The following resolution was unanimously passed: Whereas, it is desirable to further encourage the establishment of a cheese and butter factory in Wolfville; and Whereas, a large number of citizens have signed a document promising to support the council in any measures they may deem expedient in order to secure the establishment of such a factory; therefore...

Resolved, that the council procure any one company establishing such cheese and butter factory in accordance with the provisions of the resolution passed by the council at their meeting on the evening of March 7th, 1894, relative to supply of water, immunity from town taxes for a term of 10 years, provided the Provincial Legislature will grant such legislation as will make such exemption lawful, and this council further pledges itself to use its best endeavours to secure the necessary legislation during the next sitting of the Provincial Parliament.

The Canadian Magazine for March.

The Canadian Magazine for March is throughout entertaining, and it contains several striking articles which in interest to any in current magazine literature. Cooper; "Lenten and Easter Observances," by Theo. E. Champion; "Mile-steps Moods and Memories," by David Boyie, and two excellent stories, "The Canadian Magazine" is published by the Ontario Publishing Co., Ltd., Toronto, for \$2.50 per annum.

The St. John city ticket office of the Windsor & Annapolis was opened Saturday. It is situated on the corner of Prince William and Princess streets and is one of the best stands in St. John. A walnut ticket case stands at the back, facing the counter, and a massive letter-press, together with a telephone, electric light and the usual paraphernalia completes one of the finest ticket offices in the maritime provinces.
