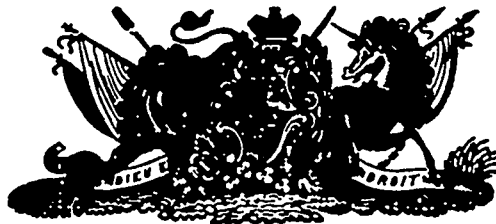

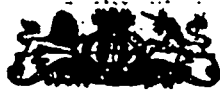

CAP. XLIV.

An Act to render permanent certain parts of the Act for amending the Constitution of the Government of Newfoundland. [25th June 1847.]

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the Session of Parliament holden in the Fifth and Sixth Years of the Reign of Her present Majesty, intituled An Act for amending the Constitution of the Government of Newfoundland, it was amongst other things enacted, that it should be lawful for Her Majesty, in or by any Commission or Commissions under the Great Seal of the United Kingdom, to be thereafter issued for the Government of Newfoundland, and in and by any Instructions under Her Majesty's Signet and Sign Manual accompanying and referred to in any such Commission or Commissions, to establish a qualification in respect of Income or Property in right of which any person might be thereafter elected to serve as a Member of the Assembly of Newfoundland; provided that no such qualification should be fixed at more than a net annual Income arising from any source whatsoever of One Hundred Pounds, or the possession of Property, clear of all Incumbrances, exceeding Five Hundred Pounds in amount or value; and that it should be lawful for Her Majesty, in manner aforesaid, to fix and determine the length of the period of residence within any Electoral District in the said Island which should be required, in addition to any other qualification, for voting at Elections within such District, or for being elected to serve as a Member of the Assembly, provided that such period should not extend beyond the period of Two Years next preceding any such Election; and that it should be lawful for Her Majesty, in manner aforesaid, to restrain the said Assembly from appropriating to the public service within the Island of Newfoundland any part of the public revenue thereof in cases where such services should not have been previously recommended, or such grants of money should not have been previously asked by or on the behalf of Her Majesty; and that it should be lawful for Her Majesty, in manner aforesaid, to restrain and prohibit the election of Members to serve in the said Assembly in different Districts on successive or different days, and to require that all such Elections should be simultaneous, and should be completed within a time to be limited, and that any such future Commission or Instructions as aforesaid should be laid before both Houses of Parliament within thirty days next after the date thereof, should Parliament then be in Session, or if not,

then within thirty days next after the commencement of the then next Session of Parliament ; and it was thereby provided that no change which should be made in the Constitution of the said Island under the said Act should continue for a longer time than the first day of September One Thousand Eight Hundred and Forty-six, unless Parliament should otherwise order : And whereas by an Act passed in the Session of Parliament holden in the Ninth and Tenth Years of Her Majesty's Reign, intituled An Act to continue till the first day of September One Thousand Eight Hundred and Forty-seven certain of the provisions of an Act of the Fifth and Sixth years of Her present Majesty, for amending the Constitution of the Government of Newfoundland, it was enacted, that the changes made in the Constitution of the said Island under the said recited Act should continue in force until the First Day of September One Thousand Eight Hundred and Forty-seven : And whereas upon and from the said first day of September One Thousand Eight Hundred and Forty-seven the changes made in the Constitution of the said Island under the first recited Act will cease to be in force, unless further Provision in that behalf be made by Parliament ; and it is expedient that from and after the said first day of September One Thousand Eight Hundred and Forty-seven the first recited Act should cease to be in force, save only so far as the same is herein-before recited : Be it enacted by the Queen's most Excellent Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and Commons, in this present Parliament assembled, and by the authority of the same, that so much as is herein-before recited of the first-recited Act shall be permanent, and that upon and from and after the first day of September One Thousand Eight Hundred and Forty-seven so much of the said Act as is not herein-before recited shall cease to be in force.

II. And be it enacted, that this Act may be amended or repealed by any Act to be passed during this Session of Parliament.

To Our trusty and well-beloved Sir JOHN GASPARD LEMARCHANT, Knight, Lieutenant Colonel in Our Army, Greeting.

WHEREAS by certain Letters Patent under the Great Seal of Our United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, bearing date at Westminster, the Twentieth day of July, One Thousand Eight Hundred and Forty-one, in the Fifth Year of our Reign, We did, amongst other things, constitute and appoint Our trusty and well-beloved Sir JOHN HARVEY, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, at that time Major General and now Lieutenant General of Our Forces, to be Our Governor and Commander in Chief in and over Our Island of Newfoundland and its Dependencies, as therein described: And Whereas by certain other Letters Patent under the Great Seal of our United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, bearing date at Westminster, the Sixth day of February, One Thousand Eight Hundred and Forty-seven, in the Tenth year of Our Reign, We did, amongst other things, revoke and determine the aforesaid recited Letters Patent so far and only so far as respected the said appointment of the said Sir JOHN HARVEY to be such our Governor and Commander-in-Chief as aforesaid, and did further constitute and appoint you, the said Sir JOHN GASPARD LEMARCHANT, to be our Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over Our said Island of Newfoundland and its Dependencies, and did further thereby give and grant unto you the said Sir JOHN GASPARD LEMARCHANT all such powers and authorities as by the said recited Letters Patent, or as by certain other Letters Patent bearing date at Westminster the first day of September, One Thousand Eight Hundred and Forty-two, in the Sixth Year of Our Reign, were vested in the said Sir JOHN HARVEY, as by the said several recited Letters Patent, relation being thereunto had, will more fully and at large appear.—And Whereas by an Act passed in the Sixth year of Our Reign, intituled “*An Act for amending the Constitution of the Government of Newfoundland,*” it was provided that it should be lawful for Us, in or by any Commission or Commissions under the Great Seal to be thereafter issued for the Government of Newfoundland, and in and by any Instructions under Our Signet and Sign Manuel accompanying and referred to in any such Commission or Commissions, to introduce certain changes therein specified into the Government of the said Island: And Whereas in pursuance of the said last recited Act certain changes were introduced into the Government of the said Island, which changes have now ceased to be in force: And Whereas by another Act passed in the Eleventh Year of Our Reign, intituled “*An Act for rendering permanent certain parts of the Act for amending the Constitution of the Government of Newfoundland,*” certain portions

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of the first-mentioned Act are rendered permanent: And Whereas it is now necessary to make permanent provision for the Government of Our said Island of Newfoundland and its Dependencies, according to the tenor of the last-mentioned Act.

Now KNOW YOU that We have entirely revoked and determined, and do by these Presents entirely revoke and determine, the said recited Letters Patent of the Twentieth day of July One Thousand Eight Hundred and Forty-one, in the Fifth Year of Our Reign, and of the Sixth of February One Thousand Eight Hundred and Forty-seven, in the Tenth Year of Our Reign, and every clause, article and thing therein contained.

AND FURTHER KNOW YOU, that We, continuing to repose especial trust and confidence in the prudence, courage and loyalty of you the said Sir JOHN GASPARD LEMARCHANT, of Our especial grace, certain knowledge and mere motion, have thought fit to re-constitute and re-appoint you, and do by these Presents re-constitute and re-appoint you, the said Sir JOHN GASPARD LEMARCHANT, to be Our Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over Our said Island of Newfoundland and its Dependencies, comprising the Islands adjacent and all the Coast of Labrador from the entrance of Hudson's Straits to a line to be drawn due North and South from Anse Sablon on the said coast to the Fifty-second degree of North Latitude, and all the Islands adjacent to that part of the said Coast of Labrador, as also of all Forts and Garrisons erected and established, or which shall be erected and established within the said Island of Newfoundland and the Islands adjacent, or on the Coast of Labrador within the limits aforesaid, or in the said Islands adjacent to that part of the said Coast, for and during Our will and pleasure.

And We do hereby require and command you to do and execute all things in due manner that shall belong to your said command and the trust We have reposed in you, according to the several powers and directions granted or appointed to the Governor of Our said Island in and by the Instructions under our Sign Manuel and Signet of even date with these Presents, or according to such further powers, instructions and authorities as shall from time to time and at any time hereafter be granted or appointed you under Our Signet and Sign Manuel, or by Our Order in Our Privy Council, or by Us through one of Our Principal Secretaries of State, and according to such Laws as are now in force in the said Island of Newfoundland, or such as shall hereafter be made and enacted under and by virtue of the said last-mentioned Act of Parliament.

And We do hereby require and command all Officers and Ministers, Civil and Military, and all other the Inhabitants of our said Island and of its Dependencies, to be obedient, aiding and assisting you the said Sir JOHN GASPARD LEMARCHANT in the execution of this Our Commission, and of the powers and authorities herein contained.

IN WITNESS whereof We have caused these our Letters to be made Patent.

ROYAL INSTRUCTIONS

VICTORIA R.

*INSTRUCTIONS to Our Trusty and Well-beloved
Sir JOHN GASPARD LE MARCHANT,
Knight, Lieutenant-Colonel in our Army, Our
Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over
Our Island of Newfoundland and its Dependencies
or in His absence to the Officer for the time being
Administering the Government of the said Island.
Given at Our Court at Buckingham Palace, the
Nineteenth day of July, 1848, in the Twelfth Year
of Our Reign.*

I.

WHEREAS by a Commission under the Great Seal of Our United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, bearing even date herewith, We did re-constitute and re-appoint you the said Sir JOHN GASPARD LE MARCHANT, to be Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over Our said Island, and of all Forts and Garrisons erected and established, or which should be erected and established within the same, and did further require and command you to do and execute all things in due manner that should belong to your said Command, and the trust We had reposed in you, according to the several powers and directions granted to or appointed for the Governor of Our said Island for the time being in and by the Instructions under Our Sign Manual and Signet therein referred to, and according to such further powers, instructions, and authorities as should from time to time be granted or appointed you under Our Signet and Sign Manual, or by Our Orders in our Privy Council or by Us through One of Our Principal Secretaries of State, and according to such Laws as are now in force in the said Island of Newfoundland, or such as shall hereafter be made and enacted by virtue of certain therein recited Acts of Parliament: Now therefore, by these Our Instructions under Our Royal Sign Manual and Signet, being the Instructions so referred to in the said Commission, We do declare Our pleasure to be, that you shall, with all due solemnity, cause Our said Commission to be read and published in the presence of Our Chief Officers and other the Principal Inhabitants of the said Island, and you shall then and there take the Oaths appointed to be taken by an Act passed in the First year of the Reign of King George the First, intituled "An Act for the further security of His Majesty's person and Government, and the Succession of the Crown in the Heirs of the late Princess Sophia, being Protestants, and for extinguishing the hopes of the pretended Prince of Wales, and his open and secret Abettors," as altered and explained by an Act passed in the Sixth year of the Reign of His late Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act for altering the Oath of Abjuration and the Assurance, and for amending so much of an Act of the Seventh year of Her late Majesty Queen Anne, intituled 'An Act for the improvement of the Union of the two Kingdoms as after the time therein limited requires the delivery of certain Lists and Copies therein mentioned, to persons indicted of High Treason or Misprision of Treason,' or in lieu thereof the Oath required to be taken by an Act passed in the Tenth year of the Reign of His

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late Majesty King George the Fourth, intituled "An Act for the Relief of His Majesty's Roman Catholic Subjects," according as the said former Acts or the said last-mentioned Act shall be applicable to your case; and likewise that you take the usual Oath for the due execution of the Office of Our Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over Our said Island, and for the due and impartial administration of Justice; which said Oaths the Chief Magistrate for the time being of our said Island shall, and he is hereby required to tender and administer unto you.

II.

And We do authorize and require you, from time to time, and at any time hereafter, by yourself, or by any other to be authorized by you in that behalf, to administer and give to all and every person or persons as you shall think fit, who shall hold any Office or place of trust or profit, or who shall at any time or times pass into Our said Island, or be resident therein, the Oath commonly called the Oath of Allegiance, save only in cases wherein any other Oath or Oaths is or are prescribed by the Statutes in that behalf made, or by any of these Statutes, in which cases it is Our pleasure, and We do hereby direct, that you do administer to such persons such other Oath or Oaths as aforesaid.

III.

Aud We do authorize and require you to call together the following persons, whom We do hereby appoint to be Members of Our Council in Our said Island, any three of whom to be a quorum, Videlicet—the CHIEF OFFICER IN COMMAND OF OUR LAND FORCES for the time being in Our said Island, next after Our Governor thereof for the time being; the ATTORNEY GENERAL for the time being of Our said Island; the COLONIAL SECRETARY for the time being of Our said Island; the COLLECTOR OR OTHER CHIEF OFFICER OF CUSTOMS for the time being of Our said Island; WILLIAM THOMAS, PATRICK MORRIS, WILLIAM BICKFORD ROW, JAMES TOBIN, and JOSEPH NOAD, Esquires; and We do hereby authorize and empower you to suspend any of the Members of Our said Council, in the manner hereinafter provided, from sitting, voting, and assisting therein, if you shall find just cause for so doing; and if it shall at any time happen that by the death, departure out of Our said Island and its Dependencies, suspension of any of Our said Councillors, or otherwise, there shall be a vacancy in Our said Council, any three of whom we do hereby appoint to be a quorum, Our Will and pleasure is that you signify the same to Us by the first opportunity, that We may under Our Signet and Sign Manual constitute and appoint others in their stead. But that Our affairs at that distance may not suffer for want of a due number of Councillors, if ever it shall happen that there be less than seven of them residing in our said Island and its Dependencies, you are hereby authorized to choose as many persons out of the principal freeholding Inhabitants of Our said Island and its Dependencies, as will make up the number of Our Council to be seven, and no more, which persons, so chosen and appointed by you, shall be to all intents and purposes Councillors for Our said Island and its Dependencies, until either they are confirmed by Us, or that by the nomination of others by Us, under Our Sign Manual and Signet, Our said Council shall

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have seven or more persons in it, and you are from time to time to send to Us, through one of Our Principal Secretaries of State, the names and qualifications of any Member by you put into our said Council, by the first opportunity after so doing.

IV.

You are to communicate forthwith such of these Our Instructions to Our said Council wherein their advice and consent are mentioned to be requisite, and likewise all such others from time to time as you shall find convenient for Our service to be imparted to them.

V.

You are to permit the Members of Our said Council to have and enjoy freedom of debate, and vote in all affairs of public concern that may be submitted to their consideration in Council; and We do hereby direct that all proceedings and votes of Our said Council shall be reduced to writing and regularly entered on the Council Books.

VI.

You are neither to augment nor diminish the number of the Members of Our said Council as already established, nor to suspend any of them without good and sufficient cause, nor without the consent of the majority of the said Council, signified in Council, after due examination of the charge against such Councillor and his answer thereunto; and in the case of the suspension of any of them you are to cause your reasons for so doing, together with the charges and proofs against such Councillor and his answer thereunto, to be duly entered upon the Council Book, and forthwith to transmit Copies thereof to Us, through one of Our Principal Secretaries of State; nevertheless, if it should happen that you should have reasons for suspending any of the Members of Our said Council not fit to be communicated to Our said Council, you may in that case suspend such Member without such consent of the majority of the Council as aforesaid; but You are thereupon immediately to send to Us, through one of Our Principal Secretaries of State, an account of your proceedings therein, together with your reasons at large for such suspension, and also your reasons for not communicating the same to Our Council.

VII.

And whereas effectual care ought to be taken to oblige the Members of Our said Council to a due attendance therein, and thereby to prevent the inconveniences that may happen from the want of a quorum to transact business, as occasion may require; it is Our Will and Pleasure that if any of the Members of Our said Council shall hereafter absent themselves from the said Island, and continue absent above the space of Six Months together, without leave from you first obtained, under your Hand and Seal, or shall remain absent for the space of one year successively, without leave given them under Our Royal Sign Manuel and Signet, or shall become bankrupt or be declared insolvent, his or their place or places in the said Council shall immediately thereupon become void; and that if any of the Members of Our said Council residing within Our said Island, shall hereafter absent themselves when duly summoned, without a sufficient cause, and shall persist in such absence after being thereof ad-

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monished by you, you are to suspend the said Councillors so absenting themselves, until Our further Will and Pleasure therein be known, giving immediate notice thereof to Us, through one of Our Principal Secretaries of State ; and We do hereby will and require that this Our Royal Pleasure be signified to the Members of Our said Council, and entered into the Council Book as a Standing Rule.

VIII.

You are authorised and directed, with the advice and consent of Our said Council, from time to time, as need shall require, to summon and call General Assemblies of the Freeholders and Householders within the said Island and its Dependencies within your Government, in such manner and form, and according to such powers and authorities as are hereinafter appointed by these Instructions, or according to such further powers and authorities as shall be at any time hereafter granted or appointed under Our Sign Manual and Signet, or by Our Order in Our Privy Council, and according to the Laws of Our said Island in that behalf made and provided ; and Our Will and Pleasure is, that the persons thereupon duly elected by the major part of the freeholders and householders of the respective Towns and Districts, and so returned, shall, before their sitting, take the Oath commonly called the Oath of Allegiance, which Oaths you shall commission fit persons, under the Seal of Our said Island and its Dependencies, to tender and administer unto them ; and until the same shall be so taken, no person shall be capable of sitting, though elected ; and We do hereby declare that the persons so elected and qualified, shall be called and deemed the General Assembly of Our said Island of Newfoundland ; and you the said Sir JOHN GASPARD LEMARCHANT, by and with the advice and consent of Our said Council and Assembly, or the major part of them respectively, shall have full power and authority to make, constitute, and ordain, Laws, Statutes, and Ordinances, for the public peace, welfare, and good Government of Our said Island and its Dependencies, and the people and inhabitants thereof, and such others as shall resort thereto, and for the benefit of Us, Our Heirs and Successors ; which said Laws, Statutes, and Ordinances, are not to be repugnant but as near as may be agreeable to the Laws and Statutes of this Our United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland.

IX.

And it is Our further Will and pleasure, that all such Laws, Statutes, and Ordinances, of what nature or duration soever, be, within three months or sooner after the making thereof, transmitted to Us, under the Public Seal of Our said Island and its Dependencies, for Our approbation or disallowance of the same, as also duplicates thereof by the next conveyance. And in case any or all of the Laws, Statutes, and Ordinances, not before confirmed by Us, shall at any time be disallowed and not approved, and so signified by Us, Our Heirs and Successors, under Our or their Sign Manuel and Signet, or by order of Our or their Privy Council, unto you the said Sir JOHN GASPARD LEMARCHANT, or the Commander-in-Chief of Our said Island for the time being, then such and so many of the said Laws, Statutes, and Ordinances, as shall be so disallowed and not approved, shall from thenceforth cease, determine, and be-

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come utterly void and of none effect; anything to the contrary thereof notwithstanding. And to the end that nothing may be passed or done by Our said Council and Assembly, to the prejudice of Us, Our Heirs and Successors, We will and ordain that you, the said Sir JOHN GASPARD LEMARCHANT, shall have and enjoy a negative voice in the making and passing such Laws, Statutes, and Ordinances, as aforesaid; and that you, or in your absence, the Officer Administering the Government, shall and may from time to time, as you or he shall judge it necessary, adjourn, prorogue, or dissolve all General Assemblies as aforesaid.

X.

And whereas by a Commission under the Great Seal of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, bearing date the Second day of March One Thousand Eight Hundred and Thirty-two, in the Second year of the Reign of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, and by Instructions under his Royal Signet and Sign Manual bearing date the Twenty-seventh day of July, One Thousand Eight Hundred and Thirty-two, his said late Majesty did authorize and empower Sir THOMAS JOHN COCHRANE, Knight, then Governor of Newfoundland, to summon General Assemblies of the Freeholders and Householders within the said Island. And whereas General Assemblies were afterwards elected and holden in and for the said Island, under and by virtue of the said last mentioned Commission and Instructions, and under and by virtue of other Commissions and Instructions from time to time issued by Us. And whereas by an Act passed in the Sixth year of Our Reign, intituled "An Act for amending the Constitution of the Government of Newfoundland," it was enacted amongst other things, that it should be lawful for Us, in the manner therein provided, to establish a qualification in respect of income or property, in right of which any person might thereafter be elected to serve as a Member of the said Assembly; and in manner aforesaid to determine the length of the period of residence which should be required in addition to any other qualification for voting at such elections, or for being elected to serve as a Member of the Assembly; and to restrain in manner therein provided, appropriations of monies to the public service by the said Assembly; and to require that all Elections of Members to serve in the said Assembly should be simultaneous. And whereas by the said last mentioned Act it was provided and enacted that no change which should be made thereby in the Constitution of the said Island should continue for a longer time than the First day of September, One Thousand Eight Hundred and Forty-six, unless Parliament should otherwise determine. And whereas by an Act passed in the Session of Parliament holden in the Ninth and Tenth years of Our Reign, intituled "An Act to continue till the First day of September, One Thousand Eight Hundred and Forty-seven, certain of the provisions of an Act of the Fifth and Sixth years of Her present Majesty's Reign for amending the Constitution of the Government of Newfoundland," it was enacted that the changes made in the Constitution of the said Island under the said recited Act, should continue in force until the First of September One Thousand Eight Hundred and Forty-seven: And whereas by a Commission under the Great Seal aforesaid, bearing date the Twenty-seventh of August, One Thousand Eight Hundred and Forty-two, and by Instructions under Our Signet and Sign Manual, bearing date the First of September One Thousand Eight Hundred and Forty two, We did in pursuance of the powers reserved to Us

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by the said first recited Act, make certain changes in the Constitution of the Government of Newfoundland, in respect of the qualifications of Members of the Assembly, and the period of residence necessary to qualify Electors for and Members of such Assembly, and in respect of holding Elections for such Assembly simultaneously, and limiting the duration thereof, and in respect of restraining the appropriation of public funds by the said Assembly: And whereas General Assemblies have been since elected and holden in and for the said Island under and by virtue of the said last mentioned Commission and Instructions, and under and by virtue of other Commissions and Instructions from time to time issued by Us. And whereas by the heretofore recited Act passed in the Eleventh year of Her Majesty's Reign, and intituled "An Act to render permanent certain parts of the Act for amending the Constitution of Newfoundland," so much of the said Act as is therein and herein recited was rendered permanent. And whereas by a certain other Commission under the Great Seal aforesaid, bearing even date with these presents, we have nominated and appointed Sir JOHN GASPARD LEMARCHANT to be Our Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over Our said Island of Newfoundland and its Dependencies, and have required and commanded him to do and execute all things in due manner that shall belong to his said Command, and to the trust thereby reposed in him, according to the several powers and directions granted or appointed in and by these Our Instructions, or otherwise as in the said Commission provided. Now, by these Our Instructions under Our Signet and Sign Manual, We do, in pursuance and exercise of the powers vested in Us by the said recited Acts, declare Our pleasure in respect of the premises to be as follows:—The qualification for all persons to be hereafter elected to serve as Members of the Assembly of Newfoundland, shall be fixed at a nett annual income arising from any source whatever, of One Hundred Pounds, or the possession of property clear of all encumbrances exceeding Five Hundred Pounds in amount or value.

XI.

The length of the period of residence within any Electoral District in the said Island which shall be required in addition to any other qualification for voting at Elections for the General Assembly within such District, or for being elected thereto, shall be the period of Two years next preceding such election.

XII.

The Assembly is hereby restrained from appropriating to the public service within the said Island any part of the public Revenue thereof in cases where such services shall not have been previously recommended, or such grants of money shall not have been previously asked by Us or on Our behalf.

XIII.

All Elections of Members to serve in the said Assembly shall be simultaneous, and shall be completed within the period of Ten days from the day of the receipt by the Returning Officer of each District of the Writ authorising such Election: and the Polling at every such Election shall be completed within Eight successive hours next immediately following the commencement of each Polling.

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XIV.

And whereas by Proclamation bearing date the Twenty-sixth day of July, in the Third year of the Reign of His late Majesty, King William the Fourth, the said Island was divided into Nine Districts, for the purpose of the Election of the Members of the Assembly of the said Island ; We do hereby authorize and empower you, from time to time, to nominate and appoint proper persons to execute the Office of Returning Officer in each of the said Districts ; and you are, so soon as you shall see expedient, to issue Writs in Our Name, directed to the proper Officers in each District, directing them to summon the Freeholders and Household-ers thereof, to proceed to the Election of persons to represent them in the General Assembly, according to the regulations and directions hereinbefore contained in these Instructions, and such other regulations and directions as shall be signified by you in the Proclamation to be issued by you as aforesaid, and according to the laws of Our said Island now in force or hereafter to be in force, in that behalf.

XV.

You are to observe in the passing of all laws, that the style of enacting the same be by the Governor, Council, and Assembly.

XVI.

You are not to give your assent to any Law or Laws to be passed, by which the number of the Assembly shall be enlarged or diminished, the duration ascertained, the qualifications of the Electors or Elected fixed or allowed, or by which any regulations shall be established with respect thereto, until you shall have first transmitted to Us through one of Our Principal Secretaries of State, the Draft of such Bill or Bills, and shall have received Our Royal Pleasure thereupon, unless you take care in the passing of such Bill or Bills, that a Clause or Clauses be inserted therein, suspending and deferring the execution thereof until Our Will and Pleasure shall be known thereupon.

XVII.

And you shall not re-enact any Law to which the assent of Us or Our Royal Predecessors has once been refused, without express leave for that purpose first obtained from Us, upon a full representation by you to be made to Us, through one of Our Principal Secretaries of State, of the reasons and necessity for re-enacting such Law.

XVIII.

No Law for constituting any Court or Courts of Judicature, or for establishing the Militia, shall be a temporary Law, and no Law for granting unto Us any Sum or Sums of Money by duties of Import, Tonnage, or Excise, shall be made to continue for less than one whole year ; nor shall any other Laws whatsoever be made to continue for less than two years, except only in cases where it may be necessary, upon some unforeseen emergency, to make provision by law for a Service in its nature temporary and contingent.

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XIX.

You are also as much as possible to observe, in the passing of all Laws, that each different matter be provided for by a different Law, without intermixing in one and the same Act, such things as have no proper relation to each other ; and you are more especially to take care that no Clause or Clauses be inserted in or annexed to any Act, which shall be foreign to what the Title of such respective Act imports, and that no perpetual Clause be part of any temporary Law, and that no Act whatever be suspended, altered, continued, revived, or repealed, by general words, but that the title and date of such Act so suspended, altered, continued, revived, or repealed, be particularly mentioned and expressed in the enacting part.

XX.

And you are particularly enjoined not to pass any Law, or do any act, by grant, deed, conveyance, or otherwise, whereby Our Revenue may be lessened or impaired, without Our especial leave and command therein.

XXI.

It is Our Will and pleasure that you do not give your assent to any Bill or Bills for raising money by the Institution of any public or private Lotteries.

XXII.

It is Our Will and pleasure that you do not, on any pretence whatever, give your assent to, or pass any Bill or Bills in our Island under your Government, by which the Lands, Tenements, Goods, Chattels, rights, and credits of persons who have never resided within Our said Island, shall be liable to be seized or taken in execution for the recovery of debts due from such persons, otherwise than is allowed by Law in cases of a like nature within Our Realm of England, until you shall have transmitted unto Us, through One of Our principal Secretaries of State, the Draft of such Bill or Bills, and shall have received Our Royal pleasure thereupon, unless you take care in the passing of such Bill or Bills, that a Clause or Clauses be inserted therein, suspending and deferring the execution thereof until Our Royal Will and pleasure shall be known thereupon.

XXIII.

It is Our further Will and Pleasure that you do not, upon any pretence whatsoever, give your assent to any Bill or Bills that may have been, or shall hereafter be passed by the Council and Assembly of the Island under your Government for the divorce of persons joined together in Holy Matrimony, nor for establishing a title in any person to lands, tenements, and real estates in our Island and its Dependencies, originally granted to or purchased by Aliens antecedent to naturalization.

XXIV.

Whereas great mischiefs may arise by the frequent passing of Bills of an unusual and extraordinary nature and importance in the Plantations, which Bills remain in force there from

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the time of enacting until Our Pleasure be signified to the contrary; We do hereby will and require you not to pass or give your assent to any Bill or Bills passed in the Assembly, of an unusual and extraordinary nature and importance, whereby Our Prerogative, or the Property of Our subjects may be prejudiced, nor to any Bill or Bills whereby the Trade or Shipping of this Kingdom shall be in anywise affected, until you shall have first transmitted unto Us, through one of Our Principal Secretaries of State, a Draft of such Bill or Bills, and shall have received Our Royal Pleasure thereupon; unless you take care in the passing of any such Bills as aforementioned, that there be a Clause inserted therein, suspending and deferring the execution thereof until Our Pleasure shall be known concerning the same.

XXV.

You are also to take care that no private Act be passed whereby the Property of any private person may be affected, in which there is not a saving of the Rights of Us, Our Heirs and Successors, all bodies politic and corporate, and of all others except such as are mentioned in the said Act, and those claiming by, from, and under them; and further, you shall take care that no such private Act be passed without a Clause suspending the execution thereof until the same shall have received Our Royal approbation. It is likewise Our Will and Pleasure, that you do not give your assent to any private Act, until proof be made before you in Council, and entered in the Council Book, that public notification of the parties' intention to apply for such an Act was affixed to the Doors of the several Churches, Chapels, or Places of Public Worship in the Town or Place where the premises in question lie, for three Sundays at least successively, before any such Act shall be brought into the Assembly; and that a Certificate under your hand be transmitted with and annexed to every such private Act, signifying that the same has passed through all the forms above mentioned.

XXVI.

You are to take care that in all Acts or Orders to be passed within Our said Island in any case, for imposing fines and penalties, express mention be made that the same is granted or reserved to Us, Our Heirs and Successors, for the Public uses of the said Island, and the support of the Government thereof, as by the said Act or Order shall be directed.

XXVII.

You are not to suffer any public money whatsoever, whether it be appropriated to any particular service or not by the Act granting the same, to be issued or disposed of otherwise than by Warrant under your hand, by and with the consent of the said Council; but the Assembly may, nevertheless, be permitted from time to time to view and examine the Accounts of money or value of money disposed of by virtue of laws made by them, as there shall be occasion.

XXVIII.

You are to take care that fair Books of Accounts of all receipts and payments of all such money be duly kept, and in which Books shall be specified every particular sum raised or dis-

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posed of, together with the names of the persons to whom any payment shall be made, to the end that We may be satisfied of the right and due application of the Revenue of our said Island, with the probability of the increase and diminution of it under every head and article thereof.

XXIX.

It is Our Will and Pleasure that you do in all things conform yourself to the provisions contained in an Act of Parliament passed in the Fourth year of the Reign of His late Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act to prevent Paper Bills of Credit hereafter to be issued in any of His Majesty's Colonies or Plantations in America from being declared to be a legal tender in payment of money, and to prevent the legal tender of such Bills as are now subsisting, from being prolonged beyond the periods limited for recalling in and sinking the same;" and also of an Act passed in the Thirteenth year of the Reign of His said late Majesty King George the Third, to explain and amend the said recited Act passed in the Fourth year of His Reign as aforesaid; and you are not to give your assent to or pass any Act whereby Bills of Credit may be struck or issued in lieu of money, or for the payment of money either to you Our Governor, or to any person whatsoever, unless a Clause be inserted in such Act, declaring that the same shall not take effect until the said Act shall have been approved and confirmed by Us, Our Heirs and Successors.

XXX.

You are to transmit an authenticated and separate Copy of every Law, Statute, or Ordinance, that at any time hereafter shall be made or enacted within the Island under your Government under the Public Seal, unto Us, through One of Our Principal Secretaries of State, within three months or sooner after their being enacted, on pain of Our highest displeasure, and also of such pecuniary or other Penalty as We may please to inflict; but if it shall happen that no Shipping shall come from Our said Island within three months after the making of such Laws, Statutes, and Ordinances, the same are to be transmitted by the next conveyance after the making thereof, whenever it may happen, for Our approbation or disallowance of the same.

XXXI.

And it is Our further Will and Pleasure that the Copies and Duplicates of Acts that shall be transmitted as aforesaid, be fairly abstracted in the Margins, and that there be inserted the several dates or respective times when the same passed in the Council and Assembly and received your assent; and you are to be as particular as may be possible, in your observations to be sent to Us, through one of Our Principal Secretaries of State, upon every Act; that is to say, whether the same is introductory of a new Law, declaratory of a former Law, or does repeal a law then before in being; and you are likewise to send to Us, through one of Our Principal Secretaries of State, the reasons for the passing of such Laws, unless the same do fully appear in the preamble of the said Act.

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XXXII.

You are to require the Secretary of the Island under your Government, or his Deputy for the time being, to furnish you with transcripts of all such Acts and Public Orders as shall be made from time to time, together with Copies of the Journals of the Council, and that all such Copies be fairly abstracted in the Margins, to the end that the same may be transmitted to Us, through one of Our Principal Secretaries of State, which he is duly to perform, upon pain of incurring the forfeiture of his Office.

XXXIII.

You are also to require from the Clerk of the Assembly of the said Island, or other proper Officer, transcripts of all the Journals and other proceedings of the said Assembly, and that all such transcripts be fairly abstracted in the margins, to the end that the same may in like manner be transmitted as aforesaid.

XXXIV.

And it is Our further Will and Pleasure that all Commissions to be granted by you to any person or persons to be Judges, Justices of the Peace, or other necessary Officers, be granted during Pleasure only.

XXXV.

You are to take care that all Writs be issued in Our Name, throughout Our said Island under your Government.

XXXVI.

You shall not by colour of any power or authority hereby or otherwise granted or mentioned to be granted to you, take upon you to give, grant, or dispose of, any Office or Place within Our said Island, which now is or shall be granted under the Great Seal of this Kingdom, or to which any person is or shall be appointed by Warrant under Our Sign Manual and Signet, any further than you may upon the vacancy of any such Office or Place, or upon the suspension of any such Officer by you, put in any fit person to officiate in the interim, until you shall have represented the matter to Us, through one of Our Principal Secretaries of State.

XXXVII.

And We do hereby authorize and empower you, in Our name and on Our behalf, but subject nevertheless to such provisions as may be in that respect contained in any further Instructions which may from time to time be addressed to you by Us for that purpose, under Our Signet and Sign Manual, or through one of Our Principal Secretaries of State, to make and execute, in Our Name and on Our behalf, under the Public Seal of Our said Island, Grants of Waste Land to Us belonging within the same, to private persons, for their own use and benefit, or to any persons, bodies politic or corporate, in trust for the Public uses of Our

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subjects therein resident, or any of them, and according to the provisions of the Laws and Statutes of Our said Island, now in force or hereafter to be in force, for regulating the mode of making and issuing such Grants.

XXXVIII.

And We do hereby authorize and empower you to constitute and appoint Judges, and, in cases requisite, Commissioners of Oyer and Terminer, Justices of the Peace, and other necessary Officers and Ministers in Our said Island, for the due and impartial administration of Justice, and for putting the Laws into execution, and to administer or cause to be administered unto them such oath or oaths as are usually given for the due execution and performance of these Offices and Places, and for the clearing of truth in judicial matters.

XXXIX.

And we do hereby authorize and empower you, in Our Name, and on Our behalf, to remit any fines, penalties or forfeitures, which may accrue or become payable to Us, provided the same do not exceed the sum of Fifty Pounds Sterling in any one case, and to respite and suspend the payment of any such fine, penalty or forfeiture, exceeding the said sum of Fifty Pounds, until Our Pleasure thereon shall be made known and signified to such Governor or Officer administering the Government of Our said Island.

XL.

And We do hereby authorise and empower you, in Our Name and on Our behalf, to grant to any Offender convicted of any Crime in any Court, or before any Judge, Justice, or Magistrate, within Our said Island, a free and unconditional Pardon, or a Pardon subject to such conditions as by any Law now or hereafter to be in force in Our said Island, may be thereunto annexed, or any respite of the execution of the sentence of any such Offender for such period as to such Governor or Officer Administering the Government of Our said Island may seem fit.

XLI.

And We do hereby authorise and empower you to suspend from the exercise of his Office within Our said Island, any person exercising any Office or Place under or by virtue of any Commission or Warrant granted, or which may be granted by Us, or in Our Name or under Our Authority; which suspension only shall continue and have effect only until Our Pleasure therein shall be made known and signified to such Governor. Nevertheless, no such suspension shall take place without good and sufficient cause, which you shall signify to Us through one of Our Principal Secretaries of State.

XLII.

You are to transmit unto Us, through one of Our Principal Secretaries of State, with all convenient speed, a particular account of all establishments of Jurisdictions, Courts, Offices,

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and Officers, Powers, Authorities, Fees, and Privileges, granted and settled, or which shall be granted and settled within Our said Island and its Dependencies, as likewise an account of all the expenses attending the establishment of the said Courts, and of such funds as are settled and appropriated to discharge the same.

XLIII.

And whereas complaints have been made by the Officers of Our Customs in Our Plantations in America, that they have been frequently obliged to serve on Juries and personally to appear in Arms whenever the Militia is drawn out, and thereby are much hindered in the execution of their employments ; Our Will and Pleasure is, that you take effectual care and give the necessary directions that the several Officers of Our Customs be excused and exempted from serving on Juries or personally appearing in Arms in the Militia, unless in case of absolute necessity, or serving any Parochial Offices which may hinder them in the execution of their duties.

XLIV.

You shall not dispose of forfeitures or escheats to any persons, until the Provost Marshal or other proper Officer have made inquiries by a Jury upon their Oaths, into the true nature thereof, nor until you shall have transmitted to Us, through one of Our Principal Secretaries of State, a particular account of such forfeitures and escheats, and the value thereof, and shall have received Our directions thereupon ; and you are to take care that the produce of the forfeitures and escheats, in case We shall think proper to give you directions to dispose of the same, be duly paid by the Receiver of Our Casual Revenue, and that a full account thereof be transmitted to Us, through one of Our Principal Secretaries of State, with the names of the persons to whom disposed of.

XLV.

Whereas you will receive from Our Commissioners for executing the Office of High Admiral, a Commission constituting you Vice Admiral of Our said Island ; you are hereby required and directed carefully to put in execution the several powers thereby granted to you.

XLVI.

And whereas Commissions have been granted in Our said Colonies and Plantations for trying Pirates in those parts, pursuant to the Acts for the more effectual suppression of Piracy ; Our Will and Pleasure is, that in all matters relating to Pirates, you govern yourself according to the intent of the Acts before mentioned, and any Commission which may have been received, or which you may receive in reference thereto.

XLVII.

And whereas there have been great irregularities in the manner of granting Commissions

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in Our Plantations to Private Ships of War, you are to govern yourself, whenever there shall be occasion, according to the Commissions and Instructions granted in this Kingdom; but you are not to grant Commissions of Marque or Reprisal against any Prince or State, or their Subjects, in amity with Us, to any person whatsoever, without Our especial Commands.

XLVIII.

And Whereas by Letters Patent under the Great Seal of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, bearing date at Westminster the Seventeenth day of July One Thousand Eight Hundred and Thirty-nine, in the Third year of Our Reign, We did erect, found, ordain, make and constitute the Island of Newfoundland to be a Bishop's See, and to be called from henceforth the Bishopric of Newfoundland: It is Our Will and Pleasure that in the administration of the Government of the said Island, you should be aiding and assisting to the said Bishop and to his Commissary or Commissaries, in execution of this charge, and in the exercise of his Ecclesiastical Jurisdiction, excepting only the granting Licenses of Marriages and the Probates of Wills.

XLIX.

We do enjoin and require that you take especial care that ALMIGHTY GOD be devoutly and truly served throughout your Government, that the Book of Common Prayer as by Law established be read each Sunday and Holiday, and the Blessed Sacrament administered according to the rites of the Church of England; and in the matters relating to the celebration of Divine Worship, you are to advise with the Right Reverend Father in God the Lord Bishop of Newfoundland for the time being.

L.

Upon the vacancy of any Ecclesiastical Benefice in Our said Island and its Dependencies, you will present to the said Bishop of Newfoundland for the time being, for institution to such vacant Benefice, any Clerk in Holy Orders of the United Church of England and Ireland, who shall have been actually resident within the said Diocese and officiating there as a Clerk in Holy Orders, for Six Calendar Months at the least next before such Benefice shall have become vacant, whom the said Bishop may certify to you to be a fit and proper person to fill such vacancy, and to be a person of good life and conversation, and conformable to the doctrine and discipline of the said United Church; but if at the time of any such vacancy occurring, there shall not be resident within the said Diocese, any Clerk in Holy Orders of the said United Church, who shall have been resident and officiating therein as aforesaid, in whose favour the said Bishop shall think proper so to certify to you, or if no such Certificate shall be received by you from the said Bishop within Three Calendar Months next after such vacancy shall occur; then, and in either of such cases, you shall forthwith report the circumstance to Us, through one of Our Principal Secretaries of State, to the intent that We may nominate some fit and proper person, being a Clerk in Holy Orders as aforesaid, to fill the said vacancy; and We do enjoin and command

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you to present to the said Bishop, for institution to any such vacant Ecclesiastical Benefice, any Clerk who may be so nominated by Us, through one of Our Principal Secretaries of State.

LI.

You are to inquire whether there be any Minister within your Government who preaches and administers the Sacrament in any Orthodox Church or Chapel without being in due Orders, and to give an account thereof to the said Bishop of Newfoundland.

LII.

And whereas doubts have arisen whether the powers of granting Licenses for Marriages and Probates of Wills, commonly called the Office of Ordinary, which We hereby reserve to you, Our Governor, can be exercised by deputation from you to any other person within Our said Island under your Government; it is Our express Will and Pleasure and you are hereby directed and required not to grant deputations for the exercise of the said powers commonly called the Office of Ordinary, to any person or persons whatsoever in Our said Island under your Government.

LIII.

And you are to take especial care that a table of Marriages, established by the Canons of the Church of England, be hung up in every Orthodox Church, and duly observed.

LIV.

It is Our Will and Pleasure that you recommend to the Legislature to enter upon proper methods for the erecting and maintaining Schools, in order to the training up of youth to reading and to a necessary knowledge of the principles of the Christian Religion; you are not however to give your assent to any Act respecting religion, without a Clause suspending its operation until Our Pleasure shall have been signified thereupon, unless a Draft thereof shall have been previously transmitted by you for Our consideration and approval.

LV.

And We do further direct, that in all matters arising within your Government, connected with the Education of Youth in the Principles of the Christian Religion according to the doctrine of the said United Church of England, or connected with the prevention of Vice and Profaneness, or connected with the Worship of Almighty God, or the promotion of Religion and virtue, you be advising with the Bishop of Newfoundland, and be aiding him in the execution of all such designs and undertakings as may be recommended by the said Bishop for the promotion of any of the objects before mentioned, so far as such designs and undertakings may be consistent with the law and with your Commission, and these Our Instructions.

LVI.

And whereas you will receive through one of Our Principal Secretaries of State a Book of

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Tables in blank, commonly called the Blue Book, to be annually filled up with certain Returns relative to the Revenue and Expenditure, Militia, Public Works, Legislation, Civil Establishment, Pensions, Population, Schools, Course of Exchange, Imports and Exports, Agricultural Produce, Manufactures, and other matters in the said Blue Book more particularly specified, with reference to the state and condition of our said Island of Newfoundland : Now We do hereby signify Our Pleasure, that all such Returns be accurately prepared and punctually transmitted to Us from year to year, through one of Our Principal Secretaries of State, and that no Officer in Our said Island within whose department it may be to contribute any return or returns for the purposes aforesaid, or to prepare the same when so contributed, shall be entitled to receive or shall receive from you any Warrant for the payment of his Official Salary, which may become due and payable to him, so long as such duty shall be in arrear or remain unperformed.

LVII.

And in case of any distress of any other of Our Plantations, you shall upon application of the respective Governors thereof unto you, assist them with what aid the condition and safety of Our Island under your Government can spare.

LVIII.

You shall likewise from time to time give unto Us, through one of Our Principal Secretaries of State, an account of the wants and defects of the Island under your Government, what are the chief products thereof, what improvements have been lately made, and what further improvements you conceive may be made or advantage gained by trade, or in what way we may contribute thereunto.

LIX.

If anything shall happen which may be of advantage or security to Our Island and its Dependencies under your Government, which is not herein or by Our Commission provided for, We do hereby allow you, with the advice and consent of Our Council, to take order for the present therein, giving unto Us, through one of Our Principal Secretaries of State, speedy notice thereof, so that you may receive Our ratification if We shall approve the same: Provided always, that you do not, under colour of any power or authority hereby given to you, commence or declare War without Our knowledge and particular commands therein.

LX.

When you shall happen to be absent from Our said Island, one full moiety of the Salary and of all perquisites and emoluments whatsoever which would otherwise become due unto you, shall, during the time of your absence, be paid and satisfied unto Our Lieutenant Governor or Officer Administering the Government for the time being, which We do hereby order

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der and allot unto him for his maintenance, and for the better support of the dignity of Our Government.

LXI.

And you are upon all occasions to send to Us, through one of Our Principal Secretaries of State, a particular account of all your proceedings and of the condition of Affairs within your Government.

LXII.

And in the event of the death or absence out of Our said Island of Newfoundland, of such person as may be commissioned and appointed by Us to be the Governor thereof, We do hereby provide and declare Our Pleasure to be, that all and every the powers and authorities herein granted to the Governor of Our said Island of Newfoundland for the time being, shall be, and the same are hereby vested in such person as may be appointed by Us by Warrant under Our Signet and Sign Manual, to be the Lieutenant Governor of Our said Island, or in the event of there being no person within Our said Island commissioned and appointed by Us to be Lieutenant Governor thereof, then Our Pleasure is, and We do hereby provide and declare, that in any such contingency, all the powers and authorities herein granted to the Governor or Lieutenant Governor of our said Island, shall be, and the same are hereby granted to the Colonial Secretary of Our said Island for the time being, and such Lieutenant Governor, or such Colonial Secretary as may be, shall have and exercise all and every the powers and authorities herein granted until Our further Pleasure shall be signified therein.

LXIII.

And We do hereby repeal and revoke all former Instructions and parts of Instructions issued at different times under Our Signet and Sign Manual, to you and other Governors of Newfoundland, so far as the same or any such part of them are or is inconsistent with these present Instructions.

LXIV.

And We do hereby reserve to Us, Our Heirs and Successors, full power and authority from time to time to revoke, alter, or amend these Instructions, as to Us or them shall seem meet.

TO ALL TO WHOM THESE PRESENTS SHALL COME, GREETING:—

WHEREAS it is Our will and purpose to issue Writs for a General Election of Members to serve in the General Assembly of Our Island of Newfoundland; and it is further Our will and purpose that the said Writs be delivered to the respective Returning Officers for the several Electoral Districts of Our said Island on the Tenth Day of November next ensuing the date of these Presents; We do therefore by these Presents declare and make known to all Our loving Subjects within Our said Island that the said Election of Members of the said General Assembly shall, for the greater convenience of the Electors of the same, be held at the several places herein-named within the said Districts respectively, as follows:—

The Election of THREE Members of the said Assembly for the District of SAINT JOHN shall be held at Saint John's, Torbay, Portugal Cove, and Petty Harbor.

The Election of FOUR Members of the said Assembly for the District of CONCEPTION BAY shall be held at Harbor Grace, Upper Island Cove, Spaniards Bay, Bay Roberts, Port de Grave, Cupids, Brigus, Harbor Main, Cat's Cove, Killegrews, Carbonear, Broad Cove, Western Bay, and Lower Island Cove.

The Election of ONE Member of the said Assembly for the District of FOGO shall be held at Fogo, Tilton Harbor, and Twillingate.

The Election of ONE Member of the said Assembly for the District of BONAVISTA shall be held at Bonavista, King's Cove, Keels, and Greenspond.

The Election of ONE Member of the said Assembly for the District of TRINITY BAY shall be held at Trinity, Catalina, Heart's Content, Hant's Harbor, and Old Perlican.

The Election of ONE Member of the said Assembly for the District of FERRYLAND shall be held at Ferryland, Cape Broyle, Toad's Cove, Witless Bay, Bay Bulls, and Renewa.

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The Election of Two Members of the said Assembly for the District of PLACENTIA and SAINT MARY shall be held at Saint Mary's, Trepassey, Little Placentia, Sound Island, Isle of Valen, and Harbor Buffet in Long Island.

The Election of ONE Member of the said Assembly for the District of BURIN shall be held at Burin, Great St. Lawrence, and Fortune.

The Election of ONE Member of the said Assembly for the District of FORTUNE BAY shall be held at Harbor Britain, Bellorum, and Gaultois.

And it is Our Will and Pleasure, and We do by these presents further order and direct, that the Elections to be holden as aforesaid, within the before-mentioned several Districts, shall be respectively opened, and the Candidates for Election respectively first nominated and declared at *St. John's, Harbour Grace, Bonavista, Trinity, Fogo, Ferryland, St. Mary's, Burin, and Harbor Britain*, respectively; and at which places respectively the final result of the Polls taken, and the return of the Representative Member or Members who shall have been duly Elected, be publicly declared.

And for the conducting of the said Elections, and the due return of the Members so to be Elected at the said next coming General Election, it is Our will and pleasure that the following further regulations be duly observed and kept, that is to say:—

That all the said Elections shall be simultaneous and shall be completed within the period of Ten complete days from the day of the receipt by the Returning Officer of each District, of Our Writ authorising such Election; and that the Polling at every such Election shall be completed within eight successive hours next immediately following the commencement of each Polling.

That the Returning Officer of each respective District, upon receipt of Our Writ to him directed, shall immediately endorse upon it the day of his receiving it, and upon the same day the Returning Officer shall, at the principal place hereinbefore nominated and appointed for opening the Election and nominating the Candidates for Election within the District specified in the Writ to him directed, at or about the hour of Ten o'clock of the forenoon of the said day, at the Polling Station of the place, make Proclamation and read the Writ openly, and thereupon forthwith call upon the Electors to nominate the Candidates for Election.

That every Candidate proposed or offering himself for Election, and before he shall be put in nomination, shall produce or cause to be produced and delivered to the Returning Officer, a declaration on oath signed by the person proposed as a Candidate, and sworn before and duly attested by the Returning Officer, if the proposed Candidate shall be present at the nomination of Candidates, and which declaration shall be according to one of the forms set forth in the Schedule hereunto annexed, respectively marked A. and B., as either of the said forms may be found most applicable to the proposed Candidate's qualification, according as the same may be founded on income or property.

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And every such Candidate not being present at the nomination of Candidates as aforesaid, shall, before he shall be put in nomination for Election, cause to be produced and delivered to the Returning Officer of the District for which he shall be proposed as a Candidate, a declaration on oath signed by such proposed Candidate and duly sworn before and attested by any Stipendiary Justice of the Peace ; and which declaration shall be made in one of the forms set forth in the Schedule hereunto subjoined, and respectively marked C. and D., as either of the said forms may be found most applicable to the proposed Candidate's qualification in respect to his income or property. And every such Candidate last mentioned, before being put in nomination, shall also cause to be produced and delivered to the Returning Officer a certificate signed by two Electors, who shall be present at the nomination of such Candidate at the place of Election, which certificate shall be in the form E. set forth in the Schedule hereunto annexed.

That if after Proclamation shall have been made and the Writ read, on the day of nomination as aforesaid, there shall not be, before the hour of Four o'clock of the afternoon of the same day, any greater number of Candidates proposed and duly nominated than the one or more Representative Members or Member prescribed in the Writ to be Elected, then the Returning Officer shall, at or immediately after that hour, proclaim and return such one or more Candidates or Candidate (as the case may be) so duly nominated, as being duly Elected.

That if on the day of nomination of Candidates, and before the hour of Four o'clock in the afternoon of the said day, it shall be found that a greater number of Candidates are proposed and duly put in nomination than the number of Representative Members prescribed in the Writ to be elected, the Returning Officer shall, at the said hour of Four o'clock, publicly declare the names of the Candidates so nominated, and then make proclamation that the Polls at such Election will be taken at all the Polling Stations of the District on the Sixth day after such nomination.

And the Returning Officer shall forthwith appoint his Deputies for taking the Polls at all the respective Polling Stations of the District, except the one at which he shall himself preside, and also without delay transmit to every such station a notice, written or printed, to be set up at every such station, notifying the Electors that the Polls will be taken on the day appointed for that purpose ; and for the convenience of taking the Polls, the Returning Officer shall at every Polling Station obtain the use of a house, or other convenient building, (not being a place of Public Worship,) or provide, where necessary, suitable booths for such purpose.

That the Returning Officer and his Deputies shall, before they proceed to the election, take and subscribe the oath as the same is in form set forth in the Schedule hereunto subjoined, before a Justice of the Peace, in the presence of two Electors of the District, who shall subscribe their names thereto. Provided nevertheless, that in such cases wherein there shall not be within convenient distance any Justice of the Peace for the said Officers to resort unto for administration of the said oath, then the Returning Officer, or any one of the Poll Clerks,

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shall be authorized and they are hereby respectively empowered to administer the said oath to the said Deputies, and in like manner any one of the said Deputies is also empowered to administer the said oath to the Returning Officer in the presence of two Electors as aforesaid.

That the Returning Officer shall appoint a Poll Clerk for each of the Polling Stations, who shall, before proceeding to take the Poll, take and subscribe the oath as the same is in form set forth in the Schedule hereunto subjoined ; and which oath the Returning Officer and his Deputies are hereby respectively authorised to administer.

That the Returning Officer shall provide Polling Books wherein to register the names of the Candidates, and the names and places of abode of the Electors or Voters in the form by Law prescribed.

That the Returning Officer shall give public notice within the District of all places where the Polling Stations will be established, and of the number of Booths or Places at such Stations, where more than one shall be appointed for taking the Polls ; and he shall in such notice specify the particular section, division or portion of Voters for the District that will be assigned and entitled to vote at each particular Booth, Place or Station ; and upon, against, or near to every such Booth, Place or Station, he shall also affix a notice specifying the section, division or portion of Voters that will be entitled to give their votes there.

That no Elector shall be permitted to vote out of the district wherein the dwelling house of his occupation, which gives him a qualification to vote, is situated ; nor shall his vote be received at any other Station, Place or Booth, than that which shall be assigned and appointed for that section, division or portion of Electors in which such Voter shall be included in the division and classing of Voters to be hereafter by our Proclamation appointed and established. *Provided nevertheless*, that the Electors for the districts of FOGO, BONAVISTA, PLACENTIA and ST. MARY, BURIN, and of FORTUNE BAY, shall give their votes respectively at such Polling Station as may to them be most convenient.

That every Elector on tendering his vote, and before his vote shall be received, shall declare to the Returning Officer or his Deputy, his true name, and the place where the Dwelling-house of his occupancy within the district for which he tenders his vote is situate ; which particulars shall be duly entered in the Poll Book ; and any Voter, before his vote shall be received and entered on the Poll Book, shall, if so required by or on behalf of any Candidate, or for any just cause that the Returning Officer or his Deputy shall deem fit, be duly sworn by the Returning Officer or his Deputy, and answer on Oath the questions following, or either of them, as may be required:—

1st—Are you the same person whose name and residence (*as A. B. of &c.*) are entered on the Book of Registry of Voters for this District for the Year 1848, and do you now continue in possession of the same Household qualification as in the said Registry is mentioned ?

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2nd—Have you already voted in this or any other Polling Place, upon this present Election ?

That in pursuance of the Proclamation of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, bearing date the 26th day of July, 1832, the vote of any Elector, being duly qualified, and whose name shall be duly registered in the Book of Registration of qualified voters at Elections, and whose dwelling-house shall be situate at a distance of more than Fifteen miles from the nearest place of Election within the District for which his vote is valid and may be tendered, may, without attending the Poll in person, give his vote by a written notice made and subscribed in the form which is set forth in the Schedule hereunto subjoined, and which notice shall be delivered to the Returning Officer or his Deputy at such Polling Place as the said Elector would be required to repair to, if he gave his vote by personal attendance ; but such Electors shall not, under the said privilege of voting by such notice as aforesaid, be exempt thereby from lawful exceptions being taken to the validity of their votes in the same manner as such exceptions might be taken if such Electors appeared and voted in person.

That the Returning Officer or his Deputy may enter apart on the Poll Book the name of any person claiming to vote for any Candidate on the ground of his two years' occupancy having been completed between the time of revising the last Registry of Voters, and the day of election ;—and the said Officers respectively shall and may in any such cases decide on the validity of all such votes after the polling has ended, and before the enclosure and ensembling of the Poll Book.

That on the day appointed to take the Polls at all the Polling Stations, the Booths or places of Poll shall be opened at Seven o'clock in the morning, and the Returning Officer or his Deputy shall then make Proclamation thereof ; and at the hour of eight o'clock the said Officers respectively shall commence taking the Polls, keeping them open for the space of eight hours and no longer, and finally closing at Four o'clock of the same day ; unless before that hour the Election be duly determined, or the Polling cease by consent of all the Candidates.

That the said Officers respectively shall, at the close of the Poll at their respective stations, publicly proclaim the number of votes polled for each Candidate, and the said Officers and Poll Clerks respectively shall certify and sign the Poll Books, and then enclose and seal them in presence of the Electors. That the Deputy Returning Officers shall then forthwith deliver or safely transmit the Poll Books so sealed to the Returning Officer, who shall, on the day next ensuing the Polling day, such day not being Sunday, but being Sunday, then on the Monday next ensuing, at the hour of Ten o'clock of the forenoon of the same day, at the principal polling station, at which the Returning Officer himself shall preside, appoint a convenient time, and without unnecessary delay, when he shall, in presence of the Candidates and Electors, or such of them as choose to attend publicly, break open the seals of the Poll Books, and sum up the whole of the Polls and declare the true number of votes given for each Candidate and proclaim the name or names of the Candidates who shall have been duly elected.

That the Returning Officers and their Deputies respectively are hereby authorised and em-

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powered to administer all such Oaths as are prescribed by Law to be taken by the Electors and Witnesses in Election of Members of the General Assembly.

That the Returning Officers respectively shall, immediately after the due execution of the writs, transmit the Poll Books, together with all affidavits, certificates and other documents incident to such Elections as aforesaid, putting the same securely under cover and seal, directed to our Colonial Secretary at his office in St. John's.

TO ALL TO WHOM THESE PRESENTS SHALL COME, GREETING :—

WHEREAS by our Proclamation made and issued under the Great Seal of our Island of Newfoundland, and bearing date the Twenty-eighth day of the month of September last past, We have appointed and made known to our loving subjects the several Stations which We have established within the respective Districts of our said Island, for the purpose of holding the Elections and receiving the Votes, and taking the Polls of Electors duly qualified to Vote at the next ensuing General Election of Members to serve in the General Assembly of our said Island: *And whereas* for the greater convenience of Electors within the respective Districts of St. John, Bonavista, and Trinity, We deem it necessary to establish the several additional Polling Stations in the said respective Districts, hereinafter mentioned: We do hereby declare and make known to all our loving subjects within our said Island that there shall be one Polling Station at Pouch Cove in and for the district of St. John, one Polling Station at Pincher's Island, and one other Polling Station at Salvage, in and for the District of Bonavista; and one Polling Station at Bird Island Cove in and for the District of Trinity, in addition to the several Polling Stations heretofore established and appointed in and for the said respective Districts. *And whereas* We deem it requisite and necessary to appoint and establish the number of Places or Booths that shall be opened and held by the respective Returning Officers, or their Deputies, for receiving the votes of the said Electors and taking the Polls at every such Station or place of Election. *We do therefore by these presents* further order and direct as follows, that is to say;

That for the DISTRICT OF SAINT JOHN there shall, at St. John's, be Eleven Booths; and that at Torbay there shall be Two Booths or Polling Places, and at Portugal Cove, Pouch Cove, and Petty Harbor respectively, there shall be One Booth or Polling Place.

And for the greater convenience of taking the Polls at the said Stations respectively, We do further order and direct that the said District of St. John shall be divided into Five Sections, and for this purpose, be respectively denominated the St. John's, the Torbay, the Pouch Cove, the Portugal Cove, and the Petty Harbor Sections; and the division and limitation of the said Sections shall be as follows, that is to say:

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That the Portugal Cove Section shall be bounded by a line commencing at Baleine Head on the South-eastern shore of Conception Bay, thence running in a straight line to the North-east end of New-found Pond, thence along the shore of the said Pond to the South-west end thereof, thence Southerly along the Western boundary line of a lot of Land granted to James Whelan, until the same strikes the Portugal Cove Road—thence in the same direction to Windsor Lake—thence South-easterly along the said Lake to the Eastern end thereof, thence Westwardly following the windings of the shore of the said Lake to the most South-western point of the same, and thence running, by the Magnet, West, until it strikes the district line, thence following the said district line Northwardly until the same strikes the shore of Conception Bay, and thence following the direction of the shore of the said Bay Northwardly and Eastwardly to the said Baleine Head—the said district to include Belle Isle and Kelly's Island.

That the Petty Harbor Section shall be bounded by a line commencing at the Flag-Staff near the Light-House on Cape Spear—thence running in a straight line Westwardly to the sixth mile mark on the Petty Harbor road, and thence still preserving the same straight line to the district line running from Broad Cove to Petty Harbor—thence following the said district line South-eastwardly to the shore, and thence along the shore to the Flag-Staff aforesaid.

And We do further order and direct that all Electors duly qualified to vote at the Election of Members for the District of St. John, and dwelling within the boundaries of the St. John's Section as above described, shall give their votes at St. John's; at which Station there shall be Eleven Booths opened for taking the Polls, and which Booths shall be arranged so that the Electors may vote in alphabetical divisions according to the initial letters of their respective surnames, in the following order, that is to say:

That No. 1 Booth (which shall be divided into two compartments) shall be opened for and limited to the Polling of such Electors only whose respective names begin with the letters A or B.

No. 2 Booth, (to be divided into two compartments) for such Electors only whose respective names begin with the letter C.

No. 3 Booth, for such Electors only whose respective names begin with either of the Letters D or E.

No. 4 Booth, for such Electors only whose respective names begin with either of the letters F or G.

No 5 Booth, for such Electors only whose respective names begin with any one of the letters H, I or J.

No 6 Booth, for such Electors only whose respective names begin with either of the letters K or L.

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No. 7 Booth, for such Electors only whose respective names begin with the letter M, and which Booth shall have two compartments for taking the Polls.

No. 8 Booth, for such Electors only whose respective names begin with any one of the letters N, O or P.

No. 9 Booth, for such Electors only whose respective names begin with either of the letters Q or R.

No. 10 Booth, for such Electors only whose respective names begin with either of the letters S or T.

No. 11 Booth, for such Electors only whose respective names begin with any one of the letters U, V, W, X, Y, or Z.

And the Returning Officer shall, to every of the said Booths at St. John's, affix thereupon in conspicuous characters the number of the Booth, and the initial letters of the names of such Electors as are assigned to vote at each Booth respectively, in conformity with the foregoing rules and orders.

And We do further order and direct that all Electors whose dwellings are within the above described Torbay Section, shall deliver their votes at Torbay ; and that all Electors whose dwellings are within the boundaries of the Portugal Cove and Petty Harbor Sections respectively, as the same are hereinbefore described and limited, shall deliver their votes at Portugal Cove and Petty Harbor respectively.

And we do further order and direct that the Returning Officer for the District of St. John's, and his Deputies, shall and may enter apart on the Poll Book, the name of any person claiming to vote for any Candidate on the ground that such person occupied a dwelling-house in the town of St. John's on the Ninth day of June, Anno Domini One Thousand Eight Hundred and Forty-six, which dwelling-house was destroyed by fire on that day—where the name of any such person shall not appear on the Book of Registry of Voters for the said district for the year One Thousand Eight Hundred and Forty-eight. And the said Returning Officer shall and may in every such case decide on the validity of every such vote after the polling has ended and before the enclosure and enscaling of the Poll Book.

And We do further order and direct that for the Elections for the District of Conception Bay, there shall be Booths or places for taking the Polls opened at the several Stations as follows, that is to say :

That at Harbor Grace there shall be Four Booths opened for receiving the Votes and taking the Polls of all Electors dwelling between the South Point of Carbonear and Feather Point, and which Booths shall be numbered 1, 2, 3, and 4 respectively, and be so arranged that the Electors may deliver their votes in alphabetical divisions, according to the initial letters of their respective surnames, in the following order :

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That No. 1 Booth shall be opened for and limited to the Polling of such Electors only whose respective names begin with any one of the letters A, B, C, D, or E.

No. 2 Booth, for such Electors only whose respective names begin with any one of the letters F, G, H, I, J, K, or L.

No. 3 Booth, for such Electors only whose respective names begin with any one of the letters M, N, O, P, or Q.

No. 4 Booth, for such Electors only whose respective names begin with any one of the letters R, S, T, U, V, W, X, Y, Z.

That there shall be One Booth opened at Upper Island Cove, at which Electors dwelling between Feather Point and Bread-and-Cheese, or Bishop's Cove, including the latter place, shall deliver their votes.

And that there shall be at Spaniard's Bay One Booth, at which Electors dwelling between Bread-and-Cheese or Bishop's Cove, and the north side of Spaniard's Bay Gut, shall deliver their votes.

That at Bay Roberts there shall be One Booth at which Electors dwelling between the South side of Spaniard's Bay Gut and long Beach inclusive, shall deliver their votes.

That at Port-de-Grave there shall be One Booth at which Electors dwelling between Long Beach and the North side of Port-de-Grave Northern Gut, shall deliver their votes.

That at Cupids there shall be One Booth, at which Electors dwelling between the South side of Port-de-Grave Northern Gut and Cupids, including the latter place, and also at which Electors dwelling between Cupids and Burnt Head, shall deliver their votes.

That at Brigus there shall be One Booth at which Electors dwelling between Cupids and the North side of Turk's Gut, including the latter place, shall deliver their votes.

That at Cat's Cove there shall be One Booth at which Electors dwelling between the South-side of Turk's Gut and Gaster's Salmon Cove, inclusive, shall deliver their votes.

That at Harbor-Main there shall be one Booth, at which Electors dwelling between Gaster's Salmon Cove and the North side of Holy Rood Southern Gut, inclusive, of the latter place, shall deliver their votes.

That at Kelligrews there shall be One Booth, at which Electors dwelling between the South-side of Holy Rood Southern Gut, inclusive, and Broad Cove, shall deliver their votes.

That at Carbonear there shall be Four Booths respectively numbered 1, 2, 3, and 4, at

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which Electors dwelling between the South Point of Carbonear, and Salmon Cove, inclusive, shall deliver their votes in alphabetical divisions, according to the initial letters of their respective surnames, in the following order :

That No. 1 Booth shall be opened for and limited to the polling of such Electors only whose respective names begin with any one of the letters A, B, C, or D.

No. 2 Booth shall be opened for and limited to the polling of such Electors only whose respective names begin with any one of the letters E, F, G, H, I, J, K, or L.

No. 3 Booth shall be opened for and limited to the polling of such Electors only whose respective names begin with any of the letters M, N, O, or P.

That at Western Bay there shall be One Booth, at which Electors dwelling between Adam's Cove and Gull Island Cove, including the latter place, shall deliver their votes.

That at Lower Island Cove there shall be one Booth, at which Electors dwelling between Gull Island Cove and Bay-de-Verds Head shall deliver their votes.

And we do further order and direct that for the Election of One Member for the DISTRICT OF FOGO, there shall be opened at Fogo One Booth, at Tilton Harbor One Booth, and at Twillingate Two Booths, at which Electors may deliver their votes.

And that for the Election of One Member for the DISTRICT OF BONAVISTA, there shall be opened at Bonavista One Booth, at King's Cove One Booth, at Keels One Booth, at Salvage One Booth, at Greenspond One Booth, and at Pincher's Island One Booth, at which Electors may deliver their votes.

And that for the Election of One Member for the DISTRICT OF TRINITY there shall be opened at Trinity Two Booths, at which Electors dwelling between the South Head of Catalina and Random South Head shall deliver their votes: Also at Catalina One Booth, at which

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Electors dwelling between Bird Island Cove and the South Head of Catalina shall deliver their votes: Also at Bird Island Cove One Booth, at which Electors dwelling between Cape Bonavista and Bird Island Cove, inclusive, shall deliver their votes: Also at Heart's Content One Booth, at which Electors dwelling between Random South Head and Sugar Loaf Head shall deliver their votes: Also at Hant's Harbor One Booth, at which Electors dwelling between Sugar Loaf Head and Salvage shall deliver their votes: And also at Old Perlican One Booth, at which Electors dwelling between Salvage and Bay de Verds Head shall deliver their votes.

And We do further order and direct that for the Election of One Member for the DISTRICT OF FERRYLAND there shall be opened at Ferryland One Booth, at which Electors dwelling between Cape Broyle and Aquaforte, including the latter place, shall deliver their votes: Also at Cape Broyle One Booth, at which Electors dwelling between La Manche and Cape Broyle, including the latter place, shall deliver their votes: Also at Toads Cove One Booth, at which Electors dwelling between the South Head of Witless Bay and La Manche, including the latter place, shall deliver their votes: Also at Witless Bay one Booth, at which Electors dwelling between the North Head and the South Head of the said Bay shall deliver their votes: Also at Bay Bulls one Booth, at which Electors dwelling between Petty Harbor and the North Head of Witless Bay shall deliver their votes: And also at Renewse One Booth, at which Electors dwelling between Aquaforte and Cape Race shall deliver their votes.

And we do further order and direct that for the Election of One Member for the DISTRICT OF FORTUNE BAY there shall be One Booth opened at each of the following places, namely, at Harbor Britain, Belloram and Gaultois, at any one of which Booths the Electors dwelling within the said district may deliver their votes.

And we do further order and direct that the several Returning Officers, Deputy Returning Officers, and Poll Clerks, appointed and employed in their several offices at the said General Election, and being duly qualified to vote, shall and may be allowed to deliver their votes at

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their respective Polling Stations without reference to any local or alphabetical rule or arrangement above made to the contrary in respect to certain voters in any of the Electoral Districts.

I am commanded by His Excellency the Governor to inform you that His Excellency does not think fit to declare the causes for which he has summoned this General Assembly until there be a Speaker of the House of Assembly.

It is therefore His Excellency's pleasure that you Gentlemen of the House of Assembly do retire and proceed to the choice of some proper person as your Speaker, and that you present such person whom you shall so choose, here for His Excellency's approbation.

GENTLEMEN,—The honor you have done me by unanimously electing me to the chair of this Assembly I deeply appreciate. The only drawback to my feelings of satisfaction is the sense I entertain of my own deficiency satisfactorily to discharge the duties of this important office. I, however, am consoled by the reflection that my labours will be lightened by the support and assistance I may confidently rely on receiving from every member of this Honourable House.

Accordingly Mr. SPEAKER elect with the House attended His Excellency the Governor in the Assembly Room, where Mr. SPEAKER elect was presented to His Excellency by Mr. WINSER, Member for the District of Ferryland, who addressed His Excellency as follows:—

May it please Your Excellency,—

The House of Assembly, agreeably to Your Excellency's command, have proceeded to the choice of a SPEAKER, and have unanimously elected JOHN KENT, Esq., Member for the District of Saint John's, and by their directions I beg leave to present him for Your Excellency's approbation.

President of H. M. Council addresses the Speaker.

Whereupon the President of Her Majesty's Council addressing Mr. SPEAKER elect said:—

JOHN KENT, Esquire—

I am commanded by His Excellency the Governor to inform you that His Excellency approves of the choice which the House of Assembly have made of you to be their Speaker.

His Excellency the Governor approves of the Speaker chosen by the House.

Mr. SPEAKER then addressed His Excellency to the following effect :—

Mr. Speaker's address to His Excellency.

May it please Your Excellency,—

Your Excellency having been pleased to approve of the choice the House of Assembly have made of me to be their Speaker, it now becomes my duty as such, in the name of the Representatives of Her Majesty's loyal subjects the people of Newfoundland, humbly to demand that they may have freedom of speech in their debates; that they and their servants may be free from arrests, and that whenever Her Majesty's service and the interests of the Colony may require it, I, as their Speaker, may have free access to Your Excellency's person. For myself I hope the choice which the House of Assembly have made of me to be their Speaker, will lead Your Excellency to put the most favourable construction upon my conduct in discharging the duties of this important office.

Whereupon the President of the Council, by command of His Excellency, said :—

The President of the Council addresses Mr. Speaker.

Mr. SPEAKER, I am directed by His Excellency to assure you that he will extend to you and the House of Assembly the amplest and fullest privileges which have been granted to your predecessors.

After some time His Excellency retired, and Mr. Speaker took the chair.

His Excellency retires, and Mr. Speaker takes the chair.

The Clerk Assistant, RICHARD HOLDEN, Esq. having taken the chair at the Clerk's table,

Mr. SPEAKER reported that the House had been in attendance upon His Excellency the Governor, and that His Excellency had been pleased to make a speech, of which Mr. SPEAKER said he had, to prevent mistakes, obtained a copy, which he read to the House as follows :—

The Speaker reads His Excellency's speech.

Mr. President, and Gentlemen of the Legislative Council :

Mr. Speaker, and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly :

Our most Gracious Sovereign, with the advice of the Imperial Parliament, having been pleased to re-establish the Constitution of this Colony in its original form, with but some few alterations that the experience of times past has proved indispensable, I have called you together at this,

the earliest period, to enable you to apply yourselves to the public business which will claim your attention, and to mature those measures that may be called for in the present condition of the Colony.

I have assembled you at an earlier period than that at which the Legislature has been accustomed to be convened, to enable you to continue the Colonial Revenue Act, which will expire on the 31st of this month; and in connection with the subject of the collection of the Revenue, I have to direct your attention to an Imperial Act, received subsequent to the last session of the Amalgamated Assembly of this Colony, which extends complete fiscal authority to the Local Legislature.

The greatly distressed condition of the Trade of this Town and Colony generally, arising out of the train of disasters that afflicted us in the year 1816, was of so desponding a character on my first assumption of the Government, as to diffuse generally, throughout all classes, suffering and privations to an extent and degree hitherto unprecedented in the history of the Colony; and consequently in its effects to impose very serious embarrassments and obligations on the Executive; these were still further enhanced by the additional losses suffered in the failure of the fisheries, and destruction of the potato crop of the following year.

The state of the Colony at the approach of last winter was such as to demand our most anxious care and vigilant attention for the preservation of the very existence of a large portion of the population, and more especially those dwelling in the remote settlements of the Island; and to the attainment of an object of such paramount importance all the resources at the disposal of the government were devoted, and by the blessing of Divine Providence not unsuccessfully; for I am thankful to have it in my power to state that the loss of a single life from destitution was prevented although so large a mass of the population were dependant on the government for their daily subsistence.

The subject that has mainly occupied my attention has been the extension of the field of labour for our increasing population, the fisheries alone being now inadequate for their support; and the promotion of Agriculture appears to me not only the surest but the sole course now remaining for us in the attainment of this end; for the increased cultivation of the soil will not only carry with it the germs of future comfort and happiness to our population, but will directly contribute, as a most powerful auxiliary, to the great staple trade of the Colony—the Fisheries, which first laid the foundation of its commercial greatness, and must ever be the source of its prosperity.

Our financial condition will not, I fear, admit of a large appropriation for the advancement of the most important part of this undertaking—the extension of Roads; but there are some of the provincial main lines on which a comparatively small expenditure will be attended with great benefit to the colony, and for which I hope some provision will be made.—I would particularly invite your attention to the great main lines of Conception Bay, St. Mary's and Placentia.

I would also suggest for your consideration whether any expenditure on this branch of the public service will be most satisfactorily made under the control of Local Boards, or the employment by the Government during the autumn, of persons whose fishery has been unsuccessful, and who may thus provide something for their families for the approaching winter; which latter system was attended with much success, both as regards the persons employed, and the labour performed during the last year.

Among the subjects requiring Legislation, I would particularly call your attention to that which relates to the condition of the poor dependant on the Government for support.

The rapid increase in their number, and the consequent pressure on the Revenue are such as, unless checked by some improved system, will involve us in much financial difficulty; and therefore I would urge upon you the propriety of revising the mode under which relief is at present administered throughout the colony.

The appearance in Europe of that fearful scourge, the Asiatic Cholera, and the probability of its extending its ravages to this side of the Atlantic, make it my duty to recommend to you the adoption of measures best calculated to mitigate its severity, should it unhappily visit us; and in your legislation I would direct your attention to the adoption of similar measures to those now in progress in England for improving the health of towns.

To meet expenses of this nature, a moderate assessment on houses in the town, to be borne equally by landlord and tenant, would suffice.

In connection with this subject, and as a very obvious method of improving the sanitary condition of this town, I recommend having an Act passed prohibiting after a certain early period any interments within the limits of this town; and in anticipation of some measure of this description, I have provided a suitable piece of ground for the purpose of a general cemetery at a short distance from the town.

The Education Act will expire at the close of the session following

that on which we are now entering ; and this most important and interesting subject will no doubt receive at your hands that careful consideration and investigation which it so eminently demands.

I have great pleasure in offering you my congratulations on the general results of the fisheries during the last season ; the produce of which, notwithstanding some partial failures, has, I have reason to believe, been something above the average.

I will cause to be laid before you copies of several despatches, which have been received from Her Majesty's Secretary of State for the Colonies.

Mr. Speaker, and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly :

The Financial Statement and Estimates shall be laid before you, and I rely, with confidence, on your making the necessary provision for the efficient conduct of the Government.

We have had to encounter a diminished Revenue and a largely increased expenditure, principally occasioned by the distressed condition of many parts of the Colony during the last winter ; this has entailed on us a very heavy outlay in addition to the provision made for such services by the Legislature ; but I have the satisfaction of acquainting you that the Public Treasury has at all times been able to meet these demands, and which will, I am confident, owing to the extreme urgency of our position at that period, meet with your entire concurrence.

In some of the districts in which the potato crop has been destroyed, and the fisheries unsuccessful, the inhabitants have been reduced to a situation of considerable distress. To those most distant I have already felt it incumbent on myself to forward some supplies ; and I would invite your immediate attention to the necessity, before the season becomes too far advanced, of making provision for others in similar circumstances.

Mr. President, and Gentlemen of the Legislative Council :

Mr. Speaker, and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly :

I have only, in conclusion, to express my full conviction that I shall on all occasions receive your ready support ; and I assure you it will be no less my desire than my duty at all times cordially to co-operate with you in the promotion of the public good.

Report of committee appointed to present Address to his Excellency the Governor.

To His Excellency Sir JOHN GASPARD LEMARCHANT, Knight and Knight Commander of the Orders of St. Ferdinand and Charles the Third of Spain, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Island of Newfoundland and its Dependencies, &c. &c.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY,—

We, Her Majesty's loyal subjects the Commons of Newfoundland in Session convened, beg to thank Your Excellency for the gracious Speech

with which Your Excellency has been pleased to open the present session of the Legislature.

Strongly impressed with the conviction that the original Constitution graciously conceded to this Colony is best adapted to our condition, we hail with satisfaction a return to that form under which we are now convoked.

We fully appreciate the necessity of re-enacting the Revenue Act which will expire on the 31st of the present month, to enable us to do which Your Excellency has wisely assembled us at this early period, and with a view to the benefits which may therefrom be drawn, our early attention shall be directed to the Imperial Act which confers on the Colonial Legislature enlarged fiscal authority.

We are well aware of the unhappy condition in which, from the train of evils it had encountered, Your Excellency found this Colony on Your assumption of the Government, and the extent to which the after-disasters had aggravated the evil is also painfully known to us. We believe that the consequent embarrassments and obligations of the Government were wisely and efficiently met, and the manner in which Your Excellency provided for the sufferings of the people during the past winter, and the conditions on which relief was afforded, have our entire approbation. We join Your Excellency in thankfulness that, notwithstanding so widespread an amount of destitution, the loss of a single life was not experienced.

The attention Your Excellency has devoted to the extension of the field of labour for our increasing population in the encouragement given to Agriculture since Your Excellency's arrival in the Colony merits our grateful acknowledgements; for in Your Excellency's views of its importance as a powerful auxiliary to the fisheries we fully and cordially coincide.

We regret to learn that our financial condition will not justify a large appropriation for the Road service—a subject so essentially connected with the promotion of Agriculture. We shall however give our best consideration to this important matter, and the Main Lines of Conception Bay, St. Mary's and Placentia, shall receive that attention which their importance demands.

In connexion with this subject we shall take into our best consideration the suggestions made by Your Excellency, as to the superiority of

the system which connects this expenditure with the administration of relief—a system which was beneficially carried out in the last winter.

We shall not fail to consider the subject of the condition of the Poor dependent on the Government for relief, and whose numbers, we regret to hear, are so rapidly increasing ; and we shall endeavour to devise such means as may tend to relieve the Colony from the aggravated burthen which the present state of this question would appear to indicate.

We thank Your Excellency for inviting our attention to the painful fact of the presence of Asiatic Cholera in the countries of Europe, and to the necessity of adopting measures to mitigate its severity, should it unhappily visit our shores. In our legislation on this important subject, we will consider how far the sanitary measures adopted in England can be made applicable to the circumstances of this Colony, The mode also in which Your Excellency proposes that the expenses for this object may be raised, shall receive due attention.

With a view to the greater security of the public health, we are alive to the necessity of a measure to prevent interments within the limits of the town, after a certain early period ; and in anticipation of this provision, we are pleased to learn that Your Excellency has secured a suitable piece of ground for the purpose of a public Cemetery, which, we trust, will be made available on similar conditions to all the people of all denominations.

We thank Your Excellency for the congratulations offered by Your Excellency, on the general success of the Fisheries in the present year.

We also offer our acknowledgements for Your Excellency's intention to lay before us several Despatches from the Secretary of State for the Colonies.

We thank Your Excellency for your promise to furnish us with the Financial Statement and Estimates, and Your Excellency may rely on our making that provision for the efficient conduct of the Government, which may be consistent with a due regard to that economy that our present condition demands.

We regret to learn that we have had to encounter a diminished Revenue and a largely increased Expenditure, occasioned by the distressed condition of the people in the past winter, while it is gratifying to find that the Public Treasury has at all times been able to meet the demands upon it. We are willing to believe that in the sums disbursed by Your

Excellency beyond the amounts provided by the Legislature, we shall recognise a course to which, under the peculiar circumstances, our concurrence may properly be accorded.

We observe that Your Excellency has deemed it necessary to forward relief to some of the Outport Districts, where the loss of the Potato crop and an unsuccessful Fishery have caused considerable distress ; and we have readily placed Your Excellency in a position to furnish similar aid to the other settlements, where Your Excellency is assured it will be required.

In conclusion, we have to express our readiness to give our support and cordial co-operation to Your Excellency in all matters that have a tendency to promote the public welfare.

Address read a first time.

Whereas by an Act passed in the Session of the Imperial Parliament, holden in the 8th and 9th Years of the Reign of Her present Majesty, entitled "An Act to regulate the Trade of British Possessions abroad," certain duties of Customs set forth in a certain table in the said Act contained, and imposed upon the importation into any of the British Possessions in America or into the Island of Mauritius of the several articles therein mentioned, not being the growth, produce, or manufacture of the United Kingdom, or of the British Possessions therein mentioned, and a certain duty of Ten Pounds for every One Hundred Pounds of the value thereof is imposed upon the Importation thereinto of certain Sugar refined in Bond, in the United Kingdom, and whereas by a certain other Act of the Imperial Parliament passed in the 9th and 10th years of Her present Majesty's Reign entitled "An Act to enable the Legislatures of certain British Possessions to reduce or repeal certain duties of Customs," reciting amongst other things, as is hereinbefore recited, it was enacted, that if and whenever the Legislature or other proper Legislative authority of any of the said British Possessions in America or the Mauritius, should make or pass any Act or Ordinance, Acts or Ordinances, reducing or repealing all or any of the said duties of Customs, so imposed as aforesaid by the said first recited Act, upon any articles imported into such Possessions, and if Her Majesty, by and with the consent of Her Privy Council, should assent to such Act or Ordinance, Acts or Ordinances, such duties of Customs should, upon the Proclamation of such assent in the Colony or at any time thereafter which might be fixed by such Act or Ordinance, be so reduced or repealed in such Possession, as if such reduction or repeal had been effected by an Act or Acts of the Imperial Legislature, any thing in any Act to the contrary thereof notwithstanding.

Resolved,—That it is expedient forthwith to repeal all the said duties of Customs, so imposed as aforesaid, so far as respects the importation into this Colony of the articles chargeable therewith, and further to make the necessary provision, so as to guard against the Revenue of the Colony being affected by such repeal of such Imperial Act as aforesaid.

And upon the question being put thereon,

Resolved,—That the said Resolution be adopted.

TO THE QUEEN'S MOST EXCELLENT MAJESTY.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR MAJESTY,—

We Your Majesty's loyal subjects the Commons of Newfoundland in Session convened, beg leave to approach Your Majesty with feelings of the most profound devotion to Your Majesty's person and Government.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR MAJESTY—On the granting of the Charter to this Colony in the year of 1831, Your Majesty's Predecessor was pleased to order that the Salaries of certain of our highest functionaries should be specially Reserved. The scale that was adopted was one which bore a wise regard to the circumstances of the Colony at that period, and its operation met the ready assent of the people at large. We are fully alive to the view that the public interests are identified with the faithful and effectual administration of the public affairs of the Colony, and that to secure this, the salaries must be such as will obtain the services of capable and honourable men. We think this subject would not be compromised by a modification of the scale hitherto existing, while we are urged to seek this reduction by the reasons to which we shall now refer.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR MAJESTY,—The condition of this Colony has undergone a most detrimental change since the period when the scale of Reserved Salaries was established. All the resources of the Colony were then in a prosperous state, and we were unincumbered with public debt. The crushing disasters of the Colony during the past two or three years give us an essentially changed position.

We have One Hundred Thousand Pounds of Public debt ; the partial failure of our Fisheries ; the reduced condition of the people, caused by the loss of the Potato Crop, in the last two years, to nearly the amount of One Hundred and Fifty Thousand Pounds ; and this reduction has cost the Colony to relieve them above Thirty Thousand Pounds. The falling off of the Revenue also, to the amount of Seven Thousand Pounds the last year, adds to our embarrassment ; and at the present moment, after providing for the ordinary service of the Government, we have very little means to devote to those objects which connect themselves with the moral and social improvement of the people.

Under all these circumstances, we are impelled by necessity to urge that our Public Official expenditure may be reduced ; and we feel assured that Your Majesty will recognize the justice of considering that the means of the Country should form a portion of the grounds on which this question should be determined.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR MAJESTY,—We desire strict justice, and accordingly do not propose anything to Your Majesty that we are not prepared to carry out amongst ourselves in all cases that come under the consideration of the House of Assembly, when voting for the salaried Officials within its control, guided by prudence and justice, and followed in all other cases where a reduction can be made, as the only mode by which the Colony can be relieved of its present serious embarrassment.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR MAJESTY,—The House of Assembly most devotedly and humbly request that the Reserved Salaries may be paid hereafter in Currency in lieu of Sterling.

On motion of Mr. WINSER seconded by Mr. HANRAHAN,

Resolved,—That the said Address be read a second time to-morrow.

Provided always, and be it enacted, that all Wooden Sheds or Erections of what nature or kind soever, other than those temporarily used for the purposes of building, that are encroachments upon the width of either Water Street or Duckworth Street or either of the said Fire-breaks in the said recited Acts mentioned, shall, after the first day of May next in this present year, if not removed back to the lines prescribed by the said recited Acts for the width of the said Streets and Fire-breaks respectively, be deemed and taken to be public nuisances, and shall be abated in the manner provided by the fourth section of the first recited Act: Provided further, that it shall be lawful for the Governor, by and with the advice of the Council, to permit any such shed to remain on its present position, where the encroachment upon the Street or Firebreak shall be to a trifling extent, or where, in the opinion of the Governor and Council, it shall not be expedient to remove the same.

Third. And be it enacted, that from and after the passing of this Act it shall not be lawful to erect, place, or put any Wooden Shed or Building of any kind or nature whatsoever within the lines and boundaries prescribed by the said recited Act for the width of Water Street, Duckworth Street, or the said Fire-breaks respectively, nor to erect or build any Wooden Shed or Building in any part of the said Town of St. John's, where Wooden Buildings are by the said recited Act prohibited from being erected, and that every

such erection made contrary to the provisions of this Act shall be deemed and taken to be a public nuisance, and shall be dealt with in the manner provided by the last preceding Section.

Fourth. And be it further enacted, that from and after the passing of this Act it shall not be lawful for any Owner or Occupier of any Wooden Shed or Building on any of the said Streets or Fire-breaks respectively, to enlarge or extend the same, and in all cases of parties offending herein every such Shed or Building shall be forthwith abated as a nuisance in manner provided by the second Section.

Fifth. And be it further enacted, that so much of the said recited Acts as relate to that part of Prescott Street Firebreak, lying between Water Street and Duckworth Street be, and the same are hereby, repealed; and that the Eastern side of McLarty's lane shall be the Eastern side of the said Fire-break, and that the Western side of the said Fire-break shall be a straight line drawn from a point in Water Street distant Westwardly eighty feet from the South-eastern corner of the said Fire-break to a point on Duckworth Street seventy feet distant Westwardly from the North-eastern corner of the said Fire-break.

Sixth. Provided also, and be it further enacted, that between the Landlords and Tenants of such temporary Wooden Sheds or Buildings as aforesaid as are under tenancy by the year, a notice to quit at the expiration of one month from the delivery thereof shall be deemed sufficient, if such notice be given within one month after the passing of this Act: Provided also, that nothing herein contained shall be deemed to extend the term as between Landlord and Tenant in cases where the tenancy is by agreement until the first day of May, One Thousand Eight Hundred and Forty-nine.

Petition from Chs. Simms,
Chief Clerk and Registrar.

Mr. HOYLES, with consent of His Excellency the Governor, presented a Petition from Charles Simms, Chief Clerk and Registrar of the Supreme and Circuit Courts, and the same was received and read, as follows :—

That by Warrant under the Royal Sign Manual, dated 5th January, 1848, Her Majesty was pleased to appoint your Excellency's Petitioner to the office of Chief Clerk and Registrar of the Supreme Court, and also to that of Clerk of the Central Circuit Court of this Island; upon the duties of which several offices your Petitioner entered on the 14th March following, and, except for a short period, during which, under the appointment of your Excellency, Petitioner filled the office of Assistant Judge of the Supreme Court, your Excellency's Petitioner has continued in the performance of the duties of his offices until the present time.

That since the vacation by Edward M. Archibald Esq., now Her Majesty's Attorney General, of the offices of Chief Clerk and Registrar of the Courts, at which time the Acts combining the Offices expired, there has been no permanent provision for the same, though in the Supply Bill passed January, 1847, (10th Vic., cap. 8,) a grant was made for the said offices at the rate of £500 per annum for one portion of the time therein mentioned, and £350 for another portion;—and in order to arrive at a clear view of the whole question, your Petitioner would respectfully beg your Excellency's attention to the circumstances incident to the creation of the two offices of Chief Clerk and Registrar of the Supreme Court, and Clerk of the Central Circuit Court.

At the institution of the several Courts of Judicature under the Royal Charter in 1826, the offices were held by two several persons; the salary attached to the office of Chief Clerk and Registrar of the Supreme Court being

£400 per annum, besides all Fees ; and the salary affixed to the office of Clerk of the Central Circuit Court being £250 per annum, besides fees ;—which arrangement continued until the year 1835, when the late Mr. Blaikie, then Clerk of the Circuit Court, was retired from that office with an annuity ; and an arrangement was made with Mr. Archibald, the Registrar of the Supreme Court, and then also holding the office of Clerk of the General Assembly, to take upon himself the duties of Registrar and Clerk of both Courts, at a salary of £500 per annum, to which was afterwards added a salary of £50 per annum for a Clerk ; and the Acts of the Colonial Legislature, 5, W. 4, cap. 11, and 6 Vic., cap. 11, were passed, confirmatory of such arrangement, and combining the two offices in one person ;—thereby effecting a considerable saving to the Public Treasury ; but the continuance of the Acts was limited to the tenure of the offices by Mr. Archibald, upon whose promotion to the office of Attorney General, they consequently expired. Mr. R. Lilly, who had been acting in Mr. Archibald's absence, continued, however, to hold the acting appointment at the same rate of salary and allowances as Mr. Archibald had received.

About the time the Legislature was in session in December and January following, (1846-7) information having been received from the Secretary of State, of the appointment by the Government at home of Mr. Dawson, a stranger to the Colony, to the office, the subject was brought before the Legislature, and the General Assembly passed an Address to Her Majesty in remonstrance against the appointment of strangers to those offices in the Colony, for which persons resident in the Colony, and competently qualified, might be had ; and shortly afterwards, in support of the same principle, the Assembly voted in the Supply Bill only £350 salary for the offices for the year ending June 30, 1848, although the full salary, at the rate of £500 sterling, was voted for the time which it was expected the then acting officer, Mr. Lilly, might fill the office.

Your Petitioner respectfully submits that if any doubt could exist as to the intention of the Legislature in those votes, a reference to the recorded speeches of the hon. members at the time would remove it and clearly shew that the object of the General Assembly was to support the assertion of the rights of the Colonists and the natives in their claims to office in the colony as set forth by the Assembly in their Address upon that subject.

Your Petitioner would further respectfully state to your Excellency that a greatly increased and increasing business has arisen beyond any former period in all branches of the duties of the several offices held by him from the great influx of suitors in the Supreme and Central Circuit Courts,

and from other causes ; that the present business of his several offices is much more than double the amount therein at the time they were held by two several persons ; and that in addition to the daily and constant labour of your Petitioner in the duties of his office and the assistance of a Clerk as sanctioned by the Government, your Excellency's Petitioner, from the great press of business in the office, has lately found it necessary to employ a third person to assist, and prevent delays and inconvenience to the public.

Your Petitioner would, therefore, the premises considered, respectfully request that Your Excellency will be pleased to recommend to the Honorable the House of Assembly to grant to Petitioner such reasonable salary in addition to the Fees of his office which Her Majesty's Commission gives him, as will afford your Petitioner a fair remuneration for the performance of his important and arduous duties. And as in duty bound Petitioner will ever pray.

That by his contract your Petitioner is bound to convey the Mails in Steam Vessels during the whole of the months of the year—thus insuring the important advantage of the regular transmission from this Island, in the winter months, of the Mails in time for the first return Packet homeward-bound from Halifax. That to insure the due and punctual performance of this service Your Petitioner is bound to provide, and has at a very great additional outlay, provided a reserve Steam Ship fully equipped, to be kept at Halifax and to be employed when required on the station. That in entering into his contract, your Petitioner was influenced by the knowledge of the fact that your Honourable House had granted an annual sum of money to the late Contractor for the carriage of the Mails, which your Petitioner trusted would be equally extended to a more expensive and efficient establishment for the conveyance of the Mails by steam during all the months of the year.

Your Petitioner therefore humbly prays that your Honourable House will take the circumstances into your consideration, and grant him such sum towards the encouragement and support of his undertaking as in your wisdom you may think fit.

It is with deep regret that your Petitioners have learnt in the manner set forth in the annexed declaration that Mr. Parsons has, since the presenting the said Petition, received from the Government a sum of one Hundred Pounds ; and, looking at the time of the payment of that sum, and the silence observed by Mr. Parsons thereon, we feel bound, at the cost of much pain to our feelings, to declare to your Honourable House our concurrence in the sentiment expressed in a resolution passed at the meeting above referred to, that he Mr. Parsons, by the receipt of the said sum of One Hundred Pounds, has betrayed the interests of his constituency, and damaged the representative character of the colony.

Your Petitioners therefore humbly pray that your Honourable House will be pleased to take the circumstances into your consideration and take such steps as will prevent, if you cannot now punish, the recurrence of an offence so destructive to public liberty.

That since the beginning of August last, and during the whole of the past severe winter, the Plugs have at all times been accessible, and capable of being immediately rendered available if a fire had occurred either in Water-street or Duckworth-street, and as far beyond these streets towards the back of the town as the supply of hose might extend.

That while these Fire-plugs, at a large outlay to the Company, unquestionably afford great security to property generally against the ravages of fire, the Company derive from them no source of revenue whatever, while the amount received for the supply of water afforded to permanent buildings in Water-street falls very far below the current expenditure necessarily incurred by the Company.

The Bill now before your Honourable House extending the time for the removal of the temporary sheds will necessarily inflict so great an injury on the Company as to deprive them of the possibility of securing even a common interest on their capital for the next two years, it not being in the power of the Company to supply these sheds with water, even if it were required by the owners, in consequence of their insecurity from the effects of frost.

The Company do not complain of this kind act of the Legislature towards the shed-holders; but seeing the effect it must have on their resources, they the more confidently throw themselves on the justice of your Honourable House to protect them in those reasonable profits which the outlay of so large a capital for so laudable a purpose most truly demands.

Your Petitioners therefore pray that Your Honorable House will take these premises into your favorable consideration, and grant to the St. John's Water Company such annual sum as will afford a remuneration for the expenditure incurred by them in laying down Fire-plugs for the security of property in the capital, as well as to assist in having the same further improved and kept in an effective state.

Resolved,—That it is the opinion of this Committee that all persons who may be hereafter appointed to offices within this Colony, analagous to offices held by a political tenure in those Colonies where Responsible Government prevails, should be notified by the Executive at the time of their appointment, that their offices are to be held upon the like tenure, in the event of Responsible Government being acceded to this Colony.

The House of Assembly respectfully submit that the meaning of this Resolution is obvious.

It does not interfere with existing rights—its prayer is to the effect, that parties now about to be inducted into certain offices, shall be notified by the Executive of this Colony, of their tenure of office being contingent on any changes that Her Majesty, in the exercise of her prerogative, may in her wisdom deem necessary to introduce into the Government of this Colony.

The House of Assembly have been induced to pass this Resolution from a desire to obviate as much as lies in their power the difficulties that are likely to arise on the introduction into the government of this Colony of any such change.

The House of Assembly have observed in the neighbouring colony of Novascotia, that the difficulty of introducing a new principle into the Administrative Government of that colony has been greatly enhanced by the claims of vested rights urged by official incumbents.

The House of Assembly therefore consider they are exercising a wise foresight in embodying their opinions on this subject in the before-recited Resolution.—They wish to guard against the possibility of the claim of private rights being pleaded as a cause for the obstruction of a public

measure that may be considered as necessary for the promotion of the general welfare; and they are also actuated by the desire, that in the event of this change taking place, its beneficial influences may not be marred by the acrimonious feelings such contests invariably engender in society.

The House of Assembly therefore pray, that the Right Honorable the Secretary of State for the Colonies will take the aforesaid Resolution into consideration, and recommend to Her Majesty that the principle therein enunciated may, in all future appointments to such offices as may be within the scope of such Resolution be carried into operation.

That in the year 1847 your Petitioner undertook the publication of a Digest of the Laws of Newfoundland, comprising the Judicature Act and Royal Charter, (then almost entirely out of print) with a commentary upon them illustrative of the practice and decisions of the Courts, the several Acts of the Local Legislature affecting the jurisprudence of the country, to which frequent reference is most needed, with notes ; also, the Rules of Court, an Abstract and Tables of all the local Acts, and other valuable information. That the work has been found very generally useful, especially to the Courts of Law and to the Magistracy. That Your Petitioner undertook the publication of the book at his own risk for a certain stipulated sum, but that owing to the work considerably exceeding its contemplated size, and embracing various styles of printing greatly adding to the expense, and owing also to the necessarily limited sale of a work of the kind, your Petitioner has suffered a considerable loss by an undertaking which has been generally admitted to be of great public service.

Your Petitioner therefore humbly hopes that Your Excellency may deem his undertaking not unworthy of the encouragement which has heretofore been accorded by the Government and Legislature to the publication of scientific or useful public works of much less importance—so far at least as may prevent Your Petitioner from incurring actual loss; and Your Petitioner is prepared to place at Your Excellency's disposal in return a sufficient number of copies to supply the various public functionaries in the Outports with a publication which cannot but be of essential service to them.

Address on making Burin a Free Port.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR MAJESTY,—

We, Your Majesty's devoted and loyal subjects, the Commons of Newfoundland in General Assembly convened, beg leave to approach Your Majesty with feelings of profound respect for Your Majesty's Royal Person and Government, praying that Your Majesty will be graciously pleased to declare Burin, in this Island, a Free, and Free Warehousing Port.

As the grounds upon which we humbly claim the exercise of the Prerogative in our favor, we beg to inform Your Majesty that the town of Burin contains about seventeen hundred inhabitants, and with its immediate neighbourhood, manufactures annually about £50,000 worth of produce; that its harbour is remarkably safe and commodious, and being only fifteen miles distant from Cape Chapeau Rouge, is at all seasons easily accessible from every quarter; that it is the central and principal port of a district comprising the extensive Bays of Placentia and St. Mary's, and Fortune, and containing one-sixth of the whole population of this Island, and in which, besides a large quantity of Salmon and Herrings, over two hundred and twenty thousand quintals of codfish, and eight hundred tons of oil, of the probable value in the whole of about £150,000, are annually taken and manufactured.

That very many of the inhabitants of Burin and the adjoining Bays, are now compelled to resort twice in every year, to the nearest free port (St. John's) for the supplies necessary for their fishery; and from the length of the voyage (nearly two hundred miles) to which they are thus subjected,

they necessarily lose much valuable time, and are frequently exposed to great peril of life and property.

That in consequence of the encroachments of the French upon the English fishing grounds, the Cod Fishery, the principal support of the inhabitants of the South coast of Newfoundland, has of late years become much less productive than formerly; that great distress and privation have been, and now are, thereby occasioned, and that therefore among other aids to their future support they require all those advantages which they trust will arise to them from the opening of Burin to Foreign Trade.

Address on making Carbonear a Free Port.

Mr. HANRAHAN, pursuant to notice, presented the draft of an Address to Her Most gracious Majesty, which he read in his place, and afterwards delivered in at the Clerk's table, where it was again read, as follows :—

TO THE QUEEN'S MOST EXCELLENT MAJESTY.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR MAJESTY,—

We, Your Majesty's devoted and loyal subjects, the Commons of Newfoundland, in General Assembly convened, beg leave to approach Your Majesty with feelings of profound respect for Your Majesty's person and Government, praying that Your Majesty will be graciously pleased to declare Carbonear in this Island, a Free, and Free Warehousing Port.

We beg respectfully to inform Your Majesty that Carbonear contains a population over Four Thousand Six Hundred Inhabitants, exceeding that of Harbor Grace, and is one of the principal towns in Conception Bay District—the most numerously populated in this Island. That it has a commodious harbour capable of affording security to extensive shipping, and from its geographical situation, commands an open entrance from the Bay.

That the town of Carbonear is one of the most ancient settlements in this Island, and for many years past has had extensive mercantile establishments, and imports and exports annually to a large amount.

That from being debarred the immunities of a Free Port, its foreign trade is injuriously restricted ; that its traders, when compelled to import

direct from Foreign Ports, frequently cannot obtain suitable British Vessels, and pay a much higher rate of freight than if permitted to import in Foreign ships; and that in the transshipment of necessary supplies from either of the free ports, St. John's or Harbor Grace, great inconvenience is felt, and expense incurred.

That from the present liberal policy of Your Majesty's Government towards Your Majesty's transatlantic possessions, we entertain the hope that Your Majesty will favourably consider our prayer; and by thus removing all restriction from its commercial intercourse, Carbonear will, in the certain extension of its trade, become greatly benefitted.

We therefore humbly pray that Your Majesty will be graciously pleased to exercise Your Majesty's Royal Prerogative in conferring upon Carbonear the privileges of a Free, and Free Warehousing Port.

TO THE QUEEN'S MOST EXCELLENT MAJESTY.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR MAJESTY,—

The Legislature of this Colony, in accordance with the powers and privileges beneficently conceded to them by the Imperial Parliament, have passed An Act for repealing the duties of Customs, imposed by the Imperial Act passed in the eighth and ninth years of Your Majesty's reign, entitled "An Act to regulate the trade of the British Possessions abroad," together with an Act for granting to Your Majesty certain Duties on Goods, Wares, and Merchandize, imported into this Colony and its Dependencies, and an Act for the general Management of the Customs in this Colony.

The combined operation of these Acts will be to effect a large reduction in the annual expenses of our Customs' Establishment, and to relieve the trade of the Colony from much trouble and inconvenience, to which they are now subjected by the existence of two Tariffs, the one Imperial, and the other Colonial; and the Assembly are therefore earnestly desirous that they should receive the sanction of Your Majesty's Government.

In establishing a new table of duties in the room of those repealed, the Legislature have as much as possible avoided the imposition of differential or discriminating duties; and the only instance in which they have departed from this principle has been with respect to the produce of the British West India Islands, upon which they have continued the difference made by the Imperial Act.

To this proceeding the Assembly were influenced principally by the consideration that in those Islands, the principal markets for Newfoundland produce, a differential duty, in our favour, has hitherto been maintained: but should Your Majesty's Government disapprove of even this slight departure from the general principles of Free Trade, the Assembly humbly pray that these acts may not be therefore disallowed, as, upon the signification of Your Majesty's pleasure to that effect, the Legislature will, at its next meeting, provide that this difference shall be no longer continued.

The Assembly humbly assure Your Majesty of their readiness most cheerfully to respond to any claims that may be preferred by Your Majes-

ty's Government, with respect to the Customs' Department of this Colony, and which may arise out of their recent Legislation upon this subject.

Mr. Shea presents Address to Her Most Gracious Majesty on the state of the Fisheries.

TO THE QUEEN'S MOST EXCELLENT MAJESTY.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR MAJESTY,—

We, Your Majesty's loyal subjects, the Council and Assembly of Newfoundland, in Session convened, beg leave most humbly to approach Your Majesty with feelings of the most profound respect for Your Majesty's person and government.

The present depressed condition of this Colony imperatively demands of us that we should bring the subject prominently under the notice of Your Majesty.—We cannot believe that a feeling of unconcern will pervade Your Majesty's counsels in regard to the interests of this Island, the oldest transatlantic possession of the British Crown; and though the benefits we might have hoped for have not heretofore attended on our appeals on this subject to the parent government, the daily aggravating evils under which we labour compel us to renewed effort to obtain a hearing for our just complaints.

We feel assured that a correct appreciation of these evils must lead to the application of those measures of redress which a loyal dependency may always confidently hope for at the hands of a paternal government. We are sensible of the lively interest Your Majesty entertains for all who live under the dominion of the British Crown, and that Your Majesty would not permit the continuance of a state of things which experience has shown to be pregnant with ruinous results.

The grounds on which we presume to rest our appeal for Your Majesty's consideration are, that the interests of this colony were sacrificed to views of Imperial policy. By the treaty of Utrecht and subsequent treaties, foreign powers were granted the right of fishing on the Banks and the principal part of the shores and harbors of Newfoundland. The French have successfully claimed the right of the exclusive enjoyment of the Fisheries from Cape Ray to Cape John, an extent of three hundred miles of coast, and embracing the most valuable portions of the fishing grounds of this Island. The American Treaty of 1818, gives the subjects of the latter power privileges nearly equal to those enjoyed by the French; and thus are the natural rights of Your Majesty's loyal subjects ruinously

compromised. The exigencies of Imperial interests might have demanded these concessions at the hands of Your Majesty's predecessors; but we humbly and respectfully submit whether it is consistent with any recognised principles of justice, that the Imperial advantages on which these Treaties were grounded should be purchased at the sacrifice of those rights, the preservation of which can alone secure the prosperity of this ancient and loyal colony.

But even if the evil rested here—if it were simply the right of foreign powers to concurrent privileges of fishing on our coasts, and prosecuting their avocations on similar terms, we should feel but comparatively small cause of complaint, for fair competition would leave us but little to apprehend for the success of our trade and fisheries. Accordingly, in the abstract, the concessions embraced in the treaties referred to would have been lightly regarded by Your Majesty's loyal subjects; but they have been made the foundation of the system under which those foreign powers now prosecute their fisheries, sustained by enormous bounties which have urged them into a condition of activity and strength, furnishing us every day with fresh proofs of the hopelessness of unaided competition, of which the decreasing productiveness of our fisheries and the awful impoverishment of the people are a truthful and lamentable development.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR MAJESTY,—

We look to the source of all this, and we find it has been for matters of imperial policy that our interests have been thus totally disregarded.

The various results of these bounties have frequently been brought by the Legislature and the people of this Colony under the notice of the Imperial Government. The foreign fisheries so sustained are annually becoming augmented, while ours are marked by corresponding diminution and decay. The effect of these bounties has been to give to the French and Americans the entire deep sea fishing, formerly the boasted nursery for British Seamen, but now completely transferred to our powerful and ambitious rivals for maritime supremacy. The bounty on the French-caught fish is fully equal to the price usually obtained for British cure, and met as we are in almost all our Markets by the protected fish of our competitors, we are frequently driven to consent to sales which leave much less than the actual cost of production.

A most fruitful source of the prosperity of the French fisheries is to be found in the supplies of bait they receive from our shores for the Bankers which fit out at St. Pierre and Miquelon, in direct contravention of the Imperial Act 26, G. 3., cap. 26. This traffic is carried on to the serious

injury of the British on that part of the coast and to the detriment generally of our fisheries. This question is ably treated of by Captain Loch of Your Majesty's ship *Alarm*, who was employed in the protection of our fisheries in the past year, and whose valuable report forms an appendix to this Address.

These evils have been progressing for many years until they have reached a crisis which places our existence as a colony in utter peril. The great fire in 1846 which swept away three quarters of a million of the capital of the country assisted materially in hastening this conjuncture, and precipitated the result which the operation of the treaties in question was producing by slower but not less certain means.

Since the period of that disastrous event, the sum of Thirty-five Thousand Pounds have been disbursed from the public Treasury of the colony to preserve the fishing population from actual starvation.

Nor do we see a prospect of relief from a continued pressure while the evils of foreign competition in our fisheries remain uncorrected. So strong is the feeling widely spreading on this subject that numbers of our most hardy fishermen are quitting the colony to seek from our rivals that remunerative employment which they despair of being able to obtain at home, and it creates not unnaturally a feeling of deep discontent that in the prosecution of similar pursuits in which they are often together engaged, the subjects of other powers find an adequate recompense for their toil, while British fishermen in Newfoundland are unable to obtain the common necessities of life, and have latterly been dependent in a great degree on the bounty of the local government for support.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR MAJESTY,—

The result of such a condition of things must be inevitably ruinous.—The continued emigration of our fishermen can scarcely be prevented, and a valuable portion of our population will be attracted to swell the tide of competition which assails us. They will naturally flee from a colony whose resources are withered by neglect, to obtain that reward for their labour which is offered to them by the rivals of British naval supremacy.

Neglect has long been our portion. While other Colonies have been from time to time recipients of Imperial Bounty, no such aid has ever been extended to Newfoundland, which, considered by reference to its maritime and commercial importance, is the most valuable of the transatlantic British possessions.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR MAJESTY,

The people of this colony are not chargeable with the causes of its present depression. The trade was fairly and legitimately carried on, exhibiting none of those wild speculations which brought ruin on other colonies, but sustaining itself without bounty or protection, and had our natural rights been preserved the necessity for this appeal would not have arisen. But for purposes of Imperial Policy the best portions of our Fisheries were handed over to Foreign rivals, whose operations have brought Your Majesty's loyal subjects to their present alarming state.

It will not be matter of surprise when we acquaint Your Majesty that from the pressure created by all these adverse circumstances, and the diminution of our revenue, the colony has within the last six years contracted a debt of One Hundred Thousand Pounds.

The cession of so large a portion of our Fisheries by Your Majesty's Royal Predecessors is the only intelligible cause of the evils which necessitated this debt.

We therefore humbly submit that the Imperial Government should relieve us from the liabilities which are so clearly the result of the sacrifices forced on the colony by the measures adopted for Imperial purposes alone.

The French Fisheries are upheld by the supplies of Bait they receive from our shores. By the Imperial Act 26, Geo, 3, this traffic is declared to be illegal ; and yet it is vigorously carried on because of the absence of a sufficient preventive force to suppress it. On the coast of Labrador Your Majesty's subjects are exposed to continued depredations on the part of the French and Americans, and though annually visited by one of your Majesty's ships, this serves but little more than to ascertain the fact that such incursions are made, and that they can only be prevented by the continued presence of a Man-of-War during the summer season.

Two or three War-steamers employed during the Fishing season would be required to protect that portion of our rights which the treaties have left us. Several French vessels of War are constantly occupied in the protection of their Fishery, while the occasional presence of one vessel is all we have hitherto had to show that British protection extends to this ancient colony.

In the markets of Spain, Portugal and Brazil, our staple export is subject to enormous rates of duty, and in the latter country a still further increase appears to be contemplated. If firmly urged by your Majesty's Go-

vernment we should have confident hope that on the occasion of new treaties with these powers, arrangements may be effected less detrimental to our interests.

We humbly submit the premises for your Majesty's consideration. And we pray that such assistance may be extended to us as will relieve the Colony from its pecuniary embarrassment, and that such other measures may be adopted as will avert the ruin which further neglect of this loyal dependency must inevitably, and at no distant period, occasion.

Resolved,—That the said Address be adopted and engrossed.

Mr. HANRAHAN from the Committee to present the Address of this House requesting that His Excellency would be pleased to forward the Address to Her Most Gracious Majesty on making Carbonear a Free Port, reported that His Excellency had been pleased to say he would comply with the request of the House.

Mr. HANRAHAN presented a Petition from Edmund Haydon, John Griffin, and others, inhabitants of Carbonear and its vicinity, and the same was received and read, setting forth, that the failure of the Potato crop for so many successive years had not only reduced them to poverty but discouraged them from continuing to cultivate it, and praying that a grant might be made to enable them to procure Seed Oats, Barley, and Wheat, without which their fields would be waste.

Petition from Carbonear for seed grain.

Ordered,—That the said Petition do lie upon the table.

S P E E C H :

Mr. President and Gentlemen of the Legislative Council :

Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly :

In bringing to a close this long and laborious Session, which has been marked throughout by an evident desire on the part of all zealously to discharge their Legislative duties, I cannot omit to express to you my congratulations on that unanimity of action in your deliberations on those measures which have during its progress engaged your attention.

Among the measures you have originated and perfected, I have to allude to the Acts to provide for the collection of the Revenue ; and the provision you have made for the Department of the Customs, to come into operation on the receipt of Her Majesty's gracious assent to the Act for the repeal of the Imperial Duties, will enable the Executive to provide for the efficiency of that branch of the public service.

As a method of improving the sanatory condition of St. John's, the Act passed for prohibiting interments within the limits of the town will conduce much to the attainment of this most desirable object.

Speech of His Excellency

Sessions.

I must also especially notice the improved system by which you have enabled the Government to secure the due expenditure of the Road Money, the powers you have thereby conferred on me are gratifying proofs of the confidence you repose in my Government, and I shall take care that the system of expenditure on this branch of the public service pursued by the Executive in the two last winters, be steadily kept in view.

Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly :

I thank you for the supplies which you have so liberally granted for the public service, and which it will be my utmost endeavour to apply in such a manner as to secure the interests of the colony in the objects for which they have been provided.

Mr. President and Gentlemen of the Legislative Council :

Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly :

In the interval of the recess I look with confidence to your best exertions and endeavours to arouse among all classes a spirit of greater self-dependence, as well as to urge upon them the absolute necessity of their reliance being placed on their own industry, and not on the eleemosynary aid of the public purse ; for unless the principles of self-exertion, frugality, and self-denial be practised to a far greater extent in Newfoundland than has heretofore been the case, the finances of the colony, straitened as they now are from the embarrassed circumstances of the last two years, must in a very short time succumb under the weight of sustaining, unassisted, so undue a proportion of the population of the Island.

And both earnestly and humbly hoping that before the Legislature shall again assemble, the grievous calamities, with which Newfoundland has been visited, may through the Divine Blessing upon the fisheries and crops of the approaching season have passed away, and comparative abundance have been again shed abroad throughout the land ; as also that the concord and harmony which have so happily subsisted between the three branches of the Legislature at the commencement of my administration of this Government may continue so long as I have the honor of holding my present position in this colony, I beg you all to be assured, in returning to your homes and private avocations, that you carry with you my best wishes for your welfare and happiness, as also my warmest interest in the future advancement and prosperity of your constituents.

BISHOP FLEMING'S LETTER RESPECTING PRESENTATION CONVENT
SCHOOL, &c.*St. John's, 12th December, 1848.*

MY DEAR SIR,—In sending the accompanying Report of the Catholic Board of Education for the district of St. John's, for the information of His Excellency the Governor, permit me to add a brief Report of the present state of the Presentation Convent School, and that of the Orphan Asylum, which Schools are not under the control of that Board, although supported by Legislative grants.

With reference to the former School, which was founded by me, and for a considerable period supported from those resources usually devoted to the personal maintenance of the Bishop, from which resources were also constructed the several School houses hitherto used by the Institution, as well as the dwelling-house of the Community destroyed by the Fire of the 9th June, 1846, which latter house, with the Schools adjacent, cost me over £4,000, but since which period the Ladies of the Institution are compelled to be indebted to the Convent of Mercy for an Asylum, where the scanty accommodation, originally intended for four Nuns, is now obliged to serve for no fewer than fifteen, an arrangement greatly calculated to militate against the health of the entire; and already has one lady fallen a victim, yet my means crippled by my vast losses by that Fire, render me utterly unable to afford a remedy.

This School is conducted by a Community of Nuns of the Order of the Presentation, and is in operation fifteen years, during which period they have sent abroad to all parts of the Is-

land, and even to the neighbouring Colonies, many thousands of young women well educated, and with their minds stored with treasures of virtue and religion.

The number of children registered on their books for admission, considerably exceeds a thousand, of whom they are only capable of accommodating four hundred in the temporary School House which I had erected for them after the fire, the others joining according as vacancies occur ; but in Summer so anxious am I to meet as far as possible the vast want in this respect that an extensive tent is erected on the ground adjoining to afford further accommodation.

The course of education here consists of Orthography, Reading, Writing, English Grammar, History, both sacred and profane, Geography, Arithmetic, the elements of Natural History, as taught by the first class Book of the Irish National Schools ; Knitting, Netting, plain and fancy needle Work; Spinning, too, had been extensively taught, but as the wheels, cards, &c., were also destroyed by the fire, the Ladies have not now the means even if they had room to teach it.

The Orphan Asylum School was established by the Benevolent Irish Society some three or four and twenty years ago. During the past year it was placed under the management of a community of Monks brought from Ireland, and at my expense. This community at present consists of five members, four of whom (the fifth is a lay brother) are highly competent to fulfil the charge imposed on them, and as they are men whose lives are devoted to the education of the poor in a moral and religious, as well as literary sense, it is not unreasonable to expect that their zeal will speedily be rewarded by the rapid improvement of the children placed under them. Indeed already may evidences of that amelioration be discovered in the great improvement that is evinced abroad by the children under their care.

The number of children at this School is 600, but at present, being the Winter season, the average attendance does not exceed 450. This number however would be at least double what it is now, were the School-room sufficient to accommodate them. They at present occupy every apartment in the spacious Building usually occupied by the Benevolent Irish Society, that body generously and charitably devoting them to the wants of the poor children, greatly to their own inconvenienc. If means could be taken to erect a suitable School-house for this invaluable Institution, I have no doubt whatever that over 800 children would be immediately enrolled as pupils, and an amount of good would result that must have a most beneficial effect upon the public interests.

The course of Education (communicated under the system used by the Brothers of the Christian Schools) is Spelling, Reading, Writing, Arithmetic and Geography for the first room or Primary School, consisting of 320 children. For the second or third Room, or Principal School the same with Grammar, Geometry, Algebra, Mensuration, Navigation, Trigonometry, Surveying, &c. These Rooms consist of 280 boys

I also append a scale showing the arrangement of classes, together with the number of boys or rather young men who left School within the last year having finished.

REPORT OF THE ROMAN CATHOLIC BOARD OF EDUCATION FOR ST. JOHN'S, DECEMBER 12, 1848.

To His Excellency Sir JOHN GASPARD LEMARCHANT, Knight and Knight Commander of the Orders of St. Ferdinand and Charles the Third of Spain, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Island of Newfoundland and its dependencies, &c., &c.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY,

The Commissioners of the Roman Catholic Board of Education have much pleasure in informing Your Excellency in their Report that the Schools under their superintendence have continued to prosper, through the fostering care of the Legislature, the attendance of the children, particularly in the Winter months, being much more constant and satisfactory, though the numbers have not increased as they might have reasonably expected, but this circumstance may be attributed to the disasters we have lately experienced as the Commissioners have reason to believe.

The Commissioners have opened a new School on the Bay Bulls road near the Goolds, there being a large population lately established in that neighbourhood; they have also at Black Head a School House in process of erection which a few weeks' labour will render fit for the reception of scholars.

Though the destruction of the stock of Books in the hands of the Commissioners at the time of the general fire has obstructed the establishment of a uniformity of classes and class books throughout all the schools, that object has not been lost sight of.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY,

The Commissioners of the Catholic Board of Education for the Harbor Grace district beg leave to report that two hundred and seventeen children, male and female, have received the benefit of an Education in the Schools that they have established in their district, for the year ending 22d November, 1848, under the tuition of teachers whose salaries amount to one hundred and ten pounds currency, as per return annexed.

And Your Excellency's Commissioners beg further to state that unless Your Excellency will be most graciously pleased to recommend to the Honourable the Legislative Assembly the necessity of passing a further grant to such amount as it may deem meet for the purpose of performing the necessary repairs now required to the School-houses under their control, those buildings will in a very short time become completely dilapidated.

REPORT OF THE PROCEEDINGS OF THE PROTESTANT BOARD OF EDUCATION FOR THE DISTRICT OF HARBOR GRACE, FOR THE YEAR 1846.

In the Report furnished by this Board for the year 1845, it was stated that in the four Schools under its direction, at Harbor Grace, Bryant's Cove, Mosquito, and Bay Roberts, 207 pupils were receiving instruction, and that out of this number the average daily attendance was 104.

The Board now beg leave to report that this daily average, with very little variation, has been continued; and that in addition to the four Schools already named, another has been opened by the Board on the South side of Harbor Grace. This School was opened on the 1st day of last April—the average attendance is about 40. It is taught by a person equal to the undertaking, and it promises to be of great service. The School-house is the property of the Newfoundland School Society, and the Board are under much agreeable obligation to the Agent of that Society in this country, for his kindness in allowing to the Board the use of that building at a rent merely nominal.

The Board have much satisfaction in stating that they have at length succeeded in erecting a suitable School-house at Mosquito and at Bay Roberts, but not having means at their disposal fully to meet such an expense in any other way, they have been reluctantly obliged in accomplishing this desirable object, to suspend the School for a short time at both these stations, and have applied the amount so saved towards the cost of these buildings. They are each 30 feet in length, 16 in breadth, and 8 in height from the floor to the wall-plate. The amount of contract for each is £70 currency, or £60 13s. 6d. sterling. A trifling outlay will yet be necessary in desks, forms, stoves, funnels, and window-shutters, &c., &c.

The Board have further to report that not being able any longer to obtain a suitable School house, in which to conduct the girls' School at Harbor Grace, they have found it necessary to suspend that School. Whether they will be enabled at a future period to re-open it, or another in lieu of it, they cannot, at present, positively ascertain; but should it appear practicable to do so, it will be requisite first to erect a suitable School-house.

The amount at the disposal of the Board, from the 21st last February to the date of this Report has been £373 7s. 5d., and the expenditure £326 7s. 8d., leaving a balance of £46 19s. 9d., as will appear by reference to a statement of accounts herewith transmitted.

REPORT OF THE PROCEEDINGS OF THE PROTESTANT BOARD OF EDUCATION FOR THE DISTRICT OF HARBOR GRACE FOR THE YEARS, 1847-'48.

In the last Report of this Board, dated 21st December, 1846, it was stated, that in the five schools under its direction, viz.: One on the South-side of Harbor Grace, one on the North-side, one at Bryant's Cove, one at Musquito, and another at Bay Roberts, about 247

pupils were then receiving instruction, and that out of this number, the daily average of attendance was about one hundred and forty.

From the Reports, furnished by the respective Teachers, as well as from the occasional inspection of the members of this Board, the numbers now receiving instruction may be stated at about two hundred and twenty, and the daily average attendance about one hundred and forty-five. In these schools, as in most of the others of similar description in the colony, there is much fluctuation in point of attendance, occasioned partly by the weather, and partly by the abstracting pursuits of the fisheries.

The School-houses at Musquito and Bay Roberts have been built from the funds placed at the disposal of the Board; that at Bryants Cove is understood to belong to the "Society for the Propagation of the Gospel;" but the Board are accommodated with it upon the easy terms of keeping it in decent repair; that on the South-side of Harbor Grace is the property of the "Newfoundland School Society," and the Board are permitted to use it on similar conditions, paying also the nominal rent of one shilling per annum; that on the North-side has been held for the last year at the rent of five pounds currency. Whether the Board can again be accommodated with it on similar terms, or whether they will find it necessary to erect a building for this purpose, is, at present, uncertain; but the necessity for continuing the School in this locality, viz.: in the upper part of the North-side of Harbor Grace, is beyond all question.

The salary paid by the Board is £40 per annum to each of the five teachers—that is, in all, £200 a-year; and the sum placed yearly at the disposal of the Board is £235 sterling: thus leaving a yearly balance of £35 sterling for rent, stoves, stove-piping, books, and repairs, &c., &c.

In adverting to the utility of the Schools under the direction of the Board, they cannot of course, be compared with those Institutions the object of which is to communicate a strictly grammatical and scientific education. This is not their object, except to a very limited extent. All that the Board can reasonably expect for the small remuneration of £40 per annum, is to obtain teachers tolerably competent and attentive to their charge. These objects, the Board flatter themselves, have been accomplished. The main impediment with which the teachers have to contend appears to arise out of that unrestrained manner in which many of the children sent to their schools are allowed to conduct themselves at home; thus rendering them impatient under a wholesome and necessary restraint.

Upon the whole, the Board have much satisfaction in stating that these Schools are of considerable service; and that the outlay expended upon them appear to be fully justified by the advantages conferred upon the rising generation.

A statement of accounts, in duplicate, will accompany this report, when a balance will appear in favour of the Board of £111 12 6 sterling at this date.

REPORT OF CARBONEAR GRAMMAR SCHOOL.

Grammar School, Carbonear, }
February 10, 1848. }

SIR,—I beg leave to submit, for the information of the Government, the following brief report of the state of the Seminary under my care during the past year.

The number of pupils in daily attendance varied from thirty to forty-one. At present there are in daily attendance, thirty-eight, whose ages vary from eleven years to twenty.—Of these pupils five, learn French; eight, Geometry; two, Algebra; nine, Globes; five, Navigation; five, Mensuration; nine, History; nineteen, Geography; thirty-one, English Grammar; two, Book-keeping; all, Arithmetic, Writing, &c., &c. One private pupil (who previously attended the School but who is now otherwise engaged during the day) learns Latin in the evenings, and is now reading the third book of Virgil's *Æneid*, Sallust and Greek Grammar.

The Class-books used by the French pupils are *Telemaque* and Perrin's fables: those reading Geometry use Chamber's treatise. Bonnycastle's Algebra is used by those engaged in that department; the other books used in the Seminary are Keath's Treatise on the Globes; Norie's Navigation; Keith's edition of Hawney's Mensuration; Pinnock's histories; Guy's Geographies; Murray's English Grammar; Jackson's Book-keeping; Guy's Arithmetic.

My system of instruction is chiefly by lecture, which I thus conduct. I bring a class to the black-board, and after due explanation I elucidate by examples what I previously spoke on. This course I pursue in the following branches, viz.—French Grammar, Geometry, Mensuration, Book-keeping, Navigation and Arithmetic; in all of which, except French Grammar and Book-keeping I cause the pupils to form diagrams for demonstration, and perform the Arithmetical questions proposed to them before they leave class. In the excep-

tions, I cause them to come prepared on one day, to answer me any questions I may choose to put relative to the subject for lecture of the preceeding day. Though Murray's English Grammar is our class-book, yet I do not confine them to the views entertained by that author; but during the time that they parse and anylyse the sentences proposed as exercises, I give them the benefit of any remarks to be found in Crombie's, Maunder's, Lennie's, and McCullock's Grammar's, and in Harris's Hermes.

I feel delighted that I can with confidence assert that the progress during the past year was well calculated to afford gratification to the parents and guardians of the pupils; and I am happy in having it in my power to state that the average attendance was very regular during the greater part of last year. It appears to me that the parents of the pupils, as well as the pupils themselves have, at length, begun to appreciate the advantages that may be derived from a sound education. I find that the progress in Geography is really astonishing, a circumstance mainly attributable to their having had, during last year the advantage of excellent Maps.

I beg leave to add, that, during the greater part of last year. I lectured a select class of pupils, amounting in number to ten or twelve, in Natural Philosophy, during one hour on every Wednesday. These lectures have not been resumed by me, as yet this year.

The hours of attendance are as follows:—Viz. In summer from half-past nine to one, and from two to four each day. In winter from ten to three without intermission.

**REPORT OF PROTESTANT BOARD OF EDUCATION FOR CARBONEAR, FOR
1848.**

SIR,—This Board have the honor to forward for His Excellency's information, the Report of the Schools under their superintendance, for the year ending 5th July, 1848.

Owing to the non-attendance of the Rev. Mr. Harvey, the removal of the Rev. Mr. England from the Black Head mission, and the absence of one of the lay members of the Board on a visit to England the past summer, the annual meeting could not be held at the usual time; consequently the lateness of this Report.

The Board have much pleasure in reporting the general efficiency of the Schools, and the steady improvement of the pupils. They have also the satisfaction of stating that a great improvement is observable in the moral habitude of the children in the small Out Coves in which the Board have established Schools.

The Return of the number of pupils is given, of the maximum attendance which occurs from September until June, when a great many of the children are taken away by their parents on their various occupations at the cod-fishery.

The fifty pounds currency, awarded this Board for the cession of the Crocker's Cove School House to the Roman Catholic Board have been expended in the erection of a School House at the important settlement of Freshwater, which School House yet requires a small sum to make it as comfortable as it is desirable a School Room should be.

EDUCATION REPORTS.

By the Return now forwarded it will be seen that the Board have but three School Houses, the remainder of the Schools being held in the houses of the several Teachers (with the exception of the School at Otterbury, which is held in the Wesleyan Chapel there) which makes it quite uncomfortable for the Masters and Scholars. The Board therefore express an ardent hope that the Legislature, at its next sitting, will grant a liberal aid, so that the inhabitants of each settlement shall be enabled to erect a suitable House.

To His Excellency Sir JOHN GASPARD LEMARCHANT, Knight, and Knight Commander of the Orders of St. Ferdinand and Charles the Third of Spain, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Island of Newfoundland and its Dependencies, &c., &c.

The Board of Education for the District of Brigus in submitting to His Excellency the Governor their report for the year ending July, 1848, beg leave to state that the Education Act places at their disposal the sum of £105 sterling, with which sum they have established three schools, and which schools are now in operation in the following places—Viz:

At Topsail on the South-shore of Conception Bay.

At Bull Cove, and at Burnt-head.

The number of Children attending said schools is as follows:—Viz.

In the school at Topsail are forty-three children. In the school at Bull Cove are thirty-eight children. In the school at Burnt-head are thirty-four children.

The annual sum paid to the Teachers of these Schools collectively, is £108 currency, or £36 currency to each Teacher, leaving a balance of £13 currency at the disposal of the Board, which sum is appropriated to the purchase of school requisites, and for defraying other incidental expences.

SIR,—I beg leave to transmit to you, for the information of His Excellency the Governor, the following report of proceedings of the Board of Education for Trinity Bay North, and of the Schools under its care.

The School at Catalina continues to be conducted by the same master as heretofore, and is considered by the Board to be in a satisfactory state, and to promise to be of great utility in that settlement.

The unsatisfactory state in which the school of Trinity, North-side, was considered to be, induced the Board to visit it, and ascertain both from the inhabitants and from the Inspector of the school itself, the causes of its inefficient working. It is their opinion that the fault lies partly with the inhabitants in their not duly appreciating the advantages of instruction, and also in their poverty, the parents, in most instances, being unable or unwilling to pay the required fees, and not having sufficient clothing for their children to appear decently in the School-room.

The Schools of Cuckold's Cove and Trouty have only the divided attention of one master, who attends three days alternately to each, they, notwithstanding this disadvantage, are making satisfactory progress.

Should it be in the power of the Government at any future time to increase the aid given for the advancement of education, the Board would beg to represent to the consideration of the Government the claims of this district of Trinity, assured that no expenditure of public money more conduces to the well-being of the country, than that which is for the great object of education.

The Schools of Trouty and Cuckhold's Cove still kept but semi-weekly, continue under the able and assiduous conduct of Mr. Arthur Watts to afford satisfaction both to the parents of the children and the Board.

The Trinity North-side School though somewhat advanced from the previous year, does not progress as it may reasonably be expected. The master has ability for commanding greater success, but the people generally do not appreciate the value of Education.

The Catalina School presents also a less favourable appearance than could be desired. A second master had offered to teach during the time of the vacation allowed, and this in part is the cause of the diminishing of the Board School. Mr. Cram's decease, which occurred on the 21st ult., has led to the appointment of Mr. William Bremner, of Hant's Harbour, to that mastership.

It may be desirable to reiterate the sentiments conveyed in the latter part of former Reports as to the inadequate means for Education in this part of the Electoral District. But a cursory view of the whole may suffice to show that with its many Coves and Harbors the number of Schools and Schoolmasters had need be-doubled to attain the end for which the Government has made the grant, namely to afford cheap and gratuitous education to the working classes.

**REPORT OF THE PROTESTANT BOARD OF EDUCATION FOR THE DISTRICT
OF FERRYLAND, 1847 and 1848.**

FERRYLAND, July 15, 1847.

SIR,—The Board of Education for the District of Ferryland, in compliance with the instructions contained in the “Act for the encouragement of Education in this Colony,” beg leave most respectfully to submit to His Excellency the Governor the following Report of their proceedings under said Act for the past year.

There are two Schools at present under the management of the Board, viz. : one at Aquaforte, and one at Renewse. The Board have determined upon re-establishing a School at Ferryland as soon as a suitable teacher can be obtained.

The number of scholars attending the School at Renewse is five, which is a little above the number in attendance last year. This School seems to be in a better condition than formerly, and we have no doubt the number of scholars will shortly increase. During the past year there has been a new teacher appointed for this School, the former teacher having been removed by death.

The number of scholars attending the School at Aquaforte is twelve; this number is somewhat larger than it has hitherto been, and it is the opinion of the Board there will yet be a greater number in attendance.

The School at Ferryland, which will be opened as soon as practicable, has not been in operation for the last two years, this has been partly owing to the difficulty of procuring a suitable person whom the Board could appoint as teacher. The sum granted by the Colony is Twenty-five Pounds per annum, which is divided as equally as possible between the three places, and to keep these Schools in operation the sum is very small. In consequence of the

School in Ferryland not being in operation for some time, there was a small surplus remaining on hand, which has enabled the Board to increase in a small degree the salary of the teacher at Aquaforte for the past year, and also to add the small sum of forty shillings for the ensuing year to the salary of the teacher at Renewse.

The Board will report the School in Ferryland as soon as a competent person can be obtained as teacher, but owing to the inadequacy of the funds, the salary that they are enabled to give is so small that they cannot easily find a suitable person willing to undertake the duty for so small a remuneration.

REPORT OF THE PROTESTANT BOARD OF EDUCATION FOR THE DISTRICT
OF FERRYLAND, 1848.

Ferryland, July 25th, 1848.

SIR,—The Board of Education for the district of Ferryland, in compliance with the instructions contained in the Act for the encouragement of Education in this Colony, beg leave most respectfully to submit to His Excellency the Governor the following report of their proceedings for the past year:—

The number of Schools remain the same as at the date of the last report, viz.: One at Aquaforte, and One at Renewse. The number of Scholars attending the Schools at Aquaforte is eleven, which is nearly the same number as was in attendance last year.

The number attending the School at Renewse is five, but there is a prospect that the number will shortly increase.

Last year the Board had determined to open a School at Ferryland, but could not obtain a competent person as Teacher. The sum granted by the Colony is so small, when divided between the three places, that the sum the Board are enabled to give a Teacher at Ferryland, after paying the salaries of the other Teachers, is so small that they cannot easily obtain the services of a Teacher for so small a remuneration; but the Board still have a hope, as there is a small surplus remaining on hand each year, to be enabled to add something annually to the sum the Board has already voted for the Teacher, and thus secure the services of a competent person, and one who would be willing to undertake the charge, as the remuneration will be somewhat greater.

EDUCATION REPORTS.

ROMAN CATHOLIC BOARD OF EDUCATION, FERRYLAND, FOR 1848.

SIR,—As Chairman of the Roman Catholic Board of Education for the District of Ferryland, I beg leave, through you, to transmit to His Excellency the Governor, an account of the present state of the schools under our care.

The number of Schools—male and female—at present in operation is fifteen, and consequently the average amount of salary, yearly, for each teacher cannot be more than £12; but we have varied the salaries according to the labors and capacity of the respective teachers. Two of the schools being discontinued for some time—viz.:—one at Brigus with a Salary of £15 currency, and the other at the South-side of Renewse with £12 currency per annum—we were enabled to repair partly the School-houses in these localities, to advance the salaries of some of the teachers, (who had only £8 to £12 currency) and to establish a female school in Brigus with a salary of £10 to its teacher. But for the last six months the male School is in operation there again. And having now furnished you with a brief, but true account of our stewardship, and hoping that it will suffice and prove satisfactory to His Excellency.

REPORT OF PROTESTANT BOARD OF EDUCATION BURIN.

JULY, 1847.

Several of the Schools reported last year have not been in operation for some time past.—The master of the Fortune School died last winter, and since his death no suitable person could be obtained. The master of the Little Burin School left us for a more promising situation in Nova Scotia early last fall, and the salary being so small no competent master has since offered. The female School in Burin Bay was suspended during last winter, but was re-opened this spring. The female School in Bulls Cove was in operation up to last April, but since that period has been vacant. All these Schools while going forward were quite as good as circumstances could warrant us to expect, and their suspension at present is altogether to be ascribed to the smallness of our funds, the salaries we can give being so trifling as to be altogether unworthy the acceptance of respectable and efficient teachers. The Schools at Lamaline, Great Burin, and Spoon Cove have been regularly kept on; but the Board have found it necessary to make some additional allowances to the persons keeping them to enable them to live, this the Board could not have done but for the circumstances before referred to which have left some fund at their disposal.

The Board trusts the time is not far distant when the Government will place in their hand a sum of money that will enable them to discharge the duties of their office with better effect and greater satisfaction.

REPORT OF PROTESTANT BOARD OF EDUCATION FOR BURIN, 1848.

In forwarding the present Annual Report for the perusal of His Excellency the Governor, the Board regrets exceedingly being obliged to communicate the fact that some of the Schools under its direction have been discontinued from the want of Teachers. This arises from the insufficiency of means to encourage suitable persons to engage as Teachers. On this account the Schools in Fortune, Burin Bay, and Bulls Cove are closed; consequently, we can give no report of the last half-years attendance of Scholars in these localities. The half-years salaries, likewise remaining in our hands, leaves a small balance in favor of the Board. The locality of Burin being so intersected by water prevents the Board from forming one or two good Schools with competent Teachers, at liberal salaries. The great and general distress of parents, also, renders them unable to afford sufficient compensation towards the education of their children. The places at present provided with Teachers are Great Burin, Little Burin, and Lamaline. The number of children receiving instruction in these Schools, according to the last reports furnished by the Teachers, and the sums expended in their support, are as follow :—

REPORT OF ROMAN CATHOLIC BOARD OF EDUCATION BURIN.

The Catholic Commissioners for the District of Burin in compliance with the Act for the establishment of Schools have the honor to transmit to His Excellency the Governor the following report having reference to the Schools under their controul.

BURIN.

This School continues flourishing. It is attended by one hundred and four children, male and female, whose mental and moral culture give ample evidence of the benefits, religious and secular, that the rising generation of this town has derived and is deriving through its instrumentality.

ST. LAWRENCE.

This School is also in a flourishing state and gives the Commissioners great satisfaction, and has generally upwards of ninety children, male and female, in attendance.

BEAU BOIS AND LITTLE BAY.

This School continues to give the Commissioners great satisfaction, and there were in attendance the last year upwards of forty children, male and female, and now that the Road connecting the two settlements is completed, this School will, no doubt, be much better attended.

EDUCATION REPORTS.

SUNDRY PLACES.

The Commissioners are desirous to establish Schools in the following places—At Lamaline where there are fifty children ; (at Lawn there are forty five ; and Mortier, Fox Cove and its neighbourhood there are upwards of ninety) but are deprived of the power for the want of means.

In conclusion, the Commissioners beg leave to impress on His Excellency the great want of Schools in many important settlements within the District, as well the great increase of the population since the last Education Grant, and trust that His Excellency will recommend to the Assembly a more liberal allowance, and they feel assured that His Excellency's consideration for the wants and wishes of all those whom a gracious Sovereign has committed to his paternal sway, will urge His Excellency to impress on the Legislature the educational necessities of this District.

REPORT OF PROTESTANT BOARD OF EDUCATION, PLACENTIA.

The Protestant Board of Education for the District of Placentia in presenting their annual report for the years 1847 and 1848, wish to premise that from the year 1845 to 1847 their functions as a Board have been suspended, owing to the absence of their Chairman and Secretary, (the Rev. Wm. Jeynes and the Rev. Wm. Taylor) although by an arrangement of some of its members with the Government, one winter School—that at Spencer's Cove, Long Island, instructing about 16 children, has been kept up.

This, with the exception of one year's grant to the School at Harbor Beaufett, has been the only School supported by this Board.

In the fall of 1847 the Rev. Wm. Kepple White having succeeded the Rev. Wm. Jeynes, at the request of several members of the Board, under the bye-laws, appointed teachers for winter Schools at the following places—that is to say:—At Sound Island, Woody Island, Burgeo, and Spencer's Cove. The progress of these schools has been exceedingly satisfactory, and the Board hopes that some little has been done towards carrying into effect the praiseworthy wishes of the Legislature. Already the inhabitants of these places appreciating the benefits accruing to their harbors by such Schools, have proffered their aid in the erection of School-houses, and have besought this Board to continue the boon which they have thus had afforded them, though in so limited a degree. And this Board responding to their wishes, so ardently expressed, have commissioned their Chairman to engage teachers for the following places, if practicable—that is to say:—Oderin, Isle of Valen, Woody Island, Sound Island, Spencer's Cove, and Harbor Beaufett, after reserving a sum of £33 to institute a Protestant School at Great Placentia in connection with the Church there so soon as the pious intention of Her Majesty, the Queen Dowager, shall have been carried out sufficiently to render such a step of utility.

But this Board would wish to observe that these advantages must necessarily be of a temporary nature, arising as they do from an accidental accumulation of funds, unless the House of Assembly see fit to augment the trifling amount allowed to this Board.

The following are the numbers in the various Schools instituted by this Board during last winter:—

Making a total of 80 children, taking the highest return, who have been benefited by the grants of the Board; and when it is considered that these four schools were the whole means of education for the Protestant portion of the Bay, excepting the School at Harbor Beaufet under the Newfoundland and British North American School Society educating perhaps 30 more; and consequently that out of more than 1200 Protestant children 111 are all who have been educated, and more than could be instructed by the annual grant to this Board. It is hoped that the necessity of the appeal for further funds will be admitted by the Legislature.

REPORT OF ROMAN CATHOLIC BOARD OF EDUCATION, PLACENTIA.

*To His Excellency Sir JOHN GASPARD
LEMARCHANT, Knight, and Knight
Commander of the Orders of St.
Ferdinand and Charles the Third
of Spain, Governor and Command-
er-in-Chief in and over the Island of
Newfoundland and its Depend-
encies, &c., &c.*

We, the Roman Catholic Board of Education for Placentia, beg leave to forward for Your Excellency's information a brief statement of the manner in which the Schools subject to our Board are being conducted.

EDUCATION REPORTS.

There are in this district six Schools in operation, viz. :—one at Great Placentia, one at Distress, one at Little Placentia, one at the Rams' Island, one at Merasheen, and one at Oliver's Cove. Of these the Commercial School of Great Placentia is by far the most beneficial and important, affording as it does an easy and excellent opportunity to the youths of this place of acquiring a perfect knowledge of Geography, Navigation, and other useful branches.

The attendance of the children is generally good, and consequently there is a visible improvement even in their habits and morals. The Teacher at the Rams' Island is sometimes, during the winter season, obliged to remove and settle where the people may be more numerous; this winter he teaches at Fox Harbor.

After paying the Teachers, there remains annually of the grant a sum of five pounds, which has hitherto been expended in hire for School-room, as until recently, there were no regular School-houses. There is, however, at Great Placentia a beautiful and commodious building for the purpose, erected by the resident Clergyman and people, if we except ten pounds given by our Board. There is also at Little Placentia a good and spacious house got up by the Clergyman of that place. There is likewise a good School-house at Merasheen; at Distress there is a School-house in progress of building.

Here it may not be out of place to remark, that from the funds at our disposal we are unable to provide for some localities wherein we would be anxious to see a Teacher—there is Branch, a large and flourishing settlement, without a School; and though they are not in reality under our Board, still being allied to us in other ways, they naturally wish to share with us in Education. As this remark is offered rather to point out to Your Excellency the benefit of having the grant for this place enlarged than to make a formal application, we trust Your Excellency will pardon the allusion.

The fact of the Board not having sent on to Your Excellency more regular Returns, has been caused by the absence of a member of our Board, with whom remained the minutes of our last meeting, and which even now, owing to the season of the year, we have not been able to obtain, as the gentleman resides at St. John's.

SIR,—In pursuance with the directions in the Act for the encouragement of Education in this Colony, as Chairman of the Board of Education for the district of Fortune Bay, I forward the report of its proceedings at the last annual Meeting (the first of my connexion with the Board) held June 20th and 30th, 1848. The appointment of the following members of the Board—Rev. J. G. Mountain, Rev. J. Marshall, Messrs. T. E. Gaden, John Chapman, Wm. Gallop, Andrew Ellis, and Thomas Stevens, by His Excellency the Governor, having been made known previously at a Special Meeting held Nov. 18th, 1847, at which the Rev. J. G. Mountain was elected Chairman, Mr. J. Chapman, Treasurer, (Mr. Ellis resigning) and the Rev. J. Marshall, Secretary.

EDUCATION REPORTS.

1—A vote of thanks to Mr. Ellis for his late services as Treasurer—carried unanimously.

2—Proposed and carried that a Schoolmaster be appointed for Bennett Island during the summer months, and Jersey Harbor during the winter months—6 months at each place, and the sum of £40, (£20 to each place) appropriated for the erection of School-houses at those places.

3—Proposed and carried, that the Chairman be authorized to procure a teacher at a salary of £50 sterling, and that every effort be made to procure a more efficient class of teachers for the future at a salary of £50 sterling, but the salaries of the present teachers to remain as fixed at the last meeting, viz.: for the one at

GAULTOIS.

This School has been in operation since the fall of 1844, and has been conducted to the entire satisfaction of the Board. It is attended by thirty-one children, male and female. This is the only School the Commissioners are enabled to establish in the district.

They beg leave to impress on His Excellency the great want of Schools in the following places,—Great Gervys, Harbor Britain, Belloram, and St. Jacques. They earnestly hope to be supplied with the means of establishing Schools in these Harbors, and should the revenue of the Island afford it, they feel assured that His Excellency will impress on the Legislature the Educational wants of this district in particular.

ST. JOHN'S, JULY 18, 1849.

The Protestant Board of Education for the district of St. John's, on presenting their Report for the past year, have the honor to acquaint Your Excellency that the Schools under their control have been conducted satisfactorily and efficiently from the period of their former Report.

ST. JOHN'S SCHOOL, MR. AND MRS. NETTEN, Teachers.

The numbers at present upon the Register of this School are 49 Boys and 25 girls, making a total of 74 children. The average attendance has been 60.

The children are instructed in the usual branches of reading, writing, and arithmetic, and the upper classes of both boys and girls are also taught English Grammar, Geography, and History. Fees to the amount of £7 10 0 have been received by the Master.

BROAD COVE SCHOOL, THOMAS SANDS, Teacher.

The total number of children belonging to this School is 30; of whom 14 are boys and 16 girls. The attendance has improved during the year. The children are taught reading, writing, and arithmetic; and in this last branch of education the elder children have advanced as far as compound Multiplication.

LANCE COVE SCHOOL, DAVID JAMES, Teacher.

Under its present master this School is again flourishing. There are now 30 children on the register, and the average attendance during the last half-year has been 23. The master has received £1 11 0 from the parents of his scholars, in addition to his salary from the Board.

The Treasurer's account for the year ending the 30th June exhibits a balance of £6 15 8 due to that officer.

REPORT OF CAPTAIN LOCH ON THE FISHERIES OF NEWFOUNDLAND,
IN A LETTER TO EARL DUNDONALD.

(Copy.)

Her Majesty's Ship *Alarm*, }
St. John's, Newfoundland, 1848. }

MY LORD,—I sailed from Halifax in H. M. Sloop under my command on the 14th June, and anchored in the harbor of St. Pierre's the afternoon of the 17th. I found the outer roads and the inner harbor filled with shipping. There were one hundred and thirty-three French vessels averaging from one hundred to three hundred and fifty and four hundred tons; one hundred of these were Bankers, chiefly brigs, lately returned with cargoes. They had taken in their salt, and were waiting for bait (caplin), which they told me would strike into the Bays of St. Pierre's and Miquelon in a day or two. This prophecy (whether likely to prove true or not) was merely mentioned to deceive me, as it was well known the supply afforded round their own Islands is insufficient to meet the great demand. The next morning I observed boats discharging caplin into the Bankers, which I ascertained had been brought over from our own shores during the night in English Boats. The bait is sold in the harbor of St. Pierre's, either by barter for piece goods, provisions, or for money.

In every way this transaction is illegal. First, by vessels trading to Foreign Ports without a Custom-house clearance, in violation of Acts 3 and 4 chap. 59, Wm. 4. Secondly, by sailing without registers; and thirdly, by defrauding the colony of a branch of its revenue.

Their only excuse is, that if they were not in self-defence to sell their caplin, the French would take it as they formerly used to do, in defiance of all remonstrances and opposition.—For it is, they say, impossible to guard every particular point where the caplin may strike along so extensive a coast, so as to prevent the robbery, or in most cases, even to see the French fishermen, in consequence of the frequent and dense fogs.—This traffic has now become so systematised and general, and so productive to all the parties engaged in it along the coast, that it will be a matter of great difficulty to put it down.

I waited on the Commandant, Monsieur Delecluse, (Capitaine de Corvette) and after mentioning the object of my visit, I strongly urged him to aid me in the support of the existing treaty.

He said he would, and always had endeavoured to do so, in conjunction with my predecessors; but it was an uphill task, owing to the proximity of the Island to the main, and the frequent fogs which often enveloped all surrounding objects, sometimes for many days together. As a means of checking this great evil, I would propose establishing one or two Magistrates at central positions, say Fortune, Lamaline, and Burin, and supplying four swift row-boats attached to a Colonial Tender, during the fishing season, and swearing in their Coxswains as Special Constables.

Some of the local authorities entertain an idea that they cannot exercise jurisdiction over men embarked in boats; but in this I ventured to assure them they are mistaken, and that when boats are fishing in creeks, harbours, or along the coast within three miles distance of the land, the same law extends to the persons of the individuals in them, as to a settler on shore, and that they would be fully borne out in exercising any legitimate authority they may possess for an infringement of a local or imperial law by parties so situated.

The fishing season commenced the beginning of June, and will close the first week of October. They do not consider it will be a favourable one—however, fishermen are as hard to satisfy as farmers—their catch will probably average one million quintals.

The government bounty is eleven francs per quintal, a sum equal to the value of the article itself. Owing to the embarrassed state of the French finances at home, and the failure of all their commercial establishments in the West Indies, there is comparatively no sale for the bank fish this year. No accurate calculation can be formed of the value of the whole quantity of the fish caught by the French, as many vessels carry their cargoes to France green.—The fish are dried and salted there, and exported thence to the West Indies, and some to the Mediterranean.

I am assured that three hundred and sixty-vessels, from one hundred to three hundred tons burthen, are engaged in the bank fishery, employing from sixteen to seventeen thousand seamen, (exclusive of the coast fishermen). All these vessels return to France every winter.—Their crews spend the money they make there, buy the fitments they require there, sell their cargoes for the use of their countrymen at cheaper rates than the Newfoundlanders can to the Colonists, and are knit together in a body by the regularity and system of their duties, and man their country's navy if required.

The French annual Great Bank Fishery averages a catch of a million, two hundred thousand quintals, and nearly the entire quantity is sent to the West Indies. Guadaloupe and Martinique consume two-thirds, and the remainder is exported to other Islands.

The Islands of St. Pierre and Miquelon are admirably adapted for the purposes to which they are applied. No expense to government,—they offer the best possible centre for all commercial operations, a depot for their stores, secure harbors for their shipping, and at the same time, owing to their proximity to the shores of Newfoundland, their inhabitants are equally well supplied with bait and fish, as the British settlers themselves in their vicinity.

The French authorities, however, do not deny that the sole object of their Government in supporting these Fisheries at so great a cost, is to form seamen for their Navy. Monsieur Filleau, the intelligent Commissary at St. Pierre's, candidly told me this, and added that no private companies could of themselves support this commerce, unless the market price of the article rose to double its present amount.

Monsieur Delecluse, the Governor, had also the honesty to affirm that the supply of caplin by the English from their Bays and Coast, alone enable the Bankers to prosecute their fishings, and he believed that by this traffic with his islands our poor settlers were alone enabled to support their existence.

REMARKS :—

It is obvious that by withholding from the French the supply of bait from our own shores, their success upon the Grand Bank would sensibly diminish, and the advantages the fish merchants at present derive from their bounty granted by their Government over other competitors, could not increase the trade beyond the limits controlled by the comparatively very scanty supply of Caplin afforded by their own coasts and islands.

If, on the other hand, it is the large payment of bounty by the Government that alone upholds the fisheries, and which has advanced them to their flourishing condition, the present is surely the period for our merchants to exert themselves to regain their lost ascendancy, while the French are paralysed by the failure of the French West India markets, and general loss of credit consequent upon the emancipation of the blacks by the Revolution of February.

It is wonderful to observe the inhabitants of a nation certainly not addicted to maritime pursuits surpass a seafaring people in the prosecution of an avocation natural to them, and in which it is necessary to display more science and perseverance to be successful than in any other branch of a sailor's trade,

In consequence of this anomaly, I cannot but believe there must be some flagrant want, either of industry or skill, on the part of the people of Newfoundland, admitting even that the existence of the French Banker is entirely dependent upon the bounty money.

However this may be answered, the fact is very apparent that the French had established and systematised a large fleet of vessels, which now no unaided individual enterprise can successfully compete with.

The capital advanced by the French Government (at the commencement of the competition with the English Bank Fishermen) at once lowered the market price of fish to almost the cost attendant upon the sailing of the English vessel, which the French bounty alone was, and is still, equal to defray.

A French vessel of three hundred tons has a crew of at least forty men (worse fed and paid than Englishmen) and is found with from seven to nine heavy anchors, and upwards of eight hundred fathoms of hemp cables. She would also have from four to five large boats capable of standing heavy weather, and numerous nets and fishing tackle made in France at one-third the expense our Colonists can procure theirs.

The boats above mentioned are capable of laying out from five to six thousand fathoms of line, to which hooks and weights are attached at certain distances and secured by anchors. These are termed Bultows, and are generally shot on each bow and quarter. They are enabled, with the number of hands belonging to each vessel, to lift those lines and take the fish off frequently, both during the day and night; while the smaller English vessels, manned by a weaker crew (consequent upon the greater expense) and only possessing common anchors and cables, are under the necessity of using the ordinary trawl line. Not only are the fish attracted away from the latter by the miles of bait spread over the bottom by their rivals, but when heavy weather occurs they are obliged to weigh, while the French remain securely at anchor with two hundred fathoms of cable on end, and ready to resume their employment immediately the weather will permit them.

While we yield to the French the advantages of independent ports and unmolested fisheries, we are on the other hand hampered by circumstances unfelt by them. For example, their Fishermen arrive from the parent state, ours belong to a thinly-peopled and dependent Colony—they have their drying grounds close to the Fisheries, as we have on the shores of this very Colony, deriving every advantage from it, and untrammelled by any expenses or local taxes, to which our people have to contribute in addition to the aforesaid disadvantages.

The distance from France is of no moment; instead of adding to, it is the means of diminishing the expense attendant on the conveyance of Fish to Europe, for a great portion of the season's catch not sent to the West Indies is carried away by the large fleet of vessels upon their return home for the winter; while our fish merchants have to collect the produce of the season from numerous stations, distributing over a great range of coast, and then again tranship it into larger vessels to cross the Atlantic.

It may also be said that our people are working for existence—the French are sent forth by capitalists, and supported by large bounties paid from their Government. Hence (as I have endeavoured to show) the great reason of their success over our Colonies in their expensive mode of fishing on the banks.

It is not surprising then that they have been thrown back upon the coast of the Island, and have abandoned their vessels for small boats only adapted to fish close to the shore, and in the creeks and harbors.

Fortunately the cod—the staple wealth of these seas—seems inexhaustible, so that a large revenue is still made, but the nursery for seamen has ceased to exist,—while our rivals number 16,000 well-trained men belonging to the Bankers, exclusive of 12,000 others attached to their fishing stations on the coasts granted to them by Treaty.

BURGEO ISLANDS.—JUNE 24.

The fishing is carried on throughout the year. It was good during the past winter, but indifferent in the spring—on the whole they have had a fair catch, 6000 quintals since October. The fish are not so plentiful as they were five years ago.—There are about 700 inhabitants residing on these Islands—they are increasing in numbers—fourteen years since there were only two families.

The French do not interfere with their fishing, or appear on their coasts. The caplin had not been at all plentiful, but were beginning to strike into the harbors in great numbers, and would, they expected, remain on the coast for several weeks.

They trade principally with Spain and Portugal, sending their largest fish to Cadiz—and generally commanding the early markets of both those countries, in consequence of their ability to prosecute their employment throughout the year.

These enquiries were principally answered by Mr. Stephens, Agent to Messrs. Newman, Hunt & Co. There was, besides this establishment, a Jersey room belonging to Mr. Nicoll, who has another fishing station thirty leagues east, and one at La Poile. During my visit there were two vessels in the port. One of them was receiving cargo for the Levant, and the other collecting fish from the different stations along the coast.

Most of the fishermen belonging to the settlement were hired by one or other of the above-mentioned houses, and they received 4s. 6d. for every hundred fish delivered; but unfortunately, they are dependant upon their employers for the supply not only of their boats, nets, clothes, and other articles, but also for their food, so that by what I could ascertain I fear that a very pernicious system of usury is prosecuted. If this should continue the merchants may be enriched, but the settlers will certainly never improve in civilization or prosperity.

The inhabitants, with but few exceptions, are all Protestants.—There are two Churches, but at the time of my visit no clergyman.—The Rev. Mr. Blackmore having been removed to a better living, and Mr. Cunningham, his successor, had not arrived. The Magistrate was a Mr. Cox, at present in England. There is also a School-house, to which the fishermen contribute a small annual sum for the education of their children.

The appearance of the settlement itself is, without exception, (considering the reputed value of the fisheries) the most disreputable and wretched I have hitherto seen. True, the ground is a bog, with granite, boulders, and rocks rising from its centre, upon which the huts and cabins can alone be planted; but yet no attempt seems to be made to drain the filth and bog water away from their doors or even to make pathways by which to pass from house to house without having to wade through black mire. The only causeway in the settlement is one formed of deal boards from the Church to Mr. Stephens' residence, nevertheless, to my surprise, I must own that the people seem happy in their state of filth, and I heard no complaint of disturbance, or of any crime having been recently committed.

LAMALINE, JUNE 30.

The fish struck in early, and in great quantities, but there was not a catch in proportion to the abundance at the commencement of the season, in consequence of bad weather preventing the boats going out until the caplin struck in, when they were fully employed catching and taking them to St. Pierre's to sell to the French Bankers. There has been but little bait at St. Pierre's this year, so that caplin fetch a high price. As much as £15 a-day is made by each boat employed in this manner.

I was informed by Mr. Winter, the Custom-House Officer at Lamaline, that a duty of 6s. per quintal was imposed by the Colony on Bait exported, but in consequence of the Law Officers of the Crown having given their opinion that Bait caught and shipped (without being landed) could not be considered as exported, the boats adopt this method of taking away the caplin to evade the duty.

At the time of my first visit the French boats had not been troublesome, none indeed had been seen ; but on my second visit after their caplin had been sold, they began to complain of their encroachments. This was the latter end of August, about the time when the fish leave their coast and small islands for our shores. After the fish have been cured they are taken by coasters to St. John's and Burin. There are also two schooners that trade regularly from Harbor Briton, in the employ of Newman & Co., and Nicholl & Co.

The house and boat that are kept for the use of the officer and crew generally left at Lamaline during the fishing season, have not been put in a state of repair this summer. The boat has no oars and looks very old—and the house has several panes of glass broken, and was not in a fit state to be inhabited.

The settlement of Lamaline is not increasing. Much apathy exists among the inhabitants. No road is yet made, and only one small house has been built since last year. The population is not quite four hundred.

Mr. Butler, the late Magistrate, died in the fall of the year, and Mr. Pack from St. John's is his successor. Mr. Pack is building a large house about a quarter of a mile from the settlement, and expresses his intention of carrying on Agriculture to a large extent. The soil is good, and well adapted for potatoes—of which they have lately begun to export a considerable quantity. The potato disease, however, visited them last year—in consequence of which their seed is neither good nor abundant,

To have left an officer and boat's crew at Lamaline at the late season of my first visit, I ascertained would have been of no service, as the French Bankers had received their supply of caplin from the English themselves, and which Mr. Pack told me were chiefly the fish about which disputes arose.

It may be undoubtedly true that the French occasionally encroach upon the Banks in the vicinity of Lamaline, and thereby excite the jealousy of the fishermen of that station, and that in consequence a man-of-war's boat would be useful to foster the indolence of those individuals who, thus protected, might chose their own time to fish, and take it easy ; yet I have no hesitation in saying that they do not deserve this protection, for the comparatively few fish the French abstract cannot be one tithe so injurious to their own individual interests as their wholesale and illegal traffic in caplin is to the entire fishing community inhabiting the South and Eastern shores of the Colony—not only by supplying the French Bankers with the means of prosecuting their successful competition on the Grand Bank, but also thereby preventing the strike of the fish towards the shore by the spread of bait which intercepts their passage.

I nevertheless think that a small Cruiser possessing three fine Whale-boats, permanently stationed on the South coast for the season, making Lamaline as the port nearest the French possessions her head quarters, and with power not only to protect our fishermen but to act as a Coast Guard Vessel to prevent smuggling and check the illegal trade in caplin, would be most beneficial to the fishing interests of the Colony at large.

ST. JOHN'S.

I sailed from St. John's for the coast of Labrador, July 23, with clear weather and a moderate breeze from W.S.W., which lasted until we were abreast of Trinity Bay, when we met a

fog from the Southern coast which generally fills that Bay, with wind between South and W. S.W. passing over the narrow Isthmus which joins the district of Ferryland to the great body of the Island.

The wind shifted to N.N.E., and threw up, as it increased, a chopping sea; but as the fog was light I stood towards Cape Freels to see whether the valuable fishing grounds extending round its extremity were occupied by our own people.

This Cape is to be avoided in thick or heavy weather, on account of innumerable rocks and shoals that surround it, both North and South.

It nevertheless is a good fishing station, and affords shelter for boats and small vessels—seventeen were in sight.

At noon we passed Funk Islands within a mile, leaving it on the port hand. It is a flat-browed Island, I should say not more than sixty feet high, and cannot be seen at more than twelve miles distance.

Parties repair thither in spring and autumn to collect eggs and feathers. At one time a very considerable profit could be gained by this trade, but lately, owing to the war of extermination that has been waged against the flights of Puffins, Gannets, Divers, Gulls, Eider Duck, Cormorants, &c. &c. &c., it has greatly diminished. One vessel of twenty-five tons is said once to have cleared two hundred pounds currency in a single trip to Halifax.

July 26th, we passed between Groais and Belle Isle (South), shortly after daylight, counted ten icebergs, some drifted about with the winds and tide, others aground, and two at the entrance of Croc.

CROC.

This harbor is a long narrow indenture, slightly curving towards its head, where vessels may lay perfectly land-locked.

It is the head-quarter station for the French men-of-war employed for the protection of their fisheries.

I found at anchor the French brig of war "Maleagre" and two empty merchant vessels laying with their top-gallant-masts down, and hatches locked, their crews to a man were engaged fishing. Besides these, there was a small English schooner, the "Mariner," bound and belonging to St. John's with a cargo of salmon.

The French have two rooms in Croc on opposite sides of the Harbor. When they return home for the winter they leave them in charge of two fishermen named Hope and Kearney, only removing the canvas coverings of the stages.

They also leave some of their boats behind them, turning them over on the beach, and thatching them with spruce boughs in the same manner that our own migratory fishermen do theirs on the coasts of Labrador, to protect them from the weather.

Their establishments are conducted upon the same principle as our own, and although their arrangements evinced a better system of discipline, I do not think that the same energy is displayed by their fishermen in the prosecution of their employment—nor does it appear to me to be so thoroughly performed. I mean that, to my inexperienced eye, the fish neither seemed to be so well cleaned, split, boned or cured.

The two rooms in Croc employ between them thirty-seven quintal boats, and one hundred and thirty men; one hundred afloat and thirty shoremen (as they are termed) in the establish-

ments, six of these boats were exclusively occupied in catching caplin and herring for bait, and were manned by crews of eight men.

Their fishing commenced this year the 5th June, and is considered good in point of quality—although the fish are unusually small. The catch has been to the present date (July 27) seven thousand quintals, and they anticipate six thousand more before the close. They use seines principally, but they also fish with lines.

Caplin had struck in very early and in great abundance. They were now beginning to disappear, replaced by herring.

Croc is by no means a first-class fishing station. Rouge, St. Julian's, Goose Cove, Cremillera, Braha, Quirpon, besides others in the vicinity of Cape St. John, all harbor more vessels and send forth a greater number of boats.

The French coast fishermen do not receive so large a bounty as their countrymen engaged exclusively on the Banks. The risk and expense attending their occupation is much less, and consequently the insurance lower.

The coast fishermen sail from France in vessels of 150 to 200 tons, laden with salt and containing their entire fishing equipments, comprising men, boats, nets, and provisions. When they arrive at the destined harbors, they moor their vessels, re-roof their last year's establishments, land their goods, lock up their vessels' hatches, and commence fishing. If the season proves prolific, traders connected with the planters will perhaps once or twice during the season carry away the produce of their good fortune and industry, preserving a sufficiency to freight their own vessels back to France.

The French north-east coast fisheries are prosecuted perhaps with greater vigor, and have increased more rapidly than those to the Southward.

This year there are upwards of 11,000 fishermen employed between Cape Ray and Cape John, shewing an increase of 1,500 men within two years.

I had great difficulty in collecting information, not only from the superintendents of the rooms, but also from the naval officers ; they evinced, I thought, great jealousy in their answers to my questions.

The northern and southern fisheries are opposing interests. The former are conducted by houses at Granville, St. Malo, Gampol, Benrick, Havre, Rants, and St. Brieux ; the latter by merchants of Dieppe, Bayonne, and in one instance in connexion with a St. Malo house of the name of L'Guller. I met at the table of the Captain of the French brig-of-war two superintendents of rooms ; they had originally been masters of bankers : they appeared to be men of energy and substance, and possessed very considerable general information. They spoke with pride of the sailors their bankers produced, and of the hardships and dangers they were exposed to while fishing on the Banks, and that to deprive their country of these fisheries would be to lop off the right arm of her maritime strength.

I found during my stay the climate dry, the winds light, and in the harbor (notwithstanding the proximity of eight or ten ice-bergs) the weather mild and agreeable ; but outside the air is damp and chill, even with a clear sky overhead.

Sailed for Belle Isle, North, July 29, and observed on my way there one brig in Fish Shot Cove, one bark and one brig in Goose Cove, one bark, one brig and one schooner in Cremillera Cove, two barques and two brigs in Braha, one English brig in Grignat Harbor, one French brig in Degrat Harbor.

BELLE ISLE, NORTH.

The fisheries round this Island are very valuable, and I grieve to say, are principally gathered by the French.

During the afternoon, night, and next morning I was off this Island; I only saw two vessels, and those were English Jacks; but nevertheless I ascertained that the French had been fishing round its shores the entire season, and had only departed on the visit of the man-of-war being reported by their look-outs.

I do not see how these fisheries can effectually be protected while the French possess the facilities of numerous and convenient ports in its vicinity, with only the opposing influence of two Jersey establishments in Chateau Bay to contend against them. The most effectual protection would be the constant presence of a small cruiser during the entire season, to act in conjunction with the small Government schooner the French themselves employ for this service. If it were practicable to form establishments on the Island itself, this expense perhaps might be saved; but owing to the total absence of safe beach or boat harbors, this would be almost impossible.

These fisheries are capable of yielding 40,000 quintals in the season, and I am told the French take upon the average 30,000.

I could not visit the establishment at Chateau owing to the Bay being blocked up by icebergs—83 were counted between Belle Isle and the coast of Labrador,

RED BAY

Is a beautiful little harbor, perfectly sheltered from every wind, and is capable of admitting ships of the largest class. It is formed by Saddle Island laying off the entrance of a round basin with a narrow neck; there is good anchorage behind the Island, which forms what may be called the outer harbor; the hills of the main are nearly 500 feet in height, somewhat higher than those directly to the north-east and south-west of the port.

The hills are close to the shore, formed of reddish granite and covered with moss, some stunted spruce, birch, and juniper bushes.

Three small rivulets enter the basin, but water cannot easily be procured for ships, owing to sandbars extending across their mouths.

The port is not very easy to make, as the features and indentation of this portion of the coast are very similar; one of the best marks is a small flat island a little to the eastward of Saddle Island, named Oil Island in the book of sailing directions, and White Island by the fishermen.

There are thirteen rooms at this station, all belonging to separate planters, small proprietors, employing altogether fifty fishermen (exclusive of the shoremen); the principal person among them is a Mr. William Penny of Conception Bay. He comes to this port in his schooner every spring, and arrived this year on the 17th June with ninety-five people on board—forty men, the rest women and children. During the season there are about 100 inhabitants—40 reside for the purpose of seal-fishing during the winter. They commence cod-fishing this year 5th June. They use both seines and lines, and have 25 boats of different sizes, employing from two to three hands each, and capable of containing five to ten quintals. They send their fish to St. John's, Carbonear, and Halifax. They dispatch it twice in the season

if the fishing is moderately good. Their catch to the present date (30th July) has been 3,500 quintals, which is the greatest amount of fish they have taken so early for the last three years. They expect to average before the close 100 quintals a man. They would not be contented with less than 70. (The French consider 50 quintals per man a paying season). The fishing generally ends about the 5th September, when the ice begins again to form, and the bait strikes off into deep water. The bait they use is caplin, herring and lance in rotation. Although the latter may be procured throughout the season, they use the caplin when it can be had, which is frequently from June to the end of August. They can place no reliance upon the strike of the herring. They consider the climate during the summer and autumn months drier and of more equal temperature than upon the north-east coast of Newfoundland.

They say that they are much disturbed by the French and Americans. The former coming over from the other side in squadrons of batteaux, sweeping all their best fishing grounds—while the latter enter their harbours in schooners of about 60 tons, catching their fish and drying them close to their own stages, which they boldly assert they have a right to do by Treaty.

I examined several of the planters separately, and all agreed that there are about 600 Frenchmen employed in fishing vessels of different sizes, between Forteau and Red Bays alone. There is no agriculture, if we except a few cabbages and turnips planted round the doors of their huts, which they use with their common diet of fish and salt pork. The fishermen are paid principally in bills of exchange given by the merchants, and receive from £18 to £25 currency a-year. Those employed for the summer season only, generally receive half their catch.

The planters of the harbour expressed so much dissatisfaction at the encroachment of the French, who, they assert, are encouraged in their depredations by some of the principal English inhabitants residing in the Bays to the Westward, that I have thought it advisable to give the evidence of the three principal parties I have examined at length:

What are your names ?

ROBERT ASH, of Carbonar, and FRANCIS WITTS. We have been fishing eleven years out of this harbour. Wiggs has resided on the coast of Labrador for the last two years, and would continue to do so if not so much interfered with by the French.

BENJAMIN COOMES came straight from England. Has been residing between Black and Red Bays, and on the coast of Labrador for twenty-five years, cod-fishing, and sealing on his own account. They all asserted that their fishing is very much injured by the encroachments of the French—fishing on the coast to the Westward in Black Bay, and Fortune Bay, &c., which prevented the fish from passing down the coast, but more particularly are they injured by the French sweeping all the caplin off the ground, which otherwise would remain a month longer if they were not so disturbed and cleared by them.—“To give an idea how much we suffer by these encroachments, and how much the French benefit by them, there are parties employed purposely to catch and cure caplin to supply the Grand Bank fishing vessels.”

Q.—Who are the principal people in Black Bay ?

A.—One family, Mr. Odell's.

Q.—Do they agree to the French going there ?

A.—Yes, they encourage them, and lend and build stages for their accommodation, and receive the livers of the fish as payment.

Q.—What may this be worth to them ?

A.—A quintal of fish produces a gallon of oil, which sells for 2s. per gallon.

Q.—Have you ever remonstrated with the English residents at the Bays to the Westward, and stated how prejudicial their encouragement of the French was to your interests?

A.—Yes, and they are well acquainted that the French fishing must injure ours.

Q.—What do you suppose is the reason why the French are enabled to surpass our fishermen in cheap fishing on our own coast?

A.—Their fit-out is in the first place much cheaper—not one-fourth the prime cost of ours. Secondly—They receive a large bounty from government. Thirdly—The wages are not one-half those we pay our fishermen.

Q.—How many Frenchmen do you suppose are fishing between Red Bay and Forteau?

A.—From 1000 to 1500.

Q.—In how many boats or vessels?

A.—About 200 large and small.

Q.—Do you think the government of Newfoundland could make any arrangement that could effectually prevent the encroachment of the French on the coast of Labrador?

A.—Yes, a cruiser stationed in the straits from the 1st July to the last of August; or resident Magistrates, say at Black Bay or Forteau, or perhaps Chateau.

Q.—Would the planters on the coast of Labrador think it worth their while to pay £300 a-year in support of the salaries of Magistrates to clear the coast of the French?

A.—We think we pay taxes enough, and we imagine that the government of Newfoundland ought to defray such a charge for the benefit of its subjects and its own commerce.

Q.—Are you aware if there are individuals residing between Red Bay and Forteau Bay who have made sums of money by their encouragement of French fishing?

A.—Yes, Samuel Tomms, formerly residing at Great St. Modeste. Last year he went to Quebec, having cleared £1000 in the last few years by the sale of oil from the cod livers.

Q.—Do the residents of Labrador receive any assistance from the government of Newfoundland during the winter?

A.—No, none. Last year, for the eight months, which is the usual length of the winter, we were hard put to it in consequence of the French having deprived us of our means of living by plundering our coasts. Many of the poorer inhabitants were alone supported by the charitable assistance of those in better circumstances.

Q.—You say that certain parties have had to give up trade in vessels in consequence of the French encroachments—state who these were?

A.—Francis and Claudius Witts, William Udel, and Mr. Pike. These parties had to give up their vessels, finding that the catch of fish was so much reduced from what it used to be before the French came in such numbers, that none of the parties could procure even half cargoes by the close of the season.

Q.—How do you know that the French fishings interfere with yours?

A.—Because on the Monday our catch is double what it is any other day of the week, owing to the French not fishing on the Sunday, thereby permitting the fish to pass up the coast.

CARROL COVE.

This is a small fishing station, five miles west of Red Bay, where there are only two rooms belonging to a Mr. Lardragan. He employs thirty men, six of these reside there during the winter to trap seals. They catch them in frame nets, which are laid down the 20th of November, and taken up the last of December; then again put down the 1st June, and taken up the middle of July. 300 seals a-year is the average catch.

They send their cod to a Jersey house in Blanch Sablon.

There are three seal fisheries between Chateau Bay and Carrol Cove fished by men from Red Bay, who abandon them in summer for the cod fishery. Their average catch is 350 seals.

BLACK BAY, OR PINWARE

Is a wild open roadstead, but a good fishing station, and caplin are always to be found in great abundance during the season inside the bar formed by the river at its head, and which the French are said entirely to appropriate, by dropping nets across the channels, and placing watch-boats to guard them. This intelligence caused me to despatch an officer in the barge from Red Bay, who might be enabled to take any intruders by surprise and give me accurate information. He counted twenty fishing boats at anchor under Ledge Island, and boarded sixteen vessels at anchor inside Little St. Modeste, belonging to Nova Scotia, one American, and three French from St. Pierre's.

The latter had been fishing on the Labrador shores, and according to my directions he took away their registers.

At Shipbroad, on the western side of Black Bay, he boarded the French brig "Novelle," St. Pierre, of St. Malo, wind-bound from Quirpon, bound to Port-au-Choix, laden with salt and a small quantity of fish, which apparently had not been taken on this coast. He also boarded two French boats fishing for vessels at Port-au-Croix, which he ordered away. He observed twelve or thirteen French boats off Cape Diable to windward of him, but these he could not reach as it blew too strong.

FORTEAU BAY

Is almost an open roadstead to the south and south-east, but safe even with winds from those quarters, owing to its depth and the protection it receives from the opposite coast of Newfoundland.

It is surrounded by table-lands of sand-stone covered with the usual moss, the dwarf spruce, birch bush and some mountain ash. A salmon river of some size enters the sea at the head of the bay. Seals, salmon, cod, and remarkably fine herrings are very plentiful. The fishings are carried on with considerable profit by five establishments—four connected with Jersey, Poole, and St. John's, are in the bay, and the fifth planted upon the eastern point, belongs to a Mr. Grange, a wealthy colonist from Anchor Point, Newfoundland.—Upwards of four hundred people are employed by these various planters, but their catch this year has not been (in proportion) so good as that of their rivals of Red Bay.

The resident agents and partners are Messrs. Ellis, employed by Mr. Bird of Poole, and Larouc, a Jersey Merchant and Agent for Mr. Quitville the most extensive planter on the coast of Labrador. He has besides this other establishments (one at Blanch Sablon) and supplies most of the winter rooms and resident fishermen with goods, clothes, and stores.

much to his own profit. Messrs. Young and Jancaut and George de Hearine and David Janners are the remainder.

There are nine fishing stations between Red Bay and Forteau—namely, Carrol Cove—East St. Modest—Black Bay—West St. Modest—Capstan Island—Lance Dialla—Riverhead of Lance-a-Loup and Lance Amour. Except at Lance-a-Loup, where a Mr. Crockwell of Torquay has a room, all these stations are fished by colonial fishermen, who send their produce to St. John's by vessels from that port, and to the Jersey houses of Forteau Bay and Blanc Sablon.

These small stations employ about two hundred-and-twenty men, and average a catch of twenty-five thousand quintals throughout the year.

Cabbages and Turnips are grown at every station for the summer consumption of the inhabitants,

Those who reside upon the coast during the winter shoot Deer, Partridges, Ducks, Geese, Curlew, and other wild fowl, amply sufficient for their support. They have, nevertheless, stores of Pork, Flour, Tea and Molasses, supplied by Traders from Quebec, Halifax, and St. John's.

Much of my time was occupied during the ship's stay at Forteau in settling innumerable disputes between the rival firms and fishermen, and in trying an action brought by Philip Landragan of Carrol Cove, against Messrs. George de Heamine and Daniel Janvers, for having taken a schooner belonging to the former, under pretence of purchasing her, and having used her for nine months, and in consequence of the Collector of Customs of St. John's declaring the Register to be incorrect, returning her to the Plaintiff, who accepted a bill of thirty pounds as an equivalent for her use, and for having boarded her after delivering her over and taking out gear belonging to the vessel.

A case of a much graver description was brought before me by a man named Charles Dickcr, a planter, resident on Grand Point, three miles west of Blanc Sablon, and a settler of twenty-four years, who, upon hearing a man-of-war was at Forteau, walked across the country to lay a charge against a stronger party for having torn up his Seal and Salmon Nets, as he asserted they prevented his own catch being so great as it otherwise would be. The poor man was thus deprived of his season's profit, and probably his winter's subsistence. I was enabled, fortunately, to succeed in restoring his rights to him.

BLANC SABLON

Is seven miles west of the western point of Forteau Bay. It is open to the eastward; nevertheless, the westerly winds are those most feared, as they throw in heavy cross-swells between Wood and Greenly Islands, and vessels are not unfrequently driven on shore by them.

It is the principal fishing station on the Labrador coast. There are four Jersey Establishments—two belonging to Messrs. Philip de Quitville, (under the charge of Thomas Laroux) and the other to Philip Bray and Lebrock—there are upwards of three hundred inhabitants during the season, and only four families reside during the winter.—They all arrived this year in June, and commenced fishing the 13th, and found both cod and caplin very abundant—they had never seen fish so early before, and greatly regretted not having arrived sooner. Besides the cod, they fish seal and herring; the latter they use for bait when caplin is scarce. They commonly find the caplin on the coast by the middle of June, and it generally remains till the end of July.

De Quitville's Establishments both at Forteau and this Bay cure and export caplin. They also extract oil from the herring as well as from the cod liver. Twelve Jersey vessels and eighty boats were in use, employing altogether three hundred hands. Bray trades to twelve different ports in the Mediterranean, and occasionally to their own Island, Jersey.

The fish is sent away as fast as they can load the vessels; the first sailed this year 7th July, and another will sail to-day, (9th August), and four in September. There were sixteen vessels at anchor in Blanc Sablon harbour, namely—one barque, three brigantines, and twelve schooners. They were all waiting for cargoes.

Notwithstanding the abundance of fish at the commencement, they consider they have only had a fair catch—13,000 quintals—owing to their late arrival, and the fish leaving early; they consider from 15 to 16,000 quintals a good season. Last year their fishing did not terminate until the end of August. This year it closed 25th July.

The fogs lay longer against this portion of the coast than further to the eastward, owing to its being at the entrance of the Straits, and more exposed to the Southerly winds which drive them out of the estuary of the St. Lawrence. Blanc Sablon is sometimes enveloped for a week at a time, while a few miles beyond, the sky is clear and dry. This is much against the planters' interests. Americans occasionally spread their nets and fish early in the season on their way through the Straits towards Cape Charles; but they do not disturb the settlers. There were about ten this year—they used to appear in greater numbers. Four French brigs had been fishing off Green Island for three weeks or a month—they left the day before yesterday, when they heard we were on the coast. They fish along the Labrador coast throughout the season, and only retire upon the appearance of the man-of-war. All the small planters complain grievously of this intrusion, while the more wealthy encourage it, for (as I have already stated) the liver oil which they receive for stage room. The Americans carry the fish away green.

The people are supported, as at the other stations, by supplies from Jersey, Halifax and Quebec, and all the large establishments pay the men £2 sterling a month, instead of giving them half the catch.

There are no resident fishermen in this particular harbour, but a few along the coast to the westward at Grand Point, Bradora, and Esquimaux Harbours, but no regular rooms are maintained.

The river running into this port separates the dependency of Newfoundland from Lower Canada. The harbour is always completely blocked up by Ice from November until June, occasionally to the end of the latter month. At this station all the fishermen are Protestants and from Jersey.

The fishery is much what it has been for the last fifteen years; but people are commencing to pass up the coast, and they anticipate a gradual supply of permanent settlers from the south of Newfoundland and Canada.

When on the point of sailing, the son of Mr. Grange, of Anchor Point, Newfoundland, came on board to complain that the French had stopped his father fishing a salmon river that has been in his family for upwards of a century; that after much opposition on his father's part, he had to yield to the French one-half, and afterwards two-thirds of the produce of the river. This year they had taken it from him altogether.

As I could find no definite instructions relative to the assumed right of the French over the river as well as sea fishings, and as this question bears so gravely upon the interests of so many settlers, and the dignity of her Majesty's colony; and feeling that any inquiry on my

part, after ascertaining the statement to be true, without forcibly expelling the French from property which has been in the possession of English colonists for so long a period would be ineffectual, I advised Mr. Grange to draw up a memorial for the consideration of the Colonial Government, and promised to lay the facts of the case before his Excellency the Governor.

REMARKS:

The inhabitants of any particular bay or station along the coast of Labrador have not the right or power, in my opinion, to permit the French to lay out their nets along the coasts or in their harbours; for by so doing, the rights of other fishings are naturally interfered with, by stopping the passage of the fish along the coast, and after fair warning, I think they should be subject to the same punishment for "aiding and abetting," as the intruders are themselves.

In my opinion it would be most advisable, nay, absolutely necessary for the prosperity of the British subjects, that Magistrates should be appointed from St. John's to administer justice and control the society resident at the various fishing stations in the Straits of Belle Isle during the season.

This extensive coast commencing from the estuary of the St. Lawrence and stretching far North to the regions of perpetual snow, is one of the most barren and desolate in the world; and it seems that nature has removed the means of supporting human life from its surface to the waters which surround it, the abundant production of which offer the inducements and reward the industry and perseverance of the thousands of adventurers who resort to it from both Europe and America.

The portion forming the norther boundary of the Straits of Belle Isle is not so well marked or grand in feature as where it recedes from the Island of Newfoundland, either to the north or south. From the sea the country has a green and alluvial appearance, and it is not until close to it that this is lost, and nothing is seen but bare granite rocks partially covered with moss and stunted shrubs; juniper, birch, and poplar trees grow in valleys where the soil is of sandy clay, the temperature much higher, and the fog less frequent than upon the coast. Here deer, bears, wolves, foxes, martens, otters, beavers, and a great variety of wild fowl take up their abode until driven to the coast by the snow-drifts of approaching winter. The ice does not usually leave the bay free for vessels to enter before June, and it begins to form again in the shallow bays and pools in the beginning of September.

The entrance of the Straits of Belle Isle between York Point and Cape Banlo is twenty-six miles wide, the latter point bearing from the former south-east. At Cape Norman, eighteen miles to the Westward of Cape Banlo, the opposite coast of Labrador is distant only fourteen miles; but the narrowest part of the Strait is at Point Amour, in Forteau Bay, where it is only nine and a-quarter miles wide. The western entrance of the Strait, between Greenly Island and Point Ferroll, is nearly twenty-one miles wide, the point bearing from the Island S. S. W. The course and distance through the Strait is S. 54° W. true, according to the mean variation W. $\frac{1}{4}$ S. 65 miles.

The navigation of this Strait is attended with very considerable danger, from sudden fogs, wandering icebergs, and strong irregular currents. In spring the entrance of the Strait to the Northward is frequently almost blocked up by large ice islands, which are set to the south-west even against strong winds from that quarter; these are broken up into smaller pieces as the summer advances, and are met with throughout the entire season; it is thus ap-

parent that the dangers of the coast are greatly increased in dark or foggy nights, during which no vessels should attempt to run—for it is impossible under these circumstances, even with the most careful watching, to guard against unknown dangers, or to be sure of the vessel's position within ten miles, owing to the frequent irregularity in the set of the currents. The prevailing current runs directly through the Strait to the S. W., and its rate is at times two knots, diminishing gradually in force as it spreads out in the wider parts of the Gulf; but yet its course and velocity is greatly influenced by the prevailing wind, for example—with the wind from south-west, the stream sets along the west coast of Newfoundland from Point Ferroll obliquely across the Strait towards Forteau Bay; again it runs with a north-east directly in an opposite direction along the west coast of Newfoundland from Point Ferroll past Point Rich. In short, there is no constancy, either in the rate or set of these streams, for the winds and the irregular tides modify the set and rate of the equally irregular currents in a manner which it is extremely difficult, if not impossible, to calculate upon with any degree of certainty. It would be prudent therefore on the approach of a dark or foggy night to secure a safe anchorage if possible; and even if a vessel bound to the Gulf, and running with an easterly wind, should find no port fit for the purpose, I would advise her standing over to the Newfoundland side of the Strait, where the soundings are not so deep, and the icebergs not so prevalent, and there either lying-to until daylight or anchoring with the stream.

ST. GEORGE'S BAY.

There are two hundred resident planters in this Bay, who receive assistance in hands during the fishing season from Cape Breton and its adjacent shores. Their fishing usually commences a month or six weeks earlier than that on the coast of Labrador. This year they began the 27th April. They fish herring, salmon, trout, and eel, besides the cod. Up to the present date (17th August) their catch has been 10,000 barrels of herring, 200 barrels of salmon, and but a small quantity of cod. They employ about 200 boats and 800 hands, and send their fish to the Halifax and Quebec markets during the summer and fall. The fishings end about the 1st October, with the exception of the eels, which are caught in great quantities and afford subsistence during the winter. They have bait without intermission during the entire fishing, and use caplin, herring, squid and clams. The climate is usually dry and mild, and if their society was under proper control, St. George's Bay would offer many inducements to the industrious settler. The harbor is occasionally blocked up by ice, but for no length of time, and is always open by the middle of April. The inhabitants consist of English, a few Irish, and a number of lawless adventurers—the very outcasts of society—from Cape Breton and Canada; and it is very distressing to perceive a community, comprising nearly 1000 inhabitants, settled in an English colony under no law or restraint, and having no one to controul them, if we except what may be exercised through the influence shewn by the single clergyman of the Established Church, who is the only person of authority in the settlement. I am told the reason why magistrates are not appointed is in obedience to the direct orders from the Home Government—it being believed against the spirit of the treaty with France. Under these circumstances I would recommend either that a vessel-of-war should be appointed to remain stationary in the harbor, or that the society should be forcibly broken up and removed; for violent and lawless characters are rapidly increasing, and neither the lives nor property of any substantial or well-disposed settler are safe. Four cases of violent assault were brought to my notice as having been recently committed upon parties—some of whom were injured for life, and others nearly murdered; and I was sorry to understand the culprits had succeeded in escaping into the woods upon the appearance of Her Majesty's ship.

The cultivation of grain has been commenced with considerable success. Wheat, barley, and oats ripen well; and turnips grow particularly fine. Potatoes and garden-stuffs are cultivat-

ed also to a considerable extent. A great quantity of fur is collected, but the trappers suffer great losses by the frequent robbery of both traps and their contents.

REMARKS :

I have thus stated to your Lordship all the information I could gain relative to the fisheries of the South coast of Newfoundland and Labrador, gleaned from the statements of the parties residing at the ports visited by Her Majesty's ship under my command; but before closing this report, I consider it my duty to lay before your Lordship how I conceive Her Majesty's ships may be beneficially employed in the protection to be afforded to British interests upon the coast of Labrador and round the Island of Newfoundland; and in doing so I must presume to call your attention to the report of Captain MILNE, of her Majesty's ship "Crocodile," whose observations in 1840 agree entirely with the facts I was enabled to collect during my cruize this season; and notwithstanding seven years have elapsed between the periods of our inspections, the evils therein pointed out exist, and in a more magnified form, with, perhaps, the single exception of the French encroachments upon our grounds round the Burgeo Islands early in the spring, for the purpose of digging bait. These have discontinued, simply because they have so systematised their arrangements with the settlers in the bays of Placentia and Fortune, including those living on the coast between, as to render them independent of any supply from the more distant Burgeo Islands.

In a former part of this report I have stated my opinion as to the best means to be adopted to prevent the smuggling of bait from Lamaline and its vicinity to the Island of St. Pierre's, and I simply add, that if the small cruiser I propose to be provided by the Colonial Government was stationed principally in the harbor of St. Pierre's during the time the French bankers arrived for their supplies of bait, she might the more effectually check the illegal trade by being there, at the point of concentration, to board all the English vessels and boats outside the harbor upon their approach and departure, instead of fruitlessly endeavouring to watch an extensive line of coast abounding in ports.

I most emphatically assert that the traffic in caplin to the French islands, and the introduction of French merchandize into our colony by the return boats, so injurious to British commerce and colonial revenue, can never be checked without the constant presence of one or more revenue vessels, possessing several swift row-boats, to act in conjunction with vigilant and independent local authorities, appointed for the sole purpose of performing this coast-guard duty.

The French, although comparatively unmolested by our fishermen, and possessing fisheries equal in extent to our own, conceive it necessary to employ six cruisers for their protection, comprising a corvette (or brig), a steamer, three schooners, and an armed store-ship. Each of these has a range of coast to guard, namely, one schooner in charge of St. Pierre's, under the immediate orders of the commandant of the island; a second from Cod Roy along the coast to Point Ferrol; a third from thence to Croc, where the senior officer generally is himself to receive all reports, and adjust disturbances. The steamer is usually employed between Croc and Cape St. John.

It is obvious that the single English man-of-war employed to protect the Newfoundland Fisheries is not sufficient to counteract the advantages of so preponderating an influence.

The coast of Labrador is, in my opinion, the one that requires the most vigilant watching for the protection of the rights of the colonial and home subjects who flock there during the season; and to do so effectually the constant presence of a cruiser would be required.

The knowledge that a man-of-war will visit the coast during the season, may exercise sufficient influence to prevent any outrageous behaviour on the part of foreigners towards de-

tached British settlers—yet it can exercise no effective control to prevent their fishing encroachments; and now, after repeatedly and vainly demanding permanent protection against these inroads, the settlers find it more to their advantage to enter upon a reciprocity of barter (as injurious to British commerce and Colonial revenue, and the fishing interests at large, as it is profitable to a few of the leading planters upon the coast, who supply the poorer settlers with commodities), than to run the risk attending a forcible ejection of the intruders.

In conversations I have held with His Excellency the Governor, it appears that the Colonial Legislature have hitherto been disinclined to re-establish the Surrogate Courts that formerly exercised annual authority upon the coast, alleging that the expense was greater than the benefit the colony derived from their existence. Under these circumstances I deem it my duty to represent to your Lordship, that if the Captains of Her Majesty's Ships should still be ordered to interfere in the control of the frequently very turbulent fishing society distributed over that distant coast, it would be more consistent with their position, and their duty would be more effectually performed, if they did so under the acts of parliament regulating their power over Her Majesty's subjects committing offences on the high seas, or that conferred upon Consuls residing in foreign ports, until such time as the Colonial Government may deem it expedient to re-establish a legal control over a dependency producing so considerable a portion of the actual revenue of Newfoundland.

In the 18th article of your Lordship's instructions you direct my attention to the prevention of all illicit trade; and although I have endeavoured to the best of my ability to carry out these instructions, I found the evil too general, and encouraged by those parties even in many instances who complained of the evil, to be able to report any great success. The injurious extent to which trade in caplin and contraband articles is carried on cannot be better shown than by stating that upwards of £20,000 were realised last year by the sale of that bait to the French; so it is very apparent that unless either the home or the colonial government take steps to re-establish a legal transfer of this commodity for the benefit of the revenue, or show more decision and method in the employment of means for its suppression, that it is in vain to rely upon any consistent aid being received from the Captain of the single ship appointed to protect the entire fishings of Newfoundland and Labrador.

I trust that I need not assure your Lordship that it is from no other wish on my part that I point to these various difficulties in the way of a successful guardianship of our fishing interests than to show in how many instances the people are themselves to blame for the evils they complain of; and how little the colonial government has been enabled to perform for the protection of its best interests, owing, I firmly believe, to the opposition it has met with from parties interested in carrying on a contraband trade.

SIR,—Agreeably to the Act of Vic. 8th, cap. 4, I beg to hand you, for His Excellency the Governor, my annual Report on the Roads and Bridges in this Colony, that the same may be submitted to the Legislative Assembly.

I would also beg leave to call your attention to several omissions in the printed copy of my Report for 1846; particularly on the Roads under the Little Placentia Board, and on the manner in which the inhabitants wished the expenditure of the Grants Vic. 9th, cap. 2, I had reported very fully.

REPORT OF THE INSPECTOR OF ROADS AND BRIDGES, AND SURVEYOR TO THE BOARD OF CONTROL.

On the 15th day of March I left St. John's for LaManche, for the purpose of inspecting the bridge over the river of that place, but the snow being accumulated under the arch and at the sides of the bridge I found my attempts to observe the performance of the work quite useless; I saw, however, that the arch of the bridge was much too low, and I was pretty certain that it would be materially injured by the first spring's freshet.

My first visit to LaManche was in 1844, having been employed by the Board of Control to proceed thither to investigate a Petition from the Board of Road Commissioners for the southern district and others, praying for an alteration in the line of road between Toad's Cove and Brigus. After making a careful survey I strongly recommended the alterations prayed for, and in my Report of that survey to the Board of Control I stated that any bridge thrown over LaManche river would require to be of not less a height than twelve feet.

In 1846 I was again sent by the Board of Control for the purpose of opening the line which I had in 1844 surveyed. After it had been opened the Board of Road Commissioners contemplated building a bridge over the LaManche river, and the height proposed by them was but eight feet, to which I strongly objected, knowing that a bridge having so low an arch must inevitably be swept away by the first freshet. The height I proposed was twelve feet, but that was considered preposterous; and on my continued refusal to sanction their proposal, they at last agreed to the addition of two feet, which would make it ten. I consented reluctantly, being convinced in my own mind that this height was even too low; this spring, the river being much swollen, the approaches to the bridge were carried away, and the water rose to a height of fourteen inches over the flooring—this was bad enough, the bridge being much injured—but the fall freshet entirely carried away the flooring.

I returned to St. John's on the 21st March, being much gratified on seeing the improvements which had taken place in the construction of Roads under the Bay Bulls Board for the last year, particularly on the main line from Bay Bulls to Toad's Cove.

On the 19th April I received instructions from the Chairman of the Board of Control to proceed to Fortune, in Fortune Bay, to inspect the progress of the breakwater in construc-

tion at that place ; and also to investigate a petition from several persons residing at Fortune and Grand Bank, respecting the road connecting these localities, as well as the line from Fortune to Lamaline, Grand Bank to Lawn, and Grand Bank through Salmonier to Burin ; also, to visit Little Placentia to enquire into, and report upon, the inefficient manner in which the roads had been constructed in that locality.

On the 29th April I received further instructions, in which I was directed to assist the Board of Road Commissioners at Great Placentia in making the alterations in the line of road between the Block House and Distress Cove, which had been petitioned for by the inhabitants of the different localities on that line, and also to visit the western districts as far as time would allow.

I left St. John's on Monday, the 3d May, and reached Holyrood that afternoon; on the following morning I started from Holyrood for Salmonier, at which place I arrived at 4 o'clock, p.m. Great improvements have been made in the construction of the roads on this line. From the Salmonier line to the North Harbor line the route is partly by water, and the arrangements of the ferries is so circuitous as to add a distance of six miles to the traveller; to put this in a clear light I shall describe the route from Salmonier to North Harbor. You first start for Cox's Point (distant from Salmonier four miles) then cross the Salmonier arm in a south-east direction to Black Duck Gulley, from whence in a north-west direction to John's Pond, and from John's Pond to North Harbor. This distressing inconvenience would have been avoided if the ferry had been stationed at Harry's Cove, from whence it should run to John's Pond, there being a road leading to that place from Limber Gras, the last-named place being between Cox's Point and Salmonier.

On the evening of the 5th I reached Great Placentia at five, p.m., and on the following day I delivered the letter from the Board of Control to the Chairman of the Board of Road Commissioners, Mr. Luke Collins; that gentleman, with the assent of the Board, considered it desirable that I should make arrangements with labourers, &c., and superintend the necessary alterations on the line from Great Placentia to Distress Cove. Those already opened were carried over such steep hills that it would be almost impossible to make them in any way serviceable; one commences at the south-east road and ends at Custlet, the other starts from the Block House, and is opened as far as Glinden's Cove; on the former a grant of £150 was expended, Vic. 6th; on the latter the sum of £38, I should say wasted, Vic. 7th; for, excepting the £75, Vic. 8th, which was spent in erecting bridges over streams (seven in number) not one penny of money expended on these two lines has in any way rendered them at all beneficial. There are still a few streams which require bridging.

I commenced my line at the western end of Patterson's Garden, and continued from thence to Little Barrisway Bridge, a distance of six miles; my reason for commencing at Patterson's Garden was that the Glinden's Cove Road (as it is termed) goes close to its eastern boundary, and the sum of £50 being so miserably inadequate for the making of the alterations, that I thought it much better to commence my line from that point in order that I might render it beneficial to as many localities as possible; and as far as it is constructed, it is shorter by three quarters of a mile than either of the other lines. I also opened a branch road three quarters of a mile from my line to Green's Point, this locality lying to the north-west of the line that distance.

I would recommend that the line from Salmonier to the head of the south-east arm should be connected in a straight line with that which commences at Patterson's garden, and that the branch-road for the town of Placentia should be at a right angle with it; if this should be done the line ought to cross Brewley Basin a little to the eastward of Patterson's house,

which will not only shorten the distance and give a more level line, but could also be constructed for half the amount which it would take to make it round the basin.

The erection of a bridge over Great Barrisway River calls for immediate attention, as it crosses the main line which runs from Branch to and through Distress Cove to Placentia, and from thence to Salmonier on to the capital; for, when it is swollen the traveller, is delayed three or four days, and very often has to cross at the risk of his life.

The numerous agricultural localities through which this line passes renders it of importance that the erection of a bridge should be attended to as soon as possible; and the removal of such an obstacle would be conducive to more benefit than would be supposed. I will venture to say that if a good bridge be thrown across it next year, a considerable number of cattle will be driven to St. John's from the remotest of the localities on the line; and this benefit, once put into execution, will speedily lead to the doubling of the number in each successive year.

As soon as I had completed the above line I proceeded (according to my instructions of the 19th of April) to Little Placentia, to inspect and report upon the inefficient manner in which the work done upon the roads under that Board had been performed.

I found that the work had been very ineffectually performed, and in no-wise corresponding with the certificate, or specification, which had been laid before the Board of Control; this I reported to His Excellency through the Board of Control immediately on my arrival at St. John's.

From Great Placentia I proceeded to Oderin, where I found that the grants of £20 and £50 had been very judiciously spent in making a road round the harbor; a further grant of about £100 would be required to finish the carrying of the road from the north-east end of the harbor to what is called the south-side.

On that part of the Island where the inhabitants are located (it being the most convenient for the fishery) there is scarcely any land fit for tillage; but on the south-side there is a large tract of arable land and very fine wood, both of which advantages are rendered entirely useless for the want of a road.

From Oderin I proceeded to Burin, and after having carefully inspected the roads through that Harbor, I was much surprised on finding them so much at variance with the statements which had been made by the Board of that place to the Board of Control. For instance, many of them had been reported as being opened, drained, levelled, gravelled, and completed; I found them certainly opened, but that was all; the stumps had been in some places taken up, and those which were left, not having had a sufficiency of mud and peat thrown over them, were to be seen several inches above the surface. Performing work in so shameful a manner deserves a severe reprimand, for the waste of money incurred by such carelessness is enormous—a waste which the country can but ill afford.

The side-drains are bad enough, but the cross-drains were far worse; and on the making of the cross-drains depends the wearing of the road: if they are properly made they will not get choked, but when the cross-drains are merely dug out and have no wall either of wood or stone to keep the loose earth from falling, it must be clear to every one that the drains after rain would get choked; parties passing roads are very blameable when made in this manner, because the contractor would find no difficulty in putting a wall to these drains; he would not, at all events, be put to any considerable inconvenience in obtaining the necessary materials, for I can almost say they are at his elbow; but he does not go to so much trouble, he digs a drain the width of his shovel across the road, covers it with a few boughs, and over these he puts the materials which came from the drain; this sort of construction is passed by the Board, and what is the consequence? After the sun's rain this road requires repairs;

and not only that, but cattle are often severely injured by their not being sufficiently strong to support their weight.

There is about an eighth of a mile in this harbor which deserves the name of a road, and that is but twelve feet in width, the remainder of the road varying in width from two to eight feet; how such impositions could have passed the eye of this Board is to me exceedingly strange.

From Burin I proceeded to Little St. Lawrence, the route is partly by water; in the first stage you cross from Burin to Burin Bay, and from thence by ferry a distance of two miles, landing at a place called Spoon Cove, (of these ferries I shall say a few words in my remarks on the Garnish Line) and from Spoon Cove to Little St. Lawrence, from thence by ferry to Great St. Lawrence.

The line of road from Spoon Cove to Little St. Lawrence is the most serpentine line that I ever travelled—it has been laid down without any judgment; and in the next place the road has been very shamefully constructed. I am pretty sure that it is not now safe as a foot-path, from its being contracted for in patches of about fifty perches, and every contractor working in the direction which best suited him, they have left from ten to twenty perches untouched between each lot; but there are so many faults on this line that it would be almost impossible to enumerate them, and I would recommend that it be abandoned.

The road from Little St. Lawrence to Great St. Lawrence is very good in comparison with those of which I have just spoken; but a want of judgment was displayed in laying down the line, as regards elevation. At the head of the harbor a street has been commenced, and on each side two pieces of about 120 perches finished; but to complete the whole street, a grant of about £50 would be required to carry it through the village on both sides.

From Great St. Lawrence through Little Lawn to Great Lawn the same remarks which I made on the line of road between Spoon Cove and Little St. Lawrence are applicable to this line, with this exception,—that on the former line an attempt has been made to construct a road; on the latter none whatever.

At the north-east side of the village a street has been made, and it is of very great service to the inhabitants, but owing to its ill-construction (of the drains) it will soon want a thorough repair.

From Great Lawn I crossed the neck to Grand Bank, and on my way I found stakes driven in such a manner as induced me to suppose that a preliminary survey had been made. If such be the case, and it is intended to construct a road to connect these localities (which I think not at all necessary for the present) it would be worth while trying whether a shorter and a much better line could not be found before any expense be incurred in constructing a road when it can never be in the slightest degree useful.

Since my visit to this place in 1844, some improvement has taken place in road-making, especially in the construction of the street which runs through the village; also in the road which runs from Grand Bank to Fortune.

It is to be regretted that the Commissioners should have spent more money on this line, at least until it had been re-surveyed, which would have been the case, but for the delay incurred in laying the petition for its alteration before the Board of Control. This delay was occasioned by the inhabitants laying their petition for its alteration before His Excellency the Governor, instead of before their own Board, by whom it should have been transmitted to the Board of Control. Consequently before I reached Grand Bank the monies were expended.

When I was here in 1844 I recommended the Commissioners not to spend anything more on this road, as a much better line could be laid down, and a road constructed at a much less expense. If this had been done the sum of £500 would have constructed a fair wheel road.

The sum of £330 had been already expended in constructing it; in fact it has been almost thrown away, for the road is not yet serviceable. It runs for a considerable way parallel to and very near the sea-shore, which I consider injudicious, inasmuch as it opens but one side of the land for agricultural pursuits.

Large sums have also been expended in erecting bridges on this line, for which there was no occasion (I mean for so many.) There are six altogether, which will not have cost less than from ten pounds to thirty-five pounds each. Now, if the line had been laid down in the direction I recommended, I can safely say, no more than two bridges would be required throughout the whole line, and the widest span would not be eight feet; the cost of a bridge having such a span would be but five pounds; however, as only a small portion of it has been constructed, it may not be too late to remedy its evils, the faults being concentrated on that part which has been but opened. It could be shortened, I think, about a mile.

I would here remark that I found the complaints of the petitioners at Grand Bank and Fortunc, with regard to the defects in the lines mentioned in their petition, quite correct.

From Grand Bank I proceeded to Jersey Harbor, where I found that a piece of a street had been constructed midway between the premises of Messrs. Nicolles and the village, having a width of fourteen feet; it would have been much more beneficial to have made one but four feet in width, its commencing point to have been at Nicolle's establishment, and have carried it round the harbor through the village; in its present state it is of no service, and a street or road of a width of four feet would be quite sufficient. Had this been more general, instead of 14 and 20 feet made in patches, much would have been added to the comfort of travellers, and a great saving to the country effected. (This was strongly recommended by me in 1844.) Where the inhabitants have neither horses nor carts from the village, the line for Little Bay should start; this locality would then have been linked with Little Bay, English Harbor, Boxes, Blue Pinion, St. Jacques, and Belloram, in one chain.

The present line for Little Bay starts about ten perches from the water, at the extreme end of the south side of the harbor, from whence it immediately runs over a steep hill (too steep, in fact, for a bridle road.) The distance between its starting point and the village is about a mile; and no road or path being between it and the village, travellers have to wait three or four hours for a passage to the opposite side; whereas, if it had been made in the manner I have pointed out, there would be both a good street through the harbor and a good local road between it and Little Bay.

This road had been reported to the Board of Control as being opened one mile, fourteen feet wide, drained, levelled, and fit for travelling; (this was, however, ten months before I saw it.) I found that three-fourths of it had been washed away, but the cause was very plain to me from the manner in which the work had been performed on the part left.

The contractors had worked to the summit of the steepest places, it seemed to me, they could find; and in constructing the road, being allowed to throw on the materials nearest to hand without removing the large stones, or without making side-drains, it cannot be wondered at that three-fourths of it should have been washed away. In fact the line to which I have alluded is so much better in every respect that I would recommend its adoption in preference to continuing the construction of the present, and it could be done for one-half the amount.

From Little Bay to English Harbor the route is by water, (distance four miles:) from the intervention of an arm of the sea, which stretches inland about seven miles, the possibility of a road between these localities is precluded.

There is a local road between this village and Boxes, towards the construction of which very little has been done except opening.

From Boxes through Blue Pinion to St. Jacques, as far as the Belloram road, the line has been only opened 18 feet wide, with the exception of about 74 perches near the head of St. Jacques harbor, which has been little more than stumped: very few parts of it can ever be made useful, as in many places the line runs up hills which have an elevation of from 400 to 600 feet. If this line had been laid down with any judgment, 50 feet would have been the highest elevation, and the distance shortened by one-fourth.

Those 74 perches to which I alluded had been reported to the Board of Control as being completed, agreeable to specification; the contractor was accordingly paid. I was much surprised to find it only stumped, where I was almost sure of its being completed; I did not expect to find it perfect in every respect, but I at least anticipated finding it fairly constructed. It is a matter of surprise to me how the Inspector could have passed it, when the work was scarcely in the second stage of construction, neither drained nor levelled.

As yet no bridges have been built on this line; but if it be continued, they will be much wanted.

I think there would be a considerable sum saved by abandoning it *in toto*, for I am sure no reasonable amount would ever render it fit for wheel-work. A magnificent line could be laid down between those localities, and would take less to construct it than to finish the line on which I have just reported by one-half.

From St. Jacques to Belloram a local line has been run; the road is not more than half-constructed; some parts are drained, and a small portion is levelled—the sides and cross-drains are very bad.

This road has been reported to the Board of Control as being gravelled; I could not see any part of it fit for gravelling. A street has been partly made through the village, the whole construction of which is very good indeed, and would require £20 more to continue it through the village.

At Harbor Britain the Custom-house is the starting point for both the local road and the street; the local road runs in a south-west direction round the head of the arm, where about half a mile remains untouched between it and Witchazel Hill.

The street branches off from the local road at about twenty perches distance from the Custom House, and runs with a very fine level directly against the end of the nearest house, from which it runs in an angle to the land-wash.

Thirty pounds were granted for the making of this street; seven have been only spent on it, the remainder being appropriated towards the finishing of the local road.

Although the street branches off from the local road, yet they keep company, for they run parallel to each other; if the line for the street had been continued through the village as far as the sum granted for its construction would permit, and the local road to have from thence taken its starting point, one line would have answered, and the inhabitants would then have been enabled to complete their local road as far as Witchazel Hill, and nearly half the amount now expended would have been saved and built bridges. Instead of doing this, however, the person who laid down the local line seemed to me not to be satisfied with the Custom House as the starting point, but that it should be as high as the Custom House, for he bolted (I think it is the fittest term) over a hill so steep, in fact, that I query if a horse could drag an empty cart to the top.

It is about two miles in length, and varies in width from nine to fourteen feet ; wherever the contractor came to a rock he allowed it to encroach, upon the road, wishing to avoid the trouble which its removal would occasion, notwithstanding he was bound by his contract to do so. I am very sorry to have to state that with these imperfections it was passed by the Board of this locality as completed according to specification.

From the head of the arm the road runs for Witchazel Hill which it ascends and descends till it reaches Connegre Bay ; the part of it which crosses the summit of the hill is entirely useless, and that not only from the manner in which the line has been laid down, but also from the manner in which it has been constructed ; for the material for its formation being taken from the lower side of the road and thrown on the highest part, has formed a deep side-drain, the water in which is constantly undermining the road ; in this it is assisted very much by the upper side-drain and cross-drains not having been made sufficiently deep : consequently the water has worn drains for itself through the road to the lower side-drain, as I before mentioned, injuring the road very much ; it varies in width from three to twelve feet.

Owing to the number of arms which run at right angles with the course, you have to make a water passage of four miles to gain the next settlement, Hermitage Cove.

From Connegre Bay the road crosses a neck of land about one mile and a quarter in length, and its formation is just as incomplete as any I have mentioned. I would here observe that the street in Harbor Britain should have commenced at the Church, and passing by the Custom-House on through the village, have joined the local road, the Church and Custom-House being their only public buildings.

It was with much attention I surveyed the line between Garnish and Burin, for a line to connect the Bays of Fortune and Placentia, knowing the importance attendant on their connection ; and I think that the starting point should be from Bulls Cove in Burin (via Salmonier Bridge) and not from Path-end ; and I am confident that a line of road from this point would not only be constructed for half the amount, but shorten the distance to the different localities on it much more than the present.

This line taking its starting point from Path-end winds round the side of a very steep cliff which, from its dangerous position alone, ought to condemn this starting point.—But to resume, from Bulls Cove, passing over Salmonier Bridge, it should continue as the main line to Lamaline, passing through Great and Little Lawn and the Saint Lawrence branch roads shooting from it at the most practicable points for the following localities, viz. :—Spoon Cove, Garnish, Corbin, Grand Bank, and Little St. Lawrence.

I will here more fully notice the ferry boats crossing Burin Bay to which I have alluded ; there are two—one stationed at Burin Bay village, the other at Spoon Cove. Now, if the line were carried out which I have described, those ferries would not be required, and the yearly sum of twenty-pounds sterling would be saved to the colony.

It may perhaps be alleged that the doing away with those ferries and carrying into execution the line which I have mentioned would, instead of shortening the distance, add to it ; but to any one who has travelled in that direction such allegations must appear extremely futile,—for instance, what can add more to the distance than delay in a country like this, embayed with ice nearly half the year, and subjected (especially in the spring and fall) to high winds, rendering a water passage not only uncertain but perilous, and parties going either to or from Burin from any of the localities before named, hindered by these obstacles, would have to make the best of their way via Salmonier ; but if the line pointed out by me were adopted, the traveller would be certain, and have nothing to fear from either ice or wind—a road which could be as easily travelled by night as by day.

In recommending this line, or the adoption of it rather, there is another object—and a very desirable one, I mean the visiting of these places by the Circuit Judges.

Large numbers of cattle could be also driven from the eastern-side of Fortune Bay to Burin, and from thence by the most convenient route to the metropolis.

If a packet should be established between the eastern and western sides of Fortune Bay, I would recommend its starting from either Grand Bank or Fortune, as at both these places breakwaters are in construction; and, when finished, will make them fine harbors of refuge. The shoalness of the offing at Garnish would prevent the sailing of any craft unless with a fair wind.

The breakwaters at Grand Bank and Fortune would require a further grant to complete them.

The present line from Garnish to Salmonier is fifteen miles in length, and it is one of the most deformed lines that I ever travelled; this was occasioned by its being divided into lots of fifty perches—each contractor making his lot in the direction which gave him the least trouble, and consequently spaces of from three to twenty perches remain unopened or drained between each lot, and this is from the contractors not keeping the same line. Leaving Garnish the first four miles have had nothing whatever done to them; after that it is partly drained and varies in width (between the side-drains) from seven to fourteen feet. It continues in this manner until it reaches Tite's Brook, (a distance of five miles) from which to Salmonier Bridge the road is as untouched as the first part.

This road was reported to the Board of Control as opened, drained, cross-drained, and gravelled (opened fourteen feet wide); the manner in which I found it was very different and shameful.

As Tite's Brook presents a serious obstacle to the traveller when swollen, a substantial bridge will be required over it.

From Tite's Brook to Salmonier Bridge nothing whatever has been done, and any one unfortunately unacquainted with the road is left to get as he may through the woods which intervene between these places.

From the Court-House at Burin to Bulls Cove the line (immediately after passing Shandy Hall) runs up a steep hill, which could have been avoided by keeping its side, and which would have made it more easy of access than running to its summit.

A second line has been run from Shandy Hall, with a view of improving the one I have just reported on; it was carried only twenty perches up the hill. This was done without any communication with the Board of Control, and is as useless as the first.

On the summit of the hill there is about one eighth of a mile, having a width of twelve feet between the drains, which I should call fairly constructed. Regarding this piece then for the use of wheelwork, you can neither get to nor from it. Having descended the hill, the line continues round the cove, and, without intermission, constantly ascends and descends hills which have an elevation of from two hundred-and-twenty to five hundred-and-twenty feet.

From Bulls Cove to Port au Bras, shortly after this line leaves Bulls Cove, a branch road runs from it for Jersey Point; it is to be regretted that the line had not been laid down with more judgment, as the construction of the road is very good.

Many alterations must take place on this line before it can be made safe, even for a bridle road. Before entering the village of Port au Bras the line descends a very steep hill, at the bottom of which a bridge is thrown across the stream, nearly on a level with the sea. It

should not have descended here, but have kept its level for about twenty perches, and then crossed this stream, where an embankment had been by nature already formed to receive a bridge; it would not then have cost thirty pounds to erect, and the road would have kept its level to and through the village, and would also have been extremely useful.

From Port au Bras to Mortier. This could have been made a beautiful line, as well as a beneficial one, but in laying it down a want of judgment has been shown; and I am confident that to lay down a new line, and finish it, the cost would be less than to continue and complete the present one; and this from the numerous and great obstacles which present themselves.

From Mortier to Druidical. This part of the line is very bad indeed, continually running up and down steep hills, rounding a pond, for what, it is impossible to tell, without it was to lengthen the distance about a sixth.

From Druidical to Little Bay. The only feature which the line between these two places presents is, that it is worse; the hills over which the line runs, are, in fact, so steep as to prevent its ever being used as a bridle road. I cannot fancy what object the parties who laid down this line could have had in view; without they wished to have it as long and as useless as possible; this must be apparent to every one, when I say that nearly a level could have been kept, with a very few exceptions, throughout the whole line, (that is from Bulls Cove to Little Bay) and the distance shortened one-fourth; the cost of its construction would have been about half the present.

On Burin Island (which forms the harbor of Ship Cove) there is a local road of about two miles in length, which connects the localities of Olive Point and Great Burin; the line has been imperfectly laid down, and the road as imperfectly constructed. Some attempts have been made to improve it, but without success.

On the 25th August I left Burin for Placentia in the Circuit vessel, having been kindly provided with a passage by his Honor Judge Simms, and arrived at Great Placentia in the evening.

On the Monday following I left Placentia for St. Mary's Bay, and at night-fall reached North Harbor.

With relation to the main lines of roads from Salmonier to Branch, &c., &c., I would beg a reference to my annual report of 1846; in which I spoke of the impracticability of erecting bridges over Colinet and Rocky rivers.

In crossing these places, on my way to St. John's, I regarded them more attentively than before, and I am much strengthened in the opinion which I have there given; and I am quite confident that it would be but a waste of money to erect any bridges across these rivers. It will be observed that wherever a ferry can possibly be avoided I have protested against its continuance, but in this case it is unavoidable, and in this country it would be impossible to throw any bridge across such places sufficiently strong to resist the immense bodies of water and huge masses of ice which rush with a swiftness one can scarcely credit down these places on the breaking up of winter, and in the fall of the year.

The immense expense which would accrue from their yearly erection; ought, I think, clearly to shew the absurdity of erecting them.

From North Harbor I proceeded to John's Pond, and from thence, by water, to Black Duck Gully; the Salmonier road at that time not being opened from Little Bay to the head of St. Mary's. I kept near the sea-shore, passing on by Mussel Pond to the river head of St. Mary's.

From the river-head of St. Mary's to the town, a distance of six miles, the line is quite spoiled, and I would recommend that no more money be expended on that part of road from the river-head of St. Mary's to Goose Pond. It would be only deforming that fine line from St. Mary's to St. John's; and for agricultural purposes it is almost useless, being carried so near the water that the farmer would always have to work up-hill; its length could have been shortened considerably.

From Goose Pond to the town the road requires some alterations, but not to any great extent. If so much had not been done to it I would recommend its alteration.

On arriving at St. Mary's Harbor, I was much surprised on seeing two roads leading from the main street towards the beach, one of which appeared to be in a very bad state, as also the bridge crossing it, which was a mass of rotten wood; the other running nearly parallel with the first, but with a gentle sweep to the northward, having a branch road leading from it in an easterly direction, and evidently the better road; the waste of ground appeared to me to be so great, that immediately on seeing the Chairman, I enquired whether compensation had been given to the parties over which both roads ran? He said that the ground belonged to a private individual, who surrendered his property without compensation, for the first line; but that being abandoned, and a better one appearing a little to the northward of it, the Commissioners agreed to give him back the ground through which the old line ran, on his allowing them to run the second, to which he assented; but this the Commissioners neglected to do, and the land still continues idle.

To the southward of the beach is a pond which is crossed by a well-built bridge, and from it commences the road to Holyrood pond [the distance is about two miles and three quarters,] which is also well made; but it is to be regretted that the line had not, when leaving the town, been kept farther to the westward, passing through a valley, which would not only have shortened the distance, but have given a much easier ascent.

In passing through the main street (which is well made and drained) at the cross-section I found that here also two lines had been laid down nearly in the same manner as those at the south-east end of the town. I remarked to the Chairman that I thought it quite unjustifiable in the Board to keep private property which they had agreed to give up for a further portion, and which they also retained.

The side-drains of the roads under this Board are very inefficiently made, and are now quite choked up; so much so, that the water runs over the road and washes off the surface, which causes continual pools of water on the road; the construction of the roads in general, however, is very good, and this arises from the removal of the soft material, and the formation of a solid foundation.

From St. Mary's I started for St. John's, which I reached the following evening. I remained in St. John's from the 1st of October until the 25th of November, at which date I again received instructions from the Board of Control directing me (at the request of His Excellency the Governor) to proceed to New Harbor for the purpose of working out the balances of the grants Vic. 7 & 9th, and 8th & 4th. On the line of road between New Harbor and Conception Bay, there being no Board, contracts could not be entered into.

It is much to be regretted that there is not means to continue the line from Harbor Grace to and through New Harbor on to Placentia Bay. Few roads would be as beneficial, and on my shewing the numerous localities it would connect, its usefulness and the numberless advantages which would accrue from it will be plain to every one. Harbor Grace, Spaniards Cay, Bishop's Cove, Bryant's Cove, and Island Cove, all these places thickly inhabited, and their local roads joining the main line between Harbor Grace on through Spaniards Bay.

The line for New Harbor starts from the Spaniards Bay road, one mile from the southern bridge of Harbor Grace; if it was made fit for wheelwork all those places which I have named could be supplied with fuel, as well in summer as in winter. As to its benefits arising from agriculture, I have before written in my report of 1846.

As far as regards New Harbor, the Dildoes, Spread Eagle, and Chapels Arm, I have not seen many parts of the country more favorable for agriculture and grazing.

I am satisfied that if a road were made from Harbor Grace to the head of Trinity Bay, where good timber is to be had for ship-building (the people of these localities are excellent hatchet men, and have all been initiated in the art of ship-building) that many of the independent persons of Conception Bay would employ them in this manner; but from the inconvenience attending the want of a road to inspect work, they do not go to so great an inconvenience to give employment, and this is the cause of so much poverty at the head of Trinity Bay. As St. John's is the depot for the produce of Topsail, Portugal Cove, Torbay, &c., so would Harbor Grace be for the above places if this line were adopted; it is the depot now, to a certain extent, but from the inconvenience attending the bringing of the produce on their backs, it is very limited. And also, if a line were opened from New Harbor to Hearts Delight, (a distance of thirteen miles) from whence there is a road to Hearts Content, the inhabitants of the numerous localities to the westward of New Harbor would be enabled to attend the prosecution of the extensive seal fishery which is carried on from New Perlican more numerously; and I affirm, without the slightest doubt, that it would assuage the extreme poverty which has prevailed in these places. The difficulties attending the route from New Harbor to Hearts Delight are so great as to prevent persons from travelling it; fancy, then, the poor fellow who has left behind him an almost starving family, with barely sufficient clothing to cover his limbs, and with hardly a sufficiency of food to take him half the way, dragging his chest and gun a distance (if from New Harbor to Harbor Grace) of eighteen miles, on a road but partly stumped. Perhaps from the delay occasioned by his poverty, he fails in his object: his next chance is Carbonear, and if he fails here, which is often the case, his next chance is New Perlican, and to reach it he must go to Hearts Content; making the distance from New Harbor to New Perlican, by this route, forty miles; whereas, through Hearts Delight it would be but twenty-two miles.

Through the benevolence of John Munn, Esq., several families had been kept from starving, and from depending on Government support, supplying them with provisions, and trusting to their honesty for a return in wood.

On the 23d of December I started from New Harbor for St. John's, which I reached on the following evening.

Before concluding my Report, I would beg to point out a few evils, which I think have occasioned the great delay in the construction of the roads in the Outports.

In the first place, then, from the lines for streets and cross-streets not being laid down before the inhabitants have taken possession of the land for cultivation, large sums have to be awarded to private parties for compensation, which very often absorbs the entire sum granted for its construction. Immense sums have been thus swallowed up, and by the delay which it occasions severely damages the localities.

We have a sufficient proof of this fact, from the prosperity and surprising increase of cultivated land in the localities which can boast of judiciously laid down roads.

Another evil is the laying down lines of roads by incompetent persons, which has also put the country to a great expense. As well where the land has been given gratuitously, as where compensation has been awarded, lines are injudiciously laid down, and what is there-

sult? Why, as soon as the road is opened, that is, when the trees are cut down, the inhabitants of the locality find that they are no nearer to their neighbors or to the capital than formerly. After some considerable delay they obtain a grant to amend the line, and after compensation has been paid, nine chances to one that it is just as injudiciously laid down as the former.

Another error is committed in the lack of judgment shewn in laying down the local lines; for, in numbers of the small localities where but one street is required, the local road ought and could serve two purposes; it is very absurd to have the local road and street running parallel to each other, and in many cases scarcely two perches from each other.

The grand object to be effected is to connect the localities with each other, and with the capital; to do this the greatest care should be taken in laying out main and local lines of roads, in order to construct them as economically as possible.

And again where the lines have been fairly laid down, the carelessness of the Boards in passing them when badly constructed causes as great a waste of money as any of the former errors; thus they allow the contractors to serve their own purposes, and not those of the public.

It would be needless for me here to enumerate the particular places in which these errors exist, as I have already spoken quite fully on them in the foregoing reports of 1845 to 1847; but this I will say, that if the remarks which I made in a former report and of the same tenor had been attended to, the colony would have saved considerably.

The grand object in making roads is to form a solid base, and to effect this the surface material should be removed until a hard base be obtained. On this base a layer of small broken stones of the necessary depth, this being raked level, would be fit for gravel.

I cannot help making some remarks on the streets of this town which are constantly out of repair; and although they are now undergoing, and have undergone, extensive repairs year after year, yet I do say that I am afraid they will be nearly as bad as before, and this from the fact of the non-obtainment of a solid foundation. It is the natural soil which supports the weight of both road and carriage; and if that soil be dry, it will support any weight without shrinking: for, wherever the material is soft and damp, it is to be seen working up through the top layer, why?—Because it is unable to bear the weight which is put upon it, and this is one of the chief causes of the collection of mud on the streets of our town: and until the surface material be removed, and a hard base obtained, they will continue so. Another error is their not being made sufficiently convex to allow for the wear occasioned by the amount of work performed on them.

The next evil is the imperfections in the construction of the cross-drains. I have carefully observed the manner of constructing drains throughout the town; and I am quite sure that drains formed (I may term it bridge fashion) having a sufficient height so as to bring the mouths about eighteen inches above the level of the road, would conduce very much to its preservation.

It must be plain to every one who has observed the cross-drains in this town, that their being constructed with gratings will not answer. They get constantly choked, and consequently whenever we have heavy rain the surface material is washed away and the road rutted to a great degree. Wherever the drains are constructed as I have described them, their beneficial results are to be plainly seen.

REPORT OF THE INSPECTOR OF ROADS AND BRIDGES, AND SURVEYOR
TO THE BOARD OF CONTROL.

On Thursday the 25th day of May I left St. John's, and reached Holyrood at four p.m. the following day: a Limbergrass on Saturday the 27th. Came on the road from Salmonier to the river-head of St. Mary's from the road leading to the ferry. On Monday I left Colinet Arm for the head of the south-east arm of Great Placentia, and arrived there at three p.m. the following day. Visited Little Placentia, and returned the same afternoon to Great Placentia.

On Wednesday the 31st it became wet, and continued so until my return on the 6th June; there were three days that I could not travel.

Between Kelligrews and Holyrood, about one and a-half miles from the former place, a bridge has been carried away. On my journey going I had no difficulty in crossing the stream, in consequence of the dryness of the weather; but on my return, from the heavy rains, had to take a wet and dangerous road to the sea-shore in order to cross; this requires attention, as a traveller and stranger with a horse would endanger his own and animal's life if the river was much swollen. Five pounds, I think, would put a temporary bridge to answer all purposes, until the road is better adapted for wheel-work.

The bridges at Indian Pond are in a very dangerous state, and would require, under present circumstances, plank, to be laid three feet in breadth on the flooring through the middle; this would make them safe for cattle. This road has undergone great improvement since my visit in October last, which adds much comfort to the traveller.

Had the plan as now adopted and recommended in my report of the Roads in the southern district in 1844, namely: of opening them 20 feet wide, draining and cross-draining where required, and then making a middle road of from 5 to 6 feet wide been carried out, all the localities would have had the advantages of a good bridle road to the capital long since, in stead of patches 20 feet wide at intervals, together with the many very expensive bridges.

The road from Kelligrews to Holyrood may be considered on the whole a good bridle road with the exception of a few perches.

From Holyrood to Salmonier there are about 4 miles of detached marshes very bad in wet weather, and in some places not safe for a horse. The remainder, say about one-half or more, is well made, although there are parts little more than opened. The cheapest and most useful way to make the marshes safe is with bridge-work; there is plenty of good timber at hand which will be ready to receive the gravel without further expense. It is well known that wood will not rot in the marshes, nor can the gravel escape through the flooring. A road made on this place will be found better and last longer than on any other. I have seen a good deal of road made in that way, and have made some myself. They require to be made convex so that the water may run off, and by that means will continue in good order for a long time. I think about £300 will make this a safe bridle road.

From Salmonier to the River-head of St. Mary's the line has been laid down with much attention as regards elevation, &c., and I have no hesitation in saying, if ever made, will be the most level line for the same distance in this or any other country, unless a railroad. The officer under whose directions the drainage, &c., was done, after the line being marked out, deserves much credit, not only for the quantity of work done for the amount at his disposal, but also for the faithful manner the same has been executed.

Two bridges of considerable dimensions will be required, as well as many small ones. I think £20 per mile with the same care as hitherto taken, would make it a good and safe bridle road. From Salmonier to Colinet the line is not open. I found some marks, and also a line opened to Coxe's Point, but those I consider undeserving any more expenditure until re-surveyed. Much attention is required in opening both those lines, and my opinion is, they should start from the first bridge, leaving Salmonier, for one mile. £250, I think, would open and make a safe bridle road from Salmonier to Colinet. Here the two ferries could be brought to one (namely the ferries between Black Duck Gully and Jehn's Pond,) as one ferry at Colinet would carry the traveller over Rocky River and Colinet.

A William Davis, the only settler at the head of Colinet Arm, is deserving of this ferry, as he is at great expense by the resort of many travellers at his place. From Colinet Arm to the head of the South-east Arm of Placentia for the first four miles nothing has been done—the line only marked to North Harbor River; the remainder, about fourteen miles, has progressed something farther. From the south-east arm of Placentia, where I fancy they commenced, the road is opened eighteen feet wide, some drains and cross-drains made, and the material thrown on the road; but this only partial, the stumps imperfectly taken out, and after the first five miles much slighted, in many places nothing done, not even the small trees cut or removed, which renders it very laborious for travellers. This part of the road will not bear comparison with works done last winter, at least in any part of the colony that came under my inspection, & I think to carry it out as a good bridle-road would cost about £800 currency.

Here I feel it my duty to state that the line from Salmonier to St. Mary's should have been brought to the head of Mussle Pond, passing Black Duck Gully and crossing the now opened road to the ferry at from one-fourth to three-fourths of a mile south-east of James Whelan's: this would make one line answer, whereas three must be made, to be any way useful to the localities either side of Salmonier Arm. Also the line should have been opened from Placentia to the head of North Harbor Pond, and thence to Colinet; nor would this add anything to the length of road or difficulty in carrying it out, as from seven to eight miles of the road already opened could be made available, and the only part on which anything has been

done. By this John's Pond, North Harbor, and the localities to the south-west of North Harbor would have been benefited, even as far as Branch. The distance from the Head of North Harbor Pond to Colinet is four or five miles: one road would answer for all for that distance. If the present line is made, a second one will also be required for all the localities to the south-west of Colinet.

In my report of 1844, 5, 6, and 7, I have endeavoured to show that if care is not taken to make one line of road to answer as far as it can be useful, we shall never connect the localities with each other or the capital. The colony is cut up in all directions with roads on which more or less has been expended—three-fourths of which will never be made. The line from the South-east Arm of Placentia for the first nine miles could easily be made a railroad of, and the remainder very level, and may be termed a beautiful line: but I want to bring the different localities to the capital by a connexion with all the settlements. A copy of the foregoing was furnished the Executive on 9th June.

I visited the Southern district as far as Renewse. The improvements on the main line of Road from Bay Bulls to Toads Cove (with the exception of one mile near Bay Bulls) have been very great, and with that exception, this may now be termed a good wheel-road. The work done on this line to render it useful has been done under the superintendance of the Relief Committee and paid for in Indian Meal.

From Toad's Cove to Renewse a great quantity of work has been done, but it is far from being completed; great injury has been done to the roads on this line from the inefficiency of the side and cross-drains. A new line has been opened from Aquaforte leading to Renewse, with the funds sent for the relief of the poor. The opening of this line I think a useless expenditure, as it will lengthen the distance and cause an annual repair. The building the bridges and road will cost more than to carry it across to the middle Otter Berry—(a much better line—see my report, 1845.)

The filling up the ravine at Deep Cove, proves that my remarks on that work in my Report, 1845, are correct. Many of the bridges on the main line in the Southern district are in a very bad state.

Left St. John's for the Northern District and arrived in Twillingate on the 20th August. Waited on John Peyton, Esq., who has the superintendance of the work in the Twillingate Board. Commenced inspecting the work in the town, and as far as the back cove. On the 22nd went over all the Branch Roads; found the work well done—great judgment and care has been used, and few localities enjoy the comfort of such fine streets. On the south-side some alterations will be required in the eastern end of the town; this street was laid down in 1837. Twillingate is situated on two islands and separated only by a narrow shoal gut at the western end. A Bridge could be easily thrown across for foot passengers which would be of great utility and may be done for a moderate sum. It is evident that water passages in this country are very inconvenient, especially when attended with high winds and subject to drift ice. The branch and local roads, as far as progressed, are good, but many of them are in the first stage.

The road leading from Tizzard's Harbor to Morton's Harbor has only been opened; it will require some alterations which will be a great improvement, and save expense.

The sum of £50 granted for the road at Change Islands has been well spent; it is opened, drained, cross-drained, and levelled. About the same sum would be required to finish it.

The streets in the town of Fogo have cost large sums. Great want of judgment has been shown in laying them out, and in the sums paid for work.

At Joe Batt's Arm £50 has been expended on a line of road going in the direction of Bard Islands over steep hills, without the least regard to its utility. Had it been carried through the village as a street, and from the village passing through the valley near the Church on to Bard Island, it would have been of very great benefit. A street is much wanted on the south-side of the Arm commencing at the head of the harbor, running through the village, passing the chapel and on to the point where the seal nets are set. In Tilton Harbor the street is very good. The best harbor in the Island of Fogo is Seldom-come-by; it is much frequented by vessels bound north and south. The population has trebled within the last three years; it is about nine miles from Fogo. A road running from Seldom-come-by to the head of Hare Bay and skirting its side to Fogo, and one from Tilton Harbor to the head of Joe Batt's Arm with a short branch to Shoal Bay would make the communication complete.

I next proceeded to Greenspond; the roads here are termed wood-roads, and in a few years will become a mass of rotten wood. They have been made at a cost of 10s. sterling per yard. If the Commissioners had any idea of road-making, they would have commenced at Garland's, and gone in the front of what is known as Slade & Reed's house, in a straight line between Mrs. Bellow's and Mr. Smith's on to the head of the harbor. This would have carried the street through the village and near the water. A solid street could have been made 8 feet wide which would have been quite sufficient in this place, as no horses or carts are likely to be used here, and not cost half as much as the wood-roads. There is another mass of rotten timber from Garland's to Slade & Cox's made in 1839. This should be removed, not being safe to walk on.

From Greenspond proceeded to Salvage. In this village the grants have been judiciously spent, the street running on the side of a cliff for some distance. From Salvage to Barrow Harbor a line has been opened, but nothing more. I consider it a waste of money to do anything more to it, as the present line is carried over very steep hills; a good line can be got and made for half the expense of the present one. The Commissioners of Relief opened a road from the line just described, intending it for the head of Salvage Bay. No judgment in road-making was shown;—it is useless: had it been laid down in a proper manner, it would have been most valuable to the inhabitants of Salvage for Agricultural purposes and for wood-hauling. In this bay there is good ground for Agriculture. Barrow Harbor is a small locality. Here I saw beans, peas, Indian corn, wheat, barley, oats, onions, potatoes and grass, all in a high state of cultivation. From Salvage proceeded to Tickle Cove. The roads under this board are very fair; they have made great improvements. From Tickle Cove to Keels the line is only opened and could be much improved, and the distance shortened; for, in starting, they have wound round a pond, although directly in the line is a narrow neck between two ponds; were a small bridge with a few perches of an embankment raised about three feet, it would have saved three quarters of a mile. The road should have joined the local road from King's Cove to Keels three quarters of a mile to the southward, instead of running as it now does, nearly parallel with it. The road entering Keels has had many difficulties to contend with, running along the side of a steep cliff. It is now used in the winter for wood-hauling: it requires a large sum to render it fit for wheel-work. The road from Keels to Broad Cove, with the exception of the first mile, has had a good deal done to it, and is a safe bridle-road. Little judgment has been displayed in laying down the line, and it would require many alterations before it can be made a useful wheel-road. The same remarks apply to the road from Broad Cove to King's Cove.

From King's Cove proceeded to and through Stock Cove, Knight's Cove, Hammer Cove, Newman's Cove, and Birchy Cove to Bonavista, distance 21 miles. This line, if run with judgment, could be shortened one-third, and a good one got. The present would not, with any sum that the country could afford under the most favourable circumstances, be made

useful even for a bridle-road, and should be laid down even for a wheel-road. It is reported as being opened 18 feet wide; there are places not opened, and so serpentine is the line, that on my getting through the unopened places, I have had great difficulty in again discovering the line. There is one part almost impossible to walk, the descent is so very steep. I do not think 4 miles of it could be made useful—I went twice over this line.

The line from Plate Cove to King's Cove is a fair one, but a most beautiful and much shorter line could be got. From this local road a branch runs to Open Hall.

There is a chain linking Plate Cove, Open Hall, Red Cliff, and Tickle Cove, on to Keels, a large proportion made. Passing through Red Cliff some private property will interfere, if carried as intended by the Board. I do not think it necessary to pay compensation for this, as the road could be carried round at less expense, and in my opinion would be much better. Great improvements have been made on those lines of road by the relief given in employing the poor. The improvements are not only in carrying out the work, but in making alterations.

From Plate Cove the line has been opened to the north-west arm of Trinity, distance 12 miles; the first 5 miles have been opened 9 feet wide, the remainder 4 feet. It is almost a level country. Great improvements could be made if this line started from Penguin Cove on the line leading from Trinity to Little Bonaventure.

There is a road commenced at this point and made for some distance; the intention of which was to carry it round to the north-side of Trinity and continue it to Bonavista, but since abandoned, and a ferry crosses the arm. If this was continued, and a line branching off for the north-side, it would be a great convenience for all parties, as the ferry cannot always run.

I do not think there is anything to justify the opening of a line from King's Cove to Trinity, until the one has been completed to Plate Cove; the distance will be only 18 miles, and the one named by me would answer for so many localities. I shall make more remarks on this line in pointing out a communication for the Northern district.

Should a line of conveyance for the Northern District be decided upon, I feel myself competent from my local knowledge and close investigation to offer my ideas fully on the subject. I would recommend the letters and papers being sent from St. John's to Carbonear, from thence by a post-boy to Heart's Content, by packet to Great Bonaventure—the latter place is a good harbor—a post-boy from thence to Plate Cove, eighteen miles; thence through Open Hall to Tickle Cove and on to King's Cove, leaving any papers or letters at Broad Cove for Keels; there is no other locality at present that would justify the recommendation of a post-boy further on this line. From Tickle Cove, a packet to Greenspond, from Greenspond to Seldom-come-by and to Fogo by the road, from Hare Bay whence a boat could be dispatched through the Change Islands to Twillingate, Fogo being a bad outlet for the latter place. I came in the Packet-boat from Trinity to Heart's Content, and from thence to Carbonear; found some alterations had been made on that line since 1845, but do not consider it any great improvement.

In most of the localities I have visited where the Relief Committee have been employed, I found much useful work had been done (out of the St. John's district); much more than the work done by contracts under the grants.

The road from Portugal Cove requires much repair, and will continue to do so while the road is made so flat and the side and cross-drains are so bad. It will require a large sum

to put it in proper repair as far as the public wharf. There is a great quantity of wheel-work all the year on this road; a large proportion is narrow and would require to be very convex; sinking continually from the very great weight of wheel-work.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF THE ST. JOHN'S ACADEMY FOR
THE YEAR 1848.

*To His Excellency Sir John Gaspard LeMarchant,
Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the
Island of Newfoundland and its Dependencies.*

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY,—

We have the honor to submit to Your Excellency our Report of the state, progress, and condition of the St. John's Academy for the present year.

The number of students, and the course of instruction in which they are engaged, are comprised in the statement recently furnished to us by the Masters of the Academy—Appendix, No. 1. No. 2 Appendix contains a correct statement of the funds at our disposal, the debts due to the institution, and the claims against it.

In the early part of last year the Directors found the Academy considerably in debt, with a decreasing income, and felt it incumbent on them to curtail their expenditure as much as possible; and this consideration compelled them to dispense with the services of Mr. Talbot, the third Master in the Academy, and thus to effect a saving of £100 per annum; to reduce the salary of the Secretary to one-half its former amount; and to take the necessary steps to relieve themselves from the annual rent of £100 for Castle Rennie, with the view of procuring a temporary place for the Academy at much less cost to the establishment.

Under other circumstances, the foregoing statement of the present condition of the Institution might be considered sufficient; but feeling that the Academy has now been in existence for a considerable period, and that a general impression prevails that it has failed to accomplish the objects for which it was established, and aware that it has disappointed public expectation in not affording that general utility which was anticipated from its establishment, the Board have for some time anxiously considered the causes which have retarded its progress, and beg respectfully to submit the result of their enquiries for the consideration of Your Excellency.

We find that from its commencement there have not been more than from twenty-four to twenty-six students in the Institution at any one period; and that in latter years that number

has been gradually diminishing until it has declined to sixteen. This decrease in the number of pupils is pointed out as a proof that the Academy has lost the confidence of the public, and thence it is said that it has become disenthralled to public support; but being sincerely anxious to see maintained in St John's at least one public Institution dedicated to the diffusion of knowledge and education of a higher order, at a moderate expense, the Directors feel desirous to show, if possible, what they believe to be the fact, that its past failure is the result of nothing inherent in the Institution itself, or in the community for whose benefit it was established; but that it is rather to be attributed to the peculiar circumstances under which the Institution has suffered since its foundation.

It has occurred to us that the most obvious cause of the paucity and diminution of students is to be found in the inconvenient situation selected in the first instance for the Academy. When the Directors made that selection it was intended to be merely temporary, and little choice was offered to them. Subsequently, the destructive fire of 1846, and the depression of all interests in the Colony caused by that and other calamities by which it was visited, induced the Board to defer raising out of the £3000 voted by the Legislature, a sum sufficient for the erection of an Academy in a more convenient locality. The Directors, however, feel so convinced that no permanent improvement could be expected until the locality was altered, that they have taken the necessary steps to enable us to surrender Castle Rennie, and thus relieve the Institution from the heavy annual rent of £100; and we are satisfied that we shall be able to procure suitable accommodation of the same temporary kind for all the purposes of the Academy, at much less expense.

The amount of the annual fee for each student had also, we conceive, seriously affected the progress of the Institution; and after giving the subject the fullest consideration, we came unanimously to the conclusion that it ought to be reduced from £8 to £5 a-year. As the grounds upon which we arrived at that conclusion were founded upon a general view of what we conceived to be the object to be attained by the maintenance of this Institution, we beg to submit them for the consideration of Your Excellency.

The Academy, being sustained to a great extent at the cost of the public, ought, in our judgment, to be rendered as generally useful to the whole community as possible; and with that view, we considered how that object could be best promoted, and what were the real wants of the community in respect to education. In considering this subject we have had regard to the other Seminaries recently established here, and we felt convinced that, whatever were the hopes or expectations formed when this Institution was originally founded, as to its being one to be exclusively devoted to Classical and the higher branches of Scientific knowledge, it would be futile now to maintain it with any such views.

We do not, however, mean to say that any branch of education should be excluded from the course of study at the Academy: but we feel convinced that the practical utility of the Institution will be best consulted, particularly for some years, by devoting the ability and energies of the Masters to the duty of imparting a sound knowledge of what may be called an extensive mercantile education, combining tuition in the modern languages, history, and those branches of practical science which will be found most useful in those pursuits which will in general form in after life the occupation of the children of our industrial and commercial community—and at all events, while this species of instruction would be most diligently promoted, that in no case should it be insisted upon as a condition to one becoming or continuing a student in the Academy that he should engage in the study of the ancient languages.—The energetic adoption of a course of instruction on this basis would, we believe, tend more than any other change in the Academy to inspire confidence in the Institution; and it cannot be denied that an opinion prevails generally respecting it, that useful and practical know-

ledge is sacrificed in the effort to teach the higher branches of learning, and the prevalence of that opinion has, we believe, proved most detrimental to the success of the Institution. In after years, as education and knowledge extend amongst this community, a desire for further improvement will be generated, and a large class will present itself, anxious to acquire in the Academy the highest state of mental culture, when all parties, we are satisfied, will unite in the desire to afford the utmost assistance for its attainment.

Entertaining these views, we reduced the annual fee to £5 for each student, believing that that sum was sufficiently high to exclude children who had not made some progress in knowledge, and quite as much as parents in this country would be disposed to pay for perhaps two, three, or four children in each family, for that species of education which they deem most advantageous for their children, namely, that which we have already stated we conceive it ought to be the leading object of this institution to impart.

The efficiency of the Masters has never been questioned, and we are satisfied that the decrease of students has not arisen from any idea that the children were not making fair progress; the prevailing opinion we believe to be in accordance with our own, that the Masters are efficient and zealous. And when a more convenient locality shall have been obtained for the Academy, and the contemplated alterations carried into effect, we are convinced that the Institution will succeed, and that its sustainment would be most beneficial to the public in imparting sound instruction, and also in exciting a useful emulation amongst the other Seminaries in this town.

Report of the present condition of the St. John's Academy.

There are Sixteen Pupils now in the Academy—all these are learning Latin, French, Writing, and Arithmetic, History, Geography, &c. Seven are learning Greek Grammar. Eight Mathematics.

In Latin, 1st class are construing the Æneid and Cicero's Orations.

2nd Ovid's Metamorphoses and Cæsar.

3rd Latin Delectus.

In French, 1st class are translating Telemachus and Echo de Paris

2nd Echo de Paris.

In Mathematics, 1st class are in 3d Book of Euclid and Simple Equations.

2nd class are just commencing 1st Book of Euclid.

In all these branches the progress of most of the Pupils has been extremely satisfactory. It may confidently be asserted that nothing has been taught superficially; the greatest care having been taken to ground the Pupils thoroughly as far as they have advanced. In the study of the Languages a sound grammatical knowledge has especially been insisted on.

REPORT ON THE LUNATIC ASYLUM.

St. JOHN'S, Oct. 31, 1848.

SIR,—I have the honor to lay before you, for the information of His Excellency the Governor, a list of the cases of insanity treated by me during the past year at Palk's farm, together with a statement of the circumstances of this provisional Asylum for the insane, since it was instituted by His Excellency, and placed under my superintendence in November, 1847.

And I cannot but use this opportunity to solicit from His Excellency a continuance of the deep interest which he has constantly shewn in the fate of the afflicted insane, who, cast out from society, and by their immediate friends, become either a reproach to humanity or the objects of its enlightened care.

Their interests having been entrusted to me by His Excellency, I should indeed be wanting in duty as well as humanity, if I did not use my utmost endeavours to serve those who are so helpless.

The house at Palk's farm affords the means of cleanliness and some comfort for the insane, and but little beside. The means required for classification do not exist, not even so as to allow of the separation of the noisy from the quiet:—no securely enclosed airing grounds exist for excited patients—nor the fields necessary for farming operations, to employ the able-bodied, who pass the greater part of their time in listlessness, idleness, and apathy.

It is scarcely possible that any curative treatment can be practised under such circumstances.

All that has been effected is the care and control of all lunatics without the use of strait-jacket, hand-cuffs, chain, or any of the usual means of mechanical restraint; and the personal cleanliness of all—together with good food and some exercise in the open air for the quiet patients. Whereas the excited lunatics, who, of all others, require exercise out of doors to enable them to relieve the excitement of the mind by muscular efforts, have been of necessity confined to the house, and for the most part to their small bed-rooms, for want of securely enclosed airing grounds and internal house-room. The unceasing noise made by a recent lunatic, his threats of violence, and occasional attacks upon the attendants, excite some of the other patients exceedingly; and it has happened more than once that a cunning and treacherous lunatic, who is kept in order in ordinary circumstances, has attempted to assist a violent new-comer in an attempt to overpower the Assistants; circumstances which could not happen if there were separate parts of an asylum for the noisy and the quiet: and in the present place the constant noise of some at night who never seem to sleep, disturbs the quiet, frightens the nervous, and excites the turbulent. It is difficult to get attendants to remain satisfied in an Asylum where such constant noises occur through the nights; so that to sleep is very often impossible for nights together, in certain states of the weather. Sleepless nights make

nervous and discontented attendants, and the patients find in them querulous and irritable superiors instead of forbearing kind friends. Nor is it to be wondered at, if, in spite of all due efforts, such patients so situated necessarily become worse instead of better: and as this applies to the majority of the recent cases, it is self-evident that such a state of things is a reproach to the colony, in which every one is interested in some degree, inasmuch as insanity spares neither sex nor station, and no one can say, I, at least, shall never require the treatment necessary for a lunatic! Those whom God thus afflicts are above all others dependant upon society for help—and now that the proper system of treatment has been pointed out by the medical profession, it appears astonishing that there should be a moment's delay, in those who have the power entrusted to them, in placing Asylums in the state most conducive to the practical working of the system. Is it not as imperative in a country to provide for the insane poor as for the sane poor? Nay, is it not more so?

Without bias, I report upon the present unsatisfactory state of the means at my disposal for the treatment of lunatics. And if I exceed my office in stating my opinions, I beg to observe that the insane under my charge may be said almost literally to have no other friend so situated as to be able to represent their wants and sufferings to those who can relieve them. I speak, then, in the name of those who, tormented night and day incessantly with furious excitement, curse their existence, and with horrid blasphemies demand relief from their intolerable misery! And in the name of those quiet, inoffensive persons suffering from alienation of the mind, who ask why they are imprisoned, and what crime they have committed! I repeat for them, why are they imprisoned? For want of a suitable place, where they would feel themselves free to move about in the fields, and to occupy themselves in the exercise of their several trades—although otherwise secluded from the bulk of mankind!

May I then be permitted to express the hope that His Excellency will soon lay the foundation of a building, suitable as an Asylum, for those permanently bereft of reason, and as a house of cure for others susceptible of treatment. Such an Asylum, also, is especially requisite for those, now living wretchedly clad and fed, scattered amongst the necessitous poor in and about St. John's; whose principal inducement for boarding them, besides the weekly pay, is, but too often, the work which they harshly force from these unfortunates—of whose misery, in some instances, I have been but too well assured by the relieving officer and other persons.

The annexed table contains a list of about one half of the insane in the Island for the past year, the remainder being either in the St. John's Hospital, or at private lodgings. To these may be added certain cases in the Outports. The whole number may be stated to be between fifty and sixty. (There were also several who fell victims to typhus fever in the Hospital, having been directly exposed to the infection of that disease for want of a separate establishment.)

In this, my first report upon the treatment of lunatics, I have considered it advisable to go somewhat into the subject of lunacy, apart from the more immediate business of the Report; and with this view, also, I have added two appendices, to bring before His Excellency some of the principal features of the old and new systems of treatment. Reproaching themselves with much of the evils of past days, regarding the insane, Physicians now strenuously strive to wipe out every remaining stain from their humane profession; and the ready co-operation of all society on its part, in every nation and colony, has produced Lunatic Asylums which do honor to mankind, and atone, as far as may be, for the errors of past ages. Regarding, then, every day that the building of an Asylum is deferred, as an opportunity for good thrown away, I make the more earnest entreaty for a consideration of the circumstances which interfere with the operation of two Acts of the Legislature providing for the building, in the hope that

they may be found less weighty than they seem to be. For, whilst years of delay pass on, misfortunes are annually occurring to the insane which disgrace the country. One is hunted nearly to death in the streets; another commits suicide, and so forth; whilst others wander about the town, injuring themselves and annoying the inhabitants.

The Provisional Asylum has been in existence fourteen months, and during that time thirty patients have been received, seven discharged, and twenty-three are remaining.

So that with the very inadequate means presented by such an establishment, where utility has in every instance given way to rigid economy, some good has been done in the curative treatment of the patients; and too much can scarcely be said of the beneficial change which is apparent in those who, for years inmates of the St. John's Hospital, in a state defying description, are now to be seen in the day-rooms of the Asylum.

I was obliged to commence with bare necessaries; and an economy has since been enforced in the establishment, that has prevented my having such a complete supply of articles of bedding and clothing as to permit them to be kept constantly clean by frequent changes. The Asylum does not therefore present that appearance of extreme cleanliness and propriety in clothing and bedding, which it would do under a more liberal economy.

It is, however, with some satisfaction that I can lay before the Government, documents proving that, exclusive of £125 expended in fitting up the Asylum, the weekly cost of the patients does not amount to the sum hitherto paid at the St. John's Hospital, viz. :—12s. 1d.; yet this includes rent, wages, coals, candles, food, clothing, bedding, and all contingencies. And I may add, that during the past year the following work has been done at the Asylum by the Manager, Assistants, and Patients:—1st., an Out-house built, capable of accommodating fifteen patients, whereby the men are completely separated from the women; 2nd., four water-closets built; 3rd., the mens' garden enclosed, and another neatly laid out garden enclosed with palings, and set apart for the women, besides a flight of stairs built in the cottage by a regular carpenter.

In the present state of the Asylum every additional patient, by dividing the general expense, will help to reduce the cost of each individual; as the diet of each costs but six shillings and nine pence three farthings a-week.

It was made imperative upon me by His Excellency, that the annual cost of the Lunatics should not at Palk's farm, exceed what it had been in the Hospital. I had therefore this problem to solve;—at 12s. 1d. a-week (the presumed cost of diet and bedding at the Hospital for a Lunatic) to supply him with a house, with some airing grounds—exclusive attendants, clothing, house-keeping, and cooking—besides better diet and bedding. The weekly cost of each patient during the past year at Palk's farm has been 11s. 10½d.; the number of attendants three, besides the Manager, Matron, and Kitchen Maid—in all six persons. The other things above mentioned have been supplied. Thus I have succeeded in providing what was required for somewhat less than the prescribed sum. But if successful in the economical boarding of the insane, I cannot say as much for their improved treatment. Great care may make a small amount of the necessaries of life suffice for health and strength; but no care or anxiety will furnish what is, not in small amount, but altogether wanting. With regard to the improved treatment of the insane: viz.—discarding the shameful use of mechanical restraints, and substituting moral control—I have been unable to practice it, except in a remote degree, not having, at Palk's farm, the requisite means.

Touching the non-restraint system, I beg to refer to the appendix, No. 1, where Dr. Connolly says, "I consider it still requisite to remind those who are most anxious to adopt it, that certain conditions are essential to its being successfully maintained."

To me it is a subject of humiliation, that whilst I have discarded many, I am yet obliged, from the nature of the Asylum, to use some means of restraint, which I abhor, and which are known to be injurious to the insane in all cases whatsoever.

The following extract concerning the use and disuse of restraint at Bethlehem, will illustrate my views.

In the report for 1844, page 49, we read:—"From the peculiar character of the cases received into this hospital, it is deemed inexpedient rather than impracticable, to adopt the principle of dispensing wholly with restraint, under all circumstances, yet every opportunity is taken of confining it within the narrowest limits."

Thus it is found to be practicable in recent cases, if thought necessary, as it is by the advocates of non-mechanical restraint; and this evidence from the physicians of Bethlehem plainly shows that the use of mechanical restraint is a matter of choice in recent as well as chronic cases of insanity. The fact that recent cases are more likely to give trouble,—that is, to require more restraint in periods of excitement,—than chronic cases, and that such periods are more constant, proves nothing in favour of mechanical restraints.

In the report above mentioned we find also, that mechanical restraints are nearly abolished; and to this I may add my own observations in 1847, when I saw no instance of mechanical restraint.

"The experience of Bethlehem, however, shows that in any Asylum, *mechanical restraints both irritate and humiliate a patient, &c.*"

P. 50. "Nearly forty-one per cent. of the curable patients admitted this year, were classed as violent or dangerous: above 50 per cent. of the total admissions, thus consisting of a class, *which a few years ago, would as a matter of ordinary precaution and humanity, have been subjected to rigorous personal restraint.* Experience has however shown, and every year confirms, not only the wisdom of a totally different system, but, that *restraint is a highly exciting cause of suicide*: and the fact that no untoward circumstance has occurred in Bethlehen, with so large a number of dangerous patients, while mechanical restraint has not been used for two patients a week, is a most striking illustration of the advantage of this system." At the present moment, the padded room is used at Bethlehem, and the practice of the Physicians seems to have nearly passed through the transition state, between the use and the disuse of mechanical restraints—a proof of the superior practical benefit of the latter system in recent cases when it obtains a fair trial.

I shall never forget the night when the lunatics, who for years had been confined in the cells of the Hospital, were brought to the Asylum. Their haggard looks and the fright of my assistants (who had never seen a lunatic before) at the presence of so many insane persons in

perfect freedom, formed a picture which is indelibly impressed on my mind. Astonishment at first kept the whole group of lunatics perfectly quiet and tractable; and their quick appreciation of the comforts and cleanliness which surrounded them, and especially of the excellent diet provided, kept them afterwards in good humour for a considerable time. Some would always seize my hands to shake, others would forcibly kiss them, so deeply grateful were those poor creatures. And it was not until a week or two had passed away, that they began to give trouble, from the bad habits which they had acquired. It took, however, nearly twelve months' experience of our kind treatment to convince them that, although we insisted upon proper conduct, yet the refractory would only be shut up for a short time in their bedrooms, and not ill-treated. The consequence was, that one man, who is partly lunatic, partly imbecile, said one day, "he hoped they would not shut him up again, for it hurt his feelings."—Words that deserve to be written in gold, as evidence of a sound moral sense, that had been gradually produced in this man by proper treatment; and a sufficient reward to those who have toiled to effect thus much.

From the first, the men who came to us, some of whom were supposed to be incurably dirty, became cleanly from constant attention; an attention which, as may be readily conjectured, was very wearying to the attendants for some time. At present, cleanliness has become a habit, demanding but ordinary care on the part of the attendants to maintain.

Some of the women, however, are constantly dirty in their habits, from debility and sickness, consequent upon years of close confinement and neglect. The great trouble these unfortunates give, and the disgusting duties of the attendants in charge of them, can scarcely be estimated by those unacquainted with Asylums. It requires much encouragement on the part of the Physician to induce the attendants to be still kind and attentive, at all times, in such circumstances; and it is evident that remuneration ought to be given them, in special relation to the nature of their duties.

Of the cases which occur of the worst kind, I shall here relate one:—Mary —, aged 45, admitted December 7, 1847.* State on admission: "A frightful object, in filth and rags; lower limbs contracted, knees touching the chin." She could not support herself in sitting posture, having been lying so long in one position that she seemed to have no legs at all, they were so closely doubled upon her body. She spent the whole day and night in roaring and cursing, saying she was on fire for her sins, and entreating every by-stander to throw her into the sea, as she was not fit to live. The calls of nature were to her—as to the brutes. She tore every article of clothing put upon her, refused to be washed, struggled with and struck the attendants, and seemed to be past remedy.

The effect of the care she received in the Asylum was as follows:—After the first week she remarked, "Ah! I was once a clean woman." Sometime afterwards she asked to see a clergyman, and began from thence to say her prayers at times. She did not give up the habit of cursing for a long time, but it gradually wore off—and at this time she is a modest, cleanly, respectable-looking woman, walking freely about, although some contraction still remains in the hips. Very grateful is this poor woman for what has been done for her. Her mind remains somewhat impaired only, but in the table of cases she is placed amongst those "much improved," although she is so nearly well that she might be named as one of the cured. She had been five years and a-half insane at the time of her admission to the Asylum.

There is another woman in the Asylum whose case is perhaps more striking, from the co-existence of much disease of her body. She was an idiot, as well as otherwise insane, and never evinced the slightest intelligence until one day, a clergyman being at her bed-side, she

most unexpectedly and suddenly cried out, "Oh, Father Forristal, Father Forristal!" She did not, however, show any other symptom of sanity: but from that day I did not despair of her improvement. She has far surpassed my expectations! The details of her case in the day-book are most interesting.

The past year's history of this little community may be told in a few words. After a few weeks' residence at the Asylum, some of the women began to assist in the duties of the house—washing, and mending clothes, &c. ; and although the majority have remained very idle, two or three have been generally doing a little to assist the servants. Some have visited their relatives during the year. The noisy women have been very badly situated. Their airing grounds being in front of the house, they have been necessarily confined almost entirely to their rooms.—In the winter, at the commencement of 1848, the male patients went thrice to the woods, and brought home firewood—principally as a recreation ; for the hire of catamarans and horses rather exceeded the value of the wood. The men were delighted, and all but one worked unremittingly. It was evident enough from these experiments that the permanent male inmates could be induced to do farm-work as a pleasure, and thus help to maintain themselves, whilst materially improving their bodily and mental health. It is notorious that the first day the men were in the woods, a gentleman from town fell in with them, to his great astonishment, while at their work ; and the first man that approached him with his load on his shoulder he recognised as one of desperate character as a lunatic, who had been chained in a cell for 15 years !—The difficulty of attending at one and the same time to those who cannot leave the Asylum, and to those who, whilst in the woods or elsewhere, must be carefully watched to prevent the possibility of accidents, cannot be easily or often overcome in our present position ; and the only other occasions upon which the men have left the Asylum were at the times of potato planting and of hay-making, when they assisted the Manager in some fields of his near the establishment, and on two or three excursions for boughs and young trees, and once berry-picking—at short distances from home. The small garden forming the mens' airing ground afforded a little occupation to them occasionally, but by far the greater portion of their time during the past year has, I am sorry to say, been spent in idleness. One or two of the most handy were engaged in the spring in assisting the Manager and Assistants to build an out-house.

Five or six of the Patients might be continually employed in farm-work if land were attached to the Asylum. The value of the work they would perform is estimated at half the expense of food for the whole number of inmates. It would at least be worth a considerable sum.

The winter is a very trying season for the male patients ; they remain almost always indoors and lose their usual ruddy healthy looks; nor can it be otherwise in the present Asylum.

With regard to their isolation from society, I have endeavoured to mitigate the severity of such a lot by encouraging the patients' relatives to visit them ; and in some instances, I have sent a patient with an attendant or my own servant to visit relatives even as far as Portugal Cove. Nothing can exceed the pleasure and gratification this affords to patients tired of the idle monotonous life of the Asylum, and longing to see faces once familiar, though long estranged from them. What floods of tears I have seen shed by lunatics at the sight of a child, a husband, or a wife, as the case may have been !

In the present Asylum it is unsafe at times for the attendants, as the excitement caused by any one patient becomes communicated to the rest—there being no means of placing the excited patients by themselves—thereby producing much disorder and alarm not destitute of danger, which in a proper place could not happen. As an instance of this, I may mention that a very troublesome patient having been admitted, and being, of necessity, placed with the

others, he struck both of the attendants severely, and by example caused another inmate to do the same. So also at night, it is frequently impossible for the attendants and quiet patients to sleep, as the excited sing and halloo all night long; and fits of excitement being periodical, and varying in the periods of recurrence in different individuals, it may with justice be said, that very seldom indeed is there a quiet night in the Asylum. The effect of this upon the attendants after their daily duties is very bad, making them discontented; and the effect upon the whole of the patients is bad, as one noisy person excites the quieter ones, so that beneficial treatment is scarcely possible.

It is said that the insane should be treated as very young children. Having lost the balance of their minds, that is, the control of their faculties, it is requisite that they become instructed afresh: be taught to think and reason correctly. Now, how can this be the case, if the influences surrounding them are contradictory to each other;—if turbulence and disorder exist in the place of calmness and regularity in the mental atmosphere surrounding them;—if they be exposed continually to a variety of accidental influences? And how can the latter be avoided in a very small, crowded Asylum, without the means of isolation?

The Provisional Asylum has done much for the insane; and yet it is as inferior to a properly-constructed Asylum as it is superior to the under-ground cells of the Hospital. A lunatic is no longer chained to his bed like a beast, nor allowed to lie in filth and vermin, with scarce a covering to his nakedness. He is still, however, a prisoner, unnecessarily, and therefore unjustly. He has not yet obtained such a position as to afford him the means of being cured. If he be tranquil, but nervous, and dreading a recurrence of his fits of excitement, he has no quiet corner to resort to where the noise of others would cease to agitate him! If he be greatly excited and pray piteously to be allowed to walk in the fresh air, his prayer is denied; he must dash his hands against the walls of his cell (7 feet by 5) and rage himself hoarse, in his fury, for hours, until the fit subsides; besides there is no enclosed airing-ground where he might harmlessly walk off his excitement in the cool breeze.

The main obstacle to the commencement of the work of freeing the insane from their cells and bonds, was the want of experienced assistants. When I look back upon our earliest days at Palk's farm—utterly ignorant of their business as my attendants were—I am thankful to Providence that no accident ever happened to check or throw reproach upon the good work we were engaged in. A few untoward occurrences and dangers having been met with, and having resulted harmlessly, gave the attendants experience, caution, and confidence in themselves and the system they help to carry out. Although many anxious moments must be spent by those engaged in such an occupation, I have never heard but one remark—"give us good wages and a good Asylum—then it will be some pleasure to do our work."

So inconvenient is the Provisional Asylum, that the attendants have no separate rooms, or sleeping-places, nor a closet nor cupboard to themselves for any purpose. Can it be expected that any one engaged in a very arduous employment, requiring the most scrupulous and unremitting attention for fourteen hours a day, will be contented without some comfort during the short time allotted them for repose—and when, in cases of temporary sickness, the same distracted noises must be listened to through the livelong night?

The attendants have cheerfully borne their part in the Asylum up to this time; but always with the prospect before them of becoming placed in the new Asylum, where their greater comfort should compensate them for their present endurances. And I must not forget that they are fully aware that they are assisting in the noble and humane undertaking of treating the insane with consideration and kindness, and of restraining their mad violence without one chain, strait-jacket, or any such thing. To do this, and to suffer blows and horrible abuse, surely demands some appreciation and recompense beyond what they obtain.

I may mention in this place that there is one great deficiency in the female side of the house, viz.—there is no second Assistant. The Matron has to discharge the duties of house-keeper and cook, which are evidently enough fully to occupy her time. Yet she, as well as the kitchen maid, is frequently required to assist in managing the patients. This confliction of occupations causes irregularity and confusion; which the employment of a second Assistant would altogether prevent. And I need not insist upon the necessity for strict regularity and order in a Lunatic Asylum.

The two *bona fide* cures which have taken place during the year were of women. And one reason for this fact is, that upon the whole; whilst the patients are more troublesome and difficult to manage in the female wards, yet there is more comfort and cleanliness there than in the male wards—these being of necessity very roughly built, and so incommodious from want of room that it is scarcely possible to maintain decent appearances. Indeed, why conceal the fact—they are out-houses.

It is, unhappily, an unquestionable fact, that although in all countries the idiot and lunatic are considered to be under the especial protection of Heaven, and that, the more so, the wilder the people—yet in the most civilized communities great numbers of the insane were, until the close of the eighteenth century, driven out of the society of their fellows by common consent, as if of inevitable necessity, chained in dens like dangerous wild beasts, and in short, put out of the way in the most convenient manner at the moment attainable—in the hope that friendly death might speedily end their misery.

God helps those who help themselves—says the proverb. If Providence have, as we believe, an especial regard for the mortal bereft of reason,—Providence, we know, works principally through mens' hands—and these having been idle for centuries in the cause of the lunatic, he has been left to his fate—the victim of criminal ignorance and neglect: his existence being forgotten; unless at times the *eclat* of some attempted assassinations turned for an instant the attention of mankind towards the frightful secret strongholds called Asylums, when another insane victim of ignorance was to be suddenly and for ever immured in one of them.

Many, many a madman is conscious of his state, although clouded and undefined to his impaired intellect; and in a far higher degree, of what has been and is being done to him. Thousands such must then have existed for years in a state worse than death. A released prisoner writes the history of his weary past hours, and interests all men in his cruel destiny; especially the prisoner of injustice. But who could write a parallel history of a released maniac of olden times? He never was released!—All society can suffer with Silvio Pellico over his one floweret! But who weeps for the lunatic who said, “Sir, I have not seen a flower or a green leaf these ten years!”

In former days the maniac was the peculiar victim of injustice from his fellows, and the hopelessness of interesting even his own kindred in his fate must have ever been his most hideous reflection. In this Island we have not yet entirely cast off the slough of former days. Injustice towards the maniac still exists.

At the close of my Report I take occasion to remark that I have obviously been compelled to draw a comparison between the state of some of the lunatics as they are in the Asylum; and as they were in the Hospital from which they were sent. I therefore think it necessary to state, that in no Hospital can lunatics ever be kept in a state of common decency—so exclusive and unremitting is the attention they demand. Precisely similar is the comparison that has been made in England, between the insane as they were but a few years since in the Hospitals, and as they are now in the Asylums.

The ceaseless business of an Asylum is admirably described by ESQUIROL, [*Maladies Mentales*, Tome 1.] who lived forty years in one. He says:—

“ What meditations exist for the philosopher who, stealing away from the tumult of the world, passes through an Asylum of Lunatics ! He finds there the same ideas, the same errors, the same passions, the same misfortunes : it is the same world. But in such a place the traits are stronger, the shadings more marked, the colors brighter, the effects more striking ; because man is there in all his nakedness ; because there he does not dissemble his thoughts, does not hide his faults, and does not lend to his passions the charm which seduces, nor to his vices the appearances which deceive.

“ In an Asylum of Lunatics the bonds of society are broken, friendships cease, confidence is destroyed, habits are changed ; one acts without propriety, harms without hating, and obeys from fear ; every one has his ideas, his affections, his language. Having no community of thoughts, each one lives alone and for himself ; egotism isolates all. The language there is *outré*, false, disordered, like the passion it expresses. An Asylum of this kind is not exempt from crime ;—they blaspheme, denounce ; the son curses his father, the mother cuts the throats of her children ; in fine they steal, they assassinate there.

“ If we look further, we see man degraded from the high rank which places him at the head of creation, stripped of his privileges, deprived of his noblest character, reduced to the condition of the most stupid and vilest creatures. He does not think ; not only has he no ideas nor passions, he has not even the determinations of instinct. Unable to provide for his subsistence, he is not even able to approach his lips to the food which affection or benevolence presents to him. He rolls himself in his own excrement, he remains exposed to all exterior and destructive influences, he seldom recognizes his fellow-man, and cannot raise himself to the point of having a knowledge of his own existence.

“ Amid such a confused mass of beings, what application, what devotion, what zeal is not necessary to discover the cause and the principle of so many disorders, to conjure so many diverse passions, to conciliate so many opposite interests ; in fine, to restore man to himself ! It is necessary to correct and set right one, to animate and sustain another, affect the mind of this one, go to the heart of that one ; one will be led by fear, another by kindness, all by hope ;—and yet he who thus devotes himself can only promise himself the good which he does. What can a physician hope for who is always wrong when he does not succeed, and is seldom right when he does, and who is pursued by prejudices even in the good which he has obtained ?”

The following contains the opinions of Dr. Conolly, of Hanwell, on Lunatic Asylums and their inmates; which from the very high standing and great experience of that Physician, will do more to prove the necessity for providing a commodious Asylum and Farm, than anything I can myself say. Dr. Conolly, in his Annual Report of the Hanwell Asylum, of 31st December, 1846, says:—

“On the 21st of September last seven years were completed, during which no strait-waistcoat, muff, leg-lock, hand-cuff, coercion-chair, or other means of mechanical restraint, have been resorted to in the Hanwell Asylum, by night or by day. In these seven years, 1100 cases have been admitted and treated entirely on the non-restraint system; and the number of patients in the Asylum has, during a great part of the said period, amounted to nearly 1000. (There are still some Asylums in England, Ireland, and Scotland, in which such means of restraint are employed and defended; and travellers from various parts of the Continent, and from the United States of America, apparently prepossessed in favour of such ancient and forcible methods of control, continue to pay hasty visits to Hanwell, and to publish opinions condemnatory of the non-restraint system.) In the annual reports of past years, when the experiment was but in an early stage of its progress, and when it was embarrassed by many difficulties, I refrained from engaging in any controversy on the subject, being satisfied that the result would furnish the best test of its being rational and judicious, as well as

humane. If such results had not appeared, it would have been my duty to alter or relinquish any other particular in the treatment of the patients. Now, after seven years' patient trial, during which the non-restraint system has been introduced into many other Asylums, without the occurrence of any accident against which mechanical restraint would have afforded security, I do not think it desirable more particularly to notice the opinions of writers who have sometimes appeared to visit Hanwell more prepared to argue than to observe: nor should I deem it necessary to refer to this part of the treatment, if it were not that I consider it still requisite to remind those who are most anxious to adopt it, *that certain conditions are essential to its being successfully maintained.*"

The Committee of Visitors of Hanwell, in their report of January 19th, 1847, say:—"It affords them the utmost satisfaction, after the experience of another year, to be enabled to speak in terms of still higher praise of the humane system which has happily been progressing in the establishment for some years past, and they have not had the slightest cause to regret the abolition of all restraint, which they attribute to the zealous and efficient manner in which the duties of the officers and servants have been performed. The Committee are anxious to draw the attention of the Court to the report of the visiting physician now presented, as containing matter of great interest and importance, on the humane and successful management of the insane without restraint in public Asylums. The subject is so ably and convincingly brought forward by Dr. Conolly, that the Committee do not think it necessary to add more than their entire approbation and concurrence in the sentiments so well expressed by him.

From Dr. Conolly's Work on the Construction and Government of Lunatic Asylums.

EFFECTS OF NEGLECT.—"It is difficult for the Physician to an Asylum to make others comprehend how important many influences, in themselves apparently trifling, become, when the aggregate of their operation is continually applied to disordered minds. Vulgar approbation is easily obtained by occasional display, although the general character of an Asylum may be that of a mere workhouse or place of safety, in which *nothing is habitually done, beyond employing the patients, and keeping them quiet, for their recovery.* The faults of commission may be few, and of omission many.—The wards may be generally quiet:—there may be a solitude falsely called peace. Contrivance may secure this at all ordinary hours of public inspection, and especially on committee days; and yet the hours of rising and going to bed, and of meals, may often be signalized by irregularities and violence, and the patients may pass a very large part of their time unoccupied, unamused: their hourly comforts little cared for, their recreations quite disregarded; so that many of them become more listless, and even at length incurable, from neglect!"

AMUSEMENTS OF THE INSANE.—"It is the same with the evening parties. The first sight of three hundred insane persons assembled for an entertainment, and stimulated by a lighted and decorated apartment, and the presence of strangers, and the sound of music, and allowed to dance as freely and even as fantastically as each may choose, is one which an unfamiliar spectator can scarcely witness without feeling some immediate trepidation. But in an Asylum where kindness is the rule, and where all the officers and all the attendants, and even the visitors, are known to entertain cordial feelings towards the patients, and where the patients are unaccustomed to any kind of violent treatment, or even to sharp or unkind reproof, it is found that a character of order prevails, which is not lost sight of amidst the excitement

of the liveliest dancing and enjoyment. What appears to be an almost unrestrained activity is moderated by one timely kind and judicious word: and excitement which seems likely to transgress due bounds is suspended in a moment by friendly conversation. When the hour of separation arrives, cheerful faces and grateful expressions show the general good effect of the indulgences accorded, on which, usually, sound sleep is found speedily to ensue.

EMPLOYMENT.—“ Among the means of relieving patients from the monotony of an Asylum, and of preserving the bodily health, and at the same time of improving the condition of the mind; and promoting recovery, employment of some kind or other ranks the highest. Generally speaking, sedentary occupations appear to be less favorable to the recovery of our patients at Hanwell than active occupations. Farm and garden work is not only more active, but more various, and therefore more remedial. This advantage, and that of its being carried on in the open air, and exciting no violent emotions, are justly enumerated amongst its recommendations by Dr. Jacobi.”

DIET.—“ The insanity is itself, in certain classes, the frequent result of half starvation, going on for years or for generations. The body has deteriorated, and the manifestations of the mind fail with the other functions. In some cases the mere diet and general comfort of the Asylum are sufficient, first for relief, and ultimately for cure. Removed to an Asylum, the sight of good food, in sufficient quantity, surprises them: they sit down to their meals ‘free-minded and cheerfully disposed’—one of the sure precepts of long-lasting enumerated by Lord Bacon: they soon become nourished, the body and the mind recover power; and if we do not produce a cure, we produce content, which is a great gain.”

DUTIES OF ATTENDANTS.—“ In Asylums in which bodily restraints are never resorted to, the great substitutes are continual superintendance and care. From the hour of rising to the patient's bedtime, no ward should, on any pretext whatever, be left without an attendant. Without harrassing the patients by useless and continual interference, the attendants must never be regardless of them, or wholly unobservant of their conduct, their manner, their language, and also of their dress, their appearance, their food, their exercise, their occupations, or their amusements. They should always be ready to explain what a patient misunderstands, and to listen to and remedy little grievances which fret the insane. When patients quarrel with one another, they alone can prevent the beginning of strife before blows are struck: and they will find that it is not difficult to do this by separating the disputants, and engaging their attention in something else. As regards the dress of the patients, their care must often be relied upon for maintaining its cleanliness, and its decency; and every industrious attendant will find out that there are many slovenly patients whose habits can be very much improved. Some of them will doubtless try the patience of the attendants to the utmost, and require the same attentions many times a day: but this attention is part of the business of an attendant. By proper attention occasionally through the day, and the last thing at night, many patients may be relieved from the miseries consequent on a neglect of cleanly habits,—others may be encouraged to neatness and order. The attendant should consider it a duty to become acquainted with the characters of the patients under his care, and should be able to give a particular account of them when required. It is often important to the medical officers to be able to get information on which they can depend, relative to many circumstances of the patient's health, and various propensities—as, whether they take food well or not, are active or indolent, good tempered or morose, fond of work or of amusement, or of reading, or any particular occupation for which they require materials or space, or other assistance—and the attendants have the most ample opportunity of knowing all these particulars. Some patients pass a large portion of their time in writing, or in making calculations on paper; and all their requests for writing paper, pens, ink, pencils or books, should be complied with—of course, within reasonable bounds. Their wishes on any subject should be made

known to the physician—as, their wishes to be employed; any particular wish as to their clothing, or articles of furniture, or decorations in their rooms; and especially any desire they may express to see the chaplain or their minister—but no promises should ever be made to them which cannot be performed, and no deception of any kind be practised upon them.”

NIGHT WATCHING.—“The general watching of a large Asylum during the night is of great consequence to many of the patients—some require food, cordials, medicines, cooling drink, or various medicines: some become suddenly violent, and require timely attention, or become dangerous to others. Epileptic patients are constantly liable to severe attacks of their malady: the paralytic and those disposed to apoplectic seizures are subject to sudden and serious accidents: and the suicidal require to be frequently visited. There are patients who evidently suffer most when lying down; there are some to whom the heat of a bed is intolerable.—They have sensations of burning heat scarcely known to the sane. These patients suffer for a length of time from the restlessness which every one knows who has ever known a bad night, but in a more intense degree.—The old method of fastening down such patients in bed made them frantic, and their cries proclaimed their excessive wretchedness.”

RESTRAINT.—“Attendants trained in Asylums where restraints are used, immediately apply them in private and recent cases; thus producing the worst consequences. Of this I meet with frequent and lamentable instances in private practice:—where days previous to the treatment of recent cases are passed in all the misery and disadvantage of bonds, and dirt, and darkness, and unregarded fever, restlessness and thirst.”

“The whole life of the numerous incurable patients in County Asylums must take its character from the *attendants*; and be agitated or tranquil, passed in misery or in content, according to the qualifications possessed by those in whose sole and immediate charge and power they must necessarily be for the greatest part of every day. Every thing that a judicious Committee wishes to be carried into effect—every comfort that the benevolence of the officers would wish to confer,—every appliance of daily treatment,—every curative means will be either realized or withheld, according to the character of the attendants. They are the instruments by which every great and good intention is brought into hourly practice. It is not necessary to say more to prove how important it is that they should be well chosen, well governed, well taken care of, well supported in their duty, and well paid!”

“I hope my concluding words will be believed when I say, that if the whole of the system which I have imperfectly endeavoured to sketch be steadily persevered in,—no anger,—no severity—no revenge,—no deception—no disregard ever shown to the insane,—the resident Superintendent will no longer find himself living among the habitually furious, or the incurably gloomy, or the constantly discontented. Calmness will come,—hope will revive, satisfaction will prevail. Some unmanageable tempers, some violent or sullen patients, there must always be,—but much of the violence, much of the ill-humour, almost all the disposition to meditate mischievous or fatal revenge, or self-destruction, will disappear. Some of the worst habits that beset the poor lunatic will also be got the better of,—cleanliness and decency will be maintained, or restored,—and despair itself will sometimes be found to give place to cheerfulness or secure tranquility.—I could walk through such an Asylum as I have described, and point out illustrations of every word in every ward.

“Thus living and thus occupied, the director will learn to love his people, with all their infirmities, which are their afflictions. The Asylum is his world. The patients are his friends,—humble, but not without even delicate consideration for others,—wayward, but not malignant, except when cruelty exasperates them—capricious, but not ungrateful,—distrustful, but to be won by candour and truth,—disturbed and grievously afflicted, but not dead to some of the best and purest affections. He will almost regard his patients as his children;

their cares and their joys will become his, and, humanly speaking, his whole heart will be given to them."

In another part of his work, Dr. Conolly says—

If experience did not always prove that improvements of any kind are slow, and invariably met by opposition, we should be at a loss to account for the fact, that in England, twenty-three years after the liberation of the lunatics at the Bicetre, a state of things equally bad, if not worse, generally existed. From the evidence given before the Parliamentary Committees in 1815, we gather facts, supported by the evidence of the attendants themselves, almost too horrible to be credible. Every artifice of cruelty seems to have been employed upon those who were already the most unhappy of mankind. The idea seemed to prevail that all the feelings of humanity were extinguished by the visitation of insanity. The keepers were, in all the English madhouses, of the lowest and most brutal character, merely distinguished by their success in controlling the violence of their patients by still greater violence, and by possessing the power of punishment. The account of the inquiry into the management of the York Asylum in 1813, written by the late respected Mr. Grey, gives probably a true picture of the state of the condition of the insane in general.

"This Asylum was opened in 1777, and bore a fair character for organization and management. Upon the establishment of the Retreat, at York, in 1796, a more humane system than had hitherto been known in England was introduced into its management; and in the description of it by the founder, Mr. Tuke, published in 1813, a recommendation of the milder mode of treatment was given; this was considered, and with some reason, to be an attack upon the management of the York Asylum; and it was followed up by a series of charges brought by Mr. Godfrey Higgins against this latter institution. The horrors ultimately made known would be beyond belief, were they not amply attested, and were it not certain that in some private Asylums things are little mended even now. Though the Committee of the York Asylum long refused to listen to the charges brought by Mr. Higgins, they could not entirely conceal the facts; and the extent to which frauds of all kinds were carried by the steward, assisted much in developing the general state of the house. A committee of inquiry was appointed; and on the day after their deliberations ceased (28th December, 1813), one wing of the Asylum was destroyed by fire. There could be no doubt of this being intentionally done, and that it was done to destroy the part of the house most obnoxious to inquiry. How many patients perished is unknown—at least four were missing. The steward barred the gates, to prevent the entrance of those who were willing to assist; and nearly all the officers and attendants were away. The steward entered four patients who were missing as "died," but it is far more probable that a larger number was sacrificed; the real number in the house was probably unknown—for either by negligence or design the books had been so irregularly kept, that the number of deaths to July, 1813, actually 365, was entered as 221, and 101 of those dead had been calculated among the cures. The Committee refused to adopt the only method of ascertaining the number missing, by requiring from each keeper an account of the patients under his care, from a pretended delicate objection to the divulging of the names of the inmates.

"Mr. Higgins thus sums up the state of the management of the house:—"In the Asylum investigations, concealment appears at every step of our progress: 365 have died; the number advertised is 221. A patient disappears and is never heard of more, and is said to be 'removed.' A patient is killed, and his body is hurried away to prevent an inquest. He is cured—but it is by some medicine, the composition of which is only known to the doctor. The public cry out that a patient has been neglected; there is a levy *en masse* of respectable governors to quell the disturbance, and to certify that the patient has been treated with all possible care, attention, and humanity. A committee of investigation desires to be shewn the

house; certain cells 'in an extreme state of filth and neglect' are omitted to be pointed out to them. The governors examine the accounts;—there are considerable sums of which neither the receipt nor the application appears. They inspect the physician's report;—it only aids the concealment. The steward's books are inquired for—in a moment of irritation he selects for the flames such of them as he thought it not advisable to produce;—and yet every circumstance of concealment is imputed by some to mere accident, and every attempt to tear off the mask, and exhibit the Asylum in its true character, is stigmatized as a libel or an indelicate disclosure!

“ The details which were brought before the Committee to exhibit the brutality and profligacy of the keepers need not be repeated; but it is gratifying to find that Mr. Higgins persevered, notwithstanding the obloquy heaped upon him, until a complete change of the officers and of the system was brought about.

“ In 1815 Bethlehem appeared to have been going back rather than improving, for a half century. From the time that the indiscriminate visits of the public had been prohibited, the secrets of the institution were known only to a few. The case of Norris, a patient in Bethlehem, which was made public by the parliamentary committee, has often been related, but it will not be out of place here:—William Norris had been an officer in the navy, and was first confined at Bethlehem in 1801. In 1803 he is said to have struck Mr. Haslam, the apothecary—and whether from any real fear of him, or as a punishment, a new and most ingenious instrument of torture was invented for his confinement. ‘ A stout iron ring was riveted round his neck, from which a short chain passed to a ring made to slide upwards on an upright massive iron bar more than six feet high, inserted into the wall. Round his body a strong iron bar, about two inches wide, was riveted: on each side the bar was a circular projection, which being fashioned to and enclosing each of his arms, pinioned them close to his sides. The waist-bar was secured by two similar bars, which, passing over his shoulders, were riveted to the waist-bar both before and behind. The iron ring round his neck was connected to his shoulder by a double link. From each of these bars another chain passed to the ring on the upright iron bar. His right leg was chained to the trough in which he had remained thus encaged and enchained twelve years. He read books of all kinds, and reasoned quite coherently on the events of the war! During the whole of this period it was impossible for him, from the nature of the restraint in which he was placed, either to stand quite upright or to lie down at ease. It will be no matter of surprise that he died on the 26th February, 1815.

“ From this time a gradual but very slow improvement in the condition of the insane may be observed. Chains were removed, and leathern restraints of much milder kinds substituted; and more care was given to the warming and clothing of the patients. Some of the largest Asylums in England were opened between 1815 and 1825. The introduction of employment by Sir William Ellis at Wakefield, and afterwards at Hanwell, was a great advance in the amount of confidence reposed in patients; employment has since been introduced in almost every Asylum, and no serious accident, so far as we are aware, has ever occurred from allowing the use of tools. The credit of declaring the total abolition of mechanical instruments of restraint to be desirable and practicable, belongs to Dr. Charlesworth and Mr. Hill, of the Lincoln Lunatic Asylum. The progress of the alteration was given by Mr. Hill, in a lecture delivered by him at the Lincoln Mechanics' Institution, 21st June, 1838, and since published with the addition of extracts from the ‘ Proceedings ’ of the Asylum, and tables shewing the gradual disuse of restraint. A reference to a few of these will illustrate this part of the history of the non-restraint system. The Lincoln Asylum was opened on the 26th of April, 1820, and was conducted from the first on humane principles, but with all the usual instruments of restraint.

“ On the 29th February, 1829, it is reported that a patient has died in the night in consequence of being strapped to the bed in a strait-waistcoat; and an order is consequently given that the use of the strait-waistcoat shall be discontinued, except under the special written order of the physician: and also that every case of restraint shall be entered in a journal, with its nature and duration.

“ On the 4th May, in the same year, the ‘heaviest pair of iron hobbles,’ which were jointed, and weighed 3 lbs. 10 oz., and the ‘heaviest pair of iron hand-cuffs,’ which weighed 1 lb. 5 oz., are ordered to be destroyed; five strait-waistcoats are likewise condemned.

“ Numerous entries in 1829, 1830, 1831, and 1832, prove the diminished use of coercion. On the 16th of July, 1832, is the first order for strong dresses for such patients as tear their clothes. These patients were in all Asylums the most subject to continual restraint.

“ 21st July, 1834. All the instruments which would confine the fingers were ordered to be destroyed; but manacles for the wrists, and leg-locks, were retained. March 1837, the system of restraint was entirely abolished.

“ Mr. Hill’s lecture, which contains much that is exceedingly interesting upon this subject, has the following sentence, which has been the test on which all the controversy on the abolition of restraint has been founded—

“ ‘ *In a properly constructed building, with a sufficient number of suitable attendants, restraint is never necessary, never justifiable, and always injurious in all cases of lunacy whatever.*’ This sentence, when published in 1838, was declared, even by those most inclined to the new system, to be too decided, and likely to produce a bad effect; but fortunately the lapse of eight years has proved its perfect truth, by its adoption as a principle in all the most important Asylums in the kingdom. But the upholders of the old system received the announcement of a doctrine so startling as if there were something atrocious in proposing to liberate those who were unfortunate enough to be insane: and for years after restraint had been actually abolished, the non-restraint system was declared ‘utopian’ and impracticable; then, declared to be practicable but not desirable; and at length, when every other argument has failed, those who have so strenuously opposed it come forward and claim it as their own system, which they have been practising for years, excepting that it is carried a little further:

“ With the results before us of the treatment of many thousand patients without restraint, and taking into consideration the facts, that in no Asylum where the new system has been introduced has it been found necessary to abandon it; that the reports of all these Asylums declare their general condition to be improved; that the cures are not decreased; and, which we consider of equal importance, that the comfort of the incurables is greatly increased,—we consider ourselves justified in considering that the strait-waistcoat, the coercion-chair, and every kind of strap and instrument of restraint will shortly disappear like ‘the dark house and whip,’ the chains and straw, the starvation, the whirling chair, and every other means of torture formerly considered a necessary part of the treatment of those who were afflicted with insanity.

“ Here we may consider the subject of non-restraint concluded so far as its practicability is concerned. If no case requiring restraint has occurred in an Asylum containing nearly a thousand patients, during six years, in which time eighteen hundred cases have been treated, it is unlikely that any more difficult cases can occur elsewhere. *It is nowhere insisted that restraint can never be necessary in ill-constructed Asylums;* and until houses for private patients are constructed for the purpose for which they are used, some restraint will probably be used in many of them.”

QUARTERLY REVIEW, JUNE, 1844.—(*Article on the Report of the Metropolitan Commissioners in Lunacy to the Lord Chancellor.*)

“The history of insanity exemplifies an observation frequently made, that in many of the greatest calamities that befall mankind, the most poignant miseries are those which are superadded by human folly and ignorance to the dispensations of Providence. During the reign of Terror, Pinel obtained permission to free his chained maniacs from the Commune. He began by liberating fifty, the first twelve of whom were the most violent in the establishment. The experiment entirely succeeded. (1792.)”

“In England, the first improved system was set on foot by the Society of Friends (1793.) This ‘Retreat’ was opened under the direction of the Tukes at York.

“The exposure of the shocking treatment of lunatics at the York Asylum, at Bethlehem’s, St. Luke’s, and Hoxton, produced a lasting impression. The fact having been demonstrated, that a kind and gentle treatment may be advantageously substituted for harshness, a reformation of the old hospitals was carried into effect, and new Asylums were set on foot, professedly on this principle. In County Asylums, where adequate means of classification and employment were at hand, it was discovered as soon as the experiment was made, that personal restraint may for the most part be dispensed with, if *due vigilance is used to prevent accidents*, and a sufficient number of attendants are at hand to overpower resistance when necessity requires. In proportion as restraint was discontinued, it was observed that the inmates of Lunatic Hospitals became more tranquil, more cheerful, more disposed to give assistance to the superintendants, and less mischievous, irritable and destructive. It was no longer impossible to cultivate gardens to which they had access, or to preserve glass windows. These were no longer guarded with lattices, nor were the walls built so high to prevent escapes. In fact, moral principles were substituted in the government of these reformed Asylums for physical force.”

To this I beg leave to add a relation of the *first attempt* made to ameliorate the condition of lunatics :—

“Towards the end of 1792, Pinel having many times urged the Government to allow him to unchain the maniacs of the Bicetre, but in vain, went himself to the authorities, and with much earnestness and warmth, advocated the removal of this monstrous abuse.—Couthon, a member of the Commune, gave way to M. Pinel’s arguments, and agreed to meet him at the Bicetre. Couthon interrogated those who were chained, but the abuse he received, and the confused sounds of cries, vociferations, and clanking of chains, in the filthy and damp cells, made him recoil from Pinel’s proposition. You may do what you will with them, said he, but I fear you will become their victim. Pinel immediately commenced his undertaking. There were about fifty whom he considered might, without danger to the others, be unchained, and he began by releasing twelve, with the sole precaution of having previously prepared the same number of strong waistcoats with long sleeves, which could be tied behind the back if necessary. The first man on whom the experiment was to be tried was an English Captain whose history no one knew, as he had been in chains forty years. He was thought to be one of the most furious amongst them : his keepers approached him with caution, as he had, in a fit of fury, killed one of them on the spot with a blow from his manacles. He was chained more rigorously than any of the others. Pinel entered his cell unattended, and calmly said to him, ‘Captain, I will order your chains to be taken off, and give you liberty to walk in the court, if you will promise me to behave well, and injure no one.’ ‘Yes, I promise you,’ said the maniac ; ‘but you are laughing at me, you are all too much afraid of me.’ ‘I have six men,’ said Pinel, ready to enforce my commands if necessary. Believe me then on my word, I will give you your liberty if you will put on this waistcoat.’ He submitted to this willingly,

without a word; his chains were removed, and the keepers retired, leaving the door of the cell open. He raised himself many times from the seat, but fell again on it: for he had been in a sitting posture so long that he had lost the use of his legs; in a quarter of an hour he succeeded in maintaining his balance, and with tottering steps came to the door of his dark cell. His first look was at the sky, and he cried out enthusiastically, 'How beautiful!'—During the rest of the day he was constantly in motion, walking up and down the stair-cases, and uttering exclamations of delight. In the evening he returned of his own accord into his cell, where a better bed than he had been accustomed to had been prepared for him, and he slept tranquilly. During the two succeeding years which he spent in the Bicetre, he had no return of his previous paroxysms, but even rendered himself useful, by exercising a kind of authority over the insane patients, whom he ruled in his own fashion."

The following Extract from Dr. Stabb's paper in the Journal of Psychological Medicine, January, 1848, contains a description of the present state (1847) of the finest Asylum in France, and perhaps in the world. This document will show what *can* be done for Lunatics:

"La Salpêtrière is an institution containing 5000 females, of whom, on an average, from 1400 to 1700 are insane poor of all ages (formerly of old age only). Attached to the Asylum are three resident physicians,—M. Lelut being the principal; and two physicians-in-chief non-resident, MM. Falret and Mitivier.

I was taken to every part of this colossal establishment by M. Battelle, who, with an earnestness that could spring only from a heartfelt interest in the subject, explained minutely the actual state of everything connected with the department for the insane, as well as the successive steps by which the whole had been brought to its present state of perfection,—a designation which I think is justly merited. For if much remains to be done, or is rather being done, in exchanging old things for new, in parts of this princely pile of the days of Louis Quatorze, there is nevertheless at the present moment an ample provision of means—perhaps superior to that of any other asylum in the world—for the curative treatment of the recently insane, and for the care and comfort of those afflicted with chronic insanity. And it is somewhat worthy of mention, that the saloons of the indigent insane are adorned with marble, polished oak, and spotless white draperies—yet it need not excite a word of cavil; for, as my excellent conductor observed, solid oak and marble would last for centuries, and such Asylums were not built for a day.

With regard to the inmates of this institution, as of Hanwell, it may be said such happy influences surround them, that their insanity is veiled from the passing observer: and when amongst them the question arises involuntary in the mind, are these really insane? In La Salpêtrière the insane are placed in five distinct divisions of the buildings, which are for the most part new, and under the direction of M. Battelle, so arranged as to present a succession of apartments equally remarkable for size and elegance, and admirably adapted to the comforts of the patients. For the sake of classification the divisions are appropriated as follows: One for insane epileptics; one for the chronically insane; and two for the insane under treatment, or the curable. For those under temporary excitement there is enclosed a large grassy court with Swiss cottages disposed around, containing one room each. To each division is attached an extensive airing court, with trees, small gardens and grass plots, for exercise and amusement. For the use of the whole establishment there are large kitchen gardens within the walls, which are cultivated by the insane of this Asylum, assisted by others from the Bicetre. Within the buildings are found large dormitories of superlative cleanliness, well lighted and ventilated—the floors of oak, beautifully waxed. The beds are arranged on a

raised platform on either side, leaving a wide passage through the centre of the ward; the bedding is remarkable for snow-white linen, heavy blankets, and numerous thick mattresses. The windows of the dormitories are large, and open in six compartments; they have curtains, and are unguarded by iron sash, bar, or wirework, except in certain wards having an exterior aspect. It is said that the window panes are never broken by the patients, and the small high window is never introduced here.

“ The dormitories open by glass doors into convenient day-rooms, where I found the patients at various times, busily occupied with the needle—chatting and singing.

“ The general arrangements are so intended as to divest the minds of the inmates of any feeling whatever of imprisonment. And whether occupied within doors, or enjoying the fresh air without, the insane at Salpêtrière appeared free and happy. The diet at this establishment is unexceptionable. The dining tables are covered with oil-cloth. The dishes and spoons are of metal; and the knives and forks of the ordinary kind.

“ The clean linen saloon is one of the finest and handsomest apartments in La Salpêtrière, containing the general supply for the hospices and hospitals of Paris—all sewn, washed, and assorted by the insane.

“ Shortly after my arrival I was present at one of M. Falret's weekly re-unions of the insane, when recitations and singing took place by the patients, who appeared much interested, especially in the songs, when many united their voices. They sat in number about a hundred, variously dressed, and sewing, except when required to recite. Their cheerful countenances, when singing, showed the pleasure they experienced, and the general occupation combined with amusement—the physician and attendants being present as encouraging friends,—could not but have a beneficial effect upon their disordered minds, whether in promoting the dawning convalescence of some, or in soothing the morbid irritability of others,—a beneficial, curative effect.

“ With regard to the quietness of so many assembled lunatics in different stages of various mental maladies, M. Falret observed that he had at length succeeded in obtaining complete control over the actions of his patients, (however difficult it might be to direct their thoughts in any given channel). Now as no effort was observable on the part of the physician or attendants in maintaining quietness and decorum, the influence of their presence alone was evidently sufficient to induce the patients to control themselves—a great step, as it appears to me.

“ Amongst the hundreds of insane in this Asylum, in vain did I look for the furious maniac: almost in vain for the excited;—the ordinary calmness of the numerous patients, consequent upon their excellent general treatment, is the reality which impressed itself on my mind from my visits to La Salpêtrière.

“ Besides those whom I saw in the day-rooms, dormitories and airing grounds, I observed some hundreds of insane employed in various ways—spinning, sewing, tailoring, washing, hanging out clothes to dry, gardening, and farming; all quiet and orderly, under the superintendence of respectable-looking attendants.

“ The chapel, on an equally grand scale with the other buildings, can contain as many as Notre Dame, viz., 2000 people: it is octagonal, and divided into so many compartments, some of which are set apart for the insane, who frequent this place of worship with the best effect upon their minds, and always behave with reverence and decorum. I entered it in the evening, and observed about a hundred people there, some praying aloud. To the insane the benefit of such attendance, and of the religious instruction carefully and wisely administered under the guidance of the Abbe Christophe, is constantly extended.

“ On quitting La Salpetriere, I could not refrain from observing to M. Battelle, that the realization of such perfect cleanliness and elegance, not to say magnificence, in a public charity, was extremely difficult of belief, even to an eye-witness, and the fact may be fairly doubted by others ; whilst the knowledge of this being the Asylum provided for the poor and miserable, the epileptic and insane, savoured more of romance than reality. But it is indeed a reality worthy of a great nation, and a striking example of the true practical genius of christianity.

“ I have described the beneficial effect produced on the insane by M. Falret’s re-unions for singing, recitation, &c. At the Bicetre, I was present at a more remarkable re-union—a re-union of idiots ! These unfortunates had been taught dancing and singing, fencing, military drill, recitation, writing, and arithmetic—with such Herculean pains of philanthropic hearts, as few can imagine !

“ The previous day I had visited the school in which these lessons were received in a dull, obtuse, mechanical manner by the poor pupils, who were drawling in the monotonous tones of a village school ; and it was only on observing the revolting countenances around, that a visitor became necessarily aware that he was amongst idiots. What an occupation,—the cultivating of minds, all but utterly sterile ! And what can repay the originators of this Divine work ? unless it be the consciousness that they, and the labourers in it, are permitted to clothe with sense and reason, however limited, those whom a mysterious Providence has placed on the earth clothed with something like brutality !

“ The holy attempt to awaken faculties hitherto dormant, to restore to themselves and to God, as it were, those lost minds, demands the praise of mankind, as the most stupendous of human endeavours,—endeavours happily not without success. Gleams of intelligence shine occasionally through the mental darkness, and these, fostered during days, months, and years, have in certain instances increased in number, and have even become combined into a steady, continuous, mild light of reason, shining from the erewhile vacant eyes of the idiot—*Charles Emile* for example !* and this is the recompense of the teacher !

“ At this re-union, eighty-four boys, idiots and epileptics, were present, and went through their various exercises with considerable skill and great propriety, under the direction of M. Vallee, their superintendent and instructor. M. Battelle, who accompanied me, was much moved, and said he could scarcely refrain from shedding tears as often as he came amongst these children. My own feelings at witnessing, for the first time, such an unparalleled scene, were painful as well as pleasing, in a high degree.”

* An idiot who has been wonderfully brought forward, from a most brutal state.

in reference to the Colonial Building and Market House, with Report of Commissioners.

St. JOHN’S, 12th March, 1849.

SIR,—I have the honor to state, in reply to your letter of the 10th, on the subject of the Supplementary Estimate for the completion and furnishing of the Colonial Building, excavating, surrounding area, building retaining walls, and out offices, and raising a terrace on the south front, that it is by no means essential that the whole of the work embraced in the estimate should be proceeded with immediately ; and that if the Commissioners think proper, they

may limit the additional expense to be incurred to the amount required for raising a road or causeway, to approach the front entrance, sloping off to the right and left; and also to slope off the ground to the distance of ten or twelve feet from the face of the building all round. This may cost about £400, and if performed, would amount to so much work done towards its final completion, as originally contemplated.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY,—

The Commissioners for the erection of a Colonial Building and Market House beg to bring under Your Excellency's notice the annexed Report of their Superintendent, which shows the progress that has been made in these buildings, and the sums required for their completion. The question of the conversion of that part of the Market House which is on the level of Duckworth-street, into a Court House, with its attendant offices, was brought by the Superintendent under the consideration of the Commissioners. Its obvious advantages induced them to make such an arrangement with the Contractors, with respect to the building, as would admit of this conversion being effected, provided the necessary funds could be obtained.

The Commissioners feel confident that an alteration which, for the comparatively small cost of £1500 will provide a Court House of larger dimensions than that which existed previously to the fire, a Sessions Room, Magistrates' Office, and indeed all Offices in any way connected with the Courts, will be generally esteemed a great benefit to the Colony.

Your Excellency will see by the Superintendent's Report, and the financial statement accompanying it, that the cost of this alteration, with some other charges not originally contemplated, will require between £3000 and £4000 in addition to the £22,000 which the Commissioners are now authorised to raise; and to meet this, as well as to provide some furniture and fittings for the Legislature on its meeting in the new building, they pray Your Excellency, in transmitting this Report to the House of Assembly, to recommend that an Act be passed authorising the Commissioners to raise a further sum not exceeding £4000.

The Commissioners anticipate, with much satisfaction, the completion of the Market House at an early period of the approaching summer, and the Colonial Building being sufficiently advanced to enable the next Session of the Legislature to be held within its walls.

SIR,—I have the honor to transmit the following abstract report of the state and condition of both of the Public Buildings which are now in progress of being erected in this town, and to request that you may submit it to the Commissioners appointed for erecting a Colonial Building and Market House in the town of St. John's.

The Colonial Building was commenced in 1846, under a special contract with Mr. James Purcell, for the sum of £14,935 sterling, and to be completed on or before the first day of January last past. Disappointment in the arrival of some of the materials, and a variety of other causes, which the contractor could not control, have prevented its completion within the time specified. The masonry is now nearly completed, the roof is framed and on the building, the joists and quartering fixed to a considerable extent, and the joinery in progress. There are also very considerable portions of the various materials requisite for finishing now on hand; and there is no reason to doubt that if the work be proceeded with and carried on with due energy, that the whole may be completed during the next summer.

Advances have been made to the contractor up to this time, amounting to nearly £8,700; the incidental expense in the purchase of land, premiums for plans, superintendance, &c. &c. may amount to about £1500 more, and an additional sum will be required for raising a terrace or approach on the south front, completing area walls, out-offices, and fences, and for furnishing the building when completed, which may amount to £1900, making an aggregate sum for this service, amounting to £12,335.

Taking into account the materials now on hand, and available for the purposes of the Building, together with the progress made up to this time, I am fully of opinion, and have no doubt, that more than two-thirds in value of the works specified and contracted for have been performed. On resuming the works in the early part of last summer it was found that a partial subsidence of the mason work had taken place on the interior of the surrounding walls, owing to the dissimilarity of the stone of which these walls are constructed—the outside courses being of limestone ashlering, having smooth, straight beds, lying closely together, set with oil-putty and very little mortar, while the inside being built of rubble-stone of various sizes: and although no small degree of attention and care was observed in setting them; it was discovered that they settled down as the work was raised, more than the corresponding courses of ashler works; which, from the closeness of their joints when set, could not become more consolidated, nor yield to any weight that might be placed on them. The effect of this was to produce a partial inclination inwards in the exterior walls, and which, although scarcely extensive enough to be of any serious importance, yet, if permitted to remain, would doubtless hereafter be considered as defective; and to prevent which, I felt it my duty to complain of it, and to bring the matter under the view and consideration of the contractor; and it is due to him to say, that on my so doing, he made no difficulty in taking down nearly the whole of the work on both flanks of the building as low as I directed, which was to the bottom of the string course on the level of the principal floor, and rebuilding them in such a manner as to effectually prevent a recurrence of any similar defect; and in connection therewith he has also substituted two stone-walls for plastered partitions across the building underneath the two superior rooms; this too was done with the view of increasing the strength and stability of the basement of the building. The contractor complains, and perhaps with some reason, that while he has been subjected to considerable expense in excavating and draining to carry off the water from the proper site of his building, as he is bound to do, that this expense is increased, and that he is frequently annoyed by the surface water from the adjoining ground, which is several feet above the level of the founda-

tion, and submits that the Commissioners should relieve him of this by causing an outside surrounding drain to be dug, which would carry off this surface water that so frequently annoys him.

In the autumn of 1847 a contract was made and entered into by the Commissioners with Messrs. Parker and Read, for the erection of a Market House on Church-hill, for the sum of £6053 sterling, which was engaged to be completed in the month of October last past.— They were, however, prevented from entering on the work until the following spring; the mason-work commenced in May, and proceeded with such celerity as not to be exceeded by any corresponding amount of work I ever saw performed. The walls are now up to their full height, and the building roofed in; a part only of the wall on the south front has not been carried up, partly with the view of making some alteration in the elevation, but chiefly from an apprehension that it might be attended with some risk if the whole were raised to the full height so rapidly, where the facing was of cut-stone and the inside of rubble.

It was provided that this should be a substantially strong building, devoid of ornament or decoration: it is faithfully executed so far as it is advanced, and the contractors have spared neither pains or expense in rendering it so; it would have progressed to a greater extent than it has at present, if it were not for the alterations made in the original plan.

During the time the excavations were being made, and between the time of perfecting the agreement, and the commencement of the mason-work, the Road Commissioners, or their agents, thought proper to excavate and lower the face of Water-street to a considerable depth, at the foot of Church-hill; the effect of which has been, and now is, to increase and render more difficult the ascent leading to the Market House, and also the height of the foundation walls, involving a proportionate amount of expense, consequent thereon. It has been found necessary to increase the height of the principal story about two feet more than is indicated in the plans, in order to assimilate this floor with the level of Duckworth Street; this too will occasion some small additional expense.

In the progress of the work last autumn, and when it had attained a height a little above the level of Duckworth Street, it became a matter of serious consideration with the Commissioners, if a very important saving could not be made to the Colony, and at the same time to effect a most desirable object, by converting the upper floor of this building, which is on the level of Duckworth-street, into a Court House, and appurtenant offices. It was considered that this floor was by no means essential for the purpose of a Market Place; and on due investigation it became apparent that there was abundant space on this area for a Court Hall, much larger than any heretofore had, together with a Sessions Hall, Police and Sheriff's Offices, Judges' Chamber, Registrar's Office, Library, Jury Rooms, and all the minor offices and accommodations that might be required. It was also found that this conversion could be made without any sensible alteration in the general features or character of the building, requiring only to have fire-places and flues in the walls, to suit the respective offices, and some slight alterations in the position of the windows.

Under these circumstances, arrangements were made with the Contractors, who have undertaken, free of any additional expense, to make the alterations required in the windows, and to construct the chimnies and flues to the height of the eaves, with the understanding that they should receive a fair remuneration for any additional work they should perform above the roof. The chimneys are now built conformably with this intention; the flues drafted, and converging, so as to come out in a shaft through the pediment on the east front, and in a similar manner towards a low gable, to be built on the western side. I would here remark that although the saving to the Colony by this arrangement may be very great, yet, to carry it out in a proper and efficient manner, must be attended with some considerable ex-

pense. This is purely a matter of calculation, and after taking into account the quality and extent of the work to be performed in fully finishing the Court Hall, the Sessions Court, and the whole suite of Offices, together with the additional work consequent thereon, I am humbly of opinion that the sum of fifteen hundred pounds would be a suitable and reasonable amount to appropriate for this branch of expenditure.

The Contractors have received about £4300 up to this time. They are of opinion, and insist, that their contract is considerably above two thirds completed; in this I differ from them, and think that they are yet short of two-thirds. It is true, they have timber and lumber enough on the premises; they have also large quantities of ashlering, and flags for flooring, but not enough for either, and even now they appear to be going on quite vigorously; they have a great number of stone-cutters and carpenters at work every day; still I am of opinion that taking all into consideration, it does not amount to the point they state.

The roof of this building, as may be seen, is so well and substantially constructed and secured with suitable iron works, that although the span exceeds sixty feet in breadth, it neither has, nor does it require a single post or column to support it, even if loaded with six times the weight it is intended it should ever carry.

The Contractors express their fullest determination that their engagement shall be completed early next summer; and if they but proceed as they have hitherto, there is no reason to doubt of their fulfilling this intention.

 REPORT OF THE COMMISSIONERS OF LIGHT HOUSES.

The Commissioners of Light Houses in submitting their annual report have the pleasure of being enabled to refer to the satisfaction the several establishments under their direction continue to afford to the trade.

By a report recently made by their Superintendant, and which is herewith transmitted, it will be observed that the Light House at Cape Spear, owing to the injuries it sustained in the gale of 1846, which were only partially remedied, will now imperatively require extensive repairs. The report also suggests with reference to the Light at Fort Amherst, that this Light should be removed to the North-head at the entrance of the harbor. The colony is annually put to considerable expense for repairs at this establishment, while the Board have no direct control over it—their tenure being one of mere sufferance. The amount expended since the Light was established here would have enabled the Board to erect a more expensive building than the report of the Superintendant contemplates. The Board fully approve of the recommendations contained in that report, and trust they may be enabled to carry its suggestions into effect.

The Commissioners have ascertained by several interviews they have been favoured with by Lieut. Colonel Robe, R. E., that the Home Government have determined on the erection of two Light Houses—one at Cape Pine, and the other at Cape Race; and that measures are in progress so that these erections may be commenced early in spring. These objects so long desired and so essentially important, it is highly satisfactory to find, are so near to their accomplishment, and the Board have little doubt that their utility will be experienced in the diminution of the losses of life and property which have hitherto so repeatedly occurred on that portion of the coast.

In connexion with this subject, the Board would again beg to draw attention to the charge for the maintenance of these Lights which they have frequently urged should not be wholly borne by this Colony. The Lights will be more especially valuable to the trade of the other British Provinces (particularly Canada) than to this; since already all the losses that have taken place in those localities have been Timber Vesselshomewardbound; and as it is these oft-recurring casualties that have led to the proposed Lights, it is manifestly right that those who are to derive the main benefit should at least participate in the expense of their maintenance. The Board accordingly trust that the necessary measures may be adopted to secure the co-operation of the governments of those Provinces in defraying the charges which the annual support of these Lights will occasion.

In the month of May last, owing to his ill health, the Board acceded to an application from the keeper of the Harbor Grace Light House for leave of absence, which has since been followed by his resignation of office. The Commissioners have accordingly appointed in his place Mr. Edward Oke who had had an acting charge on several former occasions, and in whose capacity and character the Board have every confidence.

SIR,—I beg to acquaint you that I have lately visited and inspected the Light Establishments at Cape Spear, and at the south-side of the entrance to this harbor, and now to submit the following report for the information of the Commissioners of Light Houses.

The building at Cape Spear, with the exception of the Light Room, is in every respect in good condition; and although the Light-keeper seems fearful, and complains that when the wind blows strongly that the building shakes, I am convinced that he need feel no apprehension, and that the house is substantially strong, that the chains and stays which secure it to the rock foundation are as perfect as when they were fixed; and the whole is requiring nothing beyond merely incidental repairs, and which involve but very trifling expense.

I regret that I cannot report so favorably of the state and condition of the Light-room, and that these apprehensions which I always entertained as to the propriety of fixing the lantern and dome on a wood frame as there constructed, have been here realized, and that the whole of this frame-work, surrounding and supporting the light apparatus, requires to be altered and renewed.

In reporting to the Commissioners on a former occasion with reference to the Light House at Cape Bonavista, I felt it my duty to suggest the expediency of having the Light-room built of hewn stone, to the height of the sole-plate of the lantern; believing as I did that in a short time it would be found the most convenient, and least expensive. I was led to this conclusion from my observation of the effect of the high winds upon the frame-work supporting the lantern and dome at Cape Spear, which had not then been many years constructed, yet sufficiently indicating that it could not last long, that it was not fitted to carry the superincumbent weight, nor strong enough to resist the force of the storms. The Commissioners thought proper to adopt the plan so recommended for that station; and now, if it should so happen as that by the force of a storm the surrounding building should be blown away, there is no reason to apprehend but that the light-room, the lantern and dome, and the pier on which they stand would remain intact and uninjured.

The opinions formed with regard to Cape Spear have been since verified; the wood-frame, which is of soft timber, and but indifferently constructed, has been found to yield more or less during every heavy gale of wind, the joinings becoming more and more loosened by every successive storm, until the memorable gale of the 19th September, 1846, which blew there with such violence as to completely uplift one side of the building several inches off the foundation (to which it again settled down on the storm subsiding) and so shook the frame-work of the light-room, standing as it does, partly above the building, and carrying the heavy lantern, dome and apparatus, as to crack or start every pane of glass in the lantern, and rendered the whole tremulous and infirm ever since—particularly on occasions of the wind blowing high, as sometimes to cause the machinery to stop, and at all times to demand the utmost care and vigilance of the Light-keeper. This is the shaking which the Light-Keeper feels, and of which he is so apprehensive, and not of the frame-work of the dwelling-house; for, on the occasion of that gale, the Commissioners are aware that the building was chained down to the rock on its four angles, and it has continued so ever since, quite undisturbed.

With the view to the permanent efficiency of the light at Cape Spear, and ultimately to save expense, I would respectfully submit for the consideration of the Commissioners the expediency of the light-room there being made in every respect similar to that at Cape Bonavista. It is true that in the first instance it must, of necessity, be somewhat expensive; but even so, the saving that may be made in a few years will more than cover the outlay; still leaving the establishment in a perfectly good condition. And I would here remark that although a good and well-constructed frame of sound hardwood, as of oak, might serve to support a stationary light, it would yet be scarcely fit to carry a revolving light and apparatus in exposed situations, when firmness and stability are so requisite for the steady movement of the train-work and machinery.

Should this proposition be approved of, I would submit that no time should be lost in making and preparing a plan and specification of the work, and that it should be offered for contract by public competition, as I have no doubt that persons would be found of fair character and pretensions, who would undertake to perform the work for a fair compensation, and who would give sufficient security for its being completed in a proper and substantial manner.

The chief inducement to enter on the work at present, would be that the heaviest and most expensive part of it, which is the stone-cutting, might be performed during the winter and spring months, while workmen may be had on much lower terms than in the summer; besides, it would enable the party who may contract to proceed with the work in the early part of the season, which is so essential to its efficiency and durability.

With respect to the small harbor Light at Fort Amherst, taken in connexion with the military establishment there, I have to report that although comparatively large amounts of money

have from time to time been expended in endeavouring to uphold and repair them ; and that even late this autumn, they had some repairs by direction of the Commanding Royal Engineer. They are now in quite a dilapidated condition, and require to be renewed or repaired in almost every part of them. They have been reported a day or two ago as having suffered severely from the late gales, having part of the barges and the chimnies blown away, the sashes blown in, and the wet penetrating into the light-room. I shall take advantage of the first favourable day to inspect them.

The lantern here is quite a flimsy concern; it was constructed about thirty years ago, and is now so infirm and decayed, as that, if touched at all, it must be renewed; but even this of itself would not be so important, if it were not for the fact that the whole concern is in such a decayed and worn-out condition, that it is difficult to determine at what point to begin. If this light were unconnected with any other consideration than merely to serve for the direction of vessels into this port, I would respectfully, though strongly, urge the expediency of having it taken down altogether, and removed to the north-side of the Narrows. It might be placed on the crest of the hill, south-easterly from the Block-house ; it would have a greater elevation than it has at present, it would not be so much embayed as it is, and would be sooner and better seen in coming up from the northward. A cottage of twenty-five by thirteen-feet with a linhay to the rear which, when in every respect completed, need not cost £200, would be abundant for every useful purpose ; no lantern would be required, as the light might be projected from the sitting room at the eastern end where it would be continually under the keeper's eye.

Should no superior considerations induce the rejection of this proposition, there is little reason to doubt that in a very few years the saving in expense in upholding the old building at the South-side, including the bridges and fences on the wayside which must be also maintained, would more than equal the outlay, and any expense required for repairs to the cottage would be little more than nominal.

SIR,—I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your letter dated 26th January, enclosing by directions of His Excellency the Governor, extracts from an Address from the House of Assembly, and requiring me to furnish for their information a Return of Fees received or receivable by me under the 15th, 36th and 37th Rules of the Supreme Court, with the fees received on Bail Bonds, together with the Fees taken and received for Bonds of Indemnity, &c.

In compliance therewith, I have the honor to enclose a detailed Return giving the names of the Plaintiffs and Defendants in each case, and the amount of Fees received or receivable thereon, under the 15th, 18th and 37th Rules of Court, from the 1st. July to 31st day of December 1847, and from 1st January to 31st day of December, 1848, inclusive.

The amount receivable under the 36th Rule of the Supreme Court is for the person employed to take charge of property when under attachment, and not a fee for the Sheriff; consequently no account for sums paid for this service has been kept by me, or the amount returned to Government either before or since the passing of the Commutation Act; it is generally paid by the Plaintiff or Defendant to the officer in charge of property on his being released therefrom.

It forms no part of the Sheriff's duty to prepare Bonds of Indemnity; consequently there is no fee provided by the Rules of Court for this service.

Fees received and receivable by me previous to the passing of the Commutation Act, as incident to the office of Sheriff for services performed for Government, are set forth in vouchers approved and certified by the Judges of the Supreme Court, and forwarded with my annual Return of Fees for the approval of His Excellency the Governor.

The return for 1848 accompanying this, shows the amount of £840 3s. 9d. sterling, received and receivable by me, in addition thereto. The sum of £14 14s. lost to my office by Legislative enactment must be added, making the total £854 17s. 9d. sterling, as fees of office for the year 1848.

In justice to myself I think it right to state, that although ten or twelve applications had been made to him, it was only this day the last of the Attorney's accounts for the twelve months with my office was corrected, and a balance admitted to be owing of near £70; and that His Excellency may form some idea of the difficulty in the way of giving the information required by the House of Assembly in the accompanying Return, and that no unnecessary delay has been caused by me, I enclose a copy of a memorandum kept of the calls made upon another of the gentlemen before his account was adjusted, leaving an admitted balance of upwards of £50.

PUBLIC CEMETERY.

*VICTORIA by the Grace of God of the United
Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland Queen
Defender of the Faith.*

TO ALL TO WHOM THESE PRESENTS SHALL COME, GREETING:

KNOW ye that We of our special grace certain knowledge and mere motion have given and granted and by these Presents do for Us our Heirs and Successors GIVE and GRANT unto the Right Rev Father in GOD Edward Lord Bishop of Newfoundland and his Successors in our Island of Newfoundland all that piece and parcel of Land situate and being about one quarter of a mile North-easterly from Fort William and upon the South-side of the river running into Quidi Vidi Lake abutted and bounded as follows That is to say by a line commencing at a point on the Eastern side of a Lane or Road communicating with the Quidi Vidi Road and from whence the centre of a bridge on the said last-named Road bears South twelve degrees thirty minutes West distant two chains and forty-nine links thence running in an irregular line North-westerly six chains and ninety-two links more or less thence bounded by land in the possession of Benjamin Greer Garrett running North-easterly eight chains and seventy-four links more or less to the River aforesaid thence following the windings of the same North-easterly and South-easterly nine chains and thirty links more or less to land belonging to the estate of the late Rev. COMMUNICATIONS FROM MAGISTRATES OF TRINITY, BONAVISTA, TWILINGATE, AND CARBONEAR.

To His Excellency Sir JOHN GASPARD LE MARCHANT, Knight, and Knight Commander of the Orders of St. Ferdinand, and of Charles the Third of Spain, Governor and Commander-in-Chief, in and over the Island of Newfoundland and its Dependencies, &c. &c. &c.

The Petition of the Clergy and Magistrates, &c., of Trinity, Commissioners for the Poor.

May it please your Excellency,—

Your Excellency having been pleased to honour us with Commissions in behalf of the destitute of this District, and to grant a certain supply of food to be disposed of at our hands, we feel it our duty, at this juncture, to solicit your Excellency's consideration of our affairs, with the view of obtaining some further assistance for conducting the work in which we are engaged.

With four hundred and seventy individuals on our list, and the prospect of the same number being kept up, even after the men have gone to the ice, from fresh applicants for relief, and with but thirty barrels of Meal left, one of which is necessary each day to prevent the people from sinking under their distress—we have only enough remaining of the one hundred barrels sent to this place to last through the ensuing month.

We beg to observe that with the exception of widows, the fatherless, the aged, and sickly, we have for the most part issued but the very scanty allowance of a half-pound ration. The work of giving out to the people is done gratuitously, and the empty barrels are sold for the general benefit.

We would also add that, but for the lateness of the season and the severity of the weather, every one able to work would have laboured for the relief afforded. As it has occurred, road-work could not be done, and able-bodied men have had enough to do to procure fuel sufficient to keep their families (so destitute both of wearing apparel and bedding), warm enough to preserve life.

Convinced that we have used every scrutiny in our power, and studied the greatest economy in attending to the duties which thus painfully devolve upon us, and that without some further aid to sustain the destitute through the months of March and April, at the least, there will be great distress,—we implore your Excellency to consider our case, that by your Excellency's recommendation and instruction the needful and timely assistance might be afforded.

And your Petitioners as in duty bound will ever pray.

Sir.—

Do us the honour to acquaint His Excellency the Governor that the Seventy Barrels of Meal shipped by His Excellency's order, for the relief of the destitute families in and about this place, have been received in due course, though the Despatch of 15th December, intended to accompany it, did not reach our hands until within a few days since, when we received per "Cornhill," *via* Catalina, a further supply of Thirty Barrels, which though timely in arrival, we regret to add is insufficient to meet the wants of the destitute around us; and although we have effected the reduction of some 60 persons from our list, that number has been more than counterbalanced by fresh applicants for relief, whose necessities have compelled them to resort to us for relief, so that the number of destitute now amount to 623 persons from hence to Upper Amherst Cove, and 50 persons inhabitants of Knight's Cove, for all of whom we have now on hand no more than one week's rations, at half-a-pound per head.

In this distressing dilemma we are quite at a loss how to proceed, and unless we abandon those unhappy families to their own resources, which we have every reason to believe are completely absorbed, must resort to some parties, the holders of Meal at this place or at Trinity, for a temporary supply until we can receive his Excellency's command thereon. For the present time till 1st May, we estimate that we shall require one hundred barrels of Meal, at least, to sustain the parties above alluded to, for we respectfully presume that they must not be abandoned to their fate, or let loose upon society to help themselves wherever resources may present themselves in this or the neighbouring settlement.

The King's Cove Meal is also expended at that place, Broad Cove, Keels, Tickle Cove, and Stock Cove; 210 persons, besides widows, aged persons and their families, have been relieved;—they will require a further supply of about 40 barrels of Meal to sustain them until the end of April, that is in the event of their not obtaining Seals in all March. This is a perplexing and unhappy state of things, and is beyond our control, but nevertheless the general state of the District is considerably improved since this time last year, when the number receiving relief were more than double those of the present year.

Murphys, that if they will join with me in guaranteeing the payment of a sufficient quantity of meal to subsist the parties requiring relief until the navigation opens, I will join with them, and with yourself, and do the needful, either here or at Trinity.

I have not the least hesitation in saying that the Government will meet the charge, as I have already written his Excellency the Governor that the quantity shipped was insufficient to meet the wants of the destitute.

Unless I am met by yourself, and the gentlemen at King's Cove, in this way, I will not make myself personally responsible to do the needful for your portion of the district, nor will I be answerable for the peace and security thereof.

Michael and John Murphly, the former of King's Cove, and the latter of Keels, to become with myself security for the same being repaid by the Government.

Sir,—

Do me the honour to submit the foregoing Correspondence for His Excellency the Governor's consideration, it being illustrative of the present posture of affairs around us, which begin to wear a serious aspect. Although I have offered the King's Cove gentlemen to join with them in procuring relief for the destitute around them, I do not calculate upon their lending their assistance. In the event of the people being thrown back upon their own exertions there will be but little respect for property. Mr. Brown's store at King's Cove has already been broken into and a small trifle of meal and bread taken therefrom, and threats have been thrown out of their coming hither to force Mr. Shears's. With regard to his offer of supplying a reasonable quantity of Meal, the terms being exorbitant and the time limited for returning a loan, should we accept of it, being too limited, we have not as yet attempted any arrangement with him; he being the only holder of meal in this place, and there not being any at Catalina, leaves purchasers pretty much at his mercy.

I fear we shall also be compelled to sustain the inhabitants scattered along the shore between the Cape and Bird Island Cove, which is within the Trinity electoral district—that is, judging from present appearances, for their supply is about exhausted.

Being so situated, and anxious to avoid all unnecessary responsibility, I crave His Excellency's instructions how I am to act in the present distressing posture of affairs around me.

We have neither Indian Corn Meal, Flour, nor common No. 3 Bread to dispose of, but we have a little No. 2 Bread; and if the Trinity Poor Relief Commissioners should, at their meeting to-day, decide on requesting us to supply them on Government account with 25 bags of No. 2 Bread, we will do so, provided our neighbours, Messrs. Robinson, Brooking & Co., will come forward with meal or bread on a similar scale as to price, and to an equal amount. Should they, however, object to this, on the plea of being short of those articles, we will obviate that difficulty by lending Messrs. Robinson & Brooking & Co., 25 bags of No. 2 Bread, to be returned at their convenience in the months of May or June next.

A sample of the Bread is annexed, and the price will be 26s., per bag, and which is 4s. per bag under the rate we are charging our dealers in account for the same article.

Sir,—

On the 29th of January I addressed you my monthly report of the state of the district and of the poor, whose numbers underwent no change during the month of February. March has now opened with a prospect of a diminution, by the employment of some of them in the Seal Fishery. Thirteen vessels will take away about 450 men.

The supply of meal having been exhausted, on the 21st February purchased 15 bags bread from Messrs. Robinson & Brooking at 26s., and from Messrs. Slades, 15 bags at the same price; the former has been issued at the rate of $\frac{1}{2}$ lb. per day to each individual requiring relief. I regret that the number of applicants have compelled the Committee to adhere strictly to this allowance, which is insufficient, except the parties are in situations to add something to this scanty supply.

The probable number to be provided for during the next two months, will be about 255; an equal number are taken from the Committee by the supply given to families who have some member in the Sealing vessels.

No Seals, and but few birds, have been taken in this or Bonavista Bay.

The smallpox has disappeared from this part of the district, but is still in Catalina.

No crime has been committed.

Sir,—

On the 2d instant I had the honour of addressing you on the condition of the district; the Packet-man having failed in his endeavours to get across, in consequence of the Bay being full of ice, I have now an opportunity of making an addition. The Sealers having sailed on the 3d instant, and Messrs. Slades and Mr. Stoneman, having in some measure provided for their Sealing crews, the Committee relieved 237 persons last week with 8 cwt. bread, being on an average $3\frac{3}{4}$ lbs. for each person, for the week. Some persons coming in from British Harbour this week, will increase them to what I said would be the number for the months of March and April. The thirty bags bread obtained from Messrs. R. B. & Co., and from Messrs. Slades, have been consumed, and the Committee have been obliged to have recourse to the same gentlemen for 16 bags more, which will probably last until the 24th instant. If the Committee could have procured Indian Meal, it would have done better, but none could be had here. The poor, that is the really poor, are suffering great privations, being as much in want of clothing as of food.

Sir,—

I have the honour to acknowledge the receipt of your letter per Harbour Grace messenger, on the night of 16th inst. On that day I wrote to you by the Carbonear messenger, Hurley, by which you would perceive that the distress of the North Shore was augmenting daily, and that a large supply of Meal would be absolutely necessary to save the poor people N. East of this from starvation.

I regret now to be obliged to inform you, for his Excellency's consideration, that in consequence of continued demands for relief from all parts of the North Shore, hence to Lower Island Cove, my stock of Meal is all but exhausted, and I have failed to procure any in Carbonear or Harbour Grace from the merchants, on any terms. Here there is none for sale, but in Harbour Grace there is a small quantity in the hands of Mr. Ridley and Mr. Munn, which they are unwilling to part with.

I know not what to do, and can only recommend his Excellency, earnestly and respectfully, to send hither a supply direct from St. John's, without any delay, for it is awful to contemplate the state of the range of District hence to Bay de Verd, and all depending upon Carbonear for relief. The three first days of this week we supplied ninety-eight heads of families, and these two days we have been saved from extraordinary demands by the state of the roads only, which are impassable.

Doyle's boat has not yet commenced running for Portugal Cove, nor will she ply between this and there until after March, so that we can only expect our supply from St. John's direct.

I am almost certain to be compelled, by the necessities of the poor, to purchase biscuit, or any substitute for Meal that I may be enabled to procure, to save those in destitution from destruction.

Sir,—

On the 23rd instant I had the honour to address you on the subject of the wants of this district, and acquainting you at the same time, for His Excellency's information, that I had not succeeded in purchasing meal, either here or in Harbour Grace—and in consequence, requesting an immediate supply from St. John's, to check the destitution of the North Shore, which seems to increase almost every hour, and more especially since Rev. Mr. Norris and Father Duffy, have directed their suffering poor to me.

Although my letter of the 23rd has not yet left Carbonear, I feel called upon to inform you that I saw Mr. Ridley yesterday, and that I have now a strong, though not a positive expectation of receiving some meal from him to-morrow or after, suppose ten to twenty barrels, in which case

I shall be enabled to get through this month, when I must depend altogether upon St. John's for a supply to meet the pressing demands of a line of coast extending upwards of thirty miles N. E. from Carbonear.

Doyle's boat may possibly leave here in all this week for Portugal Cove, but more probably on Monday, 2nd April; and unless His Excellency should order a quantity of meal to be sent hither direct from the capital, it would be most desirable to have a quantity sent on to Portugal Cove, to meet Doyle's boat, and so prevent delay.

Mrs. Moran, the widow, from Ochre-Pit Cove, came up on Monday, when I satisfied her, tolerably well, with one barrel meal.

The two men, Brien and Walsh, continue to tease me respecting the Bridge job, over the drain in the main street of this town.

Sir,—

In reply to your letter of yesterday, I beg to state that the petitions presented to his Excellency the Governor last Spring, on the subject of the Prescott-street Fire-break, having been referred by his Excellency to the Council, after much consideration of the matter the Honourable Messrs. Thomas, Robinson, and myself were appointed a Committee to ascertain by what means, and upon what terms, McLarty's Lane might be kept open, and a fire-break still be preserved of the width prescribed by the Act. One mode suggested was the purchase of the property bounding immediately on the Western side of McLarty's Lane. The cost of this purchase, it was found, would probably amount to the sum of £2000. A much smaller sum would have been greatly disproportioned to any advantage to be gained by the additional width of the Firebreak, but the proposition was one entirely out of his Excellency's power to entertain.

After much negotiation an arrangement was effected by which, without any additional cost to the Colony, the party to whom McLarty's Lane had been assigned having consented to forego the advantage of occupying it, and to consolidate his property to the Westward, a fire-break would be preserved of the width prescribed by law, and McLarty's Lane at the same time be kept open, to prevent the closing of which such urgent appeals had been made to his Excellency—thus opening up an avenue from Duckworth-street to Water-street, in immediate continuation of Prescott-street, and affording the most practicable and commodious access from the one street to the other in the central part of the town. This arrangement having been approved of by his Excellency and the Council, the operations already commenced for the occupation of McLarty's Lane were abandoned.

As a further inducement to take the prayer of the petitioners into consideration, his Excellency had reason to believe, from the examination and reports of competent persons, that a very great expense must have been incurred in constructing a thoroughfare on the site of the old Fire-break which is traversed by a running brook, and which, from the widening of Water-street at that point, and the position of the bridge in Duckworth-street, must have been exceedingly precipitous compared with the existing thoroughfare, which, by a very inconsiderable expenditure (without regard to the obvious improvement in the appearance of the street), has been rendered so practicable and so eminently serviceable to the public.

As a Bill is now before the Legislature for amending the Street Acts, I would suggest the propriety of inserting a clause, when the Bill comes to be considered by the Council; for confirming the alteration in question, which will render unnecessary any separate enactment, and avoid the multiplying of laws on this subject.

The Petition of the Undersigned Inhabitants of St. John's,

Respectfully Sheweth,—

That from time immemorial there has been a public footpath opposite the mercantile premises of Messrs. Hunters & Co., leading from Water to Duckworth-street, for twenty-eight years past, called "McLarty's Lane."

That the ground and some houses extending along the eastern boundary thereof formerly belonged and was occupied by three persons, named James Kennedy, Patrick Patten, and Michael Dorsey—from whom the lane in question was purchased by raising a subscription for that purpose in the year 1819, (a copy of the original list of subscribers is hereunto appended, in which the names of a number of the largest contributors are omitted,) and was then thrown open for public convenience.

That from the eastern extremity of the town to Adelaide-street, exceeding a mile in length, and comprising the most populous, wealthy, and trading portion of the Metropolis, McLarty's Lane aforesaid has been of late years the most level, convenient, and least difficult of access for horses heavy laden and carriages of every description, and the principal thoroughfare for foot passengers to and from Water to Duckworth-street.

That your Excellency's petitioners could not for a moment suppose that the inhabitants and the public generally, were about to be deprived of a passage-way of such importance and utility, particularly when it should be borne in mind that its present usefulness originated from the fact of the land having been purchased by the contributions of private individuals, and whose claims for compensation would now be very considerable;—notwithstanding Mr. Clapp has lately appeared on the premises for the purpose of enclosing and taking possession thereof, and said "that the said passage-way had been conceded by the Legislature as compensation for loss of ground taken from him in Prescott-street."

Petitioners would respectfully state to your Excellency that owing to the natural steep ascent in the contemplated line of Prescott-street, opposite the premises of Job, Bulley & Co., it will be impossible, at any expense, to reduce it to the level or make it as accessible or convenient as the lane in question.

And as your Excellency's Petitioners have determined on sending in a respectful Memorial to the next House of Assembly, praying for the repeal of any law now in force having the effect of converting McLarty's Lane into private property, they respectfully pray that your Excellency may be graciously pleased to co-operate with and sanction their peaceable and firm determination of protecting the aforesaid premises until the result of their intended Memorial to the next House of Assembly on the subject be made known.

DOCUMENTS, WITH MESSAGE FROM THE GOVERNOR ON DISTRESS IN
TRINITY, CONCEPTION BAY, AND BURIN.

[Copy.]

Bonavista, 30th December, 1848.

Sir,—

I beg to report to you, for the information of his Excellency the Governor, that since the date of my former report there has arrived at Catalina Seventy barrels of Meal for the relief of the distressed at this place, Newman's and the Amhersts Coves, sixty barrels for King's Cove and Tickle Cove, and two Bales of Clothing for the District generally. That the Committee of Relief have, at this date, three hundred and twelve persons upon their list, to whom they issue half a pound per head per diem, and that they expect a considerable increase to that number, on their next board day to four hundred, and in the course of the ensuing month that they will raise it to 500 persons at the least.

The Small-pox is, I hope, extinguished in this place, vaccination having been very generally resorted to by our Inhabitants.

The parcel of Meal for King's Cove is being transported hither from Catalina by land, and shipped off from hence as the inhabitants of King's Cove meet with favourable weather to permit their coming for it.—The late Commissioners of Relief at that place, having refused to receive it, or to take any interest in its distribution, I have been compelled to place it in

charge of the Stipendiary Constable, Maurice Divine, for distribution to the most destitute at the rate of half-a-pound each per day.

Sir,—

In my last report of the 30th ultimo, I did myself the honour to acknowledge the receipt of Seventy barrels of Meal, and two bales of Clothing, supplied for the relief of the distressed in and about this neighbourhood, by order of his Excellency the Governor. I now beg to acquaint you, for the information of his Excellency, that the brig Cornhill arrived yesterday at Catalina from St. John's, in seven hours, bringing a further supply of thirty bls. of Meal for this same object, and are most acceptable, inasmuch as that during the past month the numbers of persons applying to the Commissioners of Relief for sustenance were 695, who received rations from hence to Stock Cove, which, added to the quantity previously dispensed, has made deep inroads into the previous stock of Meal. Although the Commissioners of Relief intend a very considerable reduction in the number on the list at their next weekly meeting, I fear the quantity of Meal now on hand (less than forty barrels) will be found inadequate to meet the wants of the truly destitute beyond the end of the coming month. At Stock Cove, Broad Cove, and Keels there has been one hundred and eighty-nine persons relieved. From Keels westward to Indian Arm not one application has been made to us for relief as yet, and the Trinity Magistrate who lately accompanied Dr. Johnston on his medical circuit, informed me that there did not appear to be many destitute in that portion of the district.

The health of the District and that of the neighbourhood, viz., Ragged Harbour, the Catalinas, and Bird Island Cove, is now secured against inroads of the small pox, by his Excellency's instructions contained in your communication of the 27th December, having, since their receipt, been fully carried out. The measure will ensure the Sealing Vessels sailing from this neighbourhood healthy crews, and prevent the chance of interruption in their voyage, preventing infection from being exported with them.

In the event of the ice again disappointing the inhabitants of this place of a supply of Seals in the month of March, a large number of them will be in a most deplorable state, therefore I most respectfully crave his Excellency's commands relative to a future provision to meet the exigency of their case.

Sir,—

Do me the honour to acquaint his Excellency the Governor, that since the date of my last communication, of the 15th ultimo, the state of affairs thereby indicated as existing around us have not improved, and that in the interim the Board of Commissioners of Relief endeavoured to raise a temporary supply at Trinity to enable them to subsist the destitute from hence to Keels until the navigation opened, but their application, though made to both establishments at that place, proved fruitless, as they had not the means of doing anything to assist us. This circumstance compelled them to fall back upon Mr. Shears's offer, who providentially having laid in a larger stock than usual, was enabled to supply them with a hundred barrels of Meal, at 31s. per barrel, some portion of which he had previously lent them.

On the 23d ultimo I received a communication from Mr. Stewart, of King's Cove, of which the following is a copy:—

King's Cove, 22nd February, 1849.

WM. SWEETLAND, Esq.,

Dear Sir,—Your letter of the 14th duly reached me, and I have noticed its contents. I have been in communication since with Rev. Mr. Smith, Rev. Mr. Waldron, Mr. Brown, Mr. Michael Murphy, (Mr. John Murphy I have not seen since), and they individually decline taking any responsibility whatsoever in your procuring relief for the destitute of this locality.

In consequence of the foregoing, and for the want of means to sustain them further, we have been under the necessity (after having administered to their wants thus far) of casting off the destitute inhabitants of Stock Cove, King's Cove, Broad Cove, Keels and Castle Cove, amounting to 276 persons, to be supported by those around them. As I am led to believe there is an abundance of potatoes at King's Cove and Broad Cove, as well as some salt fish, this measure will not, I presume, be fraught with any serious consequences, provided there is a disposition on the part of the holders to assist their distressed neighbours.

The numbers relieved last week by the Commissioners of Relief, from hence to Knight's Cove, amounted to 930 persons, and thence to Keels and Castle Cove, 276—total, 1206. The stock of Meal entrusted to the Commissioners of Relief at Bird Island Cove being all expended, we are again inundated with the destitute from that quarter. In fact, unless a haul of Seals occur within the ensuing fortnight or three weeks, the destitute inhabitants of this and the neighbouring portion of the Trinity district will be in an awful state of destitution, for provisions will not be to be purchased anywhere within this district.

Sir,

Herewith I beg to hand you duplicates of my reports and correspondence during the past quarter, for the information of his Excellency the Governor, and to which for a detail of passing events here in the interim I respectfully crave reference. Since the date of my last report (the foregoing), the distress reigning around us has not suffered any diminution; the destitute of the King's Cove district, and of Bird Island Cove, having been returned upon us, they, together with our own, amounting in all to 1486 persons, say—Bonavista to Knight's Cove, 1014; Stock Cove to Castle Cove, 321; Bird Island Cove, 151. Having so completely absorbed nearly all the available resources of this place, the Commissioners of Relief are constrained to forward a boat to St. John's, to solicit further relief to meet the pressure of distress which is now being so severely felt in every part of the above portions of this and the neighbouring districts bordering on the Cape.

The past week the Commissioners issued an allowance of four lbs. of fish to each individual, which produced an attempt at riot, which was put down; for the present week they have issued two lbs. of fish, and half a pint of pease to each individual per week, together with $\frac{1}{4}$ lb of meal per day, with which they appear to be better satisfied than with that of the past week. During the winter their rations did not exceed half lb. meal per individual per day, excepting at Christmas, when $\frac{3}{4}$ lb. was issued.

For the subsistence of the destitute of the District from Stock Cove to Castle Cove, I have been compelled to purchase forty qtls. of fish from Brown, at Kingscove, at 11s. per qtl., which, I am informed to-day, will only afford another ration.

From Tickle Cove Mr. Candow writes me that he is in hopes that he will be able to make their quantum of meal now on hand suffice their wants in that quarter.

The ice having disappeared without affording any relief in the shape of seals, there are required to meet the exigencies of the coming month's distress,—for King's Cove District, 30 barrels Meal; for Bonavista District, 70 barrels ditto; for the sustenance of the inhabitants of Bird Island Cove, 20 barrels ditto: 120 Barrels to give each individual requiring relief half a pound each per day, until the 1st of May, before which time they cannot expect any supplies to be issued.

The Memorial of the Undersigned, in behalf of the destitute Inhabitants of Bay de Verd and Low Point, North Shore Conception Bay.

Humbly Sheweth,—

That Memorialists feel deeply impressed and alarmed at the present utterly destitute state of nearly the half of the population of Bay de Verd and Low Point. Memorialists beg to state that destitution originated in these two localities (with about two hundred and fifty souls) so early as December last, and are ever since depending on the bounty of their neighbours for subsistence, by which means one half are exhausted and are now on a par with each other, and there is not a day that passes but the numbers are increasing.

Memorialists are under the firm conviction that there is not now in these aforesaid two places three weeks' provision for the total number of inhabitants, were it to be equally distributed among them; those who are best supplied (and they are few) have no more than will barely supply their own wants until the first day of May next, so that they can no longer afford to aid those who are now apparently starving.

Memorialists beg further to state that they are apprehensive of an outbreak on the part of the destitute, who are now actually begging from door to door, and will take by force what they can no longer obtain by begging—the contemplation of which fills the minds of Memorialists with utter dismay, for unquestionably loss of lives would be the consequence, for the very few who have but a small supply would as soon part with their lives as part with it, as there is but little probability of any more supplies being advanced by Merchants until the first day of June next, credit being limited now to a certain extent.

Memorialists are impressed with feelings of gratitude towards your Excellency for granting relief from time to time, especially the two recent grants, of which this portion of the district received about twenty-seven barrels of Meal, which Memorialists respectfully beg leave to state were hardly a fortnight's support for those to whom it had been distributed.

Memorialists further rely on the humane disposition and tender feelings which your Excellency has evinced in the alleviating the wants of sufferers by destitution ever since your Excellency's arrival in this Colony; and now humbly pray that your Excellency will be pleased to recommend a further grant to be made to alleviate in some measure the unparalleled distress which prevails in these two aforesaid localities at this present time, and for which Memorialists will pledge themselves, in behalf of the destitute, to have returns made by labour, in repairing the public main road, or otherwise, as your Excellency may otherwise deem fit.

And your Memorialists as in duty bound will ever pray.

We the undersigned, inhabitants of Port-de-Grave, acquainted with the destitute circumstances of very many families belonging to this and the neighbouring settlements, in petitioning your honourable House in their behalf, beg to state—

That for the whole of this part of the district (from Northern Gut to Bay Roberts Point) only six barrels Indian Meal have been received.

That up to this period many widows and helpless families have existed almost entirely on the charitable aid afforded by their neighbours.

That in consequence of the general poverty many of the heads of families have been compelled to go to the Ice, leaving their families totally unprovided for.

That at present no kind of provisions can be obtained, even by those in better circumstances, and that consequently a large number of families are at present in a lamentable state of destitution—many of whom have no prospect of being better provided for.

That taking these things into consideration, your Petitioners trust that your honourable House will provide some immediate relief.

The condition of the inhabitants of that settlement, as therein shown, calls for my very earnest and anxious consideration, and the Governor will be ready to co-operate with the other branches of the Legislature in any mode of proceeding best calculated in their opinion to remedy such a painful state of things.

REPORT

Of the Produce of the Fishery and Crops, together with the condition of the Inhabitants of the Eastern division of the District of Burin, from Rushoon to Lawn, both inclusive, for the month of August, 1848.

THE FISHERY.

The Squids having been moderately plentiful up to the 15th of the month, the large boats added from five to seven qtls. per man to their former catch, bringing up the average to a little over seventy-five quintals per man—whilst the fish being scarce during this period on the home ground, the small craft did not add more than three or four quintals per man to their former catch, so that fifty quintals per man have no more than been realised for this description of craft up to the 18th of the month, when an easterly gale set in, and continued up to the 23d, during which time all the bait, as well as fish, appears to have been driven from this bay, and from the coast, as nothing has been since done in the fishery.

THE CROPS.

The Hay is being nearly all secured, producing about three-fourths of an average crop.

I regret to report that the fatal potato disease has again appeared; there were only two or three instances of it previously to the gale of wind before alluded to, when all the gardens and potato beds exposed to its direct influence, became affected—and not only the potato but almost every other vegetable production suffered.

THE CONDITION OF THE INHABITANTS.

It may now be assumed that the fishery, as pursued by the skiffs and punts, and consequently by the poorest class of the inhabitants, is ended; or if not absolutely so, the little fish which may be caught will not sustain the families depending upon it through the month of September, and there are many who are not provided with the means of support beyond the last of October. It is therefore evident to me that destitution to the amount of from one-

third to one-half of that provided for by the Government last winter, will be required for the ensuing winter, unless some means less expensive to the colony can be devised for the removal of some of the most destitute families. The subject is one of deep importance, and I should fail in my duty if I did not thus early submit it to his Excellency the Governor for his early consideration.

A Report of the Produce of the Fishery and Crops, together with the condition of the Inhabitants of the Eastern division of the District of Burin, from Rushoon to Lawn, both inclusive, for the month of December, 1848.

THE FISHERY.

The Herring Fishery, which usually affords a large amount of the sustenance of the poorer class of the inhabitants, has proved almost a total failure through the past month, adding much to their otherwise destitute situation. In the Cod Fishery nothing has been done.

THE CROPS.

The disease has destroyed nearly all the Potatoes—it is doubtful if a single barrel will be preserved for seed.

THE CONDITION OF THE INHABITANTS.

Every succeeding month shows more fully the utter destitution into which from one-third to nearly half the inhabitants are now reduced—their existence depends wholly upon Government aid; if this shall be withheld many deaths from starvation will be inevitable.

In the course of another month there will not be any provisions to be purchased, even by those who have the means in their possession, for already have many persons been compelled to resort to St. Peters for that purpose.

A Report of the Produce of the Fishery and Crops, together with the condition of the Inhabitants of the Eastern division of the District of Burin, from Rushoon to Lawn, both inclusive, for the month of January, 1849.

THE FISHERY.

Nothing either in the Cod or Herring Fishery has been done.

THE CROPS.

There is nothing to report.

THE CONDITION OF THE INHABITANTS.

As the winter advances so do the wants of the poor and destitute portion of the inhabitants—at every weekly meeting of the Commissioners of Relief, new applicants are presenting themselves. The most searching inquiry is gone into, and any who have, or from their earnings ought to have, the means of existence for three or four weeks, or a longer period, are invariably refused any assistance from the Meal at present remaining.

I have in former reports stated, and every year's experience convinces me of the fact, that while the planters who pursue the fishery in the punt and skiff shall be compelled to sell their fish in a green state, with the accompanying inconveniences and loss of time which that system involves, will never be able to provide for the wants of their families, unless by the aid of such an abundant fishery as would be fallacious to entertain. Private mercantile enterprise or speculation will not afford to such men the wants they require, without compelling them to take what they do not require; they have therefore no stimulus to exertion, they are drawn as it were into a state of destitution, and consequently become wholly dependent upon government for support for a period of from five to seven months in the year.

A Report of the produce of the Fishery and the Crops, together with the Condition of the Inhabitants of the Eastern division of the District of Burin, from Rushoon to Lawn, both inclusive, for the month of February, 1849.

THE FISHERY AND CROPS.

There is nothing to report.

THE CONDITION OF THE INHABITANTS.

It is now four weeks since the Commissioners of Relief issued the last meal of the quantity which was placed in their hands. The destitution was then on the increase, and it became indispensably necessary to sustain twelve hundred famine-stricken individuals. A few barrels of flour and bags of bread, all that could be procured, was purchased, together with some fish, which sustained the people two weeks. A public meeting of the principal inhabitants was then called, and contributions of fish and molasses made to the extent in value of £50, which but little exceeded one week's issue. Resolutions were passed declaratory of the absolute necessity which existed for the Commissioners of Relief to purchase, by drafts on the Government, as much fish and molasses as would sustain the famishing poor until communication could be had with St. John's for assistance from the Government. The Commissioners,

conscious that no other course was open to them, have complied, and a schooner is now got ready to depart on that voyage. The situation of the people was so clearly seen in January, that the Commissioners conceived it to be their duty to attempt sending a craft to St. John's, and they engaged a small schooner for that purpose. She was, however, laying far up the arm of Mortier Bay, and before she could be got out the ice formed, and prevented the possibility of getting her out—the weather, besides, assumed so severe a character that the voyage would have been attended with such danger as to prevent or deter any crew from attempting it. The Commissioners have, by memorial, drawn the attention of the House of Assembly to the alarming state of destitution which prevails here.

I am most thoroughly convinced that mercantile enterprise will never bring the people out of the distress in which they are now involved. I believe it cannot be done but through the aid of the Government—either by the removal of the most destitute, or by the fitting out of three or four vessels with a supply of salt, bread, molasses, hooks and lines, to be issued to the poor planter in payment for green fish; he would not then be compelled, as now, to receive two-thirds of his daily catch of fish in articles he does not want, or could do without; by this means he would, with the produce of two or three weeks' fishing, be placed in a situation to cure the remainder of his voyage, which would, in a great measure, render him independent. An advance of from thirty to fifty per cent on the above articles, would be, I apprehend, quite equal to the expense of the charter of a vessel, so as to leave but little or no loss on the adventure, and would prove a saving to the colony of from 1000 to £1500 a-year—a sum which, if ear, will be annually required during the existence of the present mode of mercantile speculation.

The Grand Jury at Burin having been summoned to meet this day at a General Court of Quarter Sessions, have unanimously resolved, that their best thanks are due to the Worshipful Bench of Magistrates, as well as the respective Clergymen who are associated with them as Relief Commissioners, for having engaged a boat, to proceed to St. John's, with an application to the government for a further supply of Indian Meal for the sustentation of the destitute poor of this district, the number of whom is already very great; and the Grand Jury are fully cognizant with the situation of many families who have not the means of support beyond the First of March, and who must then add to the large number now applying for relief. No application of greater necessity could have been ever made.

Sir,—

We have the honour to transmit to you, for the information of His Excellency the Governor, our Report for the last month.

The Sealing vessels from this port were unable to proceed on their voyage until the 20th ult., owing to the ice which obstructed their egress from the harbour; we think, however, that since their departure they have, on the whole, had favourable winds and weather for the prosecution of the fishery, and we trust that the catch of seals will amount to an average voyage.

We regret to be obliged to state, that the condition of the labouring population of this division is now very distressing; there are many poor families in a state of starvation, being barely kept alive by the charity of their neighbours and the small supply of Indian Meal they obtain, through us, from the Government. We are quite sure that at no period during the winter has distress been so extensive and pressing, and we are humbly of opinion that it is necessary for the Government immediately to render more extensive aid to the destitute people.

We have the satisfaction to report that there is no case of small pox now existing in this division of the district.

Sir,—

In the early part of February we had the honour to address a Petition to His Excellency the Governor soliciting further relief for the poor of this division of the district—the difficulty of getting that petition over the Bay, and the wants of the poor pressing upon us, we were obliged to appeal to Messrs. Slades and Messrs. Robinson & Brooking, of whom we have purchased 80 bags of Bread, @ 26s. per cwt., for the support of those committed to our charge, the urgency of the case not admitting of any delay; we regret that we should have been obliged to have recourse to so expensive an article of food as bread, but we had no choice—we conceived it our duty by any means in our power to endeavour to preserve life. We hope His Excellency will approve of the measure, and further, by a seasonable supply of Meal, enable us to meet the demands made upon us daily—demands which will not cease altogether until the cod fishery commences in June. We are grieved to be obliged to confine the paupers to such a small allowance; the necessity of doing so has been imposed upon us by the scanty supply at hand, and the duty imposed upon us of keeping them up until further relief could be sent. We can assure His Excellency the Governor that we have withheld this small allowance (3½lbs. per week) from any person who had any visible means of support, or that by any possibility we could shake off. The inclemency of the winter precluded any work being done. 386 persons were relieved last week—a similar number will consume the remainder of the bread by the end of this week.

Sir,—

On the 14th ult. I had the honour of addressing you, since which I have visited Catalina and Bonavista; at the latter place I met the Committee appointed by His Excellency the Governor for relieving the poor of Bird Island Cove, in consequence of their sending the paupers of that place to me to be relieved—they stated that the 50 bls. of meal were exhausted, that the people were starving, that they had no means of providing any thing for the poor, or indeed for themselves; the poor people would willingly sell all they had belonging to them to procure a little bread, or even travel to Trinity (25 miles) for the smallest quantity. Under these circumstances the relief committee of Bonavista, already overburdened, have taken charge of them, being in a situation to examine into their wants. Of this arrangement you will no doubt be informed by the Bonavista Committee.

In Catalina they had issued their last allowance of meal on Wednesday the 28th March. The aged and infirm will suffer privations, but Mr. Bremner being disposed to employ the able-bodied, and throw the families of persons at the ice on the owners of the vessels in which they are, he hopes they will get over their difficulties. For the aged and infirm he would require some assistance.

The Committee for the relief of the poor in this division of the district have been obliged to purchase 40 bags of Bread from Messrs. Robinson & Brooking, at 26s., and 40 bags from Messrs. Slades, at the same rate, of which 80 bags there does not now remain more than will sustain the poor beyond the 9th of this month, at the very moderate allowance of 3½ lbs. each per week. The stock of bread in the hands of the merchants is getting short.

In the week ending the 10th March, 237 were relieved; in that ending the 17th March, 314; in that ending the 24th, 364; and in the week ending the 31st March there were 384. The increase is occasioned principally by persons from Heart's Ease and Fox Harbour, by others falling short, and by some few persons from Stock Cove and Knight's Cove, in Bonavista Bay; these latter being in another district the Committee could only give them a small portion of Bread, not sufficient to encourage them to undertake the journey again unless their circumstances were desperate. It is to be regretted that no Indian Meal could be had, and still more so that the time appears far off when the Committee will be able to shake off those depending on them.

The Petition of the distressed part of the Inhabitants of Bay Roberts, in Conception Bay,

Most humbly Sheweth,—

That the distress now prevailing amongst us (and likely to be more disastrous) is so heart-rending as to compel us, though reluctantly, to use this means of making our case known to your Excellency.

To be brief—we cannot describe the destitution we suffer in its full force and proper light, as it is almost incredible. There having been no commissioners duly appointed in this place, as before, to represent us, we are obliged to make application ourselves, and we stand ready to answer any question your Excellency or your Officers may choose to propose. Last Spring we were in a most deplorable state, and only for the kind aid rendered us by your Excellency, through Mr. Cormack, many of us and our families must certainly have perished, as may be seen by the accompanying petition, which petition reached Mr. Cormack (then in St. John's) one day after he got relief for us, and he (Mr. Cormack) did not presume then to hand it to your Excellency after you had graciously given us relief.

We can declare to your Excellency that Mr. Cormack has, this winter and spring, given out of his own stores to many of us gratuitously to a very considerable amount, and by so doing has actually saved many from starving.

We are now ready and willing to work on the roads for what relief we get, or to do any work to keep ourselves from starvation, and that we may not be a burthen on your Excellency.

If we were, as we understand we have been, represented to your Excellency as lazy and dishonest, we would have certainly robbed—but not so, your Excellency; we have certainly begged, but not robbed—and begged until nearly all our friends and neighbours' stocks are exhausted, and they all advise us to see your Excellency without delay, as they rest assured by your past generosity that you will not allow us to starve.

Your petitioners humbly pray your Excellency to excuse so few signatures, as there are but few among us that can write their name, and the distress so great as to admit of no delay, for we fear some will perish let relief come as quick as it may.

Your petitioners therefore most humbly and earnestly pray that your Excellency will be most graciously pleased to take their deplorable case into your kind consideration, and give us speedy relief.

And as in duty bound your petitioners will ever pray.

I beg, on the part of the Poor Commissioners, to acknowledge receipt of your Circular of the 19th ult., which did not come to hand till the 6th inst., requesting a return of Meal given out here in the shape of relief, and beg herewith in compliance thereto, to forward it on as correctly as I possibly can, and with every possible despatch, which, owing to the walking, has not been so quickly as I would wish, but hope it will be in good time.

After Mr. Magill arrived at St. John's I received a letter from him, stating it to be your wish that on making up the return of relief I would not include the molasses, and which I have not done, but deducted it from the people's accounts, taking at the same time a corresponding number of days' labour therefrom likewise, equal to the amount of molasses in each individual case; account of distribution of molasses I beg to forward in separate herewith.

Mr. Magill having kept a regular account of labour done under his superintendence, I beg to refer you to him for account of work performed previous to his leaving—work performed afterwards I have specified in report of meal.

In closing I beg to observe to you my humble conviction, that for the amount given as relief, there has been fully double the work done that would have been done by tender.

I beg to enclose a much-needed petition to his Excellency, and beg you will be so good as to give it all the furtherance in your power.

DOCUMENTS IN REFERENCE TO THE VALUE OF THE SPANISH DOLLAR.

Custom-House, London, 20th December, 1827,

Gentlemen,—

It appearing that the Collectors of this revenue in several of the colonies have been in the practice of receiving dollars in payment of duties at the rate of 5s. 6d. per ounce, under an impression that they were authorized to do so by the provisions of the 12th section of the Act 6 Geo. 4th c. 114, by which it is enacted, that all sums of money granted by the said Act as duties, in the British Possessions in America, shall be deemed to be sterling money of Great Britain, and that such monies may be received according to the proportion and value of 5s. 6d. the ounce, in silver—we acquaint you that such mode of receiving the duties is incorrect, the Law above referred to, whereby the duties are imposed, declaring them to be sterling money of Great Britain, and that dollars, when taken in payment of duties, should only have been received according to their relative value to the British coin, in lieu of which the same were tendered, viz., at the rate of 4s. 4d. each. And the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury having, by an order dated the 27th ultimo, desired that the duties payable in the colonies to the officers of this revenue, be received either in British money or in dollars of full weight at 4s. 4d. each, for three years, and after that period in British money only, we direct you to govern yourselves accordingly, observing that the three years will expire on the 5th January, 1831.

In conveying these instructions, we have to apprise you that it is not considered that this arrangement will make any alteration in the amount of duty to be paid, where the duty is to be levied *ad valorem*, it being assumed that according to the former practice, the articles were valued in the same currency in which the duty was afterwards to be paid.

Read Letter from Mr. Hay, dated 16th April, 1828, transmitting one from Sir J. Kempt, with a memorial from the Chamber of Commerce at Halifax, stating the expense, inconvenience, or almost total impossibility of complying with the instructions of the Board of Customs, requiring the duties levied under the Act 6 Geo. 4, c. 114, to be paid in British money, or in dollars at 4s. 4d. sterling each for three years, and after that period in British money only; and praying that the Spanish dollar may be received at the rate of 5s. 6d. sterling per ounce of silver.

Read report from the Commissioners of Customs, dated 1st May, 1828, with a communication from the Collector and Controller at Halifax, stating that the Lieutenant Governor had directed that the orders from the Customs on this subject should be suspended for a time.

Read letter from Sir J. Kempt, dated 4th May, 1828, enclosing a Memorial from the Chamber of Commerce at Halifax, on the subject of the orders above alluded to, and praying that Spanish dollars may be received for duties at 5s. 6d. sterling each, and doubloons at £3. 12s., and Provincial notes of £1 at 18s. sterling.

Read letter from the Commissioners of Customs dated 10th July, 1828, transmitting a further letter from their officers at Halifax, by which it appears that an order in Council had been made, limiting to the 5th July, 1828, the order of the Lieutenant-Governor, by which the directions from this country in regard to the payment of duties in dollars at 4s. 4d. were suspended.

Read letter from Messrs. Bainbridge and Bliss, agents for the Province of New Brunswick, praying that the duties of Customs may be received in any coin, at the rate of 5s. 6d. sterling per ounce, or in Provincial notes of undeniable credit.

Read letter from Mr. Hay, dated 26th May, 1828, transmitting one from Mr. Tucker, administering the Government at Newfoundland, with a Memorial from the Chamber of Commerce there, complaining of the orders upon this subject, and praying that the duties may be received in silver at 5s. 6d. sterling per ounce.

Read letter from Mr. Hay, dated 27th June, 1828, with a letter from Lord Dalhousie, transmitting a Memorial from the Chamber of Commerce at Quebec, complaining of the order which directed the duties to be paid in dollars of full weight at 4s. 4d. each, the dollars in circulation being generally under the full weight of 17 dwt. $8\frac{2}{3}$ 9, and having heretofore been taken at 5s. 6d. per ounce.

My Lords read again their Minutes of the 6th June and 23rd November, 1827.

My Lords perceive by the Memorials now before them, that at Quebec, Halifax, New Brunswick and Newfoundland, a misapprehension still continues of the interpretation of the Act 4, Geo. 3, c. 15, Sec. 41, and of the 6 Geo. 4, c. 114, Sec. 12,

Transmit to Mr. Hay copies of those papers which were not received from him, and acquaint him, for the information of Sir G. Murray, that my Lords have had under consideration his letters of the 16th April, 26th May, and 27th June, and also Reports of the Commissioners of Customs of 1st May and 10th July, and a letter from Sir J. Kempt of the 4th May, and from Messrs. Bainbridge and Bliss, of the 15th July, all of 1828, containing Memorials against the orders which have been issued for the payment of the Customs Duties in the Colonies in British money, or in Dollars at 4s. 4d. each, and that copies of those papers which were not received from Mr. Hay have been directed to be transmitted to him for the information of Sir G. Murray, and request that he will move Sir G. Murray to acquaint the Governors of those Provinces respectively that it was the obvious intent and meaning of the Acts 4 Geo. 3, c. 15, sec. 41, and 6 Geo. 4, c. 114, sec. 12, that the Duties thereby imposed should be paid in British money, or in other monies the value of which should be computed by the amount of pure silver contained therein, and be received at the rate of 5s. 6d. per oz. of pure silver, by which one uniform provision was made for estimating the true value of all silver coins, whatever proportion of fine silver they might contain, and that the misinterpretation of these Acts has operated to expel the British coinage from circulation; and that my Lords cannot authorise the Dollar to be received at a higher rate than 4s. 4d. sterling, which exceeds their value at 5s. 6d. per oz. of pure silver.

That in respect of the applications from Halifax and New Brunswick, to be allowed to pay the duties of Customs in Doubloons, my Lords are disposed to think that from the state of the trade and commerce in those colonies, it may be reasonable so far to relax from the orders which have been issued, as to allow Doubloons to be received in payment of duties, as well as British money and Spanish dollars, in which case the Doubloons are to be taken in lieu of Spanish dollars, at their relative value in the market at the Colony, which my Lords understand to be, at present, $15\frac{1}{2}$ Dollars to one Doubloon, but that my Lords cannot allow Provincial Notes to be received.

That in respect of the application from the Chamber of Commerce at Quebec, my Lords cannot sanction the receipt of all clipped or light Dollars at the full value of 4s. 4d. each, but will not object to Dollars somewhat worn being received for duties, provided they are current in all transactions at their full nominal value, but not otherwise; and that my Lords request that those directions may be communicated to the Governors of the respective Colonies.

“ My Lords have under their consideration a letter from the Master of the Mint, dated 29th May, 1834, enclosing a Report of the King's Assay Master at the Mint, on the trials made by their Lordships' direction of the weight and fineness of the several specimens of the Gold Coins, the Doubloons, and its sub-divisions, of the South American States; and they refer to a similar report on the Silver Coins of the same States, and to the minute of this Board, of the 11th February, 1825, in consequence of which the Army rate of the Spanish Dollar was reduced from 4s. 6d. and 4s. 8d., at which that coin was previously reckoned to the troops at different Foreign Stations, to the present common standard of (4s. 4d.) Four Shillings and Fourpence.

“ Their Lordships have also caused reference to be made to the Commissariat accounts, and other official documents, from which it appears that, owing to a scarcity of Silver Specie, it has occasionally been found necessary on some of the military stations abroad, to have recourse to Spanish gold coins in issuing pay to the troops. In making such payments the Doubloon is, in Nova Scotia and Bermuda, rated at 67s. 2d., and at most other places at 69s 4d., being the amounts, in Army sterling, of 4s. 4d., per Dollar, of 15½ and 16 dollars respectively,

at which rates Doubloons are nominally convertible in those Colonies into Spanish silver money, although they are in reality commonly so converted, with the allowance of a premium in favour of the silver money, a circumstance which renders it necessary that some allowance should also be made to the troops when they are paid with the over-rated gold coins.

“ On a comparison of the contents in pure metal of the Dollar and Doubloon, and of the average market proportions of Gold and Silver, it is evident that the lowest of the above Dollar rates of the Doubloon is somewhat too high; for, taking the average contents as shewn by the Mint reports to be respectively about 362 and 372 grains, and the proportion of Gold and Silver metal to be between 1 to 15 $\frac{3}{5}$ ths and 15 $\frac{4}{5}$ ths, 105 Doubloons may be considered to be nearly of equivalent value with 1600 Dollars.

“ In fixing an Army rate on foreign gold coins, my Lords consider it to be a desirable object to render it, if possible, indifferent to the soldier whether he receives his pay in those coins or in foreign silver money; and as the Doubloon is, according to the preceding data, intrinsically equivalent to about 15 $\frac{5}{21}$ Dollars, and, in paying the army on foreign stations, the Dollar is valued at 4s. 4d., the corresponding value of the gold piece may, with sufficient accuracy, be considered to be 66s.—Accordingly their Lordships are pleased to direct, that so long as it shall be considered expedient to continue the Army rate fixed on the Spanish Dollar in the year 1825, the Doubloon shall be issued to the troops at the rate of Sixty-six Shillings, and the several sub-divisions of that coin at proportional rates.

“ Let a circular letter be addressed to the respective officers at the head of the Commissariat Establishments abroad, transmitting to them a copy of the Mint Report on the Spanish Gold Coins, and apprising them of their Lordships' determination on this subject. Desire, accordingly, that on the occasions when the convenience of the public service may render it necessary or desirable to make payments to the troops and military departments for pay and allowances in Spanish Gold money, they will convert the Doubloon and its sub-divisions into Army Sterling, at the rate fixed upon in this minute; and with respect to any balances of those coins that may remain in their hands on the receipt of these instructions, authorise them to take credit for the difference between the rate at which those sums were converted in their accounts into Sterling money, and the lower rate now assigned to them.”

WHEREAS by an order of His late Majesty King George 4, made with the advice of his Privy Council, and bearing date the 23d March, 1825, after reciting amongst other things that it had been represented to His Majesty at the Council Board, by the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, that they had given directions that His Majesty's Troops, serving in the several British Colonies and Possessions abroad, should, in certain cases, be paid in British silver and copper money, and that with a view of securing the circulation of such money in those Colonies, it would be expedient that an Order in Council should be issued, declaring that in all those Colonies where the Spanish Dollar was then either by law, fact, or practice, con-

sidered as a legal tender for the discharge of debts, or where the Duties to the Government were rated or collected, or the individuals had a right to be paid in that description of coin, that a tender and payment of British silver money to the amount of Four Shillings and Four-pence should be considered as equivalent to the tender or payment of one Spanish Dollar, and so in proportion for any greater or less amount of debt; His said late Majesty was pleased to approve of what was proposed in the said representation.

And whereas it is expedient that the said recited Order in Council should be revoked, so far as respects Her Majesty's Colonies and Possessions in America and the West Indies: be it therefore and it is hereby ordered by the Queen's Most Excellent Majesty, by and with the advice of her Privy Council, that so far as respects Her Majesty's Colonies and Possessions in America and in the West Indies, the said recited Order shall be and the same is hereby rescinded.

And the Right Honourable Lord Glenelg, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, is to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

A Proclamation.

Whereas the Coin current in our West India Colonies, including our province of British Guiana, consisting partly of the current coin of the United Kingdom, and partly of Spanish, Mexican, and Columbian gold coin, called Doubloons, and of Spanish, Mexican, and Columbian silver coin, called Dollars; and it is expedient that the rate at which the said Doubloons and Dollars shall circulate in our said Colonies should be ascertained and fixed. Now, therefore, We, by the advice of our Privy Council, have thought fit to declare and ordain, and, by the advice aforesaid, We do hereby declare and ordain, that throughout the whole of our said Colonies the said Doubloon shall circulate and be received in payment as being of the full value of Sixty-four Shillings, sterling, current money of the United Kingdom; and the said Dollar shall circulate and be received in payment as being of the full value of 4s. 2d. sterling like current money of the United Kingdom. And in all payments to be made in any of our said Colonies, tender of payment in Doubloons and Dollars, or either of them, at the rate aforesaid, shall be deemed and taken to be a lawful tender, in the same manner as if such tender had been made in the current coin of the United Kingdom.

Given at our Court, at Windsor, this Fourteenth Day of September, One Thousand Eight Hundred and Thirty-Eight, and in the Second Year of our Reign.

Gentlemen,—

Having laid before the Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury your Memorial, dated 23d ultimo, enclosing a letter from the Collector of Montreal, upon the subject of the rates at which Dollars and Doubloons should now be received for Duties, I am commanded by their Lordships to acquaint you, that as the Gold Doubloon of Spain or the South American States, at the rate of 64s. and the silver Dollar of Spain or the South American States, at the rate of 4s. 2d, are equivalent to Sterling money of Great Britain, and as those rates have been adopted by Her Majesty's Proclamation relating to other Colonies, and are, with the exception of minute fractional differences, in accordance with the comparative values of these coins adopted in the Act of the Canadian Legislature relating to the currency, which has received Her Majesty's confirmation; my Lords desire you will authorize and instruct your Officers in Canada to receive in payment of the Duties under the Act of the 5th and 6th. Vic., chap. 49, the said Doubloons at the rate of 64s. sterling per Doubloon, and the said Dollars, or the Dollars of the United States of America, and their proportionate parts, at the rate of 4s. 2d. sterling per Dollar. I am also to state to you that my Lords consider the same rates for the Doubloon and Dollar to be equally applicable to the collection of the Duties under the Act in question in the other North American Colonies.

Sir,—

I have the honour to acknowledge your letter of the 27th inst., conveying to me the Governor's commands to take under my consideration the subject of a Letter from the Collector of H. M.'s Customs relative to the rate or sterling value at which the Spanish Dollars ought to be issued in payment of the Reserved Salaries, under the Imperial Act 2 and 3 Wm. 4, c. 78, and the Colonial Act 6 Vic., c. 12, and to furnish my opinion upon the question therein raised.

If no defalcation in the Customs Revenues raised in the Colony under the British Acts of Parliament had occurred, to the extent of reducing the receipts of duties levied under those Acts below the sum required to pay the Reserved Salaries, I conceive that no difficulty would have occurred upon this question, and that it would have been deemed just and reasonable to pay the salaries in Dollars at the rate of 4s. 2d. each, being the same sterling rate at which, as stated by the Collector of Customs, such coin has been received in payment of such duties since the 6th July, 1843, pursuant to an order emanating from the Lords of the Treasury.

The Colonial Act of last Session, 6 Vic., cap. 12, in order to remedy this defalcation of the Imperial Duties which has attended the operation of the Act 2d and 3d, Wm. 4, c. 78, over all duties raised within this Colony, and therein directed that the sum of £6550, to be reserved out

of such duties, shall be applied in payment of the Reserved Salaries in the manner provided and described under the provisions of the beforementioned Act of Parliament, 2d and 3d, Wm. 4.

The Colonial Customs Revenue Act of last Session, 6 Vic., c. 5, (22d May, 1843.) declares (*inter alia*) duties thereby to be raised shall be deemed to be of Sterling money of Great Britain, and shall be received and taken in Sterling money of Great Britain, or in Foreign Coins at such rates as they are *now received at* in payment of Imperial Duties in this Colony. This Act will expire on the 5th July, 1844. When it was passed it was, as is now discovered, imperfectly constructed on the 4th section: for it would have been proper after the words "as they are now received," to have added the words "*or at such rates as they shall at any time during the continuance of this Act under lawful authority be hereafter received.*"

I feel assured that in framing this Act it was not contemplated that in its construction it might probably conflict with the prerogative of the Crown under the contingency that has occurred; the sterling rate of the Dollar being at that time 4s. 4d. stg., but as stated in the letter of the Collector of Customs to have been on the 8th of June last, reduced to 4s. 2d.

It belongs to the prerogative of the Crown to legitimate foreign coin and make it current, and to declare at what value it shall be taken in payment; but I presume that the alteration of the rate of the Dollar to 4s. 2d. must have been made under a Proclamation of Her Majesty, I have, however, no such authority laid before me to guide me on the present occasion, and I cannot venture to give any opinion as to the scope or provisions of such a document on supposition of what it may contain.

In this Colony the Troops and Military Services have for some time past been paid in Dollars at 4s. 2d. sterling.—After a careful consideration of the intent and provisions of the Imperial Act, passed in order to secure the payment of the Reserved Salaries in sterling money out of certain duties receivable now at the rate of 4s. 2d. sterling per dollar, it does appear to me, as far as the Duties under Imperial Statutes may extend in their amount towards the payment of such salaries, that if dollars are issued in payment of the salaries they should be so issued at the like rate of 4s. 2d., and that the residue of the salaries should be made up out of the Duties raised under the Colonial Act, and the Dollars issued at corresponding rates; for the Colonial Act, as cited above, expressly provides that the sum for Reserved Salaries shall be applied in the manner provided by the Act of 2 and 3 Wm. 4, cap. 78.

This view is of course founded on the reasonable presumption that the rate of 4s. 2d. per Dollar, as stated by the Collector of Customs, has been established under proper authority; and I think there is much force in his observations as to the effect which might be operated by a Colonial Revenue Act, in indirectly reducing the amount of the Reserved Salaries, if an irregular clause, such as the one contained in the Colonial Revenue Act, were construed to bear such an interpretation.

Whereas it has been represented to His Majesty, at this Board, by the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, that they have given directions that His Majesty's Troops serving in the several British Colonies and Possessions abroad, should, in certain cases, be paid in British Silver and Copper Money, and that with a view of securing the circulation of such money in those Colonies, it would be expedient that an order in Council should be issued, declaring that in all those colonies where the Spanish Dollar is now, either by law, fact, or practice, considered as a legal tender for the discharge of Debts, or where the duties to the Government are rated or collected, or the individuals have a right to pay in that description of coin, that a tender and payment of British Silver Money to the amount of four shillings and fourpence, should be considered as equivalent to the tender or payment of one Spanish Dollar, and so in proportion for any greater or less amount of debt.

And Whereas it has been further represented by the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, that with respect to the Cape of Good Hope, where there are not any Spanish Dollars in circulation, but where the circulation consists entirely of paper Rix Dollars and its proportions; and with respect to Ceylon, where the circulation consists of silver and paper Rix Dollars, as well as of a variety of other coins, which are generally received and paid with relation to their value, as compared with Rix Dollars, it would be expedient that a tender and payment of 1s. 6d., in British Silver Money, should be considered as equivalent to a tender and payment of one such Rix Dollar so current at the Cape of Good Hope and Ceylon respectively, and so in proportion for any greater or less sum, and also that British Copper Money should be made a legal tender in all the British Colonies for its due and proper proportions of British Silver Money, as by law established in Great Britain, but that no person should be compelled to take more than 12d., in copper money at any one payment. His Majesty, having taken the said representation into consideration, is pleased, by and with the advice of his Privy Council, to approve of what is therein proposed; and the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, and the Right Honourable Earl Bathurst, one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, are to give the necessary directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

PROCLAMATION.

WHEREAS our Sovereign Lord George the Fourth, by the Grace of God, King of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, has thought fit by his Order in Council, dated at the

Court at Carlton House, the 23d day of March last past, to order and direct that His Majesty's Troops serving in the British Colonies should, in certain cases, be paid in British Silver and Copper Money: and to secure the circulation of such money in those Colonies His Majesty has deemed it expedient to order and declare, that in all the Colonies where the Spanish Dollar is now, either by law, fact, or practice, considered as a legal tender for the discharge of debt, or where the Duties to the Government are rated or collected, or the individuals have a right to pay, in that description of coin, that a tender and payment of British Silver Money to the amount of Four Shillings and Four-pence should be considered as equivalent to the tender or payment of one Spanish Dollar, and so in proportion for any greater or less amount of debt; and His Majesty has also been pleased to order that British Copper Money should be made a legal tender in all the British Colonies for its due and proper proportions of British Silver Money as by law established in Great Britain; but that no person should be compelled to take any more than twelve pence in copper money at any one payment. And His Majesty has also thought fit at the same time to order and direct the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, and the Right Honourable Earl Bathurst, one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, to give the necessary directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, in obedience to His Majesty's said commands, have directed British Silver and Copper Money to be sent to all the Colonies, there to be issued at its nominal rate for the pay of His Majesty's Troops, and all persons having permanent appointments in any of the Civil Departments of the Army; and to secure its circulation without the great fluctuation in the rate of Exchange to which a circulation of Spanish Dollars is subject, their Lordships have by their Circular Letter, dated at the Treasury Chambers, the 12th day of February last past, ordered the Commissariat Department, on certain days in each week, to be appointed by the Officer Commanding the Troops, to receive British Silver Money in sums of not less than One Hundred and Three Pounds, from any person whatsoever, and to grant such person a Bill on the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, at thirty days' sight, for One Hundred and Three Pounds of such Silver Money, so by him to be paid into the Military Chest.

And the Right Honourable the Earl Bathurst having by letter dated at Downing Street in May last, signified to me His Majesty's commands to cause His Majesty's said Order to be duly promulgated and carried into execution in this Colony, and at the same time to notify the holders of British Silver Money that they may demand from the Officer in charge of the Commissariat Department, Bills on the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury at thirty days' sight, for One Hundred Pounds for every One Hundred and Three Pounds of British Silver Money by them paid into the Military Chest; and further to declare that as the Spanish Dollar is current, as equivalent to Five Shillings of money of account, therefore, that Seventeen Shillings and Four-pence of British Silver and Copper money is hereafter to be deemed and taken as being equal in value to One Pound of money of account in this Island and its Dependencies.

Now I, Sir Thomas John Cochrane, by virtue of the power and authority to me given, as Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over this Island and its Dependencies, in obedience to His Majesty's commands, and by and with the advice of His Majesty's Council, have issued this Proclamation, hereby making known to all His Majesty's loving subjects in this Island and its Dependencies, that it has been the Royal Will and Pleasure of His Majesty to make the said Order in Council, and also to make known the proceedings, orders, and directions of the Right

Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, and the Right Honourable Earl Bathurst, one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, for giving effect to His Majesty's said Order; and I do, in His Majesty's name, call upon all His Majesty's subjects in the Island of Newfoundland and its Dependencies, in their several offices, stations, and situations, to pay obedience to His Majesty's said Order, and to do all in their power to secure and promote the free circulation of the British Silver and Copper Money so as to insure its general use in this Island and its Dependencies, at the rates and in the manner in which His Majesty has been pleased to order and direct.

Given under my Hand and Seal at the Government House, St. John's, Newfoundland, this 18th day of October, in the Sixth Year of His Majesty's Reign, and in the Year of Our Lord One Thousand Eight Hundred and Twenty-five.

COMMUNICATIONS FROM THE CUSTOMS IN REFERENCE TO THE ADDRESS OF THE HOUSE OF ASSEMBLY ON THE PETITION OF JAMES LYNCH.

I have the honour, in reply to your letter dated the 15th instant, to transmit herewith the Report of the Landing Officers on the Memorial of James Lynch, the Master of the brigantine *Abeona*, of this port; and I beg further to state, for the information of his Excellency the Governor, that on more than one occasion I offered to return the property to Lynch, on the production of proof from the shippers of the goods that the property belonged to him, and that it was only on his failing to produce proof to that effect that I ordered it to be sold.

Sir,—

Having had the honour to receive from you a copy of a petition from James Lynch, Master of the brigantine *Abeona*, to the honourable the General Assembly,

dated February last, for our report and observations thereon, we beg leave to state that petitioner reported his said vessel at this office from Boston, on the 15th June, 1848. The said Report consisted of 745 barrels of Indian Meal, consigned to Messrs. C. F. Bennett & Co., together with sundry other articles of merchandise for other parties.

Thereupon Mr. Bayly, then Acting Landing Waiter, was appointed to superintend the discharge of the cargo in the usual manner.

That the cargo so reported was, on the 17th June, duly landed, when it was discovered that 12 barrels of Indian Meal were on board over and above the quantity so reported by the Master; which, being forfeited by law, was seized by the Acting Landing Waiter, and with your approval, deposited in the Warehouse.

That subsequently to the seizure Mr. Lynch claimed the goods as being his property, and applied to you for permission to amend his report.

That Messrs. C. F. Bennett & Co., also claimed the Goods as being the property of their friends in Boston, believing the 12 barrels to have been overshipped by mistake, the packages being of the same manufacture, and bearing the same marks as the goods originally reported and consigned to their firm.

That in consequence of these disputed claims, and no attempt having been made to evade the payment of the duties, we were directed by you to inform the parties that, unless they could agree as to the ownership of these 12 barrels, you would not allow the Report to be amended, but would maintain the seizure.

That having communicated with the parties, petitioner stated that he would much rather we should keep the Meal than Messrs. Bennett and Co., should have it.

That under these circumstances, and no duties having been paid thereon, by either party, the property was sold by public auction on the 9th of October, 1848, with other goods then under seizure.

That Mr. Bayly denies having told petitioner that the said Meal would be returned to him, nor can we learn that any officer of the department ever took upon himself to make such a statement.

The Petition of James Edwards, humbly sheweth—

That your Petitioner is a very poor man, residing in Logy Bay, with a large family of helpless children, and has been in the habit of making and working at the Roads. That in the year 1844 he obtained, by right of tender, a contract of James Douglas, Esq., Chairman of the Board of Road Commissioners, to make a Road, commencing at the

new bridge, and leading down the South Side. That he, in order to expedite his contract, engaged a strong crew, and commenced with said contract the ensuing Spring, having done as far as Messrs. Alsop's premises; he was there and then opposed and prevented from going on according to the true intention of his contract, which brought on a dispute between the opposed and Commissioners, which caused said Commissioners to alter and deviate from the contract in such a way as to make a breach thereof. He, therefore, in order to continue the Road, was obliged to make other arrangements with said Commissioners, and completed said work as he was from time to time instructed and desired, and in due time completed said work to the entire satisfaction of the aforesaid Commissioners.

That in consequence of the deviation on the part of the Commissioners, petitioner has been, from causes not to be obviated, thrown into difficulties, together with accidents occasioned to said work by the heavy gale of 19th September, 1846, which destroyed bridges, and otherwise injured said work in such a manner as to increase labour to full £20 to replace the same, in order to have the said work passed by the Surveyors, for which loss no compensation was received. That a wall was also thrown down at Widdicomb's place, through rooting of ballast from underneath, which cost seven or eight pounds to rebuild, and was not reported to the Board of Commissioners for remuneration.

That in consideration of the original contract being altered, petitioner prays to declare that he took his contract too low, thereby, with other intervening delays and unforeseen causes, he has sustained a loss of more than £50. He also declares that said Commissioners always encouraged him, by different promises, that he should be well paid for his time and labour, particularly in the case of Alsop's premises. He from time to time after said work was done, applied to James Douglas, Esq., to have it surveyed and passed, so as to demand a settlement; but in consequence of Mr. Byrne, surveyor for the Board of Road Commissioners, being out of place, he, petitioner, applied to Mr. Page, land-surveyor, to survey the work so done, and according to certificate of survey, which is hereto annexed, the petitioner hath well and truly performed one hundred and twenty-eight and a half perches, for which labour so performed petitioner, has, according to original contract, a balance of £39 2s. 3d. foregoing all other considerations, deems that said balance is due since the summer of 1847. That petitioner is still indebted to sundry labourers for making said Road; that from time to time he applied for a settlement, but was refused, James Douglas, Esq., aforesaid Commissioner, always saying the funds appropriated for such road, from altercation with certain opposing parties, was thereby expended, and that he had no means of paying him. Petitioner, being in great distress, applied last fall, previous to the late elections, and solicited a further five pounds, and two pounds also due for three years on a former contract. About two weeks ago he again applied, and was offered by aforesaid Commissioner ten pounds and be clear, which petitioner refused. Believing himself, therefore, to be a great sufferer, and his grievance one of a public nature, and from his present circumstances he is unable to seek redress at law; his crops, also were bad last fall, the potatoes altogether destroyed by the rot. He further believes and confides in your well-known mercy, and presumes to think by application to your honourable House is the most judicious and only way to gain relief. Therefore prays that you will, in your wisdom, so redress his grievance in this his present and pressing application in such a way as to remove the anxiety and present distress of himself and helpless family; and that they will, as in duty bound, ever pray.

Sir,—

I have received your letter of the 16th instant, enclosing the petition of James Edwards, relative to a contract which he had entered into in the year 1844, with the Central Board of Road Commissioners.

In reply, I have to remark, that the statements in the petition of Edwards of his having entered into a contract with the Road Commissioners, and his being prevented of making the road through the premises of Messrs. R. Alsop and Co., are correct.

As soon, however, as Mr. Alsop's intentions were made known to the Chairman, to prevent delay or loss to the Contractor, he entered into a fresh arrangement with Edwards, to the effect that he was to pass the premises referred to, and to make the road to the Eastward

thereof, and the Contractor the more readily assented to this offer, as the work to the Eastward was much easier of accomplishment than that part which passes through Alsop's ground, where the cut is double the depth of any other portion of the road which Edwards had contracted to make. Edwards is, therefore, incorrect in stating that he had a dispute with the Commissioners, as the matter was not submitted to them, but was an arrangement altogether with the Chairman to expedite the execution of the work.

In regard to the delay complained of, it is without even the shadow of foundation, the converse is the fact; Edwards was not only urged but importuned to finish his contract, but he disregarded all remonstrance, and kept the work to suit his own convenience; and it was too notorious at the time to be now gainsaid, that Edwards, instead of pushing his contract to completion, employed himself and his men in screening and selling sand, to the great annoyance of passengers, some of whom complained of the nuisance committed by encumbering the roadway with sand and screenings, and it was not until after the lapse of three years that the contract was indifferently finished, passed the Board of Control, and was paid in the usual way.

With reference to the sum of £39 2s. 3d, it is claimed for work which was not only unauthorised, but in express opposition to the intentions of the Board, and the instant the mistake was observed Inspector Tobin gave notice to Edwards to discontinue the work, and the more especially as the road was not laid out at this part, and the contractor had diverged from the intended line.

When Edwards was questioned as to the reasons which induced him to enter on work not embraced in his contract, his answer to the Inspector, and also to the Chairman, was that he had done so to procure material for those parts of his contract which required it; moreover had it been the intention of the Board to make the part for which payment is sought, the work might have been contracted for at little more than one half the price which Edwards had for his contract.

As much is said in the petition about a departure from the original contract, I deem it necessary, for the information of his Excellency, to acquaint you that a distinct and separate contract was entered into afterwards with Edwards for that part of the road which passes through land in the occupancy of Messrs. R. Alsop and Co., and for the performance of which 10s. extra per perch was allowed the contractor; and it is worthy of notice that, although this contract was agreed upon long after the one alluded to in the petition, it was, nevertheless, completed and passed before the previous one; and to indemnify the contractor against all previous and assumed losses, the extra 10s., was allowed him, and no claim was made for any extra work until his contract was passed.

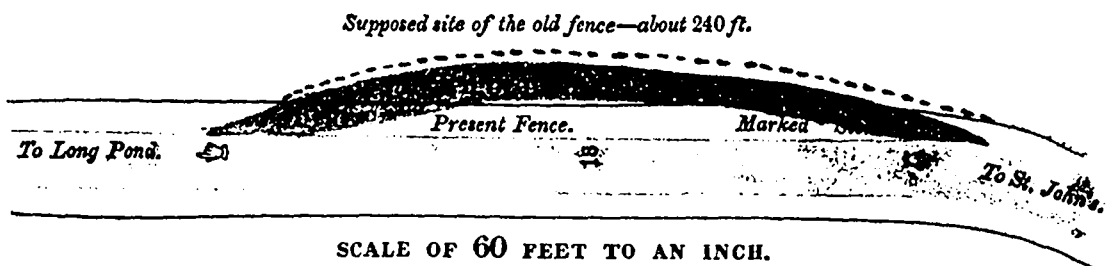

I beg to acquaint you, for the information of his Excellency the Governor, that upwards of 80 feet of the bridge or platform over the stream which divides the settlement of Petty Harbour was swept away during the recent heavy thaw, which unfortunate circumstance has, to a great extent, cut off the communication and intercourse between the South and North sides of the Harbour, unless at considerable risk.

I have caused an examination of the stream, and an estimate to be made of the cost of erecting a permanent Bridge over that part which has been carried away, as also the cost of repairing that portion of the old bridge which has been materially damaged; a statement of the estimated cost I herewith enclose.

REFERENCE TO THE ROAD NEAR WATERFORD BRIDGE.

Sir,—

I beg to acquaint you, for the information of His Excellency the Governor, that owing to the severe frost during the winter, the river both above and below Waterford Bridge is jammed with ice, so much so that the water is forced out of its usual channel, and overflows the low ground immediately to the north of the bridge, and to the injury of the main road, as well as the road from the bridge to the School-house.

Should the river be allowed to remain in its present state until the breaking up of the ice and snow, it would endanger the bridge, and might carry it away; Goff's Bridge, at Portugal Cove, and Dunscomb's Bridge, on the old Placentia road, are similarly circumstanced.

I have deemed it my duty to bring the situation of these Bridges under the special consideration of his Excellency, and to acquaint you that by cutting the ice above and below them it would greatly ensure their safety, and to accomplish which the sum of £25 would be requisite.

I have received Lieutenant-Colonel Law's Despatch (No. 36) of the 26th January, reporting that the House of Assembly of Newfoundland had reduced the Salary of the Clerk of the Supreme and Central Circuit Courts, from £500 to £350 per annum.

I cannot abstain from expressing my regret at the reduction which the Assembly has been pleased to make in the Salary of this office, as I fear that the rate now determined upon is lower than will be consistent with the true interests of the Colony. I have received Lieutenant-Colonel Law's Despatch (No. 33) of the 26th January, enclosing an Address to myself from the General Assembly of Newfoundland, protesting against the appointment of Mr. Dawson to the Office of Chief Clerk and Registrar of the Supreme Court in that Colony.

You will take the first opportunity which presents itself to communicate to the General Assembly of Newfoundland my assurance that it was far from my intention to disparage the claims to the consideration of the Colonial Bar, or of any other members of the community in Newfoundland, when I advised the Queen to appoint Mr. Dawson to the situation of Chief Clerk and Registrar of the Supreme Court. I have no doubt that there are many residents in Newfoundland who are perfectly competent to discharge the duties of the office in question, but I considered that it would, on general grounds, be more to the advantage of the Colony to select in this instance a gentleman from this country for the appointment.

DESPATCH FROM THE SECRETARY OF STATE FOR THE COLONIES TO HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR, TRANSMITTING AN ACT OF THE IMPERIAL PARLIAMENT "FOR THE NATURALIZATION OF ALIENS."

Sir,—

In the last session of Parliament an Act was passed for the "Naturalization of Aliens," 10th and 11th Victoria, ch. 83. I herewith enclose a copy of it.

The Preamble of that Act explains briefly the circumstances in which it originated. In almost all the British Colonies laws had, of late years, been enacted, the object of which was to impart the privileges of natural-born British subjects to aliens inhabiting the Colonies in

which those enactments were made. On referring those Acts to the successive Law Officers of the Crown, it appeared from their answers to such references, to be a matter of great doubt whether they were valid and effectual for their purpose, and whether the Queen could properly be advised to confirm them. The principal ground of this doubt was the existence in the British Statute Book of various general Acts respecting the Naturalization of Aliens, some of which Acts of Parliament, and especially the Statute 7 and 8 Vic., chap. 66, were supposed by Her Majesty's legal advisers to extend to, and to be in force throughout, the British Colonies. But the Colonial Acts in question being found to be in several respects at variance with, and repugnant to, those Acts of Parliament, it was inferred that such Colonial enactments were null and void either in whole or in part.

To obviate a conclusion replete with so much inconvenience, and recommended by no assignable advantage, Her Majesty's Government recommended to Parliament, in their last Session, the passing of the Act which I now enclose.

The result of that Act is—first, to give validity to all Colonial Naturalization Acts formerly passed, and to declare that they shall be taken to have been valid from the time of their enactment; secondly, the Act then proceeds to provide that all Naturalization Acts which shall hereafter be passed by any Colonial Legislature shall, within the limits of the Colony, have the force of law, any law or statute to the contrary notwithstanding; but thirdly, both the retrospective and prospective operation of the 10th and 11th Vic., chap. 83, is confined to Colonial Acts which authorize the enjoyment of the privileges of naturalization within the limits of the Colony within which such Act shall have been or shall be made. It also declares, fourthly, that all such Naturalization Laws shall be subject to the rules which regulate the enactment and disallowance of Colonial Laws on any other subject. And finally, it declares that the 7th and 8th Vic., chap. 66, does not extend to the British Colonies.

The result of those enactments will be to remove all doubts which hitherto have prevented the confirmation of various Naturalization Acts of the different British Colonies, and to ascertain the competency of the Colonial Legislatures to confer on aliens the privileges of natural-born British subjects, if the exercise of those privileges be limited to the particular Colony in which the enactment may be made.

It may obviate a possible misconception to add, that inasmuch as that part of the Navigation Act which confines to British subjects the ownership of British registered Shipping is not repealed but continues in full force, the disability of an alien, naturalized under a Colonial Act, to own such Shipping is not removed by the accompanying Statute, 10th and 11th Vic., cap. 83. It would, indeed, be at variance with the terms of that Act to claim such a privilege in pursuance of it, inasmuch as the privileges which it authorizes the Colonial Legislatures to confer are expressly restricted to the limits of the Colony within which they may so be conferred.

I propose, in a series of separate Despatches, to advert to, and dispose of, the particular questions of this kind which have hitherto been pending; those separate Despatches being, of course, addressed to the Governors of those colonies only in which any such questions have arisen.

AN ACT FOR THE NATURALIZATION OF ALIENS.

22nd July, 1847.

Whereas by divers Acts, Statutes, or Ordinances enacted by the Legislatures of divers of Her Majesty's Colonies or Possessions abroad, provision hath been made for imparting to divers Aliens there resident the privileges, or some of the privileges, of Naturalization, to be exercised and enjoyed within the respective limits of such Colonies and Possessions respectively ;—and whereas doubts have arisen as to the competency of the said Legislatures to enact any such laws, statutes, or ordinances, and as to the validity of the same when so enacted, and it is expedient that such doubts be removed. Be it therefore, and it is hereby declared and enacted by the Queen's Most Excellent Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and Commons in this present Parliament assembled, and by the authority of the same, That all Acts, Statutes, and Ordinances heretofore made and enacted by the Legislatures of any of Her Majesty's Colonies and Possessions abroad, for imparting to any person or persons the privileges, or any of the privileges, of Naturalization, to be by such person or persons exercised and enjoyed within the respective limits of such Colonies or Possessions respectively, shall within such limits have and be taken, and reputed to have had from the time of the enactment thereof respectively, all such and the same force and effect as doth by Law belong to any other Law, Statute, or Ordinance made or enacted by any such respective Legislatures.

II.—And be it and it is hereby enacted and declared, That all Laws, Statutes, and Ordinances which shall hereafter be made and enacted by the Legislatures of any of Her Majesty's Colonies or Possessions abroad for imparting to any person or persons the privileges or any of the privileges of Naturalization, to be by any such person or persons exercised and enjoyed within the limits of any such Colonies and Possessions respectively, shall, within such limits, have the force and authority of Law, any Law, Statute, or Usage to the contrary in anywise notwithstanding: Provided nevertheless, that all such Laws, Statutes, and Ordinances shall be made and enacted in such manner and form, and subject to and in conformity with all such rules as now or hereafter shall be in force in respect of other Laws, Statutes, or Ordinances enacted or to be enacted by any such Legislatures respectively, and shall and may be confirmed or disallowed by Her Majesty in such and the same manner, and subject to the same rules and regulations as extend, or as shall hereafter extend to the confirmation or disallowance of any other such laws, statutes, or ordinances.

III.—And whereas a certain Act was made and enacted in the Seventh and Eighth Year of the Reign of Her present Majesty, intituled, *An Act to amend the Laws relating to Aliens*: And whereas doubts have arisen whether the said recited Act of the Seventh and Eighth Year of Her Majesty's Reign extends to and is in force in Her Majesty's Colonies or Possessions abroad; now it is hereby further enacted and declared, That the said recited Act of the Seventh and Eighth Year of Her Majesty's Reign, or any part of it, doth not extend to the said Colonies or Possessions, or to any of them.

IV.—And be it further enacted, That this Act may be amended or repealed by any other Act of this present Session of Parliament.

I enclose herewith, for your information, the accompanying copies of a correspondence between the office of the Lords Commissioners of the Treasury and my Department, on the subject of the erection of a Light House at Cape Pine, Newfoundland.

You will learn from the enclosed Minute of the Board of Treasury, that an estimate for a grant to the amount of £2000 sterling will be submitted to the House of Commons this Session on account of the erection of the proposed building, and that communications have been addressed to the Master-General and Board of Ordnance, to the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, and to the Elder Brethren of the Trinity House, requesting them to take such steps as may be necessary for the immediate commencement of the work. As the Light House will be built under the superintendence of the Commanding Royal Engineer in Newfoundland, you will render to that officer every assistance within your power of which he may stand in need. As all the necessary preliminary arrangements will now be shortly made by the Public Departments in this country, Her Majesty will be advised to confirm the Act passed by the Colonial Legislature on the 29th April, 1844, making due provision for the maintenance of the Light.

I am therefore to request that you would move their Lordships' to give such instructions as may be necessary for this purpose, and direct their attention to your letter of the 4th May last, which stated that in the case of a Light House which was proposed to be erected of Iron, at the Cape of Good Hope, the enhanced price of Iron at that time, together with the charge for freight, would prevent any saving been effected by the use of that material.

Copy of Treasury Minute, dated 19th March, 1847.

My Lords refer to the communication made by direction of this Board to the Secretary of State, on the May, 1841, stating that upon provision being made by the Legislature of Newfoundland, either separately or with aid from the other North American Colonies, for the future maintenance of a Light House on Cape Pine, the Board would be prepared to recommend to Parliament such grant as may be requisite for defraying the expense of constructing the Light House, and my Lords have before them the Act passed by the Legislature of Newfoundland for making such provision, with the Acts relating to the appointment of Commissioners to take charge of the Light Houses belonging to that Colony; and likewise refer to the correspondence that has taken place with the Colonial Government and with the Ordnance and Admiralty Boards, and the Trinity Board, relating to the Light on Cape Pine.

Let an Estimate be prepared and laid before the House of Commons for a Grant, in the present Session, to the amount of £2,000, on account of expenses to be incurred for the construction of the said Light House; and let the requisite extracts from the above-mentioned correspondence in explanation of the Estimate, be annexed thereto.

Write to the Secretary to the Ordnance, and, referring to his letters of the 12th February and 23d April, 1845, and to the reports therein forwarded to this Board, as well as to the previous communications with this Department on the subject of the construction of a Light House on the Southern Coast of Newfoundland, request he will state to the Master General and Board that my Lords are desirous that steps should now be taken without delay for proceeding with the said works.

Transmit to the Secretary copies of the communications from the Board of Admiralty of the 19th August and 13th December, 1845, and of their enclosures, together with copies of the letter from the Trinity Board of 10th February, 1846, and of the letter from Mr. Alexander

Gordon, of 7th February, 1846, in order that they may be submitted to the Master-General and Board; and with reference thereto request the Secretary will, in the first place, state to the Master-General and Board that there appears to my Lords to be no doubt as to the expediency of selecting the site for the Light House at or near Cape Pine, as suggested in the Report of the Hydrographer of the Admiralty; and that my Lords conceive it to be desirable, in whatever manner the work may be executed, that it should be under the supervision of the Master-General and Board, and of the Commanding Royal Engineer of Newfoundland; but that my Lords will at the same time move the Secretary of State and the Lords of the Admiralty to give such directions as may ensure the Commanding Engineer receiving all practicable assistance and co-operation from the Colonial Government and the Local Commissioners of Light Houses, and from the Surveying or other Officers of Her Majesty's Navy, both in the selection of the site for the building and in all other matters connected with the work.

Further request that the Secretary will accordingly move the Master-General and Board to instruct the Commanding Royal Engineer to take the requisite steps, in communication with any Officer of H. M.'s Navy who may be delegated by the Lords of the Admiralty to assist in this respect, for determining the site for the Light House, with any requisite buildings for the use of the Light-Keepers, or the reception of stores; and likewise to furnish such further particulars respecting the means that may be attainable in the Island for constructing the buildings, either in masonry or in such other mode as may have been adopted in the construction of the existing Light Houses in Newfoundland, and in regard to the facilities the site selected for the buildings may afford for making those means available, or for landing either Wrought Stones or Iron Castings, in the event of its being found necessary to adopt the suggestions in regard to the transmission of those materials from this country or from the neighbouring Colonies of Nova Scotia or New Brunswick, as will enable the Master-General and Board to determine what arrangements it will be desirable to make for the execution of this work.

Further state that my Lords will request the Elder Brethren of the Trinity House to furnish the Master-General and Board with any information regarding the nature and dimensions of the Lantern and Lighting Apparatus that may be necessary for the guidance of the Commanding Engineer, and will also request the Elder Brethren to cause steps to be taken for the preparation of these portions of the work whenever the requisite particulars for this purpose can be ascertained.

I have to acknowledge the receipt of a Despatch from Lieut.-Col. Law, dated 27th March, (No. 57), in which he transmits the copy of an Act passed in the last session of the General Assembly of Newfoundland, “to raise by Loan a Sum of Money for the general improvement of the Colony,” and inquires “whether there is any hope that the Government will in any way assist the Colony in carrying this Act into operation.”

The only answer which I can return to this question is, that I am prepared so far to give the measure the “recognition and approbation” of Her Majesty’s Government as to advise the Queen to confirm the Act; but that the credit of the British Treasury cannot be either directly or indirectly pledged to facilitate the raising of the proposed loan for the general improvement of Newfoundland.

Sir,—

I transmit to you the six accompanying copies of an Act of Parliament, entitled "An Act to render permanent certain parts of the Act for Amending the Constitution of the Government of Newfoundland," to which the Royal Assent was given on the 25th June last.

The effect of that Act is, as you will perceive, to render permanent so much of the Statute 5 & 6 Victoria, cap. 120, as enables the Queen to determine the qualifications of Members of the House of Assembly of Newfoundland, and to determine what length of residence in any District, and what other qualifications are requisite to enable any person to vote for, or to be elected as, a Member for that District.

It also renders permanent so much of the Statute 5 & 6 Victoria, as enables the Queen to assume the initiative in all money votes of the Assembly, and to render elections simultaneous, and to limit the time for the completion of them. Subject to these changes (now made permanent) the old Constitution of the Colony will revive. There will, therefore, henceforth, be two Houses of Local Legislature, viz., a Legislative Council, nominated by the Queen, and a House of Assembly elected by the people.

It has not seemed to Her Majesty's Government necessary any longer to maintain that peculiar system in Newfoundland which originated in the unfortunate events immediately preceding the enactment of the Statute 5 & 6 Victoria. We have thought it better, on every account, to propose to Parliament the re-establishment there of the Constitution in its original form, with such securities only against abuse as the experience of former times has proved to be indispensable. I sincerely trust that there will be no recurrence of those indiscretions of which the want of that experience was probably one of the principal causes.

You will consider and report to me what instruments and what appointments will be necessary for giving full effect to the Act which I transmit. They will then be prepared with the least possible delay.

CAP. XLIV.

An Act to render permanent certain Parts of the Act for amending the Constitution of the Government of Newfoundland. [25th June, 1847.]

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the Session of Parliament holden in the Fifth and Sixth Years of the Reign of Her Present Majesty, intituled *An Act for amending the Constitution of the Government of Newfoundland*, it was amongst other things enacted, that it should be lawful for Her Majesty, in or by any Commission or Commissions under the Great Seal of the United Kingdom, to be thereafter issued for the Government of *Newfoundland*, and in and by any Instructions under her Majesty's Signet and Sign Manual accompanying and referred to in any such Commission or Commissions, to establish a Qualification in respect of Income or Property in right of which any Person might be thereafter elected to serve as a Member of the Assembly of *Newfoundland*; provided that no such Qualification should be fixed at more than a net annual Income arising from any source whatsoever of One hundred Pounds, or the Possession of Property, clear of all Incumbrances, exceeding Five hundred Pounds in Amount or Value; and that it should be lawful for Her Majesty, in manner aforesaid, to fix and determine the Length of the Period of Residence within any Electoral District in the said Island which should be required, in addition to any other Qualification, for voting at Elections within such District, or for being elected to serve as a Member of the Assembly, provided that such Period should not extend beyond the Period of Two Years next preceding any such Election; and that it should be lawful for Her Majesty, in manner aforesaid, to restrain the said Assembly from appropriating to the public Service within the Island of *Newfoundland* any Part of the public Revenue thereof in cases where such Services should not have been previously recommended, or such Grants of Money should not have been previously asked by or on the behalf of Her Majesty; and that it should be lawful for Her Majesty, in manner aforesaid, to restrain and prohibit the Election of Members to serve in the said Assembly in different Districts on successive or different days, and to require that all such Elections should be simultaneous, and should be completed within a Time to be limited, and that any such future Commission or Instructions as aforesaid should be laid before both Houses of Parliament within Thirty Days next after the Date thereof, should Parliament then be in Session, or if not, then within Thirty Days next after the Commencement of the then next Session of Parliament; and it was thereby provided that no Change which should be made in the Constitution of the said Island under the said Act should continue for a longer time than the First Day of *September One thousand eight hundred and forty-six*, unless Parliament should otherwise order: And whereas by an Act passed in the Session of Parliament holden in the Ninth and Tenth Years of Her Majesty's Reign, intituled *An Act to continue till the First Day of September One thousand*

eight hundred and forty-seven certain of the Provisions of an Act of the Fifth and Sixth Years of Her present Majesty, for amending the Constitution of the Government of Newfoundland, it was enacted, that the Changes made in the Constitution of the said Island under the said recited Act should continue in force until the First Day of September One thousand eight hundred and forty-seven: And whereas upon and from the said First Day of September One thousand eight hundred and forty-seven the Changes made in the Constitution of the said Island under the first-recited Act will cease to be in force unless further Provision in that behalf be made by Parliament; and it is expedient that from and after the said First Day of September One thousand eight hundred and forty-seven the first-recited Act should cease to be in force, save only so far as the same is herein-before recited: Be it enacted by the Queen's most Excellent Majesty, by and with the Advice and Consent of the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and Commons, in this present Parliament assembled, and by the Authority of the same, That so much as is herein-before recited of the first-recited Act shall be permanent, and that upon and from and after the First Day of September One thousand eight hundred and forty-seven so much of the said Act as is not herein-before recited shall cease to be in force.

II. And be it enacted, That this Act may be amended or repealed by any Act to be passed during this Session of Parliament.

REPORT OF THE JOINT COMMITTEE ON BURIN RELIEF.

The Joint Committee of Her Majesty's Council and the House of Assembly, to whom was referred the Message of His Excellency the Governor transmitting and recommending to the consideration of the Council and Assembly certain returns received from the Stipendiary Magistrate at Burin, have taken the subject-matter of the said documents into their consideration, and beg to report as follows:—

The Committee lament to find, that notwithstanding a somewhat more than usually abundant catch of fish during the past season, by the inhabitants of Burin (exceeding an average for the large boats of seventy-five quintals a man—and for small boats or punts fifty quintals a man), very great distress exists in this locality; and that many hundreds of persons are now dependent for daily sustenance upon relief administered by the government, and upon the charitable contributions of private individuals. The particulars of the destitute condition of the inhabitants of Burin are so fully detailed in the reports of the Stipendiary Magistrate, accompanying the Message of His Excellency, as to render a repetition of them unnecessary.

In inquiring into the causes of this state of destitution, the Committee are able to trace its origin, mainly, to the almost entire failure for three successive years of the potato crop, added to a series of unprosperous fisheries for several years preceding the past one; and to the untoward events, in particular, of the year 1846, which were peculiarly distressing in their effects upon the settlements of Burin and its vicinity. But there are other circumstances which have powerfully contributed to the existence of the present unhappy state of affairs in this locality, to which the attention of the Committee has been called. Owing to the withdrawal, years ago, of the large mercantile houses who formerly carried on business in this part of Placentia Bay, and to the absence of late of any resident Supplying Merchant, the large majority of the in-

habitants have been dependent for their supplies upon casual traders from St. John's and Nova Scotia, resorting to these parts, with whom they have carried on a disadvantageous barter traffic—receiving in exchange for their fish supplies of food and other articles, the latter not seldom of a kind and quality unsuited to their wants, and at prices over which they can exercise no controul. Each successive spring has consequently found them less able to undertake the fishery with efficiency or advantage, from the want of salt, and the absence of other necessary supplies. That during the past season their necessities, owing to the distress of the preceding winter, being greater than usual, the fishermen (more especially those in the small boats) were compelled from the want of salt, to sell their green or newly-caught fish from day to day, to procure food for the sustenance of life—being obliged, too, in many instances, to take in exchange for the produce of their labour, articles which they did not require. The catch of fish, therefore, which, if cured as taken and disposed of under ordinary circumstances, would have gone far to keep the inhabitants independent of charitable aid, has been hardly equivalent to probably one-third of the same quantity of fish cured and made available in the usual course of business. Burin, it will be borne in mind also, does not participate in common with the inhabitants of the Northern and Eastern parts of the Island, in the benefits of the Seal Fishery; and the Committee have further reason to believe that there is in this settlement a larger proportion of widows and children than in other outport settlements.

In looking at the condition of the inhabitants of Burin, the Committee discover in it, unfortunately, many features of resemblance to the condition of the inhabitants in other parts of the Island, where the fishery is relied on as the sole means of support; and independent of causes which during the past three years have more immediately affected the prosperity and depressed the condition of the Colony, the Committee are impressed with the belief that, under even ordinarily favourable circumstances, the fishery of itself is not equal to the support of those who are engaged in it, in the taking and curing of fish. This result, the Committee are of opinion, has flowed from the great increase in the amount of our population dependent on the fishery, and to the operation of causes beyond our controul influencing unfavourably the state of the markets for our staple produce, and diminishing, consequently, the price paid to the producer to a sum by no means equivalent to the cost and labour of production.

But while the fisheries are inadequate to the burthen upon them, there are, notwithstanding, ample resources within the Colony, in agriculture and in other branches of industry, rightly applied, for the independent and comfortable subsistence of even a larger population than the existing one. To render these resources available, and thereby to alleviate the distressed condition of Burin and of other portions of the Colony, as well as to provide the means of preventing a repetition of the enormous demands which, within the past two years, have been made on the Public Treasury, and, above all, to arrest the growth of a system so destructive of the energies, the self-reliance, and the morals of the people, the Committee have, after the consideration of various suggestions, agreed to recommend to the Council and Assembly the adoption of a plan which, anticipating in some measure the appropriations to be made during the present and the next three years for public works, will provide the means of employment for such able-bodied men in the localities in which distress is likely to prevail, as will probably require aid from the local Government for their relief, and at the same time develop the agricultural resources of the Colony, and promote settlement in those places which possess the greatest facilities and advantages, and hold out the best prospects for the cultivation of the soil.

The Committee, therefore, recommend that the construction of the main lines of Road mentioned in the Estimate and Schedule annexed to this Report should be proceeded with, and, as

far as practicable, completed. That surveys and allotments be made of such portions of land in different parts of the Island, as are best adapted for agriculture, and upon a report to be made by the Surveyor General, or under his direction and controul, and approved of by the Governor and Council, sums of money should be expended in the opening of cross or agricultural roads through such allotments as will, while affording employment to the poor inhabitants, facilitate their settlement upon and cultivation of the land—that the maximum amount to be expended upon the main lines, as well as on the cross roads, as specified and detailed by Act of the Legislature, and with a view to the adoption of a scale for that purpose, the Committee beg to refer to the accompanying Estimate. That to secure the employment to be afforded in the performance of these public works, to the poorer inhabitants of the different localities who are from present appearances likely to require relief from Government, the works should be undertaken and carried on in the Autumn, after the close of the fishery, and provision should be made for the employment of the poor in winter in procuring timber and other materials for Bridges. That in order more effectually to secure this employment to the poorest classes of able-bodied men, the price to be paid for the completion of the main lines of road should be limited not to exceed Seven Shillings per perch, and for the cross or agricultural roads Four Shillings a perch, or some other moderate amount—thus throwing the expenditure over so large a surface as to afford employment, as far as practicable, at no great distance from the homes of the residents in the different localities;—and in apportioning the work to be done, it might be set off with advantage in lots to be valued and drawn for indifferently by the parties to be employed. The details of the mode of expenditure of the money should be regulated by stringent provisions to be inserted in an Act for that purpose, which might usefully embrace many of the provisions of the existing Road Acts.

The full extent to which the Committee think it would be judicious to go, in the carrying out of this plan, is to the extent of £30,000—the expenditure of which spread over two, three, or more years, would afford time and opportunity for the inhabitants to turn their industry into other channels than that of the prosecution of the fishery, would develope favourably our agricultural resources, and afford scope for the cultivation of grain and other valuable substitutes for the potato, the disease of which, it is to be hoped, will have disappeared or been greatly mitigated in the course of two or three years hence.

To provide the means of meeting an expenditure so much larger than the present condition of the finances of the Colony will warrant, the Committee recommend that Treasury Notes for sums of £1 each should be issued from time to time to such an amount as may be required, not exceeding at the utmost the sum of £30,000; and it is highly improbable that so large an amount at any one time will ever be required. That such Notes should be payable by the Treasurer in discharge of any warrants to be drawn upon him, and be convertible into Specie on presentation at the Treasury, at the expiration of one month after being issued—one day in each month being appointed for the purpose of the same being presented and paid. That they shall be received at the Custom House in payment of Colonial Duties, and be re-issued from time to time as occasion may require—provision being made that the total amount to be issued shall be reduced annually to the extent of seven and a-half per cent. until the whole are called in. The Committee are of opinion that by retaining in the Treasury at all times specie to the extent of one-third or one-fourth of the issue of Notes, and from the small amounts for which these shall be issued, and their consequent general circulation, combined with the discretionary power to re-issue them, no difficulty whatever need be apprehended on the score of their convertibility, nor of their unrestricted general use throughout the Island.

While the adoption of the proposition of the issue of Treasury Notes is, in the opinion of the

Committee, necessary to the carrying into effect the plan which they now recommend for the relief of the poorer classes, by the advancement of the public works, the promotion of agriculture, and the development of other beneficial resources of industry—it is one to which they also look as likely to be advantageous to the Colony in other respects. At present the debt of the Colony is subject to a very heavy rate of interest. The employment of a paper currency, therefore, to a limited extent, though resorted to in the first instance as the means of carrying into operation the measures now suggested, may be made useful during the period limited for its existence (should our Revenue not fall short of its estimated amount) in reducing to some extent the interest now payable upon the public debt.

The Committee also recommend that provision should be made for supplying the different localities of the Island where the greatest necessity prevails, with seed corn, in order that the land heretofore under cultivation may not lie waste during the ensuing season.

The Committee have appended to this Report suggestions submitted by two or three of their members, which contain many matters worthy of consideration in carrying into effect the plan now proposed.

A large portion of the Estimate for 1849 must necessarily be expended in the year 1850 ;— by making an additional appropriation of £10,000 for that year, and an equal sum for the year following; it may be said that sufficient profitable employment will be secured for the years 1849, 1850, 1851, and 1852, as the conclusion of the season will be as soon as the sum of fifty thousand pounds can be expended.

The whole of the expenditure for public works we propose to provide for by the issue, by the Colony, of One, Five, and Ten Pound Notes, say—

These Notes to be received in payment for all Colonial Works, and for all Colonial Duties, and to be convertible into *specie* at the option of the holders, at the Colonial Treasurer's Office, either quarterly or monthly, as may be determined upon. Seven and-a-half per cent of the issue to be cancelled yearly by the Colony, by which means the whole issue will be paid off in about thirteen years, and at a cost to the Colony of little more than the usual interest.

My dear Sir,—

In compliance with the wishes of his Excellency, I have devoted my most anxious attention in maturing a project which may have the effect of relieving his Excellency's Government from the pressure upon it for the support of paupers in all parts of the island, and which must lead to financial embarrassment if not checked in some effectual manner.

The enclosed statement, which I request you will lay before his Excellency, will fully explain the only project I have to propose. It is to give general and simultaneous employment to the able-bodied labourers in every district of the island.

First,—By completing and uniting the Main Lines of Roads, opening thereby a communication with the populous settlements in each district, and connecting the whole with St. John's.

Secondly,—In opening up the country in each district by what I call Agricultural Roads, thereby giving employment to those who may stand in need of it, and affording a favourable opportunity for cultivation and settlement.

There is a main principle in this plan, which I think is indispensable for its useful working, strictly limiting the expenditure to seven shillings per perch, or some other moderate amount in the main lines, and to four shillings and sixpence in the agricultural lines—this throws the expenditure over a large extent of surface, and would afford employment at no great distance from the homes of the residents in each locality.

If this proposition for giving general employment will be found practicable, it would in a great degree relieve the government from the pressure that now rests upon it for the support of paupers throughout the Colony.

I could not recommend to his Excellency so large an expenditure under the present state of the finances of the colony, without at the same time suggesting a mode for providing for it, which I hope will meet with his Excellency's approval.

The proposition I have to make on that head, is to recommend the issue of Colonial Bank Notes, of One, Five, and Ten Pounds, to be received in payment for all Public Works, and for all Colonial Duties, and to be convertible, at the option of the holders, into Specie, by application at the Colonial Treasurer's Office, monthly or quarterly, as it may be determined on, seven and a half per cent of the whole issue to be cancelled by the Colony annually, by which, at a cost of little more than the usual interest, the whole issue will be paid off in little more than thirteen years.

In humbly and respectfully submitting these propositions for the approval of his Excellency, I may be permitted to say that I have given this important subject all the consideration in my power to bestow upon it; and that I felt doubly anxious to aid his Excellency in his praiseworthy efforts to raise the country into a state of self-reliance, and to put an end to that system of pauperism so degrading and demoralising to the people of the Colony, possessing within itself so many elements of remunerative and productive employment.

From the nature of the present distress that prevails throughout the country, and particularly because you meet the same wide-spread complaint of destitution from every District and almost from every Harbour and Cove of the Island, it is clear that, in order to stem the difficulty of the time, some method must be adopted, materially differing from any hitherto used, in meeting the just claims of the poor, and most especially ought such a course be devised as will be most calculated to conduce to the public good.

There is nothing clearer than that we shall have to make a large outlay of money before the commencement of the Fishery to keep the poor people alive, and then it is necessary for us to examine all the consequences of that expenditure.

If the money, or its worth in provisions, be distributed amongst the community simply as a loan, is there not danger of moral injury to those who, hitherto, have been industrious, and have been forced to look to Government aid by misfortune? May not these alone teach them an easier mode of supplying their families with the winter's food than renewed exertion or increased economy.

Then we have also to consider that in the present state of the Colonial finances, if the poor be fed in this way, and they have a right to be supported at all events, the general improvement of the country must stand still; because you have not the means of embracing both services, except some plan could be devised calculated to combine both objects and bring them together under the same expenditure.

Look at the state of Burin at present, the whole population sinking under the extreme of destitution. This appears to us appalling, but the only reason is, because we have not yet had accounts from the other remote settlements. I only fear that you will receive as heart-rending from the Northward; and I myself know, that in many parts of the District of Placentia and St. Mary's there is no less of misery.

We recommend the Executive to transmit, for the relief of Burin, a quantity of Indian Meal, accompanying that recommendation with a general suggestion that labour be returned for it. In doing this, would it not be better to send them a still more substantial relief, and point out the especial work to be accomplished in return. For instance:

If we look into the report of Mr. Acting Judge Simms, on the table of the House of Assembly, we find he adverts to the importance of the Road from Burin to Fortune Bay, the completion of which, he tells you, from personal observation, would render unnecessary the use of a vessel beyond Burin; yet, this is only one of the very many public advantages that would flow from that important line of communication. Why not, then, point to this road, and tell the people of Burin to make that road practicable for the food you give them, and by so doing you will have made a permanent improvement—you will greatly add to the comforts and convenience of the numerous and populous settlements on both sides of that neck of land, while you are affording the greatest facility to the administration of Justice, and the same principle may be brought to apply to every other part of the Island. Point to the particular work you require to have done and you may be certain that, while you are bountifully relieving the poor, you will be doing more for the moral improvement of the people, and the physical improvement of the country, than has been done for many years, and at an expense comparatively trifling.

I may be told, however, that it would be a hardship to ask the people of Burin to go so far from home as the extremity of the road to Garnish or Grand Bank, and in the same way of other settlements. But the system I thus beg leave to suggest has already been put in practice, and with the happiest results.

The road from St. Mary's to Salmonier, where it joins the road from Placentia to St. John's, and by which is the road to the Capital for the people of that and the neighbouring settlements, is twenty-two miles long, and only that portion that lay between St. Mary's and River-head was practicable, on that way, wild and desolate as it was; some lives had been lost through hardship arising from the great difficulty of travelling it. Last year, however, the people lost their potatoes and the fishery, and they were in destitution, but in asking for relief they sought it not as alms, but asked to be permitted to earn their food by their labour. The Government sent it there, and for the moderate supply granted to that locality, sixteen miles of road were opened and drained—the people cheerfully went upon the most remote lots, and not a murmur of complaint was heard from them. In this way their immediate wants were relieved, and the country has the great advantage of a road made over a difficult and dangerous country, that has completely stripped the journey to St. John's of the greatest of its difficulties.

The plan adopted was simply this. The whole road was carefully divided into lots, equalling the number of families requiring relief. These lots were then fairly valued, and the number of each lot having been written on paper, the head of each family drew, and was content with that which chance, in this manner, sent him, feeling that there was no undue preference given to any. If this mode, therefore, were generally put in practice throughout the country, a great quantity of public work would be accomplished, the people would be fed, and you would not

be fated to hear a single complaint on the subject from any part of the Island, while at the same time the moral character of the people would be sustained.

JOHN DELANEY.

To check the spirit of pauperism increasing to such an alarming extent, I would suggest that Committees be instituted in every part of the colony, and these Committees be formed of all the Magistrates and Clergymen in each district, and each part of such district, where it is necessary to give relief; and that where a Committee could not be conveniently formed of such persons as before named, that his Excellency be empowered and requested to name any other person or persons to form a part or the whole of such Committees.

That on the 15th of September, in each and every year, the Stipendiary Magistrates of every district, or part of district, should cause Proclamations to be posted in the usual places, calling on the inhabitants who wanted relief or expected relief in the forthcoming winter to give in their names by the 1st of October, and that on the 15th of October these persons requiring, or expected to be relieved, should be set to work in making or repairing of roads, bridges, &c., in all parts where such work was necessary, and in other parts where such work was unnecessary; that then the Committee should fix on some good spot of uncultivated and ungranted land, and there employ these labourers seeking for relief, to work either by the day at two shillings currency, or by task labour at one shilling per perch, as the labourers who are industrious would be inclined to take the latter, as they could without doubt, earn more than two shillings per day—that a Stipendiary Constable or Constables should be required to superintend these labourers, and to be paid for such superintendence, either per the day or at a per centage on the sum expended.

That on the first day of May in each and every year, such parts or parcels of Land which should be thus cleared and fit for some crop be exposed to Public Sale, and delivered to the highest bidder, on such conditions as His Excellency the Governor with the advice of his Council should dictate.

But to return to the labourers. When the season was too much advanced to continue clearing the land, then they should be directed and employed in cutting and preparing stakes and longers for fencing the land thus cleared, or in performing such necessary work as the district required, and that encouragement should be held out to spend their winter evenings in picking oakum, mending or making of cod-nets, or salmon, or herring-nets, and paid for such labour in a fair and reasonable manner by each Committee.

That each Committee should be authorised to draw on the Secretary of the Colony for the means to pay these labourers as the exigency of their case might require, either in cash or necessary food—and that the Stipendiary Magistrate should from time to time render a particular and detailed account of every transaction.

REPORT OF THE SELECT COMMITTEE ON MAIN LINES OF ROADS.

The Committee appointed to take evidence on the subject of Main Lines of Roads, now under the consideration of the House, beg leave to report that they have given their attention to the matter, and have taken evidence thereon, which is herewith annexed.

The principal point on which your Committee was instructed to consider was, what Lines of Roads in the Colony should be considered Main Lines, and it appears by the evidence that the following are alone those which come under that designation:—

The Road from St. John's to Renews; Ditto from St. John's to Holyrood, thence to Salmonier, St. Mary's, and Placentia.

The Road from Holyrood to Carbonear, and thence to Heart's Content.

The Road from St. John's to Portugal Cove.

The Road from Trinity to Catalina.

Mr. DOUGLAS'S opinion respecting the Contract system in making Roads, or the employment of destitute able-bodied men by daily labour:—

Considers the Contract system, where practicable, to be preferable and cheaper than employing men by the day, more especially on Main Lines of Roads, where the amount of making can be fairly estimated and the contract laid out in small lots; but men may be usefully employed by the day in scouring and cleaning Drains and partial Road mending, at proper seasons of the year.

MR. BYRNE'S OPINION ON THE SAME SUBJECT.

Which would it be better to employ Labourers by the day on Road making than by Contract, as by the former the poorer class could be employed, and the latter would be calculated to throw the work into the hands of large Contractors.

If there be a fair equivalent in labour expected for the money expended, the Contract system is far the best for many reasons. In the first instance, the poorer class who are able and inclined to work could be employed on the Contract system as well as on the other; when by the day they will have to be from perhaps 12 to 20 men in each body; there are generally to be found in such numbers a few who are disposed to do as little work as possible, and in a short time will make their more industrious and more willing fellow-labourers do the same.

By making a fair estimate of the work where it can be done, and laying it out into small Contracts, and the lots numbered, the applicants for labour could draw their lots and fall into their numbers accordingly, and each could have such of his children assisting him as would be enabled to do so; by this mode, instead of causing the willing and industrious to become idle, the idle person will be induced to vie with the more industrious. The Colony will get three or four times as much work done for the same money, and the labourer may earn as much and a half in the same time by the latter than by the former system.

It is difficult to give a fair equivalent in wages per day to boys of different ages, and it would be doing a wrong to put the willing and industrious person on a level with the idle man.

To give an example:—in the Fall of 1847 the Central Board of Road Commissioners had a small sum at their disposal to drain part of the St. Mary's Road, and His Excellency the Governor added to it; there were at first some 40 lots laid out, at about £4 16s. each; there had been above 120 applicants for labour, who were recommended by the Magistrates and Clergymen; each person drew a lot and fell into work according to his number; this gave general satisfaction, as each party had an equal chance of the good lot when there might be any difference; the work was done as cheap as similar work which the Board let by public tender. The same system was adopted on the Placentia Road, with similar results, but the labourers did not make as much wages as those at St. Mary's, as the season was later and the days much shorter, on account of the time it took to make the line of Road and lay out the work. The same system was adopted last Spring on the South Shore of Conception Bay, with similar results; the most of the lots in the latter place was made in value of £3. 12s. each, a few at about £2. 5s. each, and varied from 1s. 5d. to 5s. per perch—there has been upwards of 100 persons employed there.

In several places between St. John's and Pouch Cove there were parties employed this Fall by the day ; the work done cost in some places 28s. per perch, where similar work in the same neighbourhood was got done by contract at the rate of from 5s. 6d. to 6s. 6d. per perch. In other places the difference was greater, but there was a disadvantage on account of the lateness of the season.

I do not mean to recommend that this system should be substituted for that provided by the same Road Bill, as respects the ordinary expenditure of monies voted for Roads, but that it is the best mode of expending monies intended as much for the support of the poor as for the improvement of Roads.

REPORT OF THE SELECT COMMITTEE ON THE REVENUE BILL—PRESENTED BY MR. SHEA.

The Select Committee appointed to take Evidence on the subject of the Tariff now under the consideration of the House, beg leave to report that they have given their best attention to the important matter entrusted to their deliberation, and have taken evidence thereupon, which is herewith annexed.

The leading point on which your Committee was instructed to consider was the question of

differential duties, as to whether it was for the interest of this Colony that this principle should be maintained in the proposed fiscal arrangement. To this inquiry accordingly the Committee devoted their chief attention, and the result has been to determine them to report to the House, that in the present position of the commercial relations of the Colony, the total abandonment of differential duties would not be a wise or prudent measure. The evidence of several leading mercantile men who were examined before the Committee accurately coincides in support of this view, and points out the probable evils to which our trade would be exposed by the removal of the existing differential duties on the produce of the West Indies. In most of the British West India Colonies, a differential duty of Two Shillings sterling per quintal is maintained in favour of our fish, and though the Committee have learned nothing to warrant a confident assumption that this protection will be carried into the new fiscal schemes, they are still of opinion that our legislation should be so framed as to evince a recognition of the advantages this Colony derives from the existing Tariffs in the British West Indies, and exhibit our desire to give them every corresponding benefit in reference to the import of their produce into this Island. The sustainment of the principle of differential duties on these views of reciprocal advantage is accordingly the course which the Committee recommend for the adoption of your Honourable House.

It appeared to the Committee that should the differential principle be adopted, the Revenue might be exposed to loss by the importation from those places where the equalised scale of duties has been carried out, of Foreign goods under the name of British, thereby leading to an evasion of the higher duty assigned to the former. On this point the Collector of Her Majesty's Customs has offered a suggestion which the Committee fully approve, as it appears to them to afford the necessary protection in this regard. They would therefore recommend that in order to entitle such goods to the character of British, the Act shall require that they be imported direct from the place of production or manufacture, being a dependency of the United Kingdom.

With regard to the various suggestions connected with alterations in the scale of duties at present in force, the Committee decline offering any precise recommendation. They would observe, however, that where specific duties can be substituted for ad valorem, as in the cases referred to by Mr. Pack and Mr. William Barnes, the change appears to be desirable, particularly as tending to produce greater simplicity in the Tariff.

The scale of consolidated duties prepared by the Collector of Her Majesty's Customs, and now before the House, appears by the evidence to have been carefully and accurately considered, and will accordingly be a valuable aid in the determination of the proposed Tariff.

The Committee also approve of the recommendation made by the Collector in reference to the separation of the Acts; the one making provision for the management of the department, and the other providing the Tariff, as at present, from year to year.

The Committee sought information by written interrogatories from several mercantile gentlemen in Conception Bay, but the only answers they have yet received are from Robert Pack, Esq., and Thomas Ridley, Esq., whose replies form part of the evidence hereto annexed.

EVIDENCE :

WALTER GRIEVE, Merchant.—In the British West Indies, generally, there is a differential duty of two shillings per quintal in favour of Newfoundland Fish, which it is most important to this Trade to have preserved. A removal of the present discriminating duty in this Colony on West India produce might have the effect of inducing the British West India Colonies to remove the existing duties in favour of our Fish—would not therefore advise that the principle of discriminating duties on rum, sugar, molasses, &c., should be abandoned here; and more particularly, as such a change would not be attended with any beneficial result to the Revenue. If the discriminating duties on fish in the British West India Colonies were removed, it would probably have the effect of throwing the carrying trade of our fish into the hands of the Americans, and a large portion of the supply would be furnished by the French.

Thinks the duty on salted beef ought to be lessened. It is now the same as on pork, which is nearly of twice the value. Is of opinion that the duty on tea and tobacco might be advantageously reduced, as the present rates are so high as to produce smuggling, which he has no doubt is largely carried on in both these articles. Sees no reason why cattle should be exempted from duty, while a tax is laid on salted and fresh meat. Thinks the duty on segars may be reduced with benefit to the Revenue. Thinks a duty should be placed on lines, twines, nets, seines, hooks, &c.

Is not of opinion that it would be advisable to allow a drawback on the export of Manufactured goods (except in the original packages), as such a measure would be open to fraud and probably loss to the Revenue.

WALTER GRIEVE;

PETER McBRIDE, Merchant.—Is of opinion that while Newfoundland Fish is protected in the British West India Colonies by a discriminating duty, the differential duties in favour of the produce of those Colonies should be preserved. In the British West India Islands, generally, a duty exists in favour of British caught fish, of two shillings the quintal. It would be most prejudicial to the trade of this Colony if these differential duties were removed. Thinks if differential duties were removed here on the produce of those Colonies, it might lead there to the equalization of the fish duties. For these reasons, is strongly opposed to the repeal of differential duties, and fears such a measure might be of serious injury,

Thinks nets, lines, twines, seines, and hooks, as well as cattle, should pay a duty. The duty being for revenue every article should contribute. And on articles where the duty is so high as to induce smuggling, the rate should be lessened. Would therefore advise a reduction of duty on tea, tobacco, brandy, and cigars, as he believes a large amount of smuggling in these articles is carried on. If required for the revenue, sees no reason why a small tax should not be laid on salt, say sixpence a ton. Thinks the duty on salted beef should be reduced, being now the same as on pork, which is double the value. Approves generally of the scale of duties submitted to the House by Mr. Glen.

PETER McBRIDE.

EUGENIUS HARVEY, Merchant—Approves of the principle of discriminating duties, but thinks the principle should be extended to the North American Provinces, and should exist in favour of the produce of those provinces. Would advise a small increase of the duty on bread, so as to produce a greater equalization of the duty on this article and on flour, than at present exists. The reduction of the duty on foreign rum would not at all affect our fish trade with the United States, but thinks the revenue would be benefited by it. Thinks our fiscal regulations cannot in any way affect the fish trade with the United States, which is not of much importance to us. The fish is nearly all imported there and bonded for exportation. Thinks salted beef pays too high a duty at present. Would strongly recommend a large reduction of duty on tea, tobacco, brandy, and segars, which are now largely smuggled. If the present duties on tobacco and brandy should be continued, the legal importation of these articles must soon nearly if not altogether cease. Thinks cattle should pay a duty, and all the articles that are at present exempt. Approves generally of the scale of proposed duties prepared by Mr. Glen, and now in possession of the House.

KENNETH McLEA, Merchant—Is aware that a discriminating duty of two shillings the quintal is maintained in the British West India Islands in favour of British fish, under the Imperial Act. Thinks it would be unsafe, at present, to abandon the differential duties in this colony on West India produce, lest it may lead to a retaliatory measure in the British West Indies as regards our produce.

Thinks Bridport Goods—say, Seines, Nets, Lines, Twines, Hooks, &c., should pay the ordinary duty, say five per cent. Would not advise any duty on Salt. Thinks Bread could well bear a duty of sixpence per cwt., which will more nearly assimilate the duty to that paid on Flour. Is not prepared to say that he would advise any reduction of duty on Tea, Tobacco, or Brandy, as a reduction to be efficacious in the correction of smuggling should, he thinks, be to an extent that would prejudice the revenue at the present period. Thinks cattle should not be exempted from duty while fresh and salted meat are taxed.

Is opposed to a drawback on the exportation of Manufactured Goods, as he fears such a measure would expose the public revenue to imposture and loss.

WILLIAM BARNES, Merchant—Is of opinion that the differential duties as regards West India produce, should be preserved while these colonies continue to maintain a discriminating duty in favour of British fish.

Thinks on all essential articles of consumption, the equalized duty of five per cent should be as nearly as possible preserved. He would therefore suggest the following, instead of the existing duties:—

On Bread, sixpence per cwt. On Flour, one shilling per barrel. On Pork, two shillings

and sixpence per barrel. On Beef, one shilling and sixpence per barrel. On Corn Meal, sixpence per barrel. On Rice, one shilling per cwt. Salt, sixpence per ton. On Nets, Seines, Lines, Twines, Hooks, &c., to pay the same duty as other Manufactured Goods. On Cattle, five shillings per head. Believing that Tea and Tobacco are largely smuggled, would propose on these articles, viz—Tea, twopence per pound. Tobacco, one penny per pound; with a view to increase the legalised importation, which he thinks would be the result.

If the above changes should produce any loss of revenue, thinks it could be equitably made up by a commensurate increase of the duty on Manufactured Goods, which would be less felt by the poorer classes of the people. The present extra-colonial duty of 10 per cent. on all duties should be abolished, and substituted by an increase of one per cent on Manufactured Goods.

WILLIAM BARNES.

WILLIAM THOMAS, Merchant—Thinks that while the British West India Colonies retain a differential duty in favour of our fish, it would be unwise to abandon the principle of discriminating duties as regards their produce. If those Colonies abandon the principle of discriminating duties, thinks a large importation of French fish will be made there to the injury of our staple. Thinks Foreign goods have recently been imported from Nova Scotia, and sold here as British, thereby evading the differential duty. Does not think this would apply to the heavy articles of Rum, Sugar, Molasses, &c. Would re-enact the present scale of differential duties on Rum, Sugar, and Coffee.

Thinks the duties on Brandy, Tea, and Tobacco should be reduced, and that the Revenue would be benefited by this measure, as the existing duties stimulate smuggling which would be thereby corrected. Thinks all the articles at present exempted should bear a duty, including Salt, Cattle, &c. Thinks nothing should be excepted but Coin, Bullion, and Books.

If exported to the British ports thinks a drawback should be allowed on Manufactured Goods where the amount was fifty pounds. The certificate of the payment of the duty at those ports would be a sufficient security against fraud.

JAMES M. SPEARMAN, Collector—If the principle of discriminating duties be retained, it will be necessary to require that British goods affected by the principle shall be imported direct from places of production—without this restriction Foreign goods might be imported here as British from the Colonies where differential duties have been done away with, however desirous the officers in those colonies might be to guard this colony against fraud. The scale furnished by me, and now before the House, was based on the returns for 1847, which was a fair average for the three past years. The scale has been most correctly prepared, and may be fully relied on. No effort was wanting to secure the most perfect accuracy. After receiving the returns of the various items from the several officers of the Department, I compared the totals with the Returns, of which copies were transmitted home, and in all cases they corresponded exactly.

The present Warehousing system is excellent, and no change in the practice is required. The first Clerk is Warehouse-keeper, and I think this arrangement may be continued.

Under the proposed arrangement, as far as I understand it, the following officers will be fully competent to the discharge of all the duties for the port of St. John's

A Collector, two Clerks, one Landing Surveyor, two Landing Waiters, one Tide Surveyor, two Lockers, a boat and four men, Tide Waiters as at present.

The office of Landing Surveyor I consider one of much importance. He has the charge of the out-door department, appoints the Landing Waiters to the vessels as they arrive—furnishes them with blue or red books* as they may be required—superintends the landing of goods, and exercises a general supervision over the out-door department. The Landing Waiters are amenable to him, and receive all their instructions from him. Thinks there should be a Senior and Junior Landing Waiter, at fifty pounds difference of salary. There are now three Landing Waiters, but thinks the duty can be done with two under the local arrangement. Thinks if the present scale of salaries be the criterion, the salary of the Landing Surveyor should not be less than three hundred pounds.

Thinks it would be most unwise to allow a drawback on goods paying ad valorem duties; the liability to fraud under such a measure would be too great to render it otherwise than extremely objectionable.

Thinks there should be a Regulation Act, providing for the officers, management, &c., which should be a permanent act, and the act providing the duties in a separate measure, from year to year, as is the case at present.

Sir,—

Your regarded communication to me of the 14th instant only reached my hands yesterday (Sunday), so that I have not much time to seriously consider (as the thing demands), the reply which is required at my earliest convenience; but, however, I will endeavour to throw what light I can upon the subject, in the following hasty lines. It appears to suit me best to answer your first, second, and fourth questions under one paragraph, and leave the third until last. I am of opinion that all the articles of provisions should be imported on a fixed duty according to weight, and not ad valorem, on account of the fluctuation in these articles in the countries they are imported from, by reason of good or bad seasons, or from politics, or from accidental circumstances, such as the case lately at New York, for the demand at California. It has happened that sudden rises and falls have taken place in the spring, and again at harvest-time, to a large extent in the prices. So that were it to occur at any future time with an ad-valorem duty, it would be unequally borne by the importers—those paying the highest would have to deplore the payment of a higher duty in proportion to their unfortunate purchase.

Secondly,—I am of opinion that biscuit should remain at threepence per bag, as the princ-

* The distinction between the Blue and Red Books is that the former is for the Ships, and the latter for the Warehouse.

pal consumption is with the fishermen when engaged in their occupation; but flour, I think, may be reduced something. We cannot compete with the bakers in Europe in the manufacture of biscuit, nor can even those of the United States, who would if they could, because as I suppose, labour is lower in Europe than on this side of the Atlantic.

Thirdly,—If the revenue of the country is not adequate to the anticipated expenditure of the colony, I am of opinion it would be more satisfactory to the country at large to simplify the revenue bill by an ad-valorem duty on most of the articles now exempt from any, than to add to the five per cent. on those which pay now. For instance, Lines, Twines, Hooks, Nets, Seines, unrefined or clayed Sugar, Coffee, Rice-feed. I cannot see why these things should be free to the fishermen, and yet tax his provisions, the very first thing he must of necessity procure—besides his Cordage, Canvass, Nails, and various other articles as useful as them which are free, I am of opinion that Salt should be free, because of the difficulty of raising a revenue from it, and of its unequal bearing upon all the importers individually or respectively by an ad-valorem duty; for one person may and does buy salt at seven shillings per ton, whilst another, at another port, pays fourteen shillings, or relatively so, very often. On the other hand, if a fixed duty per ton is to be the standard, then it will be necessary to have officers to weigh it, for no one will be satisfied to pay the tonnage upon the bill of lading for an article so wasteful, and then the weighing salt into stores would be attended at times to a great inconvenience to importers; and above all I think it would be a very unpopular tax, and in the end not very productive to the revenue. I am of opinion that liquors of all kinds should remain as they are, as well as household furniture, or carriages and sleighs.

I am of opinion that cattle and animals of every description should come free, until the country is by cultivation capacitated to rear them on something like equal terms as they may be imported for; for this reason, an ox of tolerable size may be purchased in St. John's from the neighbouring provinces for the cost alone of the maintenance of a growing calf merely for two winters. If protectionists object to this, I think it will be on false premises, for the farmers have already an excellent protection, by the freight, expenses, and risk of the sea-voyage borne by the importers.

I am of opinion, also, that other articles now free should continue so for the future, viz—coin and bullion, seeds of all kinds (including potatoes) for the present, corn for grinding, which would give freight to ships, and employ labour here, vegetables, manures of all kinds, including lime and limestone, printed books, maps, and charts, and it would be a good thing if compensation could be managed for the copyrights of English works published in the States.

I have just noticed by a late paper that the Secretary of the Treasury of the United States has issued an elaborate circular in regard to the appraisal of imported goods, under the system of ad valorem duties, to guard against fraudulent valuation. I am of opinion such a law would be useful in this country,—it could do no harm, if it did no good.

Now I beg to address you on your second proposition,—Do you think the removal of the discriminating duties would prejudicially affect our fish trade with the West Indies?

I am of opinion that while it remained an Imperial measure, and as being of no very considerable amount in value, both British and Foreign West India Colonies took but little notice of it; in fact, lay asleep with both parties; but now, I fear, by a re-enactment of ours we shall be placed between "Charybdis and Scylla," and how to steer a middle course to escape the danger, is

not in my power to say anything that would satisfy your mind or my own; it is not, I conceive, the small amount of Revenue that is at issue, but a broad principle involving a most important question, whether you will keep up and maintain or not an old discriminating duty between our brother colonists and a friendly nation or colony willing to trade with us, in these now free trade discussions. If you rescind the duty the Foreigners no doubt will be well pleased, and may, for what we know, reciprocate—but how will our brothers take it? will they look at it in the same light in which you withdraw the discriminating duty—namely, upon extended views, holding out the right hand of fellowship to all the world who are inclined to be friendly with us upon free trade principles, that each may participate in its benefits? or will they take a narrow view of it, and consider your act to be aggressive to them alone. Therefore I must leave the question without a decisive answer.

To AMBROSE SHEA, Esq., M.A., Chairman of Select Committee, House of Assembly.

1st.—I would maintain a scale of differential duties for the protection of British Manufactures—and think those at present existing between British and Foreign West India produce had better not be removed, as more of the former will probably be imported in future than heretofore.

2nd.—I am of opinion that the removal of the discriminating duties would interfere prejudicially with our Fish Trade with the British Islands.

3rd.—I do not think that a change in the present duties on bread and flour would be advisable, as the former is going out of use, even with the present low duty, whilst the consumption of the latter is daily increasing.

4th.—I should certainly advise the imposition of a duty on cattle, but would regret to see an impost on salt, nets, seines, lines, twines, or hooks, with the difficulties and opposition to which our fisheries are at present subject; and I may add that I would not approve of a reduction in the duty on brandy, tea, and tobacco—that is, whilst the finances of the Colony are in their present condition.

Sir,—

I beg to acknowledge the receipt of your letter, dated 14th instant, accompanied by printed sheets of duties hitherto collected, and of those in contemplation by the House of Assembly of this Island, to be substituted for the former—also a sheet of Interrogatories, with a request that I would furnish replies to them at my earliest convenience, for the information of the Select Committee appointed by the House of Assembly to take evidence on the subject of the Tariff.

I would, in the first place, beg to inform you, that it was so late on Saturday night when I received your communication, that I had not sufficient time to give those questions the consideration which they appear to me to deserve, and to be in time for the return of the packet-man who brought them; nevertheless, I shall endeavour to give you my opinion in as brief a manner as I am capable of, at the same time taking the liberty of not confining my observations strictly to those questions put, but also adding a few others which naturally present themselves to my mind at this opportunity.

Your first Interrogatory—Are you in favour of the preservation of the present differential duties? I beg to say that I am, though at the same time I think that their consolidation into one fixed duty may be conveniently made, while some alteration in the colonial duty may be introduced and made to bear more proportionately. The principle of free trade which this query involves has not, in my opinion, been sufficiently tested to warrant a country so young in legislation as this to make any alteration in this way.

Second Interrogatory—Do you think the removal of the discriminating duties would prejudicially affect our fish trade with the West Indies? This query is so closely connected with the former, that, in consonance with my foregoing opinion, I must say that I think it most probably would, because by casting away discriminating duties on these articles, the production of the West Indies, it may cause a retaliatory measure on the part of the West Indians themselves, affecting our exports of fish to them; and besides, we have to look at the already smart competition with us in those markets carried on by our neighbours the Americans, and that at a time when we scarcely know where to find a safe market for that great staple of our produce.

Third Interrogatory—Are you of opinion that the present duties on bread and flour should be changed, and if so, what modification would you suggest? I think that the present duty on flour ought to be reduced to make it proportionate to that on bread. And if such reduction cause such a loss to the revenue as cannot be dispensed with, I would recommend an increased ad valorem duty on manufactures as to make up the deficiency—my motive for this is, that those articles of food are the prime and indispensable necessities of the poor man, whereas many articles of manufacture do not come within the range of his means.

Fourth Interrogatory—Would you advise the imposition of a duty on articles that are at present exempted—say cattle, salt, nets, seines, lines, twines, hooks, &c.? I would, on all except salt. Cattle are chiefly slaughtered and consumed by the more wealthy part of the population, whose interests would not be much affected by duty such as is contemplated by the House; while it would give encouragement to one very important part of farming in this country, namely, grazing and the breeding of cattle, which in my opinion it is best adapted for. With regard to nets, seines, twines and hooks, I do not see any good reason why they should be exempted more than other articles of manufacture which now pay duty, and are equally as indispensable to the fisherman—for instance, boots, shoes, blanketing, and other articles of clothing. With regard to salt, I think there are many insurmountable objections to the imposition of a duty.

If an ad valorem duty be contemplated it would bear very unequally on the different importers, as the markets whence the article is obtained are so fluctuating and vary so much in price—besides, the article being perishable and liable to considerable waste on every handling, it would bear prejudicially on the interests of all concerned; if a tonnage duty be substituted, it would, for the same reasons of waste and damage, be requisite to have a public officer in every port to take weight, which would be attended with more expense than the duty derivable from that source would amount to; and besides, even then the duty would be felt as a hardship, as large quantities frequently remain over winter, both in the land and at Labrador. I therefore am decidedly against a duty on salt.

I now beg leave to make a few observations with regard to the contemplated alteration of collecting the revenue in currency instead of sterling as heretofore. I think that a beneficial and convenient alteration might be made by assimilating the currency to that of the mother country, and fixing a standard value for each of the coins in present circulation, many of which, especially in the outports, are of a very spurious and strange description, and bear different values as the caprice or avarice of parties suggests. I further think that such alteration would not effect any inconvenient or prejudicial consequence in our intercourse with the neighbouring Colonies. There is one other subject which I would with much deference suggest for the consideration of your honourable house, which is this, that I think it would work a general benefit to the Trade and Country at large, by making all the ports of the Island Free Ports. I do not mean Free Warehousing Ports, which would involve a considerable expense, but merely free ports of entry where Foreign vessels may trade, both in selling and purchasing.

The inconvenience resulting from the present exclusive system is felt by many persons residing in this place, and no doubt many other ports are similarly situated with this. I now draw to a close these rather lengthy, but humble observations and opinions, and hope that they may not be deemed offensive, but that they may be received in that spirit in which I send them.

REPORT OF THE SELECT COMMITTEE ON THE PICKLED FISH ACT.

The Select Committee appointed to inquire into the expediency of repealing so much of the Act of the 8 Vic. cap. 5 as imposes a duty upon Herring and Caplin exported from this Colony in bulk, beg respectfully to report that they have given to the matter to them referred their serious and anxious consideration, and have taken thereupon all such evidence as they could obtain; and that they find that for many years previously to the year 1846, being the year following the passing of the said Act, a very large trade in the exportation of Herring in bulk had been carried on from Fortune and Placentia Bays to the neighbouring colonies—that this trade was carried on principally in the spring and winter months, and al-

most wholly in small schooners from Nova Scotia, Cape Breton, and Canada; that it was a barter trade—the traders receiving the Herring from the resident fishermen fresh, and salting them in the holds of their vessels in bulk, in such manner as to preserve them until their return home, and giving in return for what they received provisions, coals, clothes, and other necessaries.

That the average quantity of Herring thus annually exported from Fortune Bay alone, amounted to from fifteen to twenty thousand barrels; that this trade was a source of great advantage to the inhabitants of these bays, the fishery necessary to sustain it being carried on at a very trifling expense, and at a time when (the ordinary fisheries of the country being for the most part suspended), those engaged in it would, but for the resource which it afforded, be compelled to spend much of their time in idleness.

That in the winter of 1845, immediately after the passing of the Act, but two small vessels were engaged in exporting Herring in bulk from Fortune Bay; of these one was lost, and the other made but one trip, and that since that year the trade has been wholly discontinued, and the Herring Fishery in these Bays has, except as regards a very trifling catch for the use of the inhabitants themselves, and for the supply of a very limited demand for exportation in barrels, and except, also, in so far as it has been carried on for the purpose of supplying the French with bait, been necessarily abandoned.

This sudden extinction of this growing and important branch of our Colonial trade, the Committee find to have been occasioned solely by the heavy duty of 3s. sterling per cwt. which was then laid upon Herring exported in bulk, and they are therefore of opinion that the Act by which this duty was imposed has, in this respect, had a most injurious operation.

On the other hand the Committee do not find that the imposition of this duty has in other respects been attended with any benefits which can at all compensate for the injury which it has occasioned, nor indeed with any of those advantages which were expected to have flowed from it. The intention of the framers of the Act in imposing a duty upon Herring and Caplin in bulk, was to prevent their exportation to the French islands, but in this object the Act appears to have totally failed; and although in the former of the two years in which, in conformity with other provisions of the Act, a Colonial Cruiser was placed upon the coast, some slight hindrance was given to the traffic in bait, yet in the second year, whether from mismanagement of the cruiser, or from the fishermen having become accustomed to the risk of capture, of which they were at first afraid, the supply of bait to the French islands was kept up, almost in the same manner as before the passing of the Act. Assuming, however, that which is certainly very doubtful, that the keeping on the duty and enforcing payment of it by means of a sufficient preventive force, would effectually check the supply of bait to the French—still, as the Act makes no provision for the establishment of a Cruiser, it has, so far as regards its main object, become entirely inoperative; and when the cost of a single small schooner, for two summers only, £1163 1s. 6d. stg., is compared with the amount of duty collected under the Act, £386 16s. 9d., and when it is considered that the traffic in bait can only be prevented, if at all, by the employment of at least *two well-manned Craft* upon the south-western shore, the Committee hesitate to recommend that the funds of the Colony should be taxed to the large amount which would be necessary for their equipment and maintenance. As, therefore, the Act has been productive of very serious local injury, unattended with any general good, the Committee unhesitatingly recommend that such parts of it as lay a duty upon Herring exported in bulk should be immediately repealed; or if it

should be thought desirable still to retain the duty upon exportation to the French islands, the Act might be so far repealed as to allow of the export trade to the neighbouring colonies being *continued* as before.

It has indeed been suggested that by repealing the Act so far as regards the neighbouring Colonies, a discriminating duty would be thereby placed upon the exportation to the French Islands, which would contravene the Imperial policy, and prevent the Repealing Act from receiving the Royal assent; but after a mature consideration of the Imperial Act, 9 & 10 Vic. cap. 94, and of the construction which, with the approval of the Imperial Government, has been given to that Act in Canada and Nova Scotia, the Committee are of opinion that no ground exists for any apprehension upon this score, and that indeed the principle of non-discrimination which, even in former years was in some of the neighbouring Colonies, although theoretically in force, practically disregarded, is no longer applicable to any of the North American Colonies.

If, however, this objection should still be thought of weight, and it should also be desired to restrain as much as possible the export of bait to the French, separate Acts could be passed, by one of which the sections of the present Act, imposing the duty, could be repealed absolutely, and by the other, new and certainly more effectual regulations, could be adopted to restrain or destroy a traffic which by supporting the early French bank fishery, has unquestionably a most injurious effect upon our shore fisheries.

Should this latter course be adopted, the Committee would recommend that, in addition to such enactments as would tend to prevent the export of bait to St. Peter's, an humble address should be presented to Her Majesty, praying that instead of a sailing frigate a steamer should be sent upon our coast for the protection of the fisheries; and that instead of her coming being, as heretofore, delayed until a period of the year when she can render us no essential service, she should arrive off Fortune Bay not later than the 17th March; the Assembly undertaking, that in order to insure her continual presence in that neighbourhood for at least three months after her arrival, a supply of coal should, at the expense of the colony, be kept at Burin or St. Lawrence for her sole use.

EVIDENCE TAKEN BY THE SELECT COMMITTEE ON THE PICKLED FISH ACT.

Thursday, December 28.

PHILIP TOCQUE, of Harbour Britain, gentleman, saith—That he has occasionally resided in Fortune Bay for a period of three years and a half now last past; that the said Bay abounds in Herring of a fine quality, and which can be taken at all seasons, but are particularly abundant in the winter season. For a period of twenty years prior to the passing of the above Act, as the examinant has been informed, a large number of small vessels used to frequent Fortune Bay, and barter coal, fresh beef, provisions of all descriptions, lumber, and other necessaries, for fresh Herring. These Herring were caught by the resident fishermen of the Bay in

nets and seines, and delivered to the traders within a few hours after being caught. The traders packed them in bulk with salt, in the holds of their vessels, and when their cargoes were completed, left for Nova Scotia, Cape Breton, or Prince Edward's Island, as might be. Many sometimes made two trips in the course of the winter. This trade was very profitable to the people of that Bay; but since the framing of the above Act, it has, as examinant knows of his own knowledge, been entirely discontinued; the duty imposed by the Act operating as a prohibition, as it would not pay either to carry duty-paid Herring to the Colonies above-mentioned, or to go to the expense of having the Herring packed in casks in the Bay; while the bulk of the fishermen resident there are too poor to provide casks wherein to pack the Herring themselves. The discontinuance of this trade has been a source of great complaint among all the people of the Bay—leaving the poorer classes entirely dependent upon the merchants, who purchase but a small quantity of Herring in comparison with the quantity usually bartered to the traders. The trade was for the most part carried on in the winter, at times when the Herring could not be taken to St. Peter's for bait; and examinant never heard of any instance in which any of these traders carried Herring which they had purchased from the people of the Bay to St. Peter's for bait. From the best information which he could obtain upon this subject, as well as from his own observations during his residence in the Bay, he was of opinion that at the period he referred to, at least 14 or 15,000 barrels of Herring were annually exported in bulk from Fortune Bay to the neighbouring Colonies. The above Act is at present wholly inoperative to prevent Herring and Caplin being supplied to the French at St. Peter's. It would require for such purpose at least three small craft—one between Point May and St. Peter's Harbour, one between Cape Lahuné and Miquelon, and one to make the circuit of the Bay. A small steamer, with a numerous crew and several boats, would do the work of three sailing craft; but she should be on the coast not later than the 20th March under any circumstances; from the prevalence of fogs upon that coast, from the low price of provisions, &c. in St. Peter's, and the high price given for bait by the French Bankers, it would be exceedingly difficult, if not impossible, to prevent the people in the mouth of Fortune Bay and along the adjoining shores, from supplying the French with bait. All that has been here said, is applicable as well to Placentia as to Fortune Bay.

HENRY KNIGHT, of St. John's, Trader, being examined, says—That in the years 1846 and 1847 examinant sailed in the Revenue craft employed by the Colony for the protection of the Fisheries on the Southwest coast of the Island. During the time he was so employed, he frequently heard the people of Fortune Bay complain of the injury which they sustained by the Nova Scotia Traders being prevented from taking Herring in bulk from the Bay, and by their being prevented from exporting them to the neighbouring Colonies.

Is of opinion that the supply of Bait to the French could be prevented, were proper means taken for that purpose. The means he would suggest would be the employment of one craft in Fortune and another in Placentia Bay, with numerous crews and several boats each, which could be stationed in various parts to intercept boats proceeding to St. Peter's. He would continue the duty with respect to boats taking bait to the French, and then authorize the seizure and detention of any boats found with a greater quantity than two hogsheads of bait on board (either Herring or Caplin), and without a clearance. Were these measures taken the people of the Bay would not attempt to smuggle bait; does not think the prevalence of fog on the coast would much prevent the detection of smugglers as the boats seldom run in the fog, the

wind, with the fog on, blowing in the Bay. The placing our craft on the coast did, during the first summer, prevent a supply of bait to the French to a very great extent, but during the second summer it was wholly ineffectual for that purpose. The reason of this difference is, that our craft was not so actively employed during the second summer as during the first; another reason for this difference is, that boats which were captured being given up to the owners, others were thereby encouraged to continue a traffic which appeared to be attended practically with little risk. The number of persons who haul Caplin for the French is but small, but he has known the French boats, while the Cruizer lay in St. Peter's roads, go out and receive the Caplin from the English boats. Does not know, however, that this was because the English boats were afraid to come in, but from the anxiety of the French to get the bait as soon as possible. The Herring are supplied to the French from about the 17th of March to the 20th May; the Caplin from about the 12th to the 20th June; the Cruizer, therefore, to be of any service should, in most seasons, be on the coast as early as St. Patrick's Day. The duty at present imposed upon Herring in bulk has had the effect of entirely preventing the exportation of that article in bulk from Fortune and Placentia Bays, and some of the Fortune Bay Herrings is now, instead of being sold to the Traders and exported to the neighbouring Colonies, forced into the St. John's market.

Is decidedly of opinion that the duty imposed upon the Herring in bulk has had a most injurious effect upon the intercolonial trade of Fortune and Placentia Bays, while, from mismanagement of the Revenue Cruizer, it has operated but little to prevent the supply of bait to the French. In 1846 the Cruizer arrived on the coast about the 25th of April; in 1847 she arrived on the coast about the 1st day of May. In this latter year she was early enough upon the coast to prevent the supply of Herring to the French, in consequence of the Bay having been filled with ice for some time previously to her arrival.

RICHARD FURNEAUX, of St. John's, Accountant, being examined, saith—That he resided in Harbour Britain from 1839 to 1848, and during part of the latter year he resided in the Burgeo Island. For many years prior to the year 1845 a large trade was carried on from Fortune Bay by traders from the neighbouring Colonies, who brought thither provisions, clothing, and necessaries of all descriptions, which they bartered with the inhabitants of the bay for fresh Herring; These Herring they packed in the holds of their vessels, in bulk, slightly salting them so as to preserve them until their return to their own country. In the years 1843 and 1844 at least 20,000 barrels of Herring were annually exported from Fortune Bay alone to the neighbouring Colonies, and the trade was rapidly increasing. He was himself engaged in this trade for one year (the winter of 1845), there was only one other vessel trading to Nova Scotia from the Bay in that year; she was lost, and he found that by paying the duty imposed by the Act, the trade would not pay, and he consequently abandoned it. Since the laying on of the duty on Herring exported in bulk, this trade has been wholly discontinued. It would not pay either for these traders to take barrels to the Bay, pack, inspect, and export their Herring in barrels; the expense and delay on the voyage which would be thus incurred would be very great. Knows of his own knowledge that very great injury has been done to the inhabitants; both of Fortune and Placentia Bays, by the imposition of the duty. Knows many families there who were reduced to a state bordering on starvation, in consequence of their being deprived of the Herring Fishery, upon which they principally depended for support.

Besides the Herring before-mentioned as exported to the neighbouring Colonies, large quantities were annually exported to St. Peter's in the spring of the year. In his opinion the imposition of the duty on Herring and Caplin, and the presence of a Revenue Cruiser upon the coast during the summer season, has not prevented the French from being supplied with bait as before the passing of the Act; a larger number of persons have been engaged in supplying them with bait since that time, in consequence of the stimulus given to that traffic by the expected increased price of bait at St. Peter's, and the passing of the Act has, in his opinion, increased the supply of bait to the French, and at the same time has occasioned a greater difference between the price received at one time and at another. Does not believe that any effectual means can be taken to prevent the supply of bait to the French. The constant fogs upon that coast, and the nearness of the French islands, rendering it so easy for the fishermen to convey the bait from the main, and the high price sometimes received, offering so strong a temptation to those employed in carrying it.

PATRICK HOGAN, of Placentia, Merchant, being examined, states—That he has resided in Placentia for nine years past, and that he still continues to reside there.—Knows that before the passing of the Act imposing a duty on Herring exported in bulk, a large export trade in that article was carried on to the neighbouring Colonies and to Ireland from Placentia Bay, and which since the passing of this Act has been wholly discontinued. Had, himself, exported Herring in bulk largely to Ireland and the neighbouring Colonies before the passing of that Act; now can export only in barrels, and the expense of that mode of exportation amounted in many cases to a prohibition.—The export trade of Herring in bulk was one that was very profitable to the people of the Bay, particularly to the poorer inhabitants; the Herring fishery being carried on in the early Spring months when the people are not occupied in the Cod fishery, and being carried on at a very trifling expense. The only expense incurred in the fishery was in the price of a net and a punt to tend it; there being always a ready market for the Herring, which were generally sold, either to the resident Merchant or to the Trader, upon being taken out of the net. Has himself, in one year, before the passing of this Act, exported 3000 barrels of Herring in bulk to Ireland. Cannot say what quantity has been exported from the whole Bay in any one year, but it must have been very large.

To his knowledge the imposition of a duty upon Herring and Caplin has induced many persons to embark in the supplying of bait to the French Islands, in the hope of obtaining the high price which it was expected the duty would occasion; and these were persons who but for the imposition of the duty would have been engaged in the other fisheries. The hope of high prices has frequently had the effect of overstocking the market at St. Peter's, and that to such an extent that examinant has known, during the past two years, repeated instances of Herring taken there for sale being afterwards brought back to Placentia and given for manure. The average price of Herring when taken from the net is about three shillings. Does not think the duty upon bait and the stationing of a Cruizer upon the coast has had any effect in preventing the supply of bait to the French; on the contrary, it has rather stimulated the supply, and that although, during the past two springs, those employed in taking bait to St. Peter's from the two Placentias have not only found no market for their bait, but have lost the Codfish which they would have taken had they remained at home—the Codfish during their absence having been very abundant. Immediately before the passing of this Act he had, at a very considerable expense, constructed Vats for the purpose of curing Herring for exportation in bulk, upon a large scale and

in an improved manner; this expense has of course been entirely fruitless, though if the Act were repealed he would be enabled to continue the speculation.

PATRICK HOGAN.

JOHN FURNEAUX, of St. John's, Clerk, being examined, states—That he resided in Fortune Bay (Harbour Britain and Gaultois.) for twelve years—from 1834 to 1846. Knows that during these years a very large trade in the export of Herring was carried on from Fortune Bay to the neighbouring Colonies. This trade continued up to the year 1845, when it altogether ceased. The occasion of this trade being abandoned, was the imposition of three shillings sterling per cwt. upon Herring exported from the Colony in bulk. The trade was a very profitable trade to the fishermen of the Bay, and numbers of people used to come from the adjoining Bay for the purpose of engaging in it. In his opinion no good whatever has resulted from the imposition of the duty upon bait supplied to the French; they have been as well supplied since the Act as before. Thinks that five Cruizers would not wholly prevent that supply—the facilities for taking the bait to St. Peter's being so great.

JAMES S. CLIFT, of St. John's, Merchant, being examined, states—That for many years past he has carried on business as a Commission Merchant in St. John's. That prior to the year 1845 he has frequently purchased and shipped from St. John's, for persons in P. E. Island, Cape Breton, and Nova Scotia, cargoes of Herring in bulk—these Herring generally came from the Northern but sometimes from the Southern parts of the Island; since the year 1845 he has not shipped any Herring in bulk, the export duty preventing their being exported in that way, except at a loss.

They therefore recommend that an Address be presented to His Excellency, requesting that His Excellency will cause inquiry to be made into the circumstances of the said Petitions, with a view to the necessary information being laid before the House in the next Session.

MESSAGE FROM HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR, RECOMMENDING THAT PROVISION BE MADE FOR THE ESTABLISHMENT OF A NIGHT-WATCH.

J. G. LEMARCHANT.

It having been represented to the Governor that the establishment of a Night Watch in this Town would be attended with great benefit, and some of the principal inhabitants having expressed their readiness to contribute towards its support, the Governor consented to take on himself the responsibility of providing such funds as might be necessary in addition to such contribution.

The Force employed in this service has been, since the close of the last financial year, re-

duced one half, and the expense borne by the Government from that period to the 31st December last, has been £150 16s. sterling, and the Governor recommends to the House of Assembly, to indemnify him for this amount, and to authorise a like expenditure for the current half year, provided an equal or some amount be contributed by the parties who will be principally benefited by such an outlay.

I have the honour to enclose a Memorandum, shewing the amount paid as Colonial Import duty on articles of the description in question from the year 1845 to 1848 inclusive, and which, although it does not shew the sum actually paid within that period, the Officers concerned having omitted to furnish the account, yet it exhibits a sum of £18 14s. 4d. paid by certain Officers, Non-commissioned Officers, and Soldiers concerned, upon goods of a *bona fide* Military description, within the time specified.

Under these circumstances I trust His Excellency will be pleased to adopt such steps as he may deem proper, to relieve the Troops serving in Newfoundland from the payment of an impost from which they are, I understand, in all the other Colonies, exempt; and which, I

am persuaded, it is not less His Excellency's desire than it will be that of the Colonial Legislature itself, that they should likewise be relieved.

REPORT OF THE SELECT COMMITTEE ON ST. JOHN'S POOR RELIEF.

The Select Committee appointed to inquire into the manner in which money voted by the Legislature for the Relief of the Poor in the District of St. John's is now appropriated, beg respectfully to Report,—

The Committee have inquired into the matter to them referred, and have taken evidence thereupon, which evidence is hereto subjoined; and they find therefrom that, with the exception of the year 1848, the Poor Monies appropriated to this District have been expended under a Commission which, for many years past, has consisted of one Clergyman of each religious denomination, having a resident Minister, assisted by a paid Inspector or Overseer, who discharged the duties of their office in the manner detailed in the evidence of the Rev. Mr. Bridge.

The exception above referred to, of the year 1848, was the expenditure, under a special commission, of certain extra appropriations, to the amount of £2000, in the employment of able-bodied poor upon the roads, and in other public works—a mode of relief which appears by the evidence to be only open to the objection that it cannot be made available but at certain seasons of the year.

The system of relief by means of the committee heretofore usually adopted, appears defective in the following particulars:—

As a general rule it does not, nor is it intended to comprehend, the relief of the able-bodied poor, for whom, therefore, no regular provision is made.

In some cases, such as those of widows having young children, where returns in labour might be made by the recipients of relief, no such return is ever given, in consequence of the want of a suitable building and appliances by which their labour could be rendered available.

The practice of boarding out the permanent poor, as detailed in the evidence, although, perhaps, as economical as any that could be adopted, and indeed the only course practicable under existing circumstances, leaves the pauper in a great degree dependent upon the humanity, conscientiousness, or ability of the person with whom he may be lodged; and although it does not appear that any complaints have ever been made in this respect, the practice is one which is evidently open to much abuse.

The practice just mentioned is also objectionable in another respect, namely in the tendency which it has to increase the numbers of the permanent poor, many of these being left destitute by relatives who, it is believed, would rather support them than permit them to go into an asylum.

The present system, being founded wholly on the principle of out-door relief, necessarily exposes both the Commissioners and the Overseer to much imposition; and, therefore, notwithstanding the experience and local knowledge of the present overseer, aided by the frequent personal inspection of the commissioners, cases have occurred, and will doubtless occur again, where relief has been given to persons whose circumstances, as it was afterwards discovered, were not such as would entitle them to assistance.

Under the present system no provision is made for clothing for the destitute.

The Committee, however, have not restricted their inquiries to the defects existing in the present system of distributing relief—they have also had under their consideration the rapid increase which has of late years taken place in this district in the numbers of the destitute poor, and, consequently, in the amount expended in their support. In 1844, as appears by a return furnished by the Rev. Mr. Bridge, and hereto annexed, the amount expended for the support of the permanent and casual poor, was about £1750; in the year just closed the monies so expended amounted to over £4,900, which, being added to a sum of £2000, expended in the relief of able-bodied poor, makes the total expended for this service during the past year, in the district of St. John's alone, nearly seven thousand pounds.

Many causes, however, besides a defective system of distribution, have contributed to this extraordinary increase; the several calamities which since the year 1845 have overtaken the colony—the fire and storm of 1846—the potato rot, continuing through successive years—the prevalence of severe contagious diseases, have all had an effect in occasioning this result; but the cause to which it has been principally attributable, is the great influx from the Outports of numbers of poor people, who, coming to St. John's in the Fall expressly for a maintenance, leave it in the Spring to return to the usual place of their Summer's fishery; while not a little of this increase must be ascribed to the absence of that proper feeling of independence of charitable aid, which, the Committee regret to find, does not now, so much as heretofore, characterize the people of this Colony.

But to whatever causes attributable, the fact itself of a most extraordinary though progressive increase in the amount of monies applied for the relief of the poor, an increase indicating the existence of an evil which, if not speedily corrected, must eventually pauperize the greater part of the population and reduce the Colony to a state of bankruptcy, is too apparent; but although this cannot be denied, the Committee confess their inability to devise any complete remedy, by way of legislative enactment.

A law of settlement, by which the destitute of each district would be compelled to remain there, would consist only with an adequate provision being *there made* for their support; by which the necessity which at present compels them to leave their homes would be removed, while the circumstance of such a provision being made from the general funds of the Colony might lead to its careless or improper expenditure. On the other hand, a system of general assessment throughout the Colony would be found, under the peculiar circumstances of this country, impracticable; while a partial assessment, whether as respects persons by a modification of the Seamen's Hospital Act, or as respects places, by imposing an assessment in towns such as St. John's, Harbour Grace, Carbonear, and Brigus, where it could be raised without much difficulty, appears unjust; as in the one case, imposing upon a single class a duty which should be borne by all, and in the other, making that a local burden in some districts which in others would fall upon the general revenue.

Difficult however as it certainly is to deal effectually with this subject by means of any enactment at once practicable and comprehensive, the Committee humbly conceive that such practical remedies as it may be in the power of the Legislature to adopt, by means of such a measure as the Bill now before the House, ought not to be neglected; leaving it to the Executive, by the judicious expenditure of such monies as may from time to time be voted for such purposes, to check as much as possible those evils against which that Bill cannot provide.

The Committee are therefore of opinion, that the principle of the Bill for the establishment of an Asylum and Work-house is deserving of support; because, while it will provide for the comfortable maintenance of the permanent poor, it will, by compelling the able-bodied to labour for the relief which they receive, discourage in the strongest manner all applications for assistance, except from the really destitute; and they are also of opinion, that the principle upon which the Local Government has of late wisely acted, of making the relief which they have afforded rather a compensation for services performed than a distribution of public charity, will, if persevered in, be productive of great benefit, by encouraging that feeling of reluctance to receive gratuitous support, which, tending as it does to the promotion of habits of industry and economy, is, particularly in a young country, one of the strongest safeguards against poverty and destitution.

EVIDENCE TAKEN BEFORE THE SELECT COMMITTEE, APPOINTED TO
INQUIRE INTO THE APPROPRIATION OF MONIES VOTED BY THE
LEGISLATURE FOR THE RELIEF OF THE POOR.

JOHN FREEMAN.—I am Overseer of the Poor under the Commissioners for St. John's, and have been so for 7 or 8 years. I am of opinion that, with respect to the permanent poor of the district, they are at present supported as cheaply as they could be in an Asylum; the average cost of their maintenance is about 6d. a day each; with respect to the casual poor, I am of opinion that some alteration must take place in the present system of supporting them, and I think the establishment of a work-house would be in a great degree effectual towards reducing their number. There is at present a great deal of imposition practised by them; a great number receive relief who are perfectly able to earn their living if the means were provided for their so doing; a great many also receive relief who are not justly entitled to it, inasmuch as they are not only able-bodied, but might obtain some employment if compelled to it and to seek it. At least one half of the casual poor of the district are able-bodied paupers, able to earn their own living. Again, one half of the casual poor have come to St. John's from the outports within the last two or three years; I think that in this Fall, nearly one hundred families have come into St. John's from the outports, and of these a very large proportion are totally destitute. Pauperism is rapidly on the increase in this district; I now frequently give relief to persons who in former years would have been ashamed to have asked it, and who would not have received it if asked for. In many of these cases the circumstances of the applicants have been as good as in former years when they would not have asked for relief. The principle upon which such persons act, and which they have stated to me is, that seeing others receiving relief, they think themselves entitled to it and to seek it also. The practice of respectable householders giving recommendations for relief has also tended to increase the number of paupers in the district, as much imposition is in this way practised upon the parties recommending, and although inquiry is always made, and although relief is not afforded where such imposition is detected, yet in many cases the fraud cannot be discovered, or is only discovered after the relief has been supplied. In one case I discovered $2\frac{1}{2}$ barrels of flour in the house of a person who came recommended by several respectable persons. I may also mention an instance which occurred the other day, in

which, upon an applicant being refused further relief upon the ground of having already received considerable assistance and not being then in a position to require more, I was told that I was then giving relief to many who had bread and flour in their houses; this person would not tell the names of the parties to whom she referred, but I have myself known instances in which applicants for relief have had, at the time, a barrel of flour concealed under their beds. If a work-house were established, none of the casual poor would receive relief except those who earned it by their labour in such establishment; except also in extreme cases, such as sickness, &c., I think the establishment of a work-house would tend not only to diminish the number of applications for relief, but would, in a great degree, check the influx of poor from the outports, as the outport poor would not so readily come for assistance when obliged to work for what they should receive. I have known such establishments in Canada, in Montreal and Quebec, and have known them to work well. In many cases under the present system, where, after investigation relief has been refused by the Commissioners, the applicants have gone to Government-house and have procured positive orders for assistance to be given to them. Of late years many families have made a practice of coming here in the Fall, receiving support from the Government, and returning to their own places in the Spring; these persons, when they come, appear to be totally destitute, and of course cannot be left to starve.

JOHN FREEMAN.

The Rev. Mr. WILLIAMS.—I have acted as Commissioner for the Poor for the district of St. John's from August, 1844, to January, 1848. I am of opinion that the mode of relieving the poor heretofore adopted in this district has been very defective and inefficient. In the first place, there are no regular returns of the appropriations of the money expended made to the Government; the returns made were occasional only—this defect is attributable in some degree to the increase in the duties of the Overseer, which have increased, I would say, tenfold within the last five years. The system is defective also in this, that the clergymen of the district only are upon the Commission; it would, in my opinion, be an improvement if the Board were constituted, either wholly or in part, of laymen. I cordially concur in the principle of the Bill now before the House, but I think it should provide for out-door relief in certain cases. I think the establishment of an Asylum and Work-house would be productive of much good, as though the poor might not be maintained in it at a less expense per head, yet the aggregate expense would be less than at present, the poor would be more comfortably provided for, and the number of applications for relief would be much lessened. I think it probable that much imposition is practised under the present system, but I cannot speak positively upon this point of my own knowledge.

EDWARD M. ARCHIBALD, Esq.—I am a native of Nova Scotia, where I resided for many years. There is in Halifax a Poor Asylum, originally established in 1763, and which was placed on its present footing in 1801, and has been continued in active operation ever since. It is the only means provided by the public for the relief of the poor for the Township of Halifax, as well as for casual and transient paupers, and its establishment has been productive of much good. The Bill now before the House is framed upon the same principles as the Nova Scotia Act, and no difficulty or inconvenience has been found to attend the operation of that Act. The ma-

nagement of the institution has, for the most part, been very satisfactory to the public; the return now handed in shews the expense of the establishment for the past year. The printed rules, also handed in, comprise the code by which its affairs are regulated, under the daily supervision of the acting Commissioner. This Asylum, though principally intended for the relief of the aged sick and infirm poor and orphans, comprises also the means of providing labour for those who may be able to work, which operates as a salutary test of the actual necessity for affording public relief. The return I have handed in does not shew the proceeds of the work, but merely the expenses of the institution. There is, besides this establishment, a Bridewell, or Work-house, which was originally combined with the Poor House, but which now forms a separate institution, for the punishment of idle and disorderly persons and others guilty of light offences, and which, indeed, until the erection of the new Provincial Penitentiary formed the only Penitentiary of the province. The Poor Asylum is open for the reception of aged and infirm poor from all parts of the province, but the expense of maintaining any not belonging to the Township of Halifax is charged back upon the Township to which they belong. There is in Nova Scotia a law of settlement, upon the basis of the Act of Elizabeth, which was passed in 1770, and laws for the suppression of vagrancy and compelling idle and disorderly persons to work. In addition to the proceeds of poor rates, there is an annual grant of the Legislature for the support of this institution, to the amount of £1000 or £1200 per annum. This institution has also hitherto proved the only place of reception for lunatics. One of the leading principles is to provide, within the establishment, work for all who are capable of labour, and it has within its walls a school for the instruction of the orphan and other children who may be maintained there. I cannot say what the proceeds of the labour in the institution may be, but the inmates capable of labour are employed for the most part either in performing work necessary for cleansing and keeping the establishment in order, or in some handicraft occupation; the children in the Institute are generally taught a trade or apprenticed out to tradesmen and others.

E. M. ARCHIBALD.

The Rev. THOMAS F. H. BRIDGE being examined, says:—I am one of the Commissioners of the Poor for the district of St. John's, and have been so for 8 or 10 years. The Commission for the district consists of the Senior Minister of each religious denomination. The Commission, in accordance with the practice of their predecessors, the Stipendiary Magistrates, divide the poor of the district into two classes—the permanent and the casual poor. All applications for relief must be presented in writing, and must set forth the circumstances of the applicant's case, and whether the relief sought is permanent or temporary. If sickness is set forth as the cause of the application, the District Surgeon receives an order to visit the applicant, and upon his report the Board make an order; and if there is no sickness in the case, the Inspector of the Board, John Freeman, receives directions to inquire into it, and upon his report, or upon the inspection or knowledge of a Commissioner, relief is afforded as may be required. The permanent poor receive an allowance of from 4d. to 6d. per diem each; this allowance is generally paid quarterly to persons who contract to support them for that rate, sometimes to the applicants themselves. The casual poor receive such an amount of relief as the nature of their case requires, by an occasional issue of meal and molasses; in cases of sickness, beef, wine, and such like necessaries are furnished under the written orders of the District Surgeon; in very extreme cases clothes are sometimes given. The sum distributed in the following years, for the relief of the poor in this manner, is shewn in the statement now handed in. The amount annually expended in this district for the relief of the poor has in-

creased very much of late years, in consequence of the great influx to St. John's of outport poor. These come to St. John's in the Fall and leave it in the Spring, and the Commissioners are frequently obliged to relieve them without being able to ascertain whether they were really in distress at home. In some cases these persons bring sufficient with them to procure a house or lodging for the winter, and then apply to the Commissioners for maintenance. Large sums are also annually expended in finding passages out of the Island for destitute poor desirous of leaving it. In general the Commissioners endeavour to ascertain whether the greater expense would be incurred by allowing such to remain in the country or by sending them away, and act accordingly. Much imposition is practised in this respect, in this way: a man will leave the country leaving his family behind him destitute; after his departure his wife will apply either for relief or to be sent after him, and the Commissioners have frequently been obliged to spend money in this way in cases in which, as they have had every reason to believe, the application has been made in pursuance of a preconcerted plan among the parties concerned. In the last year applications for passages became so numerous that the Commissioners were obliged to refer all such to the Government, and now no monies are expended in this way but by the express direction of the Executive.

I am now disposed to think that the permanent poor, those, that is, who from age, infirmity, and the want of friends to maintain them, must necessarily be always supported by the Colony, are as cheaply maintained at present as they would be in a Poor Asylum, taking into account the expense of a building, of nurses, keepers, &c. With respect to the casual poor, I think the establishment of a Poor Asylum and Work-house would certainly tend to diminish their numbers. Returns of the number of poor relieved by the Commissioners are made to the Government monthly, which returns set forth the number and names of those relieved, the number in family, the quantity of relief afforded, and the general circumstances of those who are relieved.* The only expense attendant upon the working of the Commission, except some trifling incidentals for stationery, &c., is the salary of the Inspector, £100 per annum.

The law for the support of illegitimate children is another cause of the increased expenditure for the poor; the sum prescribed to be paid, even where the child is affiliated, not being sufficient to maintain it, the child is thrown upon the district until he is able to earn his own living.

The number of persons on the permanent list for the quarter ending 30th September last, is 328 heads of families, equal to about 1312 individuals; the cost of their maintenance has been for that quarter, £760 8s. 3d., currency—that is, about £26s. 4d., currency, each, per annum.

JAMES DOUGLAS, Esq.—I was employed by the Government during the year 1848 to superintend the expenditure of monies appropriated to the relief of the poor in the district of St. John's. The amount so expended was about £2000, and it was expended in the employ-

* These returns have not in two instances been regularly furnished. These instances were the occasion of the loss of the "Barbara," and the prevalence of Typhus Fever and Small Pox, by which events the Inspector's labour was so much increased that he was unable to make his returns with his accustomed regularity. His returns are always checked by me, as Chairman, at the request of the other Commissioners, before being sent to Government-house. The difference between the years 1844 and 1845 was occasioned by the list of permanent poor being revised in the latter year, and many being struck off the list whose circumstances had changed so as to render them no longer objects of relief.

ment of the indigent and those claiming relief upon the public roads and streets. During the Fall as many as one thousand persons were thus employed; and if these persons are employed early in the Fall a productive return may be had for the assistance then afforded, but after the frost sets in they can of course be no longer beneficially employed upon the roads. Many persons were, nevertheless, employed late during the past Fall, because it was thought better to employ them in a manner which would yield no adequate return rather than to give gratuitous relief. For the future I would recommend that a thorough investigation should be made into the condition and circumstances of those applying even for labour of this sort, as many worked upon the roads in this district who were not in a condition to require relief, and ought not to have received it. Messrs. McBride, Brooking, and Shea were joined with me on this Commission, and we endeavoured as far as possible to confine the labour to those who were really destitute. The assistance which was afforded in this way was confined wholly to the able-bodied, and did not in any way interfere with the operations of the Commissioners of the Poor for St. John's; though I frequently found that some who received relief from us received it also from the Commissioners of the Poor—this I think an evil; it would be better that the distribution of relief should be by a single Board. During the year referred to, affording relief seemed in some measure a bounty on pauperism, as the more relief was distributed the more numerous became the applicants. At the same time, I think the principle upon which this relief was distributed was the best that can be adopted—moderate wages and payment in kind in return for labour performed. In this present season I have had applications for relief by way of labour to which, in consequence of the frost and snow, I could not accede; and I have desired the applicants to go to the woods and work; they generally excused themselves from this on the plea of their not having the means of fetching out the wood—when I have offered, if they would go and cut the wood and lay it on the side of the road, that I would buy it from them on the spot. In no case, however, has this proposal been accepted, but I have, at the same time, never found the party thus refusing make a second application for relief. I think that it would be a good practice to purchase from the poor people at a moderate price, payable in kind, all the wood for which they could not find a market in the town. The loss upon this mode of relief would be but trifling. The applicants for relief may be divided into two great classes—those who depend for subsistence upon their daily labour, and fishermen who, not having earned, during the summer, enough for their support during the winter, are obliged to have recourse to such means for subsistence as may then be offered; and I have found that by employing these classes at proper seasons during the Spring and Fall, a great deal of productive labour may be had for the assistance afforded to them. I think it due to the people to state, that they generally evinced a desire rather to labour for such assistance than to receive it gratuitously.

With respect to the Bill before the House, I am of opinion that the altogether destitute and helpless are the only persons who should be admitted into an Asylum; the indigent of both sexes who are not able-bodied but are, nevertheless, able to perform some labour are, in my opinion, fit objects for a Work-house—though much would depend upon the management of the institution. I do not think the mode of management by a number of unpaid Commissioners, as provided by the Bill, judicious or calculated to be satisfactory in its operation. I think it would be better and more economical if there were two or three paid Commissioners whose especial duty and business it should be to inquire into all applications for relief, having at the same time two or three unpaid Directors who might exercise a general superintendance over the whole establishment.
