Wheat Yield for 1922.

Canada's wheat yield for 1922 is provisionally estimated at 391,425,000 ushels, according to a statement ssued by the Federal Bureau of Statistics. This is the highest of any yield since 1915, when the yield from the smaller acreage of 15,109,415 was 393,542,000 bushels. The area sown to wheat in 1922 is estimated at 22,-542,643. The yield per acre is also higher than in any year since 1915. being 17 1-2 bushels as compared with 26 bushels in 1915.
