



Viking Warship.

VESSEL OF 300 B.C. FOUND. A warship of the Vikings, the oldest ever found, dating as it does from 300 B.C., will soon be on view at the National Museum, Copenhagen. It was found in the Bog of Hjortspring in Slesvig, and now the ship and the shields, spears, and swords found with it are on their way by rail in 15 large packing cases.

The ship which is made of a kind of elm, is 42½ feet long and 6½ feet wide The oval shields are each in a single piece of wood. One of the swords has a bronze scabbard. There are also a couple of balers and two wooden boxes with lids which were used evidently as eating vessels There were 10 oars in the ship, each about 39in. long.






