THE DEPRESSION IN ENGLAND. English Agriculturists Not Injured by Importations From America. Opinion of The British Secretary of State For the Home Department. LONDON, Aug. 20.—Hon. Richard Assheton Cross, Secretary of State for the Home Department, in a speech at Bootle, near Liverpool to-day, referring to the depression affecting agricultural interests, said the agriculturists in the neighbourhood of New York suffered far more from the great importation of corn and cattle into the Eastern States than from the Great Western States, than the British agriculturists suffered from the present depression. He added he was not at all alarmed at the great amount of food coming from America.

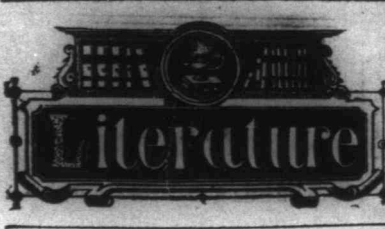
