M'KINLEY BILL AND CANADA.

MR. SPRINGER SAYS THE BILL DIS-CRIMINATED AGAINST US.

He Bewails the Loss of Canadian Trade and Canada's Retaliation in Preferring the British Market-He Makes a Claim That a High Tariff Means De

crease in Wages. WASHINGTON, Jan. 11 .- When the House net at 11 o'clock this morning there was a better attendance on the floor than on any day since the debate on the Tariff bill began. Later on more members appeared and the crowds in the galleries increased. Mr. Pendleton, Dem., had announced an

intention to object to any extension of time for any speaking, and in consequence all the speeches were limited to one hour. The speakers included Breckenridge, Ky.; Richards, Ohio; Dingley, Me.; Springer, Ill.; Dolliver, Iowa; Harter, Ohio, and Prosius, Penn.
In speaking of the loss of foreign trade resulting from a high tariff and particularly the loss of Canadian trade, Mr. Springer asserted that the McKinley bill had un-

asserted that the McKinley bill had injustly discriminated against the Canadians. There should be a free commercial intercourse between this country and Canada; and although Canada was the natural customer of the United States in retaliation for the discrimination of the McKinley bill English products were put in competition with American products in Canada and Canadians were willing to pay the higher cost of English goods. Wages, said Mr. Springer, were at the bottom of the whole tariff discussion. He asserted that protection did not raise the wages of the workingman; that it was largely a question of location. In support of his statement that the tariff did not affect the rate of wages he showed by census bulietins that in the woolen industry, with a high protective tariff on raw wool, the wages paid skilled labor were less than in the boot and shoe, factory, dependent as it was on free hides.




