

The Cobalt and adjoining areas of the Timiskaming district, Ontario, have been for several years the chief source of the world's supply of cobalt. Metallic cobalt, cobalt oxide and co balt salts are recovered from the treatment of the ores and residues derived from the silver-cobalt-nickel arsenides.
