SIR CHARLES TUPPER

The Canadian High Commissioner Reaches New York

AND IS PROMPTLY INTERVIEWED.

Sir Charles and Lady Tupper Both in Good Health.

The High Commissioner's Visit Will be a Short One—Anxious to Learn News of Canada—Not Much Interest in the School Question—Opinion of Mr. Chamberlain, the Secretary of State for the Colonies.

Montreal, Dec. 14.—A special to The Star from New York, says: "I am going to Canada," said Sir Charles Tupper, "to consult with the Premier in accordance with his request regarding the Fast Atlantic Steamship and Pacific Cable schemes."

Sir Charles stood on the upper deck of the Campania as he greeted the reporter with Lady Tupper leaning on his arm. Both were in excellent health. Sir Charles declared that his present voyage had been the most pleasant in his long series of trans-Atlantic trips. He bore not a trace of the serious attack of influenza which had almost prostrated him during his summer and in consequence of which his health required a systematic course of nursing amid the heather clad hills of Scotland at that time.

It is just as well to dismiss reports of Sir Charles' ill-health as totally untrue, for he appears to be in excellent health. While he has been in Canada since his last trip to Canada, his robust appearance and his cheerful and sprightly step indicate that there is yet plenty of that quality in him which gained for him the title of the "Cumberland War-horse."

Only a short visit. "I don't know that I have very much to say," Sir Charles as he gave expression to the object of his mission to Canada.

And how long do you expect to remain in Canada, I asked him. "My stay in Canada will be a short one," and again he reiterated, "Very brief, indeed, in proportion to my regret, for I have many friends in this country whom I would like to see."

Having stated his mission and the probable duration of his visit, Sir Charles in turn asked for news from Canada. Many interesting events had transpired since he had left London. Chief among these was the resignation of Hon. N. C. Wallace as Minister of the Interior and the appointment of Hon. J. F. Wood as his successor.

He was informed of the day. In this connection he was informed that about him being made a member of the Order of St. Michael and St. George. Sir Charles expressed his pleasure at this honor and said that he would accept it with pleasure.

With reference to the Secretary of State for the Colonies, the Rt. Hon. Joseph Chamberlain the Rt. Hon. Joseph Chamberlain one of the ablest men in public life in England has been selected for the position.
