THE WASTE OF CITY WATER.

A Break at the Works—A Manager at \$1000 For Annam.

When the water works committee met at the city hall yesterday afternoon, Ald. Walker (chairman), Mayor Manning and a full group of the members were in attendance.

Mr. Galloway put in an appearance to ask an allowance of discount on a water bill not paid before the period for granting discounts had elapsed. Mr. Carver's bill was something like \$300, and as the members balked to see him lose too much they gave him \$114 discount.

The city engineer's report diluted on the need of efficient measures to check the waste of city water. Mayor Manning gave his support to these views. No action was taken.

A sub-committee was ordered to consider whether Contractor Hamilton should not be engaged to make repairs to the pumping well at the engine house.

The engineer reported that owing to a defect in the tubes of a boiler at the engine house fourteen hours were lost in repairs. Further investigations will be made.

A request for a \$15,000 extra interim appropriation was held over.

The committee finally decided to ask applications for the position of waterworks manager at \$1500 a year.
