GOVERNMENT REPORT OF CANADA'S CROPS

Ottawa, Aug. 10.-The census and statistics office gives out today its report for the end of July. Field crops and live stock, it says, are not uniformly good, but they denote on the whole very satisfactory conditions for all parts of the Dominion. Timely rains at the end of June and frequent showers throughout July proved to be very helpful, and there are only a few localities where all crops are under an average.

Fall wheat has done well in the parts of Ontario where it is chiefly grown, it was cut early and gathered in fine condition. Reports of threshings already made show averages ranging from 20 to 35 bushels per acre, and the estimated average for the province is 231/2 bushels for an area of 581,000 acres in crop. Alberta is the only other province growing a considerable

quantity of fall wheat, and there fully one-third of the area

sown was killed by the hard winter weather. The 81,000 acres

harvested has an estimated yield of 23.40 bushels per acre. It was too early at the end of July to get estimates of spring grain for the Maritime Provinces; but for Quebec, Ontario, Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta, with an area of 7,022,200 acres in spring wheat, the estimated yield is 22.07 bushels per acre, which make an aggregate of 159,662,000 bushels. Spring and fall wheat in the five provinces show a total of 175,223,000 bushels, grown on 7,684,300 acres. Last year the area in wheat in the same provinces was 6.610,300 acres, and the estimated

yield at the same date 130,263,000 bushels. For Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta the estimated yield this year is 157,464,000 bushels, and last year, at the same time, it was 110,524,000 bushels.

Latter Make Furious Attack on Penal Station on the Coast.

Madrid, Aug. 11.-Advices received here from Penon de la Gomera, Morocco, say that the Moors are directing a fierce attack against the Spanish garrison there. The fighting began yesterday. At midnight the Spanish artillery seemed to have silenced the enemy, but the Moors dug trenches under cover of the darkness, and this morning they reopened with a heavy fire, and their bullets are falling in the streets of the town. Some of the projectiles are so large that it is thought the Moors possess light artillery. The civilians of Penon de la Gomera are aiding the soliders in the defense of the place. There have been no Spanish casualties as yet. Penon de la Gomera is a fortified Spanish island on the coast of Morocco, 80 miles from Ceuta. It is used
