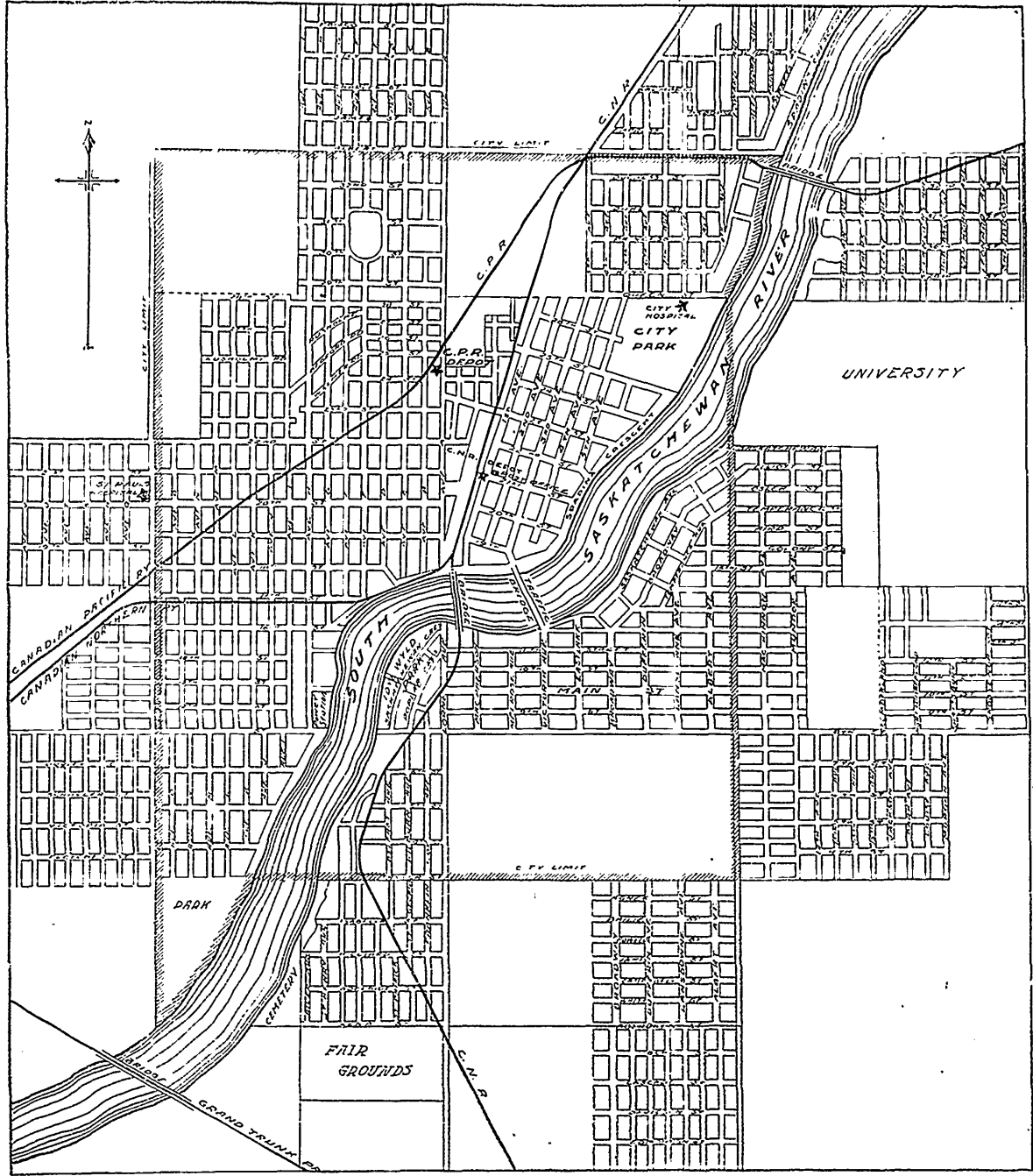

SASKATOON

The first settlers came to the district in 1882 overland from Moose Jaw, which place was then being reached by the C. P. R. mainline being built across the continent. Ten years afterwards a railway followed and up to 1907 this one line was all that connected Saskatoon with the world outside. Eleven years ago the place was little more than a point on this single railway line, with its once-a-week dilapidated passenger coach cast off as unfit for service from the C. P. R. main line. Now are nine different operating railway outlets from Saskatoon with nearly a score of trains a day running in and out of the city.

The Pioneers—About 1883, The Temperance Colonization Society being formed back in Ontario, and by its arrangement about a score of good-hearted, jolly-souled boys came to the Nutana district. They settled upon homesteads, and built shacks. They grew a little grain and tried mixed farming but there was little development. Several mortgaged their homesteads and moved away. They left their shacks empty and their homesteads unoccupied. These remained vacant and deserted for many years, for none would buy a mortgaged place when other homesteads were free. For years, people bound for Saskatoon were dis-



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couraged along the way by such advice as: "The last place in the world; the poorest country on earth; go and see the deserted homesteads where the mortals couldn't keep body and soul together, and had to leave. Better stay off here." These lies had their effect for years. Not till the inherent worth of the place overcame all the untruth, did Saskatoon cease to suffer.

In 1884-5, prospective settlers for Saskatoon hearing of the Rebellion, stopped their loads of effects, and returned to their former homes.

Its Helps—The advent of the Barr colony in 1903 did more than anything else to spread abroad the fame of the town. The colony included about 2000 persons. From Saskatoon they trekked about 200 miles westward and founded what is now called Lloydminster, which district had been selected for them before leaving Britain. This was the beginning of the growing time of Saskatoon.

Such successful farmers as T. Copland, Capts. May and Andrews, G. Fletcher, J. J. and R. Caswell, J. Art, H. Smith, D. Lusk, I. and W. Cherry, G. Stevenson and J. Evans, writing to friends, advertised the place, and brought in settlers.

At first the little straggling village grew on the east bank of the river. In 1903, the population being 113, Saskatoon became a town, and J. R. Wilson its first mayor. Rapid growth now began. In 1906 it was incorporated as a city, taking in Riversdale on the west side and Nutana across the river. The population then was a little over three thousand. The census of 1910 gives a population of over thirteen thousand.

Its Name—In the Maritime Provinces is a berry, called Indian pear; in Ontario and the United States the June berry; along the banks of the South Saskatchewan river through Saskatoon, this berry has always been plentiful. Our sweetest songster, the meadow lark, is

very fond of it. In one of the lark's eight different songs, it distinctly enunciates the word and repeats it a dozen times, "Saskatoon, Saskatoon!" This music from the bird in the midst of the berries, caused the aborigines to call the berry Saskatoon; the gladsome cry of the bird thus occasioned a name to the berry, and the berry the name to Saskatoon.

Its Situation—The river, 1000 to 1500 feet wide, with leafy-wooded banks, flows through it from the Rocky Mountain perennial snows. The scenery along the river banks winding in a semi-circle about the chief portion of the city, is for most of the year exquisite. The city overlooks the country around for miles. It is located in the heart of perhaps the greatest hard-wheat district in the world, one half-way between Winnipeg and the Mountains, and between the American Boundary and the northern limit of wheat growth; in the centre of hundreds of millions of acres of rich wheat-producing soil. It is claimed for Saskatoon that it is situated in the midst of more millions of acres of wheat-growing soil than any other city in the world. This great wheat district is one thousand miles nearer the European market via Hudson Bay, at a big saving per bushel in freight.

Its Prosperity—It is the best poor man's country and rich man's opportunity for greater riches in the world. Of those living around the district eleven years ago, nine out of every ten have made comfortable, independent fortunes, by farming, ranching, merchandizing,

As a manufacturing and distributing centre Saskatoon also excels, having 45,000 square miles to supply foreign goods to, and 70,000 square miles to supply with our flour and our other home manufactures. The reservoir on Nutana Hill has a capacity of 180,000
gallons. A domestic pressure is maintained at 80 lbs. while
for fire purposes the pressure is raised to 125 lbs. per square
inch. There are 200 fire hydrants throughout the city.

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FIRE DEPARTMENT

Chief of Fire Dept. **THOS. HEATH**

City of Saskatoon's fire apparatus consists of—Motor Fire Truck (ordered) value \$6000., Hose Wagon, Hook and Ladder Wagon, Chemical and Watrous Steam Fire Engine, contained within Central station. Apparatus Westside Station consists of Combination Hose and Chemical Wagon. Nutana Station consists of Gasoline Fire Engine and two hoses.

Location of Fire Stations

Central Hall—23rd St. E. corner 4th avenue.

Westside Hall—Corner E. ave. and 21st St. West.

Nutana Hall—Corner 11th St. and Broadway.

City Pumping Station and Power house on west side of the river at the south extremity of Ave. H.

The standing pressure is derived from standpipe located corner 11th St. and Broadway, and the registered average is from 60 to 65 lbs., which is ample for domestic purposes and small conflagrations. In case of large fire the Fire Chief upon his arrival immediately telephones the Pumping Station for increased pressures. The warning is then given to the man in charge of the standpipe by the blowing of a large whistle, and the response is made by turning the key and thereby stopping flow of water going in to the standpipe. This causes the pressure to come direct from the pumps, and it is only a matter of moments before their force is evident.

Instructions for Using Street Fire Alarm Boxes

First—Take the little hammer that is attached to each box, and break the glass over Key Box; then unlock the Box and pull the hook down once and let go. **Once is sufficient to turn in the alarm.** If when unlocking the box you hear a ticking noise don't pull the hook down as some person has pulled the box before you. Whoever pulls the box must wait at the box until the Department arrives to direct them where the fire is.

Persons using the Alarm Boxes must not try to take the key out as they cannot be removed without a relief key.

Don't turn in an alarm from the street boxes for a chimney fire—call up Telephone 501 and notify the Department and it will be attended to at once.

In case of a telephone being in close proximity to the fire call Telephone 222 and speak plainly when giving location of fire.

Don't send in an alarm for pastime as the consequences might prove disastrous.

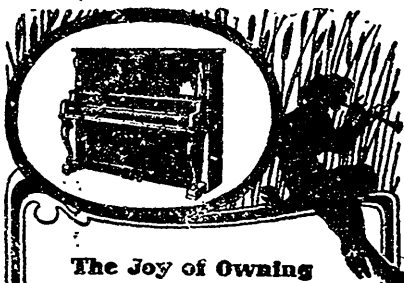

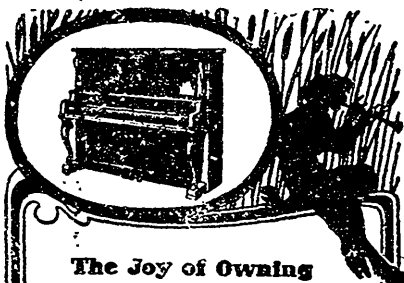

Letter Rates.—Letters posted in Canada, addressed to any place within the Dominion, 2 cents per oz. If unpaid, such letters cannot be forwarded, but will be sent to the Dead Letter Office. If partially prepaid, the letter will be forwarded to its destination and double the deficiency charged on delivery. Letters mailed at any office for delivery at or from the same office are charged 1 cent per oz., and must be at least partially prepaid; otherwise they are sent to the Dead Letter Office. All postage must be prepaid by postage stamps.

INSURANCE

Private Post Cards.—The face of a Private Post Card may be used for advertisements, illustrations, etc., provided that a clear space of at least 1-4 inch is left along each of the four sides of the postage stamp, and a clear space 3 1-4 inches long and 1 1-2 inches wide reserved for the address at the lower right hand corner of the card. Private Post Cards for delivery in Canada, U. S. and Mexico, must not exceed a size of 6 inches in length by 3 5-8 inches in width, nor be less than 4 inches in length by 2 3-4 inches in width. Cards for other countries must not exceed 5 1-2 inches in length by 3 1-2 inches in width, nor be less than 4 inches in length by 3 inches in width. Cards of dimensions not conforming to these regulations are treated as insufficiently paid letters.

Pictorial Private Post Cards which have communication on address side.—Cards which have the back covered by a picture, and one-half of the front to the left of the address space reserved for written communications, are admitted as post cards.

Cards bearing the title Post Card or its equivalent are admitted to the mails at the rate for printed matter provided they conform to the general regulations respecting printed papers.

United Kingdom, Egypt, and British Possessions and Protectorates.—Postage on Letters, 2 cents per oz.

Foreign Countries, except United States and Mexico.—Postage on Letters, 5 cents for a letter weighing one ounce or less. For letters weighing over one ounce 5 cents for the first ounce and 3 cents for each subsequent ounce or fraction of an ounce.

United States and Mexico.—The rate on letters to the United States and Mexico is the same as in Canada, and at least one rate (2 cents) must be prepaid.

Double the deficient postage is charged on all unpaid or insufficiently paid letters for other countries.

The charge for Registration in addition to the Postage is, on all classes of matter, five cents.

Registration is not an absolute guarantee against the miscarriage or loss of a letter; but a Registered Letter can be traced where an Unregistered Letter can not, and the posting and delivery or non-delivery can be proven.

Registered letters posted at and addressed to any P. O. within the Dominion of Canada may be insured against loss for amounts not exceeding \$25. The insurance fee as well as the ordinary postage and the registration fee must be prepaid

in postage stamps on all insured registered letters. The insurance fees and the corresponding limits of compensation are as follows:—

Book Post.—A Book Packet may contain any number of separate books. Limit of weight for domestic post, 5 lbs. (unless consisting of a single book, in which case a weight of 10 lbs. is allowed); for foreign post, 4 lbs. Limit of size: domestic, 30 inches in length by 1 foot in width or depth; foreign, two feet in length, by one foot in width or depth.

Miscellaneous Matter.—Matter (other than newspapers and periodicals) wholly in print without reference to process, such as circulars, catalogues, calendars, hand-bills, books, pamphlets, printed forms, maps, prints, drawings, plans (without written specifications) engravings, lithographs, photographs (when not on glass or in cases containing glass) official or private post cards in quantities, sheet music (whether printed or written) instruction books in music, visiting cards, the manuscript of books or newspapers (whether hand-written or type-written) indented or perforated sheets of paper containing characters which can be read by the blind, botanical, entomological and mineralogical specimens and the following partly written and partly printed matter:—militia and school returns, customs manifests, voters' lists, school or college examination papers, printers' proof sheets with corrections, exhibition entry tickets, municipal assessment rolls, Dominion and Provincial Government documents, statute labor returns and municipal returns in general, etc., on which the rate of postage is 1 cent for each 2 ozs. or fraction thereof. To come within this class the material printed upon must be either paper, cardboard or parchment.

The following articles are subject to the rate of 2 cents for the first 4 ozs. or fraction thereof, and one cent for each additional 4 ozs.—Seeds, cuttings (but not cut flowers) roots, bedding plants, scions or grafts.

No letter or other communication intended to serve the purpose of a letter must be sent or inclosed in any such package or thing mentioned, and the same must be sent in covers open at the ends or sides, or otherwise so put up as to admit of the contents being, if necessary, easily withdrawn for examination

by the officers of the Post Office to ensure compliance with this provision (if enclosed in sealed envelopes notched at the ends or sides, or with the corners cut off, letter rate of postage will be charged).

No packet of miscellaneous matter can be transmitted by mail if it exceeds 5 lbs. in weight, 30 inches in length or 12 inches in width or depth, nor may the combined length and girth of any packet exceed 6 feet.

Legal and commercial papers generally are liable to letter rate of postage when posted for delivery within the Dominion of Canada.

Printed or written requests for return are recognized on 3rd and 4th class matter, addressed to places within the Dominion, and same will be returned direct to the sender, subject to payment by the sender, on delivery to him through the Post Office, of the full amount of postage to which the article was in the first place liable, together with any charges rated thereon on account of any deficiency in the original payment.

Newspapers and Periodicals.—On all newspapers and periodicals posted in Canada, for delivery in the Dominion of Mexico, and on newspapers and periodicals published in Canada and posted for delivery in the United Kingdom, or the British Possessions mentioned above, other than those addressed to regular subscribers or news agents from office of publication, the rate is one cent per 4 oz., to be invariably prepaid by Postage Stamp

Copies of legitimate daily newspapers can be mailed by the publishers in Canada to regular subscribers and newsdealers in the United States on prepayment in cash at the rate of 1 cent per pound or fraction thereof and other newspapers and periodicals sent to the United States either by publishers or other individuals are subject to the rate of 1 cent per 4 ounces.

Newspapers and periodicals weighing less than 1 oz. each may be posted singly, if prepaid by Postage Stamp 1-2 cent each.

The postage on bona fide specimen newspapers, and on papers and periodicals published less frequently than once a month, is 1 cent per lb.

British and foreign publications may be posted by newsdealers in Canada to subscribers in Canada at the rate of 1 cent per lb. They cannot however be posted at that rate for local delivery at places where there is a free letter carrier service

Transient Newspapers and periodicals include all newspapers and periodicals posted in Canada, other than Canadian newspapers sent from the office of publication, and British and foreign newspapers posted by news agents for regular subscribers in Canada. When addressed to any place within the Dominion, the United States or Mexico, and, when published in Canada, and addressed to any place in the United Kingdom, Bahamas, Barbadoes, Bermuda, British Guiana, British Honduras, British North Borneo, Ceylon, Cyprus, Falkland Islands, Fiji, Gambia, Gibraltar, Hong Kong, Jamaica, Leeward Islands, Malta, Mauritius, New Zealand, Newfoundland, Northern Nigeria, Sarawak, Seychelles, Sierra Leone, Southern Nigeria, Transvaal, Trinidad and Tobago, Turk's Islands or Zanzibar, they must be prepaid the following rates by Postage Stamp:—

If posted singly and weighing less than 1 oz., half a cent each

If weighing 1 oz. or over, one cent per four oz. or fraction of four oz.

Transient newspapers and periodicals not published in Canada are subject to the ordinary printed matter rate of 1 cent per 2 ozs. when addressed to the United Kingdom or British Colonies.

Patterns and Samples.—Patterns and Samples of Merchandise and Goods for sale, not having saleable value and not exceeding 3 lbs. in weight, except samples of tea, which must not exceed 8 oz. in weight, may be posted in Canada, to be forwarded to any place within the Dominion, on prepayment by Postage Stamp of a rate of 1 cent for each 2 ozs. or fraction thereof under the following regulations:

If insufficiently prepaid the packet will be forwarded charged with double the deficient postage, provided at least 1 cent is prepaid.

Goods sent for sale or in execution of an order, however small the quantity may be, or any article sent by one private individual to another, which are not actually trade patterns or samples, are not admissible.

On Money Orders issued in Canada for payment in Canada, Antigua, Bahamas, Barbados, Bermuda, British Guiana, Cayman Islands, Cuba, Dominica, Grenada, Guam, Hawaii, Jamaica, Montserrat, Nevis, Newfoundland, Panama Canal Zone, Philippine Islands, Porto Rico, St. Christopher (St. Lucia), St. Vincent, Tobago, Trinidad, Tutuila (Samoa), Turks Islands, Virgin Islands, and the United States, the

Intending homesteaders should visit the office and choose any three townships in the district, whereupon the clerk will give them plots showing the land available for entry.

Synopsis of Land Regulations

Any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or sub-agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.00

Except in the waters of the Province of Saskatchewan, north of the main Great Saskatchewan River and its North Branch, where the close season for whitefish is from 5th October to 15th November.

The weekly close time against nets and other fishing apparatus is from 6 p. m. Saturday until 6 a. m. Monday.

Fishing with Nets or any other Apparatus without License is Prohibited.

PROHIBITIONS

The use of explosives, firearms, spears, grapnel hooks, negogs and nishagans for the purpose of catching or killing fish is prohibited.

No river or creek shall be obstructed by any kind of dam or trap for the purpose of catching or killing fish.

The throwing of lime, chemical substances, drugs, poisonous matter, dead or decaying fish, offal of fish, sawdust and mill rubbish, or any other deleterious matter in waters frequented by fish, is prohibited under a penalty not exceeding \$100.

Indians and half-breeds are forbidden to fish illegally the same as white men.

No person shall, during the close season, fish for, catch, kill, buy, sell or have in possession any of the kinds of Fish mentioned above.

Nets of any description or other apparatus shall not be used within a radius of half-a-mile of the mouth or outlet of any river or stream flowing into, or out of, any lake.

The sale or export of Speckled Trout and Brook Trout of every kind including Char is prohibited.

PRAIRIE FIRES--WARNING

Summary of the Provisions of the Prairie Fires Ordinance, violations of which are punishable, in addition to liability to civil action, with fines up to

Two Hundred Dollars and Costs

GENERAL PROVISIONS RELATING TO FIRES—Any person who, directly or indirectly—

1. Kindles a fire and lets it run at large on any land not his own property; or
2. Permits any fire to pass from his own land; or
3. Allows any fire under his charge, custody or control or under the charge, custody or control of his servant, employee or agent to run at large, is liable to a penalty of \$200 in addition to any damages awarded in civil action.

If a fire shall be caused by the escape of sparks or other matter from any engine or other thing it shall be deemed to have been kindled by the person in charge or should be in charge of such engine or thing but such person or his employer shall not be liable to the penalties imposed by this section if, in the case of stationary engines, the precautions prescribed in the Ordinance have been complied with.

CAMP OR BRANDING FIRES—Any person who kindles or is a party to kindling a fire in the open for camping or branding purposes and leaves it unextinguished is liable to a penalty of \$100.

CLEARING LAND AND FIRE GUARD—Any person kindling a fire on any land for the purpose of guarding property, burning stubble or brush or clearing land is liable to a penalty of \$100 unless the land on which the fire is started is completely surrounded by a fire guard not less than 20 feet in width, consisting of land covered with snow or water or so worn, graded, ploughed or burned over as to be free of inflam-

mable matter and unless the fire is also watched during the whole period of its continuance by three adult persons provided with proper appliances for extinguishing prairie fires.

FIRES SET OUT BY RAILWAY EMPLOYEES—Nothing in the Ordinance prevents any railway company from burning over the land held by it under its right of way and the land adjoining it to an extent not exceeding 300 feet on each side of the centre of the track; but every person causing, commencing or in charge of any such burning shall cause it to be watched and guarded during the whole period of its continuance by at least four men provided with suitable appliances for putting out prairie fire under a penalty of \$100. Any railway company is authorised to plough and burn fire guards on uncultivated or unoccupied lands.

SPRING BURNING—Nothing in the Ordinance prevents any person from kindling fire before the seventh day of May in any year for the purpose of clearing any area of land less than 320 acres in extent if such area is surrounded by a proper fire guard 10 feet in width and is continually watched by three adult persons provided with proper appliances for putting out prairie fire; but should any such fire escape or be left unguarded the

person kindling it is liable to a penalty of \$100.

FIRE GUARDIANS—In addition to such persons as may be specially appointed, all members of the North-West Mounted Police Force, members of Councils of Local Improvement Districts and Municipalities, and Justices of the Peace are *ex officio* Fire Guardians, with power of Constables.

PERSONS WHO MAY BE REQUIRED TO FIGHT FIRES—All grown-up male persons under sixty years of age (other than postmasters, members of the medical profession and railway employees) residing within 10 miles of a prairie, and 15 miles of a forest fire, may be called upon to assist in extinguishing any such fire under a penalty of \$5 for refusal.

THRESHING ENGINES—The following provisions shall be observed in and about the management and operation of engines used for threshing: (1) No engine shall be placed within 30 feet of any building or stack; (2) A metal pan of adequate size filled with water shall be placed under the engine as a receptacle for cinders and ashes; (3) Before the fires are lit in the furnace, and during the time the engine is in operation, the reservoir in the smoke stack shall be filled with water; (4) All cinders and ashes shall be thoroughly extinguished before the engine is removed from any place where it has been in operation; (5) A barrel of water and two buckets shall be placed conveniently to any stack or combustible material near the engine; (6) A spark arrester in good repair shall be used and shall not be opened while the engine is in operation. Any person failing to comply with any of these provisions is liable to a penalty of \$5.

It is unlawful to shoot on Sunday:

- “ to shoot on any person's property without permission.
- “ to shoot or carry guns on Forest Reserves at any time.
- “ to shoot between one hour after sunset and one hour before sunrise.
- “ to destroy game by poison, narcotics, sunken punts, nightlights, traps, snares, swivel, spring, automatic or machine shot guns.
- “ to export game without a permit. Fees \$1.00 for big game head and \$1.00 per dozen for geese or ducks.
- “ to offer prairie chicken or partridge for sale.
- “ to disturb nests or take eggs of birds.
- “ to use dogs for hunting deer or to allow dogs used to such practice to run at large.
- “ to export furs that are not of prime quality.
- “ to destroy muskrat houses in winter or beaver dams at any time.
- “ to use poison for killing fur-bearing animals.
- “ to accompany or aid a nonresident to shoot without a license.
- “ to kill any bird not mentioned in the Game Ordinance, except crows, eagles, goshawks, pigeon hawks, duck hawks, Cooper's hawks, hawk owls, blackbirds, cowbirds, grackles, English sparrows, loons, cormorants, pelicans and mergansers.

Nonresidents may obtain licenses from the Department of Agriculture. Fees—\$50.00 for big game; \$25.00 for birds; \$10.00 for birds (6 days).

Residents may obtain big game licenses, \$2.00 from local agents in cities, towns and villages.

Residents of cities, towns and incorporated villages may obtain bird license, \$1.00, from local agents.

Issuers of marriage licenses will be asked to also issue game licenses to residents.

No license issued to any person under 16 years of age without written application from his guardian.

Degree and Courses—At first the main emphasis will be laid upon the Three Years Course adapted to the requirements of the young man who purposes making farming his life work. As soon as the demand warrants it, a course leading to the B. S. A. degree will be established. The Three Years Course may be recognized as a portion of the B. S. A. course. Short courses of two or three weeks duration adapted to the special needs of farmers, threshermen and others will be given from time to time.

Three Years Course—Students entering this course must be sixteen years of age, must have education sufficient to enable them to pursue their studies with profit, and must have spent at least two years immediately preceding entrance at work on a farm. There will be no other entrance requirements, but there will be oral examinations for the purpose of assigning the students to proper divisions for recitations and laboratory work.

Course of Study—The work of the first year will be largely of a practical nature and closely related to actual practice on the farm. The work of the second year will consist more of the sciences that underlie successful farm practice. The practical subjects of the first year will be continued.

First Year

1. English.
2. Field Husbandry (Field Crops)
3. Animal Husbandry (Anatomy and Live Stock Judging)
4. Nature Study (Chemistry and Plant Life)
5. Mathematics
6. Farm Mechanics

Opening of Classes—Classes in the Three Years Course will be open on the Tuesday nearest the first of November and close for the fall term in time to give the students an opportunity to reach their homes before Christmas. They will open again for the spring term on the first Tuesday or Wednesday of the new year, and close with the Thursday nearest to the first of April in time to allow the students to reach home and make preparations for the spring seeding.

Fees and Expenses—The tuition fee is \$15 a year. Supplementary and other incidental fees will be small. Board will cost about \$5 per week.

Certificate and Diploma—The B. S. A. diploma will be granted to those who complete the full course. To those who complete the Three Years Course the *Certificate in Agriculture* will be given.

SHORT COURSES

For Farmers—There will be a short course in the winter of about a week's duration designed for farmers who are too busy to spend a longer time away from home. This course will be planned to give practical information on soils, crops, live stock and machinery.

For Threshermen—A course in steam and gasoline engineering is being planned to help those who have already had

some practical experience in operating engines. It will last for two or three weeks during July. This course is not planned with a view to making engineers, but rather to training engineers for the better care and management of their engines, to prevent losses of time, money and human lives.

For Weed Inspectors—In order that weed inspectors may become more efficient in looking after their work, it is planned to provide a course at the College for them. Instruction and practice will be given in the identification of weed seeds and plants, methods of spreading, together with the most practical methods of prevention and eradication.

For Creamery Workers—A short course during the winter will be provided for creamery workers, so that they may become acquainted with the most modern applications of science in dairying.

For Extension Workers and Fair Judges—There will be a short course provided for those who will be engaged in extension work throughout the province. Live stock judges, stallion inspectors and other judges will come at the same time to prepare themselves to be of greater service while discharging the duties of judging by giving reasons for their placings and conducting judging demonstrations.

For Women—At the time of the short course for men there will also be one for women, in which subjects pertaining to woman's work in the home, on the farm and in the community will be dealt with. Poultry raising, care and handling of milk and cream, and the manufacture of dairy products of the farm; gardening, sanitation and hygiene of the home, home-nursing and other matters of interest to women on the farm will be taken up.
