Parcel post and Transportation.

We understand it is the intention of the authorities to open the parcel post examining rooms at the Port aux Basques terminal, and we suggest that arrangements be made therein for export as well as for import. We fail to see any logical reason why parcels should be subject to thousand miles extra carriage together with the delay as a consequence.

In the matter of transportation we have somewhat retraced of late years. This is particularly so in marine transportation, as for instance the winter service of the Cabot Straits. For years that route was plied by one of the most powerful ice breakers ever turned out of the dockyards on the Clyde, and was followed by two other very powerful icebreakers, while today the service has to depend upon one only about half so powerful and heavy as either of her predecessors—Western Star.

# U.S. Does Not Favor Reciprocity.

Fielding Advised by U.S. Congressional Leaders--Lady Member to Take Seat in Lords--£64,000,000 Cut in English Budget--Arthur Griffith Refuses Reply to De Valera

## WASTE RESULTS.

LONDON, March 2. Addressing the House of Commons yesterday in a speech in which he minutely detailed those economies the government had decided to adopt in connection with the recommendations of the Economy Committee, headed by Eric Geddes, Sir Robert Horne, Chancellor of Exchequer, asserted that these would total £84,000,000 compared with £88,000,000. He estimated £75,000,000 would be saved in the coming financial year. The principal points in the Chancellor's speech were his acceptance of reductions in the army estimates of £1,000,000 instead of £2,000,000 as proposed by the Geddes Committee; a statement that the naval estimates of 1922-23 would be below £51,000,000 as against £52,500,000 for the current year; and his announcement that it was the purpose to economize £18,000,000 as suggested in the Geddes report.

## WHY DOING SAYS FORDNEY.

WASHINGTON, March 1. The possibility of a reciprocal trade agreement being negotiated between the United States and the United States after the passage of the pending Fordney bill legislation is being widely discussed in political circles here tonight as a result of development tonight in connection with the visit of W. S. Fielding, Canadian Minister of Finance. Mr. Fielding had a conference this afternoon with Chairman

Fordney of the Ways and Means Committee and according to the latter asked what were the prospects of re-enacting the Reciprocity Bill of 1911. Fordney replied there was nothing doing in that line.

## TURN DOWN FOR FIELDING.

WASHINGTON, March 1. Hon. William S. Fielding, Canadian Minister of Finance, who came to Washington several days ago in the interest of a general tariff reciprocity agreement between the United States and Canada has been advised by congressional leaders that Congress does not look with favour at this time on such an agreement.

## HOUSE OF LORDS WILL HAVE WOMAN MEMBER.

LONDON, March 2. The petition of Lady Rhonda to sit in the House of Lords was granted by the Committee of Privileges of the House of Lords to-day, if she takes the seat awarded her by the ruling she will be the first woman to sit in the Upper House of the British Parliament as Lady Astor was in the Lower Chamber. Lady Rhonda is the daughter of the late Viscount Rhonda, Great Britain's war-time food controller, who died in 1918 from illness brought on by overwork. His only child was a daughter. To-day's decision, it is presumed, affects all peers in their own right in the United Kingdom numbering 23. Among those affected is Lady Strathcona,

Lady Roberts, Lady Wolseley, Princess Arthur of Connaught and the Duchess of Fife.

## BETTER TIMES COMING.

WHEELING, VA., March 2. Charles M. Schwab, President of the Bethlehem Steel Corporation to-day declared that the worst of the industrial depression had been passed and that better times were expected.

## DE VALERA AGAIN BEATEN.

DUBLIN, March 1. Another threat to withdraw from Dail Eireann was made by Eamonn De Valera to-day, when Arthur Griffith refused, as President of Dail, to answer a question regarding the plan for the future of the Paul Bowles dockyard at Queenstown on the ground that this was strictly provisional government work. Mr. De Valera declared the question was a test involving the supremacy of the Dail. An effort by Republicans to shift the meetings of Dail to the Mansion House so the public could attend, was defeated 49 to 40. This motion was thought to indicate that Mr. De Valera's party expected a prolonged meeting of Dail while Griffith sup-

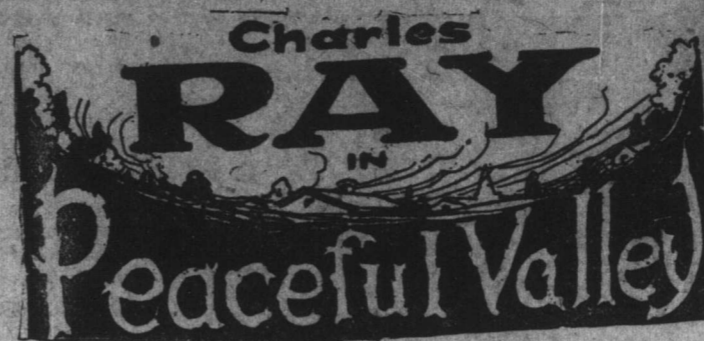

LONDON, March 2. Three persons were killed and twenty-four others injured, some seriously, in a disturbance this morning at Tanta, Egypt, fifty-five miles north of Cairo, says a Central News despatch from Cairo. Native soldiers restored order.

## PROVISIONAL GOVERNMENT WILL BE SUSTAINED.

LONDON, March 2. Long discussions have taken place on the Irish question, but the opinion here is that the Provisional Government will be sustained.

## REDUCING U.S. ARMY.

WASHINGTON, March 2. Reduction of United States army to 115,000 men has been tentatively

## IN DISTRESS.

HALIFAX, N.S., March 2. A wireless received here reads: "Norwegian steamer Gronoft, latitude 47.48, north; longitude 41.24, west, sinking. Life boats smashed. Steamer Esthonia forty-two miles distant at 11.30 proceeding to assistance making eight knots."

## CANADA'S MINERAL PRODUCTION.

OTTAWA, March 2. Mineral production in Canada in 1921, according to returns from principal mineral producing provinces, was as follows: Ontario, \$54,505,000; British Columbia, \$33,000,000; Nova Scotia, \$32,500,000; Alberta, \$29,000,000; Quebec, \$14,000,000.

## INFLUENZA EPIDEMIC PASSED.

NEW YORK, March 2. The influenza epidemic which has claimed 544 lives since January 1, was declared officially ended to-day by Health Commissioner Copeland.

**Household Notes.**

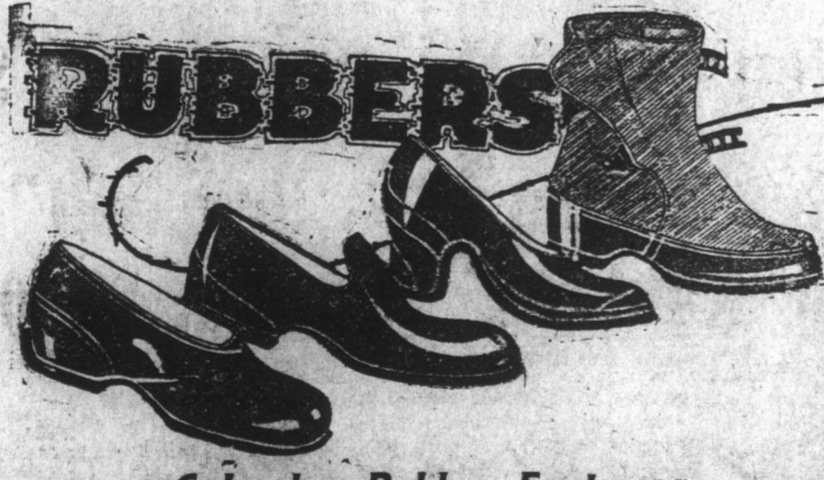
Four eggs are used to four cups of milk for plain custard.
