THE CITY PEOPLE

Mr. City Worker, do you think that reciprocity has no direct advantage for you?

If this is your opinion, it can be shown, without the slightest jugglery of facts and figures, that the proposed agreement is full of benefits for you.

It may be proven that it is not such an astonishing thing after all that the farmer may be given more for his products, and that you will, on a great number of articles, pay less than you are paying at present for prepared foods.

For instance, the Canadian farmers can secure in Buffalo for their prime bacon hogs more than is given on the Canadian markets. Consult the market reports of a Conservative paper and this will be proved. Yet the price of best bacon in Buffalo is 18 cents a pound. In London the price of best bacon is 25 cents a pound.

An Advertiser representative who purchased a pound of best bacon in a retail store yesterday was charged that price. The difference between the price in London and Buffalo is 7 cents.

The retailer is not reaping the big profit, however, it should be understood.

Glance over the following extract from a sworn statement in court and you will recognize that the big middleman-the Canadian packer-is securing dividends sometimes as great as 120 per cent per annum because of "cheap hogs and dear bacon." The figures are reproduced from a court record of the William Davies Company:

Toronto, pointed out, "It came out of you and the farmer." How is that going to make the price of bacon lower or even keep it at the same figure? you may ask.

The explanation is this: The present agreement would permit bacon to come into Canada at 11/4 cents a pound duty as compared to 4 cents a pound at present. So that unless our Canadian packer behaves and shaves off a few cents. the American dealer can send in bacon at the retail price of 18 cents, pay the duty of 11/4 cents a pound, and undersell the Canadian packer. Do you think the Canadian packer will give him a chance? There is not a possibility that he will. Rather, he will bring the price of bacon down to something like the figure for which he sells it in

The same condition will be found in other articles handled by the packer. Bacon is used as a demonstration of the benefit-to-both argument,

AS TO CANNED GOODS.

Down at Aylmer the canning trust pays the farmer \$25 a ton for peas. If a resident of Aylmer wants loose peas he pays 20 cents a quart, or at the rate of \$260 a ton. Across the line the farmer receives \$45 a ton for peas, yet the consumer pays less and receives a larger can than on this side of the line. The American canner will be able to buy Canadian peas at an advance on the price paid at Aylmer, pay the duty on the canned product, and undersell the Canadian trust on its own market. Do you think the home canner will lose his market? Not a chance of that. The price of his products will come down. If that conclusion is not correct, why is Mr. David Marshall, Conservative candidate in East Elgin, fighting the acceptance of the reciprocity agreement tooth and nail? AS TO EGGS.

The Toronto produce man charges 10 per cent, of the cost price of eggs to handle the eggs. On a dozen eggs costing 20 cents, his commission is 2 cents. The New York commission man charges 5 per cent. per dozen. That is a vast difference when eggs are handled by thousands of dozens. It will not be that the American farmer will enter into competition with the Canadian farmer in the egg business. But the American commission man will enter into competition with the Canadian commission man Five per cent will give him a wide margin on which to operate, and the consumer will reap the advantage. you understand now why the commission man is obstructing the passage of the agreement?

Do you see how the middleman is "getting the best of it in every way in Canada at the present time?

Do you think it worth while to have the duty removed on all early fruits and herries which now carry a heavy

Do you think it worth while to have oysters shipped into Canada duty free? (The present duty is 25 per cent.)
Do you relish early new potatoes and have sweet potatoes a good taste at certain seasons of the year? With reciprocity they will come into Canada duty free, and will be sold at a substantial reduction.

Can you understand why the Big Interests which have got between the farmer on the one hand and the consumer and retailer on the other, are opposed to reciprocity?

BRITISH STATESMEN APPROVE RECIPROCITY AGREEMENT

for Fair Visitors

Mr. Sidney Buxton, president of the British Board of Trade, another member of the cabinet, in discussing the matter, said:

"The Government could not regret any fiscal arrangement which tended to break down the tariff wall of any particular country, and under which, in this particular case, the trade of Canada, as the Canadians themselves think, would be increased. The Government believed that the greater the trade of Canada the greater would be the trade of the Empire, and the greater the trade this country would send to Canada. They certainly felt strongly that there was no question involved in this reciprocity agreement of the allegiance and loyalty of the Canadians themselves. (Hear, hear.) But it was said that the Government, by their inaction in the matter, were reducing the existing preference which Canada gave to British goods to the vanishing point. That pessimistic view was very greatly exaggerated. The Government highly appreciated the attitude of the Canadian Government, who in this proposed arrangement with the United States had done their best to affect in the slightest way possible the preference which they were giving to this country."

Mr. Lloyd George, chancellor of the exchequer, speaking of the reciprocity agreement, in the House of Commons, on Feb. 16, said:

"I rejoice that it has been negotiated, and heartily trust it will carry to a successful conclusion. I regard it as a great triumph of common sense, and an immense stride in the cause of free trade, inculcating a step toward the fraterrity and co-operation of the English-speaking family."

On April 18, the Canadian reciprocity agreement was discussed in the House of Lords, and on that occasion Lord Haldane, secretary of state for war, spoke in these unmistakable terms:

"The policy of the Government is to give every facility to Sir Wilfrid Laur-

ine policy of the Government is to give every racility to sir Wilfrid Laurier and the people of Canada to do the best they can for themselves, to enter into this agreement, and, as they think and we believe, to take thereby the best step they can for the development of Canada. 



If discussions take place in the upper house not fitting the knowledge of the lower house, it is not a sound practice. If the laify and lower clergy can meet together, why not the higher clergy along with the other orders? As representatives of the church, the members of the lower house were entitled to hear the discussions of the bishops.

Archdeacon Gilmour thought that the presence of the bishops in the lower house would be helpful and inspiring rather than tending towards restraining the utterances of the lower clergy.
