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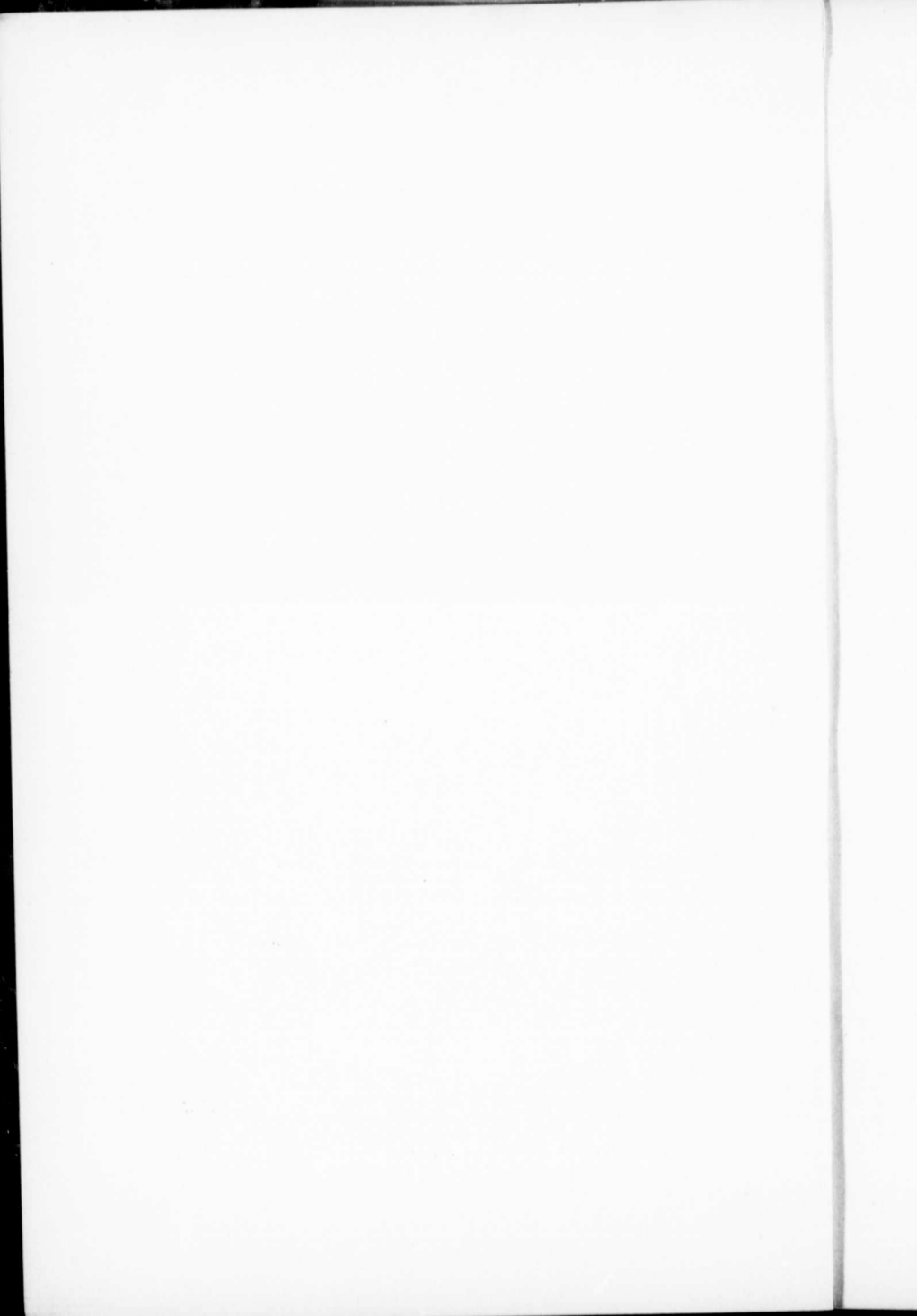

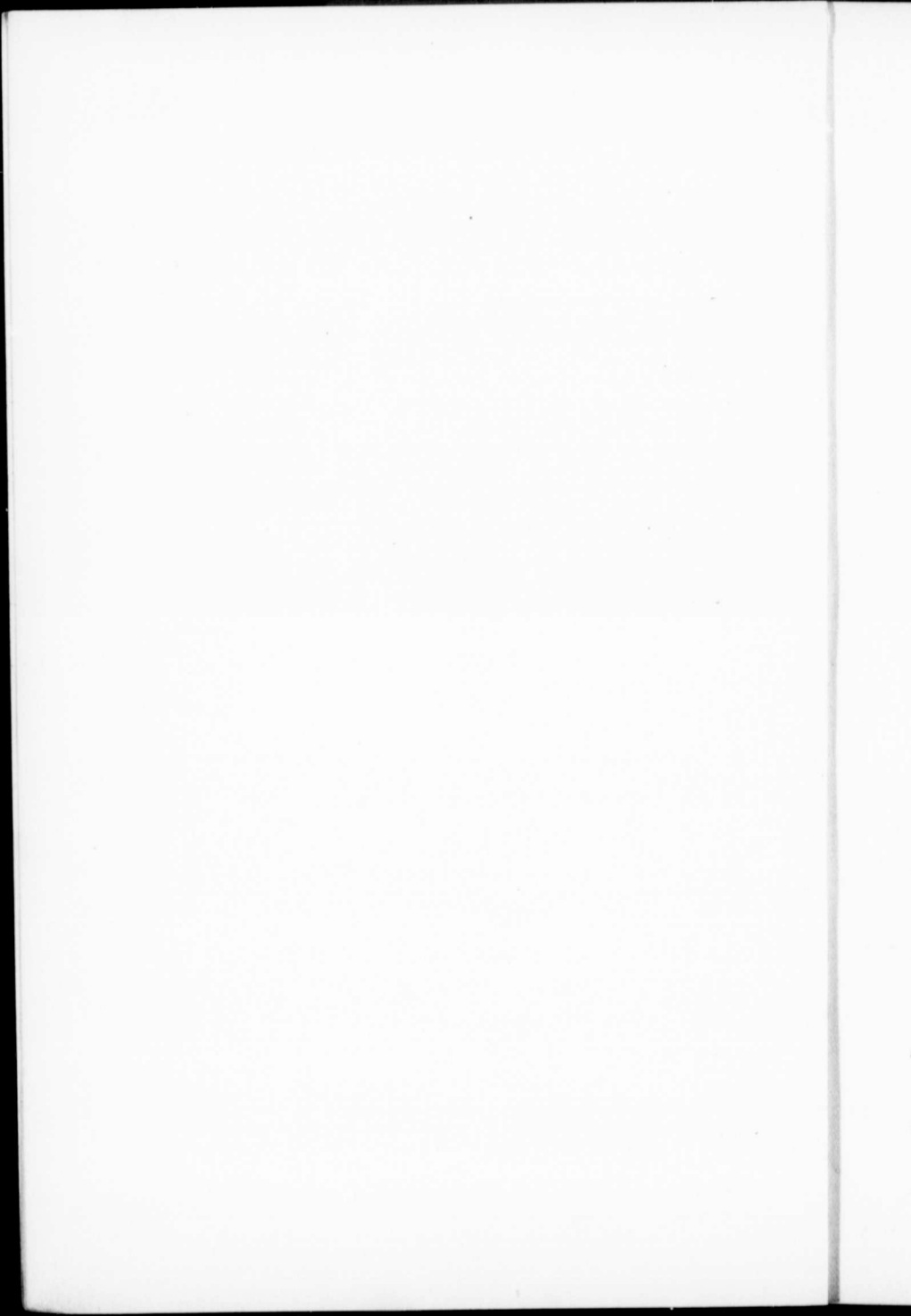

## THE BOARD OF TRADE OF THE CITY OF TORONTO.

### PRESIDENT'S REPORT.

The year 1896 has been an anxious one to all engaged in business or finance in Canada, and I believe that most business men breathed more freely when the New Year of 1897 was ushered in. This Board has not escaped its share of the troubles, financial difficulties and anxieties that have been so prevalent, and in my review of the past year's work of the Board of Trade of the city of Toronto, I must deal with one or two unpleasant matters concerning the Board itself, viz. : the necessity there was for the rearrangement of the Mortgage and Debenture Debt and the rearrangement of the Gratuity Fund. These were unpleasant and thankless tasks, requiring much time and careful consideration from the Council. On the other hand, I think that the Board has done good work, and has proved its value and importance to the community, particularly in connection with the meeting of the Chambers of Commerce of the Empire held during the year in London.

*Rearrangement of the Debt of the Board.*—While it had been realised for some time past that the expenditure of the Board was dangerously near the revenue, early in the present year, through reduction of rents and the loss of tenants from the building, it became evident that the Board could not continue to meet the very heavy drain for interest upon its Mortgage and Debenture Debt. After much consideration and many meetings of the Council, it was decided to frankly place the position before the holders of the First Mortgage Bonds (The New York Life Insurance Company) and the holders of the Second and Third Mortgage Bonds, who were for the most part members of the Board. A Committee visited New York and had an interview with the Finance authorities of the New York Life Insurance Company, and after prolonged negotiations that Company, realising the financial position of the Board through the falling off of rent revenue, in a most generous spirit met the Board's request and agreed to a reduction of interest upon the \$249,000 First Mortgage Bonds held by them from 4½ per cent. to 3 per cent. for a term of ten years, on condition, however, that the Second and Third Bondholders should agree to reduce the interest on their Bonds for a like period from 5 per cent. to 2½ per cent., and I am pleased to be able to state that of the total of these two classes of Bonds amounting to \$172,300 holders, representing \$136,000, have agreed to the reduction, and I have no doubt that the holders of the remaining Bonds will also consent to the reduction.

The saving to the Board by this rearrangement amounts to the



very large sum of \$8,675.00 per annum for the ten years. The result of this rearrangement should enable the Board to meet all its obligations for the future, and it only requires a strong and steady effort on the part of all the members of the Board to assure success. This is not a pleasant task, but it had to be faced.

*The Gratuity Fund.*—Last year a Committee of the Council was appointed to look into the position of the Gratuity scheme. The work of this Committee was continued during the early part of this year, with the result that on the 30th June last a plan for the readjustment and modification of the scheme was submitted to the members and approved of.

The Gratuity scheme has, I think, been of great service in the past in helping to keep up the large membership of the Board. However, on its present basis, while it may possibly not be so attractive a feature in the future, at all events it is now on a financially sound basis, and can be dealt with by the members at any time if it does not answer its main purpose of added attraction to Board of Trade membership.

*City Waterworks.*—This Board has always taken an active interest in the betterment of our waterworks system. Nothing has yet been done towards carrying out Mr. Mansergh's plan for putting the waterworks on a proper and safe basis—although conditions have not changed, and the necessity is now as great as ever that we should have, at all events, a sure supply of water for fire protection, and ample pure water for domestic purposes.

*Ottawa, Arnprior & Parry Sound Railway.*—In 1893 a Committee of the Board of Trade reported as to the proposal that the Ontario Government should bonus this railway. It was then pointed out that the line was being built largely in the personal interests of its promoters—that the country through which it was to pass was almost useless for settlement or agricultural purposes, and that when completed it would seriously affect the business interests of Toronto and Ontario by diverting the traffic from our city to Ottawa and Montreal. Later events proved the correctness of the contention of the Board; numerous complaints from business men showed that the policy of the road was to divert traffic from Toronto and Western Ontario. It is satisfactory, however, to be able to state that through the efforts of a Committee of this Board, who made representations to both the Ontario and Dominion Governments, the difficulty existing at Scotia Junction, so far as relates to the exchange of freight, has been amicably settled, and the further question of passenger and mail service is also, I believe, being adjusted.

*Meeting of Chambers of Commerce of Empire.*—This Board took a special interest in the meeting of the Chambers of Commerce of the Empire, held in London in June last. They felt that it was an important event of great interest to all parts of the British Empire and, in consequence, devoted much time and consideration to framing resolutions to be submitted to the Congress.

The resolutions submitted by the Board of Trade of Toronto were placed first upon the list of subjects to be discussed by the meeting in London, and the Toronto resolution suggesting a scheme of Preferential Trade between all parts of the Empire was, I think, considered the most important, and the most practical one offered to the Congress. While no immediate results were achieved, I believe that, as a consequence of the Congress, a substantial advance has been made towards that goal many of us hope to obtain—the closer and stronger binding together of the British nation and people through increased trade relations.

No one is more desirous than I am that we should live in the most friendly and cordial relations with our neighbors to the South, but at the same time I realize that we are two distinct and separate nations. We can never sink our individuality and our nationality. We should live in friendly rivalry, each trying to set a high standard of national and individual honor, and through such rivalry doing more to advance civilization than would be possible were this vast continent controlled by only one nation. Such a condition would, as a recent Hungarian writer put it, of necessity tend to “Chinify” a people living so entirely alone and without close rivalry.

I believe that our true interest is to cultivate the closest business relations with Great Britain and our sister colonies, and I for one would not hesitate to take the first step in this direction by admitting all goods coming from England or English Colonies on more favorable terms than goods coming from any other countries.

*Canada.*—The year 1896 will be memorable in Canada through the advent to power of the Reform Party after more than eighteen years in opposition. The dread of serious change in the fiscal policy of the country by the new Government has to some extent checked enterprise, but I am sure that the general belief is that there will be no damage done to our industries, and that changes in the tariff will be made only after most careful consideration, and with due regard for established industries. I believe that all parties recognize fully the great importance to this country of having a large and prosperous manufacturing community within itself.

Much is expected of the present Government. If they can advance the prosperity of the country, increase immigration, help to develop our industries and our national wealth, they will receive full credit and support from all true Canadians.

I believe that first and above all other immediate necessities for our development is the building of the Crow's Nest Pass Railway to let our merchants and manufacturers into our own mining district, East and West Kootenay, etc. British Columbia is to be in the immediate future one of the great mining regions of the world, and the Rainy River District in Ontario bids fair to even rival British Columbia. Miners are always good customers to merchants and manufacturers; as a rule they buy high-class goods at full prices and pay cash. At present the bulk of the miners' trade in British

Columbia is with Americans. **It belongs to Canada, and we must have it.** The opening up of the mines in British Columbia and the Rainy River District will give Manitoba and Ontario farmers a market, give our merchants and manufacturers a market, and generally do much to promote the interests of Canada. I believe that the trade with the mines is going to develop to an enormous extent, and to our merchants and manufacturers, if they are enterprising and energetic, a splendid field is opening up, and a period of expansion and success is before them.

*Toronto.*—I wish I could speak with more certainty of Toronto's future. We have here everything that is necessary to make a prosperous City; but for some reason or other we have stood still for many years past. No real enterprise has been taken up by our citizens since the days of the late George Laidlaw, when our merchants and citizens banded together and built railroads reaching out in all directions, rapidly adding to our wealth and population.

Since then we have been ready to go into all sorts of schemes, voting large sums of money to carry out "fads"—among them the Don Improvement, the Court House, enormous Local Improvement expansion, and anything that would cause money to be spent, if it could be borrowed on the credit of the City, without giving one thought as to what would be the result. The result has been to add enormously to our debt and taxation, without adding in the slightest degree to our prosperity. The same policy appears still to be in favor, and the sentiment of Toronto seems to be one of suspicion to all enterprise; there is plenty of energy to pull down and obstruct but none to build up. The prosperity of a city is simply the aggregate prosperity of the individual and of companies within the Municipality, and yet the success of an individual or of a corporation in Toronto seems to at once invite attack, and I myself know of more than one industry that should have been located here, but which has gone elsewhere, because, rightly or wrongly, the impression is abroad that Toronto does not treat enterprise in a broad and liberal spirit. Unless there is a change in this condition of affairs I see little hope for improvement in Toronto for many years to come.

In conclusion, I must express my sincere thanks to the Council for the unremitting attention they have given to the affairs of the Board during the past trying year. To the First Vice-President, Mr. Gurney, I owe special thanks, and of our Secretary, Mr. Wills, I can only say that his energy and loyalty to the Board of Trade are untiring and constant.

GRATUITY FUND.

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES.

TORONTO, July 1st, 1896.

To the Council of the Board of Trade, Toronto:

GENTLEMEN,

The Trustees of the Gratuity Fund herewith present their Tenth Annual Report as required by the By-laws.

In January last the personnel of the Board of Trustees was changed by the election of Mr. E. B. Osler as President of the Board of Trade.

Forty-five certificates have been transferred this year; the average age of those retiring being 51 and of the the new participants 57½.

During the year 9 deaths have occurred, all of which have been assessed for upon the subscribing members. The average age of those who died was 61 years. The death rate for the the past ten years has only reached a fraction of over the expectancy of one per cent. per annum.

Fourteen meetings of the Trustees have been held during the past year.

The amount loaned on mortgage is \$68,000.00, on property appraised at \$141,000.00; the amount invested in Bonds is \$25,000.00. The average rate of interest on the whole amount invested being a fraction over 4¾ per cent.

The recent amendments and alterations to the By-laws governing the Gratuity Fund, copies of which have been forwarded to the members, having been approved of by the General Board, the Fund is now being administered under the By-laws as so amended.

At the ensuing meeting in September, of which due notice will be given, Mr. W. D. Matthews, Trustee, retires by rotation, but is eligible for re-election.

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## ORDER OF DISTRIBUTION OF THE GRATUITY FUND.

*By-Law 17.*

**SUB-SEC. 10.**—After proof of the death of any subscribing member to the satisfaction of the Trustees, there shall be paid out of the moneys collected the sum of \$1,500, which money shall be paid to the father or mother, brothers or sisters, wife, child or children, grandchild or grandchildren, step-child or step-children, or other persons to whom the member stands in (loco parentis), in such proportion as may be designated by the member, which designation shall be in writing over his own signature, and such designation may from time to time be altered as the member may see fit, either as to the person or the class of persons desired to benefit, and which sum shall be payable free from all debts, charges or demands whatsoever, excepting claims (if any), of the Board, as provided by the Act 49, Vic. Cap. 56, Sec. 8.

11.—Nothing herein contained shall be taken or construed as a liability of the Board for the payment of any sum whatever, the liability of each member being limited to the payment of the assessments provided for under this By-law on the death of any other member, and the liability of the Board being limited to the payment of the sum above prescribed, or such part thereof as shall be collected after it shall have been collected from the members, excepting as provided in Sec. 22 of this By-law.

12.—The disposition or payment of the gratuity upon the death of any member shall be to and in favor of the persons following and in the proportion following, "unless the member shall expressly direct otherwise in writing," in favor of the parties, or some one or more of them, as herein provided by section 10, and the meaning and extent of the term "representatives" is hereby defined as follows.—

(a) If the deceased member shall leave surviving him a widow and no children, the whole is to be payable to the widow.

(b) If the deceased leave a child or children and no widow surviving, the whole is payable to such child or children in equal shares.

(c) If the deceased member leave a widow and a child or children surviving, one-half shall be payable to the widow and half to the child or children in equal shares.

(d) In any case under which any child or the children of a deceased member would, if surviving him, be entitled to the gratuity payable on his death or a share therein under any of the foregoing clauses, and such child or children do not survive him but leave (surviving him) more remote descendants they shall take (in equal shares, per stripes) the gratuity or share therein to which their parent or parents respectively, if surviving, would have been entitled.

(e) If the deceased member leave no widow or children, or more remote descendants surviving him, the gratuity shall be payable:—

(f) If the deceased leaves father and mother, or either surviving him, then to the father and mother in equal shares, or to the one if only one surviving.

(g) If the deceased leaves no father or mother surviving him, and leaves brothers and sisters, or both, the gratuity shall be paid to the brothers and sisters in equal shares, and if there be also children of any deceased brother or sister, such children shall take in equal shares the shares which the deceased parent, if surviving, would have taken; relatives of half blood to take equally with those of whole blood.

(h) The shares of minors to be paid to the legal guardians of their personal estate.

(i) If there be no person entitled to the gratuity under any of the foregoing clauses, the same may be disposed of and paid to any person or persons, to whom the Trustees of the Gratuity Fund in their uncontrolled discretion shall deem to have been wholly or partly dependent upon the deceased member or reasonably entitled to the benefit of the gratuity, or if the same be not so disposed of by the Trustees it shall go to and form part of the Gratuity Fund.

(j) The shares of minors for whom no guardians shall be appointed, may be paid into a legal depository of trust funds, subject to the order of such minors when they arrive at full age, or to order of their guardians when appointed.

All guardians must accept the guardianship in writing.

## INAUGURAL ADDRESS.

JANUARY 26TH, 1897.

Candidates for office are usually expected to make profuse promises precedent to an election. You have been good enough to place me at the head of your Executive body without pledge, and this induces the feeling that I should be both frank and careful, not only in making promises, but also in expressing opinions; and as I can better assure this by a written than by an oral communication, I have determined to ask you to bear with me in this less interesting method of expression. As you are aware, the experience of the past President has on former occasions been held to be practically the expression of the Executive regarding, not only the history of the year just past, but a declaration of the opinion of the Executive regarding the coming year, as to the domestic affairs of the Board, and also as to its course in relation to public questions, so far as present knowledge will justify an expression of opinion, it being recognized that the incoming President cannot usually, in the nature of things, be as well seized of the facts and conditions as his predecessor in office, and the distinguished character and ability of Mr. Osler warrants the remark that his recommendation should command at least as great consideration as those of his predecessors. I have, however, to say in my own behalf that, during the past year, I have been intimately associated with him, and have therefore become somewhat familiar with the business and condition of the Board and its affairs, and am, therefore, able to express a more intelligent opinion upon these subjects than I should have been had I been selected from the ranks, or than I should have been had I given less time and attention to the duties of the office which I today vacate.

Regarding the domestic affairs of the Board, I would say respectfully that members of the Board should be extremely careful in their expressions of opinion concerning the status of the Board, and especially about its internal economy, its status as a public body, and its public policy. Most of us belong to business partnerships or corporations, as partners, officers or stockholders, and doubtless in our wisdom or folly are deluded by the notion that, in difference of opinion regarding the methods or policy of our concerns, the majority of our associates who over-rule us are wrong because they do not agree with us. Yet, in such cases, we do not feel justified in pursuing a professedly destructive course in striving to pull down because we cannot control. I especially deprecate the publication in the newspapers of opinions concerning the action of the Executive which must sometimes be formed on partial information, and when

this is not the case, a member should bear in mind that it is an axiom that all men know more than any man, and a proper appreciation of the proportion of things should justify the conviction that the opinion of the Council should be more worthy of confidence than that of a single member of the Board, on the same statement of facts. Moreover, I would most respectfully urge upon members that public complaint of a paid executive officer is not an evidence of strength of character on the part of the complainant, and it certainly does not mark the presence of a controlling loyalty to the Board of Trade. Officers of the Board, including the President and Secretary, should be held uncompromisingly to their duty as indicated by the Constitution and By-laws, and it is especially to be deprecated when public complaint and lamentation is made, because of too ardent pursuit of the interests of the Board of Trade by one of its members, or by its staff, it would seem to indicate either that there are no internal arrangements for the vindication of the rights of members, or that members who appeal through the press are ignorant of the constitutional provision for such vindication. If rights of members are not sufficiently guarded, the correct course would be to initiate in the regular way measures to safeguard threatened interests.

Clearly, then, a decent regard for the corporate body of which we are all members, and in a sense co-partners, should deter every member from such appeals to the public; and in this connection it may be said that a faithful administration of a bad law is the surest way of securing its repeal. I cannot be definite regarding many questions which are of surpassing interest to the members, as the time would not suffice for their discussion, even if I were sufficiently well seated in the saddle to justify me in a declaration of policy. I may, however, promise that to the extent of my ability I shall endeavor to place facts before you in the clearest light, and shall make recommendations, so far as I shall make any, with a view to permanency rather than to procure an immediate relief at the expense of the future; and I hope to have courage to advocate measures that may be unpopular to my immediate friends and associates, if by the sacrifice of individuals the interests immediate and remote of the whole Board are likely to be conserved.

It should be the desire of members of the Board to establish the conviction in the public mind that the commercial morality of the city and country are increased and advanced by its existence; and that individuals in the community who, because of membership, measure up to its standards are given a better quality as to honesty, and have given to them a larger and broader outlook than they would or could have cramped and confined within the narrow limits of their own business; and, moreover, it should be made clear by those who know that the Board offers a method of public expression to the views of a private member which could find no other equivalent. I feel sure that if members could know the vast

influence and the immense work done by the Board that is not published, we should never hear that little man's plaint, "What does the Board do for me?" There is no member of the business community who is not affected by its operations, and that favorably, although individuals may be unconscious of the fact. Instead, therefore, of installing a new Executive while entertaining a feeling of indifference to its success, and a latent intention to hold it responsible for your errors in the past, the very difficulties of the situation should prompt in men of our race and antecedents such a closing of the ranks as will insure a new life and larger influence for the Board, and the mere breezy utterances of a new President, unaccompanied by a corresponding activity on your part, will accomplish nothing.

The Government, provincial and federal, have always been keenly alive to the value of Boards of Trade as a means of securing facts, technical information about trade, and the opinions of the leading men of the country regarding questions of legislation affecting trade; and happily the attitude of Boards of Trade has not been affected by party politics in any instance within my recollections, so as to invalidate their influence; and it shall be my aim to have this Board, during my administration, maintain this character; and perhaps there never was a time in our history when it was so desirable that advice tendered to the Government should represent the business views of the members, untinctured by their political affiliations and prejudices. The Federal Government has given every public pledge possible that there is to be a business administration, and that revolutionary action is not contemplated or to be expected; as a result of these pledges a degree of confidence is entertained which could not otherwise have existed; and although there must be in the nature of things some apprehension, there is not any such hopelessness as I feared at one time. The publication of the new tariff rates will define pretty clearly the issue as between the several parties on the tariff question, and enterprise will not be limited as hitherto by complete uncertainty as to the meaning of certain political shibboleths which have been capable of almost any construction; definiteness will be of extreme value to trade.

We have had in the experience of the people of the United States an object lesson in National Banking which, as viewed from our point of observation, has been so instructive as to have wiped out the last vestige of "Greenbackism" in Canada. Our people are as well satisfied to allow a bank to make money as they are to allow a butcher to make money, and upon exactly the same principle and for the same reason. The populist of the United States would take over the railroad, the manufacturer, the farm, and the individual upon exactly the same principle that he has taken possession of the banking privilege, and with as little reason. Happily we have escaped all that, and our people, so far as I know, without exception rejoice at



the banking system which, although it does not commend itself to the popular heart of the people of the United States, is held in high estimation by their statesmen and financiers. Our Government has placed its little finger on the rights of bankers, and has in doing so accomplished so far as possible an evil for the people. Bank rates, while they are more level in Canada, are not so low as they are in New York and Boston, and were it not for this point of interference on the part of the Government with our banking, whereby they allow a higher rate of discount than is desirable, the money which feeds the people, which is active, which pays wages, and which is borrowed from the bank, is charged for at a rate at least 1 per cent. higher than it would be. The Board of Trade stands ready to co-operate with all Boards of Trade in the direction of freeing the country from this evil, or at least so much of it as will in effect reduce the value of money to the average user.

I have nothing but words of commendation to utter regarding the relations that have existed between the Board and the authorities of the city. We have always been met in the kindest way, and have had afforded to us every facility required to secure a knowledge of questions affecting the interests of the business community. I shall ask your co-operation in endeavoring to exert an influence in the direction of conserving the interests of the business community against the too manifest purpose of increasing the obligations of the city, and thereby increasing the annual tax on business, whereby this best of all Canadian trade centres is being gradually emasculated. There is now a proposition to reach the Island by a street car line which, it is said, will cost only \$200,000. I am advised that this sum is a mere trifle compared with the real cost of such an enterprise, and I am constrained to believe that the utmost carefulness should characterise any movement in the direction of the inception of new public works by the facts in connection with the building of the new Court House, which, although it has perhaps not been shown to cover any corrupt action on the part of anyone, has indicated a most gross and inexplicable difference between estimated cost and the real expenditure. These buildings were to cost \$600,000: \$2,000,000 have already been appropriated, and no thoughtful man can view the facts as to probable expenditure without grave apprehension. I shall, early in the year, place the matter before the Council, and ask them to send it on to you for discussion.

The atmosphere is so full of mining stock certificates that it is difficult to breathe. Some legislation should be secured to protect the public against the gross deception which is being practised under foreign charters, whereby a thimble-rig business is being done under cover of absolute absence of responsibility on the part of promoters, and unhappily good names are associated with concerns which would not be found there were the ordinary responsibilities attaching to joint stock concerns operating in these. I shall ask the Council to

institute such an enquiry as may result in a discussion by you of this question. I do not deprecate speculation, or even great risks, in ventures of this kind. I do think that protection should be afforded to innocent, ignorant people who are paying their money into the hands of people when there is no chance whatever of any return of principal or interest. I would have you discriminate the legitimate from that which I have described.

The Board should be keenly alive to everything that concerns the business public in the mining territory, so rapidly filling up with people, in this province and in British Columbia. Subsidies are being freely suggested, and the issue will soon be clearly declared as between the bonusing of a company to build certain roads, or the building and control of the roads by the Government. Our past history warrants the greatest solicitude as to the decision to be reached. You may exercise a potent influence if you will, I shall endeavor to secure all facts that are attainable, and shall do what I may to influence the Council to send all these facts with their conclusions on to you. The Crow's Nest Pass is said to be valuable to Canada in a degree hard to exaggerate, and we are enjoined by our British Columbia friends to hold that Pass against all comers, as the condition precedent of all others to the future success of that country. These representations have been made recently to the Government by a deputation sent here for the purpose. We should be seized of the facts at as early a date as possible and should exert an influence to conserve whatever interests this country may have in that district, which might otherwise be endangered.

Perhaps no city in the world has been as frank as Toronto in an exposition to the world of what are sometimes called its "outs." We have overbuilt. We have too many houses, too many stores, but the excess of dwellings is not much above the normal; while as regards store property, the excess of vacancies is so thoroughly understood to be attributable to the changes in trade growing out of the establishment of great departmental stores, that it should not be accepted as an indication of a lessened business. This cause has also had its part in affecting the jobbing in certain lines of trade; this has affected individuals sadly, but changes will come. Manufacturers' agents from Europe and the United States have come amongst us, and Toronto, like other western cities of America, must adjust itself to the changed conditions. The business may be done by different men and in a different way, but the business will be done. The houses may belong to different owners, but we have the houses and they will be occupied. Toronto is not a finished city, it has a great future, and upon us rests the responsibility of a rapid or deferred recovery. Our newspapers have a responsibility in this connection both as to the past and present, great beyond my power of expression. If citizens of Toronto would show anything like the same loyalty to their city as is shown by the

citizens of other towns which have had similar experiences, we would see a change for the better in incredibly short time. Chicago has had a worse time than Toronto, and yet I have never heard a citizen of Chicago, no matter how badly he may have been hit, say a word which could be construed as a reason for avoiding that city as a place of residence; on the contrary, the newspapers and citizens of Chicago believe in their future and say so in terms as emphatic as were ever used in times of prosperity.

## BANKRUPTCY.

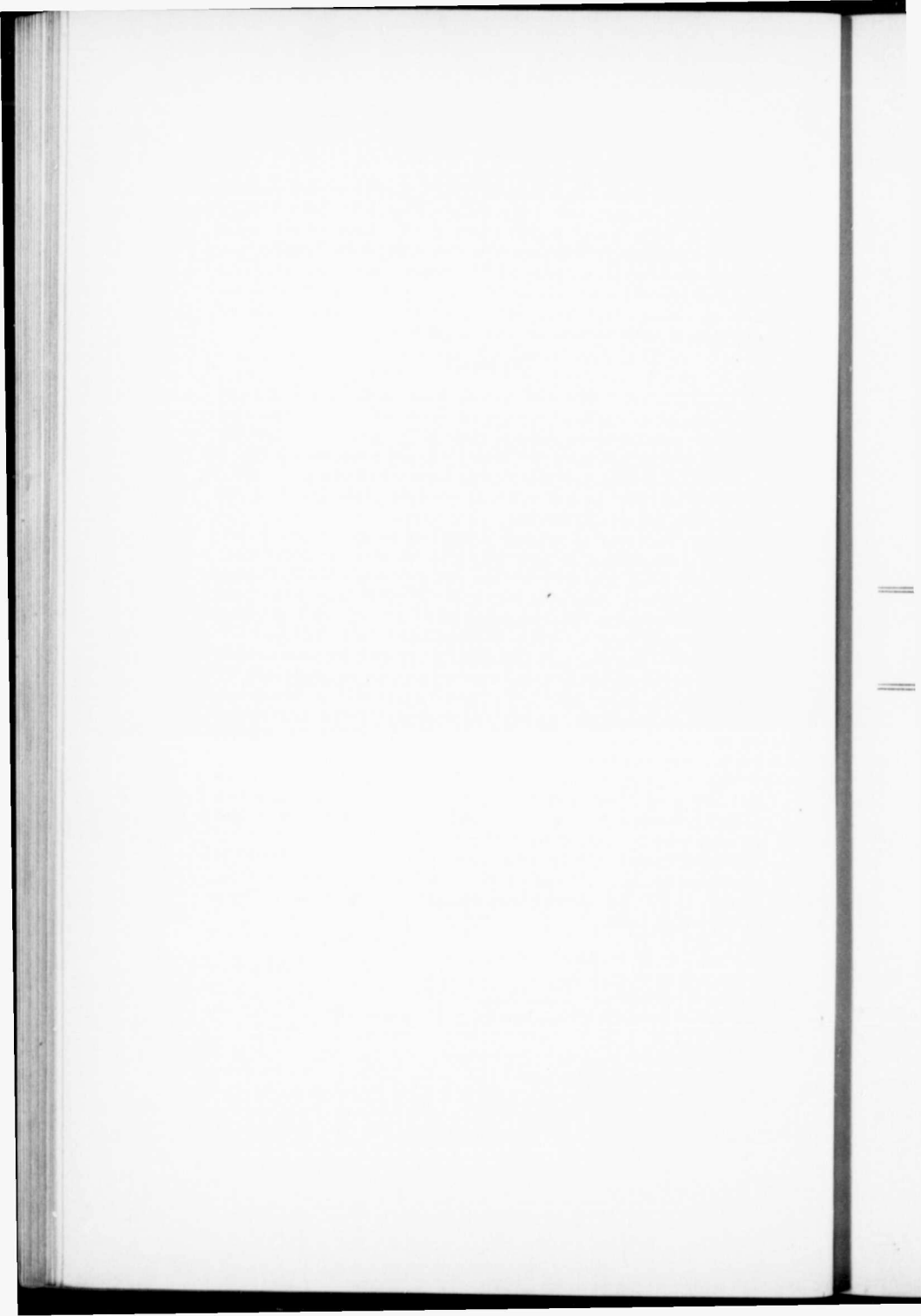
While I do not approve of a permanent bankrupt law, thereby justifying in the minds of traders of the baser sort, the idea that somehow some unknown sum less than 100 cents is right, and that such a law is an indication of the expected in commercial affairs. I know that I stand pretty nearly alone in this view, the general feeling being that the equitable distribution of the proceeds of an estate is the main thing to be attained. I do, however, so far agree in the immediate necessity of such an enactment as to advocate it, and shall urge the Council to take the matter up with the Government at as early a day as possible for the relief of many worthy debtors who have been, or may be, driven from the country by the renewal of judgments against them year after year, even when it is conceded that they have been just in their treatment of their creditors.

I concur in the recommendation made to Government touching the question of emigration, and shall counsel my associates to urge the suggestion on the attention of sister Boards, with a view of subjecting it to the closest analysis, and securing for it such attention on the part of Government as its merits, when subjected to the discussion, may warrant.

Many questions suggest themselves as affecting the business destiny of our city, but I have occupied your time to as full an extent as I feel warranted in doing. I believe that your duty is as clear as mine. By an expenditure of time which will be sufficient for the accomplishment of what I have outlined, I shall only justify your confidence in me. If I ask for your presence at general meetings, occasionally, I shall expect you to respond, and clearly your duty is as obvious as mine.
