Pacific and through the State of Maine via the Canadian Pacific and via the Intercolonial S47 miles. The McClary Company having had a limitation of taxes to \$100,000 for ten years, the result of this agreement with the city has led to the building of the largest and best equipped manufacturing plant in the Domnion in the lines produced, paying into the city treasury about \$2,100 per year and \$200 for water rates, say in all \$2,500, including water per year, besides adding more than 200 employes.

Feeling a very great reluctance of risking more investment in plant in our inland city, I finally concluded to appreach the City Council for continued limitation of taxation, not for any favor, but as a matter of business. I told them, if the commodity offered was not judged of more value than I asked, it was their business to reject it. If of more value, I had the right to expect that it would be granted. 


