Cost of Advertising.

The New York *World* makes the following sensible remarks about advertising:—"Many a dealer who places a ten dollar ad. in his village paper begrudges his investment, when it is really worth double to him what he pays for it. Advertising rates in some of the city papers would astonish some of our business men. One column in the Chicago *Tribune* costs \$26,000 per annum; in the New York *Herald*, \$69,000; and in the New York *Tribune*, \$85,000; and these papers never lack for advertising to fill their columns." And still there are people in Farmersville and elsewhere who wonder why a country newspaper cannot be the great city papers.

Sentenced.

The prisoners Patrick Mullen and James Smith, whose capture we noticed two weeks ago, were tried on the 11th inst., before Judge Macdonald, on the charge of breaking into Moulton & Mackay's store, Dulce on the 8th of December. A companion in the crime, Andrew Robinson, arrested since the capture of the prisoners on trial, turned Queen's evidence, and detailed the planning and carrying out of the robbery very minutely. Patrick Mullen and another man named Doyle were the actual burglars, while Smith and Robinson were sharers in the booty. The Judge sentenced Mullen to five years for the burglary, and Smith to six months, for receiving the stolen goods.

CURRENT PRICES.

Owing to the blocked condition of the roads, very little has been done in produce or any other line during the past few days. We quote the same as last week.

GRAIN.—Oats, peas and buckwheat are called for. Oats, 30c.; peas, 50 to 55c.; buckwheat, 35 to 40c.

CHEESE.—A few wanted at 11c.

BUTTER is in demand, and sells from 18c. for fair to 20c. for prime.

Eggs are scarce and bring 18 to 20c.

LARD.—There is demand for a quantity at from 10 to 12c.

HIDES fetch \$1.50 to \$5; pelts, 50 to 80c.

HAY sells from \$8 to \$9.

MEAT.—Beef, \$4 to \$5; fresh pork in good demand at \$5.50 to \$6 for medium size. Pork retails at 8 to 10c.

POULTRY.—Chickens are in demand at from 30 to 35c. per pair; ducks, 6 to 7c. per pound. Turkeys are wanted at from 8 to 10c.

POTATOES.—These tubers are in demand at from \$3 to 40c.

RUTA BAGAS.—A few bags would find quick sale at 35c.

BEANS range from \$1 to \$1.10.

WOOD.—Dry hard wood, \$8; dry soft wood, \$2 to \$2.25.

ONIONS wanted at 90c to \$1.

COUNCIL MEETING.

The Councillors elect for the municipality of Rear Yonge and Escott, met at the town hall, Farmersville, on Monday last, at 11 a.m. The following gentlemen subscribed to the oath of office and took their seats as the council of 1887: Jas. B. Saunders, Reeve; M. Halladay, Deputy Reeve; Thos. Berney, B. M. Brown and Thos. Moulton, Councillors. A by-law appointing the following persons to the positions named was put through its several readings and finally passed. J. H. Blackburn, Clerk; W. G. Parish, Treasurer; I. C. Aiglure and P. Wilse, Auditors; Wm. Abernathy, Janitor; C. Aiglure, Jas. Ross, and Rich. E. Cornell, Board of Health; Dr. Cornell, Medical Health Officer; H. C. Phillips, Sanitary Inspector. A petition from Geo. W. Green, and others, was read, praying the Council to open up a portion of the concession road between the 8th and 9th con. of Yonge, on lot 22 to where the macadamised road leading from Farmersville to Delta, leaves the said concession. Laid over until next meeting. The Clerk's bill for holding municipal election, amounting to \$47.14, was ordered to be paid. The council then adjourned until Saturday, Feb. 12th, at 10 a.m.

OBITUARY.

With feelings of great regret and sympathy for the bereaved, we refer to the death at Montreal of the late J. H. Rogers, B.A., B.C.L., a son of the Rev. Geo. Rogers. The deceased succumbed to his painful illness on the night of Friday, the 7th inst., after some weeks of great suffering from an aggravated disease of the leg, which we have before referred to. Decedent was a respected member of the law firm of MacLaren, Leet, Smith & Rogers. He received his education at the Huntington Academy and at McGill, where he took his B.A. with honors. He studied with the firm of which, in 1884, he became a member.

Mr. Rogers was possessed of great physical strength; and for several years he was one of the best men on the McGill team. As a lawyer his prospects were very bright and his manly honor was untainted. He was for several years secretary of the Young Men's Reform Club, and was an officer among the Good Templars.

The funeral took place on Monday, the 10th inst., and we learn from the *Witness* that it was numerously attended, the deceased having a large number of warm friends in the legal and other professions. The body was taken to the St. James Street Methodist Church where a very impressive service was conducted by the Revs. J. Philip, J. C. Antife, and W. Jackson, after which the cortège proceeded to Mount Royal Cemetery. The chief mourners were the Rev. George Rogers, of Farmersville, father of the deceased, the Rev. J. Boorland, and Messrs. J. J. McLaren, S. P. Lect and R. C. Smith.

The members of Metropolis Council No. 5 of the Royal Temple, Tempe, of which the deceased was a distinguished member, were present in large numbers. At the close of the service in the church, the funeral ceremony of the order was read by the Rev. S. C. Kondal, M.A., chaplain of the Council, assisted by Mr. W. E. Manson, S.C. Each member present placed a twig of evergreen upon the casket of their departed brother.

At a special meeting of the Montreal Bar, resolutions of condolence were passed.


