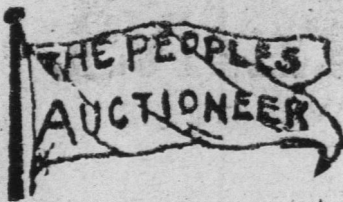

LONDON GOSSIP.

London, Sept. 11th, 1913.

Dress at the Royal Wedding.

It has been decided that Prince Arthur of Connaught shall wear his uniform as a captain of the Royal Scots Greys at the wedding next month, while the Prince of Wales will wear his uniform as a naval lieutenant.

The "supporter" of the bridegroom, the Duke of Saxo (Coburg and Gotha), will wear his picturesque dress as Colonel-in-Chief of the Seaforth Highlanders (Duke of Albany). The Duke of Connaught will be in Field-Marshal's uniform, but the King has not yet decided whether he will wear similar dress or his favourite uniform as Admiral of the Fleet. Probably, as the bridegroom is a military officer, His Majesty will likewise decide to appear as a Field Marshal. The ladies present will wear semi-evening toilettes with jewels, while all the gentlemen attending will wear either uniform or ordinary Court dress with orders. The scene is, therefore, likely to be a brilliant one, especially if the weather is at all favorable. Owing to the cramped accommodation of the Chapel Royal the ladies of the general company present will not wear trains.

Princess Mary at Buckingham Palace.

The rooms which are being made ready at Buckingham Palace for the use of Princess Mary, differ from those she has previously occupied in being in more intimate contact with the Queen's personal apartments. Her Royal Highness will in future use these rooms independently, and will be attended by her governess and her dressing-maid, who will have no other pre-occupations in the Royal Household. The suite is self-contained, and will permit of the serving of breakfast and lunch in privacy in case of need, while it also allows of personal hospitality being offered by the Princess to half a dozen friends for tea or otherwise. Her Royal Highness is having some cabinets introduced into her boudoir, to permit of the accumulation of possessions in which she is interested. These include a large number of picture-post-cards, photographs by Royal operators, curious gems, and other small objects of Oriental and savage origin, and a large number of books and knick-knacks which the Princess has received by gift and otherwise from her relatives and friends all over the world.

The Afflictions of the Court of Spain. A lady well acquainted with the Court of Spain brings the very sad news that it is feared that the second daughter of the Queen of Spain will be like her second son, both deaf and dumb. It is feared that the little girl is totally deaf, which must entail dumbness unless she can be cured. The Queen is almost heart-

broken. She goes with her children to the convents of the religious in or near Madrid to ask for prayers of intercession on their behalf, and particularly of late on behalf of the little Princess.

Another Balkan Quarrel.

Sinister rumours are reaching London on the subject of the Serbo-Montenegrin frontier negotiations. It will be remembered that when the unfortunate war between the Allies broke out Montenegrin troops occupied Ipek and some other places in the neighborhood, thereby releasing the Serbian forces for the campaign against Bulgaria. By way of compensation, Montenegro was at that time promised a "rectification" of her frontier out of the territories conquered by Serbia during the war against Turkey. Accordingly Montenegro, after the conclusion of the treaty of Bucharest, received Ipek and Djakovo. Now, however, Montenegro is demanding also Prisrend, the sacred city of the Serbian race, which King Nicholas himself made the subject of a striking poem as far back as thirty years ago. This has caused profound indignation at Belgrade. Public opinion in Serbia is dead against any further concession to Montenegrin demands. Moreover a very unpleasant impression has been created in Belgrade by the refusal of King Nicholas to bestow the usual medal for gallantry on General Putnik, the Serbian Commander-in-Chief. The reason for this offensive refusal on the part of a friendly and allied monarch is not known. General Putnik, however, is the most popular figure in Serbia, and rightly so. The "Skupshina" is about to be asked to vote him £20,000 as a gift in recognition of his services and in consideration of his poverty and large family. Con-

The Black-Listed Rifle.

There is really no need for anyone to be disturbed over the announcement that the new model army rifle under trial has proved unsatisfactory, as the rifle has never been issued except as an experimental weapon. A great deal of capital has been made out of the reputed military value of the new German rifle and the "Spitzer" bullet. In peace a great many advantages are claimed for the various engines of war. Experience shows that in actual use the majority of these advantages are discounted in an extraordinary degree. The two chief defects that condemn the experimental rifle are inability to find an explosive that when manufactured and stored in bulk will develop the advantages in flat trajectory that are claimed for the weapon and to mask the explosion made by the discharge. Added to these very vital disadvantages is the fact that the models of automatic mechanism are so rapidly approaching that level of perfection which will be practical for service requirements that it would be foolish to remain with a non-automatic weapon. It must be remembered that by a certain school of thought too much stress may possibly have been laid upon the advantages of an increase in flat trajectory. Except on a dead flat plain, such as a desert, too flat a trajectory interferes with the modern conception of overhead fire support and reduces the margin in safety of direct support, which is said to have been one of the secrets of the Greek success over the Bulgarians in the recent struggle in Thrace.

Cable News.

LIVERPOOL, Sept. 22. The Daily Courier (Unionist), says that it has the authority of an eminent statesman for the announcement that there will be a general election before the Home Rule Bill receives the royal assent.

DUBLIN, Sept. 22. Baron De Freyne died to-day in County Roscommon, aged 58, after a long illness. His son, Hon. Arthur Reginald Freyne, succeeds to the title, and the ownership of 39,000 acres in County Roscommon.

BELGRADE, Sept. 22. The situation is grave along the Albanian frontier, where the Albanians, armed with modern rifles, are assembling for the purpose of attacking Servia. It is believed here that these hostile preparations are due to foreign intrigues against Servia and Montenegro.

NEW YORK, Sept. 22. Three were injured and more than twenty injured today, in a head-on crash of two Long Island electric trains at College Point. One of the injured will die. The railroad's statement, issued later, places the number of injured at 40, with three perhaps fatally hurt.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 22. Quarantine against potatoes from the British Isles, Germany, Austria-Hungary, Newfoundland and Mexico is to be continued indefinitely. The potato plants in the States are in a very flourishing condition, and it is thought no importations will, in any case, be necessary.

TORONTO, Sept. 22. In an effort to save a drunken man from seeming danger, Daniel Shea, was killed by falling between a west-bound College car and its trailer, near Dundas Street Bridge. Shea started to get off the car when it was in motion to keep a drunken man from being struck.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 22. The free entry of wood pulp and paper was granted by the Treasury Board today to Belgium and Denmark under the favoured nation clause. This action follows the principle of the Customs Court decision granting Europe free wood and paper because that privilege is accorded to Canada.

DUBLIN, Sept. 22. Congratulating Michael J. Jordan, the new Secretary of the United Irish League of America, John E. Redmond, leader of the Irish Parliamentary Party, writes that he regards Jordan's appointment as a guarantee that the invaluable assistance received from America in the past will not fall until the Home Rule Bill becomes law.

BELFAST, Sept. 22. Carson and General Richardson's inspection tour of Down and Antrim counties ended on Saturday. They assert that a perfect military organization of 100,000 volunteers exists, composed of veterans as well as volunteer recruits from all ranks. Women have signed a pledge to assist and each troop has a uniformed corps of nurses.

MANCHESTER, Sept. 22. The Manchester Guardian corroborates the statement that the second daughter of the King and Queen of Spain, like her second son, is totally deaf, and therefore will probably be also dumb. The Queen is said to be nearly heartbroken, and is constantly taking her children to the convents of the religious orders near Madrid, asking for prayers on behalf of the little ones, especially for her afflicted daughter.

DULUTH, Sept. 22. A record unequalled since the establishment of the weather bureau in 1882, was made yesterday, when snow fell at nearly all points of Northern Minnesota around the shores of Lake Superior. The earliest snow fall in the last thirty years was on Sept. 24th, 1907. Windy scenes prevailed in the vicinity of Port Arthur, Ontario and Grand Marais, where the ground was blanketed with snow. The average temperature has been 34 degrees.

COLOGNE, Sept. 22. The correspondent of the Cologne Gazette at Constantinople telegraphs to-day that he has gained the impression during conversations with several foreign ambassadors to Turkey, that they believe it to be quite possible for the Turkish and Bulgarian armies to come to an agreement to operate jointly against Greece, if that nation refuses the conditions of peace proposed by Turkey. A responsible Turkish Government newspaper advances the same idea. General Staff, Commander in Chief of the Bulgarian Army, who is in Constantinople, declined to discuss the matter.

The principals, attended by their seconds and by all their friends, stood close opposite, each holding a cocked pistol in his right hand and a glass of raki or spirits of wine in his left. The first to drain his draught had the right to fire, and generally blazed away with fatal effect. If their seconds had been useless to discourage this practice, but I insisted on fair play."—London Chronicle.

A Panacea for Cancer.

All Germany Excited Over Procuring Some of the Costly Material.
Munich, Sept. 16.—All Germany is possessed with the idea of procuring misothorium as a panacea for cancer. It is stated to have power emanating in rays similar to but more effective than radium. The cost, seems almost as great. The substance is derived from thorium waste in the manufacture of gas mantles and is used in a tiny portion enclosed in a silver covering in which extremely small holes are pierced. The silver box is then placed upon the part affected by cancerous growth, and it is said will slowly but effectually remove all traces of the disease.

There is hardly an important town in the country which did not vote a large sum from the public funds for the purpose of purchasing some of the costly material. Where public funds are not forthcoming, concerts, bazaars and such like are the means adopted for raising the money for the purpose. Medical men seem to favor the movement for procuring misothorium. Surgeons on the other hand are not unanimous in their opinions. One surgeon referred to a case of gastro cancer where a misothorium box to which a cord was attached was lowered into the stomach of a patient, who bit through the cord and swallowed it. The patient was immediately operated on for the purpose of recovering the valuable box.

Carada-Australia Line.

The scheme for establishing an express service between Great Britain and Australia via Canada, would seem to be making rapid progress. For the contract for the construction of two 25-knot steamers has already been awarded. Also work upon a railway between Blacksod Bay, Mayo and Collooney Junction Sligo, which will have the effect of linking up the Irish railway system, will be commenced this month, while on this side a harbor is ultimately to be built at Cape Charles, on the southeast coast of Labrador, which will become the terminus of a new transcontinental railway line. At first, however, vessels will run from Blacksod Bay to Montreal in summer and to Halifax in winter. There is further to be a connecting service between Vancouver or Prince Rupert, Fiji, Auckland, N.Z., and Sydney, N.S.W., so that it will be possible to reach the latter port within three weeks of leaving London, as soon as the new express service is in working order.

Big Salaries.

What is the Limit to a Man's Worth? What is the limit to anyone's worth in salary? Is it £2,000, £10,000, or £50,000?

These questions arise from the announcement that Mr. Howard Elliott's remarkable career "from clerk to railway president" has now reached its zenith by his appointment, at a salary of £20,000 a year, to succeed Mr. Charles Wellen as president of the late Mr. Pierpont Morgan's favorite enterprise, the New York, New Haven, and Hartford Railway.

Thirty thousand a year as salary? Just think of it! Is a man really worth such a sum annually? Can he possibly earn it on his abilities?

Apparently, Mr. Pierpont Morgan considered Mr. Elliott to be well

worth the £20,000 a year which is now to be paid him. Shortly before the death of Mr. Morgan Mr. Elliott was offered a salary of £20,000 a year to transfer his services to a rival system; but on the advice of the great banker, who was reserving him for greater tasks, he refused the offer.

City Men's Views.

Here are interesting opinions on the question given by two City magnates, each a member of the governing circle of a huge financial concern with very extensive industrial connections.

"American methods, and our own differ greatly," said the first magnate, "but speaking generally, I don't think £10,000 or £20,000, or even Mr. Elliott's £20,000, is the limit which might justly be put upon the services of an organizer and controller who has to direct the operations and secure the profits in a business where probably millions of capital are involved. Naturally, however, each case must be judged on its merits, because the ability and foresight demanded vary very much in different circumstances."

Quite a different view was taken by the other City man who gave his opinion. "In present conditions," he said, "I think £5,000 or £6,000 is a reasonable limit to a man's earnings in the shape of salary. When his skill and efforts become worth more than that they should be remunerated—and in practice they very often are—by a percentage in some way or another on the profits of the business."

Large Salaries Increasing.

Huge as is to be the salary of Mr. Howard Elliott, however, that which was earned by Mr. Charles M. Schwab was more than five times greater. Mr. Schwab, as manager of the great Carnegie Steel Trust, received no less a sum than £150,000 a year!

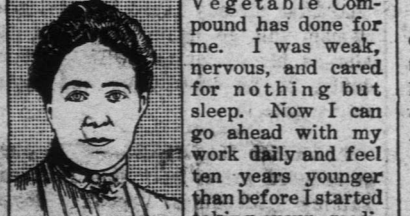
It has been stated by Mr. Brisbane, the eminent American journalist, that the value of a man half as able as the late Mr. Joseph Pulitzer, the proprietor of the "New York World," would be £20,000 a year to one newspaper and £50,000 a year to two newspapers.

But here in England we are much behind America in the matter of enormous salaries—this despite the fact that great business enterprises are increasing every day. 200 was 202, as compared with only 107 in the previous year. The total income of these 202 persons was £1,654,000, or an average of £8,000 each, but the return does not give further details. Six or seven young men had gathered there, and part of their outfit was a bottle of liquor, which each helped to dispose of in turn, until the whole seven were in fighting trim. Then the most brutal and demoralizing scene ever witnessed in this field took place (and there have been very many degrading scenes in that same field). Crazed with the liquor they had partaken of, the men started fighting and in a few moments the whole seven were pounding and pummeling each

other—neither being particular whom he struck—until blood began to flow freely, while the language used was of the vilest description. Many persons of tender years in the field were attracted to the scene, and the effect on their young minds could not be otherwise than degrading. For nearly an hour the melee lasted until men passing interfered and managed to separate the participants, but not before one or two of the fighters received injuries which they will remember for a time. The police arrived when the fight was over, but whether they made any arrests or not the writer cannot say.

Surely, Mr. Editor, such scenes as these ought to bring home to the Inspector General the need of having one or two policemen stationed near this locality. The streets in the lower part of the city are well patrolled, and rightly so; but one or two men detailed to watch the proceedings in the above-named field would have a much desired effect in maintaining order and decency, and the people who live in the neighbourhood saved a good deal of annoyance and anxiety. 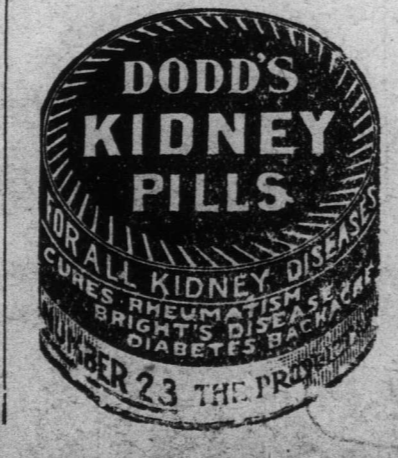

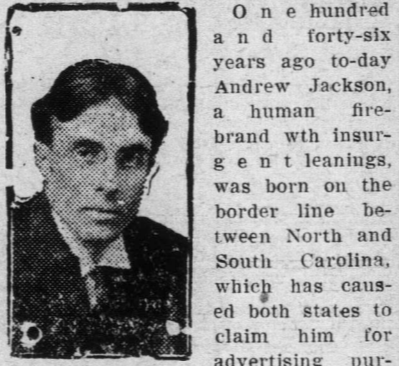

Andrew Jackson



One hundred and forty-six years ago to-day Andrew Jackson, a human fire-brand with insurgent leanings, was born on the border line between North and South Carolina, which has caused both states to claim him for advertising purposes. Andrew did not amount to much until he got married to a grass widow with great charm of manner and a large reservoir of will power, as his earlier days were spent in trying to locate the winner of the county trot. One of his principal pastimes was to challenge somebody to a duel and then pick bird shot out of his shoulderblades. He is commonly supposed to have been the person who put the pug in pugnaeous.

Up to the time that he became President, Jackson's time was principally employed in fighting the Indians and the English, in both of which pursuits he was highly successful. It was nothing uncommon for him to take a handful of men and go out and kill a whole herd of unwashed red brethren, getting back home in time to milk the cow. When the war of 1812 broke out, Andrew broke out with it and roamed all over the south looking for trouble. He found it at New Orleans, where he stood off a British army of 14,000 men with an animated cluster of pigeon-toed militia and a well-spring of hope.

Andrew's chief competitor for the presidency was Henry Clay, who was a poor politician and got nosed out several times in succession. As President Jackson made a great hit with a large number of emancipated office seekers by removing 2,000 republican postmasters and filling their places with party workers who would stand without hitching. He also landed on the United States bank and caused it to expire with a loud plunk.

General Jackson was called "Old Hickory," on account of his great powers of endurance and because of appearing at the inaugural ball in a hickory shirt. He had the disagreeable habit of taking the people into his confidence, which was very irritating to the old school politicians and caused them to comment on his table manners. He died June 8, 1845, having given the insurgent movement a start from which it has never recovered.

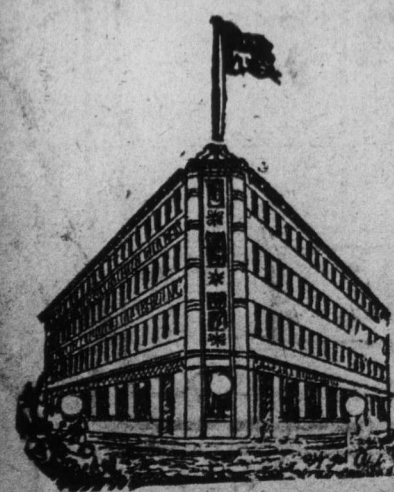

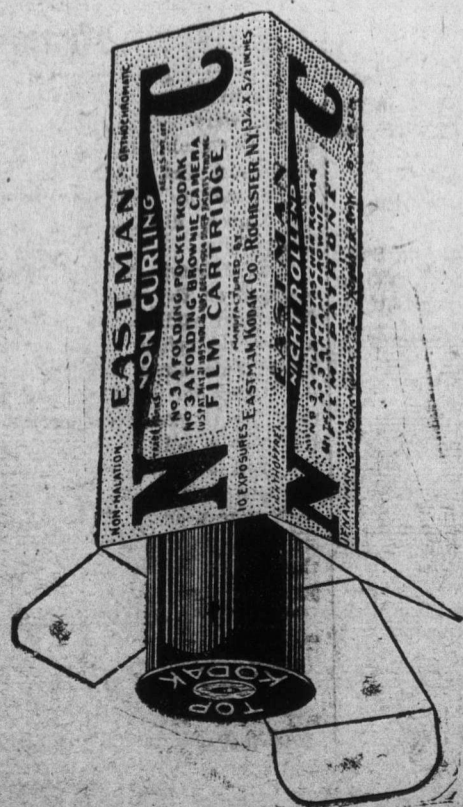

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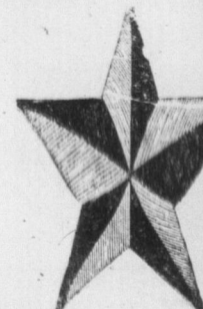
