





At the People's House.

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As compared with the previous sittings, yesterday's was comparatively tame. After the presentation of petitions by Messrs. Clift, Moulton, Devereaux and Roberts on various requirements for their different districts, and when other preliminary work had been performed, the House went into Committee of the Whole on

the Establishment of Schools where none existed before. The Premier (Sir E. P. Morris) ex plained that the Resolutions asked for a vote of \$7,000 to provide new

schools in settlements where hitherto no schools had been established, and providing for keeping the schools open for a year where they were kept open for shorter periods. According to reports of Superintendents of Education there were 1,267 settlements here. The number where schools were conducted was 636, or no schools

in half the settlements of the Colony. The Inspectors say that there are 64 settlements here where ther are no schools and where there are sufficient children of a schoolable age to justify the establishment of schools. There were 260 places where there were schools kept open for periods of from 6 to 9 months out of the year. He (the Premier) had asked the Inspectors what it would cost to put schools in settlements where there were none and of continuing schools only partially conducted. Twenty thousand dollars was their answer. He reviewed the difficulty of securilng teachers and holding them. He showed the great strides the country had made educa-






