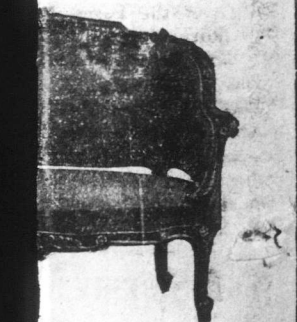

## At the People's House.

As compared with the previous sittings, yesterday's was comparatively tame. After the presentation of petitions by Messrs. Cliff, Moulton, Devcreaux and Roberts on various requirements for their different districts, and when other preliminary work had been performed, the House went into Committee of the Whole on the Establishment of Schools where none existed before.

The Premier (Sir E. P. Morris) explained that the Resolutions asked for a vote of \$7,000 to provide new schools in settlements where hitherto no schools had been established, and providing for keeping the schools open for a year where they were kept open for shorter periods. According to reports of Superintendents of Education there were 1267 settlements in half the settlements of the Colony. The Inspectors say that there are 64 settlements where there are no schools and where there are sufficient children of a schoolable age to justify the establishment of schools. There were 260 places where there were schools kept open for periods of from 6 to 9 months out of the year. He (the Premier) had asked the Inspectors what it would cost to put schools in settlements where there were none and of continuing schools only partially conducted. Twenty thousand dollars was their answer. He reviewed the difficulty of securing teachers and holding them. He showed the great strides the country had made educationally.

tionally, praised the Council of Higher Education, showed that from a vote of \$120,000 in 1889 the grant had increased to \$325,000 this year, hoped to prevent the diminution in the teaching ranks and believed the adoption of the scheme outlined would give a great impetus to the cause of education throughout the Colony.

Mr. Hon. Sir Robert Bond—He had much pleasure in supporting the principle of the Resolutions, for really it was a continuation of that policy of the advancement of education that he felt safe in saying was inaugurated by him when he had the honor to be leader of the Government from 1900 to 1908, as the Premier had stated during the last session.

ing that period the late Government had increased the grant over \$100,000, a sum in itself equal to that which had been granted for education for all the years previous. His Government had done more to advance the cause of education than did all the predecessors from the time Responsible Government had been granted. With regard to the vote of \$7,000 to be divided amongst the several denominations to be expended on the recommendation of the Superintendents of Education in sections where there were no schools, he had to observe that for some years they had been allocating similar amounts of from \$6,000 to \$20,000 to meet the alleged requirements of settlements without schools. He used the word alleged advisedly for this reason. He thought that if they could induce the several religious bodies to avail of the enabling clause that he had tried fortunately enough to secure a passage for a few years ago, there would be little need to approach the Legislature for the vote asked for this year. It was a crime for thousands of children to be without schooling. Sir Robert deplored the causes which prevent the availing of the enabling clause to meet the requirements of settlements where it was impossible to establish three schools and give teachers a wage sufficient to keep them respectably clothed and fed. The Premier had hoped that \$7,000 would meet the requirements of 60 settlements during the year. It would take \$20,000 to do so. Sir Robert said that the adoption of the enabling clause would establish one good school in the settlement. On the principle imposed now the 60 settlements would require 180 teachers. He hoped to bring in a suite of Resolutions dealing with the whole subject of education; he showed the benefits that must follow from technical education, pointed out what Canada is doing for it, and hoped to introduce a suite of Resolutions to establish practical and technical education upon a proper and effective basis.

## Mr. Clapp's Doings for His District.

TELEGRAPH EXTENSION.  
On Wednesday Mr. Clapp presented petitions from the inhabitants of L'Anse au Meadow, Little Brahab, Flower's Cove and St. Anthony on the subject of telegraph extension to these places. 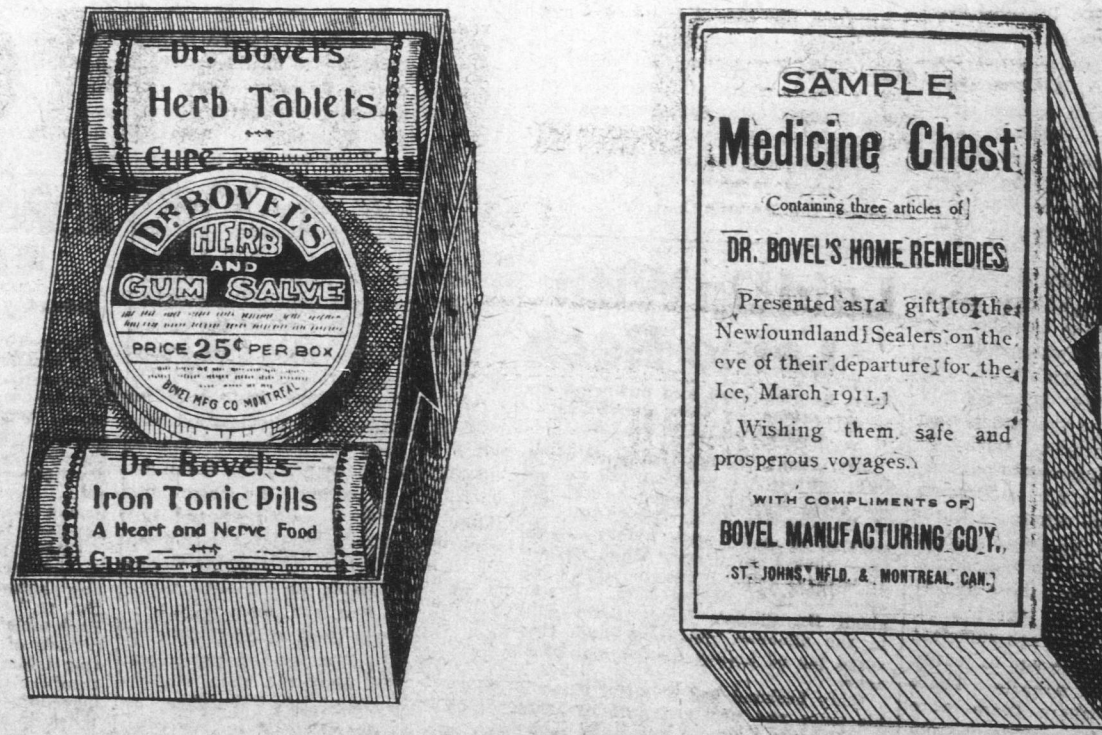

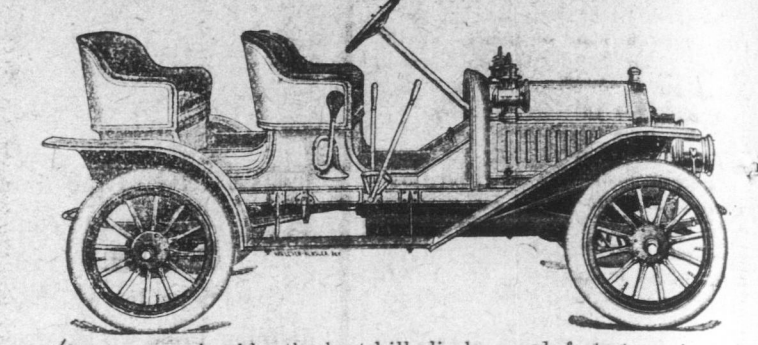
