## Newfoundland Fisheries.

LeMessurier-Imperial Trade

The Cod Fishery, which is the principal resource of Newfoundland, was highly remunerative during the year 1918. Although the catch was not equal in quantity to that of previous years, the enhanced value in the foreign markets enabled buyers to pay high prices, and the value of the pro duct was much greater than that of the previous year. The shore fishery was exceptionally good in some districts, such as that of Ferryland whilst it was poor from north of Cape Freels to Cape Bauld. The Bank Fishery showed a decrease of thirty per cent., due, in part, to the resence of German submarines on he Grand Banks. The Labrador ishery also showed a decrease in the atch, but the increase in price more han compensated for the loss in antity. The Scal Fishery showed decrease in quantity of 44.979 seals, an increase in weight of 691 tons, d in value of \$346.836. The Herng Fishery was vigorously prosecuthe catch being the largest and



## Aviation.

Wireless telegraphy impresses the numan mind with a sense of mystery and awe because it is so intangible. The human mind, however, prefers to be impressed by the whole of the human senses; it loves to see things with the eye, hear them with the ear, and so to comprehend a tangible object. The conquest of the air has been the ideal romance of the ages, and although it is now on the eve of actual achievement, romance will lend to aviation a lingering halo. It is the human being himself that has taken to the air, exulting in this new adventure, this emancipation from the terrestrial clod, and glorying in his freedom. And to make his freedom more complete he now has the means to receive and to give, by signals or by word of mouth, messages from and to the grovelling millions of gravity or his co-navigators of the airy oceans. Verily has he given "to airy nothing a local habitation and a name."

The world's mind is at present full the possibilities of the aeroplane

as their sphere. Here, again, we have the means of rapid mail services and

the dissemination of news. As one of the world's greatest airways and of the Empire's means of air communication in particular we cannot do better than mention the route to India. London to India by air, via Egypt, Bagdad, Karachi, Bombay, Calcutta! And this and all other air routes to India have passed entirely under the direction of the British Empire. In India we have an ideal country for flying, whether from such factors as meteorological conditions, easily-made landing grounds or local supplies of liquid fuel. Aviation will play a great part in the development

and progress of India. Then India is only the half-way house to Australia and other important points of the Empire. Again, in Africa we shall have the Cape to Cairo purpose of surveying and exploring great expanses of territory in the Dark Continent. Here the airship will sail clear of the fever swamps and unfordable rivers. It will be secure from the dangers of the tropical jungle paths. Configuration of the land will present no difficulties, and the desert no terror. Teaming millions hitherto bound in the darkness of superstition and ignorance shall receive the light of learning, and in due course profit by civilising influences and the scientific development and exploitation of the natural resources of their

country. In surveying the Empire communications we find that wherever civilisation and commercial activities hope to make progress the essential factor is the development of the means of communication. The ultimate goal is the co-ordination of the Empire's means of communication, be it under the sea or on the sea, underground or upon its surface, and through the air. They are the Empire's arteries and nerves, and upon them depends the explitation of a self-contained Empire, ability to bring the British race into the closest social intercourse and the such intimate relations that all subjects may learn of and discuss any subject of Empire interest and importance as nearly as possible at the same mement—a synchronisation of thought

Let us, therefore, concentrate upon the development of our communications. Then shall our ships be sure of markets, our territories receive ample development, and our people boundless scope for initiative and enterprise. The competition of the foreign flag shall not be feared, nor outside markets disturb our industries. In this way shall we build up a selfcontained, free and independent Em-

Then, in spite of lying, there is nothing hidden that shall not be known .- Montreal Wit-
