These advices indicate Lenine probably will be shot if he is convicted as a spy working in the interests of Germany, but that if not convicted he will be isolated for the duration of the war. 

"The mills are closing down rapidly," said Mr. Baxter. "It will not be long before all of them are closed if the I. W. W. agitation lasts. Lumber for airplane construction will be cut off entirely unless some definite action is taken by the Government."



PARDONED AFTER DESERTION, AGAIN LEAVES HIS UNIT

William Ploorard Now Outcast From Canadian Army.

HAD GUILTY CONSCIENCE

Gave Himself Up When Officer Called To Get Another Offender.

William Ploorard, giving his home as Hamilton, pleaded guilty in police court today to desertion from the 63rd Battery on April 8th last. He was remanded to jail for one week for sentence.

Major Osborne produced evidence to show that Ploorard had deserted also from the 153rd Battallon, while that unit was statlened in St. Thomas. He was sentenced by the magistrate there to six months at the Ontario Reformatory, but was released under the governor-general's parden order issued on New Year's Day, granting liberty to all military prisoners.

A Guilty Conscience.

He was then attached to the 63rd Battery. He absented himself illegally from this unit and was not heard of again until his arrest in Hamilton on Saturday last by Detective Smith of that city. The Senate is expected to pass the conscription measure within ten days. Dissolution of Parliament is looked for and a general election in September.

The majority today upon the third reading stage in the Commons was nine below that given when the principle of conscription was adopted on a second reading. This was due to absence of a number of conscriptionists. There was no practical change in the line-up. English-speaking Conservative members voted solidly for the bill, and 22 of the English-speaking Liberal supporters of Sir Wilfrid Laurier broke away and voted for this Government measure. The remainder of Sir Wilfrid's followers stayed with him and voted against conscription, and they were joined by five French Conservative members.
