**Eight Chinamen Under Arrest**  
POLICE MADE RAID ON PREMISES—ORIENTALS CHARGED WITH HAVING OPIUM IN POSSESSION.  
Charged with having opium in their possession unlawfully, eight Orientals, all residents of Halifax, were taken into custody early yesterday morning as the result of a raid made by the police on the premises of Wong Quin, corner Granville and Salter Sts. Suspectious of the strange gatherings which take place in the residence during the early hours of the morning a squad of police consisting of Officers Kellock, Collins, Walsh, Horne, Burgess and McLeilan visited the premises shortly after two o'clock yesterday morning. On their arrival it was found that the rooms were occupied by eight Orientals, all of whom were held while the building was searched. The police say their search disclosed a complete opium outfit, which included a large quantity of the dope. This was confiscated by the police, while the eight Chinamen, Chin Nay Hong, Lem Kee, Wong Fook, Wah Gong, Jim Lee, Sam Sing, Harry Sing and Charles Wing, were taken into custody charged with having the opium in their possession. They were taken to the Station and locked up for the remainder of the night, but were released on bail yesterday morning to appear in court this morning.  
Wong Quin, the proprietor of the building, was not among those taken by the police, having been absent from the building at the time the arrests were made. Efforts will be made to locate him to-day and he too will be charged with having opium in his possession.—Halifax Chronicle, June 15.

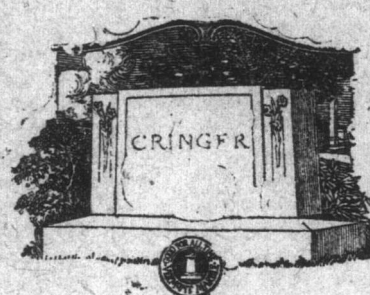

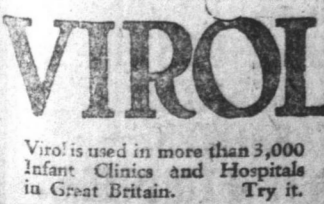

At times the rod was bent almost double by the efforts of the "fish," but the angler always appeared to have the game well in hand, and after skillfully playing his catch for 7 min. 35 sec., drew the exhausted "fish" to the side of the bath, thus winning the contest with over seven minutes to spare.

**Another Large Park for Montreal North**

SULPICIAN OFFERS PROPERTY IN VILLERAY WARD TO CITY.

The extreme northern part of the city will boast another large park in the near future if plans which are now being formulated become a reality. It was stated in city hall circles this morning that the Gentlemen of St. Sulpice were ready to lease the central section of their Youville property in Villeray ward provided that the streets which border on this property are opened and they enjoy tax exemption until all the bordering lots are sold.

The property measures about 150 acres and is located between St. Hubert, St. Michael's Road, 42nd Avenue and Cartier St. Altogether the property in question measures about 700 acres but the city will be limited to 150 of them. With the opening of this park the city will boast a total of 75 of these breathing spaces in all.

**Barnjum Enters Political Field**

RENNING IN N.S. ELECTION ON PLATFORM OF KEEPING PULPWOOD FOR CANADIAN INDUSTRY.

HALIFAX.—Frank J. D. Barnjum, the active protagonist of the pulpwood embargo proposal, has announced himself as a candidate of the Conservative party for Queen's County in the forthcoming provincial election.

Mr. Barnjum advocates the development of Canada's pulpwood resources for the manufacture of paper in Canada. He wants to see a 200-ton paper mill erected on the watershed of the Mersey River, "which controls the largest and finest waterpower in the Maritime provinces."

The initial expenditure for the erection of the plant and development of power alone will exceed the sum of five million dollars. The amount of pulpwood required to keep a mill of this size in operation will amount to more than all the wood that is now being exported by the farmers in the entire province of Nova Scotia, and will entail the distribution of more than a million dollars through the province annually, for pulpwood alone, together with an annual expenditure for labor of five hundred thousand dollars in the operation of the mills.

The class of towns that are built up around a paper mill are the finest of any towns to be found in Canada today, and as an example of this I will merely refer to the towns of Grand Mere in Quebec and Iroquois Falls in Ontario, which are probably the two model towns in the entire country.

I care not how many new paper mills may now be building in Canada, can be manufactured at a lower cost price at Liverpool than at any location on this continent. These new mills building in Canada are, by the way, largely the result of my campaign for an embargo on pulpwood.

**A Little Sense of Humour**

By Mrs. Joseph Conrad. As a nation we can hardly be accused of being joyous. Most of us cannot even look pleased or mildly interested. The grim, solemn faces one sees at theatres, dances, and—what is even less comprehensible—around a well-spread table have many times amused me.

A little sense of humour would ease that gloom, and would also go far to prevent us from making ourselves ridiculous.

The wording of our memorial references to those near and dear to us, for instance, is often rendered absurd or irreverent simply by our lack of humour. I once saw in a London newspaper the lines:

To the memory of dear father. His end was peace. With God all things are possible.

It is certain that the notice was meant to show real sorrow and affectionate regret, but the careless use of words robs it of all dignity and solemnity. No one with any sense of humour could have failed to notice the incongruous note.

But is this, which appeared in a local paper, unconscious humour, or can one detect a certain suspicion of spiteful sarcasm?

Mrs. C— wishes to thank all friends for sympathy, etc., and for flowers sent, mostly artificial. Let me quote another instance within my own experience. When a famous young novelist died in the Black Forest, where he had been taken in the hope of saving his life, his wife, whom we knew very well, was with him; also a favourite dog. In this case her lack of humour was disastrous. Her wire announcing the death read as follows: "God took—at 11.5. Make some arrangement for me to get the dog home."
