GENERAL STRIKE IN IRELAND AS PROTEST AGAINST JAIL METHODS

AS PROTEST AGAINST TREATMENT OF PRISONERS IN THE DUBLIN JAIL

Walkout Does Not Include Employees of Newspapers, Telegraph Service, Bakers and Men Required For Care of Horses and Cattle-Political Prisoners in Mountjoy Jail On Hunger Strike.

London, April 13.-The general strike declared in Ireland in protest against the treatment of the political prisoners in Mount joy jail at Dublin, who are on a hunger strike, began this morning. Early reports to the Irish office here said that the strike had gone into effect, but the officials gave no details regarding the scope of the movement.

The strike call eliminated employees of newspapers, those in the telegraph service, the humanitarian services, the bakers, and the necessary workers caring for cattle and horses.

PANKS AND ARMORED CARS ARE SENT TO MOUNTJOY PRISON

Dublin, April 13 .- The general strike declared in Ireland in protest over the treatment of the political prisoners, who are on a hunger strike in Mountjoy prison here, went into effect today. The crowd which had assembled out-The crowd which had assembled outside the prison edifice grew as the day wore on until it comprised 2,000 persons, among whom threatening demonstrations occurred. The authorities thought it necessary to augment the defences, and three tanks and several armored cars, with a large force of police and military, were stationed about the attractive.

It was announced that the strike, which originally was intended as a one-day celebration, would continue until the prisoners were released.

All the shops, public houses and restaurants of Dublin are closed and the hotel staffs quit. No tram cars or trains are running, except a few Northean Ireland Rail-

the hotel staffs quit. No tram cars or trains are running, except a few on the Great Northern Ireland Railway. The Punchestown races have been postponed until tomorrow.

The strike is not in effect in Belfast and the north of Ireland.

In Dublin and throughout the west and south of Ireland, however, business is at a standstill.

The vast crowd outside the prison this afternoon was offering prayers for the hunger strikers. The lord mayor was officially informed at the prison that all the prisoners were very weak, and that anything might happen within twelve hours.

The text of the telegram follows: "Please send us at once the names of all of your employees who are on strike, indicating the names of any of them who appear to be directing the movement in whole or in part."

Buffalo, April 13.—The arrival here early today of Frank T. Hawley of the Federal Mediation Board, and the calling of a meeting of railroadmen at a city auditorium for tomorrow, were the basis for rumors of an impending offer from the railroads that might pave the way to a settlement of the country-wide strike of railroadmen.

The meeting was called by the officers of the Switchmen's Union. At their national headquarters, it was denied that there would be any step toward recognition of the Yardmen's Association, but it was said strikers would be invited to attend.

New York, April 13 .- Although he speaks fluently six languages and ad lived in New York City ten years, George Arsenis, a Greek has been held, with this wife, at Ellis Island since February 20, because he is unable to pass the literacy test. Arsenis speaks French, English, Spanish, Italian, Greck and Rumanian, but could not read the required 40 words of any language that would readmit him to this country after a long stay abroad. Arseni and his wife, who is English, and able to read, went to Europe years ago on a long vacation. Legislation putting into effect the literactest was passed during their absence.

WANT AGENT'S POWER REDUCED

Rev. Peter Kelly, Representing British Columbia Indians, Supports Idea of Compulsory Education, But Objects To the Placing of Children in Boarding Schools Without Parents' Consent.

Ottawa, April 13.—(By Canadian Press).—Further opposition to the proposed amendments to the Indian act, chiefly on the ground that it means compulsory enfranchisement, also that it places too much power in the hands of the superintendent general, was heard by the special committee of the Commons today.

Rev. Peter Kelley, representing British Columbia Indians, supported the idea of compulsory education, but characterized the placing of children in boarding schools without consent of the parents, as a high-handed proceeding. Leaving the superintendent general to decide on the fitness of an Indian for enfranchisement was altogether too autocratic.

A. R. Chisholm, counsel for the Six Nation Indians, disputed the impression given the committee at Friday's session by Deputy Minister Duncan Scott, that the British Columbia authorities allowed the Indians to believe themselves allies until the crown was in a position to declare them subjects. 

U. S. FOR NEARLY A **WEEK FROM LONDON**

Freight Embargo.

Western Ontario is still isolated as far as the United States is concerned as a result of the embargo that has been put on all points of entry and affecting every railroad. Except for a car of foodstuff and one of household furniture nothing has been received in this city from that country, nor has anything been shipped to the United States for nearly a week.

Although hundreds of firms in every city of the United States have been forced to shut down, and thousands of men have been thrown out of work, local factories have been affected only in a comparatively small way, and nor real case of stress has been reported. The industries in the border cities have been affected to a greater extent than those located here.

It was pointed out by officials on the railroad that if the strike had occurred, or if such an embargo had gone into effect previous to the time of the high rate of exchange, the Canadian firms would have been affected to a far greater extent. During the past few months many firms, because they refused to pay the high rate of eychange, have learned to depend to a great extent on Canadian products for their raw material.

Dignity to Marriage.

The member for London would not immediately wrench the business from the present issuers but prohibit the issuance of any further licenses. His bill provides that all municipal clerks be ex-officio officers to issue licenses, receiving a fee of 25 cents for each license issued.

The Provincial Government has decided to give financial aid to the building program of the Royal College of Dental Surgeons, and it is expected that \$100,000 will appear in the supplementary estimates for this purpose. The college, in enlarging its teaching facilities, has been largely actuated by a desire to meet the requirements of rteurned soldiers. Of 320 first year stu-

facilities, has been largely actuated by a desire to meet the requirements of returned soldiers. Of 320 first year students 260 are returned men. In a total registration of 800, there are over 500 enlisted men, of whom 100 suffered disability. Mr. Grant, minister of education, states as follows:

Minister's Statement.

"The new building and equipment cost \$150,000, of which the college itself has paid \$50,000. The work was not begun until after the whole problem had been laid before the Hon. Dr. Cody, and the building extension was undertaken with the full knowledge of the late Government. Had not the plans been proceeded with, the college would have been unable to receive one new student, the entire accommodation of the old building being barely sufficient for the students who had enlisted during their course and who were returning to complete their course. The seriousness of this situation may be appreciated when it is remembered that this institution is the only dental college in Ontarlo. This is the first rerequest for funds ever made by this college, and it was for the department of education to determine whether assistance to dental education should be given direct to the college or through the universities. The Government has decided that it would be unwise to have a duplication of dental faculties in the province, and that dental education will be best served by maintaining the present position of the Rôyal College of Dental Surgeons, which is now recognized as one of the foremost dental institutions in the world. Packing house receipts included 4,000 cattle, 2,500 hogs and 4,000 sheep. This was a larger quantity than received on any day last week. About 25,000 stock-/ard workers were still idle.

Milwaukee and St. Paul, the New York Central, and other road reported that cars again were moving in the switching yards, and that embargoes had been partly lifted. Officers of these roads said they had enough men at work in the yards to take care of all cars coming into Chicago.

Deny Negotiations.

The General Managers' Association today denied that any negotiations were being carried on with the outlaw Yardmen's Association, and stated that no parley would be entered into under







SCHOOL LANDS FOR SOLDIER SETTLERS

OTTAWA, April 12.-The soldier settlement board of Canada has completed arrangements with the three prairie provinces by which considerable areas of school lands in the West have become available for settlement

It is now possible for a qualified returned soldier to apply for any parcel of school lands within fifteen miles of a railway line. If there are more than one applicant, the parcel will be disposed of by ballot, as in the case of Indian reserves and other lands recently opened for soldier settlement.

Further revision of the plumbing by-aw was effected at a meeting of the special committee Monday night. The clauses taken up dealt chiefly with the ventilation of waste pipes to prevent siphonage. In cases where the gen-eral opinion was that the bylaw as it stood at present required too many tood at present required too many ents, their elimination was recomvents, their elimination was recommended. Particular efforts were made to eliminate unnecessary work in small dwellings, while at the same time taking sufficient sanitary precautions, Technical opinion differed widely on some of the points. One plumber stated that a type of trap formerly widely used but forbidden by the bylaw was insanitary and dangerous to

aw, was insanitary and dangerous

health.

"There's just one question I would like to ask you," said Ald. O. I. Cunningham. "Have you been putting in that type of work for fifteen years?"

The plumber admitted that he had been doing so. "Then you ought to apologize to the public," said the alderman. "You've been putting in a type of fixtures which you declare to be dangerous, and you haven't been telling the public anything about it. The plumber just comes along and puts in the job, and he never gives the citizens any advice as to whether the work is sanitary or not."




