debt and public expenses have become so heavy that for six years a careful and sober administrative policy is necessary. To adopt measures that would disorganize and disturb the whole intricate financial fabric would be to court disaster, unless our fairly faithful study of civic problems has been entirely in vain.

There is room for progressive ideas and for many improvements in methods of handling municipal matters. We are not denying what is obvious but those improvements should be brought about steadily and always with the fact in mind that up till 1926 we are not in a position to gamble with chance.

What may appear from the outside to be feasible and wise may be known by those in positions of responsibility and trust to be foolish and impracticable. Pre-election platforms are said by some, of course, to be like street cars, made to get in on but the man who is running for municipal office should treat his future seriously. It is not theory that

faces him, when he is in office, but fact and he can have little respect for himself or his office if he proposes, before election, policies that are pointed out to him as unsound and dangerous.

The Journal does not wish to prejudice the candidature of any man who is seeking the suffrage of his fellows but it would remind them and particularly those who are wont to be clever and smart in their criticism of those who have served, that civic administration is a highly technical and perplexing science. For too many years it has been regarded as any man's job, as something that the man off the street can step into and succeed, as a sort of honorable mantle to throw over the shoulders of some person who is good at shaking hands and at throwing stones at the person in office, but we venture the opinion that one year in the Council will convince the most optimistic saint that there is a great deal to learn and a great deal to do and the more you learn and the more you do the higher the respect you have for sanity and service.

Notice Affecting School Children

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN pursuant to the provisions of The Vaccination Act and of The Public Health Act Regulations and with the approval of the Local Board of Health that certificates of successful vaccination or of insusceptibility on re-vaccination within seven years of all pupils or students of Public Schools, Separate Schools, the Collegiate Institute, Ridley College, Business College and of all Private Schools in the City of St. Catharines are required to be presented to the Principal, Teacher, Superintendent or other proper authority of such schools or institutions above mentioned before any pupil or student will be admitted to further attendance, and no pupil or student refusing to produce such certificate on demand shall be admitted until the certificate is furnished.

This Order will apply on the reopening of all the above mentioned schools and institutions after the usual Christmas holidays, and all Parents and Guardians are required to govern themselves accordingly. The attention of Principals, Teachers, Superintendents, Officers and other proper authorities in charge of Schools is directed to the terms of this notice, which they must carry out.

This Order will remain in force until further notice.

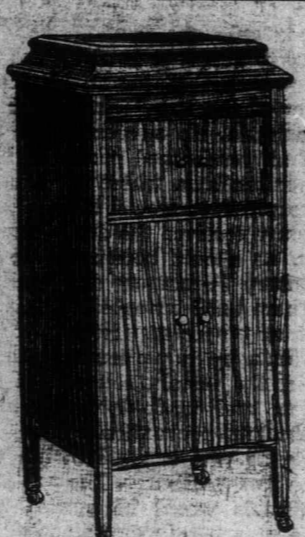

Sergt. Alexander Beats Crompton With a Knockout

Dramatic Climax To Fine Card of Fistic Battles—Alexander Challenges Loney

Before a fair sized audience of fight fans at the Armouries last night Sergt. Alex. Alexander, former Niagara Ranger, and middleweight champion of the Canadian overseas forces, knocked out Fred Crompton of Toronto in the fifth round of a scheduled ten round bout. Alexander proved to the fistic fans of St. Catharines that his wonderful work overseas has been no mere fluke. He also proved to those who witnessed the scrap, that he has the wallop as well as craftiness. It would take a good man to stand up against the tremendous blows which the husky vet uncorks.

Crompton, who has a reputation of being one of the best in the fistic arena, stocked up well before Alexander, and during the first three rounds of the battle these two ring artists displayed some of the cleverest boxing ever experienced by a St. Catharines audience. This can be especially said of Alexander, who showed fine footwork and a tremendous amount of steam behind his punches. Nevertheless, Crompton did not let the Sergeants have it all his own way and fought back like a tiger. It was in the fourth round that the tide turned. In this session Alexander uncorked a mighty left hook which caught the Torontonain below the chin. He was lifted clear of the floor and went down with a thud, remaining until the count of nine. Alex. gave him plenty of time to recover and then let loose again. Crompton again going to the floor, but was up on the count of seven. At the end of the round Crompton was visibly suffering from the terrific sledge hammer blows of the St. Kitts' veteran, but nevertheless wore the same old smile. Alexander finished fresh.

When the fifth session opened, Crompton was right on the job, but it wasn't long before Alexander floored him again. He got to his feet on the count of ten and fought gamely. Alexander knew he had his man beat and all he wanted was an opening, which he soon got. With a wicked left hook, followed immediately by a right swing to the head, he put Crompton to the land of dreams. While the referee counted off the seconds the victim once rolled over on his side, apparently in agony, but he did not raise his head from the floor. He was completely out. Alexander, who assisted Crompton to his corner, received a great ovation from the crowd. He was as fresh as a daisy at the finish.

It will be remembered that the last time these two boys hooked up, Alexander was forced to quit owing to a rupture. A doctor who was present said it would be impossible for the sergeant to continue. With Alexander in the snipe he was in last night, Loney would have to extend himself to get the better end of the scrap. It's up to Mr. Loney now, and we would like to see these two boys matched for New Year's night, when the G.A.C. are putting on a good card. When the challenge was announced the crowd yelled with glee.

NEW YEAR'S NIGHT

At noon today Secretary George Ellac of the Grand Army of Canada stated that it would be impossible to stage a bout between Alexander and Loney on New Year's night because Loney has already been matched with Al Proctor of Lockport in the main bout on that night. An effort will be made to match Chris James of Welland against a good boy for the same bill.

The six rounds between Chris James of Welland, undefeated lightweight of Ontario, and Kid Bryant of St. Kitts, who claims to be the lightweight champ of the Fourth Canadian Division, proved to be a good scrap. James was plainly the best man and appeared to have better ring experience. At time Bryant let loose with some fast work and occasionally connected with the Welland boy's jaw with one of his wicked right swings. Bryant was not in condition and took a lot of punishment.

The G.W.V.A. are to be congratulated on the fine card put on, and it is hoped they will continue with the good work. Counter attractions and the severe cold kept the crowd down below what it should have been.

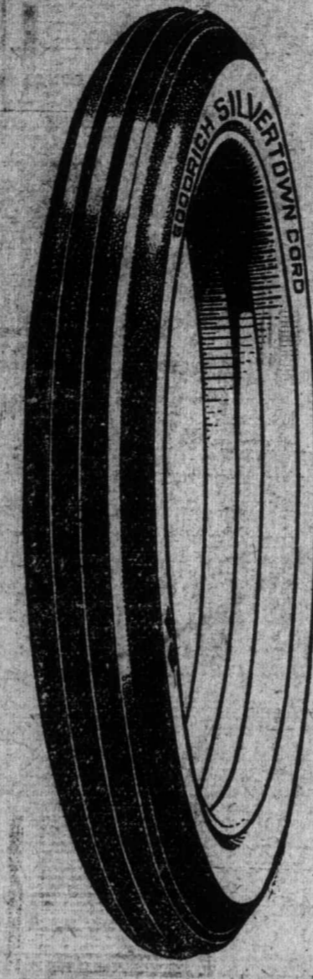

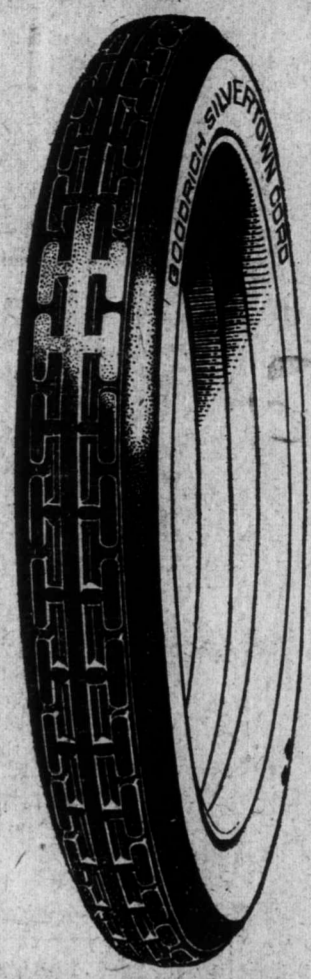

LONDON, Dec. 19.—The fact that the public executioner is the only public servant in Great Britain who has not received a war bonus has excited the conscience of a private member of the House of Commons, who asked in Parliament why he had not received it.

The Home Secretary replied that no application had been made for it and he proposed, therefore, to take no action.

THE LOCAL BOARD OF HEALTH OF THE CITY OF ST. CATHARINES

PUBLIC NOTICE

WHEREAS it is expedient to take necessary precautions to prevent the spread of Smallpox in the City of St. Catharines from other Municipalities where the same is epidemic.

THEREFORE the Local Board of Health of the City of St. Catharines hereby orders as follows:

1.—THAT all Schools (Public and Private) shall be closed at once, and each room therein fumigated in an effective manner.

2.—THAT all Theatres, places of entertainment, dance halls and other public buildings in which any gathering is held, shall be aired and properly disinfected after each performance or gathering before the Public are again admitted.

3.—THAT in all stores, restaurants and other places of business suitable means be adopted daily to prevent the spread of smallpox by disinfection of the premises.

4.—This Order shall remain in force until further notice.

COL. SHARPE'S LAST THOUGHTS ARE FOR OTHERS

Letter Admitted to Probate as Part of Dead Soldier's Will.

The Appellate Division has now given judgement approving the decision of the Surrogate Court of Ontario, which admitted to probate as part of his will a letter written by the late Col. Sam Sharpe to his wife from his billet in Flanders before going into action at Passchendaele Ridge.

The letter was written on October 21, 1917, and after giving some details as to the work to be done in the field, makes several requests of his wife as to the disposal of parts of his estate. It asks that a gramophone case be given back to "Bert," and also that Bert's family be well looked

after. His wife is assured that in addition to the pension of \$1,500 per year which she would receive if he were killed, he had left her well provided for. Requests for the consideration of others are also contained in the letter.

Col. Sharpe came through the battle of Passchendaele safely, and later at Buxton endorsed the contents of the letter which he had written for delivery in the event of his being killed.

Thirty nine new cases of small-pox in Toronto were reported in the past 24 hours, bringing the total number which has occurred in the city up to 1936. Of these 253 have been discharged as cured, including 34 Thursday. There are 620 homes, with 1904 inmates, under quarantine.

Though John Loftus, barrister, is held by the Appellate Division so have made improper investments with \$800 entrusted to him by a client, Mrs. Elsie McGinn, that court decides in a judgment given yesterday that there was nothing in his conduct to warrant a conviction on a charge of theft. A conviction by Judge Winchester last January is quashed.

The Appellate Division has allowed the appeal of Dr. Rae from a judgment for \$500 in favor of Mrs. Charlotte Smith, of Tomsonden, Mrs. Smith sued for \$1,000 damages for failure of the doctor to be on hand when her first child was born. The Appellate Division finds the doctor not to blame and adds that in assessing the damages so highly the jury must have failed to understand the case or must have been perverse.

Dr. I. N. Cherniak has lost his appeal from the action of the College of Physicians and Surgeons in striking his name from the roll for "infamous and disgraceful conduct." The doctor, who has been in practice for about a year at Windsor, was found guilty in the police court of supplying liquor to a young woman, who became very drunk, and was arrested. The doctor alleged that she had removed the liquor from his office without his knowledge, but his appeal to quash the conviction was refused, and he had to pay \$229 in fine and costs. Action by the College of Physicians and Surgeons followed.

Hospital for Sick Children TORONTO

Upkeep of Big Charity Requires Fifty Cents a Minute.

Dear Mr. Editor:

The 44th annual report of the Hospital for Sick Children, Toronto, shows a notable advance in every department of its service to the suffering and crippled youngsters of this province. The ward accommodation has been taxed to its capacity, and the summer annex, the Lakeside Home, was opened for the first time since the outbreak of war.

The daily average of cot patients has increased during the year from 192 to 229, including children from practically every county in Ontario. Even had the cost of supplies and labor remained stationary, the substantial increase in the number of patients would alone account for the addition to the charity's debt, which at the close of the fiscal year was \$109,000. This debt has become an embarrassing burden. Further increase must threaten impairment of an enviable efficiency.

The Hospital is in the forefront of all institutions upon this continent devoted to the care of sick children. It cost \$356,399 to maintain last year. This cost is not only put at the service of the children of Ontario all the resources of medical science, but, in addition, provides for a training school for 120 nurses and for unsurpassed clinical facilities for the University students who are preparing to engage in their profession throughout the province.

The income which must be forthcoming to finance this absolutely essential work figures out at seven hundred dollars a day; and, as there is no endowment fund, all but a fraction of that amount has to be derived from individual benevolence. Therefore the Trustees are making a Christmas appeal to every lover of children to foot the bills for some period of time, no matter how short it may be. A minute of mercy costs fifty cents.

For churches, societies, lodges, etc., who have more ample funds wherewith to assist the youngsters to a fair start in life, the naming of cots is suggested. A number of memorial cots have been thus dedicated in honor of the overseas service of fellow-members. This privilege is extended in recognition of the \$2,000 to the Main Hospital or \$500 to the Lakeside Home, which can be paid in annual instalments if so desired.
