## The Evening Chit-Chat

A group of us, of which a newspaper artist was one, were discussing things journalistic the other day and the conversation turned upon the work of several of his brother artists.

With each one who was named he had some fault to find.

The technique of the first was "rotten."

The faces that the second drew had no expression.

The third had no sense of motion.

The fourth was a fairly decent draughtsman, but didn't have a real snappy idea once a month.

And so on.

Now, all these criticisms may have been absolutely fair and just, I am not enough of an artist to judge whether they were or not.

But even if they were absolutely merited, that could not prevent the instinctive feeling that swept over all of us that this man was jealous of the men he criticised.

Never run down the achievements of any one in the same line of work that you are.

It doesn't pay.

If you must show your critical ability, show it in regard to some kind of work that you do not do, for otherwise, no matter how justifiable your criticisms may be, you will always run the risk of arousing in your hearers the antagonistic feeling, "He is jealous!"

The feeling may be entirely unjust and unfounded. I grant that, but unjust or not, it is a feeling that it pays to avoid rousing when it can be done so easily as by keeping one's mouth shut at the proper time.

And I don't think it pays.

If it ever becomes necessary to judge a brother workman's output for someone who desires to know its value with a view to purchase, one must, of course, speak or defect as well as merits.

But under any other conditions it seems to me it is far better from a purely utilitarian, as well as a moral standpoint to speak what good one can and then lock one's lips.

### Harbor Grace Dissatisfied.

A good deal of dissatisfaction is being expressed by our business men and other citizens that the s.s. Prospero does not call here on her way to and from the north. They say the Premier promised that she should, and point out that a great convenience it would be, not only to Harbor Grace but more or less all the Bay.

Not speaking at all of the claim this town and neighborhood have of being afforded a chance to build up trade with the northern settlements, they say that for instance, if her departure from St. John's were delayed until 10 a.m. until noon, she would afford a chance to take on board passengers from the afternoon train. In that case, passengers even from Placentia could leave home the same day and connect with the steamer here instead of having to wait for St. John's the day before. The whole Bay would be inconvenienced. We trust the Government will see that this justice is done the Bay.

The news has reached here from the roundabout way of the Labrador that it is the intention to remove the Marconi station at American Harbor to another place. Those interested in the former locality, which includes a large number of fishermen of this town and bay, declare this change will affect them injuriously, and complain of its being done, as it were, on raised—scattered air as they are—in protest. They say instead of depriving us of the convenience, why not establish another one at Grady—Harbor Grace Standard.

### HOUSEHOLD NOTES.

It is said that if common table salt be added to gasoline, spots can be cleaned on silks or other delicate fabrics without leaving a ring.

Tan colored linens should never be put into bluing water when washed. In washing blue linens, always add a little vinegar to the last rinsing.

When hot cloths are needed, either for household or medical purposes, instead of wringing them out of boiling water, heat them in the steamer.

Half an egg shell with a hole in the end make a useful little funnel. It will be more desirable if the shell is slightly browned in the stove.

To stiffen ribbons put a table spoonful of sugar in about a cupful of water and rinse the ribbons in it. When pressed they will be even stiffer than new.

To remove iodine stains, wet in cold water or milk, cover with cornstarch and let stand until all stains disappear, changing cornstarch if necessary.

Oftentimes when moving a piece of furniture, especially if it is heavy, the matting will receive an ugly tear. Darn the matting with raffia in colors to correspond.

Cream of tartar will remove rust from dresses. Boil the dress for about one hour in three gallons of water, with one tablespoonful of cream of tartar for each gallon.

To clean walls take about four handfuls of flour, mix with water into quite a stiff dough and proceed to rub the walls, when all dust and dirt will be removed.

If the broom used for brushing the rugs is plunged into salt water and then shaken free of superfluous moisture, the rugs will be brighter than if swept with a dry broom.

Falms and other plants often suffer from dust. They should be washed with a sponge at least once a week and the more fragile kind should be sprayed with lukewarm water.

Instead of using water with soap, ammonia or kerosene, try using of natural alcohol for cleaning windows. Moisten one cloth with the alcohol and polish immediately with a dry one.

If a porcelain baking dish become discolored on the inside, fill it with buttermilk and let stand for two or three days. The acid in the milk will remove all semblance of stain.

A boiled custard sometimes separates because it is overcooked. Next time this happens, beat the custard very hard with an egg beater, and you will be rewarded by having it smooth and creamy.

If a new wick to a coal oil lamp is thoroughly saturated with good vinegar and then perfectly dried before being placed in the lamp, the lamp will never smell badly, no matter how low it is turned.

Clean brass as usual, rub it over with a cloth dipped in vasaline and afterwards polish with a dry duster. This will keep it from getting tarnish.



**Vigilance Needed.**  
 On Saturday we drew attention to the need of greater vigilance on the part of the public, if any real reform is to be obtained in municipal affairs. Since the present civic system was established, two full terms have passed, and yet civic affairs are in a most unsatisfactory condition. The one outstanding work which is to the credit of the Municipal Council is the additional water supply, but as the Hon. John Harris pointed out in the Legislative Council, the distribution of this water supply leaves much to be desired. But the city is as dirty as ever it was, and the state of the streets are disgracefully foul and offensive.

For this state of affairs we are more inclined to blame the public than the Council.  
 It must be acknowledged that the public have in the past been apathetic, and we confess the Press has not been much better.  
 To-day there is a chance of new start. There will be at least five new Councillors. We are convinced that the new Mayor and the six new Councillors will enter upon their duties with the firm intention of doing their duty to the city. **FRIEDBERG, Hesse,** June 25. Herr Busold, Socialist, to-day won the bye-election for a seat in the Reichstag; he received 11,000 votes against 2,000 polled by Herr Helmsolt, Conservative. The seat hitherto has been occupied by a Nationalist Liberal.  
**LISBON,** June 26. Following the request of King Manuel, Don Antonio Fairfira de Sousa, the ex-Minister of Finance, has formed a Cabinet with himself as Premier and Minister of the Interior. The Ministry, under the Presidency of Francisco Daveiga Beirao, resigned on June 17th, after having recommended the dissolution of the Chamber of Deputies which was opposed by the King as well as by the Liberals.  
**KIEL,** June 26. In a stiff breeze to-day the American yacht Westward won the Jubilee prize, defeating the Germania by 1 minute and 42 seconds, and Empress William's American built Meteor, with the Emperor on board, finished 3rd, only a few lengths behind the Germania. The Emperor to-day conducted Divine Service on board the Imperial yacht. He chose the theme of his sermon: "Did Jesus Live." This recently has been the subject of much public discussion.

**MONTREAL,** June 26. The situation in regard to the negotiations between the C. P. R. and its trainmen now appears to be that after having served ultimatums upon one another, the two parties are looking to a peaceful settlement. A conference between the representatives of the men and the company has been arranged for to-morrow, and it is prophesied that this will pave the way for an agreement. Many of the men have a considerable number of years service to their credit on the Company's books, and if they were to go out now, they would lose this, and thus be shut out of the pension. That interruption of service by a strike invalidates the pension claim was brought home to the men by the machinists' strike a few years ago, when many men were compelled to re-enter the company's employ as new employees, though some of them had 10 or 15 years service to their credit.

**A British Naval Expert's View.**

London, June 22.—Gerard Finnes, one of England's foremost naval experts, states in the Daily Graphic that the Anglo-Japanese alliance cannot be renewed on its expiration in 1915, and that there are grave indications that this agreement may not conserve Far Eastern affairs on peace lines even before its existence is concluded.  
 "Japan will," he asserts, "in the last analysis, fight the United States very much for the reason that prompted Bismarck to fight France."  
 He contends that "Europe is not going to lift a finger when war breaks out between Japan and the United States to save to the latter islands of which they deprived Spain."

**Joe Martin Has Left the Liberals.**

Has Lost all Confidence in Government, and Urges Liberals to Speak Out.  
**LONDON,** June 22.—Mr. Joe Martin, M. P., comes out definitely against the party under whose umbrella he won his seat in St. Pancras. He says in a letter in the press, that he has lost all confidence in the government, and he adds that it is the duty of every Radical to speak out before the political peace now being hatched by Mr. A. J. Balfour and Premier Asquith is completed and the Liberal party completely destroyed.

**Negro Burned at the Stake.**

**RUSK, Texas,** June 21.—Leonard Johnson, a negro, charged with having killed Miss Maud Redding, a young woman near here yesterday, was burned at the stake by a mob near the scene of the crime, late last night.

Sheriff Norwood and Deputies were enroute to Rusk, with the negro when they were overpowered by a mob at Lone Star near the home of the murdered woman. Seizing the negro, who pleaded for his life, the mob composed of more than 100 men and boys dragged him a short distance from the town. There, it is said, he confessed that he had mistreated and murdered Miss Redding.  
 The negro was taken to a stake and brush was piled high around him, when a torch was applied. Disregarding the pleadings of Johnson, the fire was fed until he was dead and partly incinerated. Miss Redding left home intending to go to Lone Star. Later her body, with her throat cut, was found in a wood, a short distance from town.

When interviewed by the Telegram the men said they left their vessel on the morning of Saturday, the 18th inst., to go hunt their trawls, and had not long left when a dense fog set in and

They Missed Their Trawl Buoy. Seeing there was danger of going astray they started to return. A strong and shifting current was running on the Bank and after a couple of hours rowing they concluded they had lost their ship, as no sound of a horn could be heard. They then determined to make the best of a bad job. The fog cleared away just before dark, but over the vast waste of water

### Not a Sail Was in Sight.

so they rowed away again for six hours to windward and came to an anchor at midnight. The night was intensely cold and sleep did not come to them so that they were glad when daylight dawned. They had about a pint of water in a jar and matters looked bad for them. They had no gear with which to fish, and if they were to be any length of time on the ocean in their little boat, death from hunger and thirst, they feared, would be their portion. All the forenoon of the 19th they alternately sailed and rowed, consumed their water supply that day, and determined to, if possible, reach the Newfoundland coast. The fog again closed over the waters and a S. W. gale with a high sea brought them

### Face to Face With a New Danger.

That evening the inevitable pangs of hunger which they could not assuage attacked them, and they ran before the wind for Newfoundland. Occupied in keeping their dory from being swamped, their minds were kept from dwelling on their miserable position, but the men say they will never forget what they went through Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday and part of Thursday last. Clad only in their oil skins the piercing cold permitted of little, if any, sleep at night. They were distracted from hunger with not a morsel of bread or anything else to satisfy their

### Terrible Craving for Food.

As not a sign of a vessel was to be had, and as the hours of each dreary day slowly passed, a feeling of despair seized upon them, and on Wednesday they almost gave themselves up for lost. That evening heavy rain fell and they caught about a half pint of water in their jar, and eagerly consumed it as they were famished with thirst. Previously they moistened their lips and tongues by licking the moisture occasioned by the fog off the oars and sides of their boat.

### Their Sufferings were Horrible

for the last 24 hours, and Thursday morning Babcock lay down in the bottom of the dory utterly exhausted and weakened from hunger, cold and exposure. Thursday afternoon it cleared somewhat when about 5 p.m. Summers saw the schr. Carl running south and coming about east from the dory, about a half mile distant. Summers raised the oars, which he was hardly able to handle as a signal, and the Carl came up in the wind, both men rowing to her and being assisted on board by her kindly captain and crew, while their dory was hoisted to the deck. They were picked up 6 miles S.E. of Baccalieu, and the crew of the Carl gave them every kindness and the best of care. Consul Benedict took charge of them on arrival here and supplied them with needed clothes. The men say that two days and nights longer adrift would have finished them. Their emaciated appearance is an index of the sufferings they endured. The Richard was on her first voyage to the Grand Banks, hatted at St. Pierre and was only 3 days on the grounds when the men got adrift.

JUNE FROST AND SNOW.—Those whose business brought them out thus early say that about 4.30 Saturday morning there was quite a shower of snow. It was intensely cold, and the roofs of houses and sidewalks were covered with frost. This is not often recorded for the first summer month.

## BIG WIRELESS SWINDLE.

### Victims Number 28,000.

Heads of United Wireless Company of New York Arrested—Have Obtained \$20,000,000 by Fraud.

New York, June 17.—Accused of having perpetrated a gigantic swindle by which some 28,000 individuals throughout the country were gulled into buying worthless stock, Christopher C. Wilson and Samuel B. Bogart, president and vice-president of the United Wireless Telegraph Company, were arrested yesterday. Their office was at 42 Broadway, and they were taken in charge there by a battalion of post office inspectors. It is said that their victims have paid \$20,000,000 for worthless stock.

William W. Tompkins, former president of the now defunct New York selling agency, which is alleged to have helped along the wireless game, was also arrested.

#### Protested Violently.

When taken Wilson and Bogart protested violently, but the inspectors hustled them out into the corridor. An elevator had been halted for them and they were pushed into it and carried down to the main floor so fast that it nearly took their breath away. An excited throng, recognizing the president of the United Wireless, pursued them to the street and up Broadway, while they were walked up to the Federal building.

United States Commissioner Shields was ready for the prisoners, and after telling them that warrants had been issued charging them with having used the mails to defraud purchasers, he asked Assistant District Attorney Stevenson what bail was wanted. The Attorney made them gasp when he asked for \$50,000 for Wilson and \$25,000 for Bogart. This was finally furnished, but

Tompkins spent the night in the Tombs.

#### False Representations.

In an affidavit upon which the warrants were issued, it was alleged that the United Wireless officials falsely represented in advertisements published broadcast and sent to stockholders that the concern, among other things, had wireless patent rights worth \$5,520,233, stocks and bonds in other companies valued at \$14,148,610, and a cash surplus of \$6,528,329.

Against this, it is charged the only patent rights that the United ever

had were some that it bought from the De Forest concern for \$750. The \$14,000,000 of stock, the post office authorities say, was next to worthless stuff, which was transferred to Wilson and his clique for a few thousand dollars by Abraham White, known as the "postage stamp broker," who wanted to get rid of it. This De Forest stock, after the collapse of the De Forest concern, was used by the United as the basis of the tremendous issue which it sold broadcast.

#### Never Paid a Dividend.

So far as the \$6,000,000 surplus goes, the post office authorities maintain, the United never made a cent and was never known to pay a dividend. Its whole career, the officials say, has been one of rank deceit.

It was the habit of the officials, so it is alleged, to jump up the price of stock whenever they wanted to make a few millions more. They would generally do this after something had happened that got the United before the public. The stock jumping was not based upon any actual value. Prices were pushed up from the early figure of \$7.50 a share to \$50.

"The United Wireless Telegraph Company professed to have for its sole object the combining of all wireless telegraph companies, including the Marconi company, and in its early literature and letters, the statement is made that it had procured practically a controlling interest in all such companies, and that it had large holdings in the Marconi company, a statement that was absolutely untrue.

#### Increased \$5 Share.

"Whenever a new contract was obtained from a ship or line of ships the stock would be increased \$5 a share. Taking \$20,000,000 as the total stock issue of the company, both common and preferred, it would mean an increase of \$100,000,000 to the value of the property, when, in fact, the property had not been increased at all, because the wireless business with ships was not paying.

## The Name of Labrador

Editor Evening Telegram:  
Sir.—Mr. Wallace's explanation of the origin of this name is, I think, practically correct. M. Harrisse (und Records showing that Labrador was the name of a particular family living in the Azores in the XV. Century. As the Azores formed part of the dowry of the Duchess of Burgundy I have always considered the Burgundian who accompanied Cabot on his first voyage was an Azorean inferentially named Labrador. According to my reading of the cartological evidence the Isle de Labrador of the Oliveriana map shows Cabot's first discovery; thus connecting Labrador with this voyage.

Accepting this hypothesis this same Labrador evidently accompanied Cabot in 1498 and was the first to sight land.

I am inclined to consider La Bras D'Or, in Cape Breton, a corruption of the name, and evidence of some subsequent explorations made by him probably for the Anglo-Azorean Company, formed about 1501.

Mr. Wallace is mistaken in supposing the original Labrador was Greenland. The apparent connecting of the land of Labrador with Greenland (shown on maps of the Cantin type) evidently arose from a mistake reading by Lisbon cartographers of the courses taken by Cabot in 1498. The peculiar magnetic deviation in Northern Labrador and in Ungava Bay was in my opinion the chief cause of error, though there were others too technical to discuss in the space at my disposal.

P. S.—The records show that on his first and second voyages, 1497-1498 John Cabot's crew consisted of himself, a Burgundian and sixteen English sailors. This Burgundian is supposed to be Labrador, a fairly reasonable conjecture.

November, 1906, this name was changed to the United Wireless Telegraph Company, and in the following February the capitalization was increased from one million shares, at \$10 per share par value to two million shares at the same par value, one million preferred and one million common.

#### Successor to De Forest Co.

"The original company had merely a legal existence, until November 17, 1906. About that time active arrangements were instituted to put the company into operation, making it the successor to the defunct American De Forest Wireless Telegraph Company. "The officers of the American De Forest Company proceeded to abandon it as it was then sinking, being encumbered with debts and running at a loss and in default in interest on its bonds. It had an authorized capital, \$50,000 shares of preferred and 1,500,000 shares of common, par value \$10, with bonds based upon the entire assets of the concern of \$500,000."

## The "Nigger" Arrested.

Saturday at 12.30 Sgt. Byrne who was out on the search for the negro who attacked the little girl, Bridie Baker, arrested a man named James Sinyard, of Flat Islands, B. B., but who for some time past has resided along in a shack at the Blackhead Road just above Linegar's.

On Saturday morning as Miss Crocker was going to school she saw this man on the road ahead of her. He stood repeatedly, kept watching her closely, and fearing to pass him turned and retraced her footsteps. She met a man named Nolan on the way, and when he reached the city he telephoned the occurrence to L. G. Sullivan from the Western Station, and Sgt. Noseworthy and several policemen were sent out on Waterford Road. Sgt. Byrne followed and took up the case with the energy for which he is noted. He found that Sinyard had stated that he, too, had been attacked by a negro, and when he (Byrne) reached Waterford Road he cut across to the South Side Hill, he searched for and found Sinyard in the bush near his residence. He told the officer that he was attacked by a negro who had jumped on him from a tree in which he was hiding, and pointed out the tree to the Sgt. Asked how he knew that Miss Baker had been attacked, he said a lad named King, for whose father he was building a chimney, had read it for him out of the Telegram. When the lad King was asked did this occur he denied it, and then the officer brought the man down to Mr. John Baker's residence and confronted him with Bridie, the girl who reported she was attacked by a negro near St. John's farm. Sinyard has a shock of black hair, his face is dirty and burned from the sun, and he did not badly resemble a colored man. The girl identified him as her assailant. She particularly remarked his big thumbs nails and her description of her aggressor's appearance and clothing pretty well applied to the man who has been arrested. Byrne then drove him to the lock up. The man is handy about mason work, and what Miss Baker thought was a knife in his hand was no doubt a trowel which he used at King's chimney. Sinyard is of French extraction, has a foreign

accent, and it is thought is demented, as 13 years ago he spent quite a while in the Lunatic Asylum.

## At the R. C. Cathedral.

Rev. Fr. O'Callaghan preached a powerful sermon at the R. C. Cathedral last night that should not soon be forgotten by all who heard him. The text was "Thou fool, dost thou not know that this night thy soul is required of thee?"
