HINDU MOB ON RAMPAGE TURMOIL AT RAWALPINDI

Natives Loot and Burn Churches and Public Buildings and Wreck Homes of Europeans.

Allahabad, British India, May 3 .- Serious anti-European rioting has cocurred at Rawalpindi, Punjab. A Hindu mob burned two bungalows, pillaged the mission church, looted the postoffice, burned a garage, and all the motor cars in it, destroyed the plant of a powerhouse, and smashed the windows of the residences of many Europeans. Armed police eventually obtained the upper hand, and dispersed the rioters. The town is now patrolled by s squadron of the Tenth Hussars.

The outbreak is attributed to the incendiary influence of a number of well-known agitators, who have been making speeches throughout the Punjab, and who are also held responsible for the recent outbreak at Lahore. 



D. Meek Addresses Graduates-Probation Period Proposed-Dr. Smith's Valedictory.

At the Y. M. C. A. auditorium last night twenty-four graduates of the Western Medical College of this city had conferred upon them the degree of M. D., before a large gathering of their friends. On the platform were many of the leading medical and educational men of the city, while seated in the front rows of the auditorium were the twenty-four graduates. The remainder of the lower floor was occupied by the junior year men and their friends, as was the balcony.

Convocations have generally been attended with quite a bit of misbehavior on the part of the medical students, but last night the absence of all that might be called ungentlemanly conduct was conspicuous. At times some student would howl out what he intended for a humorous remark, but the audience, and the more sane students, would freeze him out with never a smile, while the speaker would keep right on as if the interruption had not oc curred.

The Valedictory Address.

The first procedure of the evening was the reading of the valedictory address by one of the graduates, Dr. Geo Smith. Dr. Smith proved himself to be a fluent speaker, and his address was clever. He pictured the young medical men, about to enter upon life of strenuous work and perplexities after having spent four long years of study. He also mentioned the brighter side of life in the medical world, and its attractions to young men, who are imbued with a desire to help their brother men, and who love the profession. He spoke of some of the great difficulties which all must expect to meet while engaged in the practice of medicine, and then pointed out the great satisfaction that would come from being able to alleviate the sufferings of even one unfortunate diseasestricken person. Dr. Smith complimented the faculty on the training which they had given the graduates, and assured them that no matter in what part of the universe they went to practice they would never forget the Western Medical College, and those onnected with it, and would never be afraid to boast of being one of its graduates

Dr. Meek's Response.

Dr. Meek responded for the faculty. He began by saying that all of the students must have at times discovered what they considered imperfections in the methods, etc., taught them at the college; but that in medical science, as in all other things, the wheels of times going slowly and at times going rapidly. But after all, in any walk of life people always find that the real falls far short of the ideal. And this is the case in the study of medicine. most people have great ideals, but seldom find the real in life to come up to the ideal standard.

A Probation Period.






