But please remember that this is not my first experience with hens though from the very first I have had almost phenomenal success. For a dozen years I have raised them-by the dozen, and by the hundred with hens, and by the hundreds with incubators, and so far the balance has always been on the right sids of my book.

For a pen of 25 hens of the large breeds, such as Rocks, Wyandottes Reds, etc., the house should be about 8x12 though 8x14 would be better, and 8x15 better still, though the latter is quite large enough. For a pen of from 40 to 50 the house should not be less than 8x16, but better 9x18 or 19x17. It is not well marry her?
