The attention of Shippers and Shipowners and the trading community generally is drawn to the fact that in time of war the practice of shipping goods with Bills of Lading made out "to order" (made illegal by section 4 of the Customs (War Powers) Act, 1915, in the case of goods shipped from the United Kingdom under lidense) is very undesirable in respect of any goods exported from any part of the British Empire. Shippers of from "The Weights and Measgoods not requiring licenses are there-fore advised not to make out Bills of Lading "to order", but only—

(a) to a named consignee, or in the margin of the Bill of Lad-

mately destined. Goods shipped to Holland should be

It is essential during the war that, in the case of all goods, whether shipped under license or not, British ships voyage a full manifest of cargo and all the Bills of Lading, or certified

copies of the Bills of Lading. Unless these requirements are complied with, there will be a risk that the ships will be stopped and diverted by H. M. Ships or the War Vessels of the Allied Nations, in order to permit full examination of the cargo and ascertainment of its destination.

In the case of British ships that will touch at ports in countries contiguous to enemy territory, compliance with these requirements is of special importance and serious delay may result to ship and cargo in such cases Just landing a cargo of if all ship's papers are not on board and in order.

LONDON, To-Day,

Sir George Buchanan, British Am bassador to Russia, presiding at the annual dinner of the English Club last night, said in part, according to a Reuter despatch from Petrograd: Between us and Germany a great gulf is fixed, red with the blood of peace Germany have been defeated and the spirit of militarism permeating the whole nation exercised. During the past two years Britain has more than once been accused not only of wishing o secure the lion's share of the spoils. but of thwarting the realization of Russia's traditional ambitions. Prem ier Trepoff's recent statement in the Duma laid that bogey to rest forever. The British Government when first approached on the subject of Constantinople and the Straits early in the spring of 1915 immediately expressed its whole-hearted assent. We want to see Russia largely compensated for all her services and sacrifices. We want to help her to the prize she has so long dreamed of. We want to see her strong and prosperous. We want to consolidate for all time the alliance which this war has cemented, for upon its maintenance depends the future peace of the world.

That is the corner stone of our policy. Sir George in the course of his speech said that Britain during the war advanced more than 600,000,000 pounds sterling to her Allies for the purchase of war material, which otherwise they would have been unable to procure, besides material she sup-



THE ALLIES' REPLY TO GERMANY

PARIS, Dec. 31. In the reply to the proffer of Germany and her Allies for a peace conference, the Entente Allies, in a collective note, declared that they refuse to consuder a proposal which is empty and insincere. The note was handed to American Ambassador sharp to-day by Premier Briand and was made public simultaneously in London and Paris. The reply is a strongly worded document which says the war will go on until the following terms are secured:

1.—Reparation for violation

2.-Recognition of the prniciple of the free existence of small 3 .-- A settlement that will end once

and for all the forces which have constituted a perpetual menace to the nations, and will guarantee the future security

4.-Legitimate reparatoin for Belgium, guarantees and safeguards for all the future.

The Allied note says the German overtures are an attempt to justify in advance a new series of crimes, submarine warfare, deportation, forced labor and enforced enlistments of the inhabitants of occupied territory against their own countries. The Allies call the German overtures a sham offer. A peace concluded on the terms, the Allies say, would be only to the advantage of the Germans, who, after imagining they would reach their goal in two months, have learned after two years that they can never attain it. The Allied note is signed by Great Britain, France, Russia, Belgium, Italy, Japan, Montenegro, Portugal, Roumania and Ser-


