## THE TRADE OF CANADA．

Mr ．Fortin recently brought before the Hnuse of Commons a number of figures relating to the trade of the Dominion with tropical countries，in support of a motion for＂all correspondence and papers relat－ ＂ing to reciprocal trade ayreements ＂between the Government of Brazil，the ＂different Governments of the West ＂India Islands，whether British or Foreign ＂and Mexicon．＂We are under the im－ pression that a yeturn of a similar charac－ ter had already been noved for by $M r$ ．

Blake, and we notice that it has been since laid on the table of the House, hut as it is very voluminous it will probably not be printed for some time. We have carelully real Mr. Fortin's figures, but we must. own that we fail in discover the value which has been altributed to thrm by Sir Leonard Tilley and nthers. Mr. Fortin has hearl and has read in books, that "the balance of trade means nothing." Such, evidently, is mot his own opinion, for lip takesa most peculiar view of the halane" of trade, such as we, at least, have never hefore heard of. Mr. Fortin seems to think that there should not only be a balance of trade between his own country and all other nations, but that there should likewise be a halance between Canada and each country, island or group $\sigma^{\prime \prime}$ islands, with which she has commercial relations.- We shall give a few briek quotations from the Fansard report of Mr. Fortin's speech: "The total imports ©from these countries (British and "Foieign West Indies) amount to $\$ 5,497$, '. 002 , the exports $\$ 3,936,734$, showing an "excess of imports over exports amount"ing to $\$ 1,560,268$, that is to say, that we "impoit gonds to the value of upwards of " $\$ 1,500,000$ more than we export to those "countries." * * "It is fair to con"trast the two amounts and draw the "conclusion, which is, that the balance of "trade is against us to the extent of more "than $\$ 1,500, C 00 . " * * *$ " believe "that this House and the Government "should investigate and try to discover "the best means of changing this state of " hings, and make the balance of trade "in our favour instead of against us."

Discounging as is the task of endeavoring to convince the believers in the "balance of trade" theory that they labour under a complete delusion, we think it may be well to enlighten those who, like the Finance Minister, were impressed with Mr. Fortin's statements. It is well known that for several years the halance of trade, as it is termed, has been largely in favour of the United States. During the five years ending in 1882 it averaged nearly $\$ 20,000,000$ or nearly $\$ 1,000,000,000$ in all. Now, let us examine the nature of this trade, which certainly the balance of trarle theorists must admit is in a most satisfactory position. In 1882 Great Britain trok over $\$ 408,000,005$ of United States exports, or more than all the other countries in the world put together. On the other hand, the imports from Great Britain were under $\$ 200,000,000$ or less than one-ball the exports to that country. Now let us examine the trade returns of the comntries with which Mr. Fortin undertook specially to deal. The United

States imported from Brazil nearly $\$ 49$, 030,003 and exported thereto a lictle over nine millions-showing an unfavourable balance of about forty millions. "lhe imports from Cuba were over $\$ 70,000,000$ and the expor's thereto $\$ 12,134,824$. The imports from Porto Rico were $\$ 5,716,574$, and exports thereto $\$ 1,562,5 \mathrm{sl}$. We come now to the British West Indin Culonies. The exports were $\$ 10,575,999$, and imports $\$ 10,362.298$. The difference is remarkable, but may be accounted for by many circumstances, prominent among which is the heavy inclehterdness on the part of the West Indies to British capitalists. Many estates are altigether owned by residents in the United Kingdom, while others are mortgiged and the produce, as a rule, is shipper to British markets. The cases we have cited of Brazil, Cuha and Porto Rico completely destroy Mr. Fortin's theory of a spociul balance of trade.

We may, however, add an illustration on the subject of the general balance of $a$ nation's indebterness, as inferred from the trade returns. Let us suppose a number of agriculturists raising produce valued at, say, a million of dollars, of which $\$ 500$,000 is required to support the families of the producers, leaving $\$ 500,000$ to be exchanged with the merchants for tea, sugar, clothing, possibly a little rye, and other etceteras. With this $\$ 500,000$ the merchant would be able to pay for the imports consumed, and there would be an exact balance of trade. Now let us put another case. The products of the agriculturists are precisely the same, but a set of capitalists undertake in the vicinity the construction, of a great railway and employ a large number of labourers. These lahourers, whose number and families we will assume to be abont the same as the others, require: 1st. fond valued at $\$ 500,010$, being an equivalent of that which the farmers retained for their own consumption. 2ndly. They require $\$ 010$,000 more to pay for their tea, sugar, clothing, and doubtless mather more rye than the others. What, then, is the result as regards the balance of trarle? Clearly an adverse balance of $\$ 1,000,000$. That amount is provided by an investment of capital, and for our present argument it is immaterial whether it is, as has been generally the case, ohtained from abroad or from capitalifits in the Dominion. The imported tea, sugar, clothing, etc., have to be paid for, and the entire prorlucts of the agriculturists have heen absorbed by domestic consumers. It has long been admitted hy all intelligent enquiers that the exports and imports of a country are no satisfactory guide to the national indebtedness.

There has been of late a great effort marle to establish trade between Brazil and Canada. It appears that the subsidy of $\$ 50,000$, which is wholly disproportionate either to the existing trade or to any likely to be carried on, is nevertheless inatequate, mod Sir Leonard Tilley, in his reply to Mr. Fortin, amounced that" the "estahlishment of that line is in some little "uncertainty at present as to its continu"ance; still I hope that the negotiations "that are now going on will lead to the "permanent continuance of that line "between Canarla and Brazil." The meaning of the Finance Minister must be that the indeiatigatle Brazilian Consul wants "better terms," and, moreover, that he is likely to get them. Sir Leonard lilley in the same speech affirmed that we had "largely increased our trade with Brazil in the last few years." Now we jnin issue with the Finance Minister on the state. ment as regards Canadian exports, which are what have principally to be considered. Of course the protective duties on sugar, which, as we pointed out on a former occasion, discriminate practically in favour of the very inferior sugars of Braxil, have tended to increase our imports of that article, but the great oliject that Mr. Fortin was anxious to eflect, was to increase our exports, and it is therefore to that branch ot our trade that our remarks shall be confined. The prineipal commodity exported to Brazil is fish. Out of a total export in 1862 of $\$ 402,785, \$ 414,146$ was fish. The trade retums prior to 1982 include Brazil with other South American States, so that there are no accurate statistics, but as those States have chiefly imported lumber, of which Brazil takes very lithle, we may credit it with the exports of fish in the previdis five years commencing with $18 \pi 7-78$. They were $\$ 381,415, \$ 37, i(15, \$ 397,651, \$ 424,50.7$ and $\$ 414,146$. There is no doubt that fish has been fully four-tifiths of the total exports. Prior to 1882 the agricultural exports were insignificant, heing confined to a smail amount of oats, hay and potatoes. In 1882 there seem to have heen some experiments, doubtess owing to the eflorts of the Brazilan Consul. In that year there were axported: nata, value $\$ 300$ fruit $\$ 93$, peas $\$ 120$, natmeal $\$ 30$, hay $\$ 1,405$, potatees, $\$ 1,706$ and flour $\$ 16,313$. Now as flour is the nnly article of any importance of apricultural prolucts exported in Brazil, it is worth hoticing that the ammunt is ahout one half of noe per cent of the augregaterexports of flour from the Dominion, und less than of per cent of the flour expolted to Newfoundland.

It may be interesling to consider the exports of manufactures on which subject our linance Minister has given some very extraordinary information. He stated that " there were a great many difficulties "in the introduction of the products of our manufactures into Brazil." 'The people of Brazil "have, we find, very "strong prejudices in favour of the manu: "faclures of England." Again, "Circum"stances have occurred to establish for "many years a very extensive trade " belween Bravil and Great Britain." And the same prejudices exist as to the United Slater.

Not a word to indicate that the prejudices wo simply owing to Great Jritain being able to fumish tho goods required in Jhazal chenper than any other country. When sir leonard, athe very time he was talking abont prejudices, was imposing an extra protection on printed cotions of: $7!$ per cent, ho was apparently umable to comprehend that it combry that is compelled to protect its industries by high duties dooms itself by that act to exelusion from the markets of the workl, its compensation being a monopoly of the lome market. Sir Lemard hit upon $a$ most unfortmato illustration of the difliculty of introducing Canadian manulactuese into Brazil, in view of the remonstrances recently mate to himon the subject of the duly on agricultural implements. He cited this as an instance of the prejectices of the Braxilians in favour of British mana. factures, and said that the same prejudices were folt in regard to the United States. It is truly absurd, in view of the protection accorded to our agricultural implements aganst the United States to imagine that we could compete in the Brazil marked with the United States for the supply of agricultural implements.

We musi devote a shorl space to the consideration of our exports of manuficetures to 13 razal, the aggregate amounting to $\$ 29,583$. The smallest amount of our exports of manulactures in tive years was 821,921 , and the largest in 1882509,583 . Now it is desiable to bear in mind that the nost important items under the head of manufactures are sewing machines and ships. It so happens that the largest exports of seving machines in the five years was, in $1875, \$ 10,500$, and the smallest, in 1882, $\$ 11,795$. And yet we are told by Sir Leonard 'Tilley that the elfect of his large subsidy of $\$ 50,000$ has been to increaso twade. The nextitem in importance is ships, but it is obvious that the purchase of ships will not be facilitated by the subsidy to the stemmers. In no year was more than one ship sold to Brazil, and
it so happened that in the year 1878 , when there was the largest export of "sewing machines" there was not a single ship sold, while in 1882 there was a ship sold for $\$ 13,000$, nearly one-half of the entire value of the manufactures. The ship and the sewing machines were valued at nearly $\$ 25,000$, the aggregate being $\$ 29,583$. The other exports were mainly, so far as we can judge, experimental, but our readers can decide for themselves: Biscuit $\$ 189$, boots and shoes $\$ 46$, ale and beer $\$ 329$, soap $\$ 142$, steel manufactures $\$ 100$, vinegar $\$ 444$, wood manufactures \$384, miscellaneous. $\$ 1,036$, iron and hard ware $\$ 1,408$. Let us imagine any of our business men subsidizing a line of steamers at $\$ 50,000$ to stimulate a trade of $\$ 30$, $000, \$ 1:, 000$ of which was the sale of a ship. We shatl not pursue the subject at present, although it is so important that we shall probably revert to it again.

We shall conclude with a fact or two: In 1879 the imports from the British West Indies were 8650,087 , from the Spanish S575,909, from South America, including Bratil, 84,358 . In 1882, they were, from British West Indies $\$ 1,848,794$, Spanish $\$ 2,136,168$ and from South America $\$ 1,373,617$. In 1879 the exports were to British West Indies $\$ 1,905,548$, Spanish \$1:237,508, South America \$741,442. In 1852 the exports were : British West Indies $\$ 1,688,962$, Spanish $\$ 1,078,273$, South America $\$ 941,162$, of which $\$ 492,78 \overline{0}$ went to Brazil. 'lhis latter is the pet country of the Dominion Government, which they aid by a subsidy of $\$ 50,000$.

We have to refer to another point. In 1882973 vessels were entered inwards by sea from the British West Indies, while from the pet foreign country of Sir Leomard Tilley there were just 37 . We submit our facts and figures for the criticism of the defenders of the Government policy to give a preference to foreigners over their fellow colonists of the British limpire. We own that we bave been unable to comprehend the manifest determination of the Dominion Government to encourage to the ulmost of their power, and in utter disregard of sound principles, commercial intercourse with foreigners in preference to our own fellow-subjects in the British West Inclies, notwithstanding the greater amount of exn exports to the latter. We are however bound to acknowledge that the press, which prolesses to speak for the opposition seems to be as strongly in the Brazil interest as that defending the Government; a fact which only proves the importance of havingan indefatigable or, possibly, an irrepressible Consul General.

THE CONFEDERATION LIFE ASSO. CIATION.

The eleventh annual report of this Association, printed elsewhere, is well worthy of perusal as showing the striking progress being made in life insurance in Canacla, and as an indication of the thrift and forethought of the people. There is surely no better omen of the future welfare of the country than this provision for a time when the earning power of the individual has fallen off. It is naturally of first importance that absolute security should surround the means by which such provision is made, and the Confederation Life Association is apparently determined that it shall be second to none in this respect. With the view of placing this beyond all doubt before the policyholders, the shareholders and the public at large, as well as in justice to itself, the Confederation recently determined upon a double valuation of its obligations in addition to that mate by their own actuary. It will be seen by the result tabulated in the report that the manner in which the liabilities have heretofore been ascertained and provided for, is more exacting by $\$ 12,000$ in its present application than that of Professor Cherriman, and by nearly $\$ 40,000$ than the valuation of Sheppard Homans, the well known New York actuary. The ingher reserve called for by the valuation made by Mr. Carpmael over that by Professor Cherriman, both being on the same mortality table and using the same rate of interest, is accounted for by the fact that in the practice of the Association it has been deemed wise to add a percentage to the net reserve in the case of paid-up and limited-payment policies, to provide for the future cost of taking care of such business and for any contingency in the future, a course, it is claimed, peculiar to the Association. The much greater difference when compared with the valuation made by Mr . Homans is to be accounted for by the increased severity of the Hm Actuaries table of Great Britain, as compared with the American experience table of mortality, the same rate of interest ( $4 \frac{1}{2}$ per cent) being used by each. In this respect the estimate made of the large surplus possessed by the Association under the sufliciently severe valuation of Prof. Cherriman, or even that of Mr. Homans, should be borne in mind. The number of policies issued during the year, after the usual careful selection, is 1573 as compared with 1360 in 1881, the amount being over $2 \frac{1}{2}$ millions of collars, an increase of over half a million as compared with the new business of the previous year. The total amount of insurance
thas increased by $1 \frac{2}{4}$ million dollars during the year, being altogether close on 10 millions. In the report sent for publication we observe that the encomiums pronounced upon the management, and the complimentary resolutions moved by Sir William Howland and seconded by one of Toronto's most experienced insurance managers, as well as the remarks of the chairman, have been suppressed. One can scarce object to such modesty in these days when the fault so frequently tends in the other direction. One of the remarks of the first vice-president of the Association, himself no second-rate authority on financial and commercial affairs generally, must close our review: "I do not think, and I say "it advisedly, as a person who has some " little knowledge of the workings of the "association-I do not think that there "is any company in Canada, whether a "banking or insurance company, or loan "association, that can show a better "report or a stronger position than we "present to-day."

## THE GRAND TRUNK AND THE CITY.

There is some reason to hope that the long pending dispute between the two powerful corporations named above, and which has been the cause of the infliction on the citizens of Montreal of the present disgraceful station on Bonaventure street, is likely to be settled. The Finance Commititee has agreed to recommend a settlement substantially similar to what the Grand Trink Co. agreed to accept on a former occasion, and which is, that if the city will abandon its clain against the Grand Trunk Co., amouyting to about $\$ 400,000$ with interest, the company will erect a new station, to cost nol less than $\$ 300,000$. It is much to be regretted that the Finance Committee was not umanimous, and we have noticed that the Hitness and Stur are both hostile to the setulement, so that it may be feared that when the Finance Committee's recommendation comes before the Council it will be vehemently opposed. The members of the corporation and the journals referred to have carefully avoided the discussion of the question on its merits, and have assumed that the indebtedness of the company to the city is beyond dispute.
We endeavored to place this disputed question fairly before our readers in November last, as it seems impossible that after a lapse of 33 years the circumstances can be familiar even to the members of the corporation. Alderman Mooney is reported as contending "that "the fact of Mr. Hickson making an offer
"of $\$ 400,000$ in stock was a sufficient "admission that the company owed the "debt." Now we contend that the worthy alderman has only proved by the remark that we have cited, that he does not understand the question, for Mr. Hick son's offer is in strict accordance with the pretension of the Grand Trunk Co., which is, that the city subscribed for $\$ 000,000$ stock in the St. Lawrence dA Allantic Railway, subsequently amalgamated, under the authority of Parliament, with the Grand 'Irunk Railway, and agreed'to give their bonds in payment-that the cancellation of the original agreement was never regularly made, and that the Grand Trunk are not bound by law to retire the city bonds, while they are certainly not bound to do so on any other ground. We believe that the above is a tolerably correct statement of the pretension of the Grand'Irunk Co., although our information is not derived from any official source, and we have never seen any satisfactory explanation of the precise ground of the city's claim.
It was in July, 1849, that the original agreement was made between the city and the Grand Trunk Co. by which the former was to take $\$ 500,000$ stock in the St. Lawrence \& Atlantic Railway, and to pay for it in debentures which the Railway Company agreed to take instead of cash, although not at the time worth anything like par. The Finance Committee adopted the scheme, and when it came before Council, Mr. Beaudry (we are not certain whether it was the present mayor) moved its adoption. Alderman Bourret moved, in amendment, that a public meeting of the citizens should be called to consider the subject, as two influential gentlemen, Mr. J. D. Gibb and Mr. John Molson, were opposed to the scheme. The amendment was adopted ${ }_{2}$ and the public meating was held 31st July, 1849, the mayor being chairman. The names of the movers and seconders of the resolutions approving of the action of the Finance Committee were as follows: Hon. A. N. Morin, Joseph Shuter; Benjamin Holmes, David Torrance, George E. Cartier and John Rose. Mr. O. Berthelet, one of the wealthy Montreal citizens, spoke in opposition to Mr. Gibb and Mr. Molson, who said that " he came "forward with great reluctance to second "Mr. Gibb's amendment." The vote was unanimous, except the mover and seconder of the amendment.
It must be obvious from the foregoing statement of undisputed facts, that the City issued the debentures in payment of stock, and, judging from a passage in Mr. Hickson's letter, to the effect that "the stock certificates "of the St. Tawrence \&
"Atlantic Railway Co., now held by the city, "be surrendered to the Co." we should infer that the stock certificates are still in possession of the city authorities. The question is, what is the precise nature of the instrument by which the Grand Trunk Co. agreed to relieve the city of its stock and of its liability for the debentures. There is nothing in the remarks of the Aldermen to elucidate this very important point. Aldermen Mooney, the most prominent opponent of the settlement, said that, "according to the city auditors the money had been duly loaned, and was owing to the cily." Now it is beyond doubt that it was not "loaned." When the first $\$ 100,000$ became due, in 1859 , it is a historical fact that the Finance Minister, Sir Alexander Galt, advanced from the public chest that sum to the city of Montreal, if Turcotte's History can be relied on, to redeem the bonds of the city. For this the Govermment was censured by Parliament, in 1862, on which occasion the negotiations which led to confederation took place. Whether that $\$ 100,000$ was ever repaid to the Government we are unaware, but certainly it was not paid by the city, which thus got relieved of that portion of its original indebtedness.

The case as it at present stands is that the city of Montreal agreed to take $\$ 500,000$ of stock, paying for it with its debentures, and that it is now pretended and supported by the opinions of some lawyers that the Grand Trunk Co. relieved the city of the stock, and agreed to pay the debentures. On the other hand, the Grand Trunk Co. deny that this arrangement was legally made, and is sustained by the opinion of other lawyers. Surely under the circumstances, it is a wise mode of settling the dispute to adopt the proposition that the alleged debt should be cancelled, conditionally on the expenditure by the Grand Trunk of $\$ 300,000$ on a station that will be a credit to the city. Strange to relate, one alderman actually declared that, as other railways had been subsidized by the city, he would have supported a subsidy if proposed, but "would not blot out a "debt." And yet all the city has been asked to do is to carry out an agreement made in the most formal manner 33 years ago, which the city claims that it has been generously relieved of by the Grand 'Irunk Co., but which the latter deny.

## THE SUPPLEMENTARY ESTIMATLES.

Great anxiety prevails as to the additional estimates which are daily expected to be submitted. The Montreal Harbour Board hope that their claim will not be overlooked and that the unanswer-
alle reasons for the assumption as a Dominion wolk of the deepening of the Chamel of the St. Lawrence will have mince wejpht than the carrying of the people of Quebec who never have hat, and never cain have, the control of the st. dawrence trade. Whether they can suc. ceed in diverting it to mited chamnels is the real question at issue. The Quebec Govermment is mostanxious for a decision on the better terms guestion, which there is *elittle doubt has been presented as forcibly as possible. There are doubtless many other jurties interested in other schemes of mote or less importance.

## TIE RIVAL RAILROADS.

The Cumod G Guzelle, a new paper recently established in lonion, has puh. lished the fovermment cablegram signed liy sir Menty Tyler on the part of the Grand Trunk Co. and Mr. George Steplien, on behall' of the Camadian Tacific Co., the main ohject of which is that the latter shall cade to the former the Credit Valley, the Ontario \& Quebec, and the Atlantic, North West, and South Eastern linesan arrangement that most assuredly would have given great dissatisfaction to the public at large. 'The Camada Gazelle, while expressing regret that the agreement was not ratified by the Pacific Co., frankly admits that "the people of "Canada camot be justly reproached for "mising their voices agminst the agree"ment," and adds "it can be easily "realized that much the same fecling "would prevail here in like circumstances; "and if Canadian companies will work in "the friendly rivalry common to England "there is no reason to suppose that inves"ters will sufler more in Canada han "they do here." In closing the negotiation Mr. Stephen assured Sir Henry Tyler that, "it will bo my endeavor to maintain "the most friendly relations with your "company in every way consistent with " Whe interests of the Camatian Pacific Rail"way." ha his reply Sir Itenry Tyler contime himself in an expression of regret that Mr. Stephen was in a position to carry out the arangement which he believed was practically concluded, and "which "formed the subject of our joint cable"gram of instructions to the general man"agers of the two companies in Camarla." It appears to us that Sir Henry Tyler has failed to consider a most important difference between the two negotiations. Lonton is the seat of Government of the Grund Truoks, and Sir lienry 'Tyler could of course send instructions to the general manager in Canada. Such was not the cise with Mr. Stephen. Montreal is the
seat of government of the Canadian Pacific railway, and its directors are on this sicie of The Atlantic. There can be no doubt that Mr. Stephen's recommendation has great weight, but then the directors could not shrink from the responsibility of forcing theirown judement in the point at issue. The Cain rald Guzelle announces that the rffect on the money market was a fall in the Grand Trunk shares. As regurds the traflic between. Montreal and Toronto, there can be litule doubt that it will $\overrightarrow{\text { be }}$ large enough to employ both roads, and possibly the failure of the negotiations may necessitate a double track.

The directors have much pleasure in again meeting the policy-humers and sharcholders at the thntaal meeting, and in being able to subait to them the following statements of the business of the association, which attest in the strongest possible nantior to the progress and stability atained.
During the year 1618 new rpplichtions, for a total assurance of $\$ 2,713,88$ the been considered. Of these 1504, for $\$ 2,407,387$, were npproved, and 114, for Si 36,000 , were declined or withitrawn not being considered desimable risks. Including 9 revived policies, 1513 new poticies for $\$ 2,510,357$ were issued, and the year closed with 6,357 pulictos, assuring $20,909,246.10$ in force.

The financial statements, duly ecrtilied by Lhe andiors, drawn up in the compleie and simple form adoped by the association, leave nothing to be explatind. I will not atempt to particndarize all these attacks, for hey eomptise a very large space in the columns of the inserame 'limes from October last to March of ha preseat yemr. 'The board viewed these atacks as uncalled for mad noexmmpled in elmmeter, and though hay would not objeet to a fitir discussion of the principles involved in the dife insurnace business, as carred on by this association, they were not willing to subinit to have lialse statements as to the pesition and conduct of the business of the compmy grinted and circulated surrepitionsly and anonymonsly-statements which wete intended to impair the reputation tund standing of the compuny, und which were most unfitirat minges to thost enadacting its athats." (llear, henr,
The President refered at length to the axamination of the defendants moser math, and also to the eharges in the matter of the specia! lom which memened in the necomals for 1881, and to the case of thomas Eaves mal Jr .
 epresentmionts. A fill seport of his speedi will he fomblan the companys ordianty report.
Ia conclasion, the Ulatioman said: "They buve abempted, it the way I have stated io impmir public condidence in the compmay. In regard to heir mis-statements ats to he provisions made tor the security of but policyholders, I think the statements I have haid before you, showitug our preseat hatancint position, and lhe result of the investigntion by Messis. Oherriman and llomans, is it lull naswer to all that. I do not think it repures suybling else. It not only proves that we do make movision such tes is omdinarily mote by other emmanies, but that we to moh more in poviling for the security uf those who insure with tis. In comaction will has matter it is puite evilent that this athed apon the comgmy originates firs from malignity and bad leeling on lhe prot of the instigat lors agrinst om hamger persomally, and, secomdy, with a view to injure the prosition of the company betore the public, possibly with the iden that such a eourse wound result it some degree to theid own alvantage, I think, so fire us the manger is eoncernod, we who have subaromad this board daciug the whole period that he hats ocenpied bis present position have phenty ot evidence of his devotion to the interests of this company, and of his ability to condret it. When the contest amse as to what shonhl be the basis apon which life insumane shonld be comblated, there was no one individund who exercised so great :un induence; who devoted more time, and liforar, and anxiety it embewouring to get the Govermanmand hergislature to estathish a busis that wom he safe to those who joined hese institutions and insured their lives in them than one manager. It is manaly due to him that the rate of interest was rellaced from the rate that was previonsly in vogine, nut the one that exists at present was established. His whole view bas been a conservative une, to strengethen the position of the company, and to inerense the security of the policy-holders, and in that view he has had the full concarrence of the bomed, and 1 think that the position of this compmiy to-dny gives evidence that we hase praciendy aeted apon that pinciple, and that she sechity athmed by it to those who foront as with their pintronage is such as is ut lease equal to, if not greater, than that allorded by any other combmay, as to the charge liat lins been minde that we do not minke provision for suspaded montality, that guestion wit! be dealt with in the eunrse of the procedings of the meeling by the manager himselt, and by Mr. Cmpmach. I will not detuin you with any further remarks, but will, betore sitting donn, make the usum motion for the adoption of the report. I beg, then, to
nove that the report of the directors, the fimancian statements, the report ot the anditors; of the Special Committee on Investments, the nethary's report, and the report of the trustees for the Govermment savings bank policies be alopted." (Ampluse.)

I momery glad to have in oppormaity olabearing lestimony to the correctness of inl the stutements the has made, and to congratulate the shareholders of the assuciation mon the very excelleat pusition that the company occupies. 1 do not think, and I say it alvisedly, is a person who has some little knowledge of the workings of the association-I do not think that there is any company in Canada, whether a banking or insurance company, or loun associntion, that ean show a bether report or a stronger josition than we present todiny. (Cheers.) I would mot indeed do justice to my feelinga, after hearing the way in which our manager has been muoyed and athacked by certain froties, if I did not stato that very mach of that prospurity is athributable to his merit. (Loud applanse.) The shatements that have been made with so machatentacy by the pesident in reference to these disputed points are striedy eorrect. Widl regard to the biaves matater we fella disposition to do everyhing that was possible, and, ander the eircunstunces, were even willing to streteh our powers, consistent with a regard to our trast, in view of the caso being a pecaliar one -but we found that we could hol. It was said by praties onside that there were sulficient fiunds at the credit of this policy to pay what was necessary in order to keep the policy alive -woll, gentlemen, you will maderstand chat will every disposition to do that, we could not do it legrilly-the ofler members of the company comk havi instituted proceedings againt us and leed us fersomally responsible for what we hat done. J'on will see the reisonableness ofournction; the other matter has been so filly gone into I need not further refer to it. Suftice it to say that there never was a time in the history of this compuay, thed I have been connected with it from the commencement, when my confidence in its limmeial position and its position genemily was greater than at his moment." (Ulieers.)
'The meeling pissed resolutions of thanks to the directors, mamager, acthary, ageney, oflice and medical stafif ele, also to Nessis. John Langton und dohin M. Mirtib, the anditors, who were renpmointed.

A considerably larger business las been done in stocks the past week, at ndvancing prices As compared with a week ago, Montral Bank shows an adrance of $2 \frac{1}{2}$ per cent., Ontariol ju.c. 'oronto 5 p . c., Merchants 1 p . c., Commerce 13, Federal 12, Richelien 4, Oity Gas 4 $\frac{1}{2}$, Lelegraph 31, and'St. Pual, M. \& M., an advince of Si per cent. Cruada Cotion fell off 1 per cent to-day, buyers closing at 99 . See comparative table on another page.
Ashes.-Receipts are modernte. .There has been a brisk demand for Pirst Pots at \$5. 10 to $\$ 5.20$; one Jot brought somewhat higher jigures. Seconds $\$ 4.80$ to $\$ 4.85$. No Thirds. Pearls continue nominal, a small parcel of 4 Firsts and 2 Seconds has been received this week, but price obnimed has not transpived. Receipts since 1st Jinuary 2200 barela Pots, 52 barrels Pearls. Deliverics 1028 barrels Pots, of barrels Pearls. Stock in store at sis o'uluck on Wednesday evening lodt barrels Pots and 48 barrels Pearls.
Boors aso Shors,-Pravellers, now mut on their sorting-up trip, ure doing frinly well in some sections, while in others orders are dificult to obtain, as many country merchants are only conmencing to move their Spring stocks. The western jobbers are reported to be ordering for their fial tade, some hatving been in the city the past week for samiples.

Jamy Jroduch-Recejpts of new Buller contime light for the sason of the year, but are sulficient for the local demand, to which business is restifeted. Values are unchanged, the bulk of the ollerings bringing 24e to 26 c ; strietly choice packages have oceasionally commanded a bigher figure. Common qualities and ald butter rule nominal, 20 c being about the nverane value. One or two smail lots of poor ware picked up yesterday at 10c. Lalest English mail advices state, concerning the Siverpool market: "The low prices that have been taken for fancy creamery lots have had a demoralizing influence on continental descriptions which are ollered at irregulat prices. Ilhere exisis a good enquiry for lots from 60s to 75 s ; choice ereameries, 95 c to 100s; perfect lots realize a shade more." The local Cheese market continues quiet, with the views of bujers lower on the new make which is quoted at 12e to l3c. At hittle Falls, N.Y. Thesday 2,500 boxes factory checse were sold at lote to $12 \frac{1}{2} \mathrm{e}$, slowing in decline of de tos c compred with prices of the week previous. The Liverpool public cable quotes $6886 d$.

Drugs anp Cmemonds.- 'lbere is a continned and increased netivity in this department, mostly in genern druggists' goods, the demand for heary chemicnls being unimportant. In priees there is litule to report by way of change. Stocks of heary goods are light, and what little is moving is at extreme prices. bleaching ponder of which the maket is almost bare has been sold as light us 2dc. Alum $2 \frac{1}{4} \mathrm{c}$. Sab Sollu, s1.20. The English market exhibits a firwer feeling and in tendency to higher prices. The reduction in the output of bleaching powder arenged for came into operation on listinstant, and:price has already hardened. Forward contracts hase been placed at $£ 62 \mathrm{~s}$ 6 d to 465 s , and now makers ask $\mathrm{E}^{6} 6$ los to f6 15 s, the lather figures being at present over buyers' riews. Cuustic is also higher. Polass Iodide lower. Quinine also lower.

Dry Goons.-Some houses appear to be busier than others, but on the whole a quiet week lias been passed, and the markel seems deroid of interesting features. With the continued cool, backward spring wenther, and the stocks in the country almost nubroken, it was not to be expected that travellers would do an active sorting-up business, and it is the opinion of some leading houses that they will have to cover the ground a second time this season. A few buyers have been in the market, as is usual at this period, but their purchases are naturally small, and stocks are still left well-nssorted in all departments. The city retail trade has continued rather innctive the past week, owing, presumably, to the unfivorable weather. An American traveller was reported in: the city yesterday, bying to secure orders for cottons, but it is a foregone conclusion that he found it a losing game. Payments are generally reported fair.

Floun and Grain. - English breadstuffs' markets have been firmer, with an adyancing tenalency, cable ndvices reporting $a$ further adrance of $3 d$. per quarter for Whent in Liverpool to-day, Imports in the United lingdom for the week show an increase of 5,000 brls. Flour, 5,000 gis. Wheat, and a decrease of 50,000 qrs. Corn. The American Whent markets have ruled somewhat irregular, but an advance of le to $1 \frac{1}{2} c$ reported in Chiengo toWhy; New York is also le higher than yesterday. In sympathy with outside markets there is astronger feeling in the local market; a fixir rolume of business. has been done in Canadn Whents during the week for thay delivery, at advanced prices, but conse gmins remain guiet and generally unchanged. Owing to the ice blocknde at Cape. Ronge, which prevents vessels coming through, the market for flom has ruled exceedingly dull; buyers anticipate liberal receipts from the West before an outlet is found for Quebec and the Lower Ports, and this may cause lower pices. Although foreign markets are stronger seljers have been forced to make concessions in orter to do business.

Pudrs.-The demand is reported generally good, notwithstanding the cold, uniavorable wenther. Oranges continue scarce and firm, at $\$ 6.75$ to $\$ 7$ per case, and Lemons are in good request at $\$ 3.50$ to $\$ 4$ per box, or $\$ 5$ per case. A fair trade is being done in havana Jineapples, at 52.50 to 83 per doz, Cococmuts slow of sale, at $\$ 5$ per hundred, and. Bununas steady, at $\$ 2$ to $\$ 3$ per bunch. Apples extremely dull; and lower; the range of priees guoted is from $\$ 3.50$ to $\$ 4.50$, the outside figure being mid only for the best. Buapmated Abples also lower, in sympathy, now selling at 15 to 17 c per ib. Southern Stravbervies are in the market: at 40c 1050 c per quart box.
Funs.-Spring Muskrats are bringing 15 c to 15 c , hut as yet receipts heve been light. An impored enquiry is reported for Bear at $\$ 8$ to 510 tor large, $\$ 4$ to $\$ 7$ for small, nud 52 to $\$ 5$ for cubs; holders would do well in this market at present. A few Red fox are offering at 51.25 , but the market is weak for this class of skius, nad also for Martin and Mink. Other kinds mink, $\$ 1$; red fox, $\$ 1$ to $\$ 1.30$; murten, 7 ane to $\$ 1$; otter, $\$ 8$ to $\$ 10$; beaver, $\$ 2$ to $\$ 2.50$ per It ; skink, 60 c ; bear, $\$ 8$ to $\$ 12$ for large, $S 4$ to 57 for small, and $\$ 2$ to $\$ 5$ for cub; lynx, $\$ 2$ to 53.50 ; spring rats, 150 to 18 c .
Groobras. - Suyars.-Some ndvance in Grnnulated from lowest point, and market firm for Refined generally, with sales to fair extent. West India Sugars, notably Porto Ricn, are higherat place of growth, and desirablet Grocery grades not in much supply: Molasses.-Market quiet, sales of lot reported about 48 c , held in common way 00c to 53c. Syrups of high class in moderate supply. Icas.-Cable advices report market in Japan as just opened at lower figure than last yent, say about $\$ 35$ the picul, with expectation of lower prices soon, this is about equal to 47 c bere. Our mar-
ket remains with very slight changes for all kinds. Low grade Japans held more firmly. Coffees-Java and Mocha maintain high figures; other kinds quiet. Rice.-Market active at adrance, say about 15 c to 20 c . The mill here has been seling to a considerable extent. English market firm. Spices.-Pepper as high, if not mather higher, than yet reached in New York. With us it is frm, Cassin and Common Ginger steady. Mruits.-Valentias not in large supply bat still by no means active. Prices for the werk show but slight change. Malaga fruit dull. Au effort is making in Malaga, by more care as to quality and packages, to secure some of the trade transferred to Valentias. The wine makers are reported lately to have bought a quantity of Loose Muscatels in Malaga at fully equal, if not over, New York relative value. Tarragona Almonds firm. Walnuts dull.

Hardwane and Iron:-A fair rmount of business in filling general Speing orders is being done, and puyments are reported fair. About 500 tons Nos. 1 and 3 of Calder have been placed during the week, and from $\$ 21.50$ to $\$ 33$, ex-ship here.
Hides and Siciss.-A moderate business contimues to be done in mative Ilides at unchanged quotations.
