## FIRE FATALITY

Score of Lives Lost and Two **Hundred Persons Terribly** Injured.

Explosions in Yards Causes Death and Destruction-Buildings Blown up.

Pittsburg, Pa., May 12.-The Sheridan yards of the Pan-Handle Railway was the scene this evening of one of the most disastrous explosions and fires known in this section for many years. A score of lives were lost and about 200 persons were so badly burned that, according to the judgment of physicians in attendance, 75 per cent, of them will die from the effects of their injuries.

The dead as far as known are:-Harry Smithey, liveryman; Billy Taylor, brakeman; Elmer Hunter, conductor: Albert McKean, brakeman: John Swan, brakeman; Dallas Bayard, fire-

The cause of the catastrophe was the explosion of a train of naptha cars which was being switched at the yards, and in the switching the rear car telescoped a car forward. The leaking naptha ignited from a switch light, causing an explosion which threw the flames fifty feet high.

Much of the escaping naptha ran through corks run to Esplen Borough, a distance of one and one-half miles, and caused another explosion, blowing to atoms the Seymour Hotel and the Collins House, on River Road, and badly wrecking a frame building near by, in which were congregated 200 or more sports from Pittsburg and vicir-ity, betting on the races, base ball, etc. Few of the occupants of this building escaped injury, many being badly burt. Mrs. Seymour and her daughter, of the Sheridan Hotel, were seriously, and it is feared fatally, in-

jured. about 4.40 o'clock, and the spectacle soon attracted a large crowd on the streets lining the hills on both sides of and parallel to the railroad. The second car exploded about 5 o'clock, but it was 6.15 when three more cars went up with a roar that could be heard for miles, that the work of destruction really began. A torrent of flame belched forth on each side of the track, sweeping back the terrified spectators like a charge of artillery, and sending a shower of flame over their heads. The successive explosions had heated the air to such an extent that before the third explosion, many were rendered unconscious by the ex-treme heat and the gaseous fumes and were being carried away when the torrent of flame swept over the ex-

REID WAS MURDERED.

Hamilton, Ont., May 12.-The coro-Hamilton, Ont., May 12.—The coro-ner's jury in the case of W. S. (Reid, of this city, whose body was found of this city, whose body was found on Thursday night last in a creek, near Marshville village, has returned a verdict that deceased came to his a verdict that deceased came to his a verdict that deceased came to his death by being killed by some persons unknown. Reid left Hamilton on Thursday, April 24th presumably to take a position as dry goods clerk in Dunnville. He evidently spent a couple of days in Buffalo, and was last seen alive at Stromness, near Dunnville. He had over \$100 on his person, when he left here, and it is likely he was robbed and murdered, the body being thrown into the creek. When discovered the remains were badly decomposed and had been in the water for at least eight days, but all money as well as all his jewellery, had disappeared and several marks of viodisappeared and several marks of vio-lence were discernable on the body. The police here have received no offi-cial notification as yet, but are mak-ing inquiries. Reid was a popular young man, and had been employed in Shea's dry goods store here for a con-siderable time.

#### TIED UP

Forty-Five Colleries Suspended Operations-140,00 out on Miners' Strike.

Shamokin, Pa., May 12 .- The fortyfive collieries in the ninth mining district were completely tied up this morning by the 20,655 employees, excluding bosses, firemen, engineers and pumpmen, enforcing the three days' suspension ordered by the Scranton convention. Two-thirds of the collieries are in the vicinity of this place, and are owned principally by the Philadelphia & Reading, Pennsylvania & Lehigh Coal companies. While all of the colliery whistles were blown the men kept away from the collier-

ies. There were no disturbances. 140,000 MEN AND BOYS IDLE.

Scranton, Pa., May 12.-President Mitchell, of the United Mine Workers, said this morning that the tie-up in the three anthracite districts is complete. Approximately 140,000 men and boys are idle, of which number only one-half are in the Lackawanna and Wyoming region.

The Planet was the whole "It."

The vituperative vocabulary of the Banner was worked overtime and epithets were plastered upon us coming and going, above and below, inside and out. The three "leaders" were all devoted, with a delightful abandon, to our complete annihilation and paraded forth under the fascinating headlines, "It Continues Crawling," "It Garbles as Usual" and "The Planet's Parallel," respectively. DEATH OF PRINCIPAL GRANT.

The death of Principal Grant, of Queen's University, Kingston, will cause the people of Ontario to forget party politics for a time and unite in sorrow for the loss of a great and good man, who had won for himself a high position in the esteem of his fellow countrymen, points out the Hamilton Spectator.

The Very Reverend George Munro Grant, D. D., was born at Stellarton, two Parliaments with the men who N.S., of Scottish parents, Dec. 22, 1835. He received his education at Pictou academy and at the West River seminary of the Presbyterian church in his native province. At the latter, at the age of 18, he won a bursary, which entitled him to a collegiate course in the University of Glasgow, the bursary being awarded by the synod of the Old Kirk in Nova Scotia. Put on him a strong surcingle and crupper. Have one ring where the check hook comes and one eight inches lower on the right side. 



#### Curiosities of Book Sales.

menting on the pheno of some recent novels, a correspondent of the "Book Buyer" writes interestingly of notable books that years ago were popular, but since have become practically unknown. He says:

practically unknown. He says:

There was once a very popular preacher who wrote many books, and for every one there was a large demand on the day of publication. But most of them passed out of print while he was still living, and I doubt if a single one of them is now kept in stock by any bookstore. Not many years ago appeared a book which the laboring classes and the tenementhouse population bought so eagerly as to run the saie into the hundreds of to run the sale into the hundreds of thousands, because they thought it showed how an equal distribution of all property might be brought about. Now it appears to be dead. Helper's "Impending Crisis" attained a sale of 140,000 copies, forty years ago, which was as great an achievement as half a million would be to-day. That was because of its bearing on burning pelitical questions and the fact that it was systematically attacked in Congress. Now you can occasionally find a stray copy of it in a second-hand shop. Tourgee's "Fool's Errand," twenty years later, reached about the same circulation. For purposes of compari-son, this and "Uncle Tom's Cabin" would seem to be closely analogous. But while the "Fool's Errand" has almost, if not quite, gone out of circula-tion, Mrs. Stowe's great novel, thirty years older, still sells largely in several editions, and at many libraries is called for more frequently than any other book. Mrs. Stephens' "Fashion and Famine" was the best selling novel of its day, and three translations of it were published in France. But to-day it is difficult to find a copy of it anywhere except in the lumber-goom of a public library. Another example may be seen in the sudden popularity and subsequent deadness of "Robert Els-mere," the author of which is still writing successful books. Were it not that it might seem like telling tales out of school, something could be said of certain books that have begun life with a phenomenal sale, which has stopped suddenly and unaccountably, as if at some mysterious signal.

For the reverse of the picture, the most notable example is afforded by "Ben Hur." This book had no sale worth mentioning for a year after its publication, and was considered dead. Now it is said to have attained a circulation surpassing that of any other American novel, with the single excep-

tion of "Uncle Tom's Cabin." meone might prepare a curious and entertaining article on three classes of books in light literature: 1. Those that have had an immediate large sale, and have then gone to oblivion. 2. Those that have had no sale at first, but afterward have met with large success. 3. Those that have been popular at the start and never lost their popularity. The first class would be the largest. Probably the second class would be the smallest. Two that would shine in the third are the "Autocrat at the Breakfast Table" and "Reverles of a Bachelor."

#### The Making of Anagrams.

Apropos the renewal of the Shakespeare-Bacon controversy, an article by William Sheppard in the "Era" on the making of anagrams is enlight-ening. "A correspondent has asked me," says Mr. Sheppard, "to furnish him with some good anagrams on the names of famous people. He further informs me that he has spent a good deal of time trying to make an acceptable anagrain on the United States, and has failed to do so. With reference to this failure, I would remind him that he must not be discouraged. The task he has attempted is an enormous one. United States has just a dozen letters. Now, mathematicians will tell him that a dozen letters will admit of seven thousand and twenty-nine millions (7,029,000,000) of possible transpositions. Old Camden has vividly described the vexation of soul undergone by anagrammatists when oft-repeated effort, with an oftrepeated approximation to success, have finally resulted in loss of time and labor: 'Some have been seen,' he says, 'to bite their pens, scratch their bend their brows, bite their lips, beat their board, their paper, when they were fair for somewhat and caught nothing herein. Again, let him omfort himself by the reflection that no one has yet succeeded in making a good English anagram on United States. Anagrammatists have been forced to fall back upon the more fluent and manageable Latin. It has been discovered that the letters forming United States may be transposed into the following Latin words:
