FUNERAL OF HARRY CLARKE

There passed away at his father's residence, Woodville, on April 26th, Harry L. Clarke just four days after he had passed his thirtieth birthday.

The funeral was held on Saturday April 28, under the auspices of his brethren Oddfellows of Coronation Lodge of which the deceased was a faithful member for some years although often prevented by illness from assembling with them at their weekly meetings.

After a brief service conducted by Rev. E. O. Steeves at his late residence, the remains preceded by a large concourse of brethren and followed by a large number of mourning relatives, were placed beside the mother who predeceased him by only a year and who lies now in the pretty Presbyterian cemetery at Lakeville with her first born son, Frank, on one side; her youngest, Harry, on the other.

The funeral rite at the grave conducted by Rev. E. O. Steeves concluded, the brethren of Coronation Lodge knelt around the open grave of their departed brother and with the simple burial rite of the order, concluding with the throwing of a sprig of evergreen into the grave, bade farewell to their first member to be removed by death.

The large gathering present then repaired to the Presbyterian Church where the pastor of the Billtown Baptist Church, of which the deceased had long been a member, addressed them from Isaiah 58.1: "Thus saith the Lord: Set thine house in order, for thou shalt die and not live."

The floral tributes were numerous and beautiful, the wreath presented by the lodge with its three links, one broken was particularly while fine, not a particle of earth could be seen in the grave the lodge brothers having banished it thoroughly with evergreen.

A CROWDED HOUSE HEARS CAPTAIN THOMAS F. BEST

On Thursday evening Pastime Hall was unable to hold the vast audience which crowded in to hear Captain Best, Y.M.C.A. representative recently returned from active work in the trenches.

The band of the 246th Battalion gave an excellent program of music both outside and in the hall, Mayor Pelton presided and introduced Captain Best. The speaker was a veteran of the Boer War and in this present struggle he had seen much of the terrible work of war and came in close touch with our men in the front trenches.

Captain Best was not only an animated and excellent speaker but he had a message from our boys in France which easily touched the hearts of all his listeners. He told of his connection with the Y.M.C.A. work in England and at the front and a magnificent service in helping, encouraging and relieving the boys in need it truly is. Everyone as they listened to Capt. Best realized how little we had sacrificed of our comforts in Canada to help maintain this war.

The speaker urged the women of the homeland to be true to their boys and beaux at the front as nothing made them feel so sure as to know their friends were forgetting them. He also urged everyone to write letters and describe the delight when a box arrived containing home cooking. Another point he wished to impress upon the audience was the fact that the majority of the boys were leading clean lives, and not the contrary, as has often been said, and many expressed the desire to return as clean morally as when they left home.

SIMON LEOPOLD

Mr. Simon Leopold died suddenly at his residence, Belcher Street, Kentville, on Friday at 7 p.m. He had been in town that day and having been ailing for some time he suddenly took a bad turn and lived but a few hours. He was 62 years of age.

Mr. Leopold was a native of Lunenburg Co. and moved to Kentville about 20 years ago buying a property on Belcher Street and by his industry has made it a valuable property. He was a man of great energy and assisted many in their efforts to do farm work. He leaves besides several brothers here a large family of children: Mrs. Samuel England, Belcher Street; Mrs. William Mahoney, Kentville; Mrs. Edward McDow, New Ross; Josephine and Howard at home. Edward serving in France, Charles Burton and Arthur in Western Canada and Thomas in Lynn, Mass.

AN EXAMPLE IN PROPOSED INCREASED PRODUCTION

Mr. W. W. Pincio, who has sacrificed much in giving to his King and Country his only son the noble and heroic Capt. Henry H. The other day the Metropolitan Magazine cabled Lord Northcliffe asking him if he had any suggestions to make as to how the U. S. could efficiently prosecute the war. Here is what the great British Journalist replied:

"If you come in I have one thing to say to you and it is this: you can learn a great deal from the example of Canada."

This tribute to Canadian achievement, from the man who stands out above all others as the ablest critic that the war has produced, should be for every Canadian a matter of pride. Cheap-jack politicians, more intent upon partizan capital than winning the war, may be little and sneer, but for what the Government and people of Canada have done in this great struggle, the outside world has only admiration and praise.

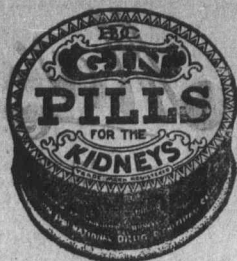

ALDRESHOT LIKELY TO BE LARGE TRAINING CAMP

Militia orders recently announced indicate that after May 29th there will be something extra doing in the training of troops. On that date the camps throughout Canada will be opened among which is Aldershot with soldiers already in training. This will be the only militia camp in the Maritime Provinces, Camp Sussex being closed as well as Camp Hughes and the large camp in British Columbia. Aldershot being the headquarters for the Maritime Provinces will have a quantity of men in training, and it will likely be the clearing station for a week or more for many Western Battalions. Camp Valcartier being opened it is likely that some of the troops will sail from Quebec.

Kentville and vicinity may expect a busy summer in again providing for and entertaining the soldiers at Aldershot.

SOCIALISTS PLAN REPUBLIC FOR GERMANY

That there is a crisis imminent in Germany is becoming more apparent. The Socialist leader Mr. George Ledebour declared in the Reichstag on Tuesday that it was impossible for Germany to win a war of subjugation and expressed the conviction that a revolution must happen in Germany as it came about in Russia. He further told the members that the Socialists would propose a constitutional committee to take preparatory steps in the direction of introducing a republic in Germany. The Allies will never seriously consider peace terms until the German people depose their ruler, whom no nation will trust, and this being done Germany can obtain peace on very reasonable terms if the objects for which the Allies are striving are guaranteed.

ACADIA CLOSING

As announced earlier in our paper Acadia University decided to close on May 16th without any formal closing exercises. This allows the male students of the College and Academy to get at farm work. This gives the boys at home the same opportunity to do work for the Empire as the noble band of undergraduates and graduates who donned the khaki.

Last Sunday, the church services were held in the Assembly Hall of the University, and Pastor Harkness preached a sermon especially to the graduates. The music was furnished by the Acadia Seminary choir, under the direction of Miss Neilly.

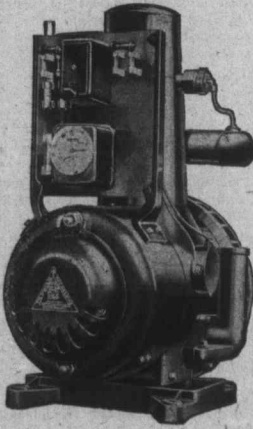

FOR SETTLEMENT OF IRISH QUESTION

Alleged Plan of the Government

LONDON, May 11.—"It is understood that the Government Irish settlement plan," the Daily Express Parliamentary correspondent reports, "will contain the following proposals:

1. The Home Rule Act, with financial adjustments, to be put into operation.

2. Protestant Northeast Ulster to be excluded until it elects to come in.

3. A National Consultative Council representing all Ireland to sit in Dublin.

4. The council to be empowered to confer with the Nationalist Parliament and the executive, which will be responsible to that Parliament.

5. When a measure is passed by the Dublin Parliament the consultative council is to have power to see whether it would be acceptable to the excluded portion of Ulster and, if so, to help in applying that particular measure to all Ireland."

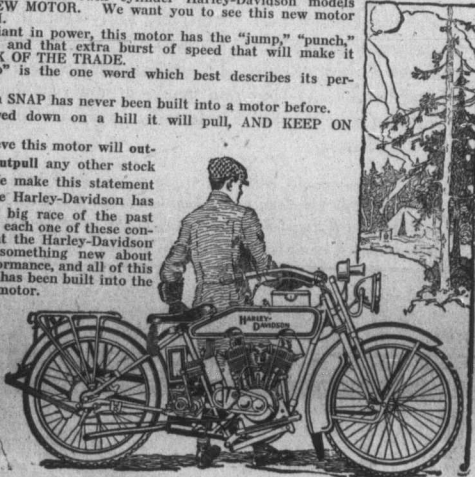

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10,000,000 Men Subject to Draft

Washington, May 12—Ten million men in the United States will be subject to the selective conscription bill July 1 within the ages agreed upon in the conference report of the War Army Bill. Director Rogers of the Census Bureau, announced Saturday. This number of men, between the ages of 21 and 30, inclusive, represents very nearly ten per cent of the total estimated population of between 100,000,000 and 104,000,000 on July 1.

New York State, it is estimated, will have 1,067,000; Pennsylvania, 874,000; Illinois, 639,500; Ohio, 494,300; and Texas, 420,000. In the eight cities which had more than a half million population in 1910 the conscription eligibles July 1 are estimated at: New York, 624,700; Chicago, 500,800; Philadelphia, 171,000; St. Louis, 144,900; Boston, 77,800; Cleveland, 82,600; Baltimore, 57,600; Pittsburgh, 67,200.

Demands for greater liberty for the German people are becoming more insistent and the Kaiser has been driven to make promises of reform which international hostilities cease. Austria-Hungary the situation is similar. Russia has already had a tremendous upheaval. The war is having effects that the men in high places who planned it never contemplated and which are not of a nature to bring them comfort.

A London cable states that Major Beckles Wilson, of Windsor, N. S., who went to England as an officer in the Canadian Records Department is now appointed inspector of war trophies.

British Prisoners Badly Treated

With the British Armies in France May 13 (Correspondence of the Associated Press) The British soldiers who have just succeeded in escaping from a German prison camp a few miles back of the fighting lines tell a pitiable story of their treatment by the enemy. They declared there was a great deal of sickness in the camp due to fatigue and starvation.

"If we showed the slightest disposition go sick," said one of the men to the correspondent of the Associated Press to-day, "we were either thrashed with whips or struck with the butt end of a rifle." Although this soldier had been in the camp only a few months, he had dropped in weight from 162 to 108 pounds. He was a living skeleton, his teeth were loose, and he was gangrenous for lack of treatment. The men had neither overcoats nor hats during the coldest weather of the winter. When captured they were stripped of their leather jackets. These the Germans took away from them, immediately. They also stripped the rubber lining from their "shrapnel" helmets and took away their regimental badges for the brass that was in them.

One of the men during the perilous trip across No Man's Land at the end of the escape was badly wounded. For food the prisoners received daily a quarter loaf of bread, one plate of thin soup and about every second day a cup of weak coffee substitute. On a few occasions they had a bit of meat about the size of a lump of sugar. Recently the men were compelled to work so near the front that they came under shell fire from the British guns. This was an exceptional case.
