



LONDON, Nov. 1.—The armistice accepted by Turkey amounts to "complete and unconditional surrender." This statement was made by Lord Robert Cecil, assistant secretary of state for foreign affairs, to the Associated Press tonight.

The terms of the armistice granted by the Allied powers to Turkey follow:

"FIRST.—The opening of the Dardanelles and the Bosphorus and access to the Black Sea. Allied occupation of the Bosphorus forts.

The positions of all mine fields, torpedo tubes and other "SECOND.—The positions of all mine fields, torpedo tubes and other obstructions in Turkish waters are to be indicated, and assistance given

to sweep or remove them as may be required.
"THIRD.—All available information concerning mines in the Black

FREES ALL PRISONERS. "FOURTH .- All Allied prisoners of war and Armenian interned per sons and prisoners are to be collected in Constantinople and handed over unconditionally to the Allies.

"FIFTH,-Immediate demobilization of the Turkish army, excepsuch troops as are required for surveillance on the frontiers and for the maintenance of internal order. The number of effectives and their dis-position to be determined later by the Allies after consultation with the Turkish Government SURRENDER ALL VESSELS.

"SIXTH.—The surrender of all war vessels in Turkish waters or waters occupied by Turkey. These ships will be interned in such Turkish port or ports as may be directed, except such small vessels as are required for police and similar purposes in Turkish territorial waters.
"SEVENTH.—The Allies to have the right to occupy any strategic points in the event of any situation arising which threatens the security

"EIGHTH.—Free use by Allied ships of all ports and anchorages now in Turkish occupation and denial of their use by the enemy. Simflar conditions are to apply to Turkish mercantile shipping in Turkish waters for the purposes of trade and the demobilization of the army.

"NINTH .- Allied occupation of the Taurus tunnel system.
"TENTH .- Immediate withdrawal of Turkish troops from Northern Persia to behind the pre-war frontier already has been ordered and will "ELEVENTH .- A part of trans-Caucasia already has been ordered

to be evacuated by Turkish troops. The remainder to be evacuated if required by the Allies after they have studied the situation. "TWELFTH.—Wireless telegraph and cable stations to be controlled the Allies, Turkish Government messages to be excepted. "THIRTEENTH .- Prohibition against the destruction of any naval,

military or commercial material. "FOURTEENTH.—Facilities are to be given for the purchase of coal, oil, fuel and naval material from the Turkish resources after the requirements of the country have been met. None of the above materials

"FIFTEENTH .- The surrender of all Turkish officers in Tripolitania and Cyrenaica to the nearest Italian Garrison. Turkey agrees to stop supplies and communication with these officers if they do not obey the order

"SIXTEENTH.—The surrender of all garrisons in Hedjaz, Assir. Yemen, Syria and Mesopotamia to the nearest Allied commander, and withdrawal of Turkish troops from Cilicia, except those necessary to maintain order, as will be determined under Clause Six. "SEVENTEENTH .- The use of all ships and repair facilities at all

Turkish ports and arsenals. "EIGHTEENTH.—The surrender of all ports occupied in Tripolitania and Cyrenalca, including Misurata, to the nearest Allied garrison. "NINETEENTH .- All Germans and Austrians, naval, military, or

civilians, to be evacuated within one month from Turkish dominions. and those in remote districts as soon after that time as may be possible.

"TWENTIETH.—Compliance with such orders as may be conveyed for the disposal of equipment, arms and ammunition, including the transport of that portion of the Turkish army which is demobilized under "TWENTY-FIRST .- An Allied representative to be attached to the

Turkish ministry of supplies in order to safeguard Allied interests. This representative to be furnished with all aid necessary for this purpose. TURKISH PRISONERS.

"TWENTY-SECOND.—Turkish prisoners are to be kept at the disposal of the Allied powers. The release of Turkish civilian prisoners and prisoners over military age is to be considered.

CONSERVE HARD COAL

Public Advised To Use More Soft Coal and Wood.

OTTAWA, Nov. 1.-That there is imperative need of conservation as regards the use of anthracite coal in Canada was stated tonight by Mr. Magrath, fuel controller.

A dispatch from Washington, which was published recently in the Canadian newspapers has to some extent been misinterpreted in that it has created the impression that there would be plenty of hard coal available.

Whilst the statistics of shipments from the United States were approximately correct as stated in the dispatch, it is necessary to emphasize the fact that the total tonnage which has been allotted to Canada still remains about one million tons lower than had originally been arranged for, the reduction being practically one quarter and being due to demands in the United States owing to the increased war activities there. They have seen the ravages of the disease as have no others, and they believe that another week would serve as a margin of safety and a buffer between the public and the disease. Despite protests from some of those who believe the board of health alone should speak, The Advertiser has permitted a free expression of views on the matter: A newspaper that is deaf to the feeling of the community on such an occasion is not fit to be circulated, and, as it is scarcely necessary to President Wilson. state, the health of the public is the primary con-

sideration. But while the prospects are that the epidemic is dying out, there are some questions that should be asked of those who are strongest in their protests. In the first place, is this disease communicable? Every authority is willing to admit

that it is. How Every Good Doctor Prevents Blindness in Babies

By DR. LEONARD KEENE HIRSHBERG.

Many states have properly and correctly passed iaws which require doctors and nurses to instill a preventive solution into a baby's eyes the moment of its birth. While it is true that most youngsters would be born without danger of blindness, it is a fact that these specific antiseptic drops absolutely prevent inflammation of babies' eyes, which so often causes blindness.

Although almost a generation has elapsed since the French physician, Dr. Crede, discovered this simple, safe and sure method to reduce the number of cases of blindness, so "slow and sot in their ways" are some parents that they hardly knew of "ophthalmia neonators of prevention. They fail to realize their derellction of duty, honor and justice, when they neglect to put the harmless drops into the new-born's eyes which do only good and prevent blindness.

Moreover, parents who do not insist that these silver eyedrops be used, may hereafter, in the enlightenment which these facts bring, consider themselves guilty of criminal negligence.







This work, together with other safeguards which the Allies consider to be necessary before the Allied fleet enters the waterway leading past Constantinople and through the Bosphorus to the Black Sea, will take several days, in the opinion of the British admiralty.

A fortnight ago the Allied fleet tested the efficiency of the forts inside the Dardanelles by dropping a few shells on them. The reply of the Turks was quick and fairly accurate, showing that the fortifications are still probably in good shape. The 50-mile passage through the waterway is a veritable sea of mines and other obstructions, which it will require some little time to remove. WALL STREET REVIEW.

New York, Nov. 2.—Further readjustment of values from a war to a peace basis was the outstanding feature of the week in the securities market, the transition being attended with some unsettlement.

The declining tendency in industrial war shares as a whole derived additional momentum from the reduction of the United States Steel's extra dividend from 3 to 2 per cent, a condition due not so much to decreased earnings as to the enormous appropriations required to meet federal taxes and excess profits. Trading was attended by less activity, the outcome of restrictions upon loans recommended by the local money committee, but this barrier was overcome to a degree later in the week when call loans fell to 4 per cent, the lowest rate in three months.

The effect of the money committee's suggestion, that the flaancial institu-

tions advance their margins on loans from 20 to 30 per cent, and which becomes operative next week, is already apparent in a heavy contraction of brokers loans. This was made possible by the closing out of many speculative accounts, especially in stocks of non-investment character. Accompanying this movement was an inquiry instituted by the officials of the stock exchange to minimize activity in stocks controlled by pools.

With the approach of peace leading financial interests are giving much thought to business, which at the moment shows much hesitation, mainly in relation to the question of labor.

New York, Nov. 2-Wall Street, 10:10 .m.-Stocks were irregular at the opening of today's market, further selling of oils forcing other active issues to lower levels. Shippings were easy, but rails and steels yielded fractionally.

New York, Nov. 2. - Further selling of speculative issues, notably oils, unsettled the market again in the early part of today's short session.

Mexican Petroleum dropped ten points and Royal Dutch nine, United States Steel fell to its lowest quotation in many weeks, together with war shares, and rails and metals lost one to two points, while shippings, motors, tobaccos and sugars fell one to four. Only a few of these recessions were regained in the short covering of the final dealings. The closing was irregular. Sales approximated 400,000 shares.

10:30 a.m.—Mexican Petroleum's further decline of 10 points and United States Steel's recession of 1% to the lowest quotation of the current movement, were the noteworthy features of the early trading. Losses of one to two points also occurred in such active issues as Bethlehem Steel, Baldwin Locomotive, American Smelting, American Car, Studebaker, Industrial Alcohol, and fractional gains in coal shares were offset by moderate reactions in Pacifics. of speculative issues, notably oils, un-






