





The Governor, Newfoundland: LONDON, Sept. 21. In France there has been artillery activity. An enemy ammunition store In Russia, the Russians are retreating in the Vilna district. Some sucsses are reported on other points on

BONAR LAW.

ST. PIERRE BULLETIN.

PARIS, via St. Pierre, Sept. 21. In Artois our batteries shelled German works. German artillery was very active on this front, directing bombardment especially against Arras suburbs, with heavy calibre shells. Mining struggle continues in Roye district. In Eastern Argonne the Germans exploded a mine near our trenches. In Lorraine and Woevre our batteries dispersed a German column of infantry travelling on a train running from Saint Maurice to Thillot. In Calonne trenches, districts of Apremont and Regnieville, German works were seriously damaged by our artillery fire. Our long range batteres shelled Thiancourt railroad station. Observers noted a train leaving the station at full speed, whilst another was held up by our fire. Also between Puzieux and Dilme we cut off the railroad track connecting Metz and Chatiansalins. Several artillery contests are reported on the remain-



The averno building will be allowed on the front of any street which does not bear a certain conformity to house already erected, and that nothing can be built that will detract from or tend to lessen the value of such propert owners. But here we find this un eightly shed projecting out to the full level of the street line blanketing good residences on either side and ending their market value away below par. Has a property owner and tax-payer no protection in such cases? How many of the Commissioners would sanction the erection of such a place by their own doors? It was noticed that our City Engineer paid a visit vesterday to this monument t our civic authorities' interest so we

must assume that everything in connection with it is in order. time to time to get in experts to report on our sewerage and water systems, and the Board of Health and the S.P.C. issue pamphlets on matters pertaining to the prevention of diseases strongly advocating pure air and ventilation of our homes. he undertaker's charges. Mountain climbing is very difficult to learn, like aviation, because the nan who makes a mistake does not often get a second chance. But when the pupil has become proficient he oves it beyond all other sports and s not happy unless he is holding a nountain peak in both arms and shinng his way slowly aloft regardless of

cicles. When a mountain climber feels the it coming on, he selects a tall, morose beak which has not been tampered with for some time. He then engages alf a dozen guides and ties himself to them with a stout rope. Then he arises at 2 a.m., and after a light breakfast of coffee, rolls and frost bite, he walks seven miles in the snow to a point where the mountain rises straight up.

Here the mountain climber begins o enjoy himself. Sticking a finger in one crack and a toe in another he works slowly aloft, now and then holding on with his neck and ears, and feasting on the scenery below.

There is always plenty of scenery for the mountain climber. He can stop at any time and look down a mile or two. It is great comfort to him to know that if he drops his cigar all he has to do is to let go and he will land beside it in a few minutes.

After the mountain climber has crawled up 11:000 feet of snow and ice, has hung over Europe by a rope a few times and has worn off his finger ends scratching toeholds in the granite flanks of the peak, he reaches the summit. After this he has no interest in the mountain and leaves it right away. Some climbers thoughtless remove a hand from the mountain to scratch an ear and reach the bottom in almost no time. but this is considered bad form.

Mountain climbing is more fatal than aviation, but not as dangerous as deer hunting in Wisconsin. It is also a much fairer sport, because the nountain has some chance.

St. John's, Sept. 21. A Relic of Bye-Gone Times.

While the Council's employees ere digging a drain on Market House Hill, known in the days gone by as Court House Hill, they discovered portions of the foundation of the old ourt house, which once was erected in that vicinity. The old court house was a wooden structure, and for years previous to its obliteration, was either wind tight nor water tight, it was designated as a hen house by Chief Justice Norton, an Irishman, and the first Roman Catholic Chief Justice of Newfoundland. The gaol was on the ground floor, and was a very unhealthy location for the upkeep of prisoners; the building cover ed the area on which now stands the Dept. of Public Works, with a scaf old, adjoining, on which in the year Downey, Spring, Manderville, and Mrs. Snow were hanged. Downey was executed for the murder of Robert Crocker Brag, maid and child, of Harbor Grace; Malone, an accomplice, was the Crown and was gave evidence for the Crown, and was given a reprieve, he was sentenced to incarceration at the King's pleasure; all the guilty parties were tried by Chief Justice Boulton, called like Lord Norbury, the "hanging judge." Judge Boulton was assisted by Justice Bren-ton and Archibald. There's a story told in relation to the unfortunate nan Downey. His body was taken to Harbor Grace, where it was hanged in irons on the "Reef" now called Gib-bet Hill; some time afterwards after it had been reduced to a skeleton, some person or persons took it down to Dr. Sterling's house, and left it lying against the front door. The maidservant hearing a knock came to the door, and on opening it she fainted on seeing the skeleton; between its long ingers were placed a piece of paper, on which was written: "O Doctor Sterling, come try your


