Vice-Admiral Makaroff, commanding the Eussian naval forces at Port Arthur, has sent the following telegram to the Emperor: "I beg most humbly to report that at 2 o'clock this morning the enemy made a second attempt to block the entrance to the inner roadstead. \$ THE WAR NEWS.

Admiral Togo has again attempted to block the entrance to Port Arthur harbor, and if the Russian reports of the affair are correct has again failed signally. This time he sent in four merchantmen armed with Hotchkias guns, but these proved of no avail, Makaroff's batteries and destroyers sinking them before they could be placed in an obstructive position. Almost the entire crew of a Russian destroyer was killed in this fight, the hoat engaging six of the enemy. The Japanese refused a challenge to battle by the Russian fleet, which came out for that purpose. Makaroff reports that he has made a reconnaissance along the coast with his fleet, his intention apparently being to locate Admiral Togo's base. The Mikado dare not risk the landing of many troops on the Liao Tung Peninsula until the Port Arthur fleet is either destroyed or so bottled up as to be useless, which doubtless accounts for yesterday's desperate attempt to block the harbor. Trivial skirmishes continue to take place in Korea. and while in themselves of no great importance, they go to show that the armies are in touch. Kuropatkin has arrived at Mukden and all Russia feels relieved. The latest about the phantom Vladivostock fleet is that it has eluded the Japs and is escorting the new Russ warships purchased from Chili.

LATER. A dispatch from New Chwang declares that the Japanese succeeded early Sunday morning in sinking three merchant steamers at the mouth of Port Arthur harbor. Viceroy Alexieff has placed New Chwang under martial law which amounts to a defiance of the powers, especially China. SCENES OF DESOLATION IN WEST LONDON; PEOPLE ARE RETURNING TO THEIR HOMES

Many Families Have Lost Their All—One of the People's Greatest Needs Is Bedding and Bed-Clothes—Breakwater Damaged in Several Places—Loss of Residents Will Amount to Fully Twenty-Five Thousand Dollars.

The men viewed their homes stolld-

ly, making but small complaint, but women appeared to be heart-broken. Everywhere a scene of desolation was revealed. Sheds, chickencoops and other outbuildings, which had floated around the yards during the flood, are now lying everywhere and anywhere but none of them right side up. Side walks, fences and huge cakes of ice also strew the yards, with here and there a vagrant water barrel mixed in. The cold of the night also froze ice a couple of inches thick and in many places the water has drained at boardinghouses. away, leaving huge sheets covering the yards and streets.



IMPERIAL EASTER EGGS

Unique Presents Given by the Czar to His Wife and Mother.

St. Petersburg, March 28.-The Czar has had to grant numerous audiences recently to the court jeweler who has At Havre-La Bretagne, from New in charge the Czar's Easter gifts to the members of his family. cut from some precious material and surmounted with the imperial crest set in jewels. The one he gives each year to the Czarina and the one he gives to his mother are filled with mechanical devices. One court jeweler devotes almost all of his time to inventing and constructing new devices for these imperial eggs, but the precise nature of the toy is kept a profound secret from all except the Czar until after the gift has been presented

The Czarina has now a large lection of these wonderful eggs, which are so fashioned that they open at the touch of a spring hidden cluster of jewels at the top. One contains a beautiful miniature of the Czar set in ivory and studded with magenormous total of 10,085,634 tons being nificent diamonds, the egg itself being of gold. Another, of crystal, contains miniatures of her daughters, each on pivot which turns at a touch, and the whole egg is on a golden pedestal set with one great emerald worth ":

king's ransom." The Flood.

West London is not alone in its misfortune. Floods are reported in Chatham, Thamesville, Wallaceburg, Vienna and other municipalities in this district. The breakwater which almost half surrounds the western suburb of this city has been an adequate protection against the annual freshets until this year. It withstood the force of the current on Saturday, but the river overflowed it in places, rising higher than in any year since the deluge of 1883. The extraordinary snowfall of the past winter, is, of course, responsible, and it may be that the experience will not be repeated in a lifetime.

There is no reason why the property- of this country. owners of West London should be pessimistic over the situation. They have enjoyed immunity from floods since the embankment was erected and had it been a foot or two higher below the forks the village would have been spared a very serious incursion this year. The breakwater is not an expensive affair, but it has hitherto served the purpose, and may be made more secure without laying a crushing burden on the ratepayers of the village. West London is better off than several other municipalities along the rivers in this part of the country, which have no artificial protection against floods, and are exposed to them every year.

The terms of amalgamation exempt the city of London from financial responsibility for damages caused by the flood, but private distress should be relieved immediately. What appears to be wanted more than anything else by a number who have been flooded out is a supply of bedding. Orders have been given to the city relief department to render aid to applicants, but there are many who will not go to the city hall to ask for help, and who are sorely in need of it. The relief officers should be instructed to make a tour of investigation, so that assistance may be rendered without putting deserving people in the position of begging for charity.

The Taxation of Railroads.

He throws his professions to the winds, because he thinks he sees a chance of turning out the Government by supporting a measure introduced by a Liberal member. The Government has not accepted Mr. Pettypiece's bill in its entirety, but has recognized its main principle, the increased taxation of railroads. The bill reported by the special committee on municipal taxation provides that railways shall pay municipal taxation on their real estate, according to its value, and in addition, pay a mileage rate for provincial purposes. This rate is now \$2, but will be increased, it is said, to \$50. Mr. Pettypiece's measure provides for the appointment of a provincial board for the taxation of railroads, the assessment to be based upon their cost of construction, earning power, and value as going concerns. The bill would enormously increase the taxation of railway corporations, and they claim they would be driven to recoup themselves by a sharp advance in freight rates. Mr. Pettypiece has presented his case with considerable skill and ability, but he will, no doubt, prefer to accept for the time being the Government's moderate measure, rather than play into the hands of those who have no sympathy with the principle of his bill and would throw it out if they ever reached the treasury benches.

The Transvaal Ordinance.

This ordinance will permit the mine owners of the Transvaal to recruit Chinese coolies, who will be indentured for a term of years, and will be forced to leave the Transvaal when the contract expires. The imported Chinese will be required to live in separate quarters or compounds. If an indentured Chinaman violates his contract and seeks to escape from his compound, he may be something in this system which smacks loving sentiments of the British people. 
