# ALLIES WRECK AND CAPTURE GERMAN TRENCHES

BRITISH NOW READY FOR NEW GERMAN MOVE IN THE WEST

British and French Believe Germans Are Preparing For New Attacks.

ALLIES WELL PREPARED

Kaiser's Troops Disheartened by Wonderful Recuperative Powers of Russians.

[Canadian Press.] London, Feb. 26—12:50 p.m.—The im-pression is gaining ground among British and French military commentators that Germany is preparing for a fresh expenditure of energy in the land campaign along the western front. Notwithstanding the recent successes of the Germans in the east, they are appar ently encountering as stubborn resist ance as at any time. The resiliency and recuperating powers of the Russian armies, according to theories advanced here, have convinced the German gen-eral staff that it is wisest to adopt the defensive in the Russian campaign, while delivering another blow in the west.

Allies Well Prepared. If this rush comes, the Allies will be well prepared to meet it. During the last few months a decided change for the better has taken place in the forces of the Allies, what with reinforcement bigger guns and more complete equip ment, lack of which was felt so keen! during the early stages of the war.

ATTACKS UNITED STATES

Bryan and Schwab Come In For Some Harsh Denunciation.

[Canadian Press.] London, Feb. 26 .- The Daily Chronicle says: "The Tagliche Rundschau, a leading Conservative German journal, comments on the result of the first week of the submarine blockade, which it calls the greatest and bravest enterprise known in the history of the war. The action of the German submarine, it asserts, will have a decisive influence on the war, that no one in Germany reckons for immediate results, and that the German admiralty will take care not to expose its boats in a thoughtless manner. The Germans, says the paper, can wait; they are in no hurry, and if next week, or the week after, there is a promise of better results, they can exercis patience till then

Ignores United States. "Of course, Britain is trying to get the United States to take action against Germany, but the Tagliche Rundschau cares little about this, as the world must learn sooner or later that German action is dictated by the law of selfpreservation, and that it can only consider the likes or wishes of neutra states so long as these do not conflict with her own. The Tagliche Rundschau is quite sure that Britain will not hesitate to sink American ships in order to embroil Berlin with Washington."

Attack on Schwab. Still another article written denunelatory of America's alleged breach of neutrality appears in the Tagliche Rundschau. The old story of 20 British officers who arrived at Schwab's steel works to superintend the manufacture of guns is warmed up and Schwab is told that he disgraces his German name. 





GRANT AND BURWELL TELLS OF WHEN ONLY BRITISH

REGULARS WERE IN CANADA ASSESSMENT VALUATORS Recommended by Board of Samuel Charlton, of 132 Waterloo Street, One of Two Survivors of Old Royal Canadian Control at Meeting Held Rifles, Reminisces of Military Doings in London in Olden Days-Recalls Visit of This Morning

Some interesting facts concerning the days when the only soldiers in Canada were British regulars were given to an Advertiser representa-tive yesterday by Samuel Charlton, now living at 182 Waterloo street, one of the only two surviving members of the Royal Canadian Rifles, mobilized in 1843 at St. Helen's Island, opposite Montreal, and dis-banded at London in 1870, the year in which the 7th Battalion, now

known as the 7th Fusiliers, came into existence.

The 7th, in fact, was composed very largely of former Royal Canadian Riflemen, and the band, which from 1881 to 1890 held the championof Canada, and which never took second place in any competition, also included in its personnel many of the bandsmen from the rifle

Crack Regiment.

Crack Regiment.

The Royal Canadian Rifles was the crack regiment of its day, and its members were recruited exclusively from men with at least two carries and not less than two. years' service, and not less than two good-conduct medals. The band was composed mainly of soldiers' sons. Mr. Charlton, who enlisted as a clarionet player in 1857, was champion clarionet soloist of Canada for 22 years, and even now, at the age of 73, he has few equals. One of his most cherished mem-

ories is of the occasion when, as part of a guard of honor composed of 400 men of the regiment, he es-corted the late King Edward, then Prince of Wales, on a tour of On-tario and Quebec Provinces in 1860.



# GERMANY'S WAR CHEST

MODIFICATIONS LIKELY

Authorities Secretive About Contents of Note and Their Effect.

[Canadian Press.] Berlin, Feb. 26 .- Via London, 12:15 m.-The American note to Germany and Great Britain on the subject of foodstuffs to civilian populations of belligerents and submarine activities at sea, a copy of which was handed to the German foreign office by Ambassador Gerard the night of February 22, has been a subject of exhaustive discussion for the past two days between the German imperial authorities concerned and the American ambassador.

Satisfactory Basis. As a result of this close attention the German reply is gradually taking de-finite form. The correspondent of the Associated Press has been assured by a most competent and reliable authority that the American proposals are regarded as constituting a satisfactory basis for future negotiation, and that they are themselves in many respects acceptable. Certain of the proposals, however, will be subjected to more of less important modifications,

Note Not Published. The American note probably will not be published here until the German response has been sent forward, but there is good reason to believe that it deals with three principal subjects, namely, mine and submarine blockade of coasts, the use of floating mines and the entry of foodstuffs for civilian

Censorship Strict. It is difficult to secure any authoritative expression of opinion concerning the German point of view on these points from any of the Imperial governmental departments interested in the negotiations, or to overcome the censorship restrictions in treating of this matter in news dispatches sent out from Berlin by telegraph.



### Wheat Will Fall Like the Forts of Dardanelles

in H. C. O. L .-- Staggerer to Markets.

Wheat prices will tumble on account of the silencing of the Turkish forts at the entrance to the Dardanelles, by the Allies' fleets. The grain markets have been anticipating such an event for more than a week, hence the big drop in prices, following the Washington Birthday noliday in the United States, when a straight dip of 8 cents a bushel was recorded in the Chicago grain pit.

The significance is that Russia's great surplus of wheat and other grains is likely to find access to the European market, whence come the ravenous demand for wheat from this continent. The Russian surplus is estimated by those of "bearish" inclination to be greatly less this season than a year ago But the fact remains that there are millions and millions of bushels of wheat in Russia in excess of what the great nation needs, and if given an outlet will relieve the pressure on this side of the Atlantic, where the supply becoming almost alarmingly

That the diplomats of the great Allies felt assured that the suc-cessful bombardment of the Dardanelles forts was imminent, shown in the fact that wheat prices in Russia were already being adjusted to a nearer parity with quotations on the markets of Western Europe.

Cable advices to traders in Winnipeg and Chicago yesterday made it plain that success was attendthe Anglo-French efforts against the Turkish forts, and prices declined 31% cents a bushel in Chicago for wheat contracted for delivery in May.

Wheat will drop, and with the fall will come the assurance to the bread-winner that he will not have to pay more per loaf than now, a Local Millers' Views.

Local millers and bakers seem to think that wheat and flour prices will hold fairly steady, and that Russia will need her entire supply of the grain for home consumption. Charles Hunt, manager of Hunt's City Mills, stated that the Dardanelles were open for three months after war was declared, and that the Russian embargo on wheat had not been lifted. The high prices for wheat had come as soon as war was declared, and would probably continue to the end. It was a question, as to whether Russia would let its wheat out, as millions of the peasants engaged in grain production had gone to the war. Therefore Russia was liable to hold to its grain supply.

"We don't get enough wheat from around London to run the mill for a day," said Mr. Hunt. "Practically all our wheat is brought in from outside sources. Ontario's wheat supply does not cut much figure." The bakers declare that they do

not think any inflow of wheat to Europe will make any difference in the price of bread here. They state that they are doing their best to give the citizens a five-cent loaf, and int out that prices are higher in







Nipponese Waive Claims As To Appointment of Political

Jap Garrison at Hankow Reported To Be Digging Trenches.

[Canadian Press.]

PEKING, China, Feb. 25. - The outlook for an adjustment of the differences which have arisen between China and Japan have improved distinctly. The conferences between the repreentatives of the countries apparently are progressing toward a compromise. The most important step yet taken

in this direction was disclosed here today. The Japanese Government has given indications which are regarded as definite, that it will not insist for the present upon the group of general demands which it presented. It included the chief points on which China pased her resistance to the representations from Tokio. The principal demands which China is reported thus to have waived for the present are outlined as follows:

The Chinese Government shall con suit Japan before choosing foreign and-

visers in political, military and finanial matters, and if such advisers are mployed, Japanese shall be employed China and Japan shall police jointly mportant places in China, or Japanese hall be preferred in case foreign police advisors are employed. China shall purchase from Japan at least one-half of the arms and ammunition it uses hereafter, otherwise an arsenal shall be established in China employing Japanese experts and ma-

Japan shall have special privileges in the Province of Fukien, and shall consulted first in case foreign capital is required in the province for mining and harbor improvements. ## SAYS BOY-ED SENT LODY TO ENGLAND

German Reservist Implicates Naval Attache In Bogus Passport Case.

ARRANGED WITH HIM TOO

Stegler, the German naval reservist arrested in this city Wednesday night to the effect that Capt. Boy-Ed, naval attache of the Ger man embassy in Washington, had fu nished an American passport to Car Hans Lody, the German spy who wa out to death in the Tower of London last November. in his general denial of Stegler's statements involving him, Capt. Boy-Ed referred to this allegation as

Linked With Lody. Charles H. Griffiths, former assistant United States attorney, who was assigned by United States Commissioner Houghton to defend Stegler, linked the Lody in a statement given out after a conference with Stegler in the Tombs. "Stegler told me," Mr. Griffiths said, "that on one occasion while he was on his way to keep an appointment with Capt. Boy-Ed, a Dr. Fuhr told him that Capt. Boy-Ed had carried through the scheme that made it possible to secure an American passport for Lody, and that steamer Carib lost their lives when their Boy-Ed sent him to England, where he was executed. Stegler also said that Dr. Fuhr had told him that Boy-Ed was the only person who knew all the details f the Lody plot, because he had planned the whole thing.

## MORE GOLD SENT FROM CANADA TO AMERICA

New York-Bankers Want Metal From Ottawa.

All the gold thus far received from Canada has been taken from the vast sum sent to Otttawa by American bankers in the early stages of the war and placed to the credit of the Bank of England. That institution showed a loss of \$3,300,000 gold in its last weekly statement, and its holdings of the metal at this time are less by \$43,500,000 than they were three months age.

Virtually all the gold reimported from Canada has been taken by one of the leading banking houses, which has close relations with the Bank of France. Whether today's import is to be followed by a further inflow of the metal could not be learned. 
